Data Book - 1968, 1969

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## INTRODUCTION

This "Wyoming Criminal Justice System Data Book" is designed to present basic statistics concerning the operation of all aspects of the Wyoming Criminal Justice System during the period 1968 and 1969, together with some basic demographic statistics concerning the people and geography of Wyoming. It is the purpose of this introduction to briefly explain the procedures used in compiling this data, the extent of coverage of the data-gathering effort, some limitations concerning the value of the data, some explanations of terms used and acknowledgments of agencies whose cooperation made this publication possible.

### A. Procedures

The basic procedure used in compiling the vast majority of the data included in this publication was the use of personal interviews with representatives of nearly every agency in the Wyoming Criminal Justice System. These interviews were conducted by four graduate assistants from the College of Law at the University of Wyoming during the summer of 1969. Using forms developed by the Governor's Committee on Criminal Administration, these students visited the office of almost every police chief, every county sheriff, every district judge, every county clerk, every county attorney, almost every Justice of the Peace and almost every municipal judge in the State of Wyoming. When the questionnaire called for information or statistics which had not heretofore been compiled by the agency under consideration, these graduate students, with the generous permission of almost every agency concerned, extracted the required information from raw data and files kept by the agency. Complete sets of the questionnaires used in this effort are contained in the "State Planning Manual" published in August of 1969 by the Governor's Planning Committee on Criminal Administration. The information and statistics contained in Parts III, IV, V and VI are a result of these questionnaires. The information contained in Parts I and II was compiled by the staff of the State Planning Agency from previously published sources and from city and county budgets filed with the office of the Wyoming State Examiner.

### B. Coverage

Because of the use of the technique of personal interviews, the coverage of this data-gathering effort was extremely comprehensive. Of the total of 53 law enforcement agencies contacted only one refused to supply requested data. Likewise one of the twelve district judges contacted failed to supply requested data. Apart from these omissions every agency contacted gave its fullest

cooperation to this effort. For this reason the data contained in this publication can claim for the law enforcement area coverage of 98% of the Wyoming population living in urban areas of 1,000 or more (30 out of 31 cities) and 97% of county population (22 out of 23 counties); for the district court area 100% coverage in terms of caseload statistics (23 out of 23 county clerks) and 92% in terms of coverage of individual district court judges (11 out of 12); 100% coverage of county and prosecuting attorneys (23 out of 23); 67% coverage of the known Justices of the Peace (46 out of 69) and probably a much higher per cent of the active J.P.'s; and 93% coverage of the municipal courts in cities or towns of 1,000 or more in the state (29 out of 31). Three towns of less than 1,000 population were also surveyed. In addition, opinion questionnaires from 169 persons were received and compiled. These included 53 from law enforcement personnel, 82 from lower court judges, 23 from county and prosecuting attorneys and 11 from district court judges.

C. Limitations

Although the scope of this data-gathering effort was extremely wide in coverage, the limitations of the data contained herein should be recognized. Among the many problems faced during the course of this project were the antiquated and inadequate record keeping system of many local agencies, the inconsistency in definition of terms used by these agencies, inaccuracies in the data-gathering forms themselves, and the lack in many cases of comparable time periods. In regard to the latter problem all compiled data contained herein represents twelve months of activity during 1968 and 1969 by the agency reporting. However, in many cases the twelve month period of one agency may not be the same as that of a sister agency due to different record keeping systems and, in the case of many courts, different terms of court. It is the hope of the Governor's Planning Committee on Criminal Administration that these inadequacies of the data will be corrected in future data-gathering efforts. Until that time the present effort will have to be considered as a first step and its results accepted and utilized in the light of limitations facing accurate data-gathering in the State of Wyoming.

It should also be mentioned here that special jurisdictions such as the Windriver Indian Reservation, the two National Parks in Wyoming and the University of Wyoming Campus Police are not included in this data. Information concerning these special

jurisdictions will be included in the Wyoming Comprehensive Law Enforcement Plan for 1970.

D. Explanation of Terms Used

In most cases terms used in compiling this data are either self-explanatory or are defined in the "State Planning Manual" published by the Governor's Planning Committee on Criminal Administration. However in the case of the section on "Needs and Problems of the Wyoming Criminal Justice System" certain explanations may be useful. As used in that section the term "recommendations" for improvement of the C.J.S. includes responses to questions on the opinion questionnaire which requested suggestions concerning ways in which criminal activity in the State of Wyoming could be reduced and the efficiency of the Wyoming Criminal Justice System could be increased. These responses were generally directed toward the improvement of the system as a whole rather than to the operations of the individual agency completing the questionnaire. The term "critical problems", on the other hand, related specifically to the problems faced by the agency answering the questionnaire and these reflect the respondent's self-view of his own problems and opportunities for improvement. Finally, the term "highest priority" includes responses to a question asking each respondent to identify the one or two problems he would most like to see corrected in or by his own agency.

In all cases in which information was not available from the respondent agency, or was not capable of compilation from the reported data, the notation "N.A." is used.

E. Credits

Finally the assistance and cooperation of many agencies and individuals should be recognized. Without these parties the publication of this document would not have been possible. Primary recognition should go to the many county and local agencies of the Wyoming Criminal Justice System who so kindly cooperated in making data available. The four young men who collected this data, Dallas Laird, David Lewis, Tom Maxfield and Jim Owens, should be congratulated for their efforts. They were assisted at times by James Hagood and Terry Mackey. In addition thanks should go to the United States Census Department, the Division of Business and Economic Research of the College of Commerce and Industry at the University of Wyoming, the Wyoming Employment Security Commission, and the Wyoming Education Department for the data contained in Part I and to the Wyoming State Examiner's

Office for the information contained in Part II.

Any comments or suggestions for improvement of this effort in the future, or criticism of the present effort, will be appreciated.
