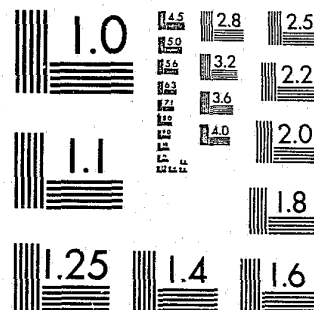

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## STUDY DESCRIPTION

The National Crime Survey Victim Risk Supplement was sponsored by the Bureau of Justice Statistics with the data collection conducted by the Census Bureau. The Supplement was designed to collect information on interviewed and noninterviewed household reports. This supplement was a special, one-time survey that was administered in conjunction with the larger National Crime Surveys: National Sample during February 1984. The purpose of the survey was to gather data on respondent's lifestyles in order to determine whether certain lifestyles are related to crime victimization.

## DATA COLLECTION PROCEDURES

The Victim Risk Supplement is based on five questionnaires used by the Census Bureau. The first and second questionnaires, VRS-1 and VRS-2, contain basic screen questions and an incident report, respectively. The VRS-3, the third questionnaire, is completed for every household member age 12 or older. Respondents 16 years of older who answered questions in the VRS-1 and VRS-2 are also required to be self-respondents for the VRS-3 questions. The VRS-3 includes questions designed to collect information on whether a respondent's lifestyle at work, home, or during leisure time affect the risk of crime victimization.

Interviewers completed the fourth and fifth questionnaires, VRS-4 and VRS-5. Interviewers were instructed to answer questions about the respondents neighborhoods and their behavior during interviews after leaving the interviewed household.

## SAMPLING AND WEIGHTING INFORMATION

### Sampling

As stated above, the Victim Risk Supplement data were collected as a part of the February 1984 interviews done for the National Crime Surveys: National Sample.

The National Sample consists of approximately 72,000 sample housing units selected in a stratified multi-stage cluster sample from the 1931 Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) formed within counties or groups of counties using every county in the U.S. The PSUs were grouped into 376 strata by



combining PSUs with similar characteristics into 220 strata and allocating a single self-representing PSU to the remaining 156 strata. Beyond the 156 PSUs selected with certainty, a single PSU per stratum was selected with a probability proportionate to size in the 220 combined stata.

The sample of housing units within a PSU was attained in two stages. In the first stage, Enumeration Districts (EDs: Geographic areas ranging in size from a city block to several hundred square miles, usually encompassing from 750 to 1,500 persons established for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing), were systematically selected from a geographically arranged listing. In the second stage, each previously selected ED was subdivided into segments of about four housing units from which a sample of segments was then selected. Whenever possible, the segments were formed from the list of addresses compiled during the 1970 Census. Housing units built after the 1970 Census were sampled primarily from lists of new construction units. Since data from the 1980 Decennial Census have become available, they have been employed in adjusting weights and the current sample design.

The National Sample of 72,000 housing units yields approximately 60,000 household interviews in the 50 states and the District of Columbia for a six-month period. Because of the continuing nature of the National Crime Survey, a rotation scheme was devised to avoid interviewing the same household indefinitely in order to avoid poor cooperation or biased responses resulting from repeated interviewing. The sample of housing units is divided into six rotation groups with each group being interviewed every six months for three years (a total of up to seven interviews per household).

Within each rotation group six panels are designated, with a different panel interviewed each month during the six-month period. The first interview for a housing unit in a group is used only for bounding and is not included in the regular public use data. However, if a new household moves into a sample unit, the members of that household are interviewed and their unbounded interviews are included in the data. Thus the number of incident reports associated with a household may be effected by its tenure in the sample. New households will have unbounded information while older units may display "time in sample" effects.

#### Weighting

The National Crime Survey Victim Risk Supplement weights reflect the normal National Crime Survey weighting.

#### FILE STRUCTURE

The National Crime Survey Victim Risk Supplement is a structured file organized into a hierarchical format which corresponds to variations in household composition and in the occurrence of incidents of victimization. Most commonly hierarchical datasets have varying record types and lengths with each record being stored sequentially in the data file. The Victim Risk Supplement has different record types, however the record lengths of each type of record, household, person, or incident is actually the same, 481 characters.

In the Supplement there are three primary types of records: household, personal, and incident. The household record contains information about the household as reported by the respondent. The person record contains information about each household member age twelve years or older as reported by that person or a proxy, with one record for each qualifying individual. The incident record contains information drawn from the incident report completed for each household or person incident mentioned during the interview.

Data from the VRS-4 "Observation of Sample Unit" questionnaire are contained at the end of the household record. Data from the VRS-3 "Supplemental Individual Information" and the VRS-5 "Observation of Respondent" questionnaires are contained at the end of the Personal record.

A typical cluster of housing units might contain four households each with varying numbers of inhabitants some of whom report victimizations. The records for such a cluster might look as follows:

The Bureau of the Census initially issued the NCS Victim Risk Supplement data in a file with a single variable length record per household. At the ICPSR, the file is organized into the household, personal, and incident levels. Using the OSIRIS IV software, these levels are then linked together in a hierarchical pattern, where the household record forms the basic building block for the file. The person and incident records are then linked in a subordinate way to "root" this group.

As a link is followed down from the root, the relationship is always one to many. In the NCS Victim Risk Supplement data, each occurrence of a household will have associated with it. In no case will a person-level record occur without a household or with additional households subordinate to it. The same is true for incidents vis-a-vis persons.

Because of the hierarchical nature of the NCS Victim Risk Supplement data, the ICPSR has also added control numbers which uniquely identify all occurrences of all groups. As these variables link and order the data, they are crucial in generating the file structure, ensuring accurate retrieval, and permitting file updating. Each group is defined by a unique control number in addition to the control numbers of the superordinate group to which it is linked. Group 1, the Household level contains control numbers which identify it: a sample designation, a PSU number, a segment number, a check digit, and a serial number, as well as collection quarter information. Group 2, at the Personal level, is in turn subordinate to group 1 and so contains the Household ID and Household level control numbers in addition to a line number. Group 3, at the Incident level, contains an incident number in addition to control numbers which correspond to its superordinate groups 1 and 2.

The National Crime Surveys: Victim Risk Supplement, 1983 is available from the ICPSR in OSIRIS format. The OSIRIS dictionary gives the format and other information for each variable. The dictionary or dictionary-codebook file is used in conjunction with the OSIRIS software package.

The Victim Risk Supplement data collection contains information for 731 variables. There are 14,258 households, 25,238 persons, and 2,952 incidents in the data file. In addition, there were 25,138 responses to the VRS-3 questionnaire, 11,000 to the VRS-4 questionnaire and 22,990 to the VRS-5 questionnaire.

# CODEBOOK INFORMATION

The example below is a reproduction of information appearing in the machine-readable codebook for a typical variable. The numbers in brackets do not appear but are references to the descriptions which follow this example.

[1] Indicates the variable and reference numbers. Usually the reference number is located immediately beneath the variable number, but in this codebook it is beneath the group number (see note [5]). A variable and a reference number are assigned to each item in the study. In this codebook documenting the archived dataset, variable and reference numbers often differ. For many variables, a reference number is assigned which corresponds to the source code used by the Bureau of the Census. The source code appears on the original instrument next to each question and is circled. Should the data be formed into a fixed record length record file, new variable numbers may be assigned or created. The reference number would remain unchanged and correspond to those in this codebook.

[2] Indicates the abbreviated (24 character maximum) variable label used within OSIRIS to identify each variable. An expanded version can be found in the variable description list.

[3] Indicates the sequential location and width of this variable within the record when the data are stored on magnetic tape. In this example, the variable named "TENURE" is one column wide and located in the 48th column within the HOUSEHOLD RECORD. Other variables will be in this same location in person and incident records. In a fixed length record file of this data the locations will be different.

[4] Indicates the designation of missing data. In this example, code value equal to or greater than nine are missing data (MD=9 OR GE 9). Although these values are defined as within the missing data categories, this does not mean that the user should not or cannot use these code valued in a substantive role, if so desired.

[5] Indicates the group and level numbers, as well as the name of the group where the variable is located. Group and level numbers are used only if the file structure is hierarchical.

[6] Indicates the type of variable - TYPE C means that the variable is character numeric.

[7] Indicates the full text of the question supplied by the original collectors of the data. This is the wording used in the original questionnaire.

[8] Indicates an additional note. This note does not actually occur in this variable.

[9] The phrase "Actual number is coded" would appear if the variable were continuous.

[10] Indicates the code values occurring in the data for this variable.

[11] Indicates the meaning of the codes.

# ICPSR PROCESSING INFORMATION

The ICPSR has added to the data a series of identification variables within collection quarter. A sequential household identification number was added for each Household, Person, and Incident record. A sequential person identification number was added within each within each household for each Person and Incident record. A sequential identification variable was also added for multiple victimizations.

During ICPSR processing it was discovered that duplicate records and miscoded identification records existed in the data. The Bureau of Justice Statistics edited the file. Duplicates were deleted and the miscoded identification records were matched with the correct records and changed accordingly.

The data were processed according to the standard ICPSR processing procedures. The data were checked for illegal or inconsistent code values which, when found, were recoded to OSIRIS missing data codes. No consistency checks were performed. Statements bracketed in "["and"]" signs in the body of the codebook were added by the processors for explanatory purposes.
