

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Crime in Arkansas, 1986, is a summary report on crime, based on statistics submitted by law enforcement agencies as a part of the Arkansas Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program.

While this document is a comprehensive report on crime, it must be understood that it includes only the number of arrests and incidents known and reported by law enforcement agencies. It does not include any data relating to prosecution, adjudication or correction. Likewise, it does not attempt to draw any conclusions about the cause of crime.

UCR data pertains to the number of criminal events in specific geographic areas, rather than the effectiveness or activities of agencies. It should not be used to evaluate or directly compare one agency to another.

In 1986, for the second consecutive year, the number of serious crimes reported in Arkansas increased, up 9.9 percent from 1985. Included in that increase was a rise of 14.2 percent in the number of violent crimes. This is discouraging news, especially in this period of very limited resources for criminal justice in our state.

If the statistics in this report tell us anything, it is that we must continue to enhance our efforts. To effectively fight crime, law enforcement and the entire criminal justice community needs more funding and assistance. A high priority must be placed on dealing with crime, beginning with an overall awareness of the problem. This report is presented as an aid in the process.

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Section 1

THE UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM IN ARKANSAS

Background

The development of a nationwide Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program began more than 50 years ago. In 1930, Congress authorized the FBI to collect crime statistics from local police departments. All information came from reports that law enforcement agencies routinely compile for their own efficient administration. The underlying philosophy was and is oriented toward law enforcement statistics for use by law enforcement agencies.

In an effort to obtain a complete picture of crime on a national level, the data is collected on certain offenses that become known to police. An overview can then be obtained through examination of seven offenses which were selected because of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and likelihood of being reported to police. These offenses, which now comprise the Crime Index, are murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. By congressional mandate, arson was added as the eighth index offense in late 1978.

To provide nationwide uniformity in the reporting of data, a set of standard definitions for specific criminal acts was devised. This standardization was necessary to overcome the variation in definitions from state to state. Reporting agencies are required to submit their data in accordance with the UCR definition of offenses. Because of the variance in punishment for the same offenses in different states, there is no possibility to distinguish between felony or misdemeanor crimes in a program such as this.

in recent years, the FBI has actively assisted individual states in the development of stateoperated UCR programs compatible with the national system. These state programs have increased the participation of law enforcement agencies due to mandatory reporting requirements. State programs also provide direct and frequent contact with local agencies, assuring more completeness and quality of information provided by them. With the development of a state UCR program, data is more readily available for use by the state, and the FBI ceases collection of data directly from individual law enforcement agencies within the state. Instead, compiled information from all reporting agencies is forwarded to the national program by the state program.

On January 1, 1974 the Arkansas Orime Information Center initially began the collection of monthly UCR data in our state. The following year, Act 742 of 1975 was approved, which included a section making the reporting of UCR data to ACIC mandatory for law enforcement agencies.

Purposes of the Arkansas UCR Program

Information from the UCR Program will assist in determining the overall scope of reported crime in Arkansas. It should be an important aid in making effective management studies and decisions.

While many purposes and objectives can be stated, the primary goals are:

- 1. To collect, verify, and analyze summary information on crime reported by law enforcement agencies in Arkansas.
- 2. To provide data back to law enforcement administrators for use in operational planning and assessments.
- 3. To give an overview of crime, its magnitude and trends, and to provide this information to the Governor, the Legislature, and to the general public.
- 4. To develop base data and statistics for use in improving the efficiency, effectiveness and performance of the Arkansas criminal justice system.
- 5. To provide the FBI with complete UCR data to be included in the national crime reports.

Reporting Procedures

The Arkansas UCR program uses a summary reporting procedure. Contributing law enforcement agencies are reponsible for compiling their own crime figures and submitting them once a month to ACIC. Agencies are furnished training in scoring and classifying offenses, in use of tally books, and in procedures for completing the reporting forms.

A sound record-keeping system is necessary for the effective operation of any law enforcement agency. This record system is a basis for crime reporting by an agency. Upon request, ACIC will make internal records, forms and technical assistance available to any agency.

On a monthly basis, law enforcement agencies report the number of offenses that become known to them during the month. This count is taken from the complaints received by the agency from victims, other sources or as discovered by officers. Whenever complaints of crime are determined through investigation to be unfounded or false, they are eliminated from the count. The number of "actual offenses known" are reported to ACIC without regard to whether anyone is arrested for the crime, stolen property recovered, or any other restrictive consideration. Law enforcement agencies report monthly the total number of these crimes which they clear by either arrest or exceptional means. To supplement the offense information, data such as the value of property stolen and recovered, circumstances surrounding homicides, additional information concerning assaults on police officers and other pertinent information is collected.

In addition, monthly reports on the number of persons arrested on all criminal offenses are collected. These reports provide age, sex and race information, with the adult and juvenile arrests separate.

Arkansas Crime Index

The Crime Index is used as a basic measurement of crime. It is the figure which is often publicized by the news media and which is widely used to assess the criminality of a given location. Many of the figures presented in this report indicate the volume, fluctuations and distribution of crime in Arkansas on the basis of this Crime Index. The eight offenses making up the Crime Index are:

- 1. Murder
- 2. Forcible Rape
- 3. Robbery
- 4. Aggravated Assault
- 5. Burglary
- 6. Theft
- 7. Motor Vehicle Theft
- 8. Arson

These crimes were selected for use as an index due to their serious nature, their frequency of occurrence and the reliability of reporting from citizens to law enforcement agencies. The Crime Index is the total number of index crimes that come to the attention of law enforcement.

In reviewing crime index figures, the reader should keep in mind that there is currently no way of determining the total number of actual crimes committed. The Crime Index has been established to measure only the instances of crime which come to the attention of law enforcement agencies.

Violent crime refers to events such as murder, rape, and assault that may result in injury to a person. Robbery is also considered a violent crime because it involves the use or threat of force against a person.

Property crimes are unlawful acts with the intent of gaining property, but do not involve the use or threat of force against an individual. Larceny, burglary, motor vehicle theft, and arson are examples of property crimes.

The Crime Rate is one of the most quoted crime statistics and is based on the number of Index Crime per 100,000 population.

In UCR, an offense is considered to be cleared (solved) when at least one offender is arrested. The arrest of one person can clear several crimes, or several persons may be arrested in the process of clearing one crime. Offenses may also be cleared by exceptional means when the offender commits suicide; makes a dying declaration; confesses while in custody or serving time for another crime; is prosecuted in another jurisdiction for the same offense; when the victim refuses to prosecute or another jurisdiction refuses to extradite. When examining clearance data, keep in mind that not all crimes are cleared within the calendar year in which the offense occurs. Also note that the recovery of property stolen with regard to a specific offense does not, by itself, constitute a clearance for UCR purposes,

Data Comparisons and Limitations of UCR

While UCR is the best source of crime statistics available at the present time, it has been subject to much criticism during its history. Some of these criticisms may be valid. However, the criticism is softened when it is remembered that the program was developed to furnish information for use primarily by law enforcement agencies.

The obvious tendency with a publication of this kind is to make comparisons of data between jurisdictions, whether they be between agencies, or counties, or regions. Caution should be exercised for the many reasons which will become apparent as the reader continues through this publication. Comparisons may not be appropriate because of the great variety of factors which affect the extent and fluctuation of crime and which are not taken into consideration in either raw data or crime rates. All crimes are considered "equal" in computing crime rates. One theft affects a crime rate the same as one murder.

The Uniform Crime Reporting program is designated to measure offenses reported and persons arrested. Difficulty will arise if this distinction is not kept uppermost in mind. Crime relates to events, but arrest relates to persons, and this is not a one-to-one correspondence. While UCR is the best information available, no claim is made that they represent "all crime".

Summary

The information collected for this report portrays the most accurate and realistic assessment available on the crime situation in Arkansas. However, individuals using these tabulations are again cautioned against drawing conclusions by making direct comparisons between agencies. Numerous factors affect the amount and type of crime from place to place. More valid use can be made of these figures by determining deviations from state averages or through comparisons with averages for similar populations groups.

It is important to remember that crime is a social problem and, therefore, a concern of the entire community. The efforts of law enforcement are limited to factors within its control.










Ten Year Offense Trends






















Ten Year Property Crime Trend

Contributing Agencies and Population Coverage

There are currently an average of 190 law enforcement agencies throughout the State contributing UCR monthly and directly to the Arkansas Crime Information Center. Each month approximately 73 out of 75 county Sheriff's Departments and 114 Police Departments participate. In addition, Public Safety Departments at three universities submit data to the program. Uniform Crime Reports received from these agencies represent statistical data covering approximately 98.7% of the estimated Arkansas population.

Section 3

STATEWIDE CRIME INDEX DATA

Murder

Murder is defined in Uniform Crime Reporting as the willful killing of another. The classification, as in all of the other Crime Index offenses, is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body.

Deaths caused by negligence, suicide, accident, or justifiable homicide are not included in the count for this offense classification. Attempts to kill or assaults to kill are counted as aggravated assaults and not as murder.

Murder in 1986

In 1986, there were 190 murders in Arkansas with three justifiable homicides. This is a 3.3% increase in actual murders and a 3.8% increase in the rate per 100,000 since 1985. There has been an increase in murder for two consecutive years.

Murder accounted for 0.2% of the total Crime Index and 2.0% of the Violent Crime Index. The five largest law enforcement jurisdictions in the state (representing populations of more than 50,000 each) accounted for 35.3% of all murders.



Rape

Forcible rape, as defined under this program, is the carnal knowledge of a female through the use of force or the threat of force. Assaults to commit forcible rape are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) is not counted in this category.

Rape in 1986

There were 684 rapes in Arkansas during 1986. This is an increase in actual and attempted rapes of less than 1% compared to 1985. During 1986, the clearance rate increased 7.2%.

Rape accounted for 0.7% of the total Crime Index and 7.3% of the Violent Crime Index. The five largest law enforcement jurisdictions in the state (representing populations of more than 50,000 each) accounted for 44.9% of all rapes.



Robbery

Robbery is the taking of property or things of value from a person by use of force or threat of force. Assault to commit robbery and attempts are included. This is a violent crime and frequently results in injury to the victim.

Robbery in 1986

There were 1,888 robberies in Arkansas in 1986. Robberies represented 2.0% of the total Crime Index and 20.2% of the Violent Crime Index. The five largest law enforcement jurisdictions (representing populations of more than 50,000 each) accounted for 67% of all robberies.

Firearms were used in 38% of the robberies. The average dollar value stolen during a robbery was \$608, this is an average increase of \$88 from 1985. Street robberies accounted for nearly 36% of all robberies.



Aggravated Assault

Aggravated assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or serious bodily harm. Attempts are included.

Aggravated Assault in 1986

There were 6,571 aggravated assaults in Arkansas during 1986. Aggravated assaults accounted for 7.0% of the Crime Index and for 70.4% of the Violent Crimes, with an increase of 37.5% since 1982. The five largest law enforcement jurisdictions (representing populations of more than 50,000 each) accounted for 51% of all aggravated assaults in the state.

There were 8,430 additional non-aggravated assaults reported during 1986.



Burglary

Burglary is the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify the crime as burglary. The subclassifications of burglary are: forcible entry, unlawful entry without force, and attempted forcible entry.

Burglary in 1986

There were 24,294 burglaries in Arkansas in 1986. Burglaries accounted for 26.0% of the state's Crime Index Offenses and 28.9% of the Property Crimes. The five largest law enforcement jurisdictions (representing populations of more than 50,000 each) accounted for 38% of the burglaries in the state. There were more burglaries reported for 1986 than for any year since 1980. Also, for the first year since records have been collected by ACIC, daytime residential burglaries outnumber those committed at night.





There were 4,604 motor vehicles stolen in Arkansas in 1986. The value of stolen motor vehicles was \$23 million. Motor vehicle thefts accounted for 4.9% of the Crime Index Offenses, and 5.5% of the Property Crime Offenses. The five largest law enforcement jurisdictions (representing populations of more than 50,000 each) accounted for 38% of all motor vehicle thefts.





LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS ASSAULTED

Law Enforcement Officers Killed in 1986

On April 18, 1986, while on duty, a patrolman with the Fort Smith Police Department was injured and died as a result of injuries from a traffic accident.

On July 24, 1986, three members of a task force on a mission to destroy marijuana died when their helicopter crashed and burst into flames at the Montgomery County Airport near Mt. Ida. The three law enforcement officers killed were an Arkansas State Police Trooper, a Jefferson County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigator and a Detective with the criminal investigation divison of the Pulaski County Sheriff's Office.

On July 24, 1984, an officer with the Hot Springs Police Department was critically injured by gunfire during a routine traffic stop. Later that day the offender killed four other victims, then shot and killed himself. On September 5, 1986, the officer died as a result of this injury.



Section 9

RAPE IN ARKANSAS

Definitions of Rape

The definition of rape in Arkansas, according to Arkansas Statute 41-1803 as amended is:

A person commits rape if he engages in sexual intercourse or deviate sexual activity with another person:

- (a) by forcible compulsion; or
- (b) who is incapable of consent because he is physically helpless; or
- (c) who is less than fourteen (14) years of age. It is an affirmative defense to prosecution under this Section that the actor was not more than two (2) years older than the victim. Rape is a class Y felony.

The definition of forcible rape in the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program is:

Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults to commit forcible rape are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) is not counted in this category.

There is a wide disparity between these two definitions. This report utilizes the Uniform Crime Reporting definition of rape. The report includes all data collected, with the cooperation of law enforcement agencies from their offense reports, as reported to the Arkansas Crime Information Center in the UCR Program.

Throughout this report, except where noted, rape and attempted rape are combined for statistical purposes.


Rape in Arkansas 1986

There were 684 rapes and attempted rapes in Arkansas reported through the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Of these, 535 were rapes and 149 were attempted rapes reported by law enforcement agencies.



GLOSSARY

Glossary of Terms

Actual Offense - A violation of the law which has been confirmed to have happened by law enforcement personnel.

Adult - For Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) purposes, a person 18 years of age or more. (Arkansas Statutes define an adult the same as UCR)

Aggravated Assault - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury.

All Other Offenses - All violations of state or local laws not specifically covered in the Part II offenses, except traffic.

Arrest Rate - The number of arrests reported for each unit of population (per 100,000 in this publication). The arrest rate is computed by dividing the number of arrests in a particular category by the population and multiplying that answer by 100,000.

Arson - Any willful or malicious burning or attempting to burn, with or without attempt to defraud.

Burglary - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft.

Classifying - Determining the proper crime categories in which to report offenses for UCR based on the facts contained in the police investigation report.

Clearance by Arrest - An offense is considered cleared when at least one person involved in the commission of the offense has been (1) arrested, (2) charged, and (3) turned over for prosecution.

Clearance by Exceptional Means - An offense in which some element beyond law enforcement control prevents placing of formal charges against the offender, but the police have: (1) definitely established the identity of the offender, (2) enough information to support arrest, charge, and turn over to the court for prosecution, and (3) knowledge of the location of the offender so that he could be taken into custody.

Clearance Rate - The percentage of offenses cleared by arrest. This is computed by dividing the number of clearances in a particular offense category by the number of offenses reported in that category.

Crime Factor - Conditions which affect the amount and type of crime that occurs in a geographical location.

Crime Index - The total of eight major offenses chosen because of their seriousness and frequency with which they occur. (Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson)

Crime Rate - The number of index offenses reported for each unit of population (per 100,000 in this publication). Crime rate is computed by dividing the number of index offenses by the population and multiplying that answer by 100,000.

Crime Trend - A percent change of an offense over a comparable previous period. A negative indicates a decrease and a postive an increase.

Curfew and Loitering - Violation of local curfew or loitering ordinances. (Persons under 18)

Disorderly Conduct - A breach of the peace.

Driving Under the Influence - Driving or operating any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

Drunkenness - Drunkenness or intoxication.

Embezzlement - Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

Forgery and Counterfeiting - Making, altering, uttering, or possessing with intent-to-defraud anything false which is made to appear true or the attempt to do any of the above.

Fraud - Fraudulent conversion and obtaining of money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks except forgeries and counterfeiting.

Gambling - Promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

Hierarchy Rule - A standard UCR scoring practice in which only the most serious offense is counted in multiple offense situations. This is determined by crime index offense order. (The exception to this is arson. It is always counted, even in multiple situations).

Hotel Rule - A standard UCR scoring practice which limits to one the number of burglaries which can be counted when more than one room is entered for the purpose of committing a felony or theft within a structure generally intended to house transients.

Jurisdiction - The area for which a city, county, or state law enforcement agency is responsible. In UCR: (1) police report offenses which occur within their city, (2) county and state report offenses which take place in the county, (3) agencies report only those arrests made for offenses committed within their jurisdiction, and (4) the recovery of property is reported only by the jurisdiction from which it was stolen.

Juvenile - For UCR purposes a juvenile is defined as a person under 18 years of age. (Arkansas Statutes define a juvenile the same as UCR)

Justifiable Homicide - The killing of a felon by a peace officer in the line of duty or the killing (during the commission of a felony) of a felon by a private citizen.

Liquor Laws - State or local liquor law violations, except driving under the influence.

Manslaughter by Negligence - The killing of another through gross negligence.

Motor Vehicle Theft - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

Murder - The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

Narcotic Drug Laws - Offenses relating to narcotic drugs, such as unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

Non-Aggravated Assault - All assaults and attempted assaults which are not of an aggravated nature and do not result in serious injury to the victim.

Offense - A violation of the law.

Offenses Against Family & Children - Non-Support, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

Part I Offenses - The first of two main groupings of UCR crime classifications consisting of eight index offenses.

Part II Offenses - The second of two main UCR groupings of crime classifications not already designated in Part I. Part II offenses are limited to arrest information only with the exception of simple assault.

Property Crimes - Unlawful acts with the intent of gaining property, but do not involve force against a person. (Theft, Burglary, Motor Vehicle Theft, Arson)

Prostitution & Commercialized Vice - Sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as prostitution, procuring or the transportation of women for immoral purposes.

Rape - The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.

Robbery - The taking of property or things of value from a person by use of force or threat of force.

Runaway - Limited to juveniles taken into custody under the provisions of local statutes.

Scoring - Counting the number of offenses after they have been classified.

Sex Offenses - Statutory rape; offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like.

Stolen Property: Buying, Receiving, Possessing - Buying, receiving or possessing of stolen property as well as all attempts of the above.

Suspicion - Arrests for no specific offense and released without formal charges being placed.

Theft-Larceny - Unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles without the use of force, violence, or fraud.

Unfounded Offenses - Offenses which are determined through investigation to be false or baseless.

Vagrancy - Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

Vandalism - Willful and malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

Violent Crime - Unlawful acts that involve the use or threat of force against a person. (Murder, Rape, Robbery, and Aggravated Assault)

Weapons; Carrying, Possessing, etc. - All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons.
