Offenders Admitted to  
Wisconsin Adult Correctional Institutions  
Calendar Year 1986

The number of persons admitted to serve sentences in Wisconsin's correctional facilities for adult offenders increased 8.1 percent from 2,634, 2,478 males and 156 females, in calendar year 1985 to 2,847, 2,671 males and 176 females, in calendar year 1986. Offenders who were admitted on a temporary basis, 141 males and 3 females in 1986, are included only in Table 1, Admission Status. These cases include 66 males received at institutions under the terms of alternative to revocation contracts, 71 males and 3 females institutionalized pending the outcome of probation, parole, mandatory release, or special action early release revocation hearings, one male who returned voluntarily to the institution from mandatory release supervision, one male admitted to serve a sentence from a jurisdiction other than Wisconsin, and two males who were admitted in error.

Social and demographic information including offense, length of sentence, and county of commitment about offenders who entered the institutions as first or readmissions during calendar year 1986 is presented in Tables 2 through 18. These tables are arranged so that comparisons can be made between both the sexes and the types of admission. The category "first admission" is made up of three groups. Group 1, new adult sentences, includes those offenders, who at the time of sentencing, were not already under some type of Division of Corrections supervision; i. e., probation parole, mandatory release, or special action early release. Offenders categorized as probation violators either with or without new sentences make up the second group, while persons who violated the terms of juvenile aftercare supervision and received new sentences as adult offenders make up the third group. No offenders in Group 3 were admitted during calendar year 1986.

Male First Admissions

Dodge Correctional Institution, the Reception Center for all males sentenced to Wisconsin's correctional institutions, reported a total of 1,994 first admissions during calendar year 1986; an increase of 6.5 percent over the previous year when 1,873 males classed as first admissions entered the facility. Almost three-fifths (56.3 percent) were classified as first admissions with new adult sentences with the remainder being fairly equally divided between probation violators with (22.2 percent) and without (21.5 percent) new sentences. The crimes for which males first-admitted to the institution in 1986 had been most often convicted and sentenced were unarmed burglary (24.7 percent), theft (7.2 percent), and first degree sexual assault (5.9 percent). The average (mean) length of sentence was found to be 63.2 months; the median, 44.6 months. Cases with life sentences were excluded from length of sentence computations. Average (mean) sentences of 51.3, 39.3, and 139.1 months respectively were reported for offenders sentenced on unarmed robbery, theft, and first degree sexual assault charges. One-half (49.9 percent) of the males admitted in 1986 were not considered to be assaultive, drug, or sexual offenders. Approx-

imately one-tenth (10.8 percent) were sentenced only on drug charges while less than one percent were categorized solely as sex offenders. Almost one-fourth (23.2 percent) were sentenced only for the commission of assaultive offenses while over one-tenth (14.4 percent) had been convicted of both assaultive and sex offenses.

Three-fifths (60.1 percent) of the males first-admitted during 1986 were from White family backgrounds while just over one-third (36.4 percent) were Black. Males of Native American heritage made up only 2.3 percent of the first admissions. Less than one-tenth (5.9 percent) were reported to have Hispanic ethnic and cultural backgrounds. Courts in Milwaukee County were responsible for the commitment of just under two-fifths (37.3 percent) of the 1986 first admissions. The Southern, Southeastern, and Milwaukee Regions; i. e., the counties that make up the southern one-third of Wisconsin, committed seven-tenths (70.9 percent) of the 1986 first admissions. Calumet, Iowa, Iron, and Menominee counties committed no first admissions in 1986. The average (mean) age was found to be 27.1 years; the median, 25.2 years. Just over one-half (52.2 percent) of the males first-admitted in 1986 had no prior felony convictions and approximately seven-tenths (68.7 percent) had no record of previous confinement in penal institutions for adult offenders. The majority (83.0 percent) were single at the time of admission including two-thirds (65.8 percent) who had never been married. Just under one-fifth (16.9 percent) had a record of military service.

#### Male Readmissions

During calendar year 1986 a total of 677 males classified as readmissions entered the Reception Center; an increase of 11.9 percent over the previous year when 605 readmissions were recorded. Males who were reinstitutionalized with new sentences following revocation of some type of field supervision made up 36.5 percent of the group while the remainder, 63.5 percent, were revoked and reincarcerated without receiving new sentences. Unarmed burglary (34.3 percent), armed robbery (11.7 percent), and unarmed robbery (6.9 percent) were the offenses for which readmitted males were most often sentenced. Males institutionalized for these offenses were found to have average (mean) sentences of 70.7, 137.1, and 91.8 months respectively. The average (mean) sentence for readmissions as a group was found to be 84.3 months; the median, 71.5 months. Males who were not considered to be assaultive, drug, or sex offenders made up slightly more than one-half (55.4 percent) of the 1986 readmissions. Three out of 10 (30.9 percent) were classified as assaultive offenders while less than one-tenth (8.4 percent) were classified as both assaultive and sex offenders. Approximately two-fifths (38.0 percent) of the readmissions were committed from Milwaukee County, with almost one-fourth (22.8 percent) from the six counties surrounding Milwaukee County. Four counties, Milwaukee, Kenosha, Dane, and Racine, with 257, 61, 53, and 43 readmissions respectively accounted for three-fifths (61.1 percent) of the group.

Somewhat less than three-fifths (57.0 percent) of the males readmitted in 1986 were from White or White-Hispanic backgrounds while two-fifths (39.7 percent) were Black. Native Americans made up only 2.7 percent of the total group. Approximately one-third (35.1 percent) were aged 20 through

24 years at the time of readmission while one-tenth (10.4 percent) were 40 years of age or older. The average (mean) and median ages for the group were found to be 28.4 and 27.5 years respectively. Eight out of 10 (81.8 percent) were reported to be single including over three-fifths (63.4 percent) of the total group who had never been married. Over two-fifths (43.3 percent) had records that included at least two prior felony convictions.

#### Female First and Readmissions

Taycheedah Correctional Institution reported 176 admissions during calendar year 1986; an increase of 12.8 percent over the previous year when 156 females were admitted to the facility. The majority (88.6 percent) were classified as first admissions with the remainder being made up of readmissions with (5.1 percent) and without (6.3 percent) new sentences. Forgery (27.7 percent), theft (16.7 percent), and other drug offenses (11.0 percent) were the offenses for which first-admitted females had most often been convicted and sentenced. The average (mean) length of sentence for the group of first admissions was found to be 49.7 months with a median of 39.2 months. First-admitted females with sentences for forgery, theft, and other drug offenses entered the institution with average (mean) sentences of 46.3, 36.5, and 35.2 months respectively. The average (mean) sentence for females readmitted during 1986 was 57.9 months and the median was 50.7 months. Forgery (30.0 percent), theft (30.0 percent), and unarmed burglary (20.0 percent) were the offenses most often noted for readmitted females. Those readmitted on the above charges received average (mean) sentences of 63.5, 46.8, and 57.0 months. Almost two-thirds (64.7 percent) of the first and eight-tenths (80.0 percent) of the readmissions were not assaultive, sex, or drug offenders. Females considered as drug offenders made up somewhat more than one-tenth (12.2 percent) of the 1986 first admissions while the remaining one-fifth were classified as assaultive (18.6 percent) or assaultive and sex offenders (3.2 percent). The remaining one-fifth (20.0 percent) of the readmissions were classified solely as assaultive offenders.

Commitments from Milwaukee County accounted for two-fifths of both the first and readmissions during 1986. Two-thirds (66.2 percent) of the first admissions came from four of the state's 72 counties; Milwaukee (66 cases), Dane (13 cases), Racine (13 cases), and Rock (11 cases). The average (mean) age for first admissions was 29.8 years while readmissions, with an average (mean) age of 28.4 years were slightly younger. Whites and White-Hispanics made up just over one-half (52.0 percent) of the 1986 female first admissions while just over two-fifths (43.6 percent) were Black. Less than one-tenth (3.2 percent) of the first admissions were reported to be Native Americans. The majority (70.0 percent) of the females readmitted during 1986 were Black while the remainder were White including one female with a Hispanic ethnic and cultural background.

The majority of the first and readmissions (73.8 percent, 75.0 percent) were reported to be single at the time of admissions while one-fifth of each group were found to be married.
