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1984 IN REVIEW

The Michigan Department of Corrections saw the beginning of a new administration in 1984. Director Perry M. Johnson resigned that year to take the post of deputy director in charge of the Bureau of Field Services, succeeding Richard K. Nelson, who retired. Twenty-three persons vied for Johnson's position. The State Corrections Commission chose Robert Brown Jr., the deputy director in charge of the Bureau of Correctional Facilities.

Brown's appointment had followed the selection earlier during the year of two new Commission members: James H. Lincoln, a former probate judge from Wayne County, and Brunetta Brandy, an attorney from Detroit. Brandy and Lincoln replaced Don P. LeDuc, dean of the Cooley Law School in Lansing, and G. Robert Cotton, a nursing home owner from Grass Lake who was in ill health.

Shortly after Brown's appointment, public clamor over use of the state's Prison Overcrowding Emergency Powers Act reached a crescendo. An East Lansing police officer and an East Lansing housewife were both shot and killed by persons who had been under the jurisdiction of the department. One of those, a parolee, was released several years early as a result of the Emergency Powers Act and was on parole at the time of the shootings. The other prisoner was a resident of a Lansing halfway house. The deaths of these two persons prompted a serious reexamination of the law which had been used nine times since its enactment in late 1980.

Shortly after the deaths of the East Lansing residents, Gov. James J. Blanchard refused to issue any more emergency declarations under provisions

of the law. He cited safety of the community as the reason for his action and called for a massive prison construction project to meet the needs of the department.

During late 1984, the Emergency Powers Act was revised to allow the Department to develop temporary multiple occupancy housing during 1985 to meet the emergency caused by continued prison crowding. The revision stipulated that the use of such multiple occupancy housing would be discontinued after Jan. 1, 1987. In addition, the State Legislature appropriated about \$16 million to acquire and analyze prison sites, to design and begin construction of new prisons, and to purchase and remodel facilities for prisons in the city of Detroit, counties of Ionia, Lapeer, Wayne, Macomb, Oakland and Jackson. The money also was to be used to construct a second prison at Camp Cusino. An additional \$600,000 was appropriated to hire 21 new field agents to develop innovative alternatives to prison. By the end of 1984, the department had responded to the Governor's decision not to enact the Emergency Powers Act by agreeing to place three prisoners in a room at the Kinross Correctional Facility. A major prison acquisition and construction program was launched early in 1985.

Also during 1984, a major out-of-court settlement between the U.S. Department of Justice and the State of Michigan guaranteed repairs and improvements in the three oldest state prisons over a six-year period at a cost of about \$30 million. The Consent Decree was approved by the U.S. District Court in Kalamazoo on July 22, 1984. Agreement had been reached earlier by the state and the Justice Department.

COURT DISPOSITIONS

The A tables, charts and graphs illustrate data supplied to the department by the Circuit Courts in Michigan and the Detroit Recorder's Court. They show dispositions for all felony convictions handled by the Courts in 1984.

Table A-1 counts the number of people who received court sentences during the year. In 1984 a total of 22,119 people were sentenced for felony crimes. Of those, 6,827 came to prison, about 100 more than in 1983. Of all persons sentenced for felonies in 1984, 52.6% were placed in probation, compared with 55.8% in 1983.

The A-1 table categorizes each person according to the most severe sentences s/he received even though a person may have been sentenced for several felony crimes. An individual is counted more than once if s/he received court sentences on separate occasions three months or more apart.

Pie charts Ala through Ale illustrate the composition of these sentenced offenders. The definitions of the groups accompany the charts. More details on these groups can be obtained from the Office of Public Information. Group A constitutes 29.7% of the 22,119 persons convicted of felonies in 1984. Group A people have no prior jail term, juvenile probation only or one jail term.

Group B constitutes 11.5% and is composed of people with a juvenile record, multiple jail terms or one term of adult probation.

Group C constitutes 37.5% of the total and is made up of persons with multiple probation terms, probation violators or prior prison terms.

Group D, which constitutes 21.4%, is composed of institutional residents, escapees, and parole violators with new sentences.

A2 counts all court dispositions (cases) as opposed to people. By looking at this chart you can tell how many cases of a certain crime got prison, probation or jail. One person may have received several sentences and some sentences involved several dispositions such as probation and jail.

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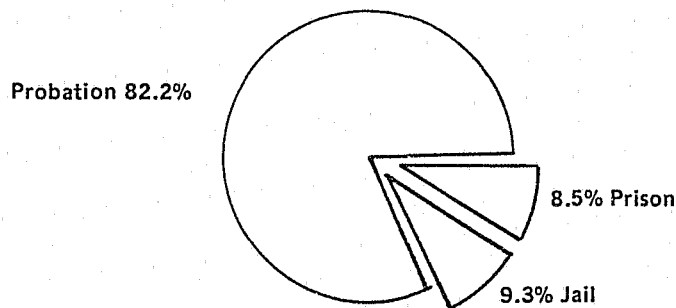

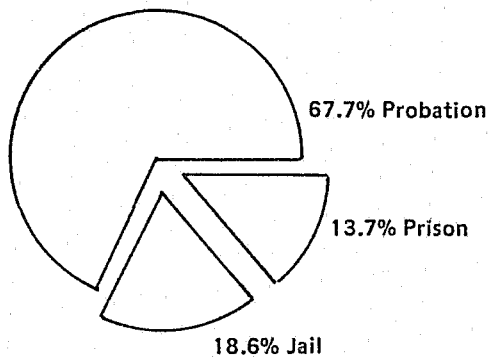

GROUP A --- No prior prison term, juvenile probation only or one jail term



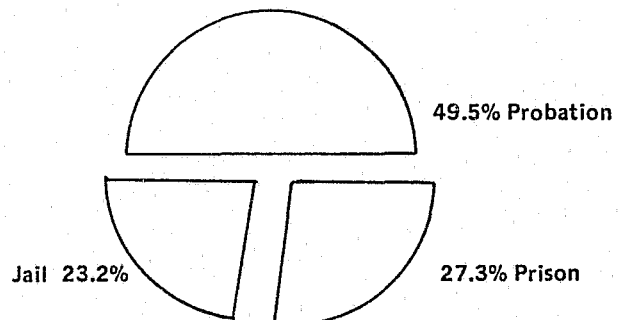
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GROUP B --- Juvenile record, multiple jail terms or one term of adult probation



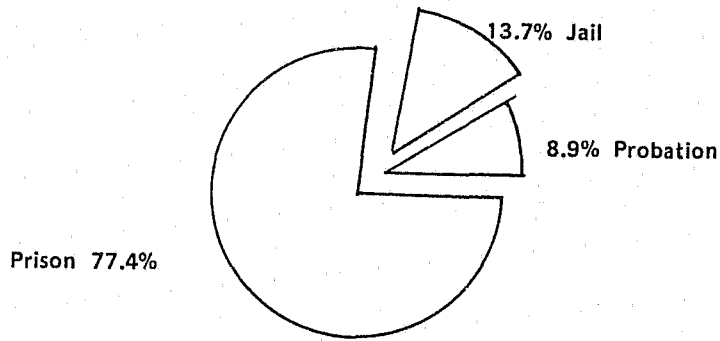
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GROUP C --- Multiple probation terms, probation violators or violators or prior prison terms

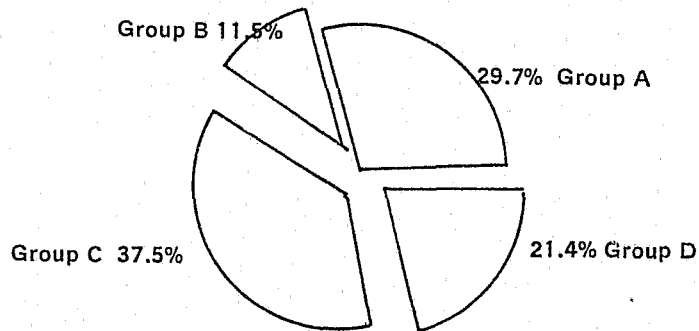

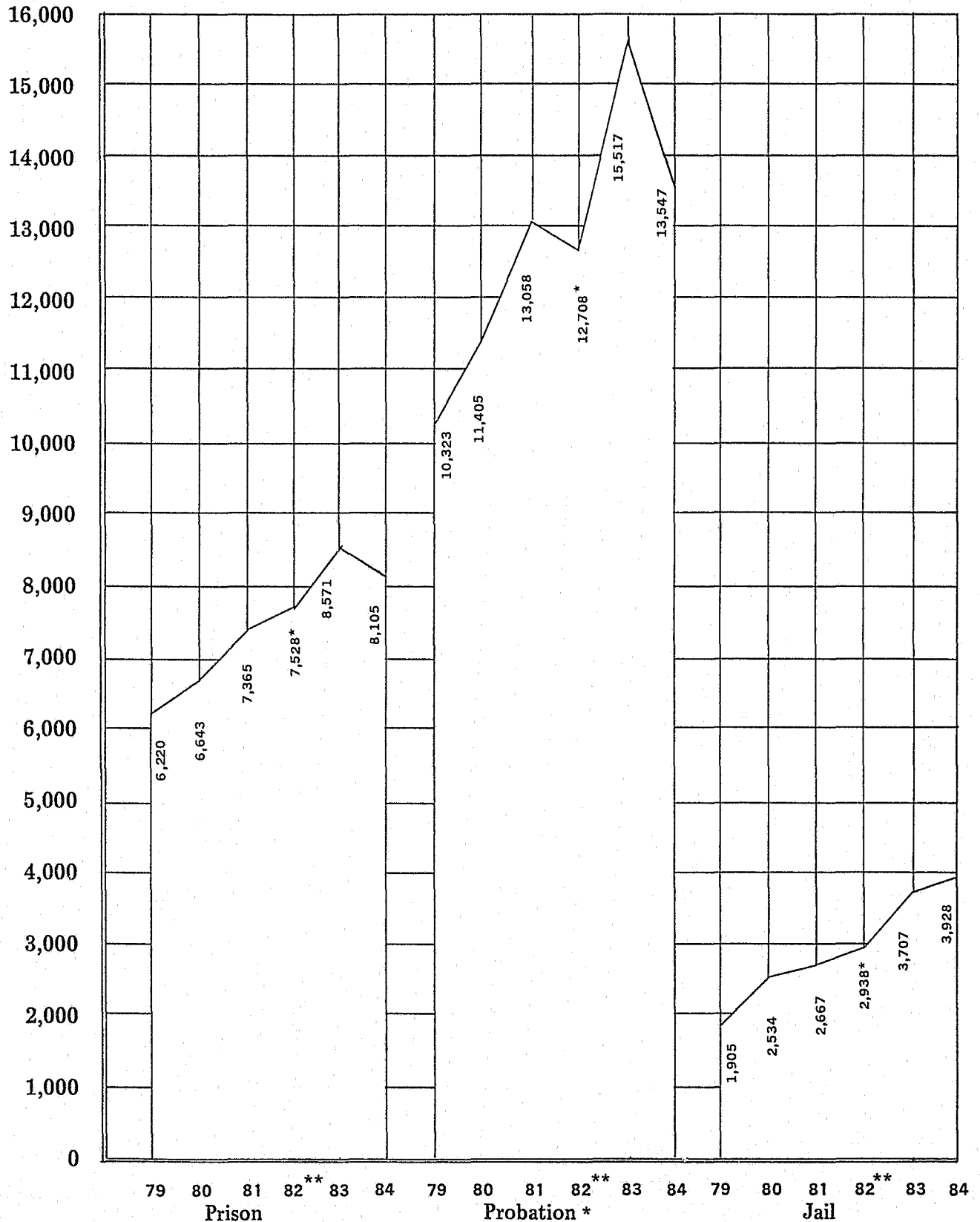

PRISON COMMITMENTS

The B tables represent people to the fullest extent possible. They count the number of prison commitments for the year, reporting the longest sentence from each commitment. A person may, however, be committed more than once in a year with multiple sentences per commitment. In such cases that person would be counted each time s/he was committed. In 1984 there were commitments totaling 6,142 for non-attempts and 1,010 for attempts. In addition to listing the number of commitments by crime, the charts give the minimum sentences for each crime. Those minimum sentences falling between the various categories are grouped with the higher number. The B-2 tables contain men and women commitments but B-3 lists only female commitments. The charts also contain an average minimum sentence for the various crimes.

The B/a table "Reported Crimes Versus Commitments in Michigan" compares the annual reported index crimes (in hundreds of thousands) with the annual prison commitments. The 1984 figures were not available from the Michigan State Police at the time of this printing.

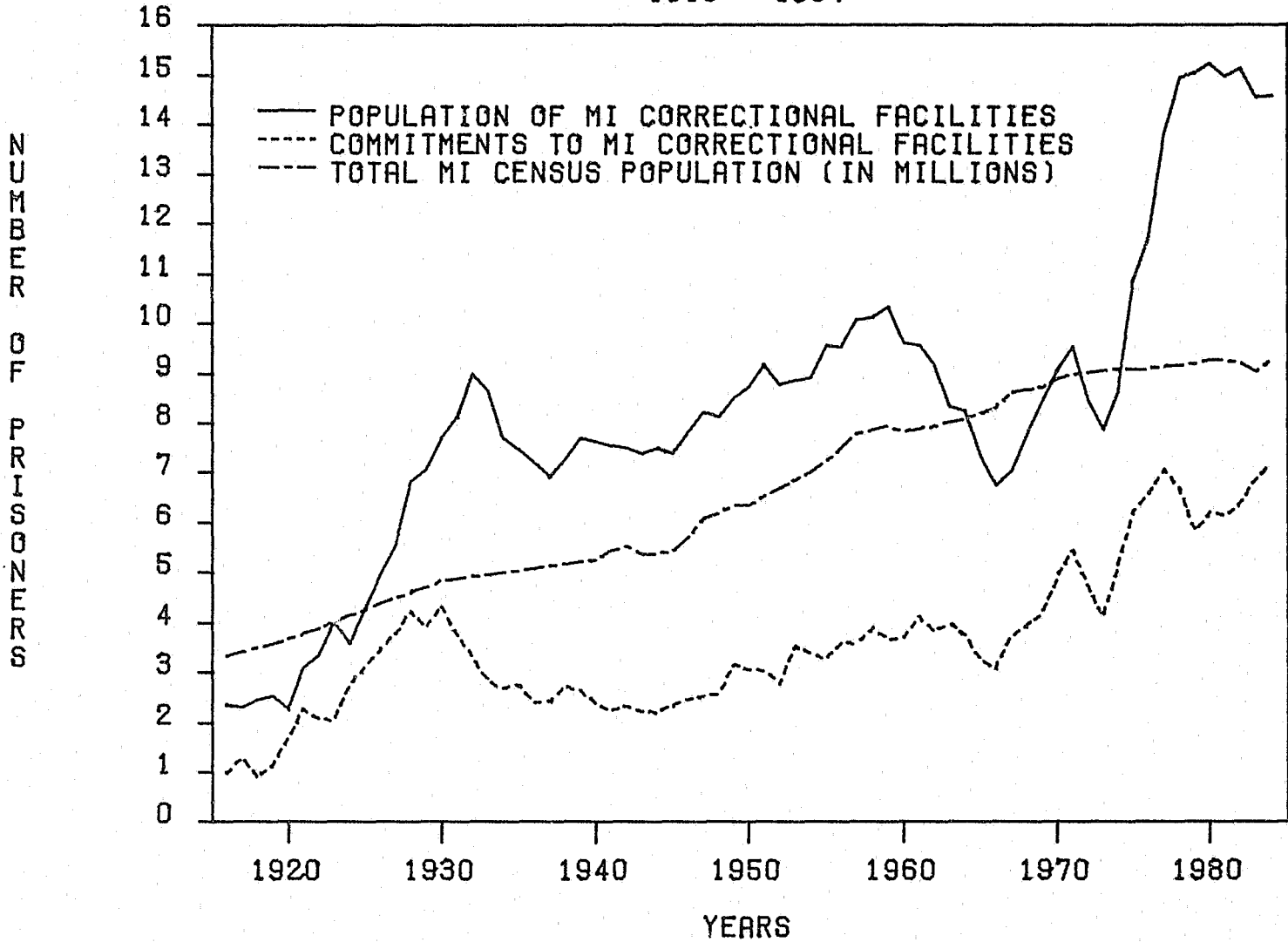
Other charts cover commitments by age, race, sex and crime types. The last chart illustrates the percentage change in crimes against people as percent of total commitments.

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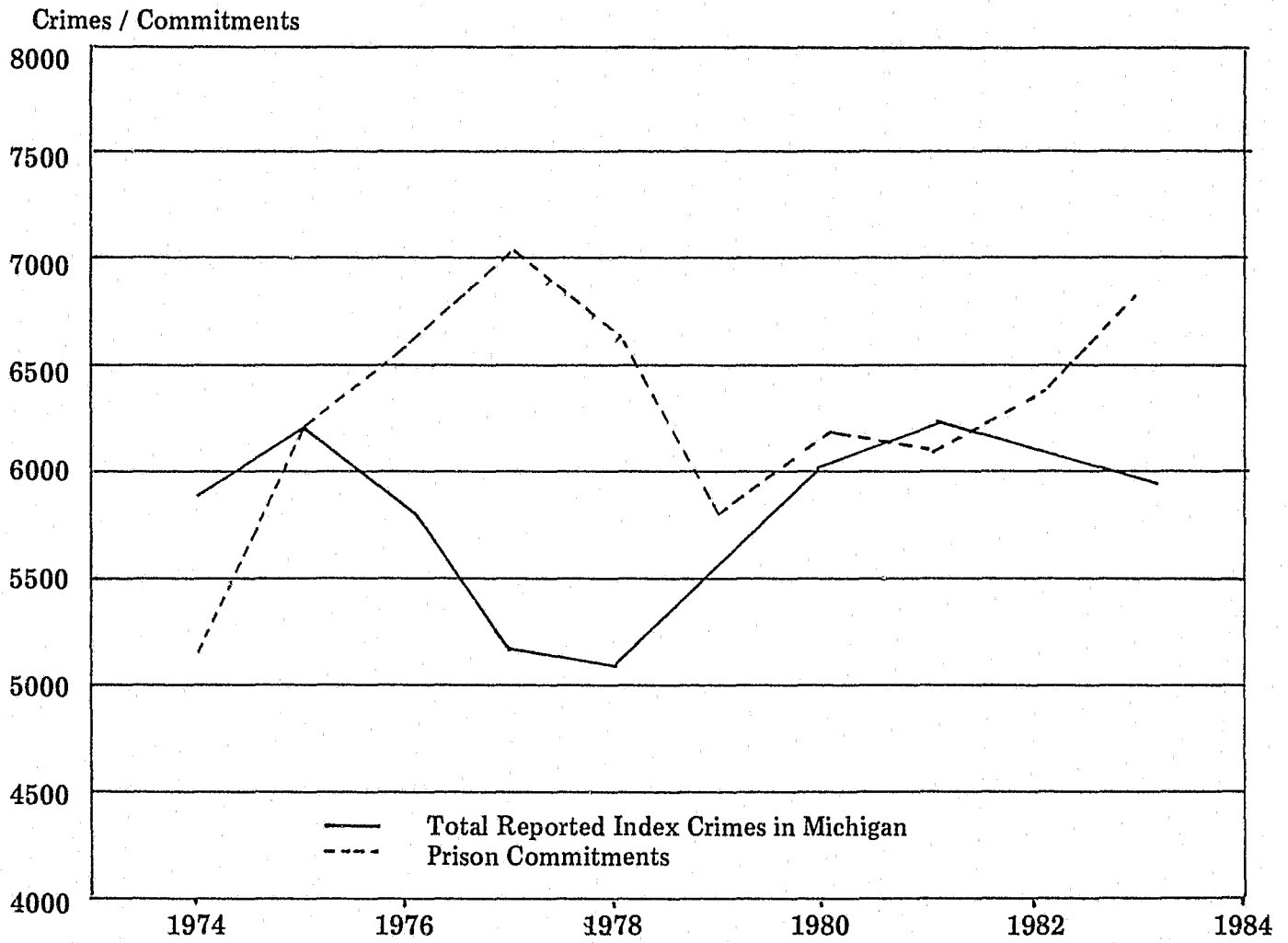

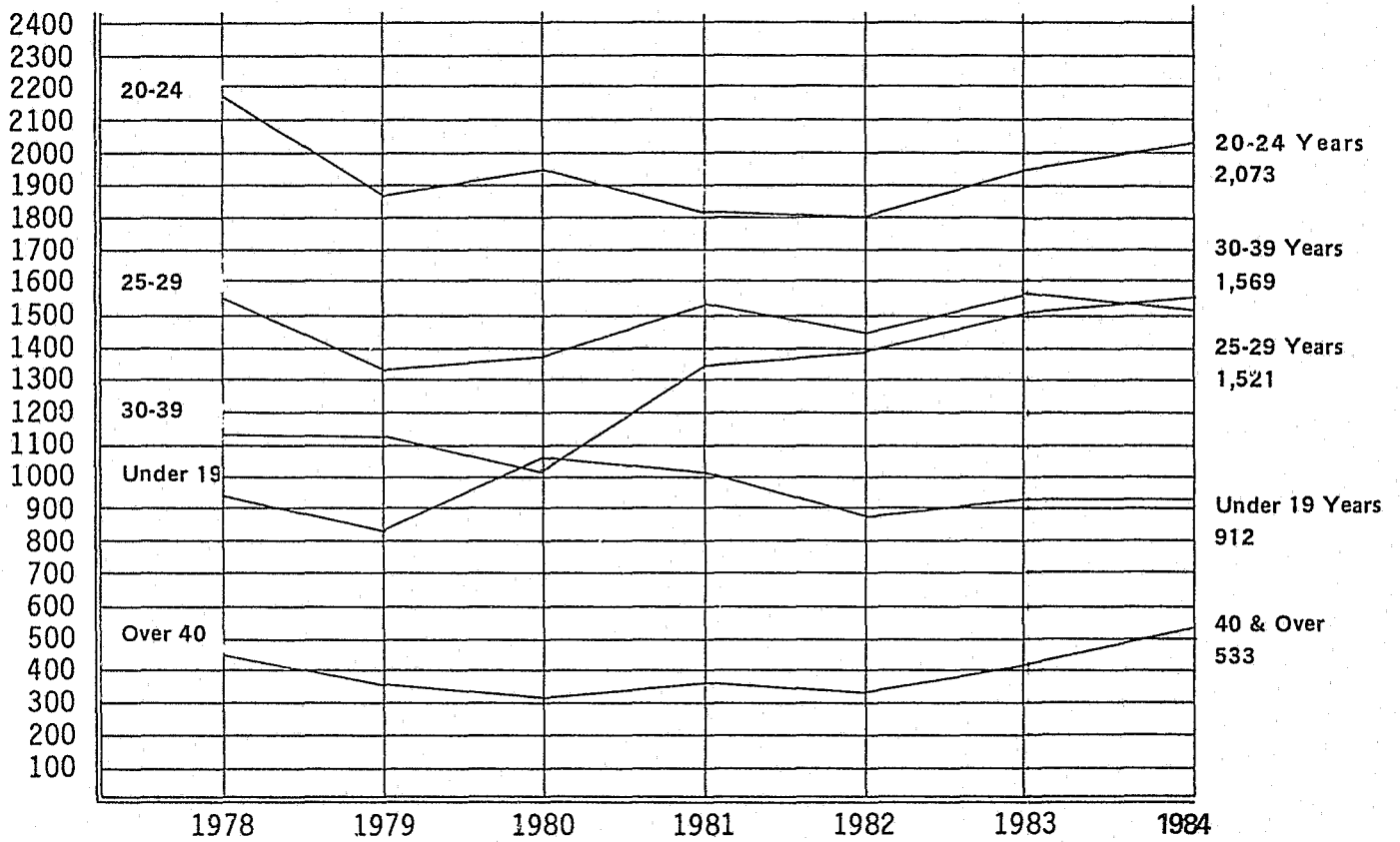

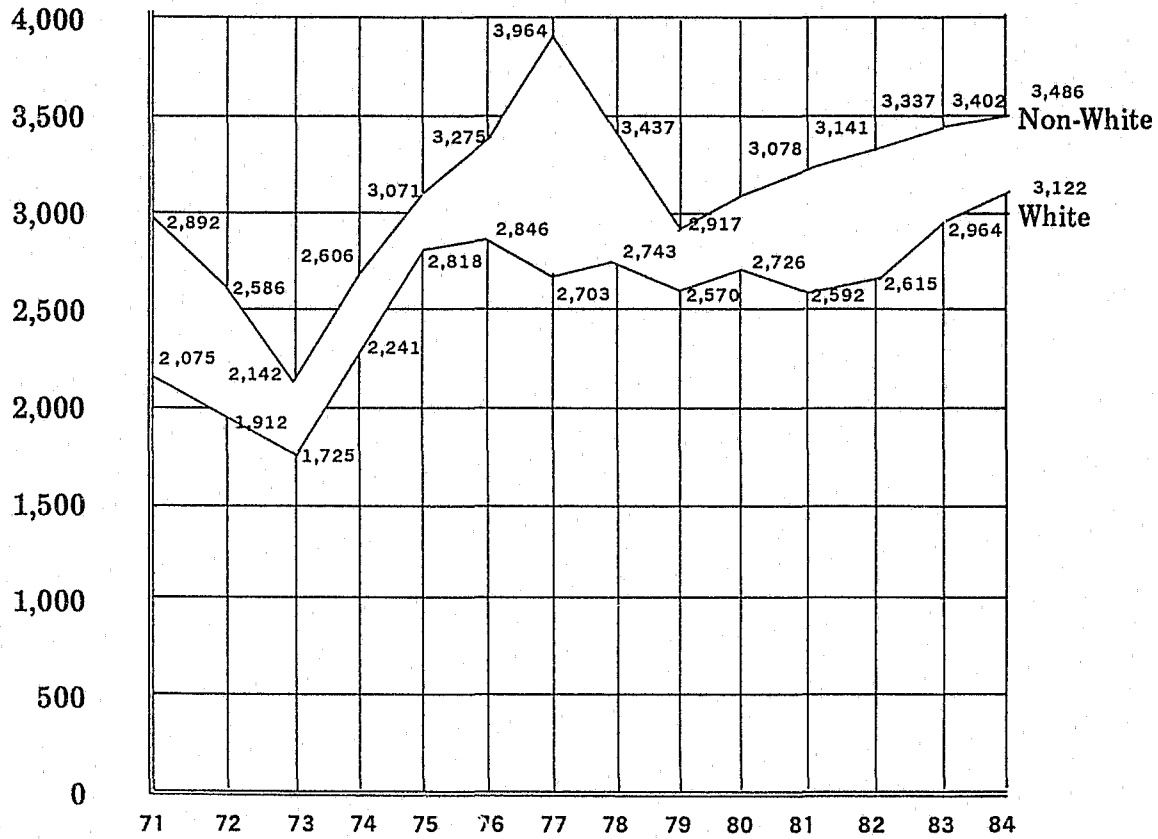

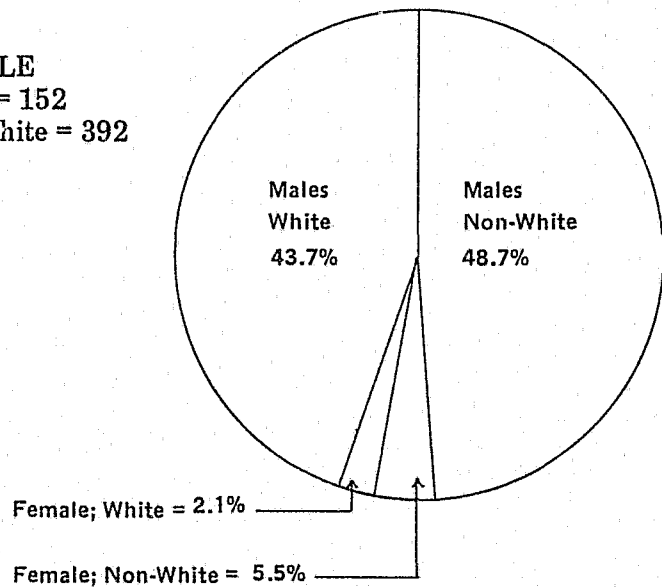
B5a Commitment by Race for Men



B5b Total 1984 Commitment by Race; Male and Female Percentages

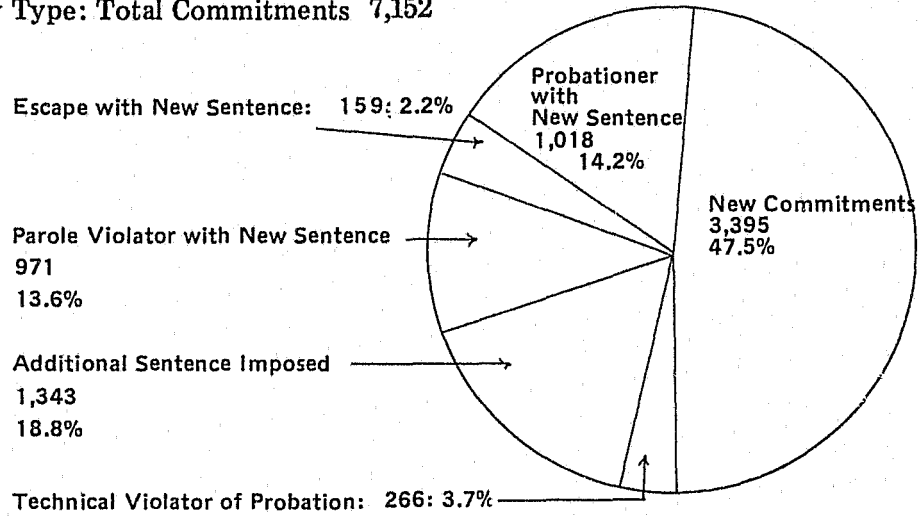

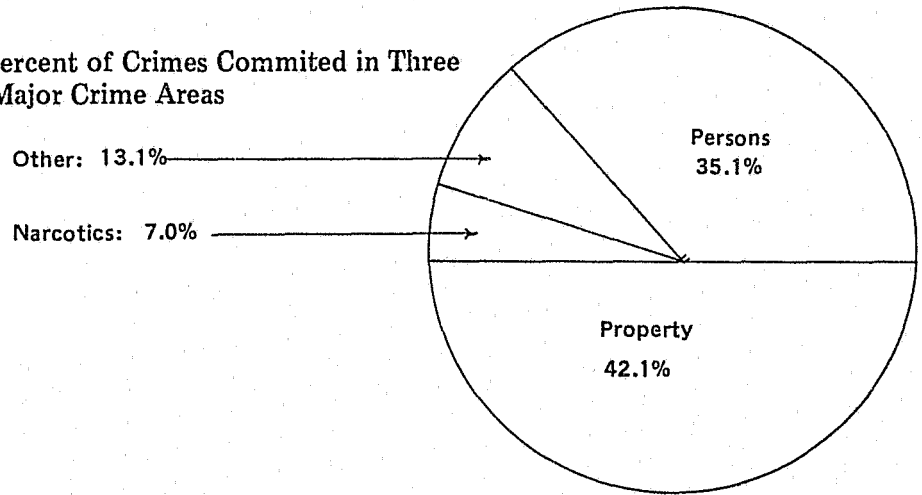

Commitments by Type: Total Commitments 7,152



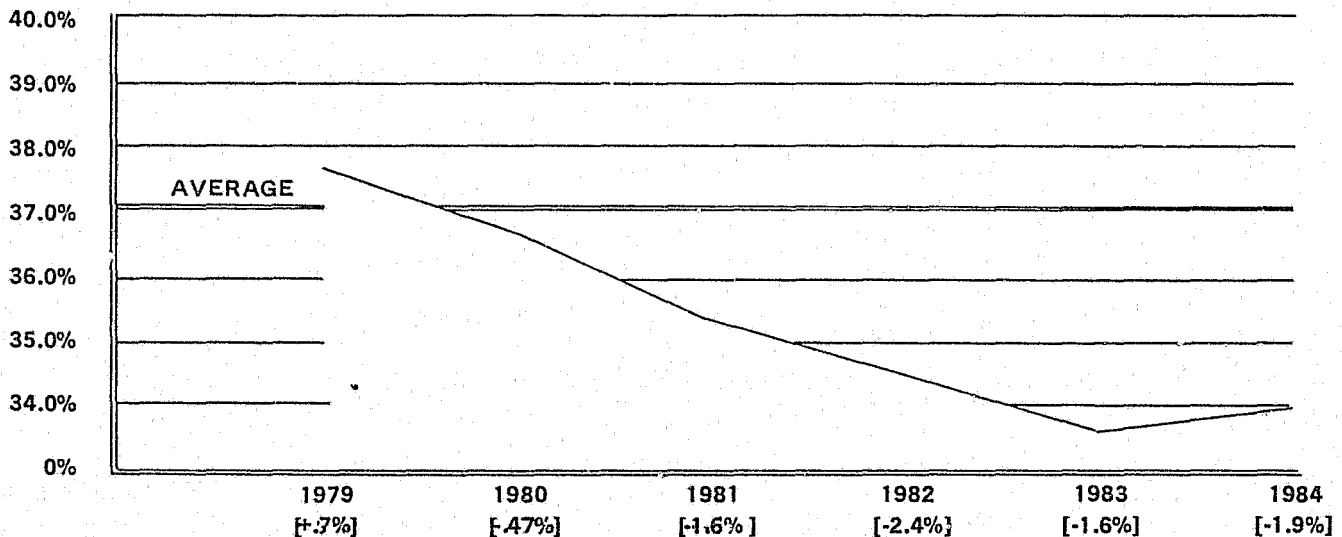

PRISONS AND PRISONERS

The following tables and charts present information on the state's prisons and prisoners. A map shows the location of all prisons and camps as of Dec. 30, 1984. Another section describes each institution.

The C tables count the controlling sentences for persons who were on count at an institution or in the halfway house program the last day of 1984. Temporary releases, furloughs, out-to-court and admissions to the Department of Mental Health are not counted nor are persons who are on a facility count who did not have any active sentence record on the Department's Computer information system.

The C-1 chart contains sentences for both men and women but C-2 contains only women. Besides listing the number of persons serving sentences for the various crimes, the charts contain minimum sentences and averages. Sentences falling between the various categories are grouped into the higher categories. Attempted offenses are given directly below the named offense and are not included in the non-attempt category.

One chart lists the various treatment activities available in Michigan prisons and minimum security camps. Another lists critical incidents.

Charts also in this section show the activities of Michigan State Industries. A chart showing the disposition of major misconducts also can be found in this section.

Charts illustrating activities of the Office of Health Care are not included in the report because a separate statistical document is available from that office.

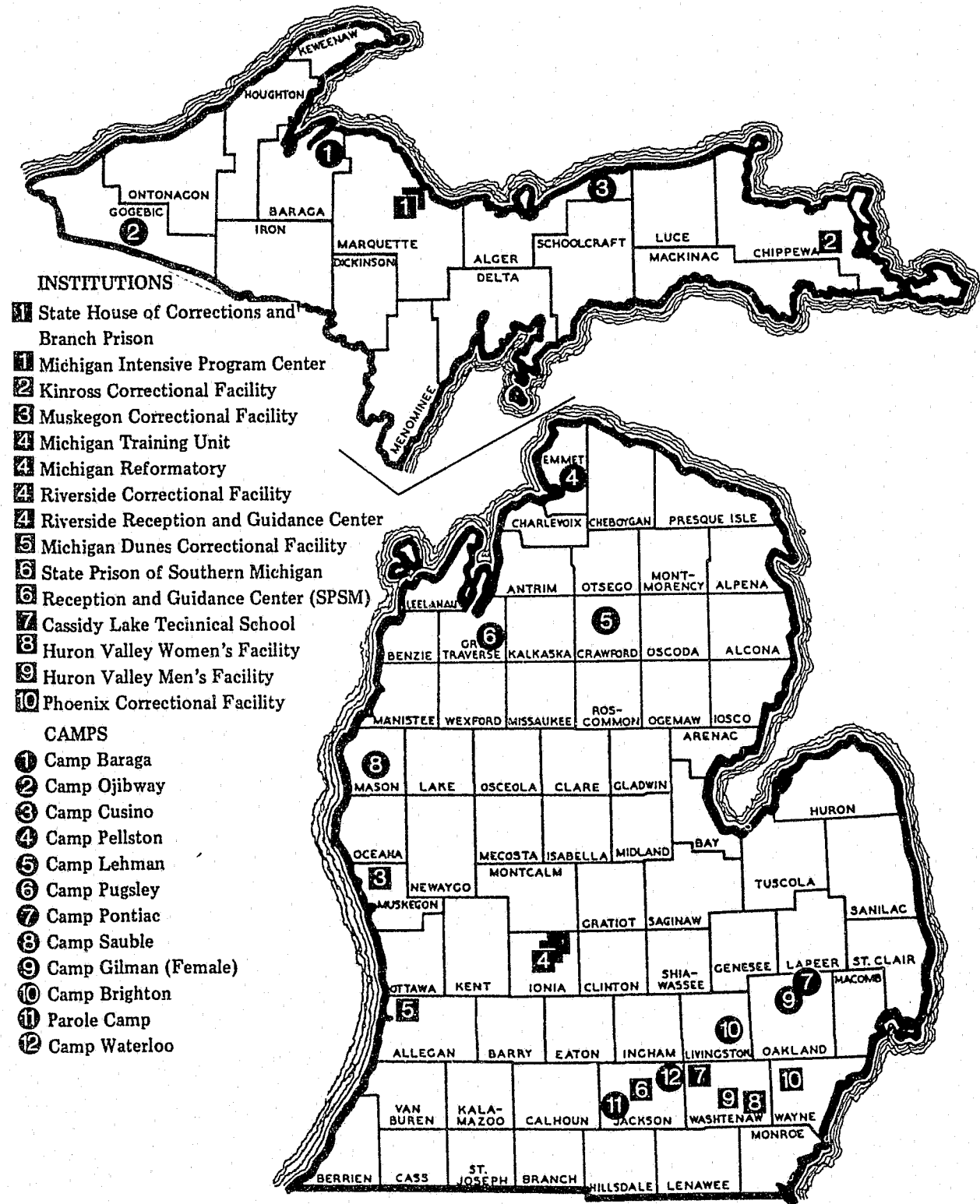

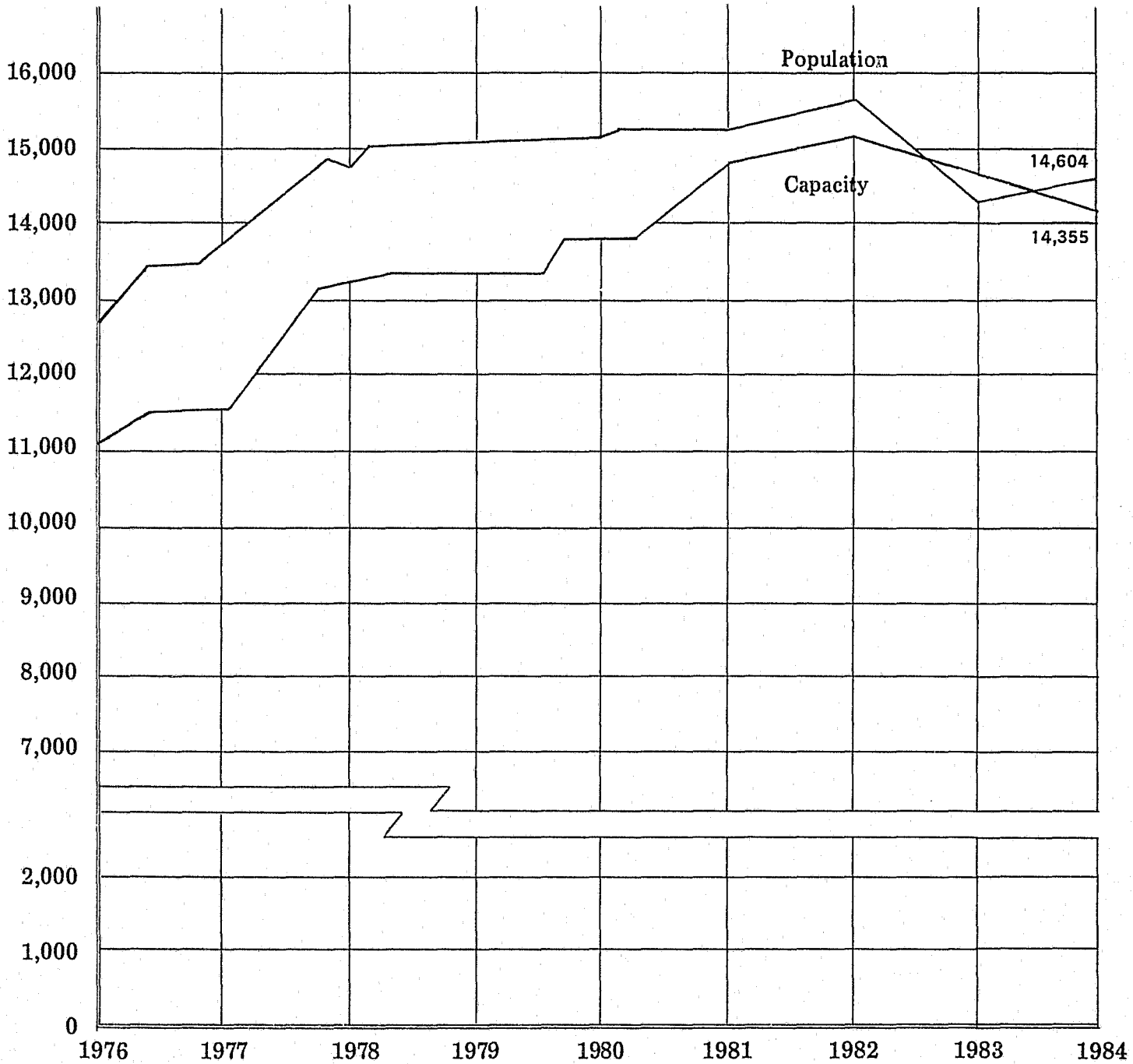

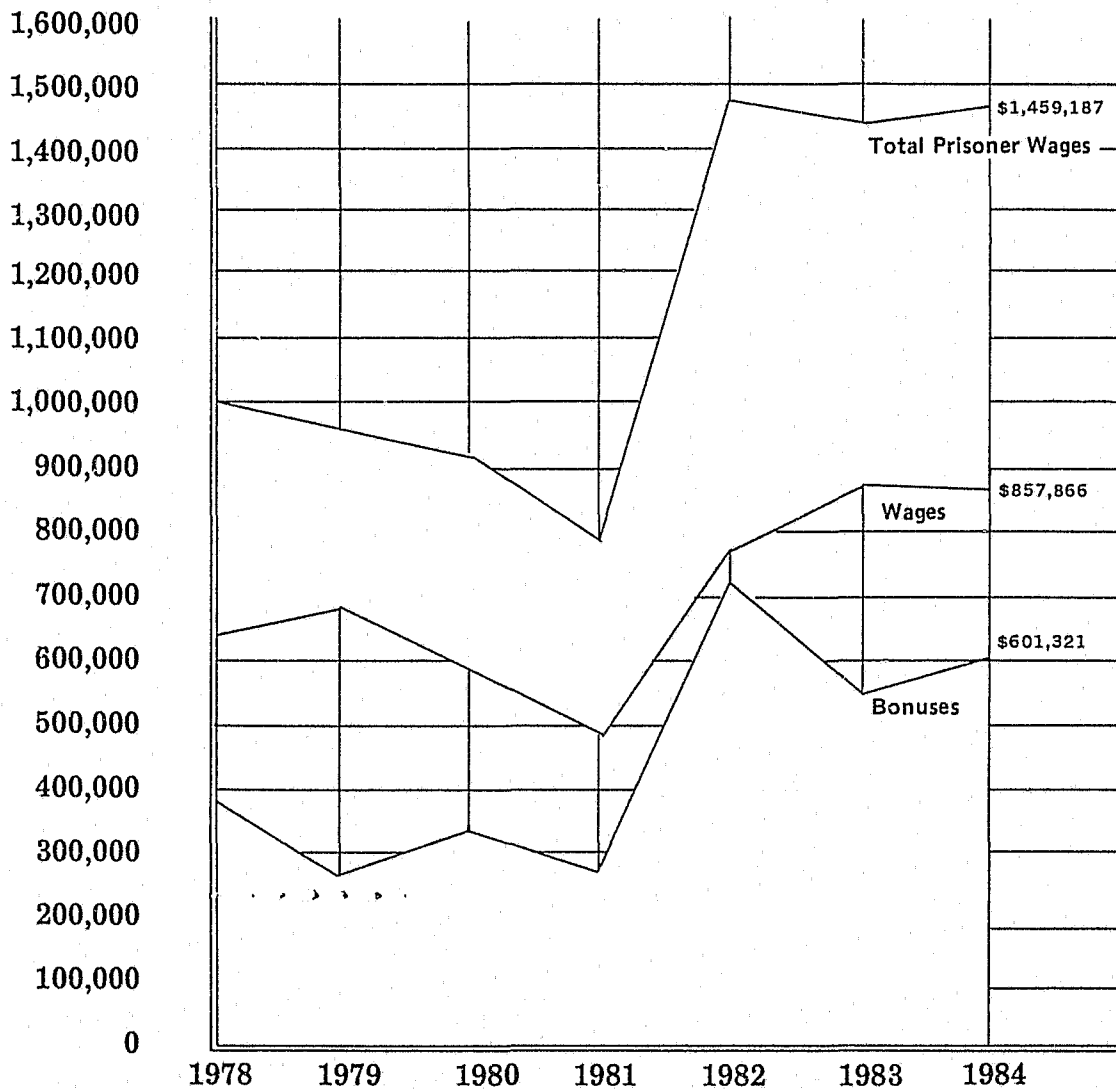
C8 Prison Population and Rated Capacity as of December 1984

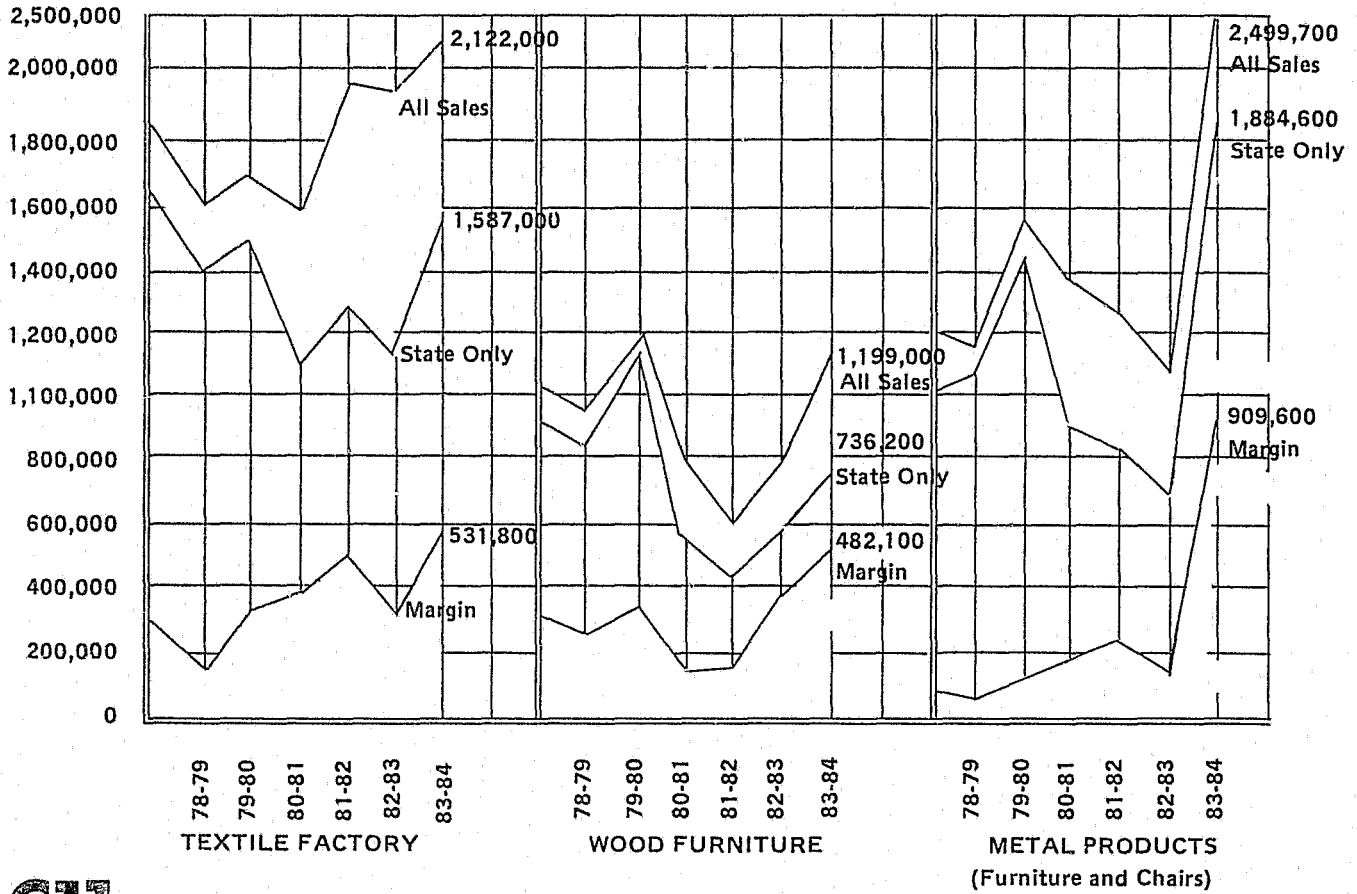
MICHIGAN STATE INDUSTRIES -- Total Prisoner Earnings



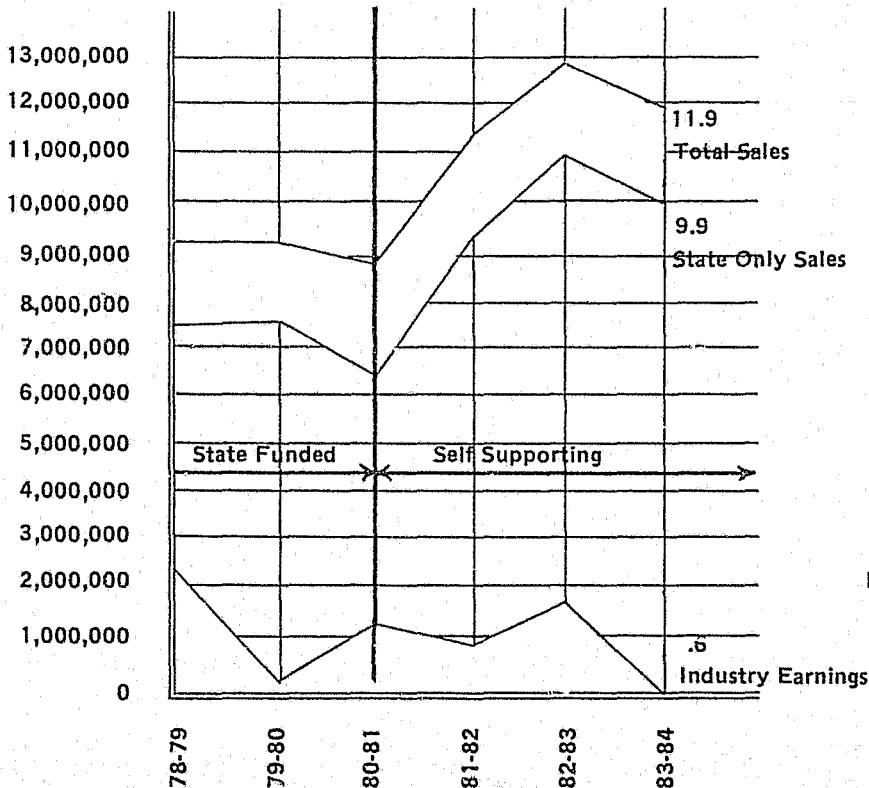

PAROLE

The D charts show parole activity in 1984. Table D1 counts the last continuance or parole action taken on a person during the year. A person may have had several actions during the year. In 1984, 56% of all first offenders were paroled on their minimums.

The Total Dispositions per category shows that 6,405 first offenders were considered for parole in 1984. Of those, 1,825 or 56% were paroled on their minimum; 44% or 1,418 were paroled after their minimums.

Of the 2,133 parole violators with new sentences considered, 699 or 33% were paroled. Of the 2,133 considered, 41% or 286 were paroled on their minimums.

A total of 4,678 repeat offenders were considered by the Board in 1984. A total of 39% or 675 of the 4,678 considered were paroled on their minimums. A total of 37% of these types of offenders were paroled.

A total of 6,127 persons from all categories were paroled in 1984; a total of 3,672 were continued. The parole to continuance ratio is, therefore, 2 to 1.

D1a shows the number and location of parole hearings in 1984.

The D2a and D2b charts show the results of four-year follow-ups of persons paroled in 1980. The offense groups shown on the left in D2a are those crimes from which the prisoner was paroled.

A new chart makes its premier in the 1984 annual report. It shows the crimes for which paroles were returned and compares them with the crime from which the person was paroled.

The table counts the original crime -- see column labeled "ORIG TOTL" --and contains subtotal counts for the group category of these crimes.

The table counts the crimes committed while on parole (P.V.N.S.).

To use the chart, find the crime title in the vertical column on the left.

Following the title will be an alpha character in parentheses. For example, homicide has the alpha character (A). The number beside this character (13) shows the number of people paroled in 1980 from a homicide and who were later returned for a new crime. Next, locate the character (A) across the top of the chart. (A) represents the crime of homicide and shows how many of the 13 persons were returned to prison for the crime of homicide. Looking below A, you can see that one person of the 13 came back with a crime of homicide. By moving to the next vertical column (B) you can see how many people paroled from homicide (A) were returned with a sentence of rape (B). In this case there were none.

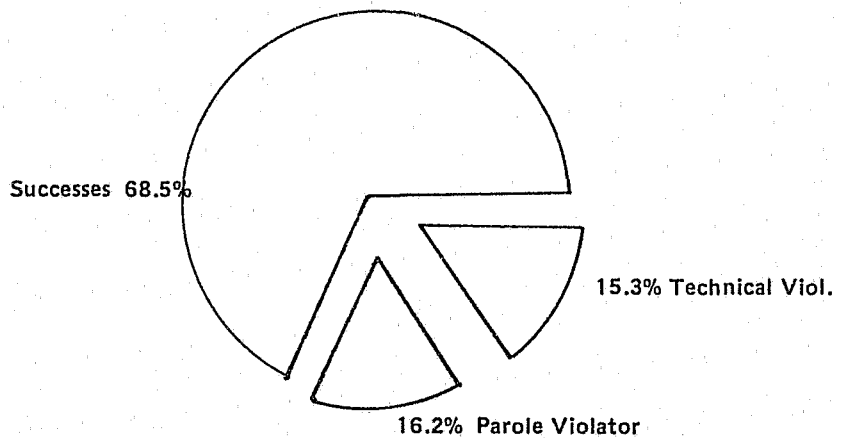

FIELD SERVICES

This section describes, through use of statistics, the activities of the Bureau of Field Services.

This bureau supervises all felons on probation, parole or living in the community in a halfway house or resident home.

The supervision is divided into three regions which are shown on the map in this section.

The central office prepares budgets, sets policies and handles matters that cannot be taken care of locally such as the Interstate Compact and communications concerning absconders picked up in other states.

Parole violations which result in return to prison are shown in this section.

Personnel and funds distribution illustrate the total staff in field supervision, community corrections centers and central office administration. It also describes, through a pie chart, the dollars spent during the 1983-84 fiscal year on these same bureau sections. The work unit distribution charts show how the work time of the employees of this bureau is divided into supervision and investigation.

Supervision is further divided into type and shows the probation supervision accounts for 68.6 percent of all supervision activities.

Investigation accounts for 27.2 percent of the work units. Of all investigations, those done for the pre-sentence reports clearly predominate.

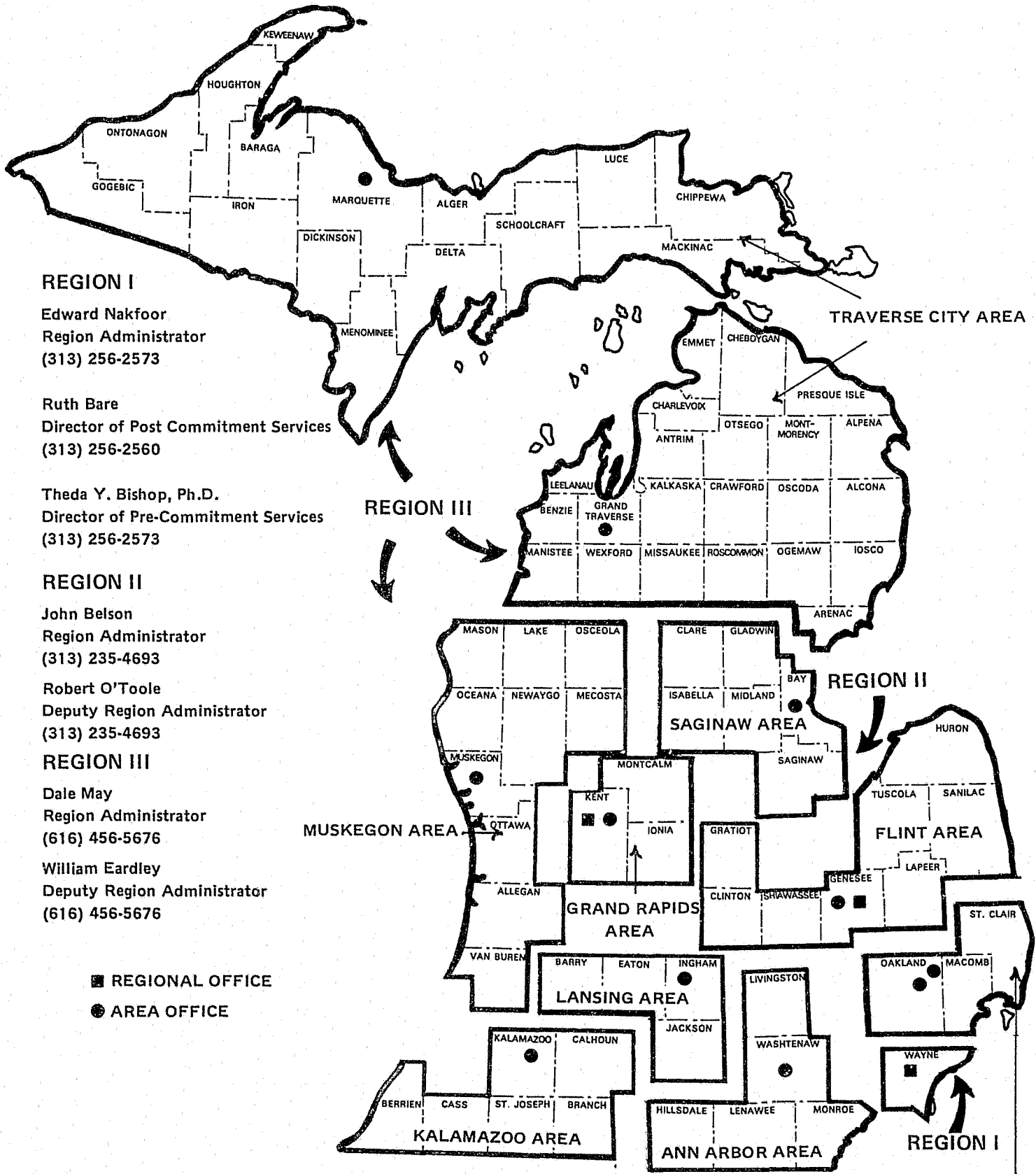
The bureau measures workloads by assigning unit values to the various tasks. A completed pre-sentence investigation equals five units and each client supervised ranges from 2 units to .1 unit. In most Michigan counties parole and probation agents average 110 work units per month.

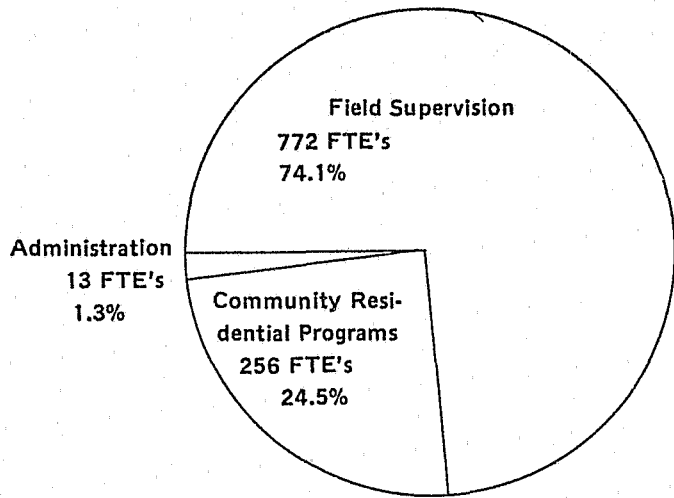

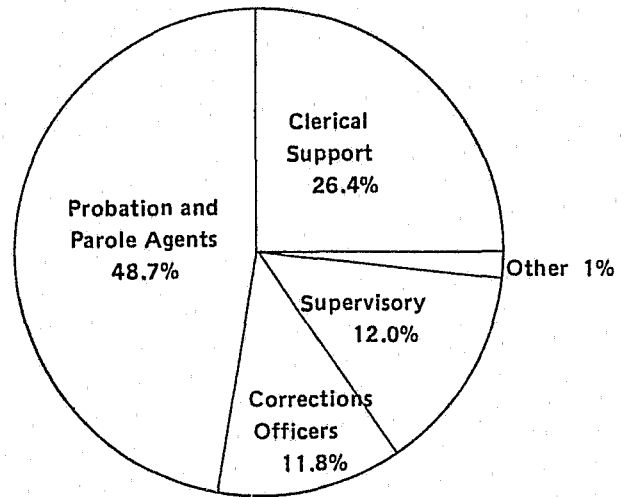

Personnel and Funds Distribution

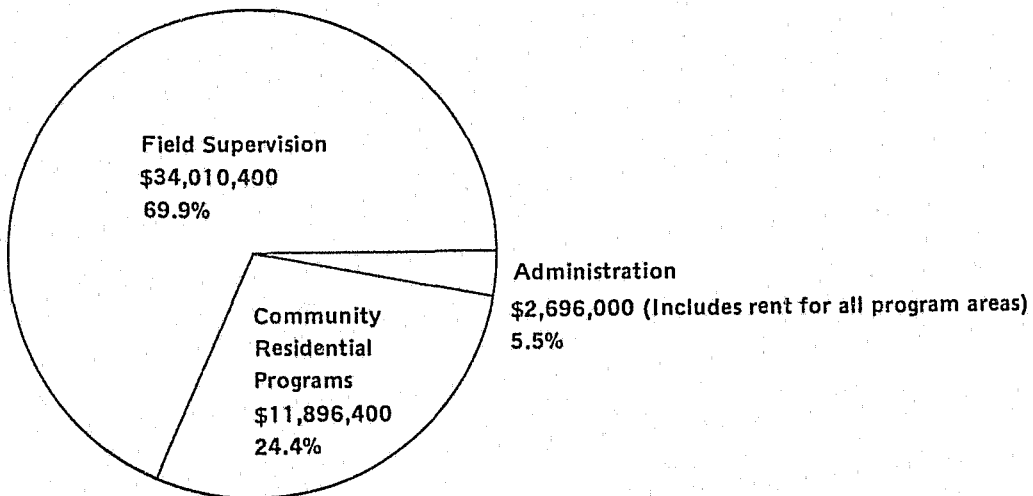
Personnel (Organization)



Personnel (Distribution) Category



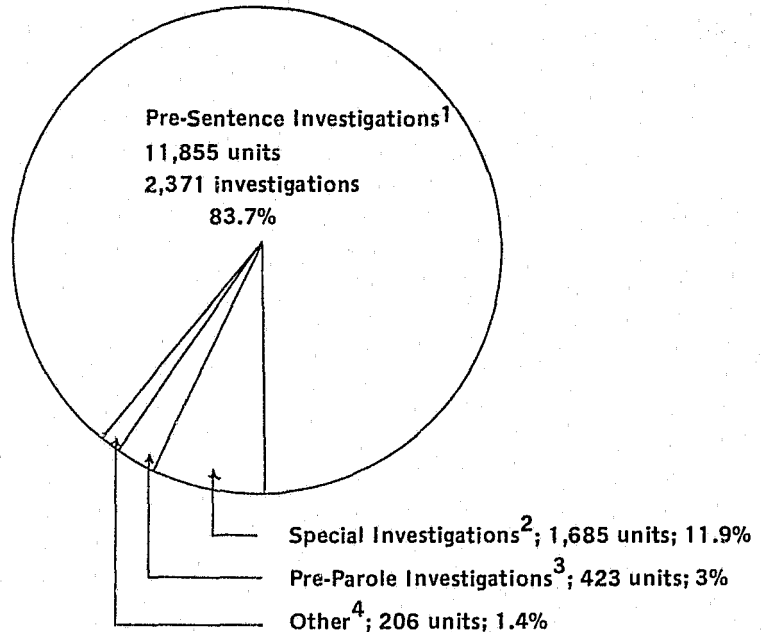

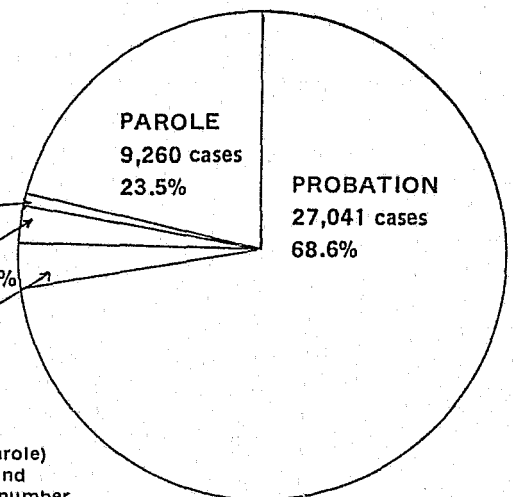

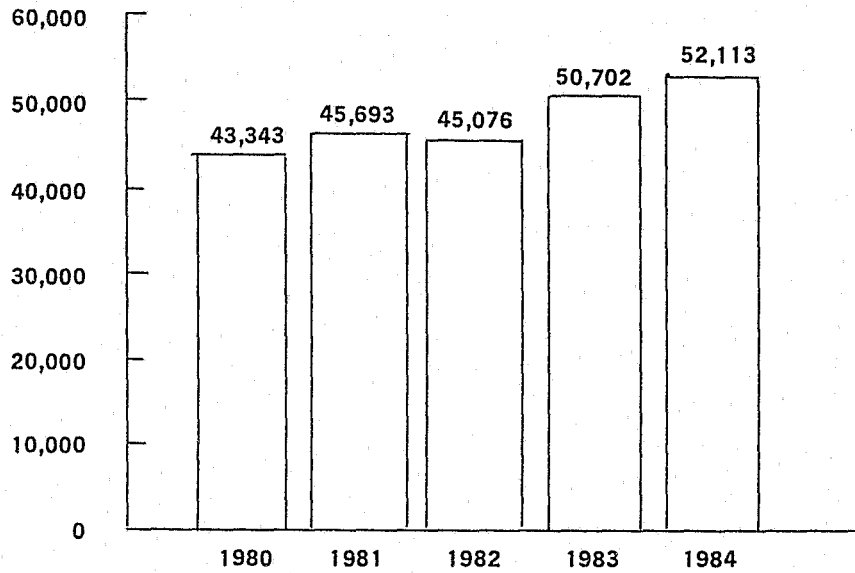

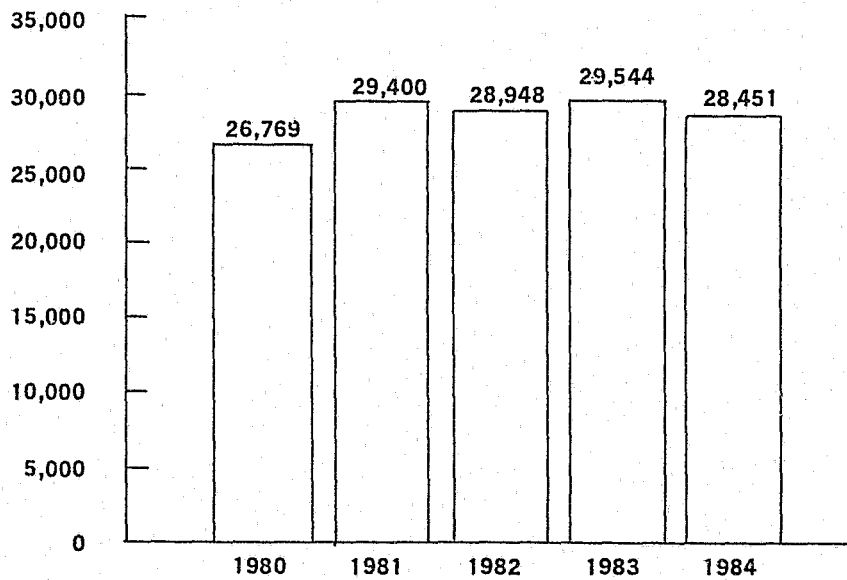

E5a Average Monthly Statewide Workunits* Annually

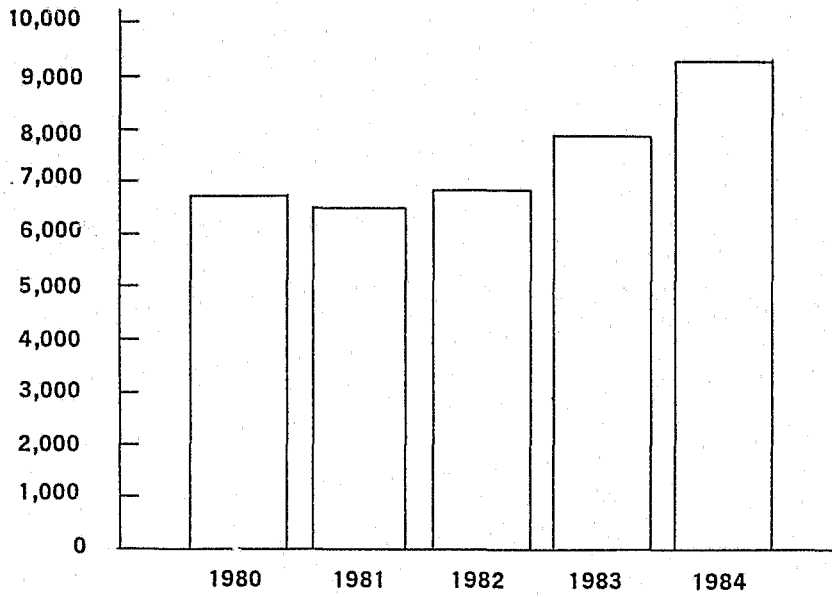

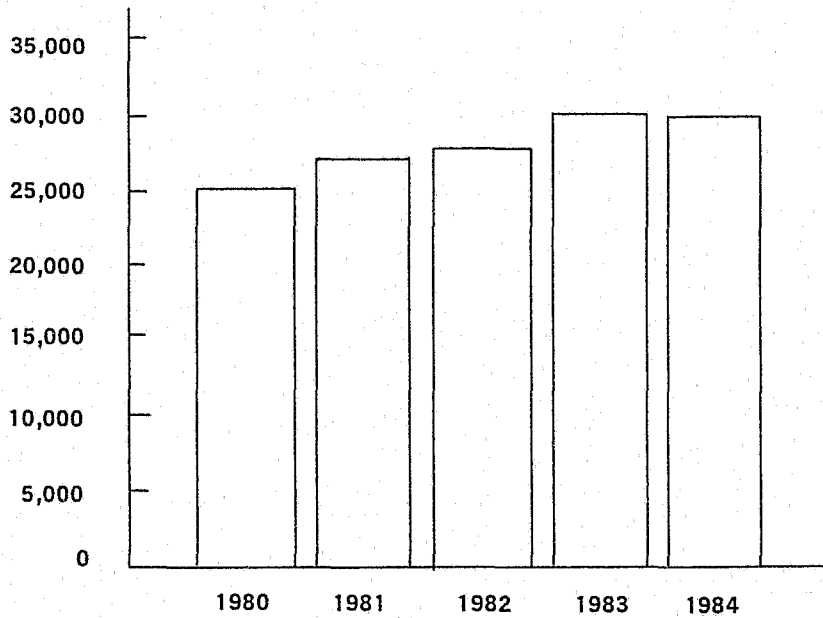
E5b Yearly Number of Pre-Sentence Investigations



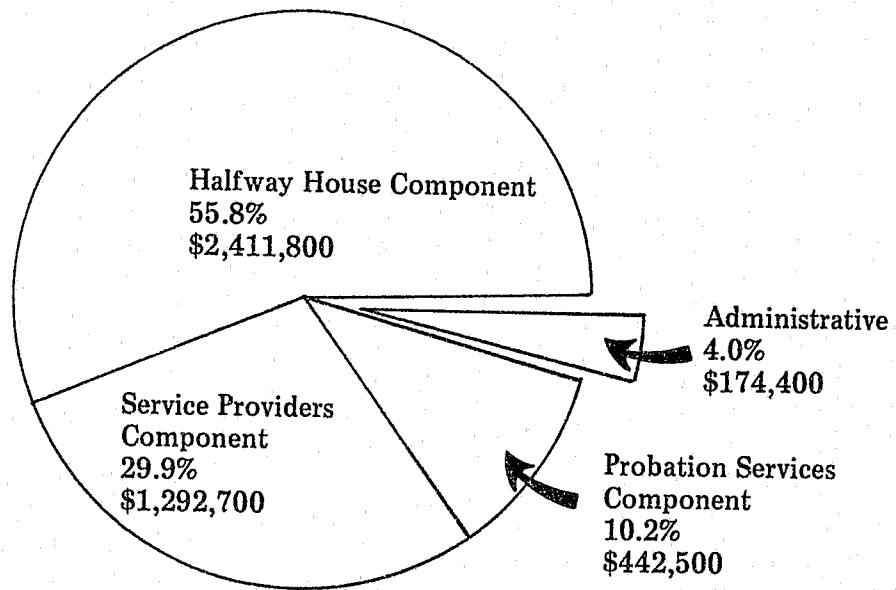
E6a Average Number of Parole Cases Supervised

E7 Community Alternative Program Funding 1983-84 FY

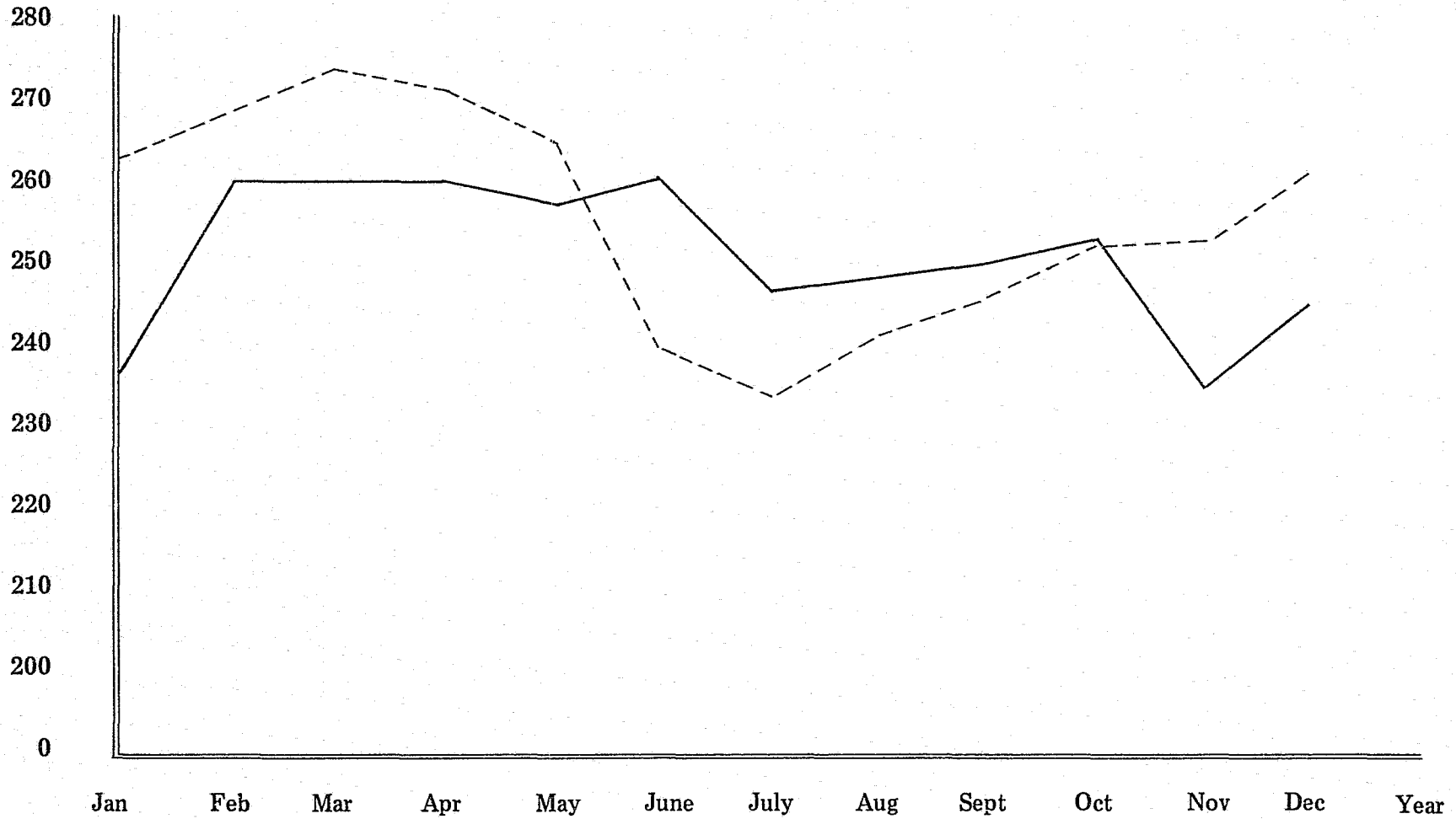

COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS

The F charts describe the department's halfway house program in 1984.

F-1 reflects community programs population, terminations, escapes, new felonies, earnings and cost statistics during a five-year period.

The average daily count was 1,587 and the service population 6,792 in the 1983-84 fiscal year. The average stay is 2.8 months. In 1984, 66.3% of all prisoners leaving the program were paroled; 5.5% were returned to prison because of disciplinary charges; 16.9% escaped; and 3.5% left with a new felony charge.

CRP Terminations - Percent of Total 1975-FY 1983-84 (F-6) -- shows general trends in termination statistics over the past 10 years.

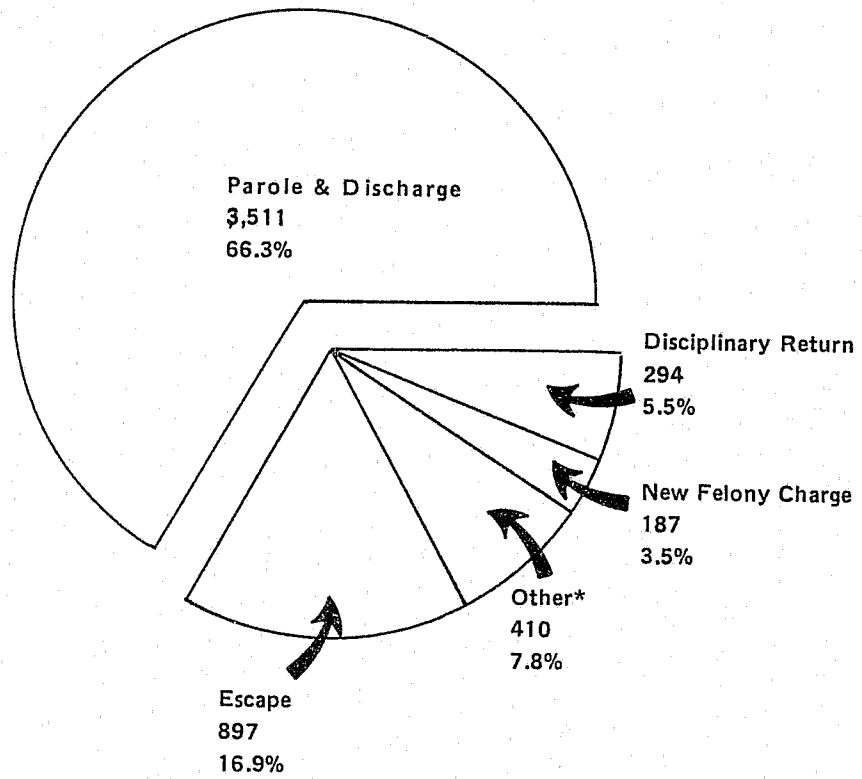

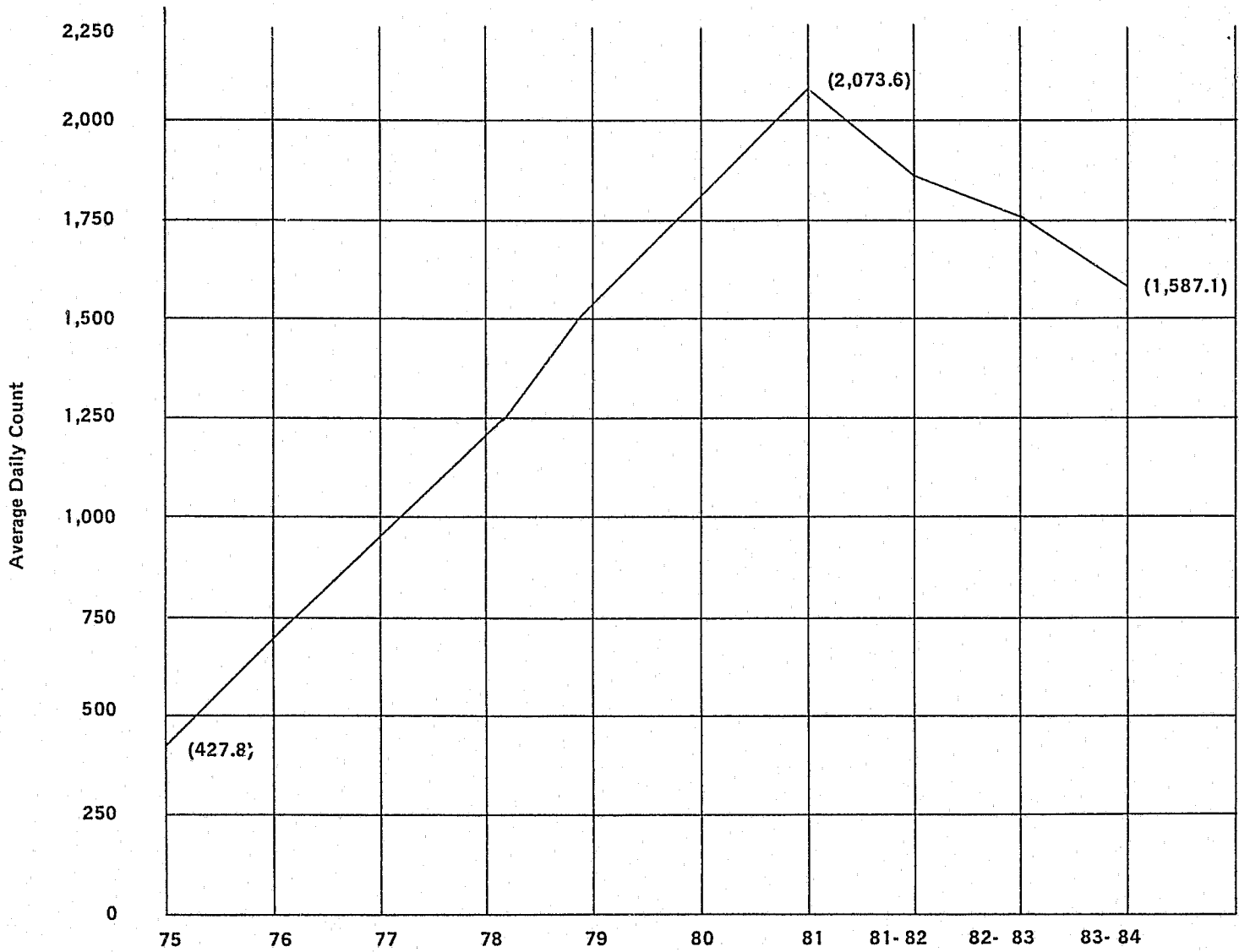

F2 CRP Program Terminations FY 1983-84

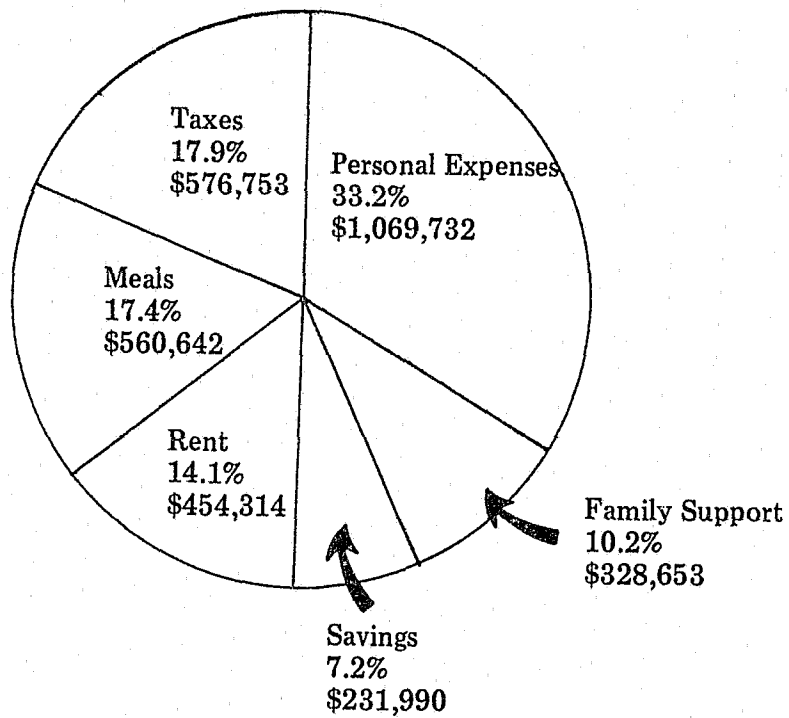

F3 Community Programs Population 1975 — FY 1983-84



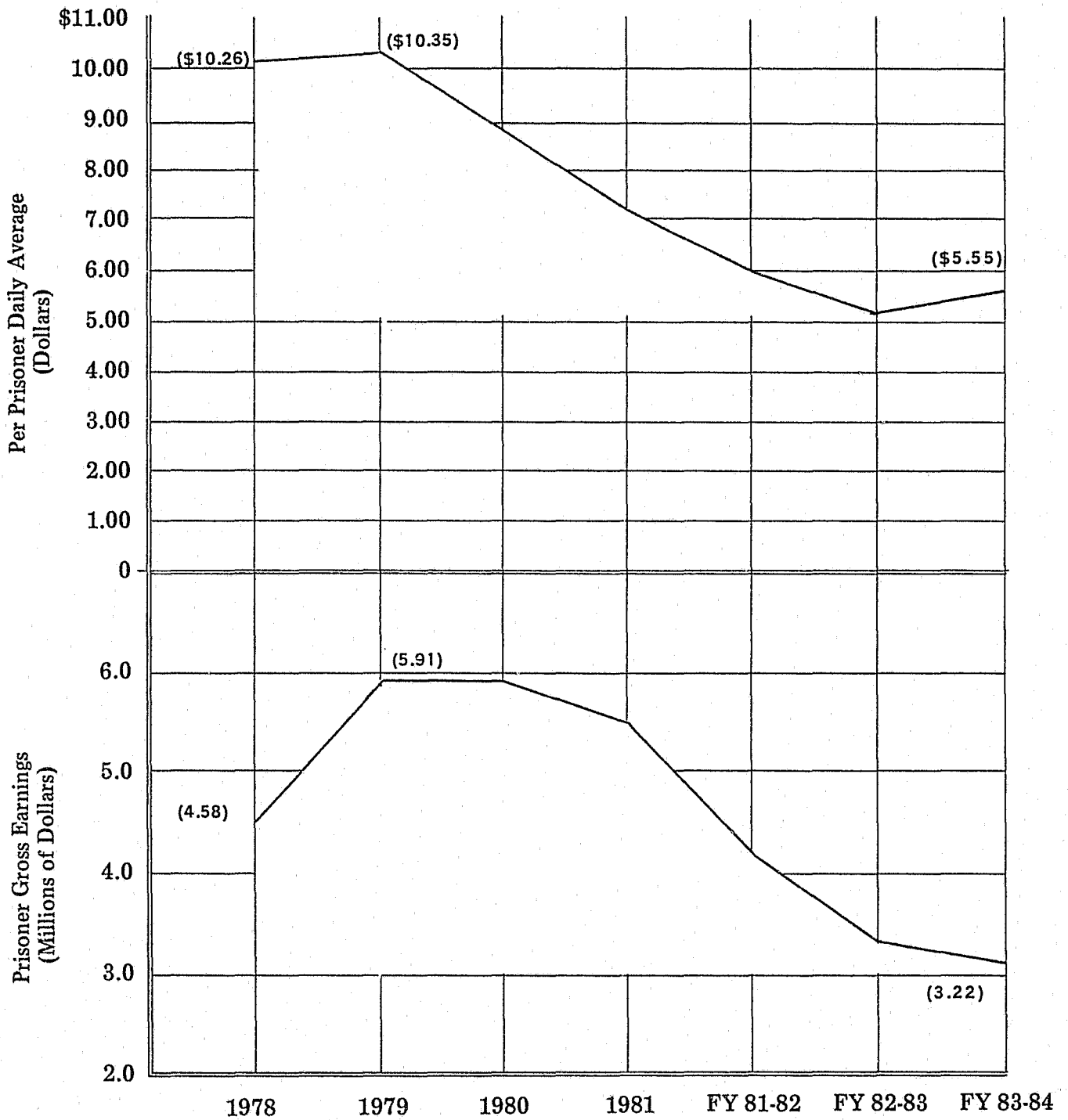
F4 CRP Prisoner Earnings Distribution FY 1983-84



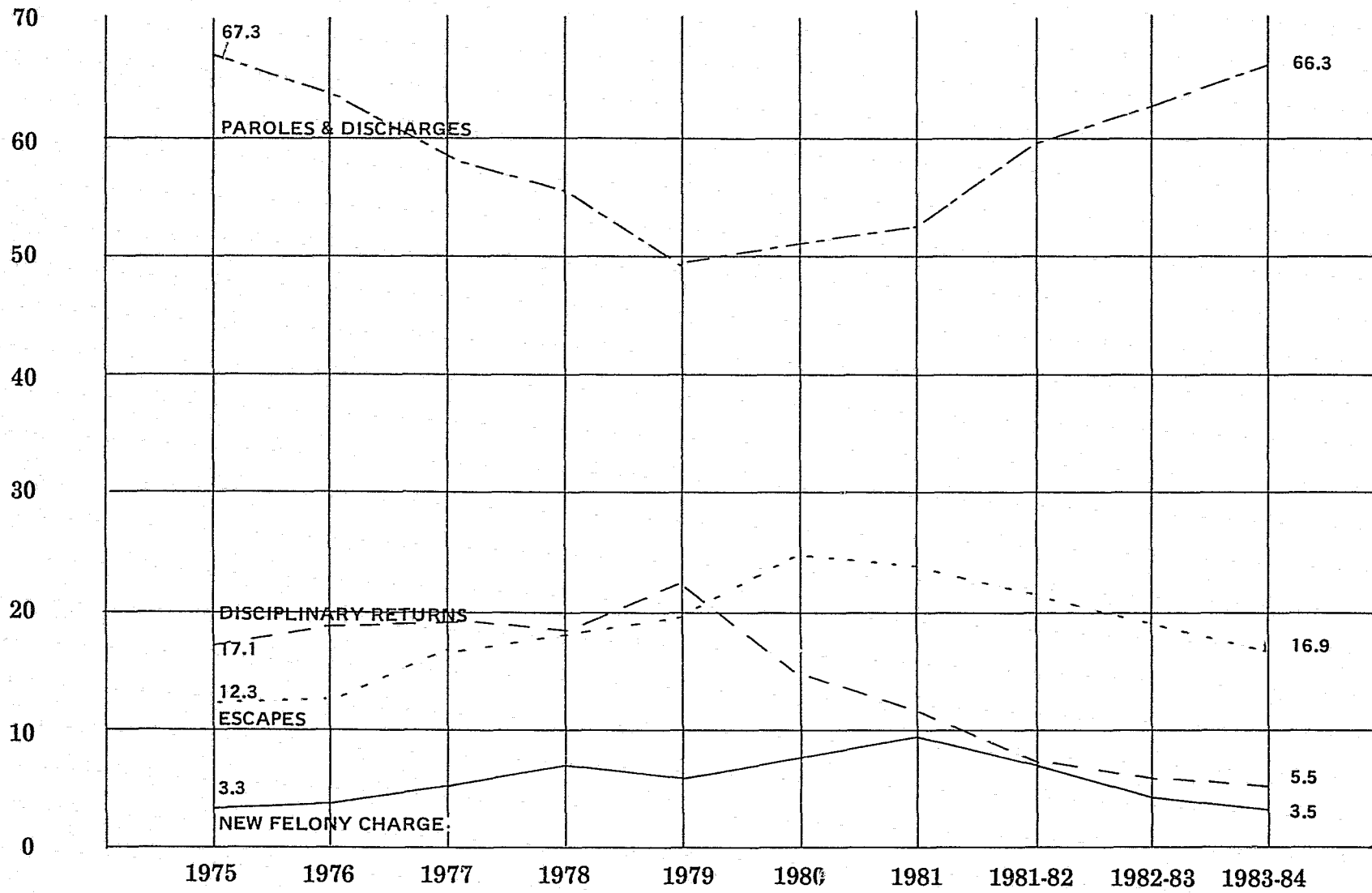

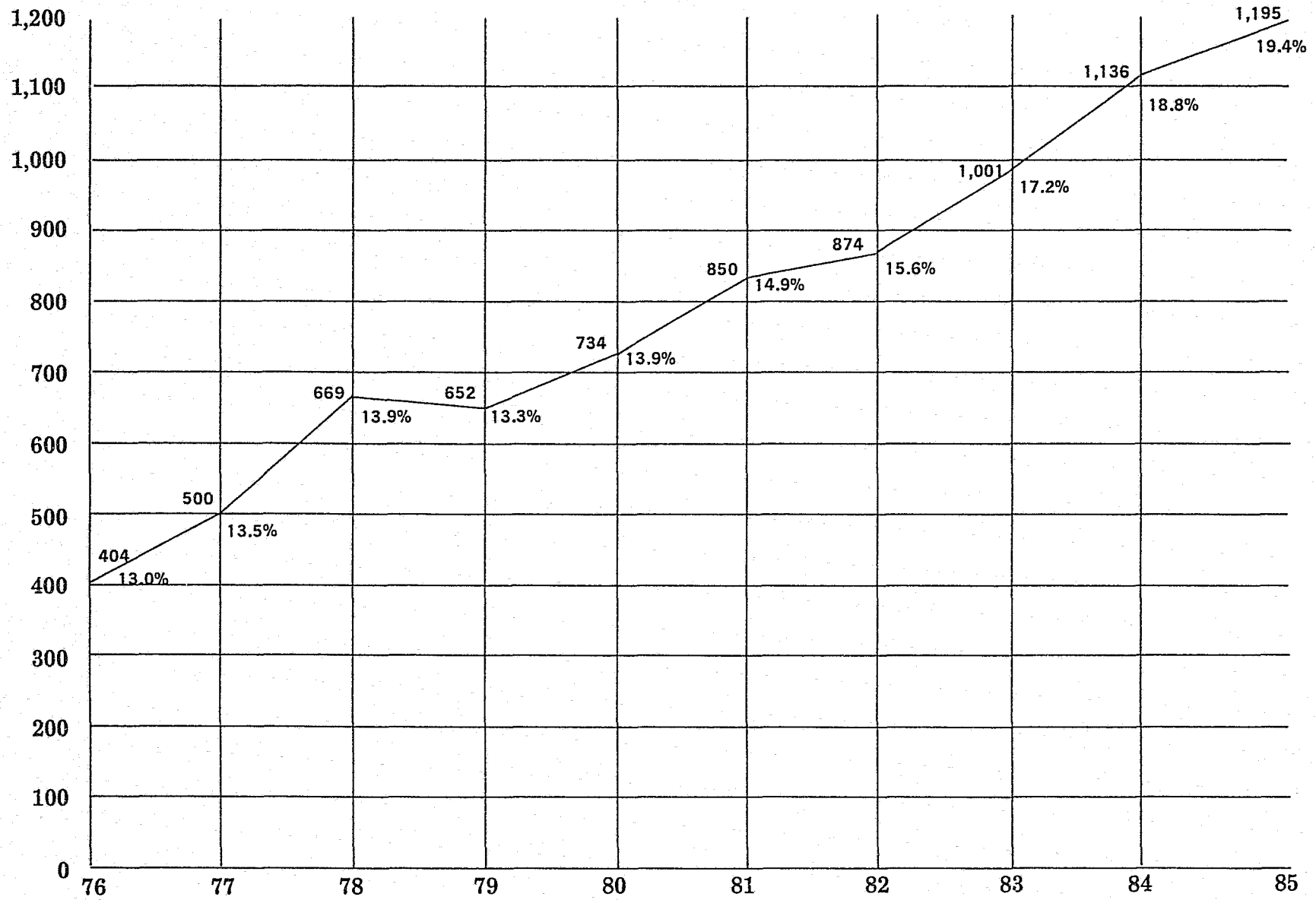

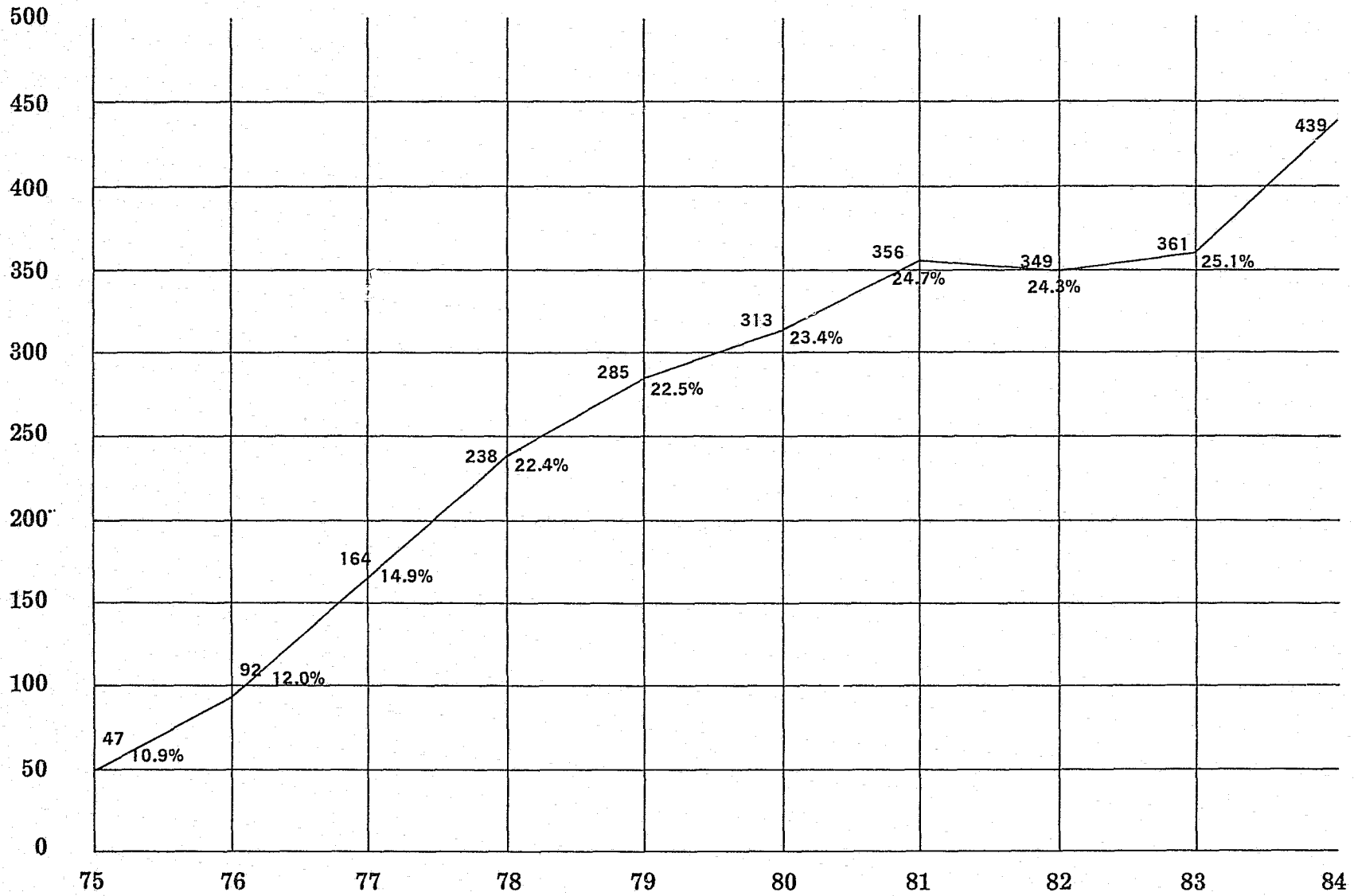

H2 Minority Employees and Percentages



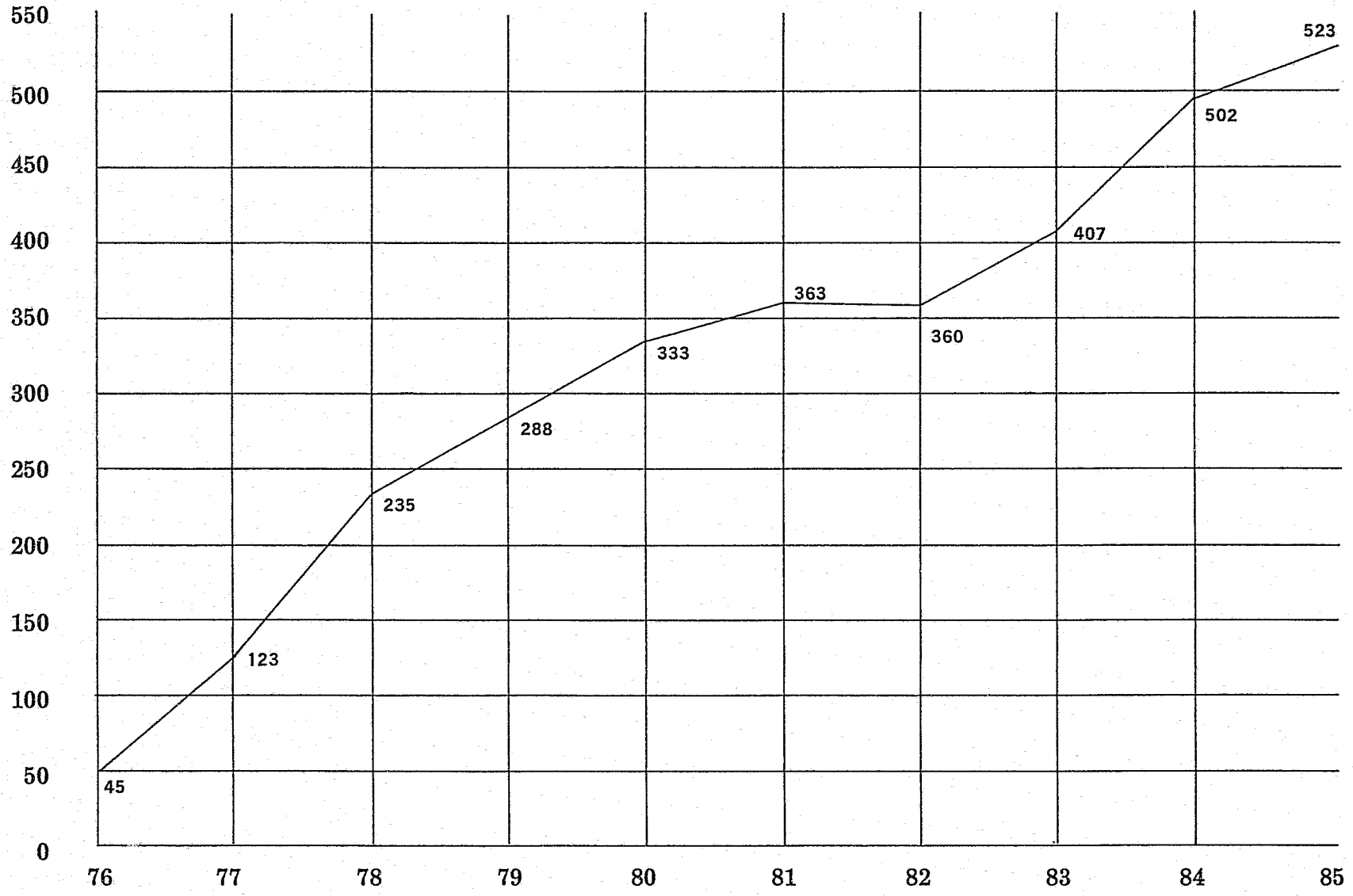
H3 Female Employees and Percentages at the Administrative and Professional Level
