



Judicial Conference of the United States

Table 3 presents the general scheme of the administration of the federal courts. The Conference, chaired by the Chief Justice of the United States, determines administrative policy for the federal courts. It oversees the Administrative Office of the United States Courts and advises the legislative and executive branches on matters affecting the judiciary. In addition to the Chief Justice, its membership includes the chief judge of each judicial circuit and a district judge from each circuit chosen by the circuit and district judges of the circuit. During 1984 the Eighth Circuit was represented on the Judicial Conference of the United States by Chief Judge Donald P. Lay and Judge Albert G. Schatz from the District of Nebraska. Chief Judge Lay's term on the Judical Conference runs concurrently with his term as chief judge. District Judge Schatz's term expires on August 28, 1987. During 1984 the following judges and lawyers from the Eighth Circuit were serving on the Committees of the Judicial Conference of the United States:

The Conference meets in Washington, D.C. semi-annually, usually in March and in September. Its committees generally convene twice yearly also. During Judicial Conference week, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and the chief judges of the circuit courts hold a meeting which the circuit executives also attend.

Federal Judicial Center

The Center was established within the judicial branch by Congress in 1967.

The Board includes the chief justice, who serves as chairman by statute, the Director of Administrative Office and six judicial members who are elected by the Judicial Conference, two from the court of appeals three from the district courts and one from the bankruptcy courts. Chief Judge Warren K. Urbom of the District of Nebraska serves on the Board.

The Center carries out its work through four divisions:

- 1. Continuing Education and Training
- 2. Innovations and Systems Development
- 3. Research
- 4. Inter-judicial affairs and Information Services.

EIGHTH CIRCUIT JUDICIAL COUNCIL

EIGHTH CIRCUIT JUDICIAL COUNCIL

Since 1939, the judicial councils were comprised of all court of appeals judges in regular active service. On October 1, 1981, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. \$33.2(a), the judicial councils were reconstituted and district judges were given representation on the councils. Such representation is to be determined by the active court of appeals judges subject to a statutory minimum. Thus, circuits with fewer than six court of appeals judges must provide for representation of at least two district judges. Circuits with six or more judges must have at least three district judges on their councils. Court of appeals judges also determine the number of court of appeals representatives on the council.

The first reconstituted Eighth Circuit Judicial Council was composed of all active court of appeals judges and three district court judges.

Effective October 1, 1983, the council was again reconstituted by adding two additional district judges. The method of selection and term of office of the five district judge members is as follows:

- (1) One member shall be the district judge who represents the circuit on the Judicial Conference of the United States and whose term of office on the Council shall run concurrently with the membership on the Conference.
- (2) The active district judges from the Eastern District of Arkansas, Western District of Arkansas, Eastern District of Missouri, and Western District of Missouri shall select from their ranks a total of two members. Such members shall serve two years. Membership shall rotate among the four districts.

- (3) The active district judges from the Northern District of Iowa, Southern District of Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, and South Dakota shall select from their ranks a total of two members. Such members shall serve two years. Membership shall rotate among the six districts.
- (4) A district shall not be represented by more than one judge.

Pursuant to the above plan, the following district court judges were selected to serve on the council:

- Chief Judge Edward J. McManus, Northern District of Iowa
- ° Chief Judge Andrew W. Bogue, District of South Dakota
- Judge Albert G. Schatz, District of Nebraska (representative on the Judicial Conference of the U.S.)
- Judge William R. Overton, Eastern District of Arkansas
- Judge Howard F. Sachs, Western District of Missouri

The council is required to hold at least two meetings a year. As a result of the Council's Committee Plan, the number of council meetings is kept to a minimum. That committee plan, which was adopted in 1980, and again in 1981 and 1983 by the reconstituted councils, provides that each committee chairman be authorized to determine, on behalf of the council, routine administrative matters requiring council approval. During 1983 almost all of the committee chairmen utilized this procedure to expedite the work of the council and to reduce burdens on other council members.

Table 4 presents a summary of the actions of the council and its committees from 1980 through 1984.

Complaints Against Judges

On October 1, 1981, the Judicial Council's Reform and Judicial Conduct and Disability Act of 1980 became effective. The purpose of the act was to provide an internal mechanism within the judicial branch to consider and act upon complaints against federal judges and magistrates. Each Judicial Council prescribes its own rules for conduct of proceedings under the act.

On July 16, 1981, the Council adopted Rules for the processing of complaints against judges and magistrates in the Eighth Circuit. These rules were amended in 1982 to require that all complaints be verified and filed on the form set out in the rules.

Copies of the revised rules are available to the public in the offices of the clerks of the court of appeals and district and bankruptcy courts throughout the Eighth Circuit.

During 1984, fourteen complaints were received by the Clerk's Office. Thirteen were dismissed by the Chief Judge. One was referred to the Judicial Council Investigation Committee and following corrective action it was dismissed as moot.

JUDICIAL CONFERENCE OF THE EIGHTH CIRCUIT

Summary Report of the 1984 Judicial Conference

of the Eighth Circuit

The 1984 Judicial Conference of the Eighth Circuit took place from July 23

through July 25, at the Hyatt Regency in Kansas City, Missouri. It is held annually to

undertake the business of the courts and to explore means for improvement of the

administration of justice in the federal courts. For the fourth year, registration was

open to all lawyers interested in the improvement of the administration of justice in the

federal courts. This practice was instituted in 1981 for the purpose of providing a more

direct forum for lawyers to participate in the administrative business of the federal

courts.

Among the 603 registered, there were 87 members of the federal judiciary from

the Eighth Circuit, chief judges of state supreme courts, chief judges of the state

intermediate appellate courts, deans of law schools in the circuit, attorneys general of

the states in the circuit, United States attorneys in this circuit, presidents of state bar

associations, the clerk of the court of appeals and the clerks of the district courts,

members of the Federal Practice Committees, and 462 lawyers from the seven states

comprising the Eighth Circuit. Total attendance, including members, spouses, and guests

was 946.

The conference began with separate sessions, of the circuit and district judges,

bankruptcy judges, magistrates and clerks of court. These were followed by general

sessions.

Chief Judge Lay welcomed the participants at each of the general sessions.

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Among the many outstanding speakers were Hon. Harry A. Blackmun, Associate Justice, U.S. Supreme Court; Hon. Joseph F. Weis, Jr. of the Third Circuit Court of Appeals; Professor Arthur R. Miller, Harvard Law School; Michael J. Remington, Chief Counsel House Judiciary Subcommittee on Courts; Irving Younger, Esq.; Hon. William H. Webster, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation; and Hon. Robert Van Pelt, Senior District Judge, Nebraska.

A special program entitled "The Trial of Alger Hiss: A Celebrated Criminal Case and Its Place in American History" was presented by Mr. Irving Younger.

The Federal Practice Committee luncheon meetings were held in the afternoon on the first day of the Conference. Chief judges of the district courts presided over these sessions. Discussions at these meetings covered important subjects of concern to the bench and the bar in the Eighth Circuit with emphasis placed on Rule 16(b) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure.

The Program Committee responsible for the program for the Conference included Hon. John R. Gibson, chairman, and Hon. Theodore McMillian, assistant chairman; Hon. Harold D. Vietor, Hon. John B. Jones, and attorneys Roger P. Brosnahan, David Collins, Wendell L. Griffen, Karen M. Iverson, Philip Kaplan, Professor Randy H. Lee, George Rozmarin, Shulamith Simon, and R. Lawrence Ward.

The 1985 Judicial Conference is scheduled for July 24-26 at the Excelsior Hotel in Little Rock, Arkansas.

FEDERAL PRACTICE COMMITTEE

The committees in each district in the circuit is chaired by the chief district judge who designates two lawyer co-chairpersons. Membership in the committee includes a cross-section of lawyers and law teachers in each district.

The committees are to:

- Study the practice and procedure in the federal courts in the Eighth Circuit and recommend to the council and the district courts changes, improvements and methods to improve and expedite case processing.
- Advise the council and district courts as to programs that will assist in maintaining a high level of competency of all attorneys practicing in the federal courts.
- Work with law schools and bar associations within the districts to co-sponsor legal education seminars in federal practice and procedures for law students and federal court practitioners.
- Assist in the organization and conduct of the annual Eighth Circuit Judicial Conference, attend such conference, and annually review the list of attendees and recommend persons who should be invited to the conference.

The clerks of the respective district courts shall act as secretary to the committees and shall keep minutes of the meetings.



CIRCUIT EXECUTIVE'S OFFICE

Background

Congress established the position of circuit executive in 1971 and prescribed the duties that may be delegated to the circuit executive. These include:

- Administer non-judicial activities, personnel, and budget of court of appeals.
- Maintain accounting systems, property control records, and space management programs.
- Conduct studies of the business and administration of courts within the circuits, prepare reports, and make recommendations.
- Collect, compile, and analyze statistical data for reports.
- Act in liaison with state courts, marshal's office, bar associations, civic groups, media, and others having interest in the circuit.
- Prepare agenda and attend meetings of judges of the circuit and circuit council.
- Prepare annual report with recommendations to expedite disposition of the business of the circuit.

In addition, the Bankruptcy Reform Act of 1978 provided that the circuit executive shall convene a merit screening committee for the purpose of passing on the qualifications of bankruptcy judges who are candidates for appointment or reappointment.

Each chief circuit judge and circuit council has great latitude as to what duties they wish the circuit executive to perform. It should be noted that the role of the circuit executive is an evolving one and will continue to be changed in order to meet the administrative needs of the federal courts.

In the Eighth Circuit, the circuit executive has a staff of three: an administrative assistant and two secretaries.

During 1984, the circuit executive in the Eighth Circuit has exercised responsibility in the following areas of court administration:

- 1. Preparing annual budget request for the court of appeals and the circuit executive's office.
- 2. Providing support services for the purchase of equipment and furniture for judges chambers and other court offices.
- 3. Rendering support services to the chief judges office in planning and conducting the annual Eighth Circuit Judicial Conference.
- 4. Operating a microcomputer to support the conference, and prepare statistical reports.
- 5. Providing staff support to the judicial council and all of its committees. Issued 54 administrative orders evidencing action of the council in 1984.
- 6. Assisting in the planning of seminars for judges and court personnel sponsored by the Federal Judicial Center.
- 7. Providing staff services for Merit Screening Committees for bankruptcy judges. Five committees were convened in 1984.
- 8. Attending semi-annual meetings of Conference of Chief Judges of the United States and of the Circuit Executives.
- 9. Approving requests for emergency court reporter services for the district courts.
- 10. Coordinating space projects for the court of appeals and the district courts.
- 11. Assisting the chief judge in planning the meetings of the chief district judges.
- 12. Installing microcomputer systems in district courts.
- 13. Preparation of annual reports for all courts in the circuit.
- 14. Recruitment and screening of candidates for circuit librarian and senior staff attorney.
- 15. Organizing Historical Societies for all the courts in the Eighth Circuit.

UNITED STATES COURT OF APPEALS

Law School Court Sessions

In 1975, the Court of Appeals began scheduling a regular session of the Court, with actual cases being argued, at law schools in the Eighth Circuit. In 1981 the court adopted a plan to sit once every three years in each of the fifteen law schools in the circuit. The program is intended to give students at least one exposure to an actual session of the Court during their attendance at law school.

The Court endeavors to select at least three cases which are significant cases and which would present issues of a topical nature. The Clerk of the Court supplies the briefs of these cases to the law schools in advance of the Court session. The law school usually prepares a summary of the facts and issues to be presented which is distributed to the students before the arguments. At the completion of the arguments, the judges hold a discussion session with the students and faculty. When the opinion is filed, the Clerk of the Court sends a copy to the law school where it can be posted and read by students.

During 1984, the Court sat at four of the fifteen law schools. Responses of students continue to be enthusiastic. Members of the Court enjoy the sessions which enable them to interact with law students and school faculty as well.

Below is a table showing the law schools in the Circuit, the dates when the Court of Appeals has sat there, and the names of the judges presiding.

PRE-ARGUMENT/SETTLEMENT CONFERENCE PROGRAM

Pursuant to Federal Rules of Appellate Procedure 33, the United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit designated all civil appeals (with the exception of petitions for post-conviction relief) from the United States district courts for consideration in the settlement program. 8th Cir. R. 1. In 1984 the program was amended to exclude social security cases, dismissals for lack of jurisdiction, interlocutory appeals certified under 28 U.S.C. § 1292(b), injunction cases certified under 28 U.S.C. § 1292(a)(1), federal or state agency cases, federal income tax cases, labor arbitrations, Title VII, section 1983 civil rights cases, and suits under ERISA unless there is a specific money judgment involved. 8th Cir. R. 2.

In civil cases subject to the program, at the time of filing the notice of appeal with the district court clerk, the appellant must also file a completed Appellant's Appeal Information Form, Form A, with the Clerk of the Court of Appeals and serve a copy on the appellee(s) together with the uncompleted Appellee's Appeal Information Form, Form B. Having been furnished with the completed Form A, the appellee completes Form B and files it directly with the Clerk of the Court of Appeals. Forms are available in the clerk's office of both the Court of Appeals and the district courts.

The District Court Clerk furnishes to the Clerk of the Court of Appeals two copies of the notice of appeal, the docket entries, the judgment or order appealed from together with any memorandum or finding by the district court. In jury tried cases or other cases where a district court opinion is not issued (e.g. no motion for new trial filed) counsel are encouraged to include with the notice of appeal and Appeal Information Form (or mailed separately to the Settlement Director) copies of the relevant pre-trial and post-trial motions and legal memoranda that provide helpful background about the nature of the case.

The Settlement Director conducts joint personal conferences with the attorneys, and when possible with their respective clients, for the purpose of settlement. In addition, he explores the delineation and simplification of the issues to assist the parties and the Court in the clarity of briefing and argument.

Although participation in the program is voluntary, the Court strongly urges participation and cooperation of attorneys and their clients.

Regular personal conferences are held in St. Louis, St. Paul, and Little Rock, and other locations when feasible. Telephone conferences are also conducted. In cases whether the amount in controversy is substantial, counsel are encouraged to attend conferences in St. Louis when the Director is unable to schedule a conference at a location more convenient to the parties. A detailed functional description of the activities of the Settlement Director is contained in the June 1984 edition of the Missouri Bar Journal. It is also available from the office of the Settlement Director.

U. S. Court of Appeals For the Eighth Circuit Clerk's Office

During calendar year 1984, the Court of Appeals began to operate an electronic bulletin board for the transmission of court documents among the various offices which comprise the Court of Appeals. The NBI terminals used by the Court (all judges' offices, the Circuit Executive's office, the Clerk's office and the Staff Attorneys' office) had the ability to transmit point to point but it was not until the installation of a central processing unit and the implementation of the electronic bulletin board that documents could be "posted" to multiple offices for transmission. The bulletin board is operated by the Clerk's office. Throughout the morning, judges' offices transmit various documents over the telephone for posting to the bulletin board. In the afternoon, each office "pulls" the documents posted to it. By following this procedure, draft opinions, memos, votes and other communiques can be quickly transmitted to those offices that need the information which is contained in the posted documents. The Court has significantly reduced intra-court mailing time by the use of the electronic bulletin board.

The present system is not a true electronic mail system. The electronic bulletin board does require operator intervention at a central site. Eventually, the system will be upgraded and documents will be sent automatically and simultaneously to multiple offices. The bulletin board is one example of the Court's growing use of technology for a more efficient operation.

The Court continues to use the simultaneous opinion release procedure for a select but growing number of cases. Responding the the requests of attorneys and local media representatives throughout the circuit, the Court began a couple of years ago to release certain opinions through the different district court clerk's offices within the circuit. Cases of particular note were simultaneously released in St. Louis and St. Paul and in the local district clerk's office so that the attorneys, parties and local media would have instant access to the Court's opinions. The procedure has been extremely well received

and efforts have been made to expand the program to a larger number of cases. The program has been successful mainly due to the efforts and cooperation of the district court clerks' offices who must carefully coordinate the local opinion release. Working with the district clerks' offices and with the attorneys, the Court is trying to identify more cases in which the opinion should be simultaneously released. The Court is aware of the attorneys' and the parties' keen interest in promptly learning about the Court's decisions and the simultaneous release program is one successful effort in responding to that interest and need to know.

The Court has maintained its policy of sitting primarily in St. Louis and St. Paul. Geographical consideration is given to the setting of each case for oral argument but the time factor on moving cases to submission and disposition is the overriding determinant as to where and when cases are scheduled for argument. Attorneys' requests for a setting in one of the two cities is usually honored if undue delay can be avoided. Criminal cases, however, are set on a priority basis and less consideration is given to geographical preference or convenience in setting criminal appeals. The Court usually sets 75 cases per month for argument – three divisions with each division hearing arguments in 25 cases during court week.

STAFF ATTORNEYS' OFFICE

The staff attorneys' office is located in St. Louis. The office is supervised by a senior staff attorney and a supervisory staff attorney, and includes seven other full-time attorneys, one half-time attorney, a special project attorney, and three secretaries. In addition, two judges each have one of their chambers clerks stationed in St. Louis. The chief judge appointed a law clerk committee this year consisting of Judge Myron H. Bright (chair), Judge Theodore McMillian and Judge George G. Fagg, and charged it with assisting in the administration of the Office of Staff Attorneys. Most of the staff attorneys are assigned to work on the screening panel (non-argument cases) and pro se cases of one or two individual judges.

When briefs are filed, all cases are sent to the senior staff attorney who screens the cases according to court guidelines. Cases screened for argument are returned to the clerk and calendared for oral argument. When a case is screened no-argument, a judge must concur in that screening. Then it is returned to the staff for preparation of a memorandum.

All pro se appeals are sent with the original district court record to the senior staff attorney. After preliminary review, some are designated appropriate for summary disposition and sent to a staff attorney for further analysis; a recommended disposition is then sent to a screening panel (three judges) for possible action. If the case is not appropriate for summary disposition, the record is held until the briefs are filed and then a staff attorney prepares a memorandum.

Although the staff is sometimes assigned administrative panel matters and argument cases, most of the case work done by the staff is on screening panel cases which are of four kinds: (1) cases screened no-argument, (2) pro se prisoner appeals, including both habeas corpus and civil rights cases, (3) other pro se appeals, and (4) jurisdictional motions which may be dispositive of the appeal. Memoranda and, when directed, draft per curiam opinions are prepared by the staff and circulated to a three judge panel for disposition.

The Court has undertaken a program to alleviate the backlog of social security cases that existed in the Circuit's district courts. A staff attorney has been hired to assist district court judges in handling backlogged cases. Other staff projects include rules committee work and education, as well as assignments related to the senior staff attorney's role as counsel to the Court. This year the office participated in the law school judicial clerkship programs conducted by both Washington University and St. Louis University. Three student interns worked in the office for about twenty hours a week for a semester.

Law clerk orientation for staff attorneys and all law clerks to judges has been held during the first court session in St. Louis each fall. This program has been under the stewardship of Judge Richard S. Arnold. During the orientation sessions, representatives of the clerk's office, circuit executive's office, library, staff attorneys' office, and the chief judge explained their functions. Also, substantive presentations were made on particular legal topics. Computer aided legal research training was provided during the week.

The Court of Appeals has experienced a significant increase in filings during the last seven years. In order to keep up with those increases the court has undertaken measures designed to increase dispositions. One such measure was an increase in case screening by the staff attorneys' office. Another was to increase the number of cases calendared each month. The court also scheduled additional hearing days. The workload of the staff attorneys' office has increased significantly as a result of these measures. Following is a table indicating the workload of the staff attorneys office from 1979 through 1984.

EIGHTH CIRCUIT LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Eighth Circuit Library System presently is comprised of six libraries. The Central Library for the Circuit is located in St. Louis. Staffed branch libraries are located in St. Paul, Little Rock, Omaha, Des Moines and Kansas City. The Library System provides information and research services to all the circuit judges, district judges, bankruptcy judges, magistrates, and their supporting personnel within the Eighth Circuit.

I. PERSONNEL

David K. Brennan, who had become Circuit Librarian on November 1, 1983, resigned effectively July 31, 1984. He was replaced December 19, 1984 by Ann T. Fessenden. She holds both a law degree and a library science degree, and has ten years of experience in academic law libraries. From August 1 through December 17, 1984, Mary Kay Jung, the Assistant Librarian for Technical Services, served as Acting Circuit Librarian.

Carol T. Johnson, Assistant Librarian for Reference and system supervisor for the NBI word processor, resigned July 31, 1984. Kurt D. Schultz, CALR Librarian, resigned November 16, 1984. Mary Fulghum, a member of the Missouri Bar and former instructor for WESTLAW, was hired July 24, 1984. She initially replaced Carol Johnson, but was transferred to the CALR position when Kurt Schultz left, because of her particular expertise in this area. The duties of system supervisor for the NBI word processor were transferred to the Circuit Court Clerk's Office, although Mary Fulghum functions as coordinator for the Circuit for all types of training, including NBI.

Elizabeth Gildea, half-time library technician, resigned as the close of 1983 and was replaced April 2, 1984 by Katherine D. Knocke, who had previously served as a deputy clerk in the Circuit Court Clerk's Office. Vicki Haylon, half-time library technician at the Little Rock library, resigned effective June 8, 1984. Her position was transferred to Kansas City, where it was filled by Deborah Ground from June 25, 1984 until December 23, 1984.

The two new satellite librarians hired in late 1983, Margaret Tranne Pearce (Kansas City) and Allison Pitcock (Little Rock) were both brought to St. Louis for weeklong training and orientation sessions. This experiment has proven to be very successful, as both librarians are performing particularly well in their positions.

Two new positions, one librarian and one technician, were authorized for fiscal 1985 but remained unfilled at the close of 1984. The assistant librarian position vacated by Carol Johnson also remained vacant.

II. SERVICES

In 1984 the Central Library began a limited program of typing purchase orders for books requested by judges for their chambers. This relieves the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts of this duty and results in faster receipt by the judges. It is hoped that this service can be expanded Circuit-wide in 1985.

Disposing of excess, obsolete, and surplus law books was a major activity in 1984. Library staff in both Central and Satellite libraries also assisted judges with transferring or disposing of unneeded books in chambers.

The Central Library continued to produce several regular publications, including the <u>Index of Slip Opinions</u>, <u>United States Court of Appeals</u>, <u>8th Circuit</u>. In 1984, the library began using the NBI word processor to produce the <u>Index</u>. This greatly reduced the staff time required to type the <u>Index</u> and produce quarterly cumulations. Cost prevented the previously planned production of continuous cumulations throughout the year, however.

Other publications are <u>U.S.C.A.</u> 8th Circuit Library News, which is primarily a listing of recent acquisitions; and <u>Content Pages of Selected Law Reviews</u>, a current awareness service. Court personnel may obtain copies of desired articles by contacting the Central Library or one of the branches. The library also provides a weekly news-clipping service to Circuit Judges and other Circuit Court officers, consisting of articles about the federal courts from major newspapers.

Use of on-line computer assisted legal research in the Eighth Circuit continued to grow in 1984. WESTLAW usage totaled 2,092 hours, an average of 174 hours per month. This was an increase of 17 per cent over the previous year. Usage was apportioned among the libraries as follows: St. Louis 31%, Kansas City 23%, Little Rock 17%, Omaha 15% and St. Paul 14%. Speed and efficiency were improved by training a library technician in St. Louis to perform routine searches such as Insta-cites, Autocites, and Shepardizing, thus freeing the CALR librarian for more complex searches.

The Central Library also acquired a LEXIS terminal in October, which is to be used as a back-up system to WESTLAW. Permissable usage of LEXIS is limited to 25 hours per month, and includes access to Nexis, a computerized data base of newspapers, wire services, trade publications, etc.

The Central Library provided mail or chambers delivery of articles, opinions, etc., to 11 Circuit Judges, 24 district judges, 5 bankruptcy judges, 5 magistrates, and 25 other court personnel. In addition, 77 requests were handled through the branch libraries. A

total of 362 reference requests were filled by mail. Several of the branches began in June, 1984, keeping track of the number of reference questions answered in the library. A total of 854 questions were answered by the three branches keeping this record, apportioned as follows: Kansas City 417 (49%); Little Rock 298 (35%); and St. Paul 139 (16%).

III. COLLECTION

The Central Library collection grew in 1984 by 1,573 volumes and 21,604 microforms. A major program of acquiring infrequently used materials in micoformat was begun in an effort to conserve space. New microform reader/printers were acquired for the Little Rock and Kansas City branches. Four of the branches also began keeping track of materials received in 1984. For the period June - December, 1984, the branches added the following: Des Moines 322 volumes; Little Rock 632 volumes; St. Paul 583 volumes. Kansas City kept records for the entire year and received 750 volumes.

IV. RENOVATIONS

Renovation, reorganization and moving were major activities in 1984. A major renovation of chambers in Omaha was completed in mid-1984 and resulted in needed expansion space for the library there. The Des Moines library was completely renovated, with expanded space. The Des Moines library was forced to move to a temporary location while renovations were taking place, and the move back was scheduled for early 1985.

The Central Library was moved in November, 1984, to a temporary space while the previous site is renovated and expanded, but about two-thirds of the collection had to be stored. Construction on this project was to begin in early 1985 with completion expected in the summer.

In St. Paul, plans were made to consolidate an existing Internal Revenue Service library with the U. S. Courts Library. Planning continued for construction of a new facility in Kansas City.

Reports From Clerks of District Courts

Seven districts in the circuit joined in a program to install a microcomputer system in their courts. The program initiated by the circuit executive's office, provides the courts with a District Court Management Information System. Following the purchase of compatible hardware (computer, printer, etc.) and specified software (programs for doing word processing, data base management and communications) the circuit executive's office installed the system in each district. The system provides the district courts with capabilities to do electronic docketing, personnel, furniture inventory and to utilize spreadsheet programs for statistical applications.

Even though microcomputer technology is new to most of the districts, several districts have already implemented an automated case docketing system and are producing statistics and case status reports.

The Western District of Arkansas expanded its use of automation by computerizing its master jury wheel for the first time. The district made plans to utilize its microcomputer to automate its inventory and pending case lists. A major building renovation project, begun in 1984, will be completed in early 1985 and will provide new courtroom facilities and chambers for an additional district judge.

In order to make the process of selecting employees in the clerk's office more rational and orderly, the District of Minnesota has developed a testing program which goes beyond the usual skills test for determining typing speed.

With the assistance of the Hennepin County (Minneapolis) Personnel Department, the clerk has developed tests that measure proficiency in spelling, punctuation, grammar and filing. The battery of tests also includes one section which measures visual acuity in comparing lists of names and numbers. Testing is conducted and scored in the clerk's office and the results determined immediately. To measure typing speed and accuracy, the clerk has negotiated with the State Employment Service for applicants to be tested at a convenient local office and the results mailed to the clerk.

Due to the limitation of file space, a cost-effective seven tier open shelf filing system with hanging unit boxes was installed in the clerk's office in Cedar Rapids in the Northern District of Iowa. As the cases are filed and separated according to division, each division is assigned a color and colored file folders are used to aid in file location. To insure immediate identification of cases in which consents to proceed before the Magistrate have been filed, a red folder is used.

The Southern District of Iowa began appointing attorneys who are active in litigating cases in the district to represent indigent civil litigants and criminal case defendants. Attorneys had always been appointed to represent indigent criminal case defendants under the Criminal Justice Act, but the list of attorneys had to be expanded to provide representation to indigent civil litigants. There were over forty-five attorneys appointed to represent civil litigants.

Following attendance at a Case Management Training Seminar in Cincinnati, Ohio, and after discussion with the Judges and the clerk's office in the District of North Dakota, implemented a case management program. The program was designed to be compatible, yet flexible enough to accommodate differing needs of divisional offices.

The district implemented a new local rule on civil case management in October, 1984. The local rule addresses the subject of Rule 16 pretrial conferences and categories of actions exempted from Rule 16(b) scheduling conferences. The local rule also streamlined the process of dealing with the filing of discovery material, noting that discovery material shall not be filed unless the material is necessary for the Court's disposition of a pending motion. In lieu of the filing of discovery materials, an affidavit of service must be filed on all notices of depositions, interrogatories, requests for admissions and responses thereto. The clerk's office developed a sample affidavit form to assist attorneys in complying with the local rule.

The Jury Plan for the District of North Dakota was modified to assist the clerk's office in filling the Master Jury Wheel. County auditors are provided with a starting number and quotient. The auditors submit a typed list of selected names and addresses to the clerk in lieu of mailing their poll books. They receive renumeration at the rate of \$.25 per name for this service.

Plans were made for an in-court training seminar on the Comprehensive Crime Control Act of 1984 to be held in Bismarck, North Dakota on January 29, 1985. The seminar was organized through the efforts of William D. Broome, Chief Probation Officer and Clerk of Court, Edward J. Klecker. Invited to attend were: the district judges, their law clerks, U. S. Magistrates, Clerk's Office staff, Probation Office staff, U. S. Marshall and staff and personnel from the U. S. Attorney's Office. A video program from the Federal Judicial Center will be viewed. The Federal Judicial Center will fund the seminar.

The clerk's office completed a refiling and records disposition project. The Fargo divisional office replaced its old five drawer files with more efficient lateral files for its court records. The Bismarck's clerk's office, fighting a space problem, replaced its five drawer administrative files with more space efficient rotating mechanical files. The five drawer files holding court records were replaced with an open space filing system. Court records were placed into sturdy color-coded file jackets. The move precipitated the culling of old files resulting in the packing of 151 boxes of case files and court reporter notes for Record Center disposition. The file project has resulted in opening up office space and allows for expected expansion of new case filings.

A three month magnetic calendar board was installed in the clerk's office as a centralized source of information on scheduled hearings, conferences and trials. The installation eliminated the need for deputy clerks to maintain duplicate desk calendars.

At the request of the clerk, a Federal Judicial Center representative visited divisional clerk's offices to evaluate staff training needs.

Construction for two additional courtrooms was commenced in the District of South Dakota, a new courtroom in Pierre, which will be used by visiting judges, magistrates and bankruptcy judges and a senior judge's courtroom and quarters in Rapid City.

In Sioux Falls, the restoration project on the courtroom was in progress and will be finished in May of 1985.

The Aberdeen courtroom will be remodeled to provide a separate jury room.

A revised jury plan was approved by the Judicial Council of the Eighth Circuit. The plan provides for division grand juries, assistance in selecting qualified or potential jurors for the master wheel by the help of county auditors, a streamlining of the procedure in calculating the number of jurors that may be needed in the separate divisions and implementation of data processing for summoning jurors.

Rule changes became effective and revisions were mailed to the members of the State Bar. The rule changes include a method of applying for admission to U. S. District Court requiring approval of two judges; revision in the manner in which hearings will be set for motions and a 10-day settlement rule for civil cases to conserve juror expenses.

III JUDICIAL WORKLOAD

STATEMENT ON STATISTICS USED


This report uses calendar year statistical data prepared by the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts. The purpose for selecting the data compiled by the calendar year rather than the federal court's statistical year (July 1 - June 30) is two-fold: 1) 28 U.S.C. \$332 (e) (10) suggests that circuit executives prepare annual reports on a calendar year basis; and 2) using calendar year data allows this report to be more timely and relevant.

Because all data in the calendar year reports is not published on a regular basis, the Administrative Office generously has provided unpublished or specially prepared data to fill in the gaps whenever this data was available.

In the Annual Reports for the Eighth Circuit for the years 1980 - 1982, statistics for the bankruptcy courts covered the court's statistical year. However, commencing with the 1983 Annual Report all bankruptcy court data is for the calendar year.

Finally, this report presents numerous graphs for the court of appeals, district courts and bankruptcy courts. This was made possible through the acquisition of a microcomputer in the circuit executive's office which can utilize sophisticated software to produce graphs.



Summary of Statistics For the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals

In 1984, total filings increased for the sixth consecutive year, rising from 1,769 in 1983 to 1959 in 1984 or 10.7 percent. Total filings in 1984 were 21.9 percent above 1982 filings, 29.7 percent above 1981 filings, 58.2 percent above 1980 filings, 76.3 percent above 1979 filings and 93.2 percent above 1978 filings.

In 1984, civil filings (including prisoner petitions) were 135.6 percent above 1977 followed by criminal and administrative case filings which rose 14.8 percent, and 2.8 percent respectively, during the same period.

The Eighth Circuit continued to record an increase in pending cases which began in 1979. The total pending caseload at the end of 1984 stood at 1120, the highest ever recorded in the circuit. That figure represented a 5.4 percent increase over 1983, a 25.0 percent increase over 1982, and a 82.7 percent increase over 1977.

The court increased terminations in 1984 by 18.7 percent, the largest increase since 1981. Furthermore, the court decreased the median time from filing to disposition from 6.7 months in 1983 to 5.7 months in 1984. Only one other circuit court disposed of its cases faster.

Table B in the appendix provides comparative data for cases commenced, terminated, and pending for the United States Courts of Appeals for the calendar years 1983 and 1984.

The charts below depict the courts total projected workload and the per panel workload through 1988.

If the projections hold true, in 1985 the court would have 765 case filings per panel compared to 590 for 1983 and 653 for 1984. In 1984 congress authorized a tenth judgeship for the Eighth Circuit. If promptly filled, the projected per panel figure for 1985 would be slightly more than 681.

Workload Projections




TABLE 11 Panel Workload Projections



The table above indicates the source of appeals for the calendar years 1980 through 1984 for the Eighth Circuit and for all the circuits in the nation. In 1984, the district courts were the source of 87.60 percent of the appeals in the Eighth Circuit, slightly higher than the national figure of 84.59 percent for the year.

The Administrative agency appeals in the Eighth Circuit increased slightly from 5.43 percent in 1983 to 5.67 percent in 1984, and nationwide from 9.68 percent in 1983 to 9.94 percent in 1984.

Provided in the table above are the number of civil and criminal appeals emanating from the district courts in the Eighth Circuit and from all the district courts in the nation during calendar years 1983 and 1984.

In 1984, criminal appeals constituted 18.1 percent of the total appeals from all district courts in the nation and 15.9 percent from the district courts in the Eighth Circuit, a decrease from the previous year's rates of 18.6 percent and 18.5 percent, respectively. In both years the largest number of civil case appeals were filed from the Eastern District of Missouri. Civil appeals increased by almost 12 percent in 1984 with the greatest increase occurring in the District of North Dakota.

Table C in the appendix contains detailed data on the nature of suit or offense from the district courts for the calendar year 1984.

The number of cases in the Eighth Circuit which were disposed of after oral hearing or submission on briefs increased by 31 percent from 754 in 1983 to 985 in 1984. Of the 1,902 cases terminated in 1984, 52 percent had a hearing or were submitted on briefs while 49 percent were terminated in that manner nationally. The rate of terminations in this manner in the Eighth Circuit has remained below the 1977 high of 63.2 percent. From 1977 to 1984, the rates were: 63.2 percent, 53 percent, 60.2 percent, 55.2 percent, 56.5 percent, 50.2 percent, 47 percent and 52 percent.

Table D in the appendix contains more detailed data on the disposition of cases in this manner for the calendar years 1983 and 1984.

Median time intervals for cases terminated after hearing or submission are shown on Table E in the appendix.

The chart below shows the changes in the rates of terminations by consolidation, and with and without a hearing or submission for the years 1979 through 1984. Dispositions after a hearing declined in four of the six years covered in the chart.



As indicated in the above table, the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals still remains below the national averages for total cases under submission more than three months. It recorded the largest number of such matters in 1984, and for the first time since 1977 recorded two matters under submission over twelve months.

The above table provides a profile of the work of the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals for the years 1983 and 1984. This table is specially prepared by the Administrative Office for this report. Sections in the table provide data on workload per panel. This figure is arrived at by dividing the number of authorized judgeships by three (the number of judges normally sitting on cases on appeal) which provides the figure for number of panels which becomes the denominator for the various actions computed in the table. Although the action per panel information serves as a rough method of comparing workload among the courts of appeals in the nation, it is not a totally accurate measurement of actual workload. In any particular court of appeals in the nation the actual workload may be higher or lower depending upon whether the court utilizes senior judges or visiting judges in which case the actual per panel workload figures would be lower and depending upon the number and length of time of judicial vacancies in which case the actual workload figures would be higher. Nevertheless, the present computations do provide a rough method of comparing workload among the courts of appeals.

The charts below, which cover the years 1978 through 1984, depict the per panel filings by case category, the percent change in those filings, and the percent change in total filings, terminations, and pending cases.

Eighth Circuit Panel Caseload





TABLE 19 Filing Changes By Category



THE DISTRICT COURTS: AN OVERVIEW

THE DISTRICT COURTS OF THE EIGHTH CIRCUIT SUMMARY OF STATISTICS FOR ALL DISTRICT COURTS

This overview of the work of the district courts in the circuit is followed by a district by district analysis.

The chart below contains the composite figures for the district courts' criminal dockets from 1978 to 1984. These figures include all criminal matters and transfers. The trend upward of criminal case filings which commenced in 1979 did not continue in 1983 or in 1984. In both years, filings and terminations decreased by 6.8 percent and 4 percent, respectively in 1983 and by 5.7 percent and 8.2 percent respectively in 1984. Although pending cases decreased slightly in 1983, they increased by 12.2 percent in 1984.


Table F in the appendix contains more detailed information on the criminal dockets of the district courts in the Eighth Circuit along with national composite data. Those figures do not include transfers.

As indicated therein, in 1984, nationwide criminal filings, terminations and pending caseloads rose by 4.8 percent, 9.7 percent, and 6.3 percent, respectively. However, in the Eighth Circuit district courts, decreases were recorded in criminal filings and terminations of 5.7 percent and 8.2 percent respectively. The increase in pending cases was almost double the national rate - 12.2 percent compared to 6.3 percent.

The chart above summarizes the civil case workload of all the district courts in the Eighth Circuit during a seven-year period commencing in 1978.

Additional data concerning civil cases commenced, terminated and pending during that period is contained in Table G in the appendix. Civil case filings more than doubled between 1978 and 1984 increasing by 120.1 percent compared to a 80.2 percent increase nationwide during the same period. The more pronounced increase between 1983 and 1984 occurred in the District of North Dakota (29.6 percent). The Sourthern District of Iowa, and the District of Minnesota recorded increases of over 18 percent. Civil filings declined in the Northern District of Iowa (-9.6 percent), Western District of Missouri (-3.8 percent), and in the Western District of Arkansas (-3.1 percent).

Civil case terminations in the district courts in the Eighth Circuit rose by almost 16 percent in 1984, and pending civil cases decreased by less than 3 percent. Pending cases decreased in every district in the Eighth Circuit except in the Southern District of Iowa and the Eastern District of Missouri which recorded an increase of 10.3 percent and 13.1 percent respectively.

Table H in the appendix contains information on the method of termination of civil actions in the district courts in the Eighth Circuit along with national composite data for 1984. As indicated therein, the district courts in the Eighth Circuit (as they have done for the last seven years) again exceeded the national average for cases reaching trial. During 1984, the national trial rate was 4.7 percent while the rate in the Eighth Circuit was 5.9 percent. In 1984, the Western District of Arkansas reported the highest trial rate in the circuit of 9.4 percent. Five districts in the Eighth Circuit reported trial rates in excess of above 6 percent during 1984 and three districts were below the national trial rate. The District of Minnesota reported the lowest trial rate in circuit of 1.9 percent.

The total workload of all the district courts in the Eighth Circuit is shown in the chart below followed by a chart of the "Backlog" in those district courts. Backlog was arrived at by determining the monthly termination rate and dividing that rate into the number of pending cases at the end of the year. As indicated in the chart, the district courts in the circuit have steadily improved their civil case backlog conditions.




The above table summarizes the workload in the district courts of the Eighth Circuit in calendar year 1984. The table provides data on workload per judgeship and serves to provide a method of comparing workload among the districts in the Eighth Circuit. Concededly, this method is not totally accurate because it utilizes authorized judgeships as a denominator rather than the actual number of judicial officers involved in case processing. In any particular district the actual workload per judge may be higher or lower depending upon whether senior judges are carrying partial or full dockets in which case the per judge workload figures would be less and depending upon the number and length of time of judicial vacancies in which case the actual per judge workload figures would be higher. Nonetheless, the current method does provide the only method at present for making workload comparison among the districts in the circuit and in the nation. Appearing below are the districts arranged according to their respective per judge workloads.




Table I in the appendix contains information on the age of pending civil cases for the year 1984 for the district courts in the Eighth Circuit along with national composite data. The table reflects the fact that every district court in the Eighth Circuit remained below the national average for pending three-year-old cases. Nationally, the percent of pending civil cases which were three years old or over was 7.0 percent while the range in the district courts in the Eighth Circuit was from 1.9 percent to 4.2 percent. The average figure for the Circuit of 3.1 percent is the same as last year's rate.

The civil cases discussed above do not include Land Condemnation cases. These are presented in Table J in the appendix.

The following charts contain comparison data for each of the district courts in the circuit for the year ending December 31, 1984. The charts depict the district court's total workload, per judge total workload, the total filings per judge and by court, actual and average per judge case production, total pending cases, and backlog.




TABLE 28 Filings Per Judge and By Court




Number of Case (Thousands)

Although civil filings increased almost 12 percent from 1983 to 1984, civil terminations during the same period increased by 29% percent, resulting in a 16 percent decrease in pending cases - the first such decrease since 1979. The district is number one in the circuit for terminations per judgeship, and fifteenth in the nation. Civil filings per judgeship stood at 632 in 1984, giving this district the second heaviest workload in the circuit and making it twenty-first in the nation. In 1984 this district (and the Northern District of Iowa) were first in the circuit, disposing of their criminal dockets in less than three months. Only 4 other districts of the 95 districts in the nation recorded a speedier disposition of criminal cases. Despite its heavy workload the district disposed of its criminal filings in less than three months and its civil filings within seven months. Civil cases were brought to trial within 14 months compared to 15 months in 1983. Although total trials decreased from 266 in 1983 to 230 in 1984, the district remained second in the circuit in that regard. Since 1981, the district has reduced civil cases pending over 3 years by 59 percent, down from 102 to 42. Only 7 matters were under advisement over 60 days and no matters were under advisement over one year in 1983.

The Circuit Council has continued to urge that an additional judgeship be created to assist the district in processing its increasing workload.






TABLE 34 **Criminal Cases**







SUMMARY OF STATISTICS FOR THE DISTRICT OF MINNESOTA

The district's total filings increased in 1984 by almost 20 percent. However, terminations increased by almost 29 percent resulting in a slight decline in pending cases. The district conducted twice as many extended trials than any other district in the circuit. Although three year old cases decreased by 18 percent, the district remained the highest in the circuit. Civil case filings increased this year by almost 30 percent, termination increased by almost 46 percent resulting in a slight decline in pending cases. Only two districts in the circuit had more felony case filings per judgeship than this district.



Civil Cases District of North Dakota Years Ending December 31st. FILINGS **Terminations** Pending



SUMMARY OF STATISTICS FOR THE DISTRICT OF SOUTH DAKOTA

Civil case filings increased by almost 9 percent in 1984, while terminations increased 25 percent resulting in a 13 percent decrease in pending civil cases. The district continues to have the lowest rate of civil cases pending per judgeship in the circuit and only 2 other districts in the nation have fewer such pending cases.

The district had the second largest number of felony case filings per judgeship in the circuit.

The district bettered the Circuit Council guidelines for trial disposition time by 2 months. The district had 13 cases which have been pending over three years in 1983, but cut that figure in half in 1984. Only two matters were held under advisement over sixty days and no matters were held under advisement over one year.







TABLE 71 Total Cases


At the direction of the Committee on the Administration of the Bankruptcy System of the Judicial Conference, the Statistical Division of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts began publishing only bankruptcy petition data starting in 1984. The Committee directed that the terms cases and estates no longer be used because they believed that they were misleading and too complicated. (A bankruptcy case, for example, implies an action comparable to a civil case in district court. The comparable bankruptcy action to a civil case, however, is an adversary proceeding. Statistics on estates were calculated by factoring in joint petitions.)

In conformity with this new policy, only data on petitions and adversary proceedings are presented in this report.

The charts below depict the total petitions commenced, terminated and pending in each of the districts for the years 1982 through 1984. There was an increase in filings in 1984 over 1983 in all the districts in the Eighth Circuit. The District of Minnesota recorded the largest number of petition filings in all three years.





TABLE 74 Petitions Pending



The following charts depict the adversary proceedings and workload per judge for the calendar year 1984. Three districts recorded over 2000 petitions filed per judge. The District of Nebraska and the Eastern District of Arkansas recorded over 2500 filings per judge with both districts in Iowa recording over 1800 such filings. Five districts reported over 200 adversary filings per judge with Northern Iowa and Eastern Arkansas reporting filings in excess of 300 and 400 respectively.

The Judicial Council has recommended additional bankruptcy judgeships for each of the above mentioned districts and for the Western District of Missouri and the District of Minnesota.


TABLE 76 Adversary Proceedings Per Judge

Tables K through N in the appendix contain more detailed information on the dockets of the circuit's bankruptcy courts for the years 1981 through 1984. Table O contains 1984 data concerning adversary proceedings. Those tables indicate the "backlog" for each of the bankruptcy courts petition and adversary proceeding filings. Backlog is determined by dividing the dispositions by 12 to arrive at the monthly disposition rate. That figure is then divided into the pending case load to reflect the number of months it will take to dispose of the pending cases.

The charts below depicts the petition backlog figures for 1982 through 1984 and adversary proceedings backlog for 1984. Backlog figures have increased in 1984 over 1983 in each district in the Eighth Circuit except the District of Minnesota.

At the end of 1984 petition backlog stood at 59 months in the Eastern District of Arkansas, over 40 months in the Western District of Arkansas, and over 30 months in the Northern District of Iowa and the District of South Dakota.

The District of North Dakota registered the highest backlog of adversary proceedings (25 months) followed by the Northern District of Iowa, Eastern District of Missouri and the District of Nebraska, each with over 15 months backlog.





Percent of Business Filings





TABLE 81
