

Crime Rate Versus Incarceration Rate

How does the incarceration rate compare to the crime rate in Pennsylvania? It is interesting to note that while the civilian population in Pennsylvania shows only a slight increase since 1970, the incarceration rate has more than doubled. However, since 1980, while the incarceration rate increased from 69.5 in 1980 to 128.1 in 1986, the crime rate decreased from 3,745.7 to 3,097.0 during the same period. We also note that during the early 1970's, while the crime rate nearly doubled, the incarceration rate declined. We believe there appears to be very little cause and effect between the crime rate and incarceration rate.



Civilian Versus Inmate Populations

While the civilian population in Pennsylvania was stationary during the 1980's, the inmate population in the Department of Corrections has nearly doubled. The rate per 100,000 civilian population increased from 69.5 in 1980 to 128.1 in 1986.

Excluding 7th and 8th class counties, the largest contributing counties in 1986 were Philadelphia (349.0), Dauphin (240.0), Erie (198.7), and Allegheny (162.0).

NMATES PER 100,000 COMPARED TO CIVILIAN POPUL




Inmate Population Versus Capacity

Beginning in mid 1981, the Department of Corrections has been housing more inmates than its facilities were designed to house based upon a one-person, one-cell concept. Since 1980, the percent of inmate population to capacity has increased from 91.9% in 1980 to 137.8% in 1986, increasing at a higher rate each year. On December 31, 1986, five facilities exceeded 140% of capacity.

There is some relief in sight because the Department of Corrections is planning to open at least three new facilities in 1987 located at Cresson, Frackville and Retreat. However, since the designed capacity of these three facilities is only 1,631, the Department of Corrections will still be crowded when they are fully operational.

On December 31st, inmate populations in the Department of Corrections increased 84.7% from 8,243 in 1980 to 15,227 in 1986. The State Regional Correctional Facilities at Greensburg and Mercer experienced the largest increases of 203.1% and 332.5% respectively since December 31, 1980. Since January 31, 1980, populations increased nearly 88 inmates per month.

INMATE POPULATION VERSUS CAPACITY ON



Admissions and Discharges

Admissions to the Department of Corrections (DOC) generally are commitments from county quarter sessions courts and parole violations returned by state and county paroling authorities. From January 1, 1980 to December 31, 1986, 27,540 court commitments and 9,467 parole violators were received in the DOC. During this same period, court commitments and parole violators represented 73.9% and 25.4% respectively of total admissions.

Since 1980, court commitments increase by 1,062 or 34.4% from 3,083 in 1980 to 4,145 in 1986. During 1985 and 1986, the number of court commitments decreased in each of these years. These decreases may be the result of corresponding decreases in Pennsylvania crime rate and the reclassification of the Greensburg Correctional Facility from a regional facility to a state institution. The result is fewer commitments with short-term county sentences under two years maximum.

The recent decline in court commitments is overshadowed by the influx of parole violators returned to the Department of Corrections since 1980. Since 1980, the number of parole violators returned increased (123.8% or 998) from 806 in 1980, to 1,804 in 1986. The percentage of returned parole violators to total admissions increased from 20.3% in 1980 to 30.2% in 1986. In addition, paroling actions by the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole (PBPP) show that the percentage of paroles granted for those who reach those minimum sentences declined from 80.8% in 1980 to 64.3% in 1986. These data suggests that inmates are not routinely paroled by the PBPP at the expiration of their minimum sentence.

As expected with a growing inmate population, the number of inmates discharged from the Department of Corrections from 1980 to 1986 was 29,858 or 80.1% of 37,279 total admissions. During this period, 25,584 inmates or 85.6% were paroled and reparoled under supervision of state and county paroling authorities and only 3,090 inmates or 10.4% were discharged under no supervision.



Profile of Court Commitments

Since 1980, court commitments to the Department of Corrections have been getting older. The median age increased from 25.8 in 1980 to 28.0 in 1986. During the same period, the percentage of white commitments decreased from 56.3% in 1980 to 51.6% in 1986. Female commitments nearly doubled from 163 in 1980 to 312 in 1986, an increase of 91.4%.

During the past seven years, 16.5 percent of all defendants sentenced by local courts to state corrections facilities were under twenty-one years of age at the time of reception. Approximately one-fourth were in the 21 to 24 age group. Table 14 demonstrates that inmates received by the Department of Corrections in 1986 are older than inmates received in 1980.

Characteristics of Inmate Population

In comparing inmate populations in the Department of Corrections on December 31, 1980 and 1986 by race, sex and age the following changes are noted: the percentage of white inmates decreased from 45.5% to 43.4%, females increased from 3.4% to 3.9%, inmates under 25 years of age decreased from 30.2% to 20.4%, and inmates 40 years old and over increased from 13.4% to 16.9% respectively. The percentage of parole violators to total inmate population increased from 12.7% on December 31, 1980 to 16.6% on December 31, 1986. Inmate populations by race, sex and age are also presented by facility from those who wish to compare these characteristics for their facility on December 31, 1980 and 1986. Inmate populations by marital status, birthplace, religion and offense are also presented but will not be further discussed in parrative form.





Court Commitments by Offense

As defined by the Federal Uniform Crime Reports. Over 70% of all court commitments to the Department of Corrections from 1980 to 1986 were convicted and sentenced for crime index offenses, commonly referred to as Part I Offenses. This group of offenses is used to measure the amount of crime and to calculate crime rates throughout the Nation. During the past seven years, 39.9% of all inmates received by the Department were committed for violent crimes (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault), and 30.6% were committed for property crimes (burglary, larcency-theft and arson). Approximately 30% were committed to serve sentences for Part II offenses.

Based on reported major offenses, the leading offenses of court commitments during 1980 to 1986 were: burglary (19.9%), robbery (19.1%), larcency-theft (9.3%), narcotic drug abuse (7.5%), murder-all types (7.2%), and aggravated assault (6.7%). Forcible rape accounted for 4.6% of all commitments during the period.

COMMITTMENTS RECEIVED BY OFFENSE 1986



Court Commitments by Minimum Sentence

Since most inmates are paroled on or shortly after their minimum sentence date, the average minimum sentence is a good indicator how long inmates are expected to be incarcerated in Pennsylvania.

During 1986, court commitments to the Department received an average minimum sentence of 3 years (3.1 males and 2.2 females). We anticipate that these inmates will serve a minimum of 3 years. 31.8% received minimum sentences of one year and under and another 23.1% received minimum sentences over one year to two years.



Court Commitments by Maximum Sentence

Since most inmates are paroled before their maximum sentence, the maximum sentence is not a good indicator how long an inmate will be incarcerated. By law, the minimum sentence can be no more than one-half the maximum sentence although it can be less. Excluding lifers, court commitments received in the Department of Corrections during 1986 had an average maximum sentence of 7.5 years (7.7 for males and 5.6 for females). At most, these inmates would serve only 3.75 years if they are paroled on their minimum sentence date, 59.5% were sentenced to serve maximum sentences between 2 and 10 years.



Time Served

Based on effective date of sentence, time served is presented for two major groups of inmates, those paroled from serving maximum sentences under two years (commonly referred to as county sentences), and those paroled from maximum sentences of two years and over (commonly referred to as State sentences).

Since 1980, inmates paroled from county sentences served an average of 8.6 months and, those paroled from state sentences served an average of 33.6 months. Collectively, all inmates released since 1980 served an average of 26.9 months. Time served for both groups was constant over the past seven years.

Commitments by Jurisdiction

Defendants are sentenced to the Department of Corrections by common pleas courts in each of the 60 Judicial Districts within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. These districts generally coincide geographically with the counties, although seven of the districts are comprised of two counties.

Since 1980, 27,540 defendants were sentenced to state correctional facilities (21,070 to state correctional institutions and 6,470 to state regional correctional facilities) in the Department of Corrections. As expected, nearly one-half of them were committed by Philadelphia and Allegheny Counties combined. Excluding state regional correctional facilities, over 70% of the inmates were committed by ten counties.

Including court commitments, parole violators, and county prison transfers, an examination of 1986 admissions reveals that 72.6% were received from the following ten judicial districts or local common pleas courts: Philadelphia (31.1%), Allegheny (18.1%), Erie (6.2%), Montgomery (3.8%), Mercer (2.1%), Bucks (2.0%), Berks (2.0%), and York (1.8%).



COMMITMENTS RECEIVED BY COUNTY FROM 1980 TO 1986



Long-Term Inmates

The increasing number of long-term inmates is a major concern to administrators in the Department of Corrections. For this report, long-term inmates include all inmates serving a minimum sentence exceeding ten years, serving a life sentence, and capital cases (under sentence of death). Using this definition, long-term inmates increased by 1,321 or 104.6% from 1,263 on December 31, 1980 to 2,584 on December 31, 1986. On December 31, 1986 long-term inmates represented 17.0% of the total inmate population. Unless sentencing practices change in Pennsylvania, we anticipate that the percentage of long-term inmates in the Department of Corrections will continue to rise and could reach 20% of the total inmate population in the next five years.



Analysis of Lifer Population

The largest number of long-term inmates in the Department of Corrections are those serving a life sentence primarily for first and second degree murder. In Pennsylvania, there is no life sentence with parole; however, the Governor can commute a lifer's sentence. This group of inmates has increased by 696 or 82.1% from 848 on December 31, 1980 to 1,544 on December 31, 1986. Generally, the lifer population represents approximately 10% of the total inmate population. Since 1980, the number of inmates serving a life sentence on December 31 increased by an average of 99 lifers annually.

During the past seven years, an average of 115.6 lifers were received annually; 52.2% were from Philadelphia County and 10.6% were from Allegheny County. Their average age when received was 29.2, 60.6% were non-white, and 95.2% were males.

From 1980 to 1986, only 32 (only 16 from 1981 to 1982) commuted lifers were released and during the same period 45 lifers were deceased. Lifers commuted by the Governor of Pennsylvania served an average of 19.1 years. Lifers who died served an average of 10.4 years.

On December 31, 1986, 1,544 inmates were serving a life sentence in the Department of Corrections, 53.5% were from Philadelphia County. These lifers already served an average of 8.9 years. The median years served increased from 6.6 on December 31, 1980 to 8.0 on December 31, 1986. The median age of lifers on December 31 increased from 31.5 years in 1980 to 34.5 years in 1986.

On December 31, 1986, 74 inmates in the Department of Corrections were sentenced to death, 45% were from Philadelphia County, all were males, 58.1% were non-white, and their average age was 32.2.

LIFERS RECEIVED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS BY COUNTY 1980 TO 1986


