Dear Mr. Carrasco:

The number of Index Crimes reported to the Austin Police Department in 1984 totaled 31,821. This number represents an increase of 7% when compared to the 29,812 Index Crimes reported in 1983. A more detailed breakdown of these statistics can be found within the first section of this report.

The Case Clearance Rate in 1984 for Index Crimes reported to the Department was 35%, representing a drop from last year's record breaking 38%. The per capita crime increased only minimally, from 79.4 in 1983 to 79.8 crimes per 1,000 in 1984. Texas cities with populations over 250,000 showed a 21% clearance rate and a 90.6 per capita crime rate.

Traffic safety continued to be one of the department's major concerns in 1984. The State funded DWI Program (STEP) is actively progressing. Officers working at strategic locations and times have again maintained DWI arrests at the same high level when compared to 1983. Additional grant funds are currently being sought for enforcement of the National Maximum Speed Limit and Hazardous Moving Violations.

To further enhance crime prevention activities in the City, the Department's Victim Services Program received State funding for a Juvenile Delinquency Prevention Program. This program targets all physically or sexually abused victims or offenders that enter the Juvenile Criminal Justice System.

The Wellness Program has experienced tremendous success since its implementation in 1983. A medical doctor oversees the program, which not only offers medical services, but also preventative seminars and activities to promote a more physically and mentally healthy employee.

I will be looking forward to working with the Austin Police Department and the City Administration in a collective effort to improve police service in the City of Austin.

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UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

INTRODUCTION

Uniform Crime Report (UCR) is a law enforcement program providing a nationwide view of crime based on the submission of statistics by city, county and state law enforcement agencies throughout the country. The crime data is submitted either to a state Uniform Crime Reporting Program or directly to the national UCR Program which is administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The success of UCR is a testimony to the dedication and cooperative attitude of peace officers in the United States.

HISTORY OF UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

In the 1920's the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) envisioned the need for statistics on crime in our nation. The committee on Uniform Crime Records of the IACP developed and initiated this voluntary national data collection effort in 1930. During that same year, Congress authorized the FBI to serve as the national clearinghouse for statistical information on crime. Since that time, the FBI, through the UCR Program, has collected and compiled data for use in law enforcement administration, operation and management, as well as to indicate the fluctuations in the level of crime in the United States. Austin has used the UCR system of reporting offenses and arrests to the FBI on a monthly and annual basis since 1935.

OFFENSES IN UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING


Offenses in Uniform Crime Reporting are divided into two groupings designated Part I and Part II. Crime Index offenses, or Index Crimes, are Part I offenses, excluding simple assaults. Index Crimes are comprised of eight offenses chosen because of their seriousness and frequency of occurrence. Information on the number of offenses, clearances and arrests are collected for Index Crimes. Part II crimes are those not in the Index Crime category. Only arrest information is reported for Part II offenses.

Part I offenses are as follows:

- 1. Criminal Homicide**—(a) Murder and non-negligent manslaughter. All willful felonious homicides as distinguished from deaths caused by negligence. Excludes attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, or justifiable homicides. Justifiable homicides are limited to (1) the killing of a person by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and (2) the killing of a person in the act of committing a felony by a private citizen. (b) Manslaughter by negligence: Any death which the police investigation established was primarily attributable to gross negligence of some individual other than the victim.
- 2. Forcible Rape**—The carnal knowledge of a female, forcibly and against her will. The categories include: rape by force, assault to rape, and attempted rape. Excludes statutory offenses (no force used—victim under age of consent).
- 3. Robbery**—Stealing or taking anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person by force or by violence or by putting in fear, such as strong-arm robbery, stickups, armed robbery assaults to rob, and attempts to rob.
- 4. Aggravated Assault**—Assault with intent to kill or for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury by shooting, cutting, stabbing, maiming, poisoning, scalding, or by the use of acids, explosives or other means. Excludes simple assaults.
- 5. Burglary**—Breaking or entering—Burglary, house-breaking, safecracking, or any breaking or unlawful entry of a structure with the intent to commit a felony or a theft. Includes attempted forcible entry.
- 6. Larceny**—Theft (except motor vehicle theft)—The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Thefts of bicycles, automobile accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or any stealing of property or article which is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Excludes embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, worthless checks, etc.
- 7. Motor Vehicle Theft**—Unlawful taking or stealing or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is a self-propelled vehicle that travels on the surface but not on rails. Specifically excluded from this category are motor boats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.
- 8. Arson**—Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Time Clock for Index Crime 1984







AVERAGE INDEX CRIMES PER MONTH




INDEX CRIME RATE PER 1,000 POPULATION



AUSTIN POLICE DEPARTMENT

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

CHIEF'S OFFICE

The Chief of Police, Assistant Chiefs, Bureau Commanders, Lieutenant in charge of Internal Affairs, Legal Advisor, Data Processing, Research and Planning and the Emergency Operations Center, with their respective personnel, comprise the Chief's Office within the Austin Police Department. This area is responsible for establishing departmental policy, directing law enforcement activities, enforcing State and Federal laws as well as ordinances of the City of Austin. The Internal Affairs Division investigates all citizen complaints against police personnel. The Legal Advisor and the Research and Planning personnel provide staff support for the Chief's office. Data Processing is responsible for maintaining and developing computer technology for police use. The Emergency Operations Center functions as the coordinating base for all emergencies within the city and surrounding areas.

FIELD OPERATIONS

An Assistant Chief of Police is directly responsible for the Field Operations. Under Field Operations are two of the major bureaus: the Patrol Bureau, and the Criminal Investigations Bureau (CIB) commanded by Majors. The Patrol Bureau is responsible for around the clock patrol functions throughout the city. Specialized divisions are responsible for traffic safety and accident investigation within the Patrol Bureau. The Criminal Investigation Bureau is divided into two divisions. Each division is divided into sections responsible for the investigation of specific major crimes. Division I consists of Homicide, Sex Crimes/Child Abuse, General Assignment, Robbery, Youth Services, and the Delinquency Prevention Office. Division II is Forgery, Burglary, Auto Theft, and Theft.

SUPPORT OPERATIONS

An Assistant Chief is directly responsible for the Support Operations. Under Support Operations are two major Bureaus: the Technical Services Bureau and the Staff Services Bureau commanded by Majors. The Technical Services Bureau is responsible for the Jail Division, the Forensic Science Division, and the Information Division. The Staff Services Bureau is responsible for the Training Division, Resource Evaluation Division, Counseling Services, the Community Services Division, Victim Services Program and the Wellness Division.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The Administrative Services is commanded by a non-sworn Director and is responsible for the functions of Personnel Services, Budget Analysis, and Property Management. The Budget Analysis Unit is responsible for the preparation and monitoring of the department's operating budget, Capital Improvement projects, and external funding. Personnel Services oversees all personnel actions, payroll, and the Department's Affirmative Action program. Property Management is responsible for all police vehicles, equipment, and supplies as well as maintenance and inventory of crime scene evidence and recovered property.




Total Motor Vehicle Collisions by Month



As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve mankind; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception; the weak against oppression or intimidation, and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all persons to liberty, equality, and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all; maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, animosities, or friendships to influence my decisions, with no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals. I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of the Police Service. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession—Law Enforcement.
