

## COUNTY DETENTION FACILITIES DAILY INMATE POPULATION DATA FEBRUARY, 1988

### I. Executive Summary

County detention facilities housed a daily average of 26,641 inmates during the month of February, 1988. This represents the highest daily average reported since the Department of Corrections has been involved in the process of collecting data on inmates held in county detention facilities.

Overall, the data reported for February of 1988 reflects that the daily average for inmates housed in county detention facilities increased by 3,162 inmates over the average reported for February, 1987. This is a growth rate of thirteen percent.

The average number of inmates housed awaiting felony trial remains the largest segment of the inmate population in the county system. Of the 26,572 inmates housed on a daily average during January and February of this year, 54 percent were inmates held for felony trial. This is an increase of twelve percent over last year and strongly suggests that the state prison system will continue to see an increase in the pattern of new admissions in the months to come.

In spite of court action, the addition of 3,667 new beds, pretrial intervention programs, and other attempts to abate the influx of inmates, overcrowded conditions in many county detention facilities continue to prevail. This situation is now more critical since February of 1987. The data would also suggest that inmates are now receiving longer sentences for felony crimes and counties appear to be incarcerating at a greater rate compared to January and February of 1987. However, current construction and planning activities now in process should have considerable impact on reducing overcrowding during the next two years.

The data reflects that on a daily average, 20,745 inmates were housed in county detention facilities in January and February of 1987. In January and February of this year, 26,572 inmates, on the average, were held by counties, representing an increase of 3,514 or fifteen percent over January and February of 1987.

In the adult male category, three of the subcategories for felonies are considerably higher than figures for January and February of 1987. The data indicates that male inmates sentenced to 365 days or more increased at a significantly higher rate than those sentenced to less than one year in a county detention facility (46% versus 18%), suggesting a trend for the imposition of longer sentences for felony crimes committed by adult male offenders. However, the average for those felony offenders awaiting sentencing is down by four percent. The Baker Act (mental health) sub-category average reflects the highest rate of increase in the adult male category, with a 156 percent increase over January and February, 1987. Overall, the adult male category increased by fourteen percent over January and February of 1987.

The adult female averages reflect a dissimilar pattern especially in the felony subcategories. The average for adult females sentenced to 365 days or more is up by 26 percent over last year at this time, while the figures for those sentenced to 364 days or less increased by 37 percent indicating a trend toward imposing more lenient sentences for felony crimes committed by adult female offenders. The daily averages for adult females awaiting felony trial and felony sentencing are up by 23 percent and six percent, respectively. The average for adult female probation violators increased 59 percent over last year, this being significantly greater than the trend with the adult male subcategory. Overall, the adult female category increased at approximately twice the rate of that for adult males over the past year.

In the juvenile male category, the average number of inmates housed as adults on felony charges increased by 47 percent over January and February of last year and those held as sentenced adult felony offenders increased by 45 percent. Those housed as adults on misdemeanors, in the pretrial subcategory was also up considerably over January and February of 1987. The average number of juvenile females held as adults or beyond staff control increased by 129 percent over January and February, 1987.

In all subcategories, the average number of inmates housed awaiting felony trial constituted the preponderance of the inmate population in the county system in January and February, 1987 as well as in January and February, 1988. In January and February of 1987, these subcategories alone represented 56 percent of the total for those two months. In January and February of 1988, this figure represented 54 percent of the total, reflecting an increase of twelve percent over the January and February, 1987 daily average.

It should be noted that the preceding table presents an extremely high incarceration rate of 10.87 per/1,000 general population for Hamilton County. This should not be concluded as an alarming rate as it is the result of the practice of holding approximately 61 percent of their inmates under contract with the Department of Corrections and the U.S. Marshals Service. This is also the case with Baker County where the rate is almost three inmates per/1,000. This results from housing approximately 69 percent of their inmates for the U.S. Marshals Service. Escambia County with a rate of 3.10 is also influenced somewhat by housing eight percent of their inmates for the Department of Corrections under contract.

In January and February of 1987, the state-wide county detention facility incarceration rate was 1.72 per/1,000 based on the population estimate for 1987. Based on the 1988 population estimate, on a state-wide basis, counties incarcerated at a rate of 2.16 per/1,000 general population in January and February of this year. This represents a rate increase of 26 percent. According to estimates, the general population for Florida in 1988 will increase by three percent over 1987. This would suggest that counties, on the average, are housing inmates at a greater rate than the rate of growth in the general population.

## IV <u>Individual County Detention Facility Inmate Daily Averages and Authorized Facility Inmate Capacities</u>

Attachment C provides the daily average and the authorized capacity for each county detention facility for January and February of this year.

As of February 29, 1988, 24 counties housed an average of 4,094 inmates in facilities beyond their rated authorized capacity. Thirteen counties operated facilities at or near capacity and 30 were holding inmates in facilities below capacity. Figure 2, Attachment D offers an overview of the county inmate capacity status throughout the state.

Currently there are 105 detention facilities housing county inmates throughout the state. This represents three fewer county facilities than in February of last year.

The following table presents a comparison of county inmate capacity data for February, 1986, February, 1987 and February, 1988.

The above table reflects the addition of some 6,611 new beds on line in the county detention system since February, 1986. However, these additional beds have failed to keep pace with the accelerated growth in inmate populations in those counties where serious overcrowding exists. A number of counties experiencing high inmate populations are now involved in various stages of detention facility construction and many are in the process of planning new facilities, renovations or additions to their existing facilities. Unless the inmate populations increase more dynamically than they have since February of 1986, current construction and planning activities now in process should produce significant gains in reducing the problem of acute overcrowding during the next two years.
