

CHILD means a person who is under the age of eighteen years, with the exception that any child who violates a federal or state law or municipal ordinance prior to attaining eighteen years of age shall be beened a "child" irrespective of his age at the time the complaint is filed or hearing had thereon. Section 2151-32281 GRC)

GELINGUENT Child includes any child. (A: who violates any law of this state, the United States, or any ordinance on regulation of a political subdivision of the state, which would be a crime if committed by an adult, except as provided in section 2151,021 of the Revised Code; (B) who violates any lawful order of the Court made under this chapter. (Section 2151,020 DRC)


unRob.? CHILD includes any child. (A) who does not subject himself to the reasonable control of his parents, teachers, guardian, or custodian, by reason of being wayward or habitually disobedient. (B) who is an habitual truant from home or school, (C) who so deports himself as to injure or endanger the realth or morals of himself or others, (D) who attempts to enter the marriage relation in any state without the consent of his parents, custodian, legal guardian, or other legal authority; (E) who is found in a disreputable place, visits or patronizes a place prohibited by law, or associates with vagrant. Vicious, priminal, notorious, or immoral persons; (F) who engages in an occupation prohibited by law, or is in a situation dangerous to life or limb or injurious to the health or morals of himself or others, (G) who has violated a law applicable only to a child. (Section 5151 022 OPC)

SUVENILE TRAFFIC OFFENDER is a child who violates any traffic law, traffic ordinance, or traffic regulation of this state, the United States, or of any political subdivision of this state, shall be designated as a "juvenile traffic offender" (Section 2151 021 ORC)

SEPENCENT CHILD includes any child: (A) who is howeless or destitute or without proper care or support through no fault of his parents, guardian, or custodian, (B) who lacks proper care or support by reason of the mental or physical condition of his parents, guardian, or custodian, (C) whose condition or environment is such as to warrant the state, in the interests of the child, in assuming his quardianship. (Section 2151 04 ORC)

NEGLECTED CHILD includes any child (A) who is abandoned by his parents, guardian, or custodian, (B) who lacks proper parental care because of the faults or habits of his parents, guardian, or sustadian. C) whose parents, guardian, or custodian neglects or refuses to provide him with proper or necessary subsistence, education, medical or surgical care, or other care necessary for his nealth, morals, or well being; (D) whose parents, guardian, or custodian neglects or refuses to provide the special care made necessary by his mental condition. (E) whose parents, legal guardian, or custodian have placed or attempted to place such child in violation of section 0103 to and 5103.17 of the Revised Code. A child who, in lieu of medical or surgical care or treatment for a wound, injury, disability, or physical or mental condition, is under spiritual treatment through prayer in accordance with the tenets and practices of a well-recognized religion, is not a neglected child for this reason alone. (Section 215) 03 ORC:

HBUSED CHILD includes any child who. (A) is the victim of "sexual activity" as defined under Chapter 2737 of the Revised Code where such activity would constitute an offense under that chapter, except that the court need not find that any person has been convicted of the offense in order to find that the child is an abused child, (B) is endangered as defined in section 2919-22 of the Revised Code, except that the court need not find that any person has been convicted under that section in order to find that the child is an abused child, (C) exhibits evidence of any injury or death inflicted other than by accidental means, or an injury or death which is at variance with the history given of it, except that a child exhibiting evidence of corporal punishment or other physical disciplinary measure by a parent, guardian, bustodian, persons having custody or control, or person in loco parents of a child is not an abused child under this division if the measure is not prohibited under section 2919-22 of the Revised Code. Dear Citizens of Huron County:

For the last few years, I have taken the occasion of the issuance of the annual report to discuss our growing problem of substance abuse, including alcohol, by our Huron County children. This year I wish to strike a positive chord.

There are positive, bright spots in what I see in the Juvenile Justice area in Huron County. Some of the problems of our children are being addressed in new and encouraging ways by, not only the Court and law enforcement, but by the schools, mental health agencies, the medical community, churches, Human Services Department, Child Assessment Team and others. For example, for over a year, a steering committee to organize grass roots efforts to deal with substance abuse has been meeting and working in that effort. The R.O.Y., big-brother and big-sister type program, continues to expand, providing much-needed, caring attention to troubled children. The offering of parenting training for families and the participation in those classes grows each year.

I invite everyone's attention to these positive aspects of our juvenile justice problems and urge all to conscientiously contribute what time and effort you can to solving the problems of our Huron County children.
