FOREWORD

Virginia's Uniform Crime Reporting Program was among 11 state programs that became operational during 1975, bringing the total to 33 at that time. Today, there are 41 such programs. The UCR program is a system of collecting and analyzing crime statistics gathered from participating law enforcement agencies throughout the State.

The Department of State Police, in accordance with the Code of Virginia, is the collection agency for Virginia UCR information. This report reflects a summary and analysis of data collected during the program's thirteenth year of operation. The most accurate information available in Virginia was utilized in generating statistics contained herein. Although initially designed for use by the law enforcement community, demand for UCR statistics from various public and private sources continues to increase yearly. They have become the primary vehicle used in evaluating levels of criminal activity and functions related thereto in jurisdictions throughout the Commonwealth.

The participation and cooperation of all agencies making this publication possible is sincerely appreciated.

VIRGINIA UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

HISTORY

Development of the current nationwide Uniform Crime Reporting Program began more than fifty years ago. In 1930, crime counts were first requested from local police departments, with the Federal Bureau of Investigation designated by Congress to collect, compile, and analyze these statistics. The Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police played a primary role in the origin and development of the UCR Program and, to this day, serves in a strong advisory capacity. The National Sheriff's Association (NSA) in 1966, established a Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting to serve in an advisory capacity to the NSA membership and the national Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Today, this Committee and similar committees within the state law enforcement associations are active in promoting interest in the UCR Program. Standardized offense classifications and scoring procedures to insure uniformity and consistency of data are the keynote of the reports. All of the Uniform Crime Reports were designed to be a by-product of information that a law enforcement agency should routinely compile for its own efficient administration and performance. The underlying philosophy and focus is and always has been oriented toward police statistics for use by law enforcement agencies, but the unique nature of the program makes the data invaluable for use by elected officials and the American public.

In recent years, the FBI has actively assisted individual states in the development of statewide programs of police statistics compatible with the national system. These state statistical programs provide the advantage of increased coverage of law enforcement agencies due to mandatory reporting requirements. State systems also provide direct and frequent service to law enforcement agencies in assuring completeness and quality of information provided by them. Through coordination by the state collection agency, the data is available for use by the state, and the collection and reporting machinery for the national program is substantially streamlined.

Prior to June 30, 1974, no mandatory uniform crime reporting law existed in Virginia, and of the 288 agencies in the Commonwealth, 162 or 56% were voluntarily reporting directly to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Effective law enforcement requires the coordinated action of all law enforcement agencies within and among political subdivisions. Special attention must often be devoted to a selective and concentrated effort both area wide as well as in terms of a specific pattern and type of criminal behavior. Selective and coordinated enforcement becomes possible only when the type and volume of crime can be analyzed on a basis of accurate information, statistically developed and coordinated. A system of this magnitude necessitates the use of a computer-based information processing system.

The need for statistical information on the number of offenses and offenders was long recognized in the state. The system developed in Virginia gives vital information that assists law enforcement agencies throughout the state by furnishing information for management decisions and planning programs.

A statewide UCR program informs the Governor, Legislature, local and state law enforcement agencies, other governmental officials, and the public as to the nature of crime problems in Virginia, their magnitude, and their trend over a period of time. Local and state officials are able to assess the direction and impact of crime through the collection of timely and reliable statistical information.

UCR SYSTEM OBJECTIVES

In keeping with a recommendation of the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice, the Virginia Uniform Crime Reporting Program was planned for eventual growth into a complete and integrated offender based Criminal Justice Information System. Under this program, each offender arrested in Virginia will be tracked through the entire criminal justice system from the time of arrest through the courts, and to the correctional system where his exit (parole, expiration of sentence, etc.) will be recorded. In this manner, a complete "rap sheet" on individual offenders will be available for use by the police, courts and correctional agencies in Virginia. In addition, statistical data derived from the CJIS Program will provide assistance in determining the overall efficiency of the criminal justice system in Virginia and will make effective management studies possible.

The fundamental objectives of the Virginia Uniform Crime Reporting Program are:

- (1) To inform the Governor, Legislature, and other governmental officials, and the public as to the nature of the crime problem in Virginia—its magnitude and its trend.
- (2) To provide law enforcement administrators with criminal statistics for administrative and operational use.
- (3) To determine who commits crimes by age, sex, race, and other attributes in order to find the proper focus for crime prevention and enforcement.
- (4) To provide base data and statistics to measure the workload and effectiveness of Virginia's criminal justice system.
- (5) To provide base data and statistics to measure the effects of prevention and deterrence programs.

- (6) To provide base data and statistics for research to improve the efficiency effectiveness and performance of criminal justice agencies.
- (7) To provide base data to assist in the assessment of social and other causes for the development of theories of criminal behavior.

REPORTING PROCEDURES

In the statewide Uniform Crime Reporting Program, contributing law enforcement agencies are responsible for compiling their own crime reports and submitting them to the State Police UCR Section. The State Police, in an effort to maintain quality and uniformity in the data received, furnish full-time field representatives who provide training in Uniform Crime Reporting procedures. All contributors are furnished with the UCR Guide Manual which outlines in detail procedures for scoring and classifying offenses. The manual illustrates and discusses the monthly and annual reporting forms as well as the numerous tally sheets made available to facilitate the periodic tabulation of desired data.

A centralized record system is necessary to the sound operation of any law enforcement agency. The record system is an essential basis for crime reporting by the agency. Upon request, the State Police will make internal records, forms, and technical assistance available to any law enforcement agency. This provides for the establishment or modification of a basic non-automated police records system.

On a monthly basis, law enforcement agencies (state, county and municipal) report the number of offenses that become known to them during the month in the following crime categories: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, manslaughter by negligence, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. This count is taken from a record of all complaints of crime received by the law enforcement agency from victims, other sources and/or discovered by officers. Whenever complaints of crime are determined through investigation to be unfounded or false, they are eliminated from the actual count. The number of "actual offenses known" in these crime categories is reported to the State Police UCR Section without regard to (1) whether anyone is arrested for the crime; (2) the stolen property is recovered; (3) the local prosecutive policy; or (4) any other restrictive consideration. Law enforcement agencies on a monthly basis report the total number of these reported crimes which they clear either by arrest or exceptional means. A separated count of crimes cleared involving persons under the age of 18 is shown. The number of law enforcement officers killed and assaulted and the value of property stolen and recovered during the month are reported. Arrests are reported for all criminal acts, except traffic violations, by crime categories including the age, sex, and race of each person arrested. Supplementary information concerning pertinent data surrounding homicides is reported.

Law enforcement employee data concerning the number of sworn and other personnel is collected annually.

VERIFICATION PROCEDURES

An obvious concern in the collection of crime statistics is the validity and uniformity of the data received. With the receipt of reports covering approximately 288 jurisdictions, the problems of attaining uniformity are readily apparent.

Issuance of instructions does not complete the role of the State Police UCR Section. On the contrary, standard operating procedure is to examine each incoming report not only for arithmetical accuracy but also, and possible of even more importance, for reasonableness as a possible indication of errors.

Numerous checks and cross-checks are used to insure the accuracy of the reports. Arithmetical adjustments or unusual variations are noted by the UCR verifiers and brought to the attention of the submitting agency by direct contact or through a field representative. Upon resubmission of a corrected return, the forms are reverified.

A great deal of the success of Virginia's UCR Program is due to the full-time field staff assigned to assist local agencies in record-keeping practices and crime reporting procedures. Personal contact is invaluable to the accuracy and uniformity of UCR data received.

STATISTICAL FEEDBACK

A particularly important aim of Virginia's UCR Program is statistical "Feedback" to contributors. With the implementation of this program, participating police agencies furnish data that is analyzed and returned to each jurisdiction upon request in monthly printout form. A monthly newsletter is published containing monthly state totals. Quarterly, semi-annual and annual summaries are also furnished each agency. With the completion of the annual report, contributing agencies possess detailed information showing crime trends by jurisdiction.

Data collected is also forwarded by the Department of State Police UCR Section to the Federal Bureau of Investigation on a monthly and annual basis. This is for inclusion in national crime reports and the FBI's annual UCR Report, Crime in the United States.

CRIME FACTORS

There are many factors which will affect the type and volume of crime that occurs in a given area. Caution must be advised when reviewing and comparing these statistics as crime trends will vary from place to place.

The most important and vital influences on crime are:

Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.

Composition of the population with reference to age, sex, and race.

Economic status and mores of the population.

Relative stability of population including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.

Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.

Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.

Effective strength of the police force.

Standards governing appointments to the police force.

Attitudes and policies of the courts and prosecuting officials.

Relationships and attitudes of law enforcement and the community.

The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agencies, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

Organization and cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police jurisdictions.

THE CRIME INDEX

For practical purposes of measuring the trend and distribution of crime on the National and State level, the Uniform Crime Reporting Program is based on a Crime Index. This index is composed of those crimes considered to represent the most local crime problem and the most serious by nature of motive or by the volume in which they occur. Essential also to the maintaining of uniform and consistent data is the establishment of standard definitions which are used for the State and National Programs.

The UCR Crime Index Offenses and their definitions, listed in order of seriousness, are:

- (1) Murder/Nonnegligent Manslaughter—The willfull (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.
- (2) Forcible Rape—The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.
- (3) Robbery—A vicious crime which takes place in the presence of the victim to obtain property or anything of value by force or the threat of force.
- (4) Aggravated Assault—An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury.
- (5) Burglary—The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft.
- (6) Larceny—The unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles of value without the use of force.
- (7) Motor Vehicle Theft—The unlawful taking or stealing of a motor vehicle.

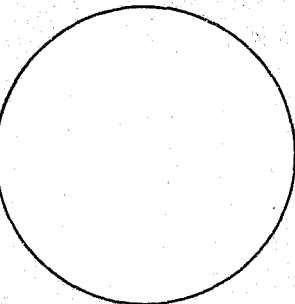

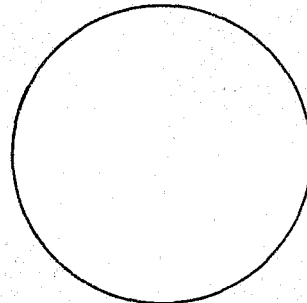

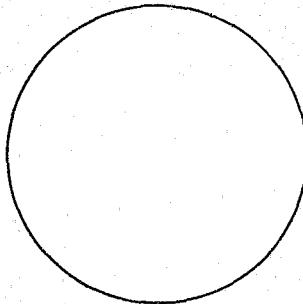

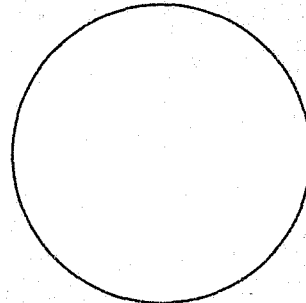

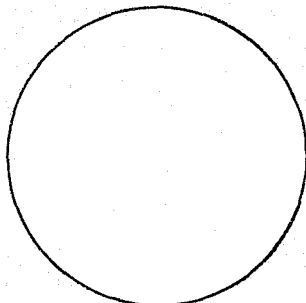

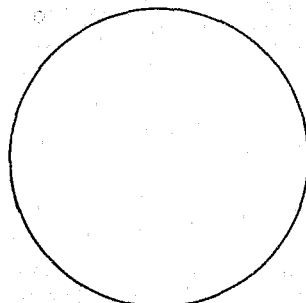

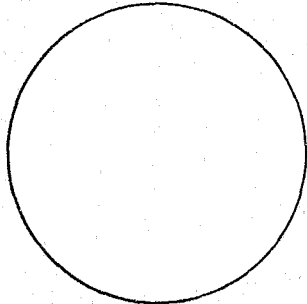

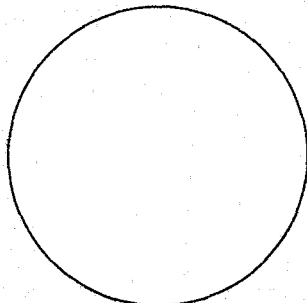

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT



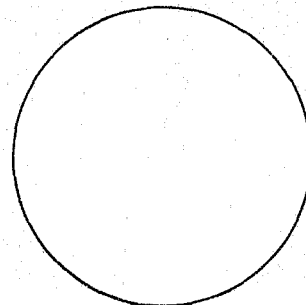

CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY

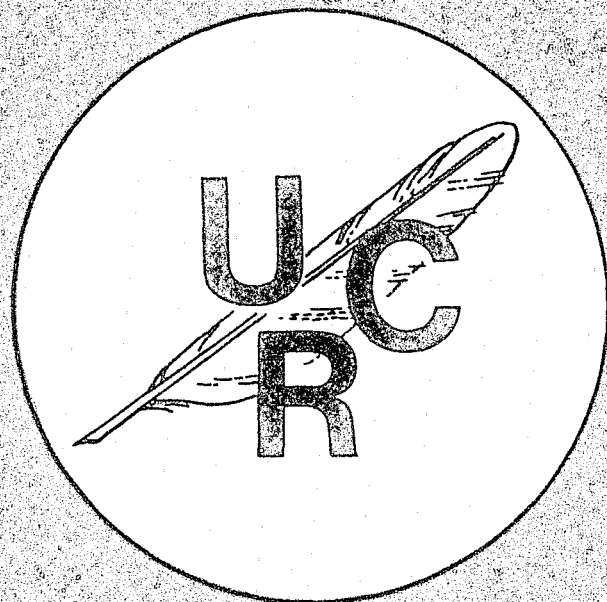

CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

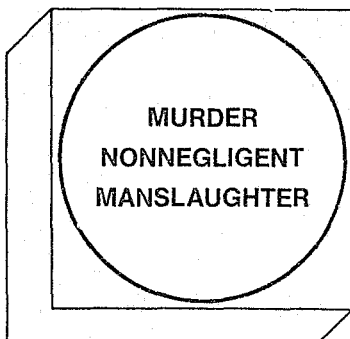

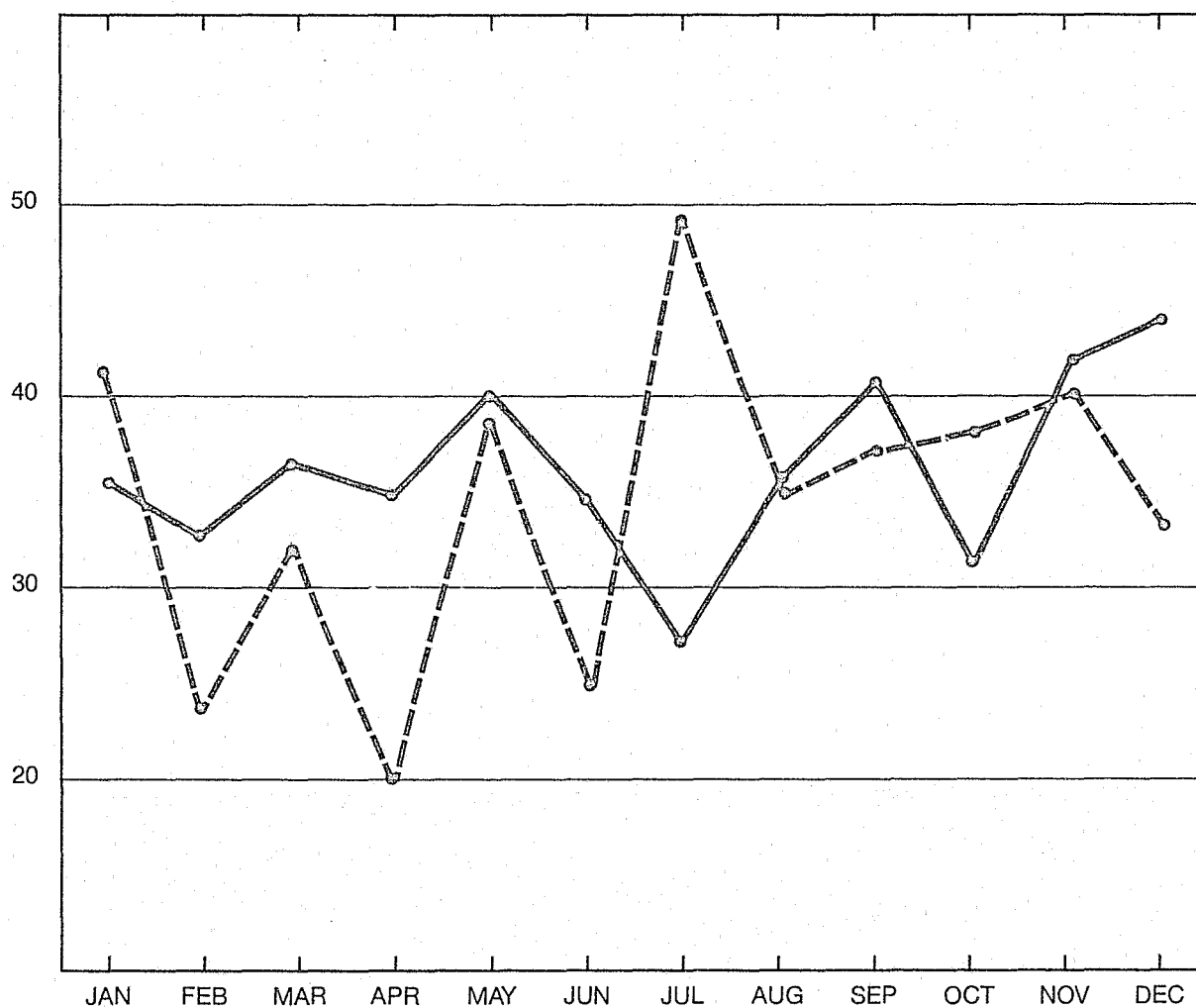


Murder/Nonnegligent Manslaughter is defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as the willful (Nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. As a general rule, any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. Suicides, assaults to murder, and attempted murders are not included. Those deaths found through police investigation to be accidental and all traffic fatalities* are classified as Manslaughter by Negligence. These are not considered crime index offenses and are not included in this report.

In 1987, there were 437 murders reported. Of these offenses 81.2 percent were cleared. An analysis by month shows December had the greatest occurrence. Compared to 1986, there were 411 murders reported, 86.1 percent were cleared, and July had the greatest occurrence.

*Beginning January 1, 1978, no data is collected through the UCR program on traffic fatalities.

MURDER/NONNEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER

In all cases of murder reported under this system a supplementary report is submitted by participating law enforcement agencies. This report provides pertinent information including age, sex, race, and ethnicity of the victim, weapon used, relationship of victim to offender, and any circumstances or motives which led to the commission of the crime.

OFFENDERS BY AGE, SEX, RACE AND ETHNIC ORIGIN

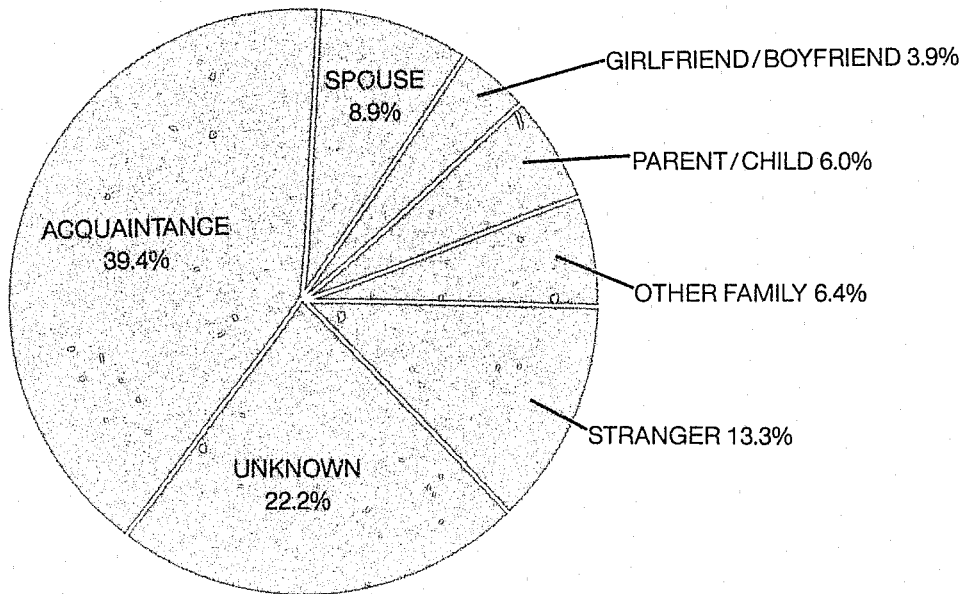

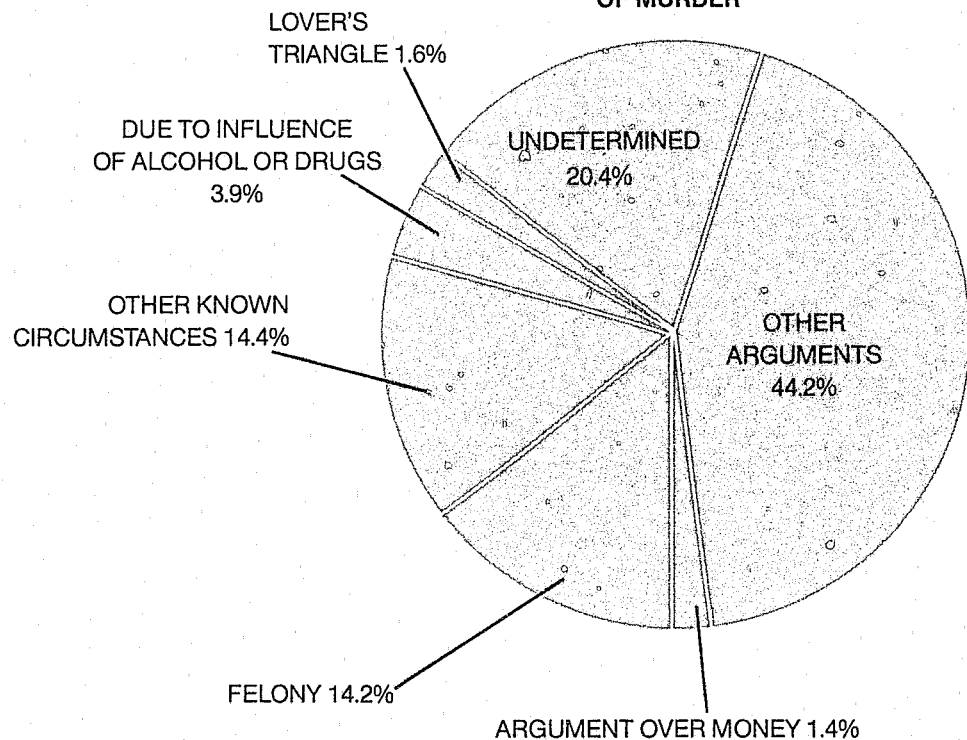
MURDER/NONNEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER

The circumstances which result in murder vary from family arguments to felonious activities. Murder/Nonnegligent manslaughter is largely a societal problem which is beyond the control of police. The relationship of the victim to the offender and the circumstances of murder serve to emphasize this point.

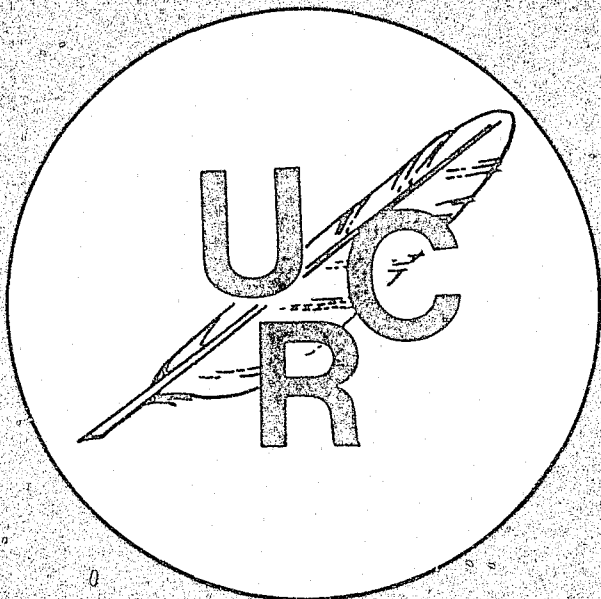

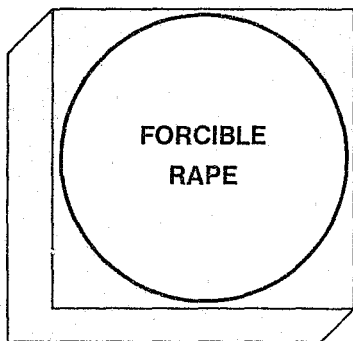

FORCIBLE RAPE

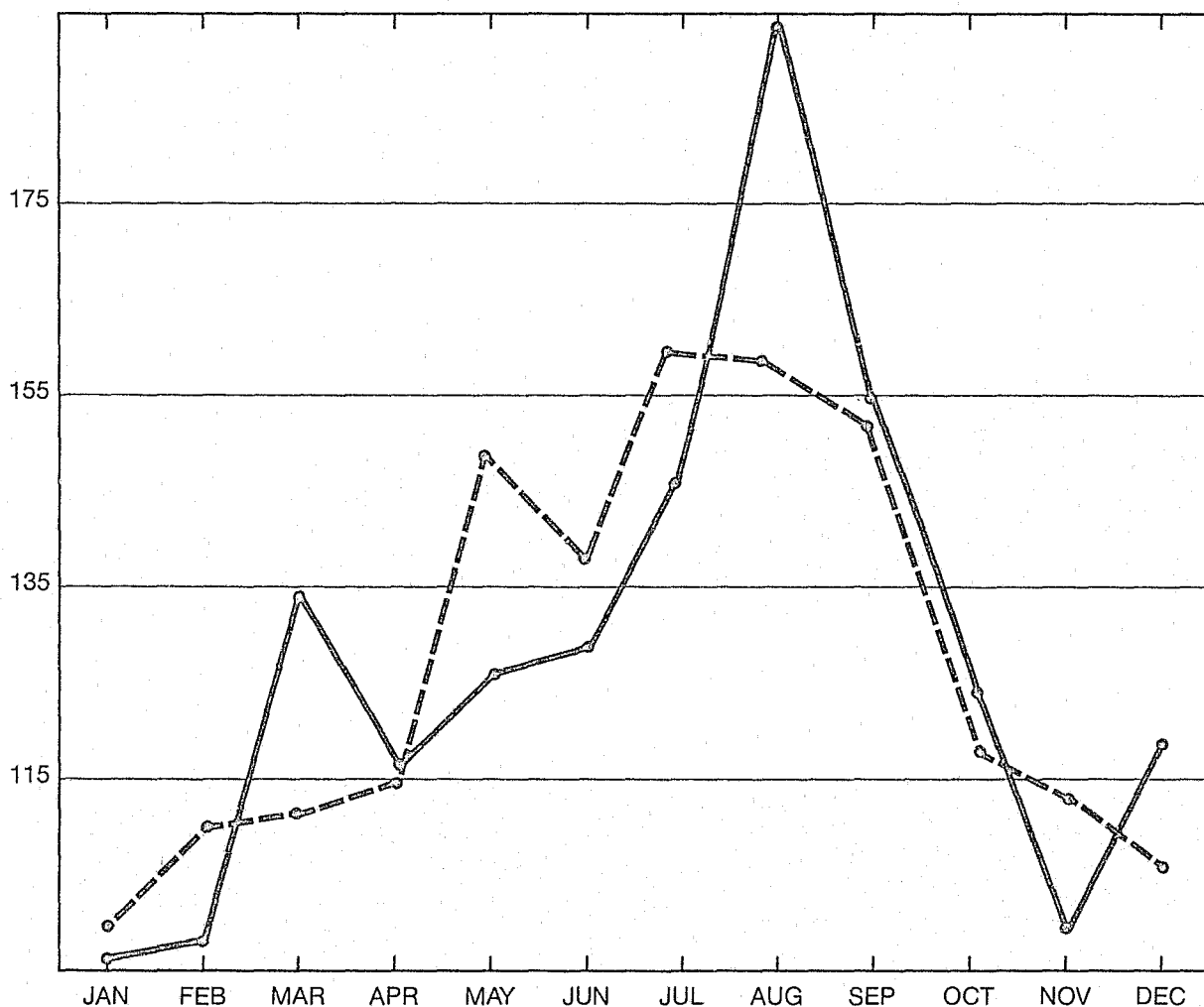

Forcible Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. For UCR purposes this offense is divided into two sections: Forcible Rape and Attempted Forcible Rape. Statutory rape offenses and other sex offenses are not included in this category.

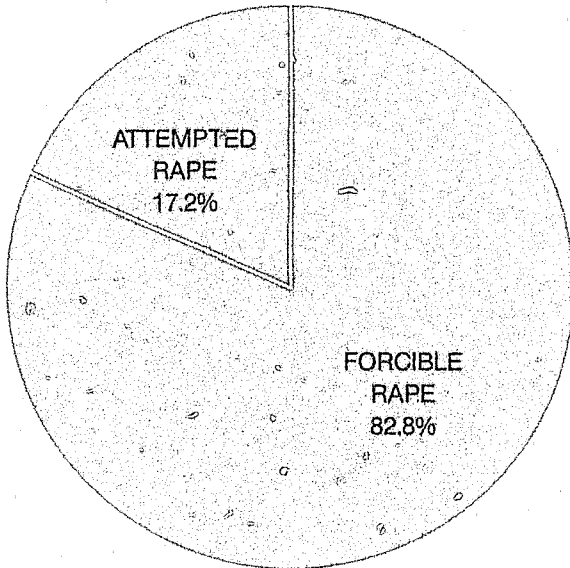
NUMBER BY MONTH



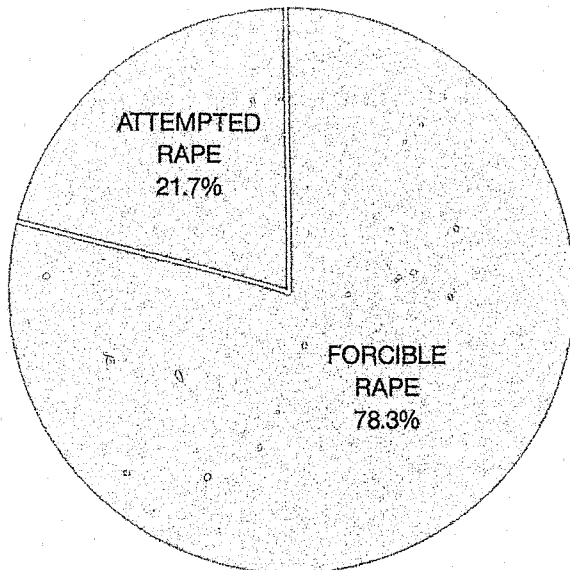

FORCIBLE RAPE

Forcible Rape differs from other violent crimes in that the victim, in many cases, is hesitant in reporting the offense to police. The rigors of court procedure, embarrassment and fear of any accompanying stigma have a deterrent effect on the victim's willingness to make the crime known to police.

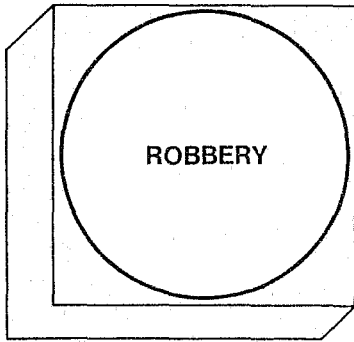

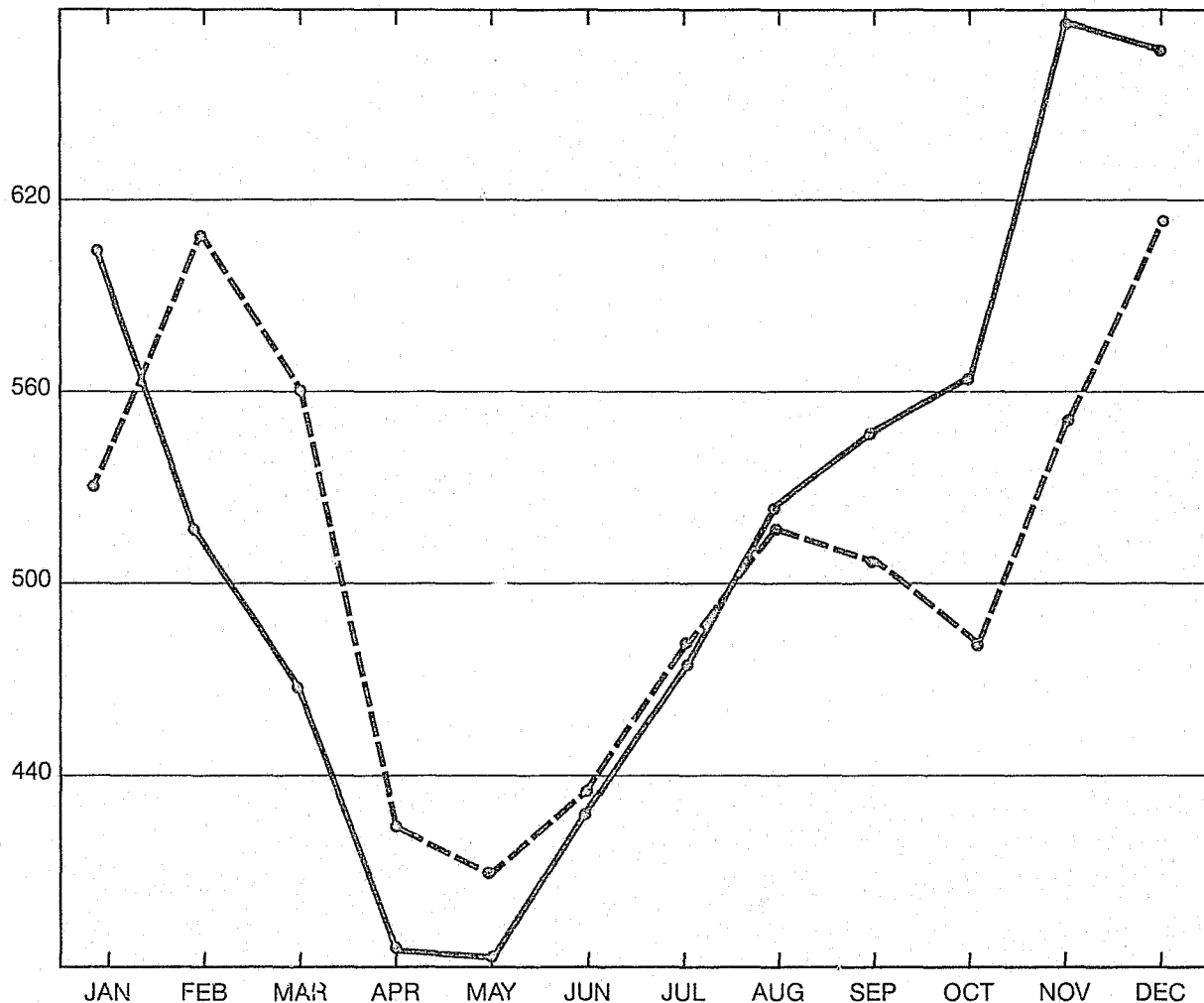

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another against his will by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the UCR Program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included. Robberies are reported in four general categories: firearms, knife or cutting instruments, strong-arm and other dangerous weapons.

In 1987, 6,244 robberies were reported. Of these offenses 37.7 percent were cleared. An analysis by month shows November had the greatest occurrence. Compared to 1986, there were 6,118 robberies reported. 34.3 percent were cleared, and December had the greatest occurrence.

NUMBER BY MONTH



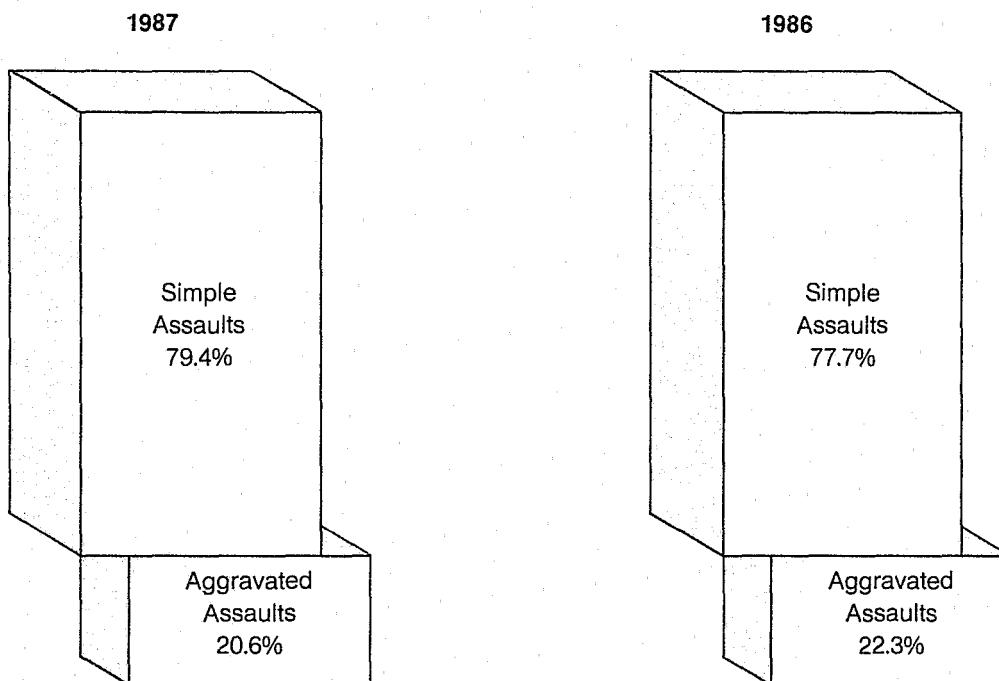

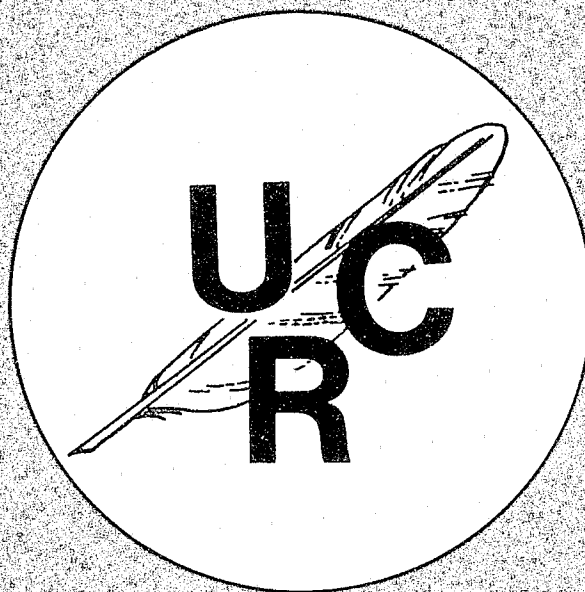
AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

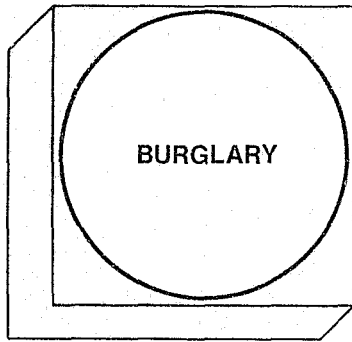

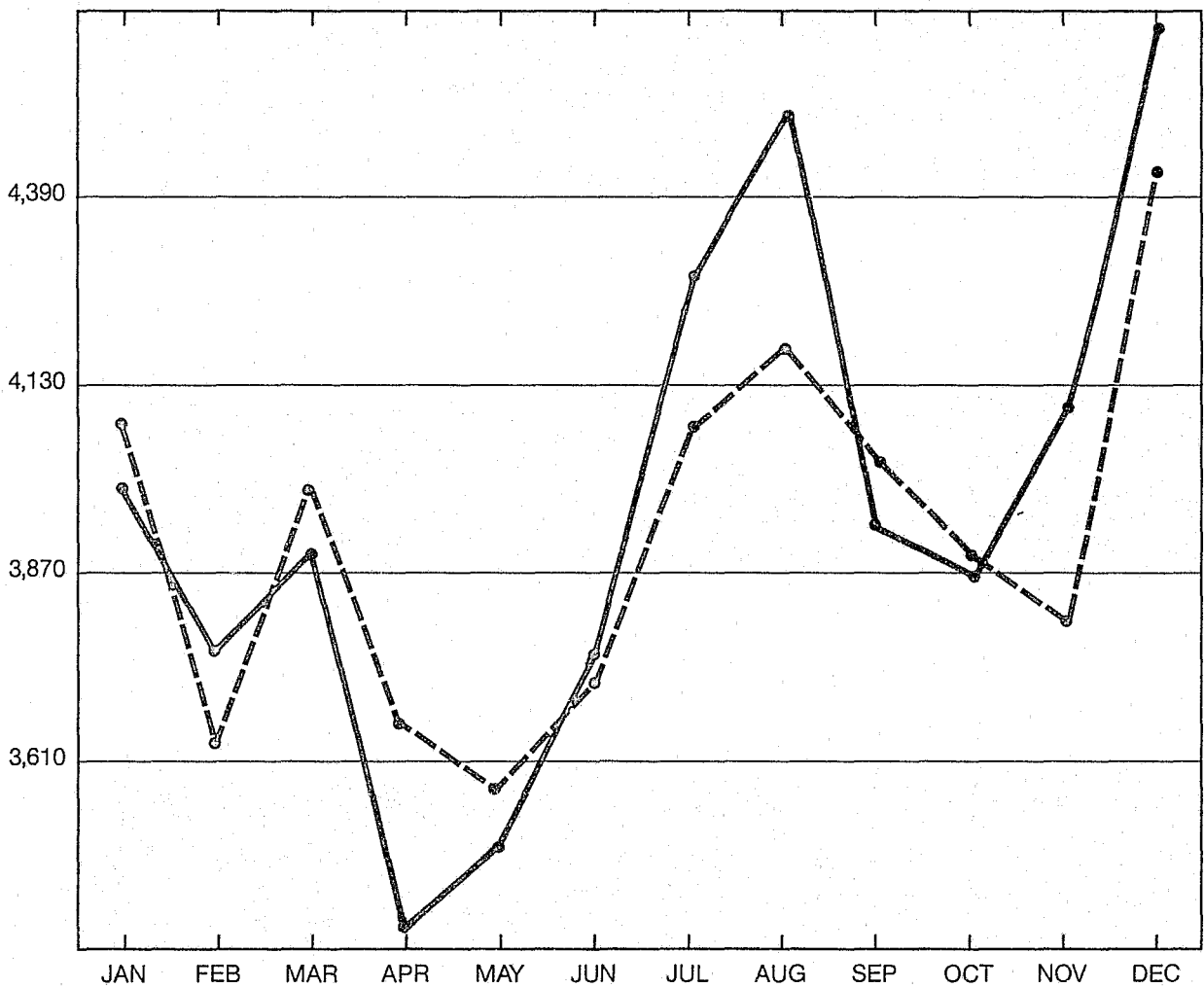

Burglary is defined as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify the crime as a burglary. This offense is sub-divided into three classifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry—no force, and attempted forcible entry.

In 1987, there were 47,642 burglaries reported. Of these offenses 25.1 percent were cleared. An analysis by month shows December had the greatest occurrence. Compared to 1986, there were 47,021 burglaries reported, 24.1 percent were cleared, and December had the greatest occurrence.

NUMBER BY MONTH



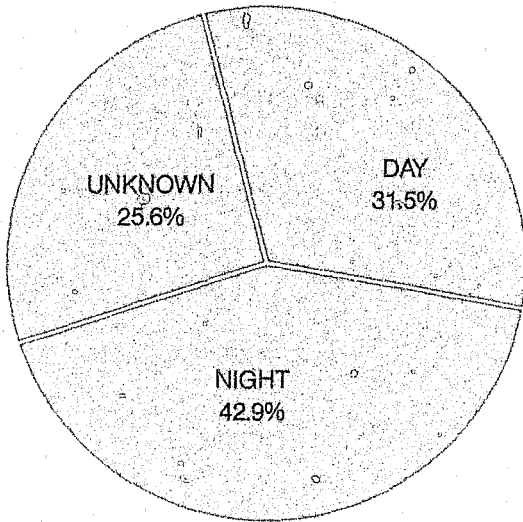

BURGLARY

Burglary is generally accepted as a crime of stealth and opportunity. In 1987, 75.1 percent of the burglaries involved forcible entry, 15.1 percent were unlawful entries and 9.8 percent were found to be attempted forcible entries. Economically, the offense of burglary represents a substantial sum of \$37,204,276. The average dollar loss per burglary was \$781. Compared with 1986, 75.6 percent were forcible, 14.8 percent were unlawful, and 9.6 percent were attempted forcible. The total sum was \$33,932,188 with an average dollar loss of \$722 per burglary.

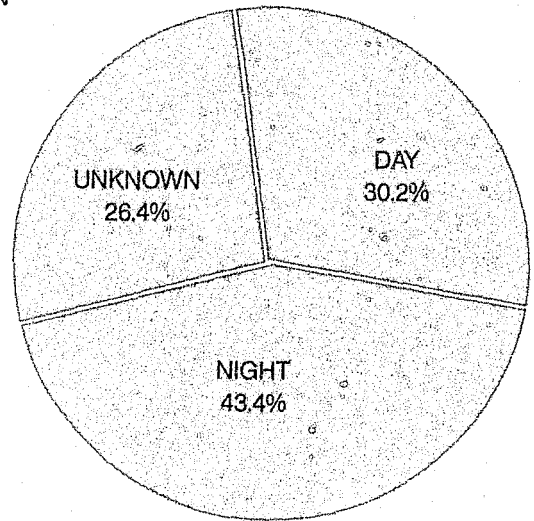

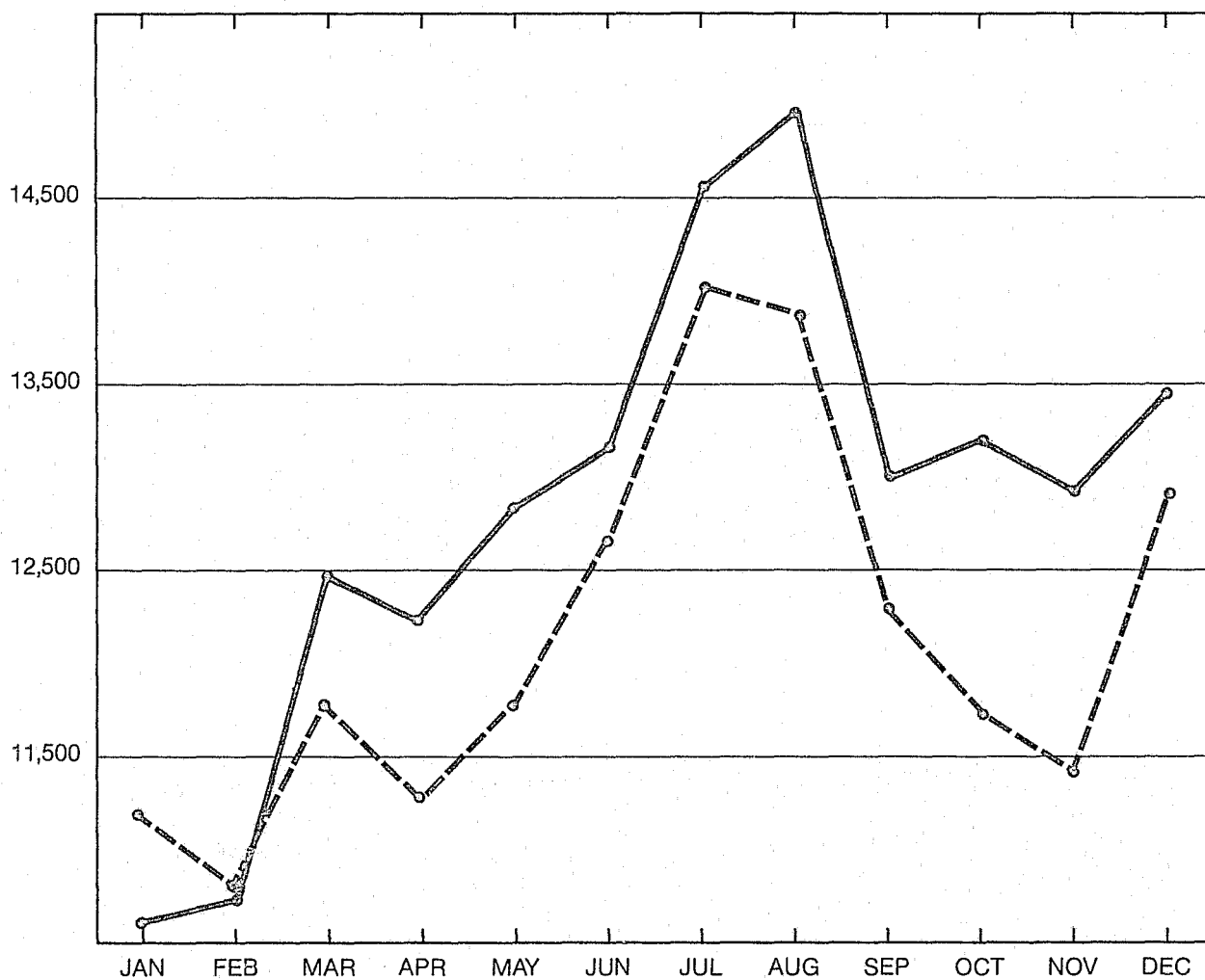




This offense is defined as the unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles of value without the use of force or violence. Motor vehicle theft is not included in this category and is counted as a separate offense. All thefts which are not considered part of robbery, burglary, or motor vehicle theft are classified in this category, regardless of the value stolen. Attempted thefts are included.

In 1987, there were 153,690 offenses of larceny reported. 22.1 percent of these offenses were cleared. The estimated dollar loss per offense was an average of \$318. Compared with 1986, there were 145,935 offenses reported. 21.5 percent were cleared with an average dollar loss of \$308. In 1987, the greatest occurrence of larceny was in the month of August. In 1986, the greatest occurrence was in July.

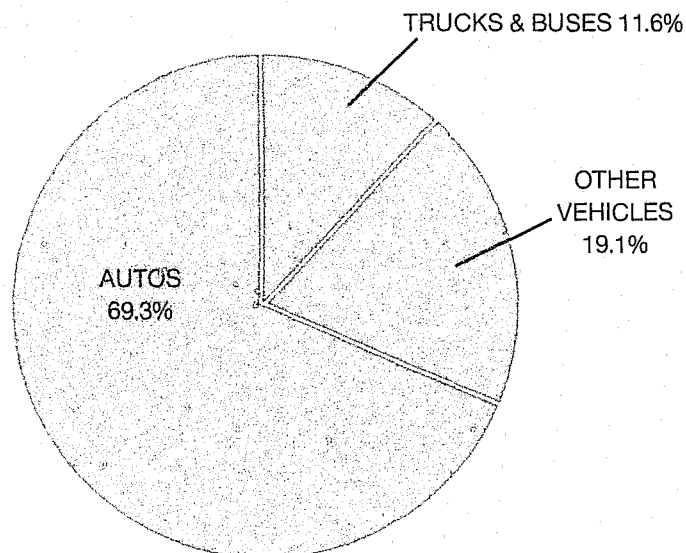

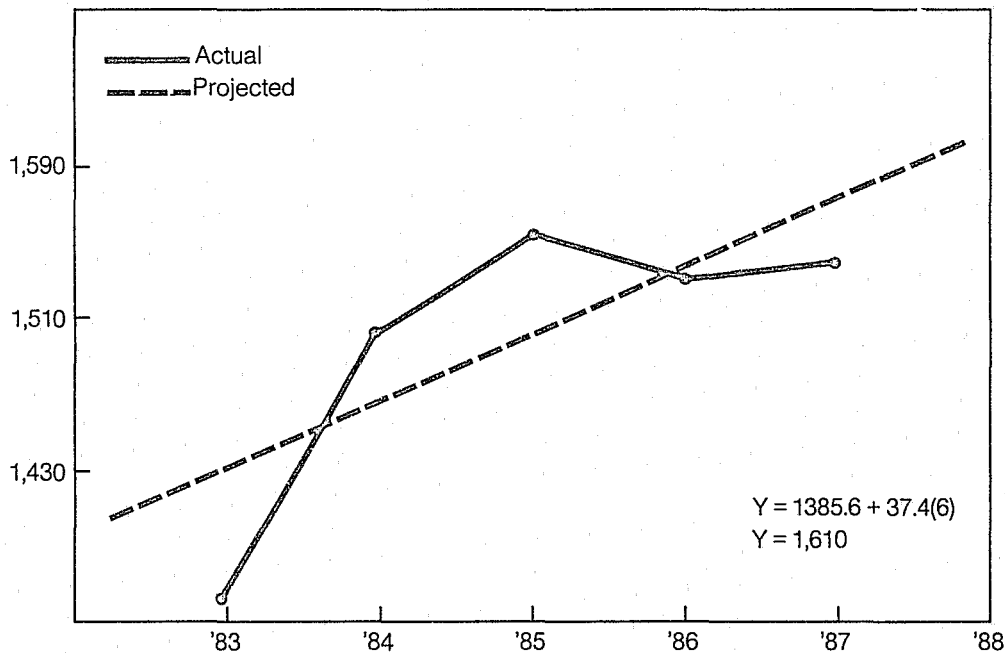
FIVE YEAR TRENDS AND PROJECTIONS

The following graphs are five year trends for the Index Crimes. The 1988 projections shown are estimates computed by a Least-Squares Linear Regression Method. The algebraic formula for linear regression ($Y = a + bX$) permits one to determine "Y" (the incidence of crime) from "b" (the relative slope) of a line. The slope of the projection line is determined such that the sum of the distances from the various points (crime incidences from prior years) to the line is at a minimum.

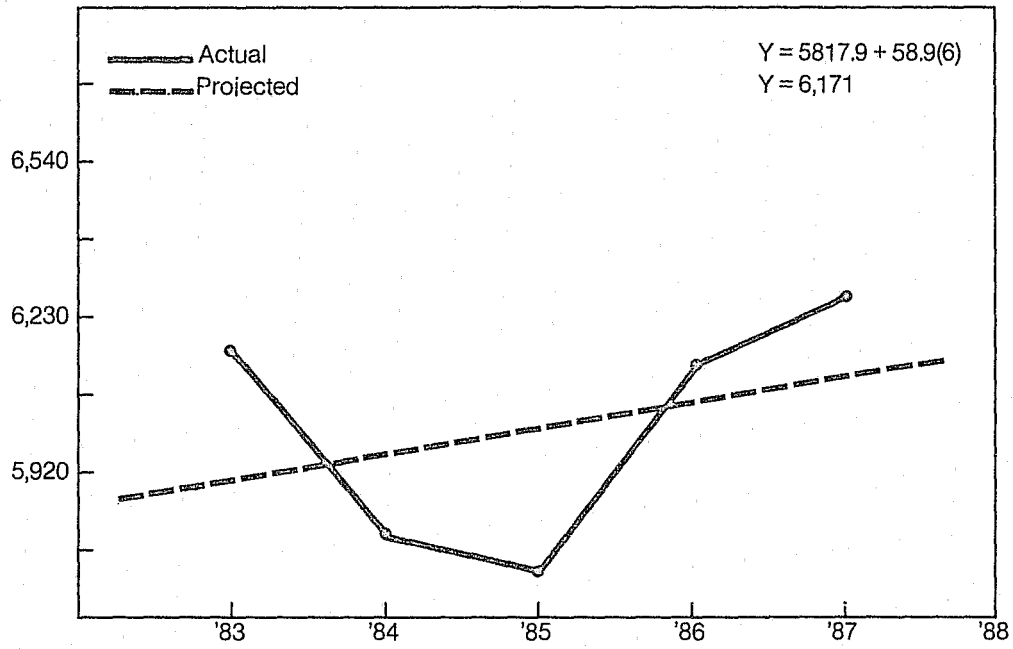

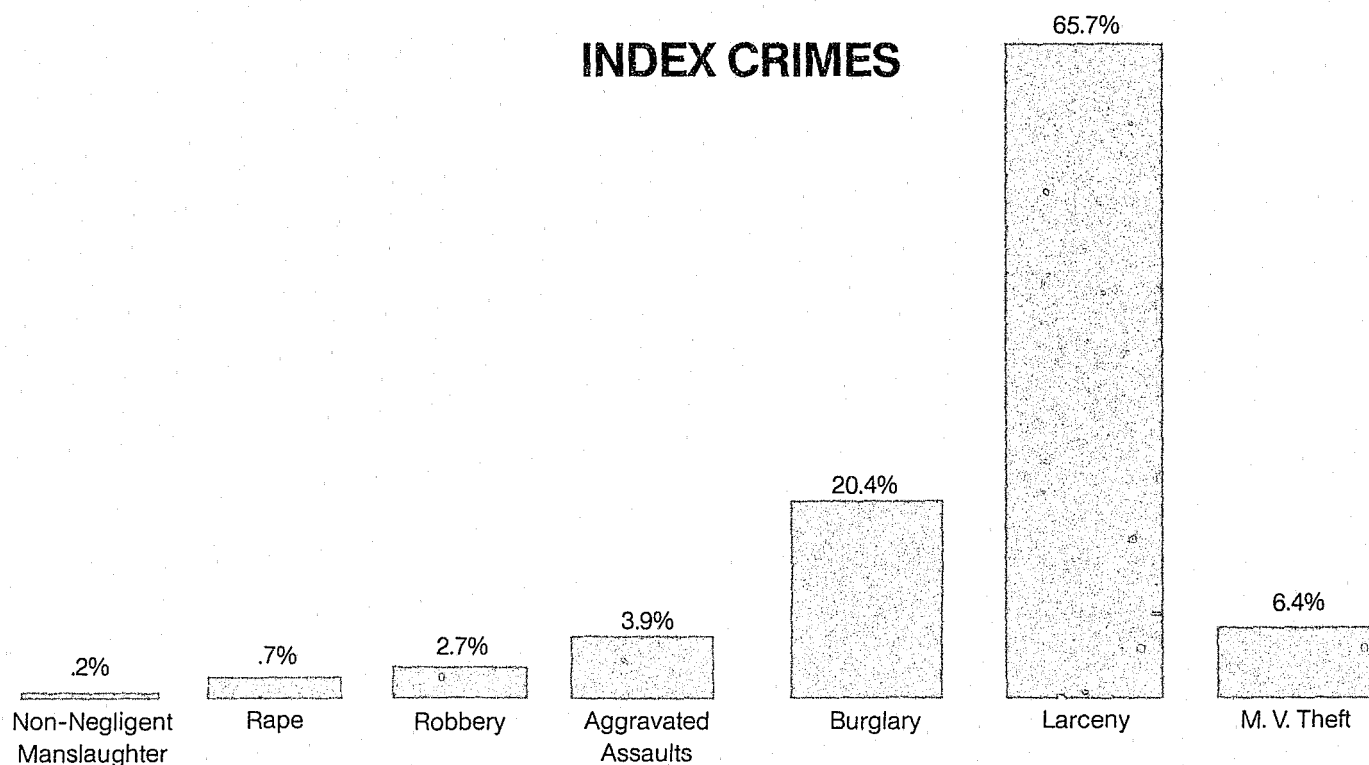

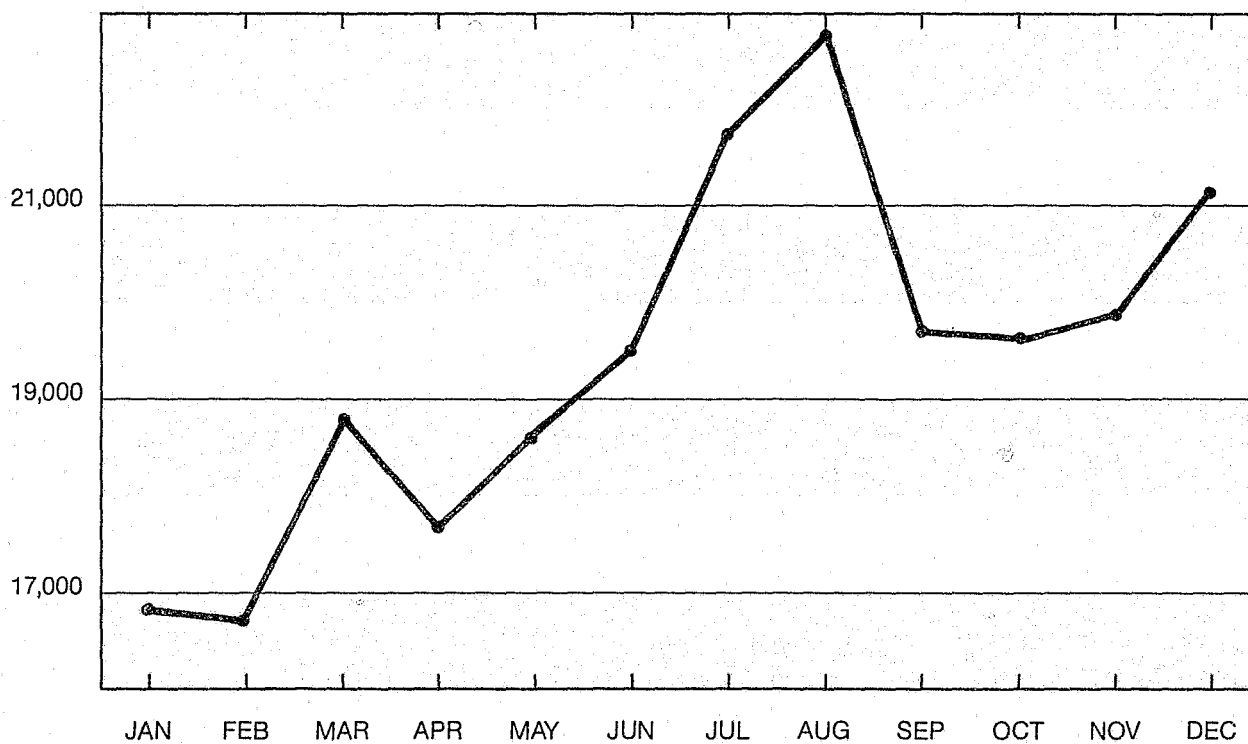
INDEX CRIMES



The measure used to indicate the probable extent, fluctuation, and distribution of crime reported through the UCR system is a Crime Index. As outlined in the introduction of this report, the Crime Index consists of the offenses of murder/nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft.

The graph below illustrates the variations and distributions of the total number of Index Crimes reported monthly.

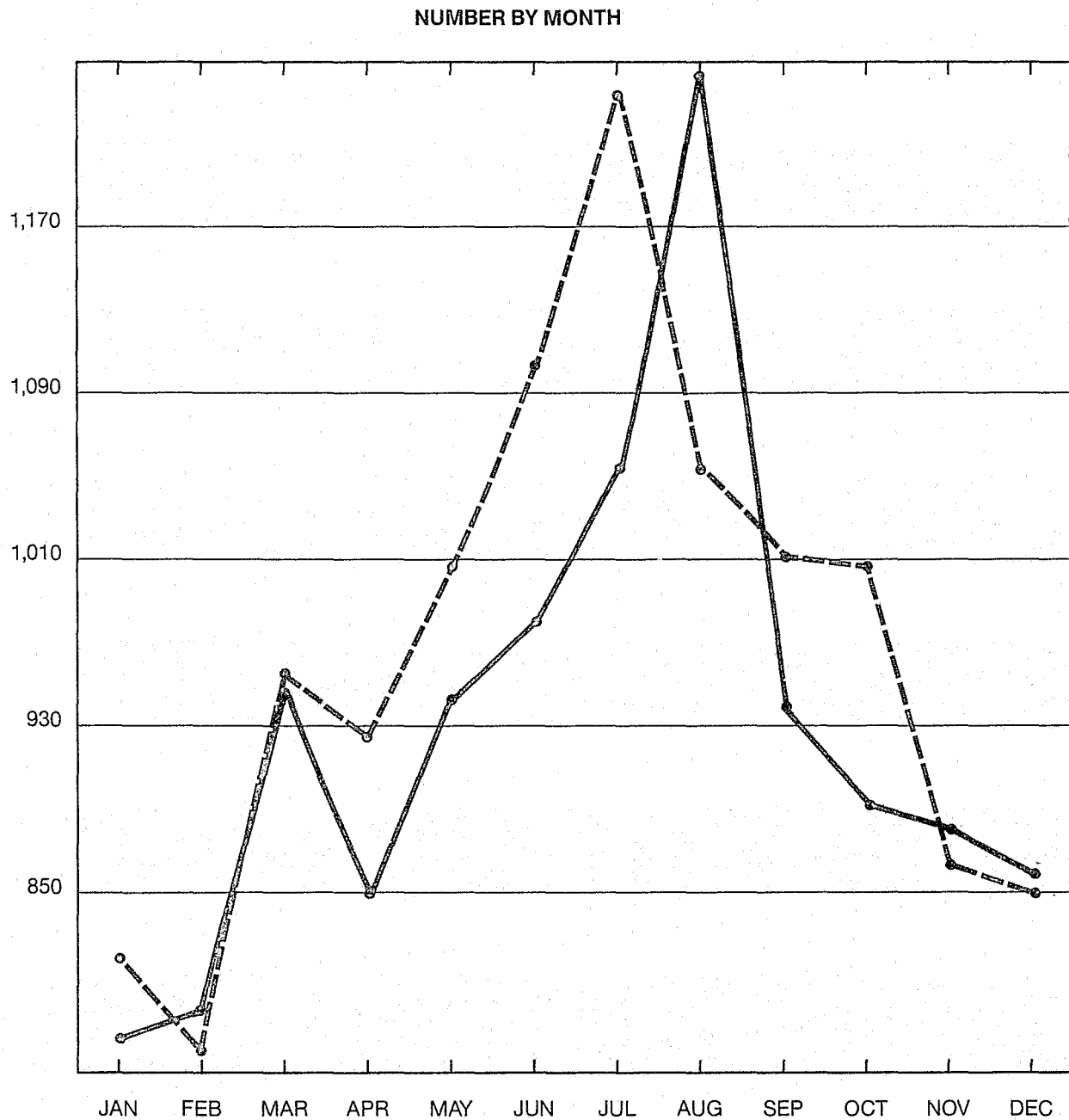
NUMBER BY MONTH



CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

Those crimes which are classified as crimes against the person are murder/nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, and aggravated assault. These offenses are often considered the most violent of crimes because of the personal confrontation of the victim with the perpetrator. The classification is based entirely on the motive of the crime and any involvement of money or theft is not considered in this classification.

1986 represented by broken line

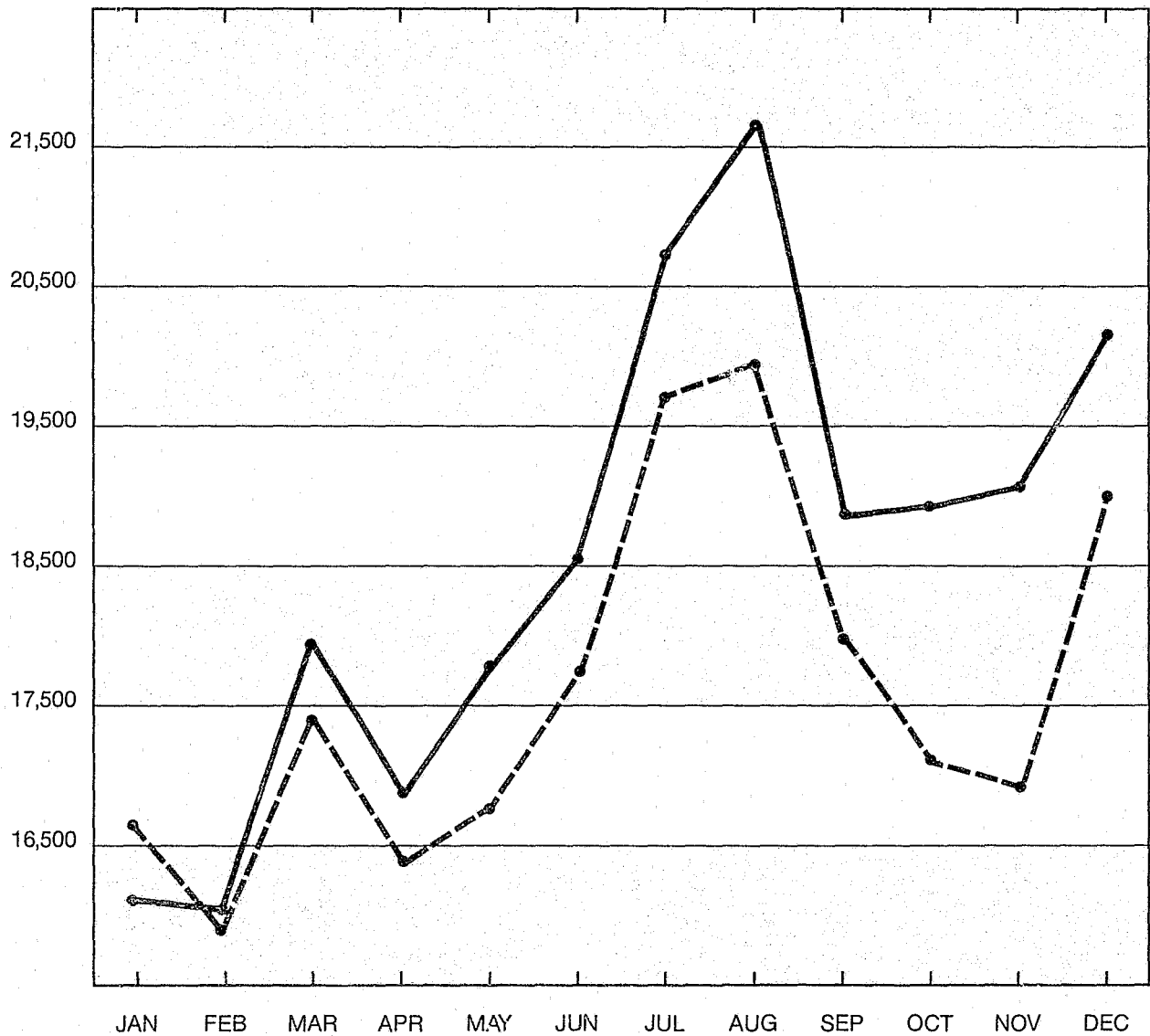
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY

Property crimes, under Uniform Crime Reporting, are the offenses of robbery, burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft. These offenses for the year of 1987 made up 95.2 percent of all reported Index Crimes.

Total value of property loss amounted to \$167,250,915.

These offenses for the year of 1986 made up 94.8 percent of all reported Index Crimes. Total value of property loss amounted to \$139,314,013.

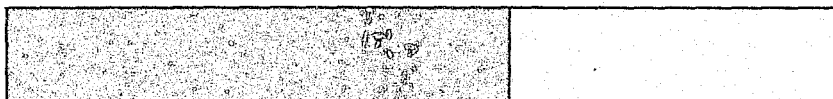

CLEARANCE RATES FOR INDEX OFFENSES

The percentage of crimes cleared is obtained by dividing the number of offenses cleared by the number of offenses known and multiplying the results by 100.

Example:

$$\frac{55 \text{ (Robberies cleared)} \times 100}{180 \text{ (Known Robbery Offenses)}} = 30.5\%$$

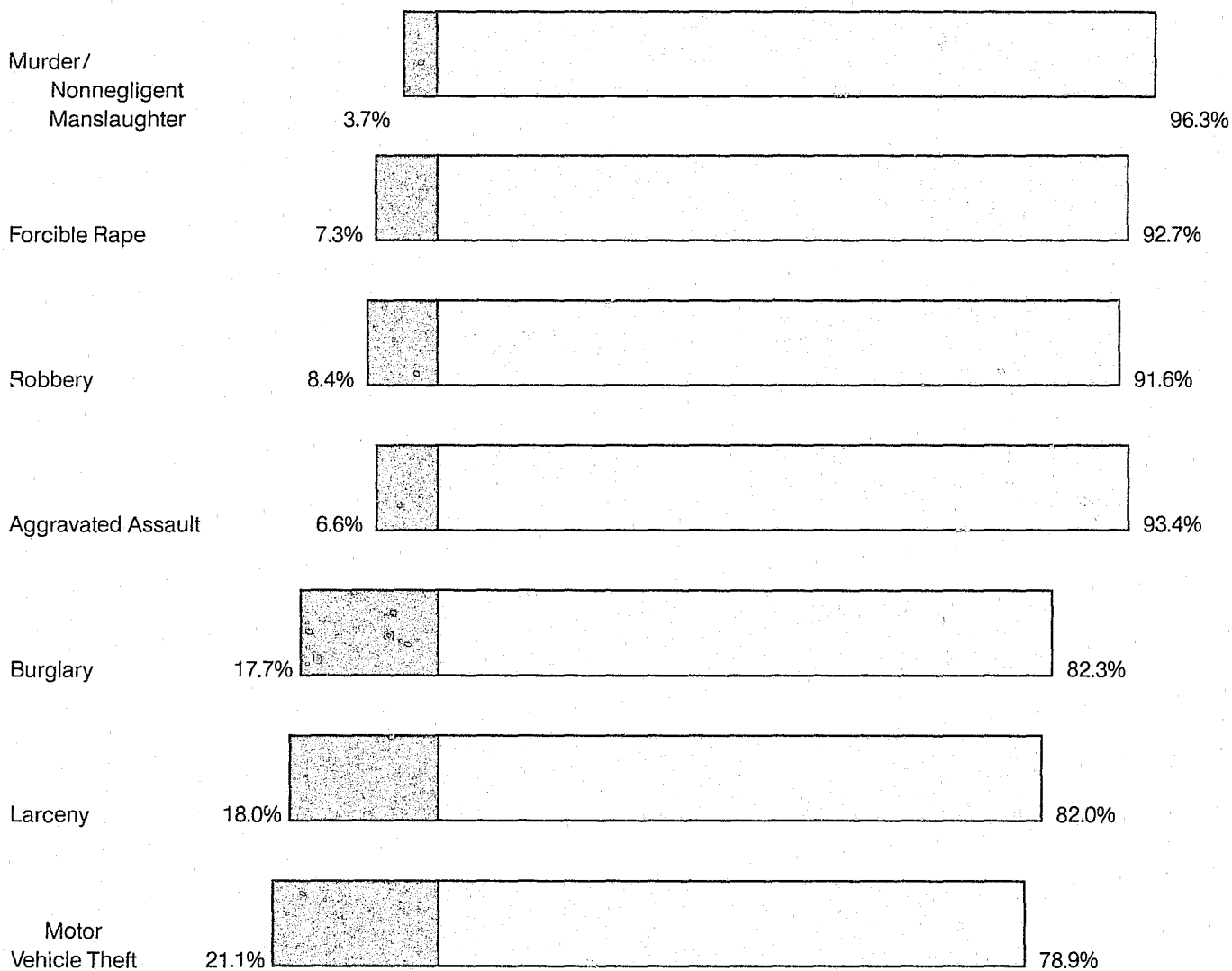

CALCULATION OF CRIME RATES

One of the most meaningful crime statistics used in Uniform Crime Reporting is the Crime Rate. This rate is the number of offenses per 100,000 inhabitants. This rate can be calculated regardless of the number of inhabitants in a city or county. To compute rates, divide the city's population by 100,00 and divide the number of offenses in each class by that answer. The answer is the number of offenses per 100,000 inhabitants and is your crime rate for that offense.

Example:

- A. Population for jurisdiction—75,286
- B. Number of Burglaries for that jurisdiction—215
- Divide 75,286 by 100,000 = 0.75286
- Divide 215 by 0.75286 = 285.58

The Crime Rate for Burglary in that jurisdiction is 285.58 per 100,000 inhabitants.

STOLEN AND RECOVERED



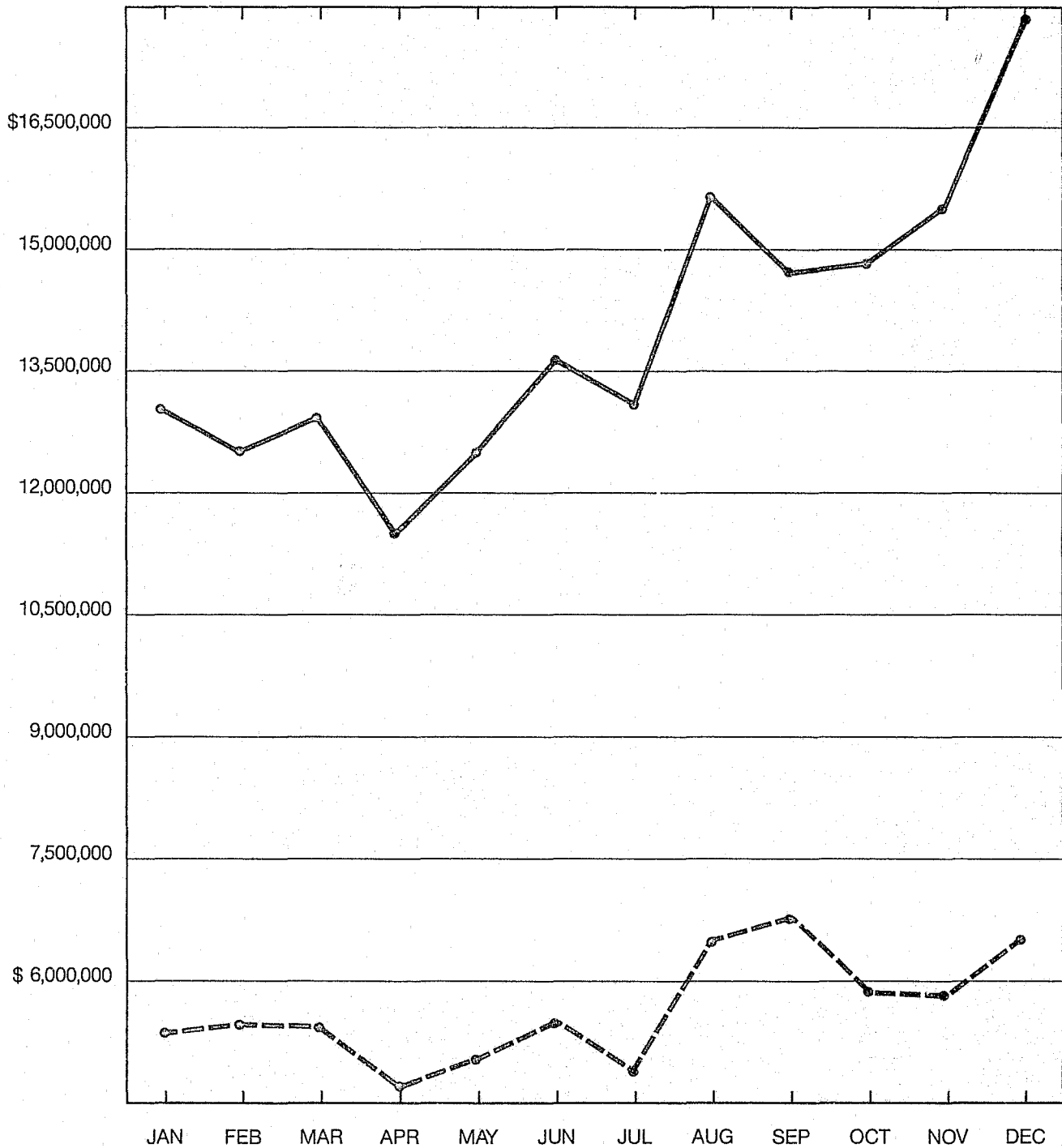

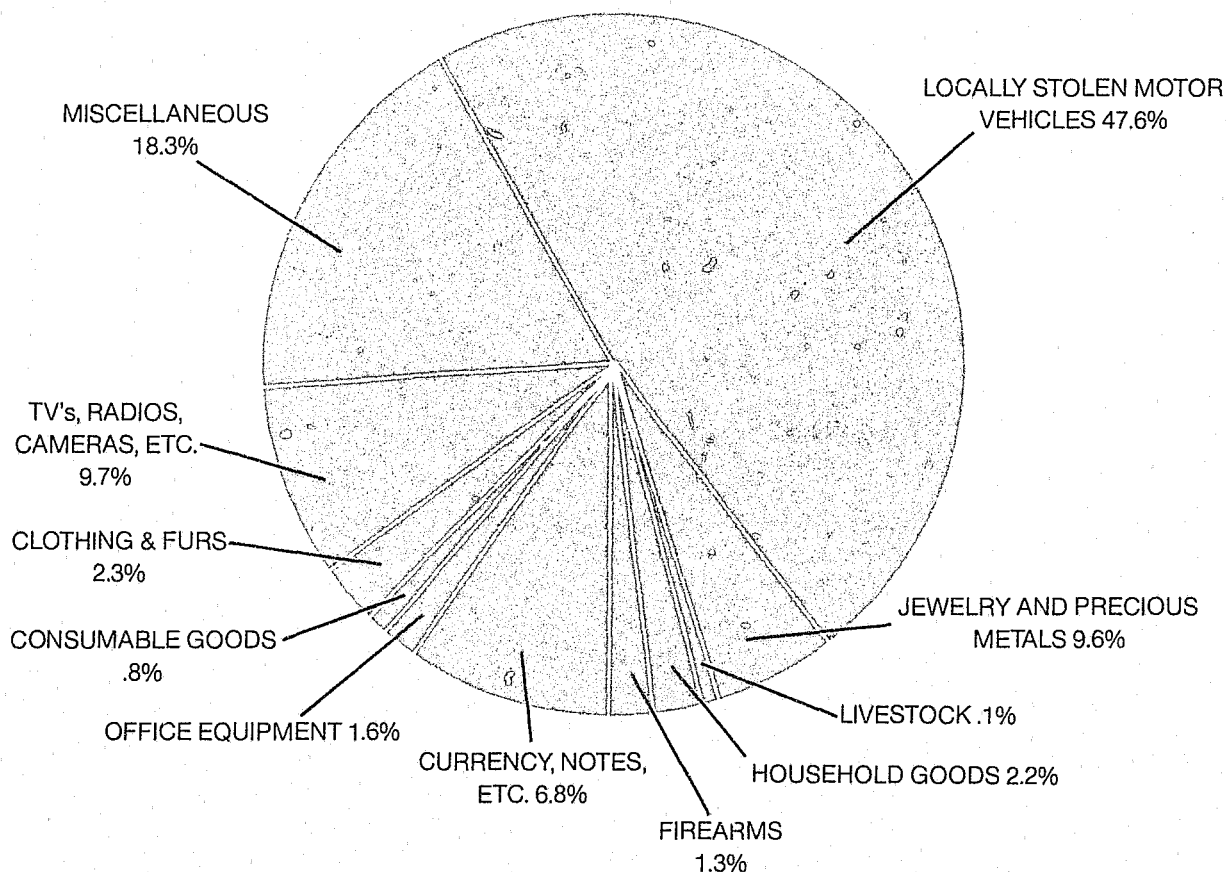

Arrest statistics reflecting characteristics of persons arrested by age, sex, race, and ethnic origin are collected monthly from contributing law enforcement agencies. In examining arrest figures it is important to remember they do not personally identify individuals arrested but represent the total number of persons arrested. One person may be arrested several times during a year for the same type of crime or for different offenses. Each arrest would be counted. Furthermore, arrest figures cannot be compared to offense figures because several persons could be arrested for the same offense, or the arrest of one person may solve several offenses. Arrests are primarily a measure of police activity as it relates to crime. Although law enforcement arrest policies vary, particularly with respect to juveniles, contributors to this program are instructed to count one arrest each time an individual is taken into custody for committing an offense. A juvenile is counted as a person arrested when he commits an offense and the circumstances are such if the offender were an adult, an arrest would be made. The data below compares 1987 to 1986 arrest statistics.

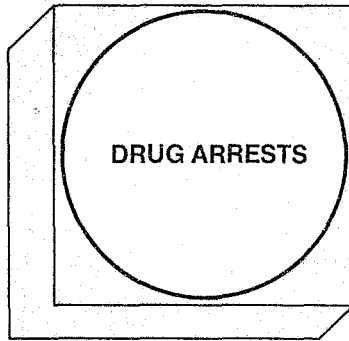
Percent Distribution of Persons Arrested By Sex, Race, and Ethnicity

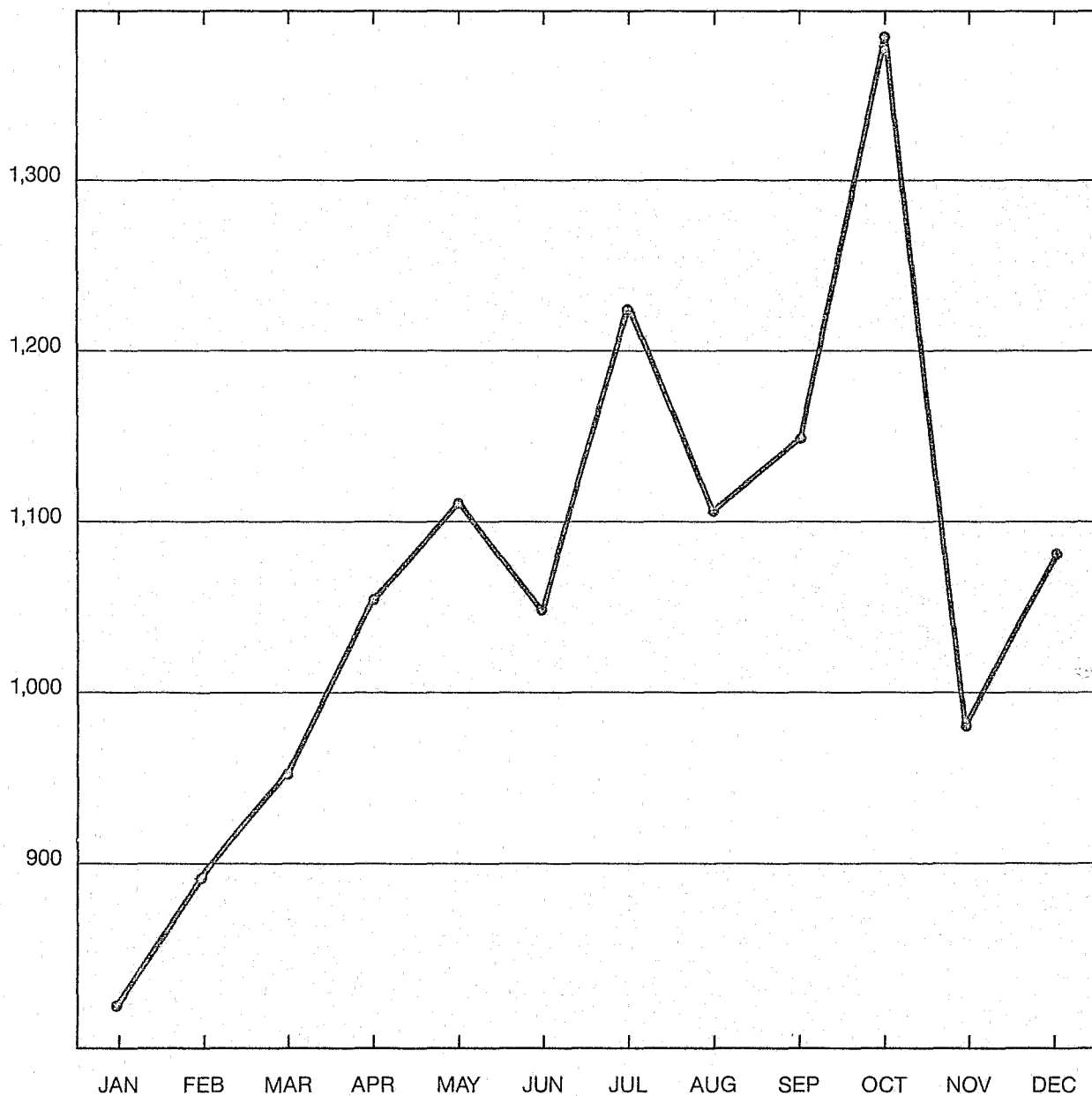
