INTRODUCTION

The following report constitutes the forty-first in a series of Juvenile Court Statistics published under the auspices of the Division of Youth Services (mandated by Missouri Statue P.S.Mo.-sec. 219.016.3). The presentation and organization of material in this report reflects the four major categories of juvenile referrals - Abuse/Neglect, Administrative, Law Violations, and Status Violations. Each of these categories is further examined through analysis of various demographic breakdowns.

About the Numbers

It is important to bear in mind that the numbers (frequencies of occurrences) presented in this report represent referrals to the Juvenile Courts, not the number of youths referred. An important point to reference pertains to the nature of the referrals.

Referrals, as recorded on the Missouri Statewide Juvenile Information System Form, represent a single delinquent act even though several offenses may have been committed at the same point in time by the child referred. Only the most serious crime is recorded per referral. Several referrals per-child per-year are possible. Use of this form by the reporting circuits is encouraged as it improves the reliability and accuracy of the data used for this report. For the purpose of analysis, the numbers presented here represent a "snapshot" of the Juvenile Court system for 1985.

The total population for the State of Missouri in 1980 (source: 1980 U.S. Census data) was 4,916,686 of which 52% were female (2,551,199) and 48% were male (2,365,487). Of that

total there were 1,269,684 persons age 16 and under (51% (650,219) male and 49% (619,465) female). Eighty-five percent of the juvenile population is white, 13.5% black, and 1.5% other. The number of children referred in 1985 was 32,569 or 2.5% of the juvenile population.

Table 1 presents the actual number of juveniles referred by race and sex. As defined by Missouri law, a juvenile (a person under the age of 17) is referred to the Juvenile Court not only for violations of the law but also when actions of another party impact upon the juvenile in a harmful manner (abuse/neglect).

Status referrals represent a category unique to the juvenile. Status offenses consist of conduct which is only a violation of the law when committed by a juvenile.

Administrative referrals consist mostly of Permanency Planning cases and represent actions taken by the court as a result of administering a particular case. Permanency Planning, which consists of two types of task force meetings, was established in May 1982 by the Missouri Supreme Court in order to expedite the placement of children in Foster Care with permanent guardians. Administrative referrals, other than Permanency Planning, include offenses such as "violation of a valid court order" or "violation of probation".

The average number of days between the time a child was referred and his/her court date (when formally adjudicated) was forty-six in 1985. When the case was disposed of informally, the average number of days between the referral date and the date of adjustment was nineteen.



Graph 2.1 illustrates the broad categories of referral by race and sex. Table 2.1, which will be referenced throughout this report, presents the broad categories of referral by metropolitan and non-metropolitan circuits. Metropolitan circuits include St. Louis City, St. Louis County, Jackson, and Clav counties. The Non-metropolitan category is comprised of all of the remaining circuits not listed above. Male referrals outnumber female by 2 to 1. Law violations make up the largest category of referrals with a ratio of male to female of 3.37 to other categories -- Abuse/Neglect, Status, Administrative are approximately balanced male to female. law offenders totaled 24,443 referrals. This compares with 34,772 remaining referrals for all of the other categories combined.

Table 2.2 points out the breakdowns of the four broad categories by race and sex. The distribution of black-to-white and male-to-female is approximately even across the categories except for those referral offenses which comprise the Law category.



In Table 2.3, Abuse/Neglect data tend to be skewed toward younger referrals with the 0-5 years group accounting for 41% of the referrals. Contrasted with this are Law violations where the 15-17 years group accounts for 60% of the referrals.



GRAPH 2.2 MOST FREQUENT REFERRALS




GRAPH 2.3 MOST FREQUENT REFERRALS



Graphs 2.2 and 2.3 show the ten most frequent categories of referral for male and female referrals. Notable differences include placement of Abuse/Neglect (fourth for males, second for females) and stealing offenses, ranked second for males and fifth for females. The six most frequent referrals for males account for 49% of all referrals. Status and Abuse/Neglect referrals constitute 50.8% of all referrals for females.

Graph 2.4 provides the broad categories of detention for the four basic referral categories. Of particular interest is the Administrative category where there are only 490 detentions out of a total of 6,796 referrals. Permanency Planning, with 5,542 referrals, constitutes the bulk of the Administrative category. When the Administrative category is considered without Permanency Planning, 39% of the remaining 1,254 referrals were detained. Overall, 28.5% of Abuse/Neglect referrals, 13.34% of Law violations, and 26.29% of Status referrals were detained in 1985.

The types of facilities used for detaining juveniles fall into two categories -- secure (Jail Detention, Secure Facility) and non-secure (Pre-hearing Placement).

Table 2.5 presents further elaboration on detention of juveniles. Average lengths of detention in the three types of detention facilities are:


Jail Detention 4.23 days
Secure Facility 11.78 days
Pre-hearing Placement 32.25 days

These average lengths of stay reflect the nature of the types of facilities. The fewest number of juveniles were detained for the shortest period of time in jail detention. Jail detention also reflects the nature of facilities available to local officials and is more common in non-metropolitan circuits. As of January 1, 1986, jail detention for juveniles is no longer permissible.

Graph 2.5 illustrates the skewed nature of the findings presented in Table 2.6 which lists outcomes of referrals by the four major categories.

The outcomes represent a dichotomy of referrals. True/out home, true/in home, true/no service, not true, motion to dismiss and dismiss for certification represent a category of outcomes formally adjudicated with petition to the court.

Adjust with supervision, adjust without supervision, adjust no action, transfer, and rejected represent informal actions taken by juvenile officers and other court personnel without formal petition to the courts. As shown in graph 2.5, most referrals were disposed of informally. It is interesting to note that 17% of the referrals were found to be not true, dismissed, or rejected.

Table 2.7 provides further analysis of these findings. Adjusted/no action, rejected, and allegation found not true make up 21.1% of all referrals while adjustment without supervision constitutes 20.8% of all referrals. Eighty-five percent of municipal violations were disposed of without petition to the court and this reflects a trend for the outcomes overall. Exceptions to this include Abuse/Neglect cases where 49% were disposed formally (with petition) and Administrative cases (not including Permanency Planning) where 52% were disposed with petition.

Table 2.8 lists certifications to Adult Court in 1985. Burglary, assault, and stealing cases represent the three offenses most often certified. Out of a total of 2,265 burglary cases, 27 were certified; of 2,768 assault cases, 13 were certified, and out of 7,627 cases of stealing, 10 were certified. Overall, a total of 83 cases out of 11,668 Law Offense referrals were certified or 7/10ths of one percent.

GRAPH 3.1 STATUS OFFENSE REFERRALS




Table 3.1 presents status offenses by the Metropolitan/Non-metropolitan and Sex categories. Status offenses represent a category unique to the juvenile, and, as previously stated, consist of activity which is a violation of the law only when committed by a juvenile. Status offenses include truancy, habitually absent from home, and behavior injurious to others.


The results here would seem to indicate that males are more likely to be involved in violent activity than females and that females are more likely to be habitually absent from home (run away from home). Rural females are twice as likely to run away from home as rural males; males in metropolitan circuits are more prone to truancy. Most categories, however, are relatively balanced male to female.

As evidenced in Table 3.2, jail detention occurs for status offenders only in the non-metropolitan circuits -- a reflection of the available facilities in certain counties as opposed to the degree of severity of the offense. Only 2.3 percent of status offenders were jail detained. As a polarity, 66.2% were detained in secure court-run facilities. A breakdown of other pre-hearing placements is shown in Graph 3.2.

GRAPH 3.2 OTHER PRE-HEARING PLACEMENTS




Status offenses are skewed toward the older age brackets. The largest single category is runaways (habitually absent from home) with 33.7% of all referrals. White, 15 years of age, was the largest segment within that subcategory. Twenty-two percent of all status referrals are white and fifteen years of age. Fifteen and sixteen year olds account for 48.1% of all status referrals.

The category of Abuse/Neglect encompasses a wide variety of referrals. For example, children are referred when they are:

- a. abandoned
- b. not receiving adequate care or support
- c. abused physically, emotionally, or sexually
- d. neglected physically or emotionally.

Upon receiving a report of abuse or neglect the court conducts an investigation or refers the case to a social agency.

The Division of Family Services maintains a Child Abuse/Neglect Hotline on a statewide basis. Professionals in many occupations are currently mandated to report suspected child abuse and neglect to the Division of Family Services. However, any person may report suspected child abuse or neglect.

Although several children from the same family may be called to the attention of the court by a single report, each child is considered a separate referral. The usual case in neglect referrals is for all of the children in the household to be referred. This occurs to a lesser extent in abuse referrals. Multiple Abuse/Neglect referrals may occur for the same child during the course of a single reporting year.

As shown in Table 4.1, physical abuse, sexual abuse, and neglect/improper care account for 61.3% of the Abuse/Neglect category. Improper care was the largest single category with 38.1% of all Abuse/Neglect referrals. Although not shown in Table 4.1, the numbers also indicate that there was a higher relative percentage of reported physical abuse in the non-metropolitan reporting areas.

Table 4.2 lists Abuse/Neglect referrals by referral source and metropolitan/non-metropolitan circuits. The Division of Family Services and law enforcement officials were responsible for 75.5% of all Abuse/Neglect referrals with the Division of providing 56.2%. Law enforcement Family Services alone referrals are shown to be more common in the metropolitan circuits and school referrals were three times more likely for the non-metropolitan circuits. Even though there were fewer non-metropolitan than metropolitan referrals for all categories combined, the non-metropolitan circuits had more Abuse/Neglect DFS referrals are especially prevalent for the non-metropolitan circuits.

Table 4.3B provides a detailed breakdown of the "other prehearing placements" by type of facility. 

As noted earlier, Permanency Planning consists of two types of task force meetings. Review Team meetings determine the continuing necessity and appropriateness of permanent placement. Dispositional Review Hearings determine the child's status concerning the possibility of returning home, placement for adoption, or the necessity of remaining in care for long-term placement.

Violation of probation constitutes the majority of the remaining administrative referrals with 36% of the total. A majority of the Non-permanency Planning Administrative referrals were distributed among younger referrals (the 0 to 11 years age bracket -- not shown above). When the category is viewed as a whole (i.e., with Permanency Planning included), the remaining Administrative referrals represent 18.5% of the Administrative category total.
