JUVENILE DETENTION AND CORRECTIONAL FACILITY CENSUS, 1986-1987: PUBLIC FACILITIES (ICPSR 8973)

SUMMARY: The purpose of this data collection is to provide information on the numbers and type of juveniles placed în state and local residential facilities for juvenile offenders and to facilitate the development of programs under the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974. The collection augments information currently available on the adequacy and needs of the nation's juvenile correctional system. Six types of public facilities are covered: (1) detention centers, (2) shelters, (3) reception or diagnostic centers, (4) training schools, (5) ranches, forestry camps, and farms, and (6) halfway houses and group homes. Data are provided in this collection on the number of juveniles held according to age, sex, race, ethnic origin, reason for custody, facility type, and number of staff and educational programs. CLASS IV

UNIVERSE: All state county, and city operated public juvenile facilities in the United States. These include residential programs and group homes that were (1) in operation on February 2, 1987, (2) housed three or more residents, at least 50 percent of whom were juvenile, and (3) had accused or adjudicated delinquents or status offenders making up at least one percent of the daily population.

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#### I. Purpose

#### A. Sponsorship

The 1987 Juvenile Facility Census was sponsored by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, with the data collection effort done by the Bureau of the Census. The Census updated and expanded the data base from the 1985 Juvenile Facility Census.

#### B. Justification

The 1987 Census was authorized by the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended (42 U.S.C. 3732) and conducted under an inter-agency agreement with the Department of Justice and Census Bureau. The findings of this census will be compared to earlier efforts so changes and trends can be measured.

#### C. Uses/Users of the Data

Collected data will be used by Department of Justice officials to develop programs under the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, as amended, and otherwise improve assistance provided to those concerned with juvenile problems. Without this collection effort, information on a national level on the adequacy and needs of the juvenile correctional system would not be available. Some users of these data include the following:

A public use tape which includes all the information obtained from public facilities will also be placed at the Archives Network at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. Interested researchers may obtain copies of the data codebooks and access to data for their own research.

#### II. Methodology

#### A. Census Coverage

The 1987 census collected information on 1-day counts of juveniles and facilities as of February 2, 1987, and annual data for the calendar, or fiscal year, 1986.

Residential programs and group homes in operation on February 2, 1987, were included in the census if they housed three or more residents; if at least 50% of the residents were juveniles; and if accused or adjudicated delinquents and status offenders were at least 1% of their average daily population. In California, however, all California Youth Authority facilities were included in the census. Juvenile facilities operated as part of adult jails were excluded, as were nonresidential facilities, facilities exclusively for drug or alcohol abusers or nonoffenders, and Federal juvenile correctional facilities.

All State, county and city operated public juvenile facilities were included in the census. A facility was classified as private if it was staffed by non-public employees. The following types of facilities were included in the census:

- . Detention Center
- . Shelter
- . Reception or Diagnostic Center
- . Training School
- . Ranch, Camp, and Farm
- . Halfway House and Group Home

The public facility universe was first updated using the American Correctional Association Directory of Juvenile amd Adult Correctional Institutions. Following this, each State's department having responsibility for juvenile corrections was sent a listing of their facilities along with a letter requesting that they verify and/or update the listing and return it to the Census Bureau. In addition, other sources such as annual reports. State criminal justice directories and personal contacts were used to complete the update. For private facilities, facility listings were sent to various local juvenile courts and social service placement agencies asking them to verify and update the list which they use to place juvenile offenders. State juvenile correctional departments were also asked to do the same.

#### B. Data Collection

1. There were several new sections added to both the public and private questionnaires for the 1987 census. The following is a description of the new sections added:

The additional questions extended data collection, data processing and other followup procedures. Due to added length, 40% of the private facilities did not report complete data for their facility. These facilities are coded with 10 8's in data field #584 of the private data file.

- 2. This effort was a complete census therefore all known juvenile correctional facilities were surveyed. The data were obtained through mailed questionnaires. A followup 2nd mailing and nonresponse telephone calls were made to encourage reporting.
- 3. Data Collection Activities Data collection activities were carried out in Washington for the public forms and in Jeffersonville, Indiana for the private ones. Below is the schedule of operations.

- 4. Response Rate The public sector had a response rate of 99.9 percent yielding 1,107 facilities. Only two facilities refused to participate in the census. The private sector had a response rate of 80 percent yielding 2,239 facilities.
- 5. Non-response followup Nonresponse telephone followup began in December 1987 for both the public and private facilities. There were 125 public and 1,200 private facility nonrespondents contacted by telephone.

#### C. Data Processing Activities

An extensive quality control procedure was applied to data in the file. A manual edit of each questionnaire was conducted by Census staff. During the edit, an item-by-item comparison of the 1985 data with the 1987 data was made for each facility. After another professional review, they were sent to Jeffersonville, Indiana for data keying. After data was transmitted back to Washington, an extensive computer edit was applied to the entire file to check for internal consistencies and punching errors. Error listings were reviewed and resolved and a final computer edit was run against the file to catch any undetected errors. A tally program was then used to create summary tables which were closely analyzed making comparisons to the 1985 data.

#### D. Data Limitations

 Public facilities - Data limitations were fewer for the public facilities than the private due mainly to the good rapport shared with the public sector administrators. However, there are a few.

First, there were 63 formerly private facilities in the state of New York that transferred auspices to the public sector. This was brought about by a change in making all the contract personnel running the homes, State employees. This will result in a large increase in the number of facilities in the State of New York. There were five Michigan State facilities that chose to report data on 1 form since all 5 facilities were on the same campus under one director. Two county facilities also in Michigan did the same.

2. Private facilities - Private facility response proved to be about 50 percent before telephone followup began. Telephone followup brought the figure to 80 percent, however, not all data was collected during this phase of data collection due to the length of the questionnaire and unavailability of data. Data for sections IV H and L; XI A - number of juveniles enrolled; XI B - number of juveniles enrolled (except for drug and alcohol dependency); XI C - medical service; XIII A and XIII B - access to records; was not collected during telephone followup. For these records, there are 10 - 8's keyed in data field \$584 of the record, signifying incomplete data for the particular facility. Those facilities that responded have complete data for each facility.

#### E. Special Coding:

Each facility record has several special numbers or codes in it that were computer generated, based on the data that was obtained from the census. Each facility record has the average age of male and female juveniles, in years and months, calculated for the male and female juveniles in the facility on the reference date. This calculation is located as follows:

Another calculation done by computer is the facility census classification code. Each facility is also asked to classify itself and this self-classification is located in field #38.

Each facility was coded as either short-term or long-term based on the purpose for which most juveniles were held. Short-term facilities typically hold juveniles awaiting adjudication or other disposition. Long-term facilities generally hold juveniles who have been adjudicated and committed to custody.

The environment of each facility was also categorized as institutional or open, based on security arrangements and the degree of access residents had to community resources. Institutional environments impose greater restraints on residents' movements and limit access to the community. Most detention or diagnostic centers, training schools and ranches were classified as having institutional environments. Open environments allow greater movement of residents within the facility and more access to the community. Facilities with open environments included mainly shelters, halfway houses, group homes, and a few ranches.

One of the following codes was computer generated based on the above characteristics reported by each facility on the census form and placed into field #638:

INSTITUTIONAL - Code = 3 Open - Code = 4 Another code placed in the facility record is the region code. This code is used to identify the region in which the facility is located and is placed in the ASCII position #21 of the identification section. A region code listing, by state, is located in the appendix.

Whenever data was not available for the number of juveniles enrolled in education and treatment programs (sections XI A&B) and for capital expenditures (section XII B), ten 9's were keyed into that particular data field (for both public and private files). The following data fields may have ten 9's in them indicating that data for that item was not available:
