

Fiscal Year Summary Report  
of Population Movement  
1988

This publication is designed to provide an overall view of the volume and movement of offenders under the supervision of Wisconsin's Division of Corrections during the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1988. The Division of Corrections is responsible for both the operation of correctional facilities for adult and juvenile offenders as well as for the supervision of offenders residing in the community under probation, parole, mandatory release, special action early release, or juvenile aftercare supervision. The information contained in Tables 1 through 4 is a compilation of data originally published in the monthly report Statistical Bulletin C-59, Report of Wisconsin Corrections Population. Information about average daily populations and movement into and out of correctional institutions for adult offenders during fiscal year 1988 is presented in Table 1. This table also includes, in the columns labeled "contr. fac." information about offenders serving Wisconsin sentences under contractual arrangements in facilities operated by the federal government and in Wisconsin county jails. Information concerning offenders serving sentences at the Wisconsin Resource Center, an institution operated by the Division of Care and Treatment Facilities, is not included in Table 1.

Fiscal year movements and average daily population data for Ethan Allen and Lincoln Hills Schools, Wisconsin's facilities for juvenile offenders, are presented in Table 2 while information about the youth aids program appears in Table 2-A.

Table 3 displays information about the movements of offenders under field supervision in the community and data about absconders from field supervision is included in Table 4.

Average daily populations of offenders in correctional institutions or under supervision in the community during fiscal years 1984 through 1988 are presented in Table A. Data relating to absconders from field supervision are not included in this table.

Wisconsin's Division of Corrections was responsible for the supervision of 37,207 offenders on June 30, 1988; an increase of 3.7 percent over the 35,886 offenders under supervision on June 30, 1987. The population in residence in correctional institutions for adult offenders rose from 5,676 at the start to 5,790 at the end of fiscal year 1988; an increase of 2.0 percent. The resident population in juvenile institutions remained relatively the same with 515 residents at the start and 511 at the end of fiscal year 1988. Adults and juveniles reported in footnote a, Tables 1 and 2, as being absent with leave are not included in these population figures. Community supervision cases rose from 26,197 on July 1, 1987 to 27,013 on June 30, 1988; an increase of 3.1 percent. (See Table 3.) The number of community supervision cases on absconder status increased 11.3 percent from 3,498 at the beginning to 3,893 at the end of the fiscal year.

The average daily population of offenders under Division of Corrections supervision during fiscal year 1988 was 32,420; an increase of 4.2 percent over the previous year's average daily population of 31,116 offenders. Fiscal year average daily populations have risen steadily from 27,724 in 1984 to 32,420 in 1988; an overall increase of 16.9 percent during the five-year period. (See Table A.) Community supervision cases made up four-fifths, approximately 80.0 percent, of the average daily population throughout the five-year period.

During the fiscal years 1984-1988 the average daily population of offenders under some type of community supervision increased 15.5 percent from 22,608 cases in fiscal year 1984 to 26,115 cases in fiscal year 1988. The average daily population of offenders under probation supervision rose from 19,201 in 1984 to 22,333 in 1988; an increase of 16.3 percent. During that time period the average daily population of offenders under adult probation supervision increased 16.4 percent from 18,676 in 1984 to 21,740 in 1988. The overall average daily population of offenders under some type of parole supervision rose 11.0 percent from 3,407 in 1984 to 3,782 in fiscal year 1988. During 1988 the average daily population of adult offenders under some type of parole supervision was 3,385; a high for the five-year period and an increase of 2.7 percent over the 1987 average daily population of 3,295. The average daily population of juveniles under aftercare supervision dropped from the five-year high of 190 in 1986 to a low of 167 in 1988; a decrease of 12.1 percent. The decrease in the average daily population of youthful offenders is due to the repeal of the Youthful Offender Statute effective on July 1, 1978 while the almost total absence of juveniles under probation supervision is attributable to a Department of Health and Social Services policy decision to discontinue the provision of such services on a state level.

The average daily population of offenders in correctional institutions for adult and juvenile offenders rose steadily from 5,116 in 1984 to 6,305 in fiscal year 1988; an increase of 23.2 percent. The bulk of the increase was in institutions for adults where the average daily populations rose steadily from a low of 4,671 in fiscal year 1984 to a high of 5,781 during fiscal year 1988; an increase of 23.8 percent. Juvenile institution average daily populations were at a low of 445 in 1984, increased 20.0 percent to the five-year high of 534 in 1986, decreased 5.4 percent to 505 in 1987, and then increased 3.8 percent to 524 during fiscal year 1988.
