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PREFACE

California Prisoners and Parolees, 1987, is a presentation of statistical data about felons and non felons under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Corrections (CDC). Statistical data on felons in CDC have been published since 1950 when the first issue of California Prisoners, covering the years 1945 through 1949, was released. Statistical data on civilly committed narcotic addicts have been published since 1967 when the first issue of Summary Statistics, Civil Commitment Program for Narcotic Addicts, covering the years 1961 through 1966, was published. Beginning in 1980, the two were combined into one publication. With the Civil Narcotic Addict Program decreasing in size and emphasis since the 1970's, and the felon institution population and parole population growing so fast, the publication has been changed to place more emphasis on felon inmates and parolees. The Civil Narcotic Addict Program is covered in the last chapter along with other CDC populations.

The first chapter is a summary of the total departmental population and movements into and out of the institutions and parole regions during Calendar Year 1987. The second chapter looks at felons newly received from court. The next chapter covers characteristics of the institution population on December 31, 1987. The fourth chapter looks at the behavior of inmates in the institutions, while the fifth chapter is a summary of characteristics of parolees. The sixth chapter covers parole movements, and finally, the last chapter looks at other populations in CDC: the Civil Narcotic Addict Program, the County Diagnostic Cases, the Community Based (work furlough and local jails) Programs, Inmates on Death Row , and Parolees at Large (PAL) .

The Director of Corrections administered sixteen institutions in 1987 and four parole regions. The types of commitments received by CDC are Felons, Civil Narcotic Addicts, County Diagnostic Cases (under Penal Code Section 1203.03), some Youth Authority commitments, federal prisoners, and prisoners from other states.


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HIGHUIGHUS

On December 31, 1987, the California Department of Corrections' total population reached 120,510. This was an all time high for the department.

On December 31, 1987, there were 42,298 felons and civil addicts on parole in California.

The institution population at the end of the year totalled 66,975, again, the largest population ever experienced by CDC.

There were 25,204 Parole Violators Returned to Custody (PV-RTC's) during Calendar Year 1987, the most in CDC history.


The CDC institution population increased 12,6% (7,491) since December 31, 1986.


The incarceration rate for CDC reached an all time high of 239 inmates per 100,000 California Population.

The number of felon releases to parole reached an all time high of 50.512.



TOTAL CDC POPULATION

The California Department of Corrections (CDC) population reached a high of 120,510.

- The institution population was at an all time high of 66,975. This included:
- 64,904 in institutions and camps.
- 1,690 in Community Based Facilities.
- 381 in Dept. of Mental Health Facilities.
- The California supervised parole population was at 42,298. There were:
 - 40,590 felons and civil narcotic addicts under CDC supervision.
 - 1,708 parolees from other states being supervised in California (ICOOPS: See Glossary on page 71).
- Non CDC jurisdictions totalled 2,702.
 - 1,646 inmates being supervised by other state, federal or juvenile jurisdictions.
- 1,056 California parolees being supervised by other jurisdictions (ISPU: See Glossary on page 71.).
- Other CDC populations totalled 8,535. There were:
 - 1,152 inmates out to court.
 - 457 inmates on escape status.
 - 166 inmates in work furlough status being housed in county jails.
 - 6,760 felons and civil addicts absconding from parole and suspended (PAL/RAL).




The CDC institution population reached an all time high of 66,975.

- The institution population increased 12.6% (7,491) from December 31, 1986.
- The institution population has increased 241.3% (47,352) since 1977 and 93.3% (32,335) since 1982.
- The incarceration rate increased to 239 per 100,000 California population. This was an all time high for CDC.
- The design capacity of CDC institutions was 41,094.
- The CDC institution population was 157.9% of the design capacity.


- 44,811 (66.9%) new admissions from court.

- 577 (0.9%) others, including escape returns and psychiatric returns.







INSTITUTION POPULATION BY RETURN STATUS





INSTITUTION MOVEMENTS, RECEIVED

- 26,649 felon new admissions received from court.
- 25,204 parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTC's).
- 6,377 parole violators returned with new terms from court (PV-WNT's).
- 1,296 new civil narcotic addict admissions received from court.
- 2,513 county diagnostic cases received.
- 690 escape returns to CDC institutions.

INSTITUTION MOVEMENTS, RELEASED

- 50,512 inmates were paroled from CDC institutions and from temporary release status.
 - 28,134 were first releases to parole.
 - 22,378 were being re-released to parole.
- 2,510 county diagnostic cases were discharged from CDC institutions.
- 761 inmates escaped from CDC institutions and community based facilities. Of this total, 75 were from institutions and camps and 686 were from community based facilities.
- 95 inmates died in CDC institutions.
- 1,827 civil narcotic addicts were released to parole outpatient status.







PAROLE MOVEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1987





HIGHUGHUS

Felon New Admissions From Court reached 26,649, an all time high for the Department of Corrections. (CDC).

Felon New Admissions From Court increased 13.2% in 1987 compared to Calendar Year 1986.

More than half (59.4%) of Felon New Admissions were under the age of 30. The admission rate for Felon New Admissions in Calendar Year 1987 was 96.3 admissions per 100,000 California population. This rate was the highest ever experienced by CDC:

The number of Felon Drug Admissions reached an all time high of 7,637. The admission rate of 27.6 per 100,000 California Population was the highest in CDC history.

Admissions from Los Angeles County accounted for 43.7% of total felon admissions to CDC.


California Department of Corrections New Felon Admissions from Court reached an all time high of 26,649.

- Felon admissions increased 3,117 (13.2%) over felon admissions in 1986.
- Felon admissions have increased 67.3% since 1982 and 252.6% since 1977.
- The number of male admissions was 24,300, while the number of female admissions totalled 2,349.
- The rate of admission to CDC for felon new admissions reached a high of 96.3 per 100,000 California population.
- The admission rate compares to 34.6 during 1977, 64.4 during 1982, and 87.2 during 1986.


OFFENSE CATEGORIES CALENDAR YEAR 1987

- Other offenses made up the remaining 4.1% (1,066) of admissions.



VIOLENT OFFENSE GROUPS

The number of felon admissions committing violent offenses decreased 15.4% from 1982 to 1987 (from 46.5% to 31.1%) as a percentage of the admission population. This was mainly due to the large increase in drug admissions during 1987 (see page 14).

- Homicides accounted for 1,460 (5.6%) of new admissions from court. There were:
 - 385 (1.5%) Murder First admissions.
 - 406 (1.6%) Murder Second admissions.
 - 500 (1.9%) Manslaughter admissions.
 - 169 (0.6%) Manslaughter by Vehicle admissions.
- There were 2,936 (11.3%) Robbery admissions. This represented the largest group of violent crimes.
- Sex crimes accounted for 1,736 (6.7%) of new admissions from court. There were:
 - 504 (1.9%) admissions for Rape.
 - 957 (3.7%) admissions for Lewd Acts With a Child.
 - 275 (1.1%) admissions for Other Sex crimes.
- Assault with a Deadly Weapon accounted for 1,524 (5.8%) of new admissions.
- Other Assaults accounted for 276 (1.1%) of felon new admissions.
- Kidnapping accounted for 162 (0.6%) of new admissions from court.






VIOLENT OFFENSE GROUPS

PROPERTY OFFENSE GROUPS

Property offenses in 1987 decreased 4.7% since 1982 (35.4% to 40.1%) as a percentage of all admissions. Property offenses had an actual increase in number of 2,821 from 1982.

- Burglary First and Second Degree accounted for 4,763 (18.3%) of new admissions from court. These were the two largest of the property offense groups. There were:
 - 2,869 (11.0%) for Burglary First Degree.
 - 1,894 (7.3%) for Burglary Second Degree.
- Grand Theft was the next largest property offense group accounting for 1,047 (4.0%) admissions.
- Petty Theft With a Prior accounted for 843 (3.2%) admissions.
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 826 (3.2%) admissions.
- Auto thefts accounted for 954 (3.7%) admissions. There were:
 - 221 (0.9%) admitted for Grand Theft Auto.
- 733 (2.8%) admitted for Vehicle Theft.
- Forgery accounted for 636 (2.4%) of admissions.
- Other Theft accounted for 145 (0.6%) of new admissions from court.

DRUG OFFENSE GROUPS


Drug offenses accounted for 29.4% (7,637) of new admissions to CDC. This represented the most drug admissions ever received by CDC. Drug admissions have increased 450.6% since 1982, 635.0% since 1977, and 39.7% since 1986.

- CSS I & II (see note) accounted for 5,145 (19.8%) admissions.
- CSS III, IV & V (see note) accounted for 1,474 (5.7%) admissions.
- Marijuana accounted for 941 (3.6%) admissions.
- Other Drugs accounted for 77 (0.3%) admissions.






OTHER OFFENSE GROUPS CALENDAR YEAR 1987





Blacks, Whites and Mexican/Americans each represented over thirty percent of New Admissions from Court.

- Blacks accounted for 33.2% (8,835) of admissions and represented the largest racial/ethnic group.
- Whites accounted for 30.7% (8,173) of admissions.
- Mexican/Americans accounted for 30.6% (8,154) of admissions.
- Other racial/ethnic groups accounted for 5.5% (1,476) of admissions.


AGE GROUPS

The majority of admissions were under 30 years of age. This group represented 59.4% of felon admissions during 1987.

- The 20 to 24 year old age group accounted for 28.6% (7,622) of admissions.
- The 25 to 29 year old age group accounted for 26.4% (7,037) of admissions.
- The next largest age group was the 30 to 34 year old group, representing 18.5% (4,920) of admissions.
- The smallest age group was 60 years and older, or 0.7% (185). The next smallest group was the 55 to 59 year old group.
- The median age of new admissions was 28 years.


COUNTY AND AREA OF ADMISSION

- 17,580 (66.2%) felons were admitted from Southern California.
- 4,212 (15.9%) felons were admitted from the San Francisco Bay Area.
- 4,743 (17.9%) felons were admitted from the rest of the state.
- The admission rate for Southern California was 63.6 per 100,000 California population, while it was only 15.2 and 17.1 for the San Francisco Bay Area and the rest of the state, respectively.
- The admission rate for felons admitted from Los Angeles County was 42.0 per 100,000 California population.
- Los Angeles County alone accounted for 11,607 (43.7%) of new admissions from court.
- San Diego was the next largest county of commitment, accounting for 1,534 (5.8%) of new admissions.
- Santa Clara County admitted the most in the San Francisco Bay Area, accounting for 1,198 (4.5%) of new admissions.
- Alpine County did not have any new admissions committed to CDC.





TEN LARGEST COUNTIES OF ADMISSION CALENDAR YEAR 1987





RATE OF ADMISSION BY COUNTY POPULATION

- Sierra County had the highest rate of admission at 264.7 per 100,000 county population (although it had only 9 admissions).
- Lake County had the second highest rate of admission at 190.9 per 100,000 county population.
- Kings County had the next highest rate per county population at 166.1.
- Los Angeles County, which has the highest rate of admission per state population, had an admission rate of only 136.8 per county population.
- Mariposa County had the lowest admission rate (except for Alpine county which had no commitments) at 14.3 per 100,000 county population.

MARITAL STATUS

- 38.6% of new admissions were single upon reception to CDC.
- 61.4% of new admissions had been married at least once.
- 27.1% were divorced or separated.
- 25.7% were married once.
- 6.3% were married twice.
- 1.7% were married three times.
- 0.6% had spouses who were deceased.

DRUG HISTORY

- Inmates with a past history of cocaine use represented the largest group of drug users among new admissions at 26.4%.
- Those with a history of heroin use was the next largest group at 24.5%.
- Marijuana use was the next largest drug group at 13.3%.
- 6.4% of new admissions had a history of methamphetamine or amphetamine use.
- 21.7% of new admissions had no history of drug use.

Note: Only the most serious drug used was considered for drug history. It is possible that more than one drug has been used.



ALCOHOL HISTORY


- 62.8% of new admissions had no history of alcohol abuse. This group either did not use alcohol or used it on social occasions.
- 8.5% of new admissions were under the influence of alcohol at the time they committed their offense.
- 28.7% of new admissions had either past or current alcohol abuse before entering CDC.

INTELLIGENCE STATUS MALE FELONS CALENDAR YEAR 1987





INTELLIGENCE STATUS

- Over half (52.3%) of male new admissions were considered of normal/average intelligence.
- 11.6% of male new admissions were considered to be above average intelligence.
 - 0.2% were tested as being at genius level.
 - 3.2% were tested as being superior.
 - 8.2% were tested as being bright normal
- 5.4% of male new admissions were considered to be of defective intelligence.

EDUCATIONAL GRADE PLACEMENT CALENDAR YEAR 1987



GRADE LEVEL PLACEMENT

Over 66% of new admissions were placed in the 7th grade or above during Calendar Year 1987.

- 7.1% (1,894) of new admissions were tested as being illiterate, that is, the second grade level or below.
- 13.3% (3,545) of new admissions tested at the twelfth grade level or above.
- The median grade level of new admissions was the eighth grade.

Violent offenses accounted for close to half (47.7%) of the institution population on December 31, 1987.


The number of inmates in CDC prisons for drug offenses had increased 38.8% since December 31, 1986.


There were 66,975 inmates in California Department of Corrections institutions. This represented a 241.3% increase from 1977 and a 93.3% increase from 1982.

• There were 62,823 (93.8%) men and 4,152 (6.2%) women in the institution population.

- 1,763 (2.6%) civil narcotic addicts.



VIOLENT OFFENSE GROUPS

Almost half (47.7%) of those incarcerated were committed for violent offenses. The number of violent offenders increased 13,188 from 1982 and increased 20,571 from 1977. Violent offenses decreased as a percentage of the total population since 1982.

- Homicides accounted for 8,755 (13.3%) of those incarcerated. There were:
 - 3,960 (6.0%) Murder First inmates.
 - 2,832 (4.3%) Murder Second inmates.
 - 1,645 (2.5%) Manslaughter inmates.
 - 318 (0.5%) Manslaughter by Vehicle inmates.
- Robbery accounted for 10,474 (15.9%) of the population, this represented the largest group of violent crimes.
- Assault With a Deadly Weapon accounted for 4,015 (6.1%) of the population.
- Other Assaults accounted for 651 (1.0%) of the population.
- Sex crimes accounted for 6,728 (10.2%) of the CDC institution population. There were:
 - 2,542 (3.9%) Rapists in prison.
 - 2,922 (4.4%) incarcerated for Lewd Acts With a Child.
 - 1,264 (1.9%) incarcerated for Other Sex crimes.
- Kidnapping accounted for 919 (1.4%).

VIOLENT OFFENSE GROUPS DECEMBER 31, 1987






PROPERTY OFFENSE GROUPS

Those incarcerated for property offenses accounted for 30.9% of those in prison at the end of 1987. Property offenses increased 10,804 from 1982 and 15,669 from 1977. As a percentage of the institution population, property offenses increased only slightly since 1982.

- Burglary First and Second Degree accounted for 12,276 (18.5%) of those in prison. These were the two largest groups of property offenses. There were:
- 8,609 (13.0%) in prison for Burglary First Degree.
- 3,667 (5.5%) in prison for Burglary Second Degree.
- Petty Theft With a Prior was the next largest property offense group, accounting for 1,809 (2.7%) of those in prison.
- Grand Theft accounted for 1,670 (2.5%).
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 1,558 (2.4%).
- Auto thefts accounted for 1,812 (2.8%). There were:
 - 428 (0.7%) incarcerated for Grand Theft Auto.
- 1,384 (2.1%) incarcerated for Vehicle Theft.
- Forgery accounted for 1,110 (1.7%) of those in prison.
- Other Theft accounted for 211 (0.3%) of the institution population.


Drug offenses accounted for 11,636 (17.6%) of those in CDC prisons. This number represents an increase of 9,424 (426.0%) since the end of 1982, and 3,252 (38.8%) since 1986.

- CSS I & II (see note) accounted for 7,819 (11.8%) of those incarcerated.
- CSS III, IV & V (see note) accounted for 2,524 (3.8%) of those incarcerated.
- Marijuana accounted for 1,145 (1.7%) of those in prison.
- Other drug offenses accounted for 148 (0.3%) of those in prison.





OTHER OFFENSE GROUPS DECEMBER 31, 1987



RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS

- Blacks accounted for 34.9% (23,384) of the institution population. This represents the largest racial/ethnic group in the institution population.
- Whites accounted for 32.5% (21,747) of the institution population.
- Mexican/American inmates accounted for 28.1% (18,797) of the institution population.
- Other racial/ethnic groups accounted for 4.5% (3,047) of the institution population.

AGE GROUPS

- The largest age group in prison was 25 to 29 years old. This group represented 28.6% (19,166) of the institution population.
- The second largest age group, the 30 to 34 year old group, accounted for 21.7% (14,541) of the institution population.


PRIOR COMMITMENT

- Those having prior prison commitments accounted for a total of 43.8% of the population. There were:
 - 24.4% with one prior prison commitment.
- 10.8% with two prior prison commitments.
- 8.6% with three or more prior prison commitments.
- Those with no prior commitments of any type accounted for 22.5% of the institution population.
- Those with only prior county jail or juvenile commitments accounted for 26.4% of the population.
- Those with only prior state juvenile commitments accounted for 7.3% of the institution population.


- The percent of inmates in prison with high school degrees upon admission to CDC was 42.0%, leaving 58.0% of those in prison without a high school degree.
- 46.8% of the female felon population had high school degrees compared to 41.8% of male felons.


HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES DECEMBER 31, 1987





MILITARY HISTORY MALE FELONS DECEMBER 31, 1987







TOTAL NUMBER OF INCIDENTS CALENDAR YEARS 1970 THROUGH 1987







TYPE OF INCIDENTS CALENDAR YEAR 1987







ASSAULTS ON STAFF WITH AND WITHOUT WEAPONS

- There were 151 assaults against staff by inmates using a weapon during 1987. This number accounted for 16.5% of total assaults on staff.





CALENDAR YEARS 1977 THROUGH 1987



CALENDAR YEAR 1987




NUMBER OF ESCAPES FROM MALE INSTITUTIONS AND CAMPS CALENDAR YEARS 1960 THROUGH 1987



TIME CREDITS

Information presented below shows the average days lost by felon inmates due to serious behavior reports (CDC 115: see Glossary on page 68).

- The average number of days lost per felon (based on the average daily institution population, ADP) was 26.8. This average includes both inmates who lost credits and those who did not lose credits.
- The average days lost in 1987 increased slightly over 1986 (26.8 to 26.6 average days, respectively).

Note: On January 1, 1983 legislation was implemented which increased the number of time credits lost for one offense from 45 to 180 days. This explains the large increase in credits lost since 1983.



HIGHLIGHTS

On December 31, 1987 the California Department of Corrections' Felon Parole Population reached an all time high of 40,242.

Parolees who were originally committed for property offenses made up the largest group of parolees; this group accounted for 41.9% of the Felon Parole Population.

The CDC parole population increased 26.8% from December 31, 1986 and 203.5% from December 31, 1977.

The majority (52.0%) of felon parolees were 25 to 34 years of age.

The 1987 parole population reached a high of 143.6 parolees per 100,000 California population, the highest in CDC history.









OTHER OFFENSE GROUPS DECEMBER 31, 1987








TIME ON PAROLE DECEMBER 31, 1987













REGION OF PAROLE RELEASE CALENDAR YEAR 1987





TEN LARGEST COUNTIES OF PAROLE RELEASE CALENDAR YEAR 1987









AVERAGE TIME SERVED IN MONTHS BY RACE/ETHNICITY AND SEX CALENDAR YEAR 1987





TIME ON PAROLE BEFORE DISCHARGE CALENDAR YEAR 1987







- Parole Region IV had 266 felons.

COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS 1977, 1982 AND 1987





TOTAL RECEIVED ON DEATH ROW AND CURRENT DISPOSITION CALENDAR YEARS 1978 THROUGH 1987





INMATES ON DEATH ROW

On December 31, 1987:

- There were 220 inmates on Death Row.
 - 199 were housed at San Quentin.
 - 21 were out to court.

PAROLEES AT LARGE CALENDAR YEAR 1987





- 5,809 (89.0%) were males.
- 716 (11.0%) were females.
- The number of PAL's represented an increase of 19.9% since December 31, 1986 and an increase of 208.1% since December 31, 1982.

GLOSSARY



GLOSSARY OF COMMONLY USED TERMS

ADMISSION RATE: The number of felons entering CDC institutions as new admissions from court (See NEW ADMISSIONS FROM COURT) during a specified time period per 100,000 population, usually state or county population.

AGE GROUPS: The grouping of persons by age into ten major groups used for summary statistics.

ARSON*: Willfully setting fire to any structure, forest land, or property.

AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION (ADP): The average population per day in a CDC facility for a given period of time, usually one year.

BOARD OF PRISON TERMS (BPT): The state agency which has jurisdiction over the release to parole of inmates sentenced to indeterminate terms and parole revocation of all felons.

BPT CHARGE GROUP: The grouping of like revocation charges used for summary statistical purposes.

BPT CHARGE CATEGORY: The grouping of BPT charge groups into four major categories (Violent, Property, Drug and Other) used for summary statistical purposes.

BPT REVOCATION CHARGE: The principal violation of a parolee which caused his or her parole to be revoked and subsequently sent back to prison as a parole violator returned to custody (PV-RTC).

BREACH OF PERIMETER: Escape from a CDC facility which contains a fenced or walled perimeter.

BURGLARY, FIRST DEGREE*: Entry into an inhabited building (being used for dwelling purposes) with the intent to commit grand or petty larceny or any kind of felony.

BURGLARY, SECOND DEGREE*: Entry into an uninhabited building with the intent to commit grand or petty larceny or any kind of felony. See BURGLARY, FIRST DEGREE.

CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (CDC): The state agency which has jurisdiction over the California prison and parole system and the California Rehabilitation Center.

CALIFORNIA JURISDICTION: As used in this publication, any inmate or parolee who is being supervised by CDC in California.

CALIFORNIA POPULATION (100,000 CALIFORNIA POPULATION): The total population in the state of California of which rates are computed per 100,000 people.

CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER (CRC): An institution operated by the California Department of Corrections which is designated for the Civil Narcotic Addict (CNA) program.

CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY (CYA): The state agency which has jurisdiction over and maintains institutions as correctional schools for the reception of wards of the juvenile court and other persons committed from justice, municipal and superior courts.

CDC 115: A behavior report documenting an inmate's violation of California law or a serious rule of the Rules and Regulations of the Director of Corrections while incarcerated.

CDC TIME: The time spent in a CDC institution from delivery date to the first parole date.

CIVIL COMMITMENT: A type of commitment in which criminal proceedings are suspended while a defendant undergoes treatment at the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) as a narcotic addict.

CIVIL NARCOTIC ADDICT (CNA): A person civilly committed to the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC).

CLASSIFICATION LEVEL: A uniform classification scoring system for inmates developed by CDC, which includes items such as length of sentence, social stability factors, escape history, and prior prison performance. Inmates are grouped into four levels to help determine the level of security and other needs. The score given an inmate can be reduced or increased depending on behavior in prison. The categories for 1987 were as follows:

- Level 1 = 0 to 23 points: Minimum Security
- Level 2 = 24 to 33 points: Minimum/Medium Security
- Level 3 = 34 to 55 points: Medium Security
- Level 4 = Over 55 points: Maximum Security

COMMITMENT: See COURT COMMITMENT.

COMMITMENT RATE: The number of new felon admissions from court and parole violators with new terms (PV-WNT'S) committed to prison during a specified time period per 100,000 population, usually state or county population.

COMMUNITY BASED FACILITIES: County, state, and privately contracted facilities which are located in local communities; includes inmates in work furlough and prisoner-mother programs, and parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTC'S) who are serving revocation time in county jails.

CALIFORNIA PRISONERS AND PAROLEES

GLOSSARY

COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS: See COMMUNITY BASED FACILITIES.

CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES SCHEDULE I, II, III, IV AND V (CSS I,II,III, IV AND V) *: A drug, substance, or immediate precursor which is set forth in Health and Safety Code Sections 11054 through 11058. These include heroin, marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates and psychedelics. The schedules categorize substances according to their potential for abuse and set restrictions for their use.

- Schedule I: Severely addictive substances with absolutely no medical use; for research only.
- Schedule II: Highly addictive substances with restricted medical use in emergency cases only.
- Schedule III: Moderately addictive substances with medical use; doctor's prescription required.
- Schedule IV: Substances with medical use and low abuse potential; doctor's prescription required.
- Schedule V: Substances with medical use and low abuse potential; doctor's prescription not necessarily required.

COUNTY DIAGNOSTIC CASE: A person who has been convicted of a felony and sent to prison by the court to receive a diagnostic evaluation (under Penal Code Section 1203.3) to help the court determine whether he or she should be sentenced to state prison, or probation and/or jail.

COURT COMMITMENT: A person received by CDC from court to serve time on a conviction. A commitment can be as a felon, civil narcotic addict, county diagnostic case, or CYA ward.

CREDIT: As used by the Inmate Work Training Incentive Program, a credit represents a day lost, a day gained, or a day restored.

DEATH ROW: Term used to describe the housing of inmates sentenced to death under CDC jurisdiction.

DESIGN CAPACITY: The maximum number of inmates a facility was originally designed to house, less/plus beds lost/gained due to later conversions, additions or deactivations.

DETERMINATE SENTENCING: The sentencing structure which became effective in California July 1, 1977. Determinate sentencing requires imposition of a term of imprisonment proportionate to the seriousness of the crime, with uniform sentences for like crimes.

DISCHARGED: When a person is released from prison or parole and is no longer under CDC jurisdiction.

ESCAPE RETURN: When an inmate escapes from a CDC facility and is returned to prison either with or without a new term from court.

CALIFORNIA PRISONERS AND PAROLEES

GLOSSARY

FELON: A person who has committed a felony.

FELONY: A crime which is punishable by death or by imprisonment in state penal institutions.

FIRST PAROLE: The release to parole of a felon for the first time on a commitment from court. This would include new admissions from court and parole violators with new terms (PV-WNT's).

GOOD TIME SYSTEM: Time credit system by which an inmate could reduce up to one-third of his or her prison sentence for good behavior, regardless of whether he or she was working in an educational/vocational program. Replaced by the INMATE WORK TRAINING INCENTIVE PROGRAM (IWTIP) in 1983.

GRADE LEVEL PLACEMENT: The actual grade completed or the grade the inmate is placed in from testing upon entering a CDC reception center.

GRAND THEFT*: The unlawful stealing of another person's property worth more than \$400.

GRAND THEFT AUTO*: Grand theft when the property taken is an automobile, and the purpose is not temporary use.

HOMICIDE*: The unlawful killing of another person.

HONORABLE DISCHARGE: An exit from the military under favorable conditions.

INCARCERATION RATE: The number of persons in prison per 100,000 population, usually state or county population.

INCIDENT: An event committed by an inmate in a CDC facility which is either against the law or a violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Director of Corrections.

INDETERMINATE SENTENCING: A type of sentencing structure used in California until July 1, 1977 where the purpose of sentencing was rehabilitation, and the parole authority, rather than the Legislature or the courts, determined the length of sentence. Under indeterminate sentencing, the commitment is not for a single specific period of time (such as three, five or seven years), but is instead for a range of time (such as fifteen years to life). Indeterminate sentences are still given for offenses committed before July 1, 1977 and for crimes which carry life sentences.

INMATE: An inhabitant of a penal institution ordered by the court to serve a prison term.

INMATE WORK TRAINING INCENTIVE PROGRAM (IWTIP): A program in which inmates are eligible to "work off" up to half their total sentence for having a job or participating in an educational or vocational learning program.

INSTITUTION: See PRISON.

INTELLIGENCE STATUS: The grouping of scores on intelligence quotient tests given by CDC psychological staff used to measure the intelligence level of inmates. Below is a breakout of scores used for each category:

Genius: 140 and above.

• Superior: 120 to 139.

• Bright Normal: 110 to 119.

Normal/Average: 90 to 109.

• Dull Normal: 80 to 89.

• Borderline: 68 to 79.

Defective: 67 and below.

INTERSTATE COOPERATIVE PAROLE AGREEMENT (ICOOP): An agreement between California and other states to supervise other state parolees while they live in California.

INTERSTATE PAROLE UNIT (ISPU): The California parole unit responsible for coordinating the supervision of California parolees living out of state.

JAIL: A county or municipal facility for incarceration of sentenced and unsentenced persons.

JUVENILE: A person under the age of 18.

KIDNAP*: Transportation or confinement of a person without authority of law and without his or her consent, or without the consent of his or her guardian, if a minor.

LEWD ACTS*: Engaging in sexual activity with a child under the age of 14 years with the intent of arousing such a person or child.

LIFER: An inmate who has been sentenced by the courts to life in prison. The sentence can be life in prison with the possibility of parole or without the possibility of parole.

MANSLAUGHTER*: Causing the death of another person by recklessness or gross negligence.

MANSLAUGHTER BY VEHICLE*: Causing the death of another person by reckless use of an automobile, usually drunk driving.

MEAN: The sum of individual values of each case divided by the number of cases; the average of all values.

MEDIAN: A designated point in a series chosen so that one half of the individuals in the series are below, and half above.

CALIFORNIA PRISONERS AND PAROLEES

GLOSSARY

MENTAL HEALTH FACILITY: A facility operated under the jurisdiction of the Department of Mental Health which treats the mentally ill or criminally insane.

MISDEMEANOR: A crime punishable by imprisonment in a county jail, a fine or both. Under certain conditions defined in Section 17 of the Penal Code, a felony crime can be treated like a misdemeanor.

MURDER, FIRST DEGREE*: Murder which is perpetrated by means of a destructive device or explosive, knowing use of deadly ammunition, lying in wait, torture, or any other kind of willful, deliberate, and premeditated killing; or which is committed in the perpetration or attempt to perpetrate arson, rape, robbery, burglary, mayhem, and other crimes.

MURDER, SECOND DEGREE*: All murders that are not first degree murders in that they do not involve the willful, deliberate and premedication of the crime. See MURDER, FIRST DEGREE.

NEW ADMISSION FROM COURT: An original commitment from Superior Court where the inmate is given a new CDC identification number. A new admission from court can be for a felony conviction or a civil narcotic addict commitment.

OFFENDER BASED INFORMATION SYSTEM (OBIS): An automated computer system designed to track all movements of inmates committed to the California Department of Corrections from the time of their admission to their discharge from prison or parole.

OFFENSE: The principal or controlling offense for which the person was committed to prison.

OFFENSE CATEGORIES: The grouping of offense groups into four major categories (Violent, Property, Drug and Other).

OFFENSE GROUPS: The grouping of offenses into 29 categories used for summary statistics.

OUTPATIENT STATUS: A Civil Narcotic Addict released from the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) to the jurisdiction of the Parole and Community Services Division.

PAROLE: A period of supervision in the community following completion of a prison sentence. The conditional release provides supervision and control over offenders after they return to society.

PAROLE REGION: An area of the state whose boundaries define jurisdiction and supervision of the Parole and Community Services Division. There are four parole regions in the state under CDC jurisdiction.

PAROLE RELEASE: The release of an inmate to the jurisdiction of the Parole and Community Services Division. This includes both first paroles and reparoles.

GLOSSARY

PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURNED TO CUSTODY (PV-RTC): A parolee who has violated the terms of parole, been revoked from parole by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT), and returned to prison for a term up to twelve months.

PAROLE VIOLATOR WITH A NEW TERM(PV-WNT): A parolee who has violated the terms of parole by committing a new crime and has been returned to prison with a new commitment from court.

PAROLEE AT LARGE (PAL): A parolee who absconds from supervision and whose parole is suspended by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT).

PENDING REVOCATION: One who has committed a violation of parole but has yet to have a parole revocation hearing, and is being held either in county jail or a state prison facility.

PETTY THEFT*: Unlawful taking of property under \$400; can be a felony if there are prior convictions.

POPULATION AT RISK: The number of persons in a population at a given point in time and the number of persons entering a given population during a calendar year.

PRECONFINEMENT TIME: The time credits granted by a judge at sentencing for time spent in jail awaiting trial and/or sentencing and the time spent in jail after sentencing to the date of delivery to CDC.

PRINCIPAL CONTROLLING OFFENSE: The offense which usually has the greatest term of imprisonment imposed by the court, including enhancements. This offense is also used for statistical information for CDC publications.

PRIOR COMMITMENT: A previous order by the court to serve time on a conviction.

PRISON: A state correctional facility where persons are confined following conviction of a felony offense.

RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS: Grouping of racial and ethnic origins into four major groups (White, Black, Mexican/American and Other) used for summary statistics.

RATE: As used in this publication, the ratio of the number of one specific group to a population base.

REINSTATED: When a parolee at large (PAL) whose parole has been suspended is reinstated to active parole status.

REPAROLE: The release to parole of a felon who had violated the conditions of parole on a technical violation and had been returned to prison (PV-RTC'S).

GLOSSARY

RETURN STATUS: An indication of whether or not an inmate has escaped or been paroled and has subsequently been returned to prison.

REVOCATION: Cancellation or the repeal of parole by the Board of Prison Terms (BPT).

REVOCATION TIME IMPOSED: The amount of time given to serve in prison for a parole violator returned to prison for a technical violation (PV-RTC'S) by the Roard of Prison Terms. (BPT)

REVOKE: To withdraw, repeal, or cancel parole.

ROBBERY*: Felonious taking of personal property in the possession of another, from his or her person or immediate presence, and against his or her will, accomplished by means of force or fear.

STATE JUVENILE COMMITMENT: Commitment to the California Youth Authority (CYA) or equivalent in other states.

SUSPENDED: The suspension of parole for someone who has absconded and is considered a Parolee at Large (PAL).

TEMPORARY RELEASE STATUS: An inmate released temporarily from a CDC institution to go back to court, jail, an outside hospital or medical facility, or on temporary community leave.

TIME CREDIT: The net difference between credits earned and restored through the Inmate Work Training Incentive Program (IWTIP) and credits lost due to administrative or serious rule violation (CDC 115). This also includes credits earned for those still under the "Good Time" System.

TOTAL TIME SERVED: The sum of preconfinement time plus CDC time served.

VEHICLE THEFT*: The unlawful taking of an automobile, bicycle, motorcycle, or other vehicle or motorboat or vessel, for the purpose of temporarily using or operating it; a felony if there are prior convictions.

WALKAWAY: An inmate who escapes from, or fails to return to, prison, a community based facility, or correctional camp with no fenced or walled perimeter.

WORK FURLOUGH: A program to assist felons to adjust from institution life to the community. Inmates work in the outside community during the day without supervision and return each evening to the custody of the jail or correctional facility.

YOUTH AUTHORITY: See CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY.

* These are only simple definitions of these crimes. For a more detailed explanation, check the California State Penal Code. Penal Code (PC) listings begin on page 75.


