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### **FOREWORD**

At all levels of government, from the White House to the smallest townships, the ongoing "war on crime" includes daily battles involving illegal drugs and drug-related crime. Because of these drugs' adverse influence on the human mind and their promise of quick financial gain, those entangled in the illicit drug world perpetrate crimes which are especially barbaric and violent in nature. While violent crime known to law enforcement reached an unprecedented high in 1988, there is currently no way to measure accurately drug involvement in these unwelcome statistics. The forthcoming National Incident-Based Reporting System will, however, enable such assessment and much more. The first incident-based data were received by the national Uniform Crime Reporting Program in early 1989. By the end of next year, approximately half of the states will be participating in the new system.

Just as the FBI must adjust to increasing fiscal constraints, so must many law enforcement agencies at other levels of government. We try to compensate for limited resources with better training and equipment, proactive approaches to crime fighting and prevention, and improved strategic deployment of personnel. Basic to these innovative approaches is information. Over the years, information has been gathered every time an officer investigates suspicious circumstances, observes criminal activity, responds to a crime scene, interviews a victim or witness, or interrogates a criminal. These recorded data have remained stored in records systems at the local level, but much of the information has not been utilized or gathered at the state or national levels or by other interests. Information developed by law enforcement is a major key to understanding many aspects of crime, its victims and perpetrators, but most importantly, the knowledge gained is indispensable in advancing crime resolutions and prevention techniques. With the inclusion of the Federal law enforcement sector into the National Incident-Based Reporting System, mandated by the Uniform Federal Crime Reporting Act of 1988, we will, for the first time, have a more accurate national perspective of the characteristics, elements, volume, diversity, and complexity of crime known to law enforcement in the United States.

The National Incident-Based Reporting System, comprising 22 broad categories of offenses, includes crimes that pervade all levels of law enforcement jurisdictions, as well as the victims and perpetrators related to them. As implementation of the National Incident-Based Reporting System advances across the country, all of us will be able to learn from those progressive law enforcement agencies who have already utilized detailed information for operational and administrative objectives. We will also be able to identify and duplicate successes in logistical approaches in fighting the increasingly complicated battles in the "war."

Finally, the predictability of crime will be greatly enhanced with National Incident-Based Reporting System information. Given the greater specificity concerning crime incidents, more easily recognizable trends, along with victim and offender information, will make the projection of crime a reality. Valid projections should lead to more proactive, aggressive, and effective law enforcement.

### **CRIME FACTORS**

The presence of crime in our Nation is a matter of serious concern not only to the law enforcement profession, but to society at large. Historically, the causes and origins of crime have been the subjects of investigation by varied disciplines. Some factors affecting the volume and type of crime occurring from place to place are:

Population density and degree of urbanization with size of locality and its surrounding area.

Variations in composition of the population, particularly youth concentration.

Stability of population with respect to residents' mobility, commuting patterns, and transient factors.

Modes of transportation and highway system.

Economic conditions, including median income, destitution, and job availability.

Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.

Family conditions with respect to divorce and family cohesiveness. Climate.

Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.

Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.

Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).

Attitudes of citizenry toward crime.

Crime reporting practices of citizenry.

The Uniform Crime Reports give a nationwide view of crime based on statistics contributed by state and local law enforcement agencies. Population size is the only correlate of crime utilized in this publication. While the other factors listed above are of equal concern, no attempt is made to relate them to the data presented. The reader is, therefore, cautioned against comparing statistical data of individual reporting units from cities, counties, states, or colleges and universities solely on the basis of their population coverage or student enrollment.

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### SECTION I

### SUMMARY OF THE UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

The Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program is a nationwide, cooperative statistical effort of approximately 16,000 city, county, and state law enforcement agencies voluntarily reporting data on crimes brought to their attention. Since 1930, the FBI has administered the Program and issued periodic assessments of the nature and type of crime in the Nation. While the Program's primary objective is to generate a reliable set of criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management, its data have over the years become one of the country's leading social indicators. The American public looks to UCR for information on fluctuations in the level of crime, while criminologists, sociologists, legislators, municipal planners, the press, and other students of criminal justice use the statistics for varied research and planning purposes.

### Historical Background

Recognizing a need for national crime statistics, the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) formed the Committee on Uniform Crime Records in the 1920s to develop a system of uniform police statistics. Establishing offenses known to law enforcement as the appropriate measure, the Committee evaluated various crimes on the basis of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, pervasiveness in all geographic areas of the country, and likelihood of being reported to law enforcement. After studying state criminal codes and making an evaluation of the recordkeeping practices in use, the Committee in 1929 completed a plan for crime reporting which became the foundation of the UCR Program.

Seven offenses were chosen to serve as an Index for gauging fluctuations in the overall volume and rate of crime. Known collectively as the Crime Index, these offenses included the violent crimes of murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault and the property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. By congressional mandate, arson was added as the eighth Index offense in 1979.

During the early planning of the Program, it was recognized that the differences among criminal codes precluded a mere aggregation of state statistics to arrive at a national total. Further, because of the variances in punishment for the same offenses in different state codes, no distinction between felony and misdemeanor crimes was possible. To avoid these problems and provide nationwide uniformity in crime reporting, standardized offense

definitions by which law enforcement agencies were to submit data, without regard for local statutes, were formulated. The definitions used by the Program are set forth in Appendix II of this publication.

In January, 1930, 400 cities representing 20 million inhabitants in 43 states began participating in the UCR Program. Congress enacted Title 28, Section 534, of the United States Code authorizing the Attorney General to gather crime information that same year. The Attorney General, in turn, designated the FBI to serve as the national clearinghouse for the data collected. Since that time, data based on uniform classifications and procedures for reporting have been obtained from the Nation's law enforcement agencies.

### **Advisory Groups**

Providing vital links between local law enforcement and the FBI in the conduct of the UCR Program are the IACP and the National Sheriffs' Association (NSA). The IACP's Committee on Uniform Crime Records, as it has since the Program began, represents the thousands of police departments nationwide. The NSA's Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting, established in June, 1966, encourages sheriffs throughout the country to participate fully in the Program. Both committees serve in advisory capacities concerning the UCR Program's operation.

To function in an advisory capacity concerning UCR policy and provide suggestions on UCR data usage, a Data Providers Advisory Policy Board was established in August, 1988. The Board is comprised of 20 city, county, and state law enforcement executives, representing the four geographic regions of the Nation.

The Association of State Uniform Crime Reporting Programs and committees on UCR within individual state law enforcement associations are also active in promoting interest in the UCR Program. These organizations foster widespread and more intelligent use of uniform crime statistics and lend assistance to contributors when the needs arise.

### Methods of Data Collection

The information compiled by UCR contributors is forwarded to the FBI either directly from the local law enforcement agency or through a state-level UCR Program. Agencies submitting directly to the FBI are provided continuing guidance and support on an individual basis.

State-level UCR Programs are very effective intermediaries between local contributors and the FBI. Many of the

41 state Programs have mandatory reporting requirements and collect data beyond the national UCR scope to address crime problems germane to their particular locales. In most cases, these agencies are also able to provide more direct and frequent service to participating law enforcement agencies, to make information more readily available for use at the state level, and to contribute to more streamlined operations at the national level.

With the development of a state UCR Program, the FBI ceases direct collection of data from individual law enforcement agencies within the state. Instead, information from local agencies is forwarded to the national Program through the state data collection agency.

The conditions under which these systems are developed ensure consistency and comparability in the data submitted to the national Program, as well as provide for regular and timely reporting of national crime data. These conditions are: (1) The state Program must conform to national Uniform Crime Reports' standards, definitions, and information requirements. The states are not, of course, prohibited from collecting other statistical data beyond the national requirements. (2) The state criminal justice agency must have a proven, effective, statewide Program and have instituted acceptable quality control procedures. (3) Coverage within the state by a state agency must be, at least, equal to that attained by the national Uniform Crime Reports. (4) The state agency must have adequate field staff assigned to conduct audits and to assist contributing agencies in record practices and crime reporting procedures. (5) The state agency must furnish to the FBI all of the detailed data regularly collected by the FBI in the form of duplicate returns, computer printouts, and/or magnetic tapes. (6) The state agency must have the proven capability (tested over a period of time) to supply all the statistical data required in time to meet national Uniform Crime Reports' publication deadlines.

To fulfill its responsibilities in connection with the UCR Program, the FBI continues to edit and review individual agency reports for both completeness and quality; has direct contact with individual contributors within the state when necessary in connection with crime reporting matters, coordinating such contact with the state agency; and upon request, conducts training programs within the state on law enforcement records and crime reporting procedures. Should circumstances develop whereby the state agency does not comply with the aforementioned requirements, the national Program may reinstitute a direct collection of Uniform Crime Reports from law enforcement agencies within the state.

### Reporting Procedures

Based on records of all reports of crime received from victims, officers who discover infractions, or other sources, law enforcement agencies across the country tabulate the number of Crime Index or Part I offenses brought to their attention during each month. Specifically, the crimes

reported to the FBI are murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

Whenever complaints of crime are determined through investigation to be unfounded or false, they are eliminated from an agency's count. The number of "actual offenses known" is reported to the FBI regardless of whether anyone is arrested for the crime, stolen property is recovered, or prosecution is undertaken.

Another integral part of the monthly submission is the total number of actual Crime Index offenses cleared. Crimes are "cleared" in one of two ways: (1) at least one person is arrested, charged, and turned over to the court for prosecution; or (2) by exceptional means when some element beyond police control precludes the arrest of an offender. Law enforcement agencies also report the number of Index crime clearances which involve only offenders under the age of 18; the value of property stolen and recovered in connection with the offenses; and detailed information pertaining to criminal homicide and arson.

In addition to its primary collection on Crime Index (Part I) offenses, the UCR Program solicits monthly data on persons arrested for all crimes except traffic violations. The age, sex, and race of arrestees are reported by crime category, both Part I and Part II. Part II offenses include all crimes not classified as Part I.

Various data on law enforcement officers killed or assaulted are collected on a monthly basis. The number of full-time sworn and civilian personnel is reported annually, as of October 31.

### **Editing Procedures**

Each report submitted to the UCR Program is examined thoroughly for arithmetical accuracy and for deviations which may indicate errors. To identify any unusual fluctuations in an agency's crime counts, monthly reports are compared with previous submissions of the agency and with those for similar agencies. Large variations in crime levels may indicate modified records procedures, incomplete reporting, or changes in the jurisdiction's geopolitical structure.

Data reliability is a high priority of the Program and noted deviations or arithmetical adjustments are brought to the attention of the state UCR Program or the submitting agency through correspondence. A standard procedure of the FBI is to study the monthly reports and to evaluate periodic trends prepared for individual reporting units. Any significant increase or decrease is made the subject of a special inquiry. When it is found that changes in crime reporting procedures or annexations are influencing the level of crime, the figures for specific crime categories, or if necessary, totals are excluded from trend tabulations.

To assist contributors in complying with UCR standards, the national Program provides training seminars and instructional materials in crime reporting procedures. Throughout the country, liaison with state Programs and

law enforcement personnel is maintained, and training sessions are held to explain the purpose of the Program, the rules of uniform classification and scoring, and the methods of assembling the information for reporting. When an individual agency has specific problems in compiling its crime statistics and remedial efforts are unsuccessful, FBI Headquarters' personnel may visit the contributor to aid in resolving the difficulties.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook, which details procedures for classifying and scoring offenses, is supplied to all contributors as the basic resource document for preparing reports. Since a good records system is essential for accurate crime reporting, the FBI also furnishes the Manual of Law Enforcement Records.

To enhance communication among Program participants, the UCR "Newsletter" and State UCR Program "Bulletin" are utilized. They address Program policy, as well as present information and instructional material, and are produced as needed.

The final responsibility for data submissions rests with the individual contributing law enforcement agency. Although the Program makes every effort through its editing procedures, training practices, and correspondence to assure the validity of the data it receives, the statistics' accuracy depends primarily on the adherence of each contributor to the established standards of reporting. Deviations from these established standards which cannot be resolved by the national UCR Program may be brought to the attention of the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the IACP or the Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the NSA.

### Reporting Area

The presentation of statistics by reporting area facilitates analyzing local crime counts in conjunction with those for areas of similar geographical location or population size. Geographically, the United States is divisible by regions, divisions, and states. As discussed in Appendix III, further breakdowns rely on population figures and proximity to metropolitan areas.

A Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) is an integrated economic and social unit with a recognized large population nucleus. Each has a central city of at least 50,000 population or an urbanized area of at least 50,000. Contiguous counties which meet specified criteria of metropolitan character and integration, designated suburban counties in UCR, are included. Due to changes in the geographic compositions of MSAs, no year-to-year comparisons of data for those areas should be attempted.

Rural counties and "other cities," most of which are incorporated, are outside MSAs. As a general rule, sheriffs, county police, and state police report crimes committed within the limits of the counties but outside cities, while local police report crimes committed within the city limits.

Certain tables within this publication present statistics relative to "suburban" areas. A suburban area consists of

cities with fewer than 50,000 inhabitants together with counties which are within an MSA. In this context, the central city is, of course, excluded. The concept of suburban area is especially important in a study of this nature because of the particular crime conditions which exist in the communities surrounding the Nation's largest cities.

During 1988, law enforcement agencies active in the UCR Program represented approximately 240 million United States inhabitants, or 98 percent of the total population as established by the Bureau of the Census. The coverage amounted to 99 percent of the United States population living in MSAs, 94 percent of the population in "other cities," and 90 percent of the rural population.

Although most law enforcement agencies submit crime reports to the UCR Program, data are sometimes not received for complete annual periods. To be included in this publication's Tables 6, 7, 8, and 9, showing specific jurisdictional statistics, figures for all 12 months of the current year must have been received at the FBI prior to established publication deadlines. Other tabular presentations are aggregated as set forth in Appendix I. Unless consisting of estimates for the total United States population, each table in this publication shows the number of agencies reporting and the extent of population coverage.

### Population Data

Current year population figures for the Nation, states, geographic regions, and divisions are Bureau of the Census provisional estimates as of July 1, 1988. Using these figures along with the 1987 and 1986 Bureau of the Census provisional estimates for counties and cities, respectively, the populations of individual jurisdictions were extrapolated (see Appendix III). The estimated United States population increase in 1988 was approximately 1 percent over the 1987 estimate.

### Offense Estimation

Tables 1 through 5 of this publication contain statistics for the entire United States. Because not all law enforcement agencies provide data for complete reporting periods, estimated crime counts are included in these presentations. Offense estimation occurs within each of three areas: Metropolitan Statistical Areas, "other cities," and rural counties. Using the known crime experiences of similar areas within a state, the estimates are computed by assigning the same proportional crime volumes to nonreporting agencies.

Unique estimation procedures were used to produce estimated 1985 through 1988 forcible rape figures for the State of Illinois. In mid-1984, gender-neutral sex offense legislation was passed in that state. As a result, forcible rape figures furnished by the state-level UCR Program administered by the Illinois Department of State Police were not in accordance with national UCR guidelines. Forcible rape totals are not shown in Tables 6, 7, 8, 9, and Appendix IV, which present individual MSA, city, county,

and university/college data for Illinois agencies. Since the data supplied were not comparable with those provided for other agencies across the country, the post-1984 forcible rape figures have been estimated using national rates per 100,000 inhabitants within the eight population groups and assigning the forcible rape volumes proportionally.

Due to reporting problems at the state levels, no usable 1988 data were received for local law enforcement agencies in Florida and Kentucky. For Tables 1 through 5 of this publication, offense totals for these two states were estimated. The states' most current valid annual totals, by population group, were updated by applying percentage changes for each offense within each population group of the geographic division in which the state resides. The state totals were compiled from the sums of the population group estimates. No data for Florida or Kentucky jurisdictions are shown in Tables 6 through 9 or Appendix IV.

### Crime Trends

Showing fluctuations from year to year, trend statistics offer the data user an added perspective from which to study crime. Percent change tabulations in this publication are computed only for reporting units which have provided comparable data for the periods under consideration. Exclusions from trend computations are made when figures from a reporting agency are not received for comparable timeframes or when it is ascertained that unusual fluctuations are due to such variables as improved records procedures, annexations, etc.

Care should be exercised in any direct comparison between data in this publication and those in prior issues of *Crime in the United States*. Valid percent changes for 2, 5, and 10 years are presented in this book's tabular portions.

### Redesign of UCR

While throughout the years the UCR Program remained virtually unchanged in terms of the data collected and disseminated, a broad utility had evolved for UCR by the 1980s. Recognizing the need for improved statistics, law enforcement called for a thorough evaluative study that would modernize the UCR Program. The FBI fully concurred with the need for an updated Program and lent its complete support, formulating a comprehensive threephase redesign effort. The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the Department of Justice agency responsible for funding criminal justice information projects, agreed to underwrite the first two phases. Conducted by an independent contractor, these phases were structured to determine what, if any, changes should be made to the current Program. The third phase would involve implementation of the changes identified. Abt Associates Inc. of Cambridge, Massachusetts, overseen by the FBI, BJS, and a Steering Committee comprised of prestigious individuals representing a myriad of disciplines, commenced the first phase in 1982.

During the first phase, the historical evolution of the Program was examined. All aspects of the Program, including the objectives and intended user audience, data items, reporting mechanisms, quality control, publications and user services, and relationships with other criminal justice data systems, were studied.

Early in 1984, a conference on the future of UCR, held in Elkridge, Maryland, launched the second phase of the study, which would examine potential futures for UCR and conclude with a set of recommended changes. Attendees at this conference reviewed work conducted during the first phase and discussed the potential changes that should be considered during phase two.

Findings from the evaluation's first phase and input on alternatives for the future were also major topics of discussion at the seventh National UCR Conference in July, 1984. Overlapping phases one and two was a survey of law enforcement agencies.

Phase two ended in early 1985 with the production of a draft "Blueprint for the Future of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program." The study's Steering Committee reviewed the draft report at a March, 1985, meeting and made various recommendations for revision. The Committee members, however, endorsed the report's concepts.

In April, 1985, the phase two recommendations were presented at the eighth National UCR Conference. While various considerations for the final report were set forth, the overall concept for the revised Program was unanimously approved. The joint IACP/NSA Committee on UCR also issued a resolution endorsing the Blueprint.

The final report, the "Blueprint for the Future of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program," was released in the summer of 1985. It specifically outlined recommendations for an expanded, improved UCR Program to meet informational needs into the next century. There were three recommended areas of enhancement to the UCR Program. First, reporting of offenses and arrests would be made by means of an incident-based system. Second, collection of data would be accomplished on two levels. Agencies in level one would report important details about those offenses comprising the current Crime Index, their victims, and arrestees. Law enforcement agencies covering populations of over 100,000 and a sampling of smaller agencies would be included in level two, which would collect expanded detail on all significant offenses. The third proposal involved introducing a quality assurance program.

One of the first actions taken by the FBI to begin implementation was to award a contract for the development of new offense definitions and data elements for the redesigned system. The work involved: (a) revision of the definitions of certain Index offenses; (b) identification of additional significant offenses to be reported; (c) refining definitions for both; and (d) development of data elements (incident details) for all UCR offenses in order to fulfill the

requirements of incident-based reporting versus the current summary reporting.

Concurrent with the preparation of the data elements, the FBI studied the various state systems to select an experimental site for implementation of the redesigned Program. In view of its long-standing incident-based Program and well-established staff dedicated solely to UCR, the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED) was chosen. The SLED agreed to adapt its existing system to meet the requirements of the redesigned Program and collect data on both offenses and arrests relating to the newly defined offenses.

To assist SLED in conducting the pilot project, offense definitions and data elements developed under the private contract were put at the staff's disposal. Also, the FBI's Technical Services Division developed "Automated Data Capture Specifications" for use in adapting the state's data processing procedures to incorporate the revised system. The BJS supplied funding to facilitate needed software revisions. Testing of the new Program was completed in late 1987.

Following the completion of the pilot project conducted by SLED, the FBI produced a draft set of guidelines for an enhanced UCR Program. Law enforcement executives from around the country were then invited to a conference in Orange Beach, Alabama, where the guidelines were presented for final review.

During the conference, three overall endorsements were passed without dissent. First, that there be established a new, incident-based national crime reporting system; second, that the FBI manage this Program; and third, that an Advisory Policy Board composed of law enforcement executives be formed to assist in the direction and implementation of the new Program.

Information about the redesigned UCR Program, called the National Incident-Based Reporting System or NIBRS, is contained in three documents produced subsequent to the Orange Beach Conference. Volume 1, Data Collection Guidelines, contains a system overview and descriptions of the offenses, offense codes, reports, data elements, and data values used in the system. Volume 2, Data Submission Specifications, is for the use of state and local systems personnel who are responsible for preparing magnetic tapes for submission to the FBI. Volume 3, Approaches to Implementing an Incident-Based Reporting (IBR) System, is for use by computer programmers, analysts, etc., responsible for developing a state or local IBR system which will meet NIBRS reporting requirements.

NIBRS will collect data on each single incident and arrest within 22 crime categories. For each offense known to police within these categories, incident, victim, property, offender, and arrestee information will be gathered when available. The goal of the redesign is to modernize crime information by collecting data presently maintained in law enforcement records; the enhanced UCR Program is, therefore, a byproduct of current records systems. The

integrity of UCR's long-running statistical series will, of course, be maintained.

It became apparent during the development of the prototype system that the level one and level two reporting proposed in the "Blueprint" may not be the most practical approach. Many state and local law enforcement administrators indicated that the collection of data on all pertinent offenses could be handled with more ease than can the extraction of selected ones. While "Limited" participation, equivalent to the "Blueprint's" level one, will remain an option, it appears that most reporting jurisdictions, upon implementation, will go immediately to "Full" participation, meeting all NIBRS data submission requirements.

The implementation of NIBRS will be at a pace commensurate with the resources, abilities, and limitations of the contributing law enforcement agencies. The FBI was able to accept NIBRS data as of January, 1989, and the first test tape containing the expanded data was received in April, 1989, from the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center. The other state-level UCR Programs are in various stages of planning and development. Twelve states, including Alabama, are expected to commence NIBRS reporting for selected jurisdictions during calendar year 1989. At least 13 more are planning implementation in 1990.

### Recent Developments


ADVISORY POLICY BOARD—The implementation of an expanded and enhanced UCR Program will result in a wealth of crime data never before available. To function in an advisory capacity concerning UCR policy and provide suggestions on uses of the data collected under the enhanced UCR Program, a Uniform Crime Reporting Data Providers Advisory Policy Board (APB) has been established. Comprised of executives from local law enforcement agency data contributors, the Board had its first meeting in Alexandria, Virginia, on February 14 and 15, 1989. During the meeting, the Board adopted bylaws and elected officers.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED-In connection with its Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted Program, the national UCR staff is conducting a special statistical effort to study officer homicides in much greater detail than ever before. With the assistance of the FBI's Behavioral Science Unit and an outside consultant, the staff has developed a protocol from which to interview offenders convicted of having killed law enforcement officers. The main objective of the interviews is to identify any measures the officers could have taken or avoided that would have saved their lives. An attempt is also being made to identify danger signals that may have been exhibited by the perpetrator. The project will be completed during 1989, and the resulting data could potentially lend new insight to officer survival training programs.

FEDERAL CRIME REPORTING—In 1988, the U.S. Congress passed the Uniform Federal Crime Reporting Act, mandating Federal law enforcement participation in UCR effective January, 1989. Plans to implement NIBRS, the redesigned UCR Program, at the Federal level are underway, and the Department of the Interior has agreed to act as the pilot agency for testing Federal participation requirements. Data produced as a result of this Act should be of tremendous benefit to all levels of law enforcement, to the Executive and Legislative Branches, and to many other interests.

ARSON—The Anti-Arson Act of 1982 mandated the FBI to classify arson as a Part I crime permanently and to

prepare a special statistical report on arson in cooperation with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, National Fire Data Center, on an annual basis. Data collection from the fire service commenced in January, 1987, but participation levels have since remained too low to project any state or national estimates. With the development and implementation of NIBRS, whose resultant data will adequately meet the objectives of the congressional mandate, the unique data collection on arson will be discontinued. Fire service agencies will report information on arson under NIBRS, using the same guidelines as established for law enforcement agency contributors.



## SECTION II CRIME INDEX OFFENSES REPORTED

### MURDER AND NONNEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER

### \_ DEFINITION \_\_\_\_

Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, is the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

The classification of this offense, as for all other Crime Index offenses, is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Not included in the count for this offense classification are deaths caused by negligence, suicide, or accident; justifiable homicides; and attempts to murder or assaults to murder, which are scored as aggravated assaults.

### Volume

The total number of murders in the United States during 1988 was estimated at 20,675 or 1 percent of the violent crimes reported. More persons were murdered in August than any other month, while the fewest were killed during February.

Geographically, the Southern States, the most populous region, accounted for 42 percent of the murders. The Western States reported 21 percent; the Midwestern States, 19 percent; and the Northeastern States, 18 percent.

### Trend

The murder volume increased 3 percent nationwide in 1988 over 1987. The Nation's cities overall experienced an increase of 4 percent, while both the suburban and rural counties recorded 2-percent declines. Among city groupings, those of jurisdictions with populations over 25,000 registered increases ranging from 1 to 8 percent. The groupings of cities with smaller populations showed declines, 5 percent in those with 10,000 to 24,999 inhabitants and 3 percent in those with populations under 10,000.

Viewed regionally, the murder counts increased 10 percent in the Northeast, 4 percent in the South, and 1 percent in the West from 1987 to 1988. A 3-percent decline was experienced in the Midwestern States.

The accompanying chart reveals an 11-percent rise nationally in the murder counts from 1984 to 1988. The 10-year trend showed the 1988 total 4 percent below the 1979 level.

### Rate


Up 1 percent from 1987, the 1988 United States murder rate was 8 per 100,000 inhabitants. On a regional basis, the Southern States averaged 10 murders per 100,000 people; the Western States, 9 per 100,000; the Northeastern States, 8 per 100,000; and the Midwestern States, 6 per 100,000. The murder rate in the Northeast was up 9 percent, 1988 versus 1987. In the South, it increased 3 percent, and in the West, it showed no change. A rate decrease of 4 percent was recorded in the Midwest.


The Nation's metropolitan areas reported a 1988 murder rate of 9 victims per 100,000 inhabitants. In the rural counties, the rate was 5 per 100,000, and in the cities outside metropolitan areas, it was 4 per 100,000.

### Nature

Supplemental data provided by contributing agencies recorded information for 18,269 of the estimated 20,675 murders in 1988. Submitted monthly, the data consist of the age, sex, and race of both victims and offenders; the types of weapons used; the relationships of victims to the offenders; and the circumstances surrounding the murders.

Based on this information, 75 percent of the murder victims in 1988 were males. Ninety-one percent were persons 18 years of age or older, with 49 percent aged 20 through 34 years. Considering victims for whom race was known, an average of 50 of every 100 were white, 49 were black, and the remainder were persons of other races.

Data based on incidents involving one victim and one offender showed that in 1988, 94 percent of the black murder victims were slain by black offenders, and 86 percent of the white murder victims were killed by white

offenders. Likewise, males were most often slain by males (84 percent in single victim/single offender situations). These same data showed, however, that 9 of every 10 female victims were murdered by males.

Firearms, as in previous years, were the weapons used in approximately 3 of every 5 murders committed in the United States. Of all murders, 45 percent were by handguns; 6 percent by shotguns; and 4 percent by rifles. Other or unknown types of firearms accounted for another 5 percent of the total murders.

Among the remaining weapons, cutting or stabbing instruments were employed in 19 percent of the murders; blunt objects (clubs, hammers, etc.) in 6 percent; and other dangerous weapons, such as poison, explosives, etc., in 8 percent. Personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.) were employed in 6 percent.

Over half the murder victims in 1988 were related to (15 percent) or acquainted with (40 percent) their assailants. Twelve percent of the victims were murdered by strangers, while the relationships among victims and offenders were unknown in 33 percent of the murders. Among all female murder victims in 1988, 31 percent were slain by husbands or boyfriends. Five percent of the male victims were killed by wives or girlfriends.

Arguments resulted in 34 percent of the murders during the year. Nineteen percent occurred as a result of felonious activities such as robbery, arson, etc., while another 1 percent were suspected to have been the result of some felonious activity. Three percent of the murders were committed during brawls while offenders were under the influence of alcohol or narcotics. The table on the following page shows murder circumstances for the past 5 years.

### Clearances

As in previous years, the clearance rate for murder was higher than for any other Crime Index offense in 1988. Law enforcement agencies nationwide, as well as in the cities, cleared 70 percent of the murders occurring during the year. Cities with populations from 25,000 to 49,999 reported the most successful clearance rate, 79 percent. Seventy-seven percent of murders in rural counties and 68 percent of those in suburban counties were cleared.

Regionally, the murder clearance rate was highest in the Southern States, 74 percent. Sixty-nine percent of all murders were cleared in the Northeastern States and 67 percent in the Midwestern and Western States.

Persons under 18 years of age were involved in murder less often than in any other offense in 1988. They accounted for 6 percent of the willful killings cleared by law enforcement nationally, as well as in suburban counties. Seven percent of the Nation's city clearances and 5 percent of the rural county clearances involved only persons in this young-age group.

### Persons Arrested

Of all murder arrestees in 1988, 45 percent were under 25 years of age. The 18- to 24-year age group accounted for 35 percent of the total.

Eighty-eight percent of those arrested were male and 12 percent, female. Whites comprised 45 percent of the total arrestees for murder in 1988. Blacks made up 53 percent, and the remainder were of other races.

The 1988 murder arrest total increased 5 percent above the 1987 figure. Arrests of persons aged 18 and over increased 4 percent, while those of younger persons were up 18 percent. During the same 2-year period, male arrests increased 6 percent and female arrests were up 4 percent.

Long-term trends indicate the 1988 murder arrest total was 8 percent above the 1984 level and 4 percent higher than the 1979 figure.

### FORCIBLE RAPE

### \_ DEFINITION .

Forcible rape, as defined in the Program, is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are excluded.

### Volume

During 1988, there were an estimated 92,486 forcible rapes in the Nation. Rape offenses comprised 6 percent of the total violent crimes. Geographically, the Southern States, the region with the largest population, accounted for 37 percent of the forcible rapes reported to law enforcement. Following were the Midwest with 25 percent, the West with 23 percent, and the Northeast with the remainder.

Monthly totals showed the greatest number of forcible rapes was reported during the summer, with July recording the highest frequency. The lowest total was registered in December.

### Trend

Compared to the previous year, the 1988 forcible rape volume increased 2 percent nationwide. In the suburban counties and cities collectively, the totals were up 1 percent. Rural counties recorded a 1-percent decline. City trends ranged from a 12-percent increase in cities under 10,000 in population to a 4-percent decline in cities 500,000 to 999,999 in population.

Among the geographic regions, the Midwestern States recorded a 4-percent rise; the Southern States, a 3-percent increase; the Northeastern States, virtually no change; and the Western States, a 2-percent drop.

National trends for 5 and 10 years show that the forcible rape total rose 10 percent over 1984 and 21 percent above 1979.

### Rate

By Uniform Crime Reporting definition, the victims of forcible rape are always female. In 1988, an estimated 73 of every 100,000 females in the country were reported rape victims. The 1988 female forcible rape rate showed no change from 1987, but was 6 percent higher than in 1984.

Female forcible rape rates for 1988 showed there were 83 victims per 100,000 females in MSAs, 49 per 100,000 females in cities outside metropolitan areas, and 36 per 100,000 females in rural counties.

Regionally, the highest female rape rate was in the Western States, which recorded 81 victims per 100,000 females. Following were the Southern States with a rate of 78, the Midwestern States with 75, and the Northeastern States with 57.

### **Nature**

Of all reported forcible rapes during 1988, 82 percent were rapes by force. The remainder were attempts or assaults to commit forcible rape. An increase of more than 2 percent was registered in the number of rapes by force, while attempts to commit rape decreased 5 percent from the 1987 figures.

### Clearances

Nationwide and in the cities, 52 percent of the forcible rapes reported to law enforcement were cleared by arrest or exceptional means in 1988. Rural county law enforcement agencies cleared 55 percent of the offenses brought to their attention, while suburban county agencies cleared 53 percent.


Clearance rates for the regions ranged from 45 percent in the Midwestern States to 56 percent in the Southern States. In the Northeastern States, the clearance rate for forcible rape was 54 percent, and in the Western States, it was 51 percent.


In the country as a whole, the Nation's cities, and the rural counties, 9 percent of the forcible rape clearances involved only persons under the age of 18. Suburban counties recorded a 10-percent involvement of this age group.

### Persons Arrested

From 1987 to 1988, the number of persons arrested for forcible rape showed virtually no change nationally. Arrests for this offense declined 1 percent in both suburban counties and the Nation's cities, while arrests in rural counties rose 5 percent. For the 5-year period, 1984 to 1988, increases of 3 percent were recorded for the total forcible rape arrests, and 4 percent for those of adults. A decrease of 2 percent was shown for arrests of persons under 18 years of age during this same period of time.

Of the forcible rape arrestees in 1988, 43 percent were persons under the age of 25, with 29 percent of the total being in the 18- to 24-year age group. Fifty-three percent of those arrested were white, 46 percent were black, and all other races comprised the remainder.





### **ROBBERY**

### **DEFINITION**.

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

### Volume

Accounting for 4 percent of all Index crimes and 35 percent of the crimes of violence, the estimated robbery total in 1988 was 542,968. During the year, robberies occurred most frequently in December and least often in April.

Regionally, the most populous Southern States registered 33 percent of all reported robberies. Following were the Northeastern States with 28 percent, the Western States with 21 percent, and the Midwestern States with the remainder.

### Trend

Upward trends in robbery were evident nationwide and throughout all population groups in 1988. Nationally, the 1988 robbery volume was 5 percent higher than the 1987 level. The suburban counties experienced a 7-percent increase in robberies; the Nation's cities overall, a 4-percent rise; and the rural counties, a 3-percent increase. Of the cities, those with populations of 100,000 to 249,999 registered the greatest increase, 7 percent.

Two-year regional trends show the number of robberies were up in all but one region. The increases were 10 percent in the South; 6 percent in the Northeast; and 2 percent in the West. A 2-percent decrease was recorded in the Midwest.

The accompanying chart depicts the trend in the robbery volume, as well as the robbery rate, for the years 1984-1988. In 1988, the number of robbery offenses was 12 percent higher than in 1984 and 13 percent above the 1979 total.

### Rate

The national robbery rate in 1988 was 221 per 100,000 people, 4 percent higher than in 1987. In metropolitan

areas, the robbery rate was 278; in cities outside metropolitan areas, it was 55; and in the rural areas, it was 15. With 919 robberies per 100,000 inhabitants, the highest rate was recorded in cities with populations over 1 million.

A comparison of 1987 and 1988 regional rates showed the only decline—2 percent—was in the Midwest, which had a rate of 169 per 100,000 population. The South's rate of 209 was 9 percent higher; the Northeast's rate of 299 was up 5 percent; and the West's rate of 225 represented a 1-percent increase.

### Nature

In 1988, a total estimated national loss of \$343 million was due to robberies. The value of property stolen during robberies averaged \$631 per incident. Average dollar losses ranged from \$344 taken during robberies of convenience stores to \$2,885 per bank robbery. The impact of this violent crime on its victims cannot be measured in terms of monetary loss alone. While the object of a robbery is to obtain money or property, the crime always involves force or threat of force, and many victims suffer serious personal injury.


As in previous years, robberies on streets or highways accounted for more than half (54 percent) of the offenses in this category. Robberies of commercial and financial establishments accounted for an additional 23 percent, and those occurring at residences, 10 percent. The remainder were miscellaneous types. Only gas or service station robberies declined from 1987 to 1988, down 1 percent. Among the other types, convenience store robberies showed the greatest increase, 16 percent.



Forty-three percent of all robberies in 1988 were committed through the use of strong-arm tactics. Firearms were used in 33 percent, knives or cutting instruments in 14 percent, and other weapons in the remaining 10 percent. A comparison of 1987 and 1988 robbery totals by weapon showed those by both strong-arm and other dangerous weapons increased 5 percent; those by firearms rose 3 percent; and those by knives or cutting instruments increased 2 percent.

### Clearances

Twenty-six percent of the robbery offenses reported to law enforcement were cleared during 1988. The highest robbery clearance rate—41 percent—was registered by

rural law enforcement agencies. Suburban county agencies cleared 29 percent and those in cities, 25 percent. Regional robbery clearance percentages were 30 percent in the South, 27 percent in the West, 25 percent in the Northeast, and 19 percent in the Midwest.


Nationally, persons under the age of 18 were the offenders in 10 percent of all 1988 robbery clearances. This age group accounted for 11 percent of the city clearances, 8 percent of the suburban county clearances, and 6 percent of the rural county clearances.


### Persons Arrested


Arrests for robbery increased 3 percent nationwide and in cities during 1988 when compared to 1987. An increase was also experienced in the rural counties, 7 percent. The suburban counties, however, showed a decrease of 1 percent in the number of persons arrested for this offense.


Fifty-nine percent of all robbery arrestees in 1988 were under 25 years of age, and 92 percent were males. Sixty-three percent of those arrested were black, 36 percent were white, and the remainder were of other races.


The total number of robbery arrests increased 4 percent during the 5-year period, 1984-1988. For the same timespan, arrests of females for robbery increased 21 percent, while male arrests rose 3 percent. Juvenile arrests were down 11 percent, while those of persons 18 years of age and older were up 9 percent.














### AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

### \_ DEFINITION \_\_\_

Aggravated assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

### Volume

Totaling an estimated 910,092 offenses nationally, aggravated assaults in 1988 occurred most frequently in the summer months. Geographic distribution figures show that 36 percent of the aggravated assault volume was accounted for by the Southern States, 25 percent by the Western States, 20 percent by the Midwestern States, and 19 percent by the Northeastern States.

The 1988 monthly figures show that the greatest number of aggravated assaults was recorded during July and August, while the lowest volume occurred in February.

### Trend

In 1988, aggravated assault increased 6 percent nation-wide in volume as compared to 1987. For the 2-year period, upward trends in the geographic regions ranged from an increase of 10 percent in the Northeastern States to 4 percent in the Midwestern States. Rises of 7 and 5 percent were recorded in the Southern and Western States, respectively.

By population grouping, cities with 250,000 to 499,999 inhabitants recorded the greatest rise in aggravated assaults from 1987, 11 percent. Upswings of 8 percent in the suburban counties, 6 percent in the cities collectively, and 1 percent in the rural counties were registered for this offense during the same time period.

Five- and 10-year trends show aggravated assaults up 33 percent above the 1984 level and 45 percent over the 1979 experience.

### Rate

Up 5 percent above the 1987 rate, there were 370 reported victims of aggravated assault for every 100,000 people nationwide in 1988. Higher than the national average, the rate in metropolitan areas was 422 per 100,000. Cities outside metropolitan areas experienced a rate of 286 and rural counties, a rate of 141.

Nationwide, the rate for aggravated assault showed increases of 28 percent over 1984 and 29 percent over 1979.

### Nature

In 1988, 31 percent of the aggravated assaults were committed with blunt objects or other dangerous weapons. Of the remaining weapon categories, personal weapons such as hands, fists, and feet were used in 27 percent of the offenses; and knives or cutting instruments and firearms in 21 percent each.

From 1987 to 1988, aggravated assaults committed with knives or cutting instruments and personal weapons increased 4 percent while those assaults with blunt objects or other dangerous weapons increased 7 percent. Assaults where firearms were used showed the greatest increase during this 2-year period, 10 percent.





### Clearances

During 1988, law enforcement agencies nationwide cleared 57 percent of the aggravated assaults reported. The cities collectively reported a 56-percent clearance rate while the suburban and rural county law enforcement agencies cleared 60 and 67 percent, respectively. Among the city groupings, those with populations less than 10,000 recorded the highest clearance rate, 66 percent.

Geographically, clearance percentages for aggravated assault were 62 percent in the South, 60 percent in the West, 55 percent in the Northeast, and 48 percent in the Midwest.

Eight percent of the clearances reported by suburban county agencies involved only persons under age 18. Persons in this age group were identified as the assailants in 9 percent of the national and city clearances and 6 percent of those in rural counties.

### Persons Arrested

The estimated 416,300 persons arrested for aggravated assault in 1988 represented 67 percent of all arrestees for violent crimes. Whites comprised 58 percent of the arrestees; blacks, 41 percent; and all other races, the remainder. Eighty-seven percent of the arrestees were males and 13 percent, females.

Total arrests for aggravated assault were up 11 percent in 1988 from the 1987 total. During this 2-year period, juvenile arrests increased 13 percent and adult arrests rose 10 percent. A comparison of 1984 and 1988 figures showed total arrests for this offense up 33 percent; those of persons under age 18, up 28 percent; and those of adults, up 34 percent.

### **BURGLARY**

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The Uniform Crime Reporting Program defines burglary as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify an offense as burglary. Burglary in this Program is categorized into three subclassifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry.

Estimated at over 3.2 million in 1988, burglaries accounted for 23 percent of all Crime Index offenses and 26 percent of the property crimes.

Distribution figures for the regions showed that the highest burglary volume occurred in the most populous Southern States, accounting for 42 percent of the total. The Western States followed with 23 percent, the Midwestern States with 19 percent, and the Northeastern States with 16 percent.

Like the previous year, more burglaries occurred in August than any other month. The lowest number was reported in April.

#### Trend

Nationwide, the burglary volume decreased 1 percent in 1988 from the 1987 total. Cities with populations of 1 million or more registered the only increase, 2 percent. Both the rural and suburban counties showed no change in their burglary volumes.

Geographically, three of the four regions reported decreases in burglaries in 1988 compared to 1987. The declines were 4 percent in the Midwestern States, 3 percent in the Western States, and 1 percent in the Northeastern States. The Southern States recorded the only increase in burglaries, 2 percent.

#### Rate

A burglary rate of 1,309 per 100,000 inhabitants was registered nationwide in 1988. The rate decreased 2 percent from 1987 and was 13 percent below the 1979 rate. In 1988, for every 100,000 in population, the rate was 1,457 in the metropolitan areas, 1,042 in the cities outside metropolitan areas, and 672 in the rural counties.

Regionally, the burglary rate was 1,583 in the Southern States, 1,461 in the Western States, 1,039 in the Midwestern States, and 1,018 in the Northeastern States. A comparison of 1987 and 1988 rates showed declines of 4 percent in the Midwest and West and 1 percent in the Northeast. The South registered a burglary rate increase of 1 percent.

#### Nature

Two of every 3 burglaries in 1988 were residential in nature. Seventy percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 22 percent were unlawful entries (without force), and the remainder were forcible entry attempts. Offenses for which time of occurrence was reported were evenly divided between day and night.

Burglary victims suffered losses estimated at \$3.3 billion in 1988, and the average dollar loss per burglary was \$1,014. The average loss for residential offenses was \$1,037, while for nonresidential property, it was \$967.


Residential burglary showed a 2-percent decline from 1987 to 1988; nonresidential offenses showed no change during the same period.




In 1988, 13 percent of the burglaries brought to the attention of law enforcement agencies across the country were cleared. Geographically, a 15-percent clearance rate was registered in the South. In the Northeast, the rate was 14 percent; in the West, 13 percent; and in the Midwest, it was 11 percent.


Rural county law enforcement cleared 16 percent of the burglaries in their jurisdictions. Those in the suburban counties recorded a clearance rate of 14 percent, and agencies in cities obtained clearances in 13 percent.


Adults were involved in 82 percent of all burglary offenses cleared, and only young people under 18 years of age were offenders in the remaining 18 percent. Similar to the national experience, persons under age 18 accounted for 18 percent of the burglary clearances in cities and suburban counties. Rural county law enforcement agencies reported 19 percent of their burglary clearances involved only juveniles. The highest degree of juvenile involvement was recorded in the Nation's smallest cities (under 10,000 population) where young persons under 18 years of age comprised 26 percent of the clearances.














## Persons Arrested

In the UCR Program, several persons may be arrested in connection with the clearance of one crime, or the arrest of one individual may clear numerous offenses. The latter is often true in cases of burglary for which an estimated 463,400 arrests were made in 1988. Arrest trends between 1987 and 1988 show a 1-percent decrease in total burglary arrests. Arrests of persons under 18 years of age declined 4 percent, while those for adults increased 1 percent. For the

same 2-year time period, total burglary arrests in the cities recorded virtually no change, while in the rural and suburban counties, they showed decreases of 4 and 3 percent, respectively.

Ninety-two percent of the burglary arrestees during 1988 were males and 67 percent were under 25 years of age. Of the total burglary arrestees, whites accounted for 67 percent, blacks for 31 percent, and other races for the remainder.

#### LARCENY-THEFT

# **DEFINITION**.

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. In the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, this crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is also excluded from this category inasmuch as it is a separate Crime Index offense.

Larceny-theft offenses, estimated at 7,705,872 during 1988, comprised 55 percent of the Crime Index total and 62 percent of the property crimes. When viewed monthly, larceny-thefts were recorded most often during August and least frequently in February.

Regionally, the most populous Southern States recorded 37 percent of the total. The Western States registered 24 percent; the Midwestern States, 22 percent; and the Northeastern States, 17 percent.

# Trend

Compared to 1987, the 1988 volume of larceny-thefts increased 3 percent in the Nation and 2 percent in all cities collectively. Both the suburban and rural counties also showed 3-percent increases.

Volume increases were recorded in the Southern States, 4 percent; and in the Western and Northeastern States, 3 percent. The Midwestern States registered virtually no change.

The 5- and 10-year national larceny trends showed a 17-percent increase over the totals for both 1984 and 1979.

#### Rate


The 1988 larceny-theft rate was 3,135 per 100,000 United States inhabitants, 2 percent higher than in 1987. The 1988 rate was 12 percent above the 1984 level and 5 percent higher than in 1979. The 1988 rate was 3,506 per 100,000 inhabitants of metropolitan areas; 3,298 per 100,000 population in cities outside metropolitan areas; and 973 per 100,000 people in the rural counties.


Regionally, the Western States' larceny-theft rate increased 1 percent over the 1987 level to 3,642 per 100,000 inhabitants. The rates were 3,338 in the Southern States and 2,594 in the Northeastern States, up 3 and 2 percent, respectively. The Midwestern States' rate, 2,877, showed virtually no change in 1988 as compared to 1987.

#### Nature

The average value of property stolen due to larceny-theft during 1988 was \$426, up from \$404 in 1987. When the average value was applied to the estimated number of larceny-thefts, the loss to victims nationally was \$3.3 billion for the year. This estimated dollar loss is considered conservative since many offenses in the larceny category, particularly if the value of the stolen goods is small, never come to law enforcement attention. Losses in 25 percent of the thefts reported to law enforcement in 1988 ranged from \$50 to \$200, while in 35 percent, they were over \$200.

Losses of goods and property reported stolen as a result of pocket-picking averaged \$384; purse-snatching, \$228; and shoplifting, \$104. Thefts from buildings resulted in an average loss of \$673; from motor vehicles, \$461; and from coin-operated machines, \$144. The average value loss due to thefts of motor vehicle accessories was \$297 and for thefts of bicycles, \$188.





Thefts of motor vehicle parts, accessories, and contents made up the largest portion of reported larcenies—38 percent. Also contributing to the high volume of thefts were those from buildings and shoplifting, each accounting for 15 percent; and bicycle thefts, accounting for 6 percent. The remainder were distributed among pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from coin-operated machines, and all other types of larceny-thefts. The accompanying table presents the distribution of larceny-theft by type and geographic region.

#### Clearances

Twenty percent of the reported larceny-thefts were cleared nationwide and in cities during 1988. The highest clearance rate, 24 percent, was reported by law enforcement agencies in cities from 10,000 to 24,999 in population. Those in suburban and rural counties recorded 17-percent clearance rates.

Regionally, law enforcement agencies in the West cleared 21 percent of the larceny offenses brought to their attention. The clearance rate in the South was 20 percent; in the Midwest, 19 percent; and in the Northeast, 18 percent.

Twenty-two percent of the larceny-theft clearances nationally and in the cities involved only offenders under 18 years of age. Nineteen percent of those in suburban counties and 17 percent of those in rural counties were accounted for by persons in this age group.


#### Persons Arrested


Between 1987 and 1988, the total number of persons arrested for larceny-theft increased 1 percent. Female arrests for this offense decreased 1 percent, and those of males increased 2 percent. During this same period, adult arrests rose 3 percent, while those of persons under 18 years of age showed a decline of 2 percent.


Considering a longer timeframe, larceny-theft arrests showed a 14-percent increase for the 5-year period, 1984-1988. Juvenile arrests were up 3 percent, and those of adults rose 19 percent. Male arrests increased 13 percent and female arrests, 16 percent during this 5-year timespan.


Larceny-thefts not only comprised the largest portion of Crime Index offenses reported to law enforcement, this offense accounted for 55 percent of the arrests for Index crimes and 70 percent of those for property crimes in 1988. Forty-four percent of the larceny arrestees were under 21 years of age, and 30 percent of the arrestees were under 18. Females, who were arrested for this offense more often than for any other in 1988, comprised 30 percent of all larceny-theft arrestees.

























# MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle, this offense category includes the stealing of automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motorscooters, snowmobiles, etc. The definition excludes the taking of a motor vehicle for temporary use by those persons having lawful access.

An estimated total of 1,432,916 thefts of motor vehicles occurred in the United States during 1988. These offenses comprised 12 percent of all property crimes. The regional distribution of motor vehicle thefts showed 31 percent of the volume was in the Southern States, 25 percent each in the Northeastern and Western States, and 19 percent in the Midwestern States.

Motor vehicle theft figures by month showed that the greatest number occurred in August, while the lowest was in April.

#### Trend

The number of motor vehicle thefts increased 11 percent nationally from 1987 to 1988. This upward trend was evident in all population groups with cities having populations of 1 million and over showing the largest increase, 16 percent. Suburban and rural counties showed increases of 11 percent and 4 percent, respectively.

Geographically, all four regions experienced motor vehicle theft increases. The increases were 14 percent in both the Northeastern and Western Regions, 10 percent in the Southern Region, and 5 percent in the Midwestern Region.

The accompanying chart shows that the volume of motor vehicle thefts in 1988 increased 39 percent over the 1984 volume.

## Rate

The 1988 national motor vehicle theft rate—583 per 100,000 people—was 10 percent higher than the rate in 1987. The rate was 33 percent higher than in 1984 and 15 percent above the 1979 rate.

For every 100,000 inhabitants living in MSAs, there were 713 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1988. The rate in cities outside metropolitan areas (other cities) was 210 and in rural counties, 114. As in previous years, the highest rates were in the Nation's most heavily populated municipalities, indicating that this offense is primarily a large-city problem. For every 100,000 inhabitants in cities with populations over 250,000, the 1988 motor vehicle theft rate was 1,448. The Nation's smallest cities, those with fewer than 10,000 inhabitants, recorded a rate of 236 per 100,000.

Among the regions, the motor vehicle theft rates ranged from 713 per 100,000 people in the Northeastern States to 446 in the Midwestern States. The Western States' rate was 711 and the Southern States' rate, 526. From 1987 to 1988, rate increases were registered in all regions. In the Northeastern States, the increase was 13 percent; in the Western States, 12 percent; in the Southern States, 9 percent; and in the Midwestern States, 5 percent.

An estimated average of 1 of every 128 registered motor vehicles was stolen nationwide during 1988. Regionally, this rate was greatest in the Northeast where 1 of every 91 motor vehicles registered was stolen. The other three regions reported lesser rates—1 per 110 in the West, 1 per 147 in the South, and 1 per 172 in the Midwest.

#### Nature

During 1988, an estimated national loss of over \$7 billion was due to motor vehicle theft. At the time of theft, the average value per vehicle stolen was \$5,117.


Seventy-seven percent of all motor vehicles reported stolen during the year were automobiles, 15 percent were trucks or buses, and the remainder were other types.



#### Clearances

Law enforcement agencies nationwide cleared 15 percent of the motor vehicle thefts reported in their locales during 1988. Those in cities cleared 14 percent; those in suburban counties cleared 18 percent; and rural county agencies cleared 33 percent.

Regional clearance percentages for motor vehicle theft were 10 percent in the Northeastern States, 15 percent in the Midwestern States, 16 percent in the Western States, and 19 percent in the Southern States.

Persons in the under-18 age group accounted for 21 percent of the motor vehicle thefts cleared in the Nation and for 22 percent in the cities. They comprised 18 percent of the clearances in the suburban counties, and in the rural counties, 19 percent.

#### Persons Arrested

During 1988, males accounted for 90 percent of the persons arrested for motor vehicle theft. Fifty-nine percent of the arrestees were white, 40 percent were black, and the remainder were of other races.

A large proportion of motor vehicle theft arrestees was accounted for by the younger segment of the population. In 1988, 58 percent of all persons arrested for this offense were under 21 years of age, and those under 18 comprised 40 percent of the total. Between 1987 and 1988, arrests of males under age 18 rose 20 percent and those of females within the same age range, 14 percent.

Total motor vehicle theft arrests were up 18 percent and adult arrests rose 17 percent in 1988 over the previous year. Overall arrests for this offense were 63 percent higher in 1988 than in 1984 and 20 percent above the 1979 level.

# **ARSON**

# **DEFINITION**.

Arson is defined by the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

A total of 101,097 arson offenses was reported by 12,367 law enforcement agencies across the country; these agencies furnished from 1 to 12 months of reports during 1988. Of these reporting agencies, 12,184 provided the detailed information—type of structure, estimated monetary value of the property damaged, etc.—from which the tables on the accompanying pages were tabulated. Further information regarding arson offenses and trends is presented in Tables 6 through 13 and arson clearances in Tables 20 through 23. Since only 8,164 agencies covering 70 percent of the United States population submitted reports for all 12 months of the year, the data user should be aware that, while conservative indicators, the figures do not represent the Nation's total arson experience.

### Trend

The number of arson offenses reported nationally increased 1 percent in 1988 as compared to the 1987 total. Rural and suburban county arson counts declined, 5 and 3 percent, respectively, while the Nation's cities showed a 3-percent increase.

Geographically, arson increases were experienced in the South, 5 percent; and in the Northeast and Midwest, 1 percent each. A 1-percent decline was recorded in the West.

By property type nationally, the number of arsons of mobile property declined 3 percent; arsons of structures dropped 1 percent; and those of all other property increased 6 percent.

Caution is recommended when viewing arson trend information. The percent change figures may have been influenced by improved arson reporting procedures during the collection's relatively limited timespan. It is expected that year-to-year statistical comparability will improve as collection continues.

#### Rate

Since population coverage for arson data is lower than for the other Crime Index offenses, arson rates per 100,000 inhabitants are tabulated independently. Based only on figures from law enforcement agencies supplying 12 months of statistics for all Index crimes, including arson, the 1988 rates are shown in the accompanying table.

The rates ranged from 108 per 100,000 inhabitants in cities with populations over 1 million to 20 per 100,000 rural county inhabitants. The suburban counties and all cities collectively recorded rates of 37 and 60 per 100,000 inhabitants, respectively. Overall, the 1988 national arson rate was 51 per 100,000 population.

Regionally, the highest arson rate was registered in the Western States with 54 offenses per 100,000 population. Following were the Southern and Midwestern States with rates of 40 per 100,000 and the Northeastern States with 38 per 100,000.

#### **Nature**

As in previous years, structures were the most frequent target of arsonists in 1988 and comprised 55 percent of the reported incidents. Twenty-six percent of the arsons were directed at mobile property (motor vehicles, trailers, etc.), while other types of property (crops, timber, etc.) accounted for 19 percent.

Residential property was involved in 62 percent of the structural arsons during the year, with 43 percent of such offenses directed at single-occupancy dwellings. Nineteen percent of all targeted structural property was either uninhabited or abandoned at the time the arson occurred.

Motor vehicles comprised 92 percent of all mobile property at which arsons were directed.

The monetary value of property damaged due to reported arsons during 1988 totaled over \$1 billion, and the average loss per incident was \$12,467. The overall average for all types of structures was \$20,229. While industrial/manufacturing property was the structural classification with the lowest number of offenses, 754, it showed the highest average loss—\$75,415. Mobile properties averaged \$4,620 per incident, and other targets averaged \$660.

#### Clearances

The national 1988 arson clearance rate was 15 percent. Cities with populations under 10,000 showed the highest rate, clearing 24 percent of the arson offenses brought to their attention. Rural county law enforcement agencies cleared 22 percent; those in suburban counties, 18 percent; and city departments, 14 percent.

Regionally, the Southern States reported a clearance rate of 21 percent; the Western States, 14 percent; and both the Midwestern and Northeastern States, 12 percent.

Thirty-nine percent of all 1988 arson clearances involved only young people under age 18, a higher percentage of juvenile involvement than for any other Index crime. Persons in this age group accounted for 38 percent

of structural arson clearances, 21 percent of the clearances for arsons of mobile property, and 60 percent of those of all other property.

By population grouping, juveniles were the offenders in 41 percent of the city arson clearances, 37 percent of those in suburban counties, and 25 percent of those in the rural counties.

The accompanying tables show clearance data only for those 12,184 law enforcement agencies which were able to furnish breakdowns by type for the structural and mobile classifications. As can be seen, the highest clearance rate (32 percent) was recorded for offenses in which community or public structures were involved, while the lowest rate (10 percent) was registered for motor vehicles.

# Persons Arrested

The estimated number of arrests for arson during 1988 totaled 19,700. Forty-three percent of the arrestees were under 18 years of age and 63 percent were under 25. Males comprised 87 percent of all arson arrestees. Seventy-three percent of those arrested were white, 25 percent were black, and the remainder were of other races.

Trends for 1987 versus 1988 show arson arrests increased 4 percent nationwide and 6 percent in all cities

collectively. The rural counties registered a 1-percent rise. Suburban counties recorded a 2-percent decline.

Arrests of persons under the age of 18 increased 8 percent from 1987 to 1988, while adult arrests showed a 2-percent increase nationwide. During the same period overall, male arrests for arson were up 4 percent and total female arrests, up 3 percent.

The 1988 arson arrest total for all ages was 2 percent below the 1984 level and 8 percent lower than in 1979.

# CRIME INDEX TABULATIONS

This Section's tabular portions present data on crime in the United States as a whole; geographic divisions; individual states; Metropolitan Statistical Areas; cities, towns, and counties; and college and university campuses. Also furnished in the following tables are national averages for the value of property stolen in connection with Crime Index offenses; further breakdowns by type for the robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and arson classifications; and data on the type and value of property stolen and recovered.

Although the total number of crimes occurring throughout the Nation is unknown, information on those reported to law enforcement gives a reliable indication of criminal activity. In reviewing the tables in this report, it must be remembered, however, that many factors can cause the volume and type of crime to vary from place to place. Even though population, one of these factors, is used in computing crime rates, all communities are affected to some degree by seasonal or transient populations. Since counts of current, permanent population are used in their construction, crime rates do not account for short-term population variables, such as an influx of day workers, tourists, shoppers, etc. A further discussion of various factors contributing to the amount of crime in a given area is shown on page  $\nu$  of this publication.

National data can serve as a guide for the law enforcement administrator in analyzing the local crime count, as well as the performance of the jurisdiction's law enforcement agency. The analysis, however, should not end with a comparison based on data presented in this publication. It is only through an appraisal of local conditions that a clear picture of the community crime problem or the effectiveness of the law enforcement operation is possible.

#### Note

The collection of statistics on arson as a Crime Index offense began in 1979. However, 1988 annual figures are not available for inclusion in tables presenting statistics for the total United States. Arson totals reported by individual law enforcement agencies are displayed in Tables 6 through 9. Two-year arson trends are shown in Tables 10 through 13.

#### Crime Index Total

The Crime Index total rose 3 percent to 13.9 million offenses in 1988. Five- and 10-year percent changes showed the 1988 total was 17 percent above the 1984 level and 14 percent higher than in 1979.

From 1987 to 1988, overall violent crime showed a 6percent increase. Among the violent crimes, aggravated assault increased 6 percent; robbery, 5 percent; murder, 3 percent; and forcible rape, 2 percent.

The number of property crimes increased 3 percent for the 2-year period. Motor vehicle theft rose 11 percent, and larceny-theft was up 3 percent. Burglary showed a 1percent decline.

Considering 5- and 10-year timeframes, the 1988 violent and property crime totals each showed increases. Violent crime was up 23 percent and property crime, 16 percent over 1984 figures. A comparison of 1979 and 1988 figures showed upswings of 30 percent for violent crime and 12 percent for property crime. National estimates of volume and rate per 100,000 inhabitants for all Crime Index offenses covering the past decade are set forth in Table 1. "Index of Crime, United States, 1979-1988." Crime rates relate the incidence of reported crime to population.

Table 2, "Index of Crime, United States, 1988," shows current year estimates for MSAs, rural counties, and cities and towns outside metropolitan areas (other cities). See Appendix III for the definitions of these community types.

Provided in Table 3, "Index of Crime, Regional Offense and Population Distribution, 1988," are data showing the geographical distribution of estimated Index crimes and population. When utilizing figures presented on a regional basis in this publication, the reader is cautioned to

consider each region's proportion of the total United States population. For example, although the Southern States accounted for the largest volume of Crime Index offenses in 1988, they also represented the greatest regional population.

Although arson data are included in the trend and clearance tables, sufficient data are not available to estimate totals for this offense. Violent crimes are offenses of murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Property crimes are offenses of burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. Data are not included for the property crime of arson.

All rates were calculated on the offenses before rounding.





(per 100,000 inhabitants)



### **SECTION III**

### CRIME INDEX OFFENSES CLEARED

For UCR purposes, law enforcement agencies clear or solve an offense when at least one person is arrested, charged with the commission of the offense, and turned over to the court for prosecution. Several crimes may be cleared by the arrest of one person, while the arrest of many persons may clear only one offense. Law enforcement agencies may clear a crime by exceptional means when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against the offender. Examples of circumstances allowing such clearances are the death of the offender (suicide, justifiably killed by police or private citizen, etc.); the victim's refusal to cooperate with prosecution after the offender has been identified; or the denial of extradition because the offender committed another crime and is being prosecuted in a different jurisdiction. In all exceptional clearance cases, law enforcement must have identified the offender, have enough evidence to support arrest, and know the offender's location.

Law enforcement agencies cleared 21 percent of the Crime Index offenses brought to their attention during 1988. A 46-percent clearance rate for the violent crimes collectively was recorded. Among the violent offenses, the rates were 70 percent for murder, 52 percent for forcible rape, 26 percent for robbery, and 57 percent for aggravated assault. Clearances for crimes against persons (murder, forcible rape, and aggravated assault) are generally higher as more intense investigative efforts are often given these offenses and witnesses are frequently available to identify the perpetrators.

The overall property crime clearance rate was 18 percent. Thirteen percent of the burglaries, 20 percent of the larceny-thefts, and 15 percent of both motor vehicle thefts and arsons were cleared during the year. When considering the Modified Crime Index total which includes arson, the overall clearance rate remained the same, 21 percent.

Regionally, the highest total Crime Index clearance rates were registered in the South and West, both with 22 percent. In the Midwest and Northeast, the rates were 19 percent. The South recorded the highest violent crime clearance rate, 51 percent. Following were the West with 49 percent, the Northeast with 42 percent, and the Midwest with 38 percent.

By community type, rural county law enforcement agencies showed clearances for 22 percent of the Crime Index offenses brought to their attention. Those in cities cleared 21 percent, and those in suburban counties, 20 percent.

# Clearances Involving Only Persons under 18 Years of Age

Involvement of juveniles in crime can be measured by the number of crimes in which they have been identified as the offenders. Even though no physical arrest has been made, a clearance by arrest is recorded when an offender under 18 years of age is cited to appear in juvenile court or before other juvenile authorities. Juveniles (persons under 18 years of age) accounted for 26 percent of the United States population, according to 1988 Bureau of the Census projected population figures.

Eighteen percent of the Crime Index offenses cleared by law enforcement during 1988 involved only young people under age 18. Persons in this age group accounted for 9 percent of the violent crime clearances and 21 percent of those for property crimes. Murder showed the lowest percentage of juvenile involvement (6 percent), while the highest percentage was shown for arson (39 percent).

Geographically, the Midwestern States recorded the largest percentage of Crime Index offense involvement by the under-18 age group—23 percent. Juveniles alone were the offenders in 19 percent of the clearances in the Northeastern and Western States and 14 percent of those in the Southern States.



## **SECTION IV**

### PERSONS ARRESTED

Primarily a gauge of law enforcement's response to crime, arrest counts also provide definitive data concerning the age, sex, and race of perpetrators. Arrest practices, policies, and enforcement emphases vary from place to place and even within a community from time to time as, for example, during a local police campaign against residential burglary. While the practices for certain unlawful conduct such as drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, and related violations may differ among agencies, those for robbery, burglary, and other serious crime arrests are more likely to be uniform and consistent throughout all jurisdictions. The Program's procedures require that an arrest be counted on each separate occasion a person is taken into custody, notified, or cited. Annual arrest figures do not measure the number of individuals arrested since one person may be arrested several times during the year for the same or different offenses.

Nationwide, law enforcement agencies made an estimated 13.8 million arrests in 1988 for all criminal infractions except traffic violations. When the arrest volume was related to the total United States population, the rate was 5,366 arrests per 100,000 inhabitants. In cities with populations of 250,000 or more, the rate was 7,901, the highest recorded. For suburban county agencies overall, the arrest rate was 3,881, and for rural county law enforcement, it was 3,477 per 100,000 inhabitants.

Regionally, the arrest rates per 100,000 population ranged from 4,753 in the Midwest to 6,043 in the West. The Northeast recorded an arrest rate of 5,302 and the South, 5,357.

Due to reporting problems at the state levels, no usable arrest data were received for local law enforcement agencies in Florida and Kentucky. For Table 24, showing the total estimated arrests for the United States, arrest figures for these two states were estimated. The states' most current, valid annual totals were updated by applying the percentage changes of the geographic divisions in which the states reside. No Florida or Kentucky figures are included in the other tables on persons arrested.

### Arrest Trends

The total number of arrests for all offenses except traffic violations increased 1 percent in 1988 as compared to the 1987 volume. During the same time period, adult arrests rose 2 percent, while those of persons under 18 years of age showed virtually no change. When considering only the eight Crime Index offenses, increases were recorded for arrests of persons of all ages, 3 percent; of adults, 4 percent; and of juveniles, 1 percent. Total arrests for the Index's violent crimes increased 8 percent and for property crimes, 2 percent.

Similar to the national experience, 2-year trends for city agencies showed a 1-percent increase in total arrests, 1988 over 1987. Suburban county arrests were up 2 percent and rural county arrests, 3 percent.

Over the 5-year period beginning in 1984, total arrests for all offenses were up 10 percent with adult arrests up 11 percent and those of persons under 18 years of age up 6 percent. Total Crime Index arrests increased 15 percent, those of adults jumped 20 percent, and arrests of juveniles under 18 years of age rose 5 percent. During the same years, 1984-1988, total violent crime arrests increased 22 percent, and property crime arrests were up 14 percent.

Increases in arrests of persons of all ages were recorded for the 10 years, 1979-1988. Arrests for all offenses were up 22 percent; Crime Index arrests, 14 percent; violent crime arrests, 25 percent; and property crime arrests, 11 percent.

The 1988 drug abuse violation arrest total was 14 percent above the 1987 figure and 48 percent higher than in 1984. The types of drugs involved in violations resulting in arrests during 1988 are shown by geographic region in the accompanying table.

#### Age

Five percent of all persons arrested nationally in 1988 were under the age of 15; 16 percent were under 18; 30 percent were under 21; and 47 percent were under 25. Persons in the under-25 age group accounted for 48 percent of arrests in the cities, 43 percent of those in the suburban counties, and 41 percent of those in the rural counties.

Age distribution figures for persons arrested for Crime Index offenses showed 28 percent were under the age of 18; 43 percent, under 21; and 57 percent, under 25. The under-25 age group was also responsible for 45 percent of the violent crime arrests and 61 percent of property crime arrests in 1988.

### Sex

Eighty-two percent of the persons arrested in the Nation during 1988 were males. They accounted for 79 percent of Index crime arrests, 89 percent of those for violent crimes, and 76 percent of the property crime arrests. Males were most often arrested for driving under the influence, which accounted for 14 percent of all male arrests.

As in past years, larceny-theft was the crime for which females were most often arrested. This single offense accounted for 78 percent of arrests of women for Index crimes and 20 percent of all female arrests. Fifty-three percent of all female larceny-theft arrestees were under 25 years of age.

Two-year trends showed a 1-percent increase in the number of male arrests from 1987 to 1988 and a 2-percent rise in female arrests for the same period. Arrests of males were up 9 percent and those of females up 17 percent for the 5-year period from 1984 to 1988.

#### Race

Race distribution figures for the total number of arrests in the United States during 1988 showed 69 percent of the arrestees were white, 30 percent were black, and the remainder were of other races. Whites accounted for 62 percent of the Index crime arrests, 52 percent of the arrests for violent crimes, and 65 percent of those for property crimes.

# Law Enforcement Code of Ethics

As a Law Enforcement Officer, my fundamental duty is to serve mankind; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation, and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the Constitutional rights of all men to liberty, equality and justice.

# Will keep my private life unsultied as an example to all; maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn, or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of the police service. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession ... law enforcement.

# SECTION V

# LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL

The Nation's law enforcement community employed an average of 2.1 full-time officers for every 1,000 inhabitants as of October 31, 1988. Considering full-time civilians, the overall law enforcement employee rate was 2.8 per 1,000 inhabitants according to 12,269 city, county, and state police agencies reporting in 1988. These agencies collectively offered law enforcement service to a population of nearly 231 million, employing 485,566 officers and 166,877 civilians.

Varying demographic and other jurisdictional characteristics greatly affect the requirements for law enforcement service from one locale to another. The needs of a community having a highly mobile or seasonal population, for example, may be very different from those of a city whose population is relatively stable. Similarly, a small community situated between two large cities may require a greater number of law enforcement personnel than a community of the same size which has no urban centers nearby.

The functions of law enforcement are also significantly diverse throughout the Nation. In certain areas, sheriffs' responsibilities are limited almost exclusively to civil functions and/or the administration of the county jail facilities. Likewise, the responsibilities of state police and

highway patrol agencies vary from one jurisdiction to another.

In view of these differing service requirements and responsibilities, care should be used when attempting any comparison of law enforcement employee rates. The rates presented in the following tables represent national averages; they should be viewed as guides or indicators, not as recommended or desirable police strengths. Adequate personnel for a specific locale can be determined only after careful study and analysis of the various conditions affecting service requirements in that jurisdiction.

The law enforcement employee average for all cities nationwide in 1988 was 2.7 per 1,000 inhabitants. By population grouping, city law enforcement employee averages ranged from 2.1 per 1,000 inhabitants in those with populations from 10,000 to 49,999 to 3.4 for those with populations of 250,000 or more. Rural and suburban counties averaged full-time law enforcement employee rates of 3.4 and 3.0 per 1,000 population, respectively.

Regionally, the highest law enforcement employee rate was in the Northeast with 2.9. In the South, the rate was 2.8, while the Midwest and the West both registered law enforcement employee rates of 2.4.

#### Sworn Personnel

Rates based solely on sworn law enforcement personnel (excluding civilians) showed the national average for all cities was 2.1 officers per 1,000 inhabitants. By population grouping, the lowest average rate (1.7) was for cities with populations of 10,000 to 99,999; cities 250,000 or more in population recorded the highest rate, 2.7. Suburban county law enforcement agencies averaged 2.0 officers per 1,000 population, while agencies in rural counties averaged 2.3.

Geographically, the highest rate of officers to population was recorded in the Northeastern States where there were 2.4 officers per 1,000 inhabitants. Following were the Southern States with 2.2, the Midwestern States with 2.0, and the Western States with 1.7.

Nationally, males comprised 92 percent of all sworn employees. Ninety-four percent of the officers in rural counties and 93 percent of those in cities were males, while in suburban counties they accounted for 89 percent.

### Civilian Employees

Civilians made up 26 percent of the total United States law enforcement employee force in 1988. They represented 21 percent of the police employees in cities, 32 percent of those in rural counties, and 34 percent of the suburban law enforcement strength.

## Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted

Seventy-eight law enforcement officers were feloniously slain in the line of duty during 1988, 4 more lives lost than in 1987. Another 77 officers were killed due to accidents occurring while performing their official duties in 1988.

Extensive data on line-of-duty deaths and assaults on city, county, state, and Federal officers can be found in the Uniform Crime Reporting publication, Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted.

# SECTION VI APPENDIX I

# TABLE METHODOLOGY

Designed to assist the reader, this appendix explains the construction of many tabular presentations in the book. The following key refers to the columnar headings used throughout the appendix.

- Key: A) Column 1 shows the table numbers. Included are Tables 1 through 64, Crime in the United States 1988.
  - B) Column 2 indicates the level of submission necessary for an agency's statistics to be included in a table. There are three levels of participation:
    - Agencies having reported data for all
       months of the year.
    - 2. Agencies having reported data for at least one month but less than 12 months of the year.
    - 3. Nonreporting agencies.

The tabulations presented in the publication employ statistics from one or more of these participation levels. For example, Table 2 includes all three agency reporting levels, but Table 14 presents only data for agencies having reported the entire year.

- C) Column 3 explains how each table was constructed. Data adjustments, if any, are discussed along with various definitions of data aggregation.
- D) Column 4 contains general comments regarding the potential use and misuse of the statistics presented.

# APPENDIX II

# OFFENSES IN UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

Offenses in Uniform Crime Reporting are divided into two groupings, Part I and Part II. Information on the volume of Part I offenses known to law enforcement, those cleared by arrest or exceptional means, and the number of persons arrested is reported monthly. Only arrest data are reported for Part II offenses.

The Part I offenses are:

Criminal homicide.—a. Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter: the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded. Justifiable homicides are limited to: (1) the killing of a felon by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and (2) the killing of a felon by a private citizen. b. Manslaughter by negligence: the killing of another person through gross negligence. Traffic fatalities are excluded. While manslaughter by negligence is a Part I crime, it is not included in the Crime Index.

Forcible rape.—The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Included are rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape. Statutory offenses (no force used—victim under age of consent) are excluded.

Robbery.—The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated assault.—An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.

**Burglary-breaking or entering.**—The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempted forcible entry is included.

Larceny-theft (except motor vehicle theft).—The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles or automobile accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article which is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, worthless checks, etc., are excluded.

Motor vehicle theft.—The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self-propelled and runs on the surface and not on rails. Specifically excluded

from this category are motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.

Arson.—Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

The Part II offenses are:

Other assaults (simple).—Assaults and attempted assaults where no weapon is used and which do not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

Forgery and counterfeiting.—Making, altering, uttering, or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true. Attempts are included.

Fraud.—Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Included are confidence games and bad checks, except forgeries and counterfeiting.

Embezzlement.—Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

Stolen property; buying, receiving, possessing.— Buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, including attempts.

Vandalism.—Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

Weapons; carrying, possessing, etc.—All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers. Included are attempts.

Prostitution and commercialized vice.—Sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring, or transporting women for immoral purposes. Attempts are included.

Sex offenses (except forcible rape, prostitution, and commercialized vice).—Statutory rape and offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Attempts are included.

**Drug abuse violations.**—State and local offenses relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, and manufacturing of narcotic drugs.

**Gambling.**—Promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

Offenses against the family and children.—Nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

**Driving under the influence.**—Driving or operating any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

Liquor laws.—State or local liquor law violations, except "drunkenness" and "driving under the influence." Federal violations are excluded.

**Drunkenness.**—Offenses relating to drunkenness or intoxication. Excluded is "driving under the influence."

Disorderly conduct.—Breach of the peace.

Vagrancy.—Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

All other offenses.—All violations of state or local laws, except those listed above and traffic offenses.

Suspicion.—No specific offense; suspect released without formal charges being placed.

Curfew and loitering laws (persons under age 18).— Offenses relating to violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

Runaways.—(persons under age 18)—Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes.

### APPENDIX III

# UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING AREA DEFINITIONS

#### **Community Types**

Uniform Crime Reporting data are often presented using three community-type aggregations. These are Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), other cities, and rural counties.

The MSA concept was developed to facilitate the analysis and dissemination of uniform statistical information on metropolitan areas. The primary objective in establishing standard definitions of these areas was to make it possible for Federal agencies to utilize the same boundaries when publishing statistical data. Each MSA is an integrated economic and social unit with a recognized large population nucleus. Detailed criteria followed in establishing and defining MSAs can be found in the U.S. Department of Commerce publication, State Metropolitan Area Data Book, 1986 edition.

An MSA includes a central city of at least 50,000 population or an urbanized area of at least 50,000. The county containing the central city and contiguous counties having strong economic and social relationships to the central city and county are also included. Counties in MSAs are designated suburban in UCR. An MSA may cross state lines.

New England MSAs are comprised of cities and towns instead of counties. In this publication's tabular presentations, New England cities and towns are assigned to the proper MSA. Some counties, however, have both suburban and rural portions. Data for state police and sheriffs in those jurisdictions are included in statistics for the rural area.

MSAs made up approximately 77 percent of the total United States population in 1988. Some presentations in this book refer to "suburban area." A suburban area includes cities with less than 50,000 inhabitants in addition to counties (unincorporated areas) within the MSA. The central cities are, of course, excluded.

"Other cities," most of which are incorporated, are those outside MSAs. They comprised 9 percent of the 1988 population of the United States.

Rural counties, like "other cities," are outside MSAs. Covering areas not under the jurisdiction of city police departments, rural county law enforcement agencies of fered service to 14 percent of the national population in 1988.

The following diagram illustrates the aforementioned discussion of the community types.

The major source of UCR data is the individual law enforcement agency. The number of agencies included in each population group will vary slightly from year to year due to population growth, geopolitical consolidation, municipal incorporation, etc. Population figures for individual jurisdictions are estimated by the UCR Program in noncensus years. To obtain the 1988 figures, for example, state growth rates, as supplied by the Bureau of the Census, were applied to every county within each state. The county base figures were 1987 Bureau of the Census estimates. Using the revised county figures, 1986 Census provisional estimates for the cities were then updated to obtain the 1988 city population totals shown in this publication.



Forcible rape figures furnished by the state-level Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program administered by the Illinois Department of State Police were not in accordance with national UCR guidelines. Therefore the figures were excluded from the forcible rape, violent crime and Crime Index total categories.

1988 aggravated assault figures are not comparable to prior years.

Data for 1988 were not available for the States of Florida and Kentucky. Therefore, it was necessary that their crime counts be estimated. See "Offense Estimation", page 4 for details.
