



JUDGES OF THE DOMESTIC RELATIONS AND JUVENILE COURT

The Honorable Lillian M. Kern served as judge of the Montgomery County Domestic Relations Court from January of 1976 until her retirement in December of 1988, having been the first female judge elected to the Montgomery County Common Pleas Court. Prior to these years, Judge Kern served the community for ten years as an assistant prosecuting attorney. It was during Judge Kern's tenure as administrative judge of the court that major changes in Ohio law and procedures were enacted which resulted in the changing face of domestic relations law. Through this period, with Judge Kern's leadership, Montgomery County Domestic Relations Court earned the reputation as the best domestic relations court in the state.

Throughout her career, Judge Kern conducted herself with the highest traditions of American jurisprudence and continually displayed honesty, integrity, and an unwavering dedication to the legal profession. Judge Kern never failed to acknowledge the accomplishments, hard work, generosity and helpfulness of her colleagues, co-workers and staff. For her many accomplishments while an active member of the court, for her service to the public, for her integrity of character, for her skilled leadership, and for her generosity of spirit, we now commend Judge Lillian M. Kern for a job well done.

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INTRODUCTION

This report encompasses a three-year period during which the Court experienced a substantial increase in cases and a new dilemma. The delinquency caseload alone increased almost 20% during the reporting period. Commitments to the Department of Youth Services increased 32%, Detention population rose 21% and use of our Correction Center increased 20%. The new dilemma was, of course, the onset of crack, a deadly cocaine product. This dilemma brought us a rise in drug cases of almost 400% over the reporting period and the total ramifications in the area of dependency, neglect and abuse with crack babies is yet unknown. There are, of course, no clear-cut resolutions to any of these problems, yet there is a growing resolve within the community and the nation to conquer the problems facing our youth and and our society.

These three years also brought us to the close of some great experiences and to the beginnings of new challenges and opportunities. In 1987, the Juvenile Court Director, Mel Lopez announced his retirement. Mr. Lopez served the community and the Court for over 26 years. His years of leadership, spanned years of substantial increases in Juvenile Court caseloads and landmark Supreme Court decisions affecting the operation of Juvenile Justice Systems across the nation. Mr. Lopez served the community well and we sincerely thank him for his efforts.

In 1988, Jerald T. Connell resigned his position as Director of Human Resources. Mr. Connell served the community and the Court for 25 years, leaving to share his expertise with the private sector. Mr. Connell began as a Probation Office in 1965 and served in dozens of capacities in the Court, including Director of Probation Services and Director of Human Resources. We thank Mr. Connell for his dedicated service and wish him the best in his new endeavors.

December of 1988 marked the retirement of the Hon. Lillian M. Kern, Administrative Judge for the Domestic Relations Division of the Court. Previously in this report, there is a special commendation for Judge Kern's dedicated years of service and on behalf of the community and all of the Court personnel, we thank her for her service.

Finally, the end of 1988 brought to a close the existence of the Division of Domestic Relations and Juvenile

Court itself. As of January 1, 1989, the Domestic Relations Court and the Juvenile Court became separate, distinct divisions of the Common Pleas Court of Montgomery County, Ohio. In the summer of 1989, the Common Pleas Court, Division of Domestic Relations, will be relocated in the new Dayton-Montgomery County Courts Building and the Montgomery County Common Pleas Court, Juvenile Division, will remain the sole occupant of the Family Court Center.

The years '86, '87 and '88, therefore, brought to a close some great experiences and great relationships. However, they also mark the beginning of new challenges and opportunities. These beginnings are reflected by new assignments in key positions within the Juvenile Division, including: Henry N. Kuntz, Jr., Court Administrator; Margaret L. Gasper, Director of Legal Services and Michael Pratt, Director of Probation Services.

This era was also highlighted by the establishment of the Court's Support Enforcement Office, expansion of Drug Assessment programming, participation in the Casey Foundation Grant to Dayton's New Futures Program, the installation of a new gymnasium floor and the beginning of the National Accreditation process for the Detention Center and the Frank W. Nicholas Residential Treatment Center.

We thank, especially the citizens of Montgomery County for their continued support, the Montgomery County Commissioners for their efforts on our behalf, the Junior League of Dayton for their special support in establishing the CASA, Court Appointed Special Advocate Program, and all of the staff who have brought us through this period and will lead us into the future.

SUPPORT SERVICES

Building Bridges, Inc.

A privately-supported arm of the Probation Department offering work therapy, intensified casework and a plethora of recreation and sports programming to repeat juvenile offenders. Youth are referred from the four main Probation Supervision Units, with Building Bridges operating as a satellite component at Shawen Acres, Cottage #4, Ron Reigelsperger, Supervisor (276-6800).

Chemical Awareness Program (C.A.P.)

The substance abuse unit of the Probation Department providing drug assessments, drug education, support and treatment groups, urinalysis and referral to in-patient programs. Youth are referred from throughout the Probation Department, as well as from the judge and referee staff. C.A.P. is located in Room #8 of the Family Court Center, Colleen McCutchen, Supervisor (225-5453).

Community Placement Unit (C.P.U.)

A part of the Probation Department assisting Probation Staff with evaluating the appropriateness of placement outside the natural home and alternative case planning through the unit's Screening and Assessment Committee. Where placement is warranted, C.P.U. works out funding by utilizing the Court's Placement Budget, other agency financial assistance and referral to I.C.A.T. (Interagency Clinical Assessment Team). Except for the Nicholas Center and George Foster Home, C.P.U. then supervises all children during placement and aftercare -- Jim Orme, Supervisor (225-4187, Room #3, Family Court Center).

Community Service/Restitution Program

A dispositional option of the Probation Department based on an accountability model where youth are placed in supervised work groups to work off a court-ordered number of community service hours (up to 10 hours) or amount of victim compensation (not to exceed \$600.00). Youth receive no direct monetary compensation and work out of Shawen Acres Cottage #4, Elmer Ahrens, Supervisor (276-6815).

Court Appointed Special Advocate Project (C.A.S.A.)

A joint effort of the Juvenile Court and the Junior League of Dayton whereby community volunteers are trained to act as Guardian Ad Litems for abused, neglected and dependent children. They interview all interested parties, make recommendations to the Judge or Referee and monitor the child's case, from a child advocacy position, through the implementation phase of planning.

C.A.S.A. is located on the 6th floor of the County Administration Building, Helen Jones, Project Director (225-5491).

Effective Parenting Information for Children Program (E.P.I.C.)

A Probation Department project run in conjunction with the Family Services Association to assist parents in developing confidence and competence in basic parenting skills. Parents are under Court order to attend the 2-hour weekly sessions for a total of 8 weeks. E.P.I.C. groups are held at the Family Court Center and are run by Probation and Family Services staff, Linda Fish, Probation Supervisor (276-6819).

Family Intensive Assessment and Treatment Project (F.I.A.T.)

A Juvenile Court-operated project in conjunction with Catholic Social Services and the Eastway Corporation to provide family assessments, short-term family treatment and referral for families referred by Probation Staff with acute family dysfunctional problems. Home visitation is a part of an aggressive outreach component, with the main office located in Room \$6 of the Family Court Center -- Sheila Jones-Jenkins, Supervisor (225-5652).

George Foster Home Programs

The residential component of Building Bridges, Inc. which includes a group home for 8 boys at 2157 Salem Avenue and a foster care network for girls -- George Wharton, Director (274-6619), and Janine Frank, Girls Coordinator (276-6821).

Home Detention Program

An alternative used by preliminary referees whereby a youth is released from the secure "lock up" of the Detention Home and supervised under a strict monitoring system at home pending court disposition in his case. Professional and volunteer staff enforce a contract by making three contacts per day with the youth -- Joan Lehn and Dona Devoise, Counselors (225-6305, Room \$9, Family Court Center).

Juvenile Correction Center (J.C.C.)

A dispositional alternative where a youth is committed to a secure treatment wing of the Detention Home for a specified period of time not to exceed 30 days (usually 2-15 days). Status offenders may only be placed in J.C.C. for violation of probation and for only a maximum of five days -- George Holcomb, Director of Detention Services (225-5901).

Nicholas Residential Treatment Center (N.R.T.C.)

A court-operated residential treatment center located on 60 acres at 5581 Dayton-Liberty Road in Jefferson Township. Included in

this open campus setting with two split-level family style cottages is an accredited, on-grounds school for the 24 boys, ages 11-16, who are referred by the Probation Department -- Lee Townsel, Director (262-3102).

Probation Supervision Units

The main body of the Probation Department broken into four geographical areas of responsibility, each with a Casework Supervisor and 5 or 6 Probation Officers. They are responsible for pre-hearing investigation reports (Social Histories) and supervision of those children placed under official probation (usually for periods of six months). Interview, assessment, relationship and referral skills are employed with the following Casework Supervisor assignments:

Project Attention

Is located and a part of the Intake Department of the Juvenile Court employing crisis intervention to reduce the number of status offenders necessitating secure detention or reduce the number of days for such offenders in the Detention Home. The Project Attention worker, Tom Castleman (225-5834, Room #122D, Family Court Center) provides early involvement with those status offenders not yet assigned a Probation Officer.

Psychological Services

Psychological testing and consultation for court cases referred by the Judge, Referee or Probation Department. Priority attention is given to detained and bind-over cases under the direction of Dr. Zeev Bar-av (225-5847, Room #10, Family Court Center).

Volunteers In Probation Program

Under the direction of the Chief Probation Officer, volunteers are channeled to all areas of the Probation Department for special assignment in a variety of helping roles, including that of an Assistant P.O. Many volunteers are college students, some doing practicum or internship work. Service clubs and churches are involved -- Mike Pratt, Director of Probation Services (225-4162, Room #13, Family Court Center).

RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY COURT PSYCHOLOGIST

DOMESTIC RELATIONS COURT

During the years 1986, 1987, and 1988, the Domestic Relations Court witnessed many changes brought about by new legislation and Supreme Court Rules. The new mandates increased the overall work of the court and specifically created the need for establishing a new department within the court called the "Support Office".

The legislative changes, concerning support enforcement, and the Supreme Court Rules, establishing child support guidelines, were adopted by Ohio to conform to the Federal Regulations regarding child support enforcement. These changes have assured the community that the children of divorce will receive an equitable amount of support from both parents, and, in almost all cases, these children can be assured of receiving the support from the non-custodial parent until their majority.

It was also during the years 1986, 1987, and 1988, that the Domestic Relations Court was involved in the design of space for the court to be located in the new Dayton-Montgomery County Courts Building. The initial planning with the architects commenced in 1986, with ground breaking in October of 1987. The space for the court was designed to provide for efficiency in operations, and to provide comfort and security for both staff and the public. With occupancy, scheduled for the summer of 1989, all Domestic Relations Court staff will be together for the first time in twenty years...a long awaited dream.
