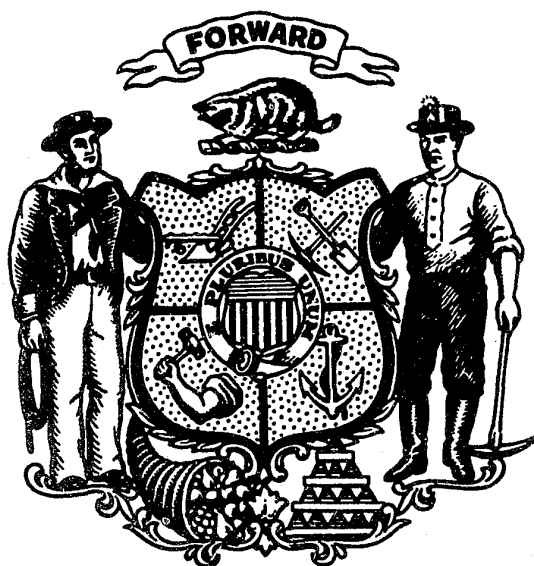

## ACQUISITIONS

Wisconsin's Division of Corrections is responsible for (1) the operation of correctional facilities for adult and juvenile offenders and (2) the supervision of offenders residing in the community under the terms and conditions of probation, parole, mandatory release, special action early release, and juvenile aftercare supervision. This publication, which is a compilation of the monthly Statistical Bulletin C-59, Report of Wisconsin Corrections Population, is designed to provide information about the volume and movements of offenders under Division of Corrections supervision during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1989.

Fiscal year average daily populations and movements into and out of correctional institutions for adult offenders are presented in Table 1. The columns labeled "Contr. fac." include information for offenders serving Wisconsin sentences under contractual arrangements in Wisconsin county jails and in correctional institutions operated by the Federal Bureau of Prisons. Table 1 does not include information about offenders confined at the Wisconsin Resource Center, an institution operated by the Division of Care and Treatment Facilities.

Table 2 includes information about average daily populations and movements into and out of Ethan Allen and Lincoln Hills Schools, the state's correctional institutions for juvenile offenders. Data about the youth aids program for fiscal year 1989 is presented in Table 2-A.

Information about the average daily populations and movements of offenders residing in the community under field supervision is included in Table 3. Data about offenders who absconded from or were returned to field supervision during fiscal year 1989 appears in Table 4.

For those interested in trend data the average daily populations for community supervision and institution cases for the fiscal years 1985 through 1989 are shown in Table A. Information for absconders from field supervision is not included in this table.

On June 30, 1989, the Division of Corrections was responsible for the supervision of 39,581 offenders; an increase of 6.4 percent over the 37,207 under supervision on June 30, 1988. The number of offenders resident in correctional facilities for adults rose from 5,790 at the start to 6,232 at the end of the fiscal year; an increase of 7.6 percent. The population in correctional institutions for juvenile offenders increased 7.0 percent from 511 on July 1, 1988 to 547 on June 30, 1989. Adults and juveniles reported in footnote a, Tables 1 and 2, as being absent with leave are not included in these figures. The number of offenders under some type of supervision in the community rose from 27,013 at the start to 28,388 at the end of the fiscal year; an increase of 5.1 percent (see Table 3). The number of community supervision cases on absconder status increased 13.4 percent from 3,893 on July 1, 1988 to 4,414 on June 30, 1989.

During fiscal year 1989 the average daily population of offenders under Division of Corrections supervision was 33,359; an increase of 15.4 percent over the average daily population of 28,897 reported during fiscal year 1985. The average daily population of offenders under probation supervision rose steadily from 20,105 in fiscal year 1985 to 22,981 in fiscal year 1989; an increase of 14.3 percent. Adult probation average daily populations increased 14.0 percent during the five-year period while the average daily population of probationers supervised under interstate compact agreements increased 27.7 percent from 499 in 1985 to 637 in fiscal year 1989. The overall average daily population of offenders under some type of parole supervision increased 8.3 percent from 3,553 in 1985 to 3,848 in 1989. The adult offender average daily parole population in fiscal year 1989 was 3,457; a high for the five-year period and an increase of 2.1 percent over the previous fiscal year when the average daily population was 3,385.

The juvenile aftercare average daily population, which was at a five-year high of 190 in fiscal year 1987 decreased to 163 in fiscal year 1989; a decline of 14.2 percent. It should be noted that the absence of juveniles under probation supervision is due to a Department of Health and Social Services policy decision to discontinue the provision of such services on a state level. The almost total absence of youthful offenders is attributable to the repeal of the Youthful Offender statute which became effective on July 1, 1978.

Correctional institution average daily populations rose steadily from 5,239 in fiscal year 1985 to 6,530 in fiscal year 1989; an increase of 24.6 percent. The greater part of the increase was in institutions for adult offenders where the average daily population rose steadily from 4,734 in fiscal year 1985 to 6,006 in fiscal year 1989; an increase of 26.9 percent. For the second year in a row, juvenile institutions' average daily populations remained at 524.
