Gentlemen:

It is my great pleasure to forward to you this Department's 1989 Annual Report.

Although there was a modest increase in this year's F.B.I. Index Crimes of 4%, some comfort can be taken by the fact that the more serious crimes against persons, homicides and rape, decreased by 8.5% and 7.3% respectively.

We are continuing our endeavors to provide more efficient police service to our citizens. In this regard, 1989 saw the hiring of sixty-one (61) permanent Report Technicians, with a total of twenty-three (23) assigned to the Patrol Division, releasing a like number of Police Officers for patrol duties.

Our constant attempts to increase efficiency saw the re-alignment of the boundaries of Precincts #8, #9, #11, #12 and #16. This re-alignment has achieved a more equitable distribution of calls for service in those precincts thus allowing for increased efficiency in answering those calls.

This Department will continue to seek out and implement any procedures which will increase the quality of police service to our citizens. As always, I thank you on behalf of this entire Department for your continued support.



**NIAGARA MOHAWK BUILDING.**  
1912, additions 1924, 1927  
sometimes called General Electric Tower  
538 Washington St. Buffalo

This slender, white-glazed terra cotta light-house like building, designed by the prominent Buffalo architectural firm of Evershew and Johnson, attempts to replicate the Tower of Light, a temporary edifice built for the Pan-American Exposition in Buffalo in 1891 and shortly thereafter razed. It is even suggested that the building tries to capture something of the imagined configuration of the Pharos, the lighthouse that stood at Alexandria in Egypt. One of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World, it is now thought by archaeologists to exist in ruins at the bottom of Alexandria harbor. The Niagara Mohawk Building is one of a number of terra cotta curtain wall buildings erected in Buffalo in the early years of the century.




# Architecture of the

**FIRE ENGINE COMPANY**  
NO. 28, 1897  
1170 Leavitt St. Buffalo

One of the most ornate of a number of stylish fire stations in Buffalo, built in various revival styles, is Engine 28. It is vaguely French Renaissance style and one of two in houses on the city landmark register, the other being Hook and Ladder Co. No. 141 309 Spring St. Other notable firehouses in Buffalo are the opulent-looking French Second Empire Engine No. 2 (circa 1873) at 402 Lehigh Street at Plymouth; the vaguely Romanesque Engine No. 26 (1884) at Tonawanda and Progressive No. 1 in Riverside; and the sagely Craftsman style Engine "3" (1912) at Main St. and Mercer near Bennett High School. The octagon towers with their octagon turrets, the ornate dormer and the cast-iron arched and window caps make No. 28 an unusual public building. It adds a certain dignity to the profession of fire fighting and supplies a certain tone to the neighborhood.

Whatever historical style these stations were built to emulate, they all possess a plain which tower toward the rear for hanging the hose to dry and for locating ladders. The architect was Frederick Mohr.



**BUFFALO LIGHTHOUSE, 1833**  
1 N. Canal Guard Base  
at Buffalo Harbor. Restored in 1961

Built in 1833, this handsome, clean-lined Buffalo Lighthouse is the oldest building on the Buffalo Waterfront and one of the oldest lighthouses on the Great Lakes. Octagonal shaped

and made of a light limestone and bluestone, it rises 44 feet above the harbor. A symbol of Buffalo, this venerable building appears on the official seal of the City of Buffalo and on the left of the Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society.

Threatened by demolition in the late 1940s for some unjustifiable harbor expansion, the building was saved in 1961 by a cadre of preservation-

ists headed by contractor Daniel B. Vanderbode, with the aid of the Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society. The saving of the Buffalo Lighthouse marks the beginning of the Preservation Movement in Buffalo.

No longer a functioning lighthouse, it is, however, turned into a museum for special civic ceremonies.





**CONNECTICUT STREET  
ARMORY, 1898-1900,  
184 Connecticut Ave. at Niagara St., Buffalo**

This huge castle-like Medina sandstone building evokes visions of Camelot. The crenelated keep and parapets, the machicolations, the slit-like recessed windows, and the massive portal with its largevous arch lend a romantic aura to the headquarters of the 17th (formerly the 74th) Regiment, N. Y. State Militia. It was built toward the end of an era when war was more glorified than today. It is possibly the last built Romanesque-Revolunt structure of the many in the city that were planned in the last twenty-five years of the 19th century by Richardson's great Buffalo State Hospital. The architects were Lansing and Becht of Buffalo. The interior is one of the most breath-taking spaces in the city. Not only does it contain one of the largest, unobstructed skylighted drill floors in the nation but also boasts some superb carved oak woodwork in the grand stairway and throughout the building.

The armory is built on the site of the old Prospect Avenue racetrack. Over the years it has been the scene of championship indoor track meets and even bicycle races.

After the north end was partially gutted by fire a few years ago, the building was beautifully restored with state funds largely through the initiative of the Landmark Coalition of Erie County.


now an office building with the K. C. club rooms in the basement, enlarged in 1918, 506 Delaware Ave. near Virginia, Buffalo

The northern half of this building is the original mansard of Second French Empire structure. Its red brick (now painted) with limestone keystone and springstones at the top of the windows, and a high stone water table at grade level. In 1918 the

original building was replicated southward, and the Georgian portico added. The newer section was also enlarged westward. The original facade is one of the few streaks of masonry which have survived on Delaware Ave. The interior contains

some outstanding woodwork including elaborate carved flour moulding, door and window and pane glass mirrors as well as painted ceilings and low fireplaces.

The building has contributed to local Catholic history in the charitable work of the Catholic Club of Buffalo, a club of the Knights of Columbus. It was recently purchased on the outside, and the interior carrels converted into attractive offices.



**THE SULLIVANS, 1943  
Naval and Seawarrens Park,  
Foot of Main St., Buffalo**


*U.S.S. the Sullivan* is a destroyer (DD 537) which saw much combat action in World War II, possibly as much as any other American naval vessel in the Pacific during that war. Commissioned in 1943, it participated in the intense

fighting in the Marshall Islands, the Marianas, the Carolines, and the Philippines. It also took part in the bloody landings at Iwo Jima and Okinawa and later saw combat service in the Korean conflict.

Especially designed for anti-submarine warfare and for landing craft and task force escort service, it carried, besides its guns, six deck-mounted torpedoes. Its thin hull, sharp prow, and speed of 37 knots enabled it to maneuver

quickly.

With its raked decks and sleek and sculptured lines, *the Sullivan* is an outstanding work of nautical art. Appropriately, it commemorates the five Sullivan brothers (Joseph, Francis, Albert, Madison, and George) who went down with the cruiser *Jutland*, sunk in the Solomon Islands on November 13, 1942, during the Battle of Guadalcanal.
















## YEARS OF SERVICE BY RANK - TITLE






LAKE ERIE






