



### FOREWORD

This is the fifteenth Crime and Justice Annual Report prepared by the Division of Criminal Justice Services pursuant to Sections 837, 837-a, and 837-b of the Executive Law.

The Division appreciates the cooperation and support of the nearly 600 police departments, sheriffs' offices and specialized police agencies that provide offense and arrest data for the report. We also wish to express our gratitude to District Attorney and Special Prosecutor offices throughout the State for their continued cooperation and assistance in providing data on the processing of felons. 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## STATUTORY AUTHORITY

VII

The collection, analysis and dissemination of criminal justice data in New York State is authorized by sections 837, 837-a and 837-b of the Executive Law, to wit:

### "§ 837. Functions, powers and duties of

The division shall have the following functions, powers and duties:

...4. In cooperation with the state administrator of the unified court system as well as any other public or private agency,

...(c) collect and analyze statistical and other information and data with respect to the number of crimes reported or known to police or peace officers, the number of persons arrested for the commission of offenses, the offense for which the person was arrested, the county within which the arrest was made and the accusatory instrument filed, the disposition of the accusatory instrument including, but not limited to, as the case may be, dismissal, acquittal, the offense to which the defendant pled guilty, the offense the defendant was convicted of after trial and the sentence."

### "§ 837-a. Additional functions, powers and duties of the division

In addition to the functions, powers and duties otherwise provided by this article, the division shall:


1. Collect and analyze statistical and other information and data with respect to the number of persons charged with the commission of a felony by indictment or the filing of a superior court information, the felony with which the person was charged therein, the county within which the indictment or superior court information was filed, the disposition thereof including, but not limited to, as the case may be, dismissal, acquittal, the offense to which the defendant pleaded guilty, the offense the defendant was convicted of after trial, and the sentence."

### "§ 837-b. Duties of courts and peace officers

1. It is hereby the duty of the state administrator of the unified court system; and of every sheriff, county or city commissioner of correction and head of every police department, state, county, or local, and also railroad, steamship, park, aqueduct and tunnel police and town constables, of every district attorney of every probation agency; and of head of every other officer, person or agency, dealing with crimes or criminals or with delinquency or delinquents, to transmit to the commissioner not later than the fifteenth day of each calendar month or as such times as provided in the rules and regulations adopted by the commissioner, such information as may be necessary to enable him to comply with subdivision four of section eight hundred thirty-seven. Such reports shall be made upon forms which shall be supplied by the commissioner.

2. Such officers and agencies shall install and maintain records needed for reporting data required by the commissioner and shall give him or his accredited agents access to records for the purpose of inspection.


3. For every neglect to comply with the requirements of this section, the commissioner may apply to the supreme court for an order directed to such persons responsible requiring compliance. Upon such application the court may issue such order as may be just, and a failure to comply with the order of the court shall be a contempt of court and punishable as such."





## INTRODUCTION



The New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services was assigned the responsibility for the collection of data concerning crimes and arrests in New York State, effective January 1975, pursuant to Sections 837, 837-a and 837-b of the Executive Law.

In assuming that responsibility, the Division was also committed to providing relevant data to the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and to disseminating this information to the New York State criminal justice community.

This publication is the fifteenth annual report produced in discharge of that responsibility.

## UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

Uniform Crime Reports submitted monthly by police agencies in New York State are the basis for much of the material contained in this report. These reports include information on:

- Part I Offenses
- Part II Offenses
- Location and Time of the Offense
- Value of Property Stolen
- Part I Arrests
- Part II Arrests
- Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted
- Number of Law Enforcement Employees

This report also provides greater detail regarding the following aspects of Part I Offenses:

- a. Type of Weapon/Force Used
- b. Type of Location in which the Crime was Committed
- c. Number of Offenses Cleared
- d. Type and Amount of Property Stolen and Recovered

For many reasons, not all offenses come to the attention of the police. Victims may feel too embarrassed to report a crime or that the loss sustained was too small to report or believe that there is nothing the police can do. Victimization studies have confirmed that many offenses are never reported.

When an offense is cleared, it is usually done by one or more arrests. However, there are exceptional circumstances when an offense may be cleared without an arrest. Exceptional clearances result when the police know who and where the offender is and have enough evidence to support an arrest, but are prevented from doing so because of some reason outside of their control.

To combat crime effectively, it must be known when and where crime is occurring. The county, as a crime location, is not sufficiently definitive. Therefore, we have instituted direct reporting to the state program from every police chief and sheriff in New York State in accordance with state law.

It is important to note that without the collaboration of the law enforcement agencies and cooperation of the criminal justice agencies, this report would not be possible.

- o In 1989, all 575 law enforcement agencies participated in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program and agencies with multi-county jurisdictions reported separately of each county within their jurisdiction.*

## AGE, SEX, RACE AND ETHNIC ORIGINS OF PERSONS ARRESTED

1. Persons Under 16 Years of Age (Juvenile)
  2. Persons 16 Years of Age and Over (Adults)
- o Note: The FBI/UCR Program treats persons under 18 as juveniles, and requires that they be so reported. This report, however, is compiled in accordance with New York State law which classifies juveniles as those persons under 16 and adults as those 16 and over.*

## LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED OR ASSAULTED

Statistics are provided on the number of New York State law enforcement officers killed or assaulted. A description of the conditions under which the officers were assaulted is also provided.

## HOMICIDE ANALYSIS

- o Details on homicides committed in New York State, including characteristics of victims and circumstances under which such homicides occurred, are provided.*

## ARSON ANALYSIS

- o This report provides additional detail concerning arson. The analysis describes the types of structures involved, distribution of activity and clearance rates.*

## DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

- o Statistics are presented relating to the incidence of domestic violence by geographic locations in New York State, New York City and Upstate Counties.*

In addition to Uniform Crime Reporting data contained in this report, we have provided data on felony arrests, felony drug arrests, and felony indictments and dispositions.

- o The arrest material is derived from the Computerized Criminal History (CCH), which is based on the arrest fingerprint cards submitted to the Division of Criminal Justice Services in compliance with Section 160.20 of the Criminal Procedure Law. Adult felony and misdemeanor arrests are presented for each county from 1984 through 1989.*

## FELONY INDICTMENT AND DISPOSITION

The felony indictment and disposition material is reported by District Attorneys and Special Prosecutors throughout the State pursuant to Section 837-a of the Executive Law. This material includes data on felony indictments, felony drug indictments, felony dispositions and median time from indictment through disposition.

- o *Information from other criminal justice agencies is included in this report to present, in one volume, as much information as possible about the criminal justice system.*



## OFFENSES

For over 50 years criminal offenses have been used as a crime index to assess the level of criminal activity within an area. The index offenses were selected because of their seriousness or frequency of occurrence.

The index offenses are murder & non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft.

Comparisons of crime rates between police agencies or counties should be made with extreme caution. The crime rates published in this report are based solely on offenses reported or known to the police and the size of the resident population. Additional factors which may influence crime rates are density of population, geographic location, social attitudes, economic conditions, number of law enforcement officers, seasonal and transient populations, and rural or urban environments.

### INDEX OFFENSES

- o Index offenses increased 0.1 percent in New York State from 1988 to 1989.*

### VIOLENT OFFENSES

- o Violent offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault) showed an increase of 3.5 percent from 1988 to 1989.*
- o Violent offenses accounted for 18.0 percent of the index total.*

### MURDER

- o Murder and non-negligent manslaughter increased 12.6 percent from 2,239 in 1988 to 2,253 in 1989.*
- o New York City reported 84.5 percent of the murder offenses in New York State.*

### FORCIBLE RAPE

- o Forcible rape offenses went from 5,475 in 1988 to 5,227 in 1989, a decrease of 4.6 percent.*
- o New York City reported 62.3 percent of the forcible rape offenses.*

### ROBBERY

- o Robbery offenses increased 6.7 percent from 97,445 offenses in 1988 to 104,001 in 1989.*
- o New York City reported 89.9 percent of the robberies in New York State.*

## AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

- o Aggravated assault offenses increased 0.6 percent from 1988 to 1989.*
- o New York City reported 77.6 percent of the aggravated assaults in New York State.*

## NON-VIOLENT OFFENSES

- o Non-violent offenses (burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft) decreased 0.6 percent from 1988 to 1989.*
- o Non-violent offenses constituted 82.0 percent of the index total.*

## BURGLARY

- o Burglary offenses decreased 3.1 percent from 1988 to 1989.*
- o New York City reported 57.7 percent of the burglary offenses in New York State.*

## LARCENY

- o Larceny offenses decreased 2.9 percent from 1988 to 1989.*
- o The 542,059 larceny offenses included larcenies of any amount, and accounted for 48.1 percent of the index offenses.*

## MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

- o Motor vehicle theft increased 11.2 percent from 1988 to 1989.*
- o New York City reported 78.4 percent of the motor vehicle thefts in New York State.*

## PART II OFFENSES

- o A total of 1,569,792 Part II Offenses were reported in 1989, a 2.2 percent decrease over 1988.*
- o Part II Offenses comprise all offenses not included in Part I Offenses and range in seriousness from kidnaping to disorderly conduct.*

## PROPERTY STOLEN

- o In New York State, the value of property stolen during the commission of index offenses was \$1,563,786,694 in 1989, a 5.7 percent increase from the 1988 total of \$1,478,940,296.*
- o Stolen vehicles accounted for 51.6 percent of the value of property stolen in 1989.*






**Introduction**

The 1989 homicide analysis represents a departure from the traditional format that has appeared in prior years of Crime and Justice. The changes grew out of a redesign of the computerized data base from which this report is drawn. Many of the changes are transparent, as the report retains the same basic victim and offender demographic data.

The most significant change is related to the way the number of "unknown" offenders is treated. In prior years, a homicide victim with an undetermined number of offenders was counted as one offender and added to the "unknown" offender tally. In this report, no assumption is made about the number of offenders in a case with an undetermined number of offenders. As a result, the "unknown" value is not reported in the offender tables, since it is truly unknown. For this analysis, the number of incidents and the number of victims are the basic units of count, with the offender, weapon and other data as subordinate data fields attached to the victim(s) in a given incident.

**SUMMARY**

**Reported Homicides**

- o There were 2,266 homicide victims in New York State in 1989, a 0.4 percent increase over the 2,257 victims in 1988.
- o The 2,266 homicide victims were slain in 2,208 homicide incidents which involved a total of 1,482 known offenders.
- o The month of January had the fewest homicides (137) and November had the most (230), a range of 93.
- o The first quarter of 1989 had the fewest homicides (20 percent) and the third quarter had the most (30 percent).
- o New York City reported 85 percent of the homicides in the State, the remaining 15 percent being reported by counties outside New York City.

### Offender Characteristics

- o In the 1,101 cases where the age of the offender was known, 48 percent of the offenders were in the age group of 16-24.
- o Offenders were predominately male. In the 1,266 cases where the sex of the offender was known, 93 percent of the offenders were male.
- o In the 1,258 cases where offender race was known, 44 percent of the offenders were white and 54 percent were black.

### Victim Characteristics

- o In the 2,264 cases that the age of the victim was known, 65 percent of the victims were in the age group of 20-39.
- o In the 2,266 cases where the victim's sex was known, 82 percent of the victims were male.
- o For the 2,266 cases where victim race was known, 44 percent of the victims were white and 53 percent were black.

### Victim-Offender Characteristics

- o Victims tend to be slightly older than the offenders. A victim is most likely to be in the 25-29 age range, while an offender is most likely to be in the 20-24 age range.

### Victim-Offender Relationship

- o Males are more likely to be killed in situations outside the family setting, usually involving a stranger or a casual acquaintance. This occurs in 89 percent of the 819 cases where the relationship is known.
- o Females are more likely to be killed by a family member or in a romantic dispute. This occurs in 53 percent of the 207 cases where the relationship is known.

### Circumstances

- o The circumstances surrounding a homicide were unknown in 47 percent of the cases.
- o For the 1,064 cases where the circumstances were known, 40 percent were felony connected.
- o In the 2,266 cases where the location was known, 41 percent of the victims were killed indoors and 59 percent outdoors.

### Weapons

- o In the 2,229 cases where the type of weapon was known, 67 percent were killed by firearms and 33 percent were killed by all other means.
- o Among the firearm victims, 94 percent were killed by handguns and 6 percent by rifles, shotguns, etc.
- o The most frequently occurring homicide was a shooting with a handgun of a victim 25-29 years old.

## ARSON

This is the eleventh analysis of arsons in New York State to be presented in the Crime and Justice Annual Report. The data for these analyses are derived from a supplementary arson data collection program begun in 1979 under the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) System.

- o Arson is defined by the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as a "willful or malicious burning, or attempted burning, of a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle, aircraft, or personal property of another." Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons.*
- o A "cleared" arson incident is defined as an offense for which a perpetrator has been taken into custody or is otherwise known by police to have committed the crime, but for reasons outside police control cannot be taken into custody.*

Arsons reported under Part II of the UCR program and shown elsewhere in this volume are reported under the "hierarchy rule," whereby an offense is counted only if it is the most serious in an incident. Under this program, an arson offense is reported regardless of whether it occurred in conjunction with a more serious offense. This analysis, therefore, shows more arson offenses than are shown for arson offenses in the UCR Part II offense presentations.

Type of property is divided into three categories:

- structural (residential, commercial, public/community, and other);
- mobile (motor vehicle and other);
- other property.

The definitions of property type are as follows:

### **SINGLE OCCUPANCY RESIDENTIAL**

includes houses, townhouses and duplexes.

### **OTHER RESIDENTIAL**

includes apartments, tenements, flats, hotels, motels, inns, dormitories and boarding houses.

**STORAGE**

includes warehouses, garages and barns.

**INDUSTRIAL/MANUFACTURING**

includes factories and all other manufacturing facilities.

**OTHER COMMERCIAL**

includes stores, restaurants and offices.

**PUBLIC/COMMUNITY**

includes churches, jails, schools, colleges and hospitals.

**ALL OTHER STRUCTURES**

includes out-buildings, monuments and structures under construction.

**MOTOR VEHICLES**

includes automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters, and snowmobiles.

**OTHER MOBILE**

includes airplanes, boats, trailers, and recreational vehicles.

**OTHER PROPERTY**


includes crops, timber, fences, and signs.

Estimated values of property damaged are included in the report. They are included in order to provide an estimate of the absolute minimum dollar value. Because many police departments have little or no access to dollar amounts for arson, the monetary values for many arson cases are not reported.

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<sup>1</sup> The clearance rate is the ratio of clearances to the net number of arsons reported, expressed as a percent. Because a 1988 clearance does not necessarily reflect clearance of an offense reported in 1988, the clearance rate should be considered only as a general indicator of processing efficiency.


## New York State ARSONS REPORTED - 1989



## ARSON ANALYSIS NEW YORK STATE SUMMARY

### ARSONS REPORTED

There were 10,879 arson incidents reported in New York State in 1989, a 6.6% decrease from 1988.

#### Structural Arsons

- o *Arsons of structures accounted for 61.6% of all New York State arsons. Of these, 44.7% were residential arsons. Consistent with data from previous years, residential structural arsons remained the most common type of structural arson throughout the state.*
- o *Commercial structure arsons accounted for 11.9% of all arsons in New York State. "Other Commercial" arsons, the most frequent form of commercial arson in New York State, accounted for 7.9% of the arsons statewide.*
- o *The 715 arsons that occurred in abandoned structures accounted for 6.6% of all arsons in New York State. Residential structures were the most common form of abandoned structures to be targets for arson.*

#### Mobile Arsons

- o *In this category, the 3,730 "motor vehicle" arsons reported in New York State accounted for 34.3% of all New York State arsons, while "other mobile" accounted for 0.9% of these arsons.*

### ARSONS CLEARED

- o *In 1989, 1,065 arson incidents were cleared in New York State. Of these, 79.9% were structure arsons, of which 56.6% were residential and 14.2% were commercial.*
- o *Two hundred eighty of the arson clearances involved persons under age 18. Persons in this age group accounted for 26.3% of the arson clearances in the state; this represents a decrease from 1988 when they accounted for 29.2%.*

### ARSON CLEARANCE RATES

- o *The 1989 clearance rate for all arsons in New York State was 9.8%. This relatively low clearance rate seems to reflect the extreme difficulty in solving a crime in which much of the physical evidence is destroyed.*
- o *Arson clearance rates also vary by the type of property involved. In 1989, statewide clearance rates for the "community/public" (18.9%) and "single occupancy residential" (16.6%) categories had the highest clearance rates, while "motor vehicle arson" had the lowest clearance rate (4.5%).*

## ARSON ANALYSIS UPSTATE SUMMARY

### **ARSONS REPORTED**

There were 4,428 arson incidents reported in the counties in upstate New York in 1988, 40.7% of the total New York State arsons.

#### **Structural Arsons**

- o Upstate structural arsons reported equaled 25.1% of the total New York State arsons.*
- o Of the "single occupancy" arsons, 88.6% took place upstate and constituted approximately 24.0% of the total arsons upstate.*
- o Upstate had a higher proportion of commercial structural arsons than New York City.*
- o Upstate, 13.3% of all arsons occurred in abandoned structures.*

#### **Mobile Arsons**

- o Of the motor vehicle arsons, 41.1% occurred upstate.*

### **ARSONS CLEARED**

- o The upstate clearance rate was 15.6%.*
- o Clearances of residential arsons accounted for 47.3% of arsons cleared upstate.*


The Governor's Task Force on Domestic Violence was established by Executive Order #90 on May 17, 1979, to study "the traumatic effects of domestic violence and how our social and legal systems can better deal with such violence and its causes."

The Uniform Crime Reporting System (UCR) is utilized by DCJS as the data collection instrument for obtaining domestic violence data from the local law enforcement agencies. The domestic violence data reflected in this report are based on those offenses which have come to the attention of law enforcement officers, regardless of whether a formal complaint was filed or an arrest made.

For New York City, the 52,270 offenses reported in 1989 is a 6.3 percent decrease over the 55,787 reported in 1988, while the Upstate counties increased 19.4 percent.

Statewide, domestic violence offenses reported increased. A total of 93,109 offenses were reported in 1989 as opposed to 90,001 reported in 1988, an increase of 3.5 percent. As in prior years, this increase is due in part to improved reporting by the law enforcement agencies across the State. Additionally, procedural changes that require an arrest to be made in domestic violence cases have contributed significantly to the reported increases.

## ARRESTS

Arrests in New York State during 1989 totaled 1,106,621, a 0.8 percent increase from the 1,097,318 arrests in 1988. Males accounted for 84.5 percent of those arrested and females 15.5 percent.

Arrests for index offenses -- murder, non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft --increased from 205,546 in 1988 to 211,773, up 3.0 percent. In 1989, arrests for index offenses accounted for 19.1 percent of the New York State arrest total.

### ADULT ARRESTS<sup>1</sup>

- o A total of 1,041,347 adult arrests were reported in New York State in 1989.*
- o Adults sixteen through twenty-nine accounted for 61.7 percent of the adult arrest total and adults twenty-one and under made up 26.1 percent of the arrest total.*

### JUVENILE ARRESTS

- o New York State reported a total of 65,274 juvenile arrests in 1989, 6.8 percent below the 70,043 reported in 1988.*
- o Males represented 82.4 percent of the juveniles arrested and females, 17.6 percent.*
- o Arrests for fifteen year olds accounted for 35.2 percent of the juveniles arrested and fourteen year olds represented an additional 26.8 percent.*

### NEW YORK CITY

- o New York City reported 60.6 percent of all the arrests in New York State for 1989.*
- o The 31,940 juvenile arrests reported by New York City accounted for 48.9 percent of the state total.*

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<sup>1</sup>Adults are persons sixteen years of age and older.

NOTE: Arrests include summonses for violation of local ordinances.

## DRUG ARRESTS

- o Combined adult and juvenile drug arrests increased from 131,771 in 1988 to 145,087 in 1989, an increase of 10.1 percent.*
- o Arrests for marijuana accounted for 22.5 percent of the New York State drug arrests.*
- o Arrests for opium, cocaine and derivatives represented 72.9 percent of the drug arrests and showed a 14.9 percent increase from 1988 to 1989.*

## RACE AND ETHNIC ORIGIN

- o Data on race and ethnic origin were estimated for summonses reported from New York City. Existing forms do not provide for the reporting of racial and ethnic data for New York City summonses. Arrest categories that include these estimates are: marijuana use, criminal mischief, other gambling, liquor law violations, disorderly conduct, loitering and "all other offenses" category.*

## ADULT FELONY AND MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS

- o A total of 213,093 felony adult arrests were reported in New York State in 1989, 7.9 percent above the 197,465 reported in 1988.*
- o New York City reported 71.1 percent of the total adult felony arrests in 1989 compared to 72.4 percent in 1988.*
- o New York State reported 312,271 adult misdemeanor arrests in 1989, a 0.4 percent increase over the 310,999 reported in 1988.*
- o New York City showed a 6.5 percent decrease in adult misdemeanor arrests from 1988 to 1989 and represented 41.6 percent of the state total in 1989.*



1989 DRUG ARRESTS**


**DISTRIBUTION BY OFFENSE AND DRUG TYPE**

**TOTAL DRUG ARRESTS = 145,087**




**DRUG TYPES**

## INDICTMENTS AND DISPOSITIONS

The following tables present data on felony indictments and dispositions for 1989 and 1988. This information is obtained from a statistical reporting system based on individual reports of each indictment and each disposition submitted by district attorneys and special prosecutors throughout the State. The unit of count in this reporting system is the defendant/indictment; that is:

- o When several defendants are named in one proceeding or indictment, each defendant is counted separately; and*
- o When one defendant is named in multiple proceedings or indictments, each indictment is counted separately.*

The use of offender-based statistics and the tracking of each defendant from time of indictment until final disposition makes possible the measuring of elapsed time between various stages in processing. The median time is obtained by ranking all the values in a specific category (for example, time from indictment to disposition) and choosing the middle number - that is, the number with an equal amount of values above and below it. As a result, the median values are not influenced by very large or very small numbers which can affect averages.

It should be noted that the disposition data reported in these tables pertain to cases handled during the specified year by the superior courts. These dispositions may be for indictments in the same or previous years.

### DEFENDANT - INDICTMENTS

- o A total of 78,377 felony indictments were reported in New York State in 1989, a 17.4 percent increase from the 66,753 felony indictments reported for 1988.*
- o Felony drug indictments in New York State increased from 26,551 in 1988 to 36,365 in 1989, a rise of 37.0 percent.*
- o Drug indictments accounted for 46.4 percent of the statewide total in 1989 compared to 39.8 percent in 1988.*
- o In New York City in 1989, felony indictments totaled 53,475, an increase of 19.4 percent from the 44,789 felony indictments reported in 1988.*
- o Drug indictments in New York City increased from 21,575 in 1988 to 28,498 in 1989, a rise of 32.1 percent.*
- o In 1989, 53.3 percent of the New York City indictments were for drugs compared to 48.2 percent in 1988.*
- o New York City felony indictments accounted for 68.2 percent of the State indictment total and 78.4 percent of the felony drug indictments were for New York City.*
- o In the Suburban Area of New York City (Nassau, Suffolk, Rockland and Westchester counties) felony indictments increased by 17.5 percent from 1988 to 1989 and felony drug indictments rose 67.0 percent.*

- o Drug indictments accounted for 42.7 percent of the Suburban Area indictment total in 1989 compared to 30.0 percent in 1988.*
- o In the Upstate area, felony indictments increased from 13,400 in 1988 to 14,852 in 1989, a rise of 10.8 percent.*
- o In 1989, felony drug indictments in the Upstate Area represented 24.4 percent of the indictment total compared to 18.2 percent in 1988.*
- o Statewide, Class A drug indictments increased from 2,273 in 1988 to 2,745 in 1989, an increase of 20.8 percent.*

## DISPOSITIONS OF FELONY INDICTMENTS - New York State

- o Dispositions include felony indictments for which the judicial proceedings were completed by dismissal, acquittal, other court action, or by conviction and sentence.*
- o A record high of 66,531 dispositions were reported in New York State in 1989, 13.6 percent above the 58,562 dispositions reported in 1988.*
- o Drug dispositions totaled 28,291 in 1989, 37.1 percent above the 20,637 reported in 1988.*
- o In 1989, drug dispositions accounted for 42.5 percent of the disposition total compared to 35.2 percent in 1988.*
- o In 1989, the 4,081 trials were slightly less than the 4,101 trials reported in 1988 despite the 13.6 percent increase in dispositions*
- o Trials for drug indictments increased from 750 in 1988 to 966 in 1989, a rise of 28.8 percent.*
- o For all trials in 1989, the conviction rate was 75.6 versus 69.7 percent in 1988.*
- o For trials for drug indictments in 1989, the conviction rate was 79.1 percent compared to 75.7 percent in 1988.*
- o State prison sentences totaled 26,046 in 1989, up 23.1 percent from 1988.*
- o Prison sentences resulting from drug indictments increased from 7,913 in 1988 to 12,095 in 1989, a rise of 52.8 percent.*
- o In 1989, 46.4 percent of the prison sentences were for drug indictments compared to 37.4 percent in 1988.*
- o Youthful Offender adjudications dropped from 9.1 percent of the conviction total in 1988 to 8.1 percent in 1989.*
- o In 1989, 33.4 percent of the Youthful Offender adjudications resulted from drug indictments compared to 27.1 percent in 1988.*
- o Dispositions of Class A drug indictments increased from 1,861 in 1988 to 2,150 in 1989, a rise of 15.5 percent.*
- o The median processing time from indictment to disposition for all felony dispositions in New York State decreased from 85 days in 1988 to 83 days in 1989.*



## SENTENCES FOR SELECTED FELONY OFFENSES

New York State convictions and sentences for murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, and larceny<sup>1</sup> are compared for 1988 and 1989 on the following tables. They specify type of sentence and length of maximum sentence to state prison.

- o Convictions for these increased less than 1 percent from 1988 to 1989.*
- o State prison sentences increased by 5.9 percent from 1988 to 1989.*
- o In 1989, 56.9 percent of the convictions for these offenses resulted in state prison sentences compared to 54.1 percent in 1988.*
- o Murder convictions increased from 280 in 1988 to 353 in 1989, a rise of 26.1 percent.*
- o Life sentences to state prison rose from 415 in 1988 to 504 in 1989, an increase of 21.4 percent.*
- o In 1989, 351 life sentences were for murder and 153 for sentences of persistent offender.*

## **PROCESSING TRENDS FOR FELONY OFFENSES AND FELONY DRUG OFFENSES IN NEW YORK STATE**

Data presented for these offenses were derived from several sources. The felony arrest data were obtained from fingerprint cards submitted to the Division of Criminal Justice Services in accordance with Section 160.20 of the Criminal Procedure Law. Data on indictment through sentence were provided on individual reports by District Attorneys and Special Prosecutors in New York State.

Indictments, convictions and sentences to state prison may result from felony arrests in the same or previous years. Convictions may be for felony indictments in the same or previous years and are included in the year in which the defendant was sentenced.





### **FELONY CHARGES**

Felony arrests in New York State increased from 151,304 in 1985 to 213,093 in 1989, a rise of 41 percent. Felony indictments registered a 57 percent increase during the same years, while convictions rose 44 percent and state prison sentences increased by 66 percent.

### **FELONY DRUG OFFENSES**

Felony drug arrests more than doubled in the five year period from 1985 to 1989. In 1985, felony drug arrests accounted for 17 percent of the felony arrest total compared to 30 percent in 1989. Drug indictments rose even more sharply, up 266 percent during the five year period. State prison sentences resulting from drug indictments increased from 2,865 in 1985 to 12,095 in 1989, a rise of 322 percent. In 1989, state prison sentences resulting from drug indictments accounted for 46 percent of the prison sentences compared to 18 percent in 1985.

**NEW YORK STATE****LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED OR ASSAULTED****1989**

During 1989, seven law enforcement officers were feloniously slain in the line of duty in New York State. Additionally, one Federal Drug Enforcement Agent was feloniously slain. Three other officers, including one Federal officer, accidentally lost their lives while performing law enforcement duties.

There were 7,926 officers assaulted while performing law enforcement functions, a decrease of 0.2 percent from the 7,944 officers assaulted in 1988.

In 1989, 86.7 percent of the assaults resulted in personal injury to the officer.

**WEAPON**

- o Physical force, as in prior years, was the most common method of assault; 75.3 percent of the officers were assaulted in this manner.*
- o Other dangerous weapons were the next most frequently used weapons in assaults (11.8%) followed by handguns at 9.5 percent, knives at 2.2 percent and lastly, other firearms at 1.2 percent.*

**ACTIVITY**

- o As in previous years, assaults occurred most frequently when officers were attempting arrests, accounting for 31.5 percent of the assaults.*
- o The next highest number of assaults took place during all other activities, accounting for 16.3 percent of the assaults.*
- o The fewest number of assaults, 0.9 percent, occurred during ambushes.*


**ASSIGNMENT**

- o Officers assigned to two-man vehicles experienced the most assaults, 48.3 percent. These assaults increased 0.9 percent over 1988.*
- o In contrast, only 10.8 percent of the assaults were experienced by officers assigned to one-man vehicles. The 858 cases represent a 8.3 percent increase from the previous year.*


**TIME**

- o The likelihood that a law enforcement officer would be assaulted was greatest between 10:00 PM and 12:00 PM, the hours when 1,124 of the assaults took place.*
- o An assault was least likely to occur between 6:00 AM and 8:00 AM, the hours when only 233 of the assaults took place.*
- o Almost half of all assaults (47.5%) occurred between 4:00 PM and midnight, the hours when police are usually their busiest.*
- o The hours of 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM recorded the lowest number of assaults, 24.5 percent.*


## OFFICERS ASSAULTED

## LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES

### EMPLOYEES

- o A total of 80,126 persons were employed by law enforcement agencies in New York State in 1989.<sup>1</sup> This figure includes both sworn and civilian personnel and those working full or part-time as well.
- o The 1989 figure represents an increase of 1.7 percent over the figure reported in 1988.
- o The largest department was the New York City Police Department with 35,605 employees.
- o The next largest departments in order of size, were the New York State Police with 4,890, the New York City Transit Authority with 4,010, Nassau County Police with 3,673 and the Suffolk County Police with 3,518 employees.
- o Statewide, 78.0 percent of the employees were sworn personnel.
- o The number of sworn personnel increased 1.5 percent between 1988 and 1989.
- o Ninety-six percent (96.3 percent) of the sworn personnel were employed full time.
- o Females accounted for 8.9 percent of the sworn personnel; the number of females employed rose 9.2 percent over the number employed in 1988.
- o Municipal police agencies employed 75.1 percent of the sworn personnel in New York State; special or multiple jurisdiction agencies (parks, railroads, university campuses, etc.) employed 17.4 percent and sheriffs employed the remaining 7.5 percent.

### EXPENDITURES

- o The State's law enforcement agencies estimates of operating expenditures for 1989 amounted to \$3,912,044,054, an increase of 6.9 percent over 1988 operating expenditures. The 1989 expenditures were distributed across law enforcement jurisdictions as follows:

IN NEW YORK STATE**

Legislative enactment (Chapter 631 of the 1987 Laws of New York) requires the Division of Criminal Justice Services to collect and analyze statistical and all other information and data with respect to the number of environmental crimes and offenses violating Articles 27, 37, 40 and Titles 27 and 37 of Article 71 of Environmental Conservation Law regarding hazardous waste and waste disposal. The following is presented in satisfaction of that mandate for the year 1989.

**PREFACE**

This report presents a general overview of the number of hazardous waste and waste disposal violations monitored by specific State agencies in 1989. Included are summaries of reports submitted to the Division of Criminal Justice Services from the Department of Environmental Conservation, the Department of Law, the Division of the State Police, the Division of Criminal Justice Services as well as reports from several county District Attorney's offices.

**BACKGROUND**

This past year New Yorkers have become increasingly aware of the threat imposed by hazardous waste and waste disposal violations. Illegal dumping, oil and gasoline spills, illegal tire dumps, underground tank leaks, illegal disposal of medical waste ("red-bag waste")...each week local and national papers reported on violations that threatened health, property and the environment. Some violations were accidental, occurring because of inattention or improper training. Others were intentional, committed for profit, convenience, or both. Whether violations were accidental or intentional, it is certain that the problems surrounding hazardous waste and waste disposal are increasing and the solutions are not simple.

**HAZARDOUS WASTE AND WASTE DISPOSAL LEGISLATION  
1989**

The New York State legislature and Governor Cuomo have persisted in their efforts to find effective long-term solutions to the issues surrounding hazardous waste and waste disposal. New legislation has been adopted to address the problems.

**1989 legislation includes:**

- o **Chapter 18** of the Laws of 1989 amends chapter 395 of the Laws of 1978 and relates to moratoriums on the issuance of certificates of environmental safety for the siting of facilities and certification of routes for the transportation of liquefied natural or petroleum gas in relation to extending the effectiveness of the provisions of such chapter. Effective March 31, 1989.
- o **Chapter 62** of the Laws of 1989 raises fees charged pursuant to the State Air Quality Control Program. Fees for SPDES permits are also raised, as well as new definitions for wastewater and low-level radioactive waste as found in § 72-0302 and § 72-0602 respectively. Effective April 19, 1989 with exceptions.
- o **Chapter 88** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in relation to existing waste tire facilities in that it requires the owner of a facility with 1,000 or more tires to file for a permit or to cease operations and dispose of the tires in a lawful manner. Approved May 11, 1989; effective on the ninetieth day after it becomes law.
- o **Chapter 180** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law, the Public Health Law, and the Transportation Law in relation to regulated medical waste. Such amendments include a listing of regulated medical wastes, as well as the procedure for treatment and disposal. Effective June 22, 1989 with exception.
- o **Chapter 306** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Public Authorities Law in relation to authorizing the Suffolk County board of supervisors to appropriate money to defray project costs associated with the extension of water mains to areas with documented groundwater contamination. Effective July 10, 1989.
- o **Chapter 402** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law by adding a new section 27-0712 which requires all transporting of solid waste be covered to prevent spillage. This is to include barges. Effective sixty days after July 16, 1989.

- o **Chapter 424** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in relation to standards for certain plumbing fixtures, in that water use be limited to maximum gallon use. Effective January 1, 1991 with exceptions.
- o **Chapter 436** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Laws and the Soil and Water Conservation Districts Law in relation to the abatement and control of nonpoint source pollution. Effective July 16, 1989.
- o **Chapter 490** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in relation to the State's membership on the Superfund Management Board. Effective March 31, 1989.
- o **Chapter 523** of the Laws of 1989 amends Chapter 489 of the Laws of 1987 relating to establishing the New York State Center for Hazardous Waste Management, in relation to governance and administration. Effective July 30, 1989.
- o **Chapter 564** of the Laws of 1989 amends the State Finance Law, the Environmental Conservation Law, and the Public Authorities Law in relation to establishing a fund authorized to receive and disburse monies paid into the federal Marine Protection Act. Effective July 16, 1989 with exceptions.
- o **Chapter 565** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law, the Public Authorities Law, the Local Finance Law, and the State Finance Law in relation to establishing a fund to provide for construction of municipally owned sewage treatment projects and to provide authority to implement such programs. Effective July 16, 1989.
- o **Chapter 627** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Education Law in relation to the storage and inventory of chemicals present in school science facilities. Effective July 1, 1991.
- o **Chapter 650** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Navigation Law by providing technical corrections in relation to construction of structures in or on navigable water. Effective July 21, 1989.
- o **Chapter 666** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law and the State Finance Law in relation to implementing the final report of the tidal wetlands advisory committee and making an appropriation therefor. Effective July 21, 1989 with exceptions.
- o **Chapter 674** of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in relation to city town and school district assessments on hazardous waste treatment, storage, and disposal facilities. This amendment limits as well as authorizes certain taxes to be imposed by school districts and municipalities on such facilities. Effective January 1, 1990.

- o Chapter 708 of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law, the Executive Law and the Parks Recreation and Historic Preservation Law in that it allows Department of Environmental Conservation to use prisoners to clean up parks, etc. as an alternative to incarceration.  
Effective July 24, 1989.
- o Chapter 712 of the Laws of 1989 amends the Navigation Law and the Public Health Law in relation to establishing an emergency oil spill relocation network and authorizing the Commissioner of the Department of Health to deploy such resources at his discretion. Effective 120 days after July 24, 1989.
- o Chapter 736 of the Laws of 1989 amends the Civil Practice Law and Rules and the Real Property Tax Law in relation to In Rem Foreclosures (property foreclosures) to include inactive hazardous waste disposal sites as eligible for exemption from foreclosure. Effective July 24, 1989.
- o Chapter 739 of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in relation to permits for transporters of waste. Certain haulers of waste may be excused from permit application if they haul certain types of waste by certain means. Effective 180 days after July 22, 1989.
- o Chapter 775 of the Laws of 1989 amends the Environmental Conservation Laws in relation to the management of state lands and prohibiting and creating exceptions for the burning of forest land. Effective Dec. 27, 1989.

#### **HAZARDOUS WASTE AND WASTE DISPOSAL VIOLATIONS AGENCY REPORT SUMMARIES**

In addition to the use of legislative initiatives to attack the problems of hazardous waste and waste disposal, a variety of State agencies have become increasingly active in monitoring hazardous waste and waste disposal violations and enforcing legislation.

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The State Police Hazardous Materials Unit - Comprised of sixteen uniformed State Troopers, this unit has in the past targeted all vehicles placarded as carrying hazardous materials. As of May 1987, it was given the authority to inspect any vehicle suspected of carrying hazardous materials. Specializing in inspection of highway transport of hazardous materials, the following was reported to the Division of Criminal Justice Services as 1989 activity:

- 4,681 Vehicles stopped and inspected
- 2,108 Vehicles had violations of such seriousness that they were taken out of service.

Tickets issued for hazardous materials carrier violations:

- 487 Uniform Traffic Tickets issued for Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulation violations
- 819 Tickets issued for violations of 14-F of the Transportation Law (referred to in ECL 27-0305)
- 1,306 Total tickets issued for violations related to hazardous materials violations
- 2,343 Other Vehicle and Traffic tickets issued.

Approximately 36% of all tickets issued by this unit were related to hazardous materials transport violations.

It should be noted that the category "hazardous materials" includes the subcategory "hazardous waste." Tickets issued by the State Police were primarily for violations of New York State Transportation Law which regulates the transport of hazardous materials. Some of those tickets issued included violations related to the transport of hazardous waste.

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The State Police Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program (MCSAP) Unit further monitors the transport of hazardous materials. This unit also consists of sixteen uniformed State Troopers and, in conjunction with the Department of Transportation, has the authority to stop any truck to check for safety and transportation violations. Such inspections can include a check for hazardous materials. For the calendar year 1989 this unit submitted the following information to the Division of Criminal Justice Services:

Tickets issued for hazardous materials violations are primarily for violations of the Transportation Law. Those tickets may include violations related to hazardous waste and waste disposal.

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**NEW YORK STATE DEPARTMENT OF LAW  
ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION BUREAU  
1989 ENVIRONMENTAL CRIME UNIT REPORT**

The Environmental Protection Bureau's Environmental Crime Unit of the New York State Department of Law reported to the Division of Criminal Justice Services that a total of twenty-one cases involving hazardous waste and waste disposal offenses were processed in 1989. The number of individuals charged was 21 (62.0% of those charged) and the number of other entities (corporations, businesses, etc.) charged was 13 (38.0%).

Dispositions of cases involving hazardous waste and waste disposal violations in 1989 resulted in 5 dismissals, 2 acquittals, and 30 convictions (24 by plea and 6 by trial). Seventeen persons and 13 corporations/other entities were convicted. There were nine felony convictions, 6 misdemeanor convictions and 20 violations. A total of 52 charges were disposed. The 1989 convictions include:

Other sentencing included a total of \$284,800 in fines, \$25,000 for remediation, \$975,000 in civil penalties following a criminal prosecution, and a total of 470 hours of community service. One company is required to advertise in four wastewater treatment publications advising other corporations to comply with State environmental standards. A conditional discharge included a timetable for closure of landfill. From one Federally prosecuted case, New York State received a \$325,000 fine amount.

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In order to further facilitate the prosecution of cases, many District Attorney's Offices have established active environmental crime units. This year, inquiries were made of all District Attorney's Offices in the State. Cortland, Erie, Fulton, Ontario, Warren, Washington and Westchester Counties responded with no activity to report. Dutchess County reported a substantial criminal indictment concerning ECL violations and Penal Law violations under the State Pollution Discharge Elimination System (SPDES) program. The Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Suffolk and Tompkins County District Attorney's Offices' environmental crime units submitted activity reports. The summaries for those reports dealing with hazardous waste and waste disposal violations follows.

CATTARAUGUS COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE  
HAZARDOUS WASTE AND WASTE DISPOSAL VIOLATIONS REPORT  
1989

In 1989, one case involving a hazardous waste/waste disposal violation was investigated and resulted in an indictment. This indictment was against a person who was charged with five felonies and 2 misdemeanors (ECL 71-2707(1)-2 counts, ECL 27-0305(1)-1 count, ECL 71-2717(1)-1 count, ECL 71-2713(6)-1 count, ECL 71-2712(4)-1 count, ECL 27-0914(2)-1 count). Prosecution occurred in 1990 where after trial, the case resulted in conviction on all counts. Sentencing is scheduled for December 1990.

**CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE**  
**HAZARDOUS WASTE AND WASTE DISPOSAL VIOLATIONS REPORT**  
**1989**

In 1989, one case involving a hazardous waste/waste disposal violation was investigated and resulted in an indictment. This indictment was against two persons who were charged with one felony and one violation (ECL 71-2707(1) unlawful possession of hazardous waste in the second degree). There were two cases disposed in 1989; one case was dismissed and the other resulted in a conviction by plea to ECL 71-2703, prohibited disposal of solid waste. A \$200.00 fine was imposed and the defendant landowner was required as part of the plea to clean several acres of property covered with solid waste. Two local businesses paid to remove hazardous waste oil generated by them and discarded tires and they signed a consent order with the Department of Environmental Conservation requiring them to pay \$1,500 and \$3,000 in civil penalty.

**SUFFOLK COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE**  
**ENVIRONMENTAL CRIMES UNIT**  
**HAZARDOUS WASTE AND WASTE DISPOSAL VIOLATIONS REPORT**  
**1989**

In 1989 the Suffolk County District Attorney's Office Environmental Crimes Unit initiated the investigation of 28 cases dealing with hazardous waste and waste disposal violations. As a result, four persons were charged with 4 felony charges, and one misdemeanor charge. In addition, there were two counts of Environmental Pollution Violations of the Suffolk County Sanitary Code. Also as a result of the investigations, eleven corporations/other entities were charged with a total of five felonies, seven misdemeanors, and 131 counts of Environmental Pollution Violations of the Suffolk County Environmental Code. Environmental Conservation Law violations include:

A total of 11 cases were disposed in 1989 by plea. Four persons and ten corporations/other entities were convicted of some charge. Of those convictions there were six felonies, six misdemeanors and 133 counts of environmental pollution violations of Suffolk County Sanitary Code. Sentences imposed consist of three jail sentences and a total of \$226,033 in penalties and fines. In addition, it was required that two defendants take out newspaper advertisements warning of the consequences for polluting the environment. Also, all convicted parties were required to clean up discharged pollutants as part of plea.

TOMPKINS COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE  
HAZARDOUS WASTE AND WASTE DISPOSAL VIOLATIONS REPORT  
1989

In 1989, one case involving hazardous waste or waste disposal violations was investigated and resulted in an indictment. This indictment was against a person who was charged with a misdemeanor (violation of Section 8 of Local Law No. 1). The case resulted in conviction of the charge by plea. Defendant was sentenced to a conditional discharge; remove solid waste completely within six months.

The Division of Law Enforcement's Bureau of Environmental Conservation Investigations at the Department of Environmental Conservation reported the following activity concerned with hazardous waste and waste disposal violations:

In 1989 there were a total of 111 different events under investigation. Fifty-four new cases were opened in 1989. The following is a breakdown of the number of cases opened by county of offense as reported to the Division of Criminal Justice Services.

In all, the Bureau of Environmental Conservation Investigations reported that 77 cases were closed in 1989. Of those cases closed in 1989, the original charges included 14 felony charges, 70 misdemeanor charges and 2 violations.

Dispositions resulted in fines, penalties, and consent orders totaling \$1,757,217.

Note: A consent order is a legal and enforceable negotiated agreement between the Department of Environmental Conservation and responsible parties where responsible parties agree to undertake investigation and cleanup or pay for the costs of investigation and cleanup work. The order includes a description of the remedial actions to be taken and a schedule for implementation. Monies collected via consent orders are placed in a remedial fund which is used in the cleanup of hazardous waste. Fines indicate a criminal disposition; penalties and consent orders indicate a civil or administrative disposition.

1989 REPORT ON HAZARDOUS WASTE AND WASTE DISPOSAL VIOLATIONS

The Department of Environmental Conservation's (DEC) Division of Environmental Enforcement (DEE) assists in the civil and criminal enforcement of Environmental Conservation Law. Consisting of attorneys, engineers, geologists and chemists, DEE provides valuable legal and technical assistance to a number of State units; Environmental Conservation Investigations, County District Attorney's Offices, the State Attorney General's Office and the U.S. Department of Justice. Support services provided by DEE include legal sufficiency evaluations of investigations, sampling and analysis of evidence, the drafting of search warrants, legal research, and investigator assistance in the development of matters for prosecution referral.

While DEE does not have independent criminal prosecution authority, on many occasions DEE attorneys have been deputized to handle environmental prosecutions.

The Division of Environmental Enforcement's report on 1989 Division activities concerned with hazardous waste and waste disposal violations assistance with the cases already reported by Environmental Conservation Investigations, several reported by the District Attorney's Offices. In addition, Environmental Enforcement assisted the Department of Justice with three cases, the Attorney General's Office with one case, and District Attorney's offices with three cases. All of these cases resulted in a conviction. Sentencing included Probation, \$5,000 fine and remediation, 18 months imprisonment, \$40,000 fine, \$5,000 fine plus 40 hours community service, 6 months in jail and a \$100,000 fine, and 6 months jail. Environmental enforcement also assisted with the Federally prosecuted case that resulted in a \$650,000 fine with New York State receiving \$325,000.

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**Division of Criminal Justice Services** - The Computerized Criminal History/Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (CCH/OBTS) data system utilized by the Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) is a compilation of data from police, courts, and correctional agencies and is used to track individual offenders through the criminal justice system. The total number of violations reported from the information contained in this file is considerably lower than the total number reported by Environmental Conservation Investigations (currently considered the most complete data source on the subject). The reasons are several. In order to be included in the DCJS data base, the charge must have been for a fingerprintable offense as designated by State law. Not all Environmental Conservation hazardous waste/waste disposal violations are fingerprintable. It also follows that in order to be fingerprintable, the charge must have been levied against a person as opposed to a corporation or other entity. In a 1988 review of the hazardous waste/waste disposal violation data on cases disposed by the DEC Investigations Unit it was determined that less than 20 percent of the violators charged were individuals. Lastly, the CCH/OBTS data system requires that the fingerprintable Environmental Conservation hazardous waste/waste disposal charge must be the most serious charge levied ('top-charge') in an arrest or disposition event in order to be included in a DCJS count. Often a violation will include other more serious charges.

The information available through the Division's CCH/OBTS file includes a regional breakdown of the number of violations.

Although the amounts are small, throughout the State there was a noticeable increase in the number of arrests in which a hazardous waste violation was the most serious charge. Statewide, felony arrests more than doubled with the greatest regional increase occurring Upstate.

Dispositions for 1989 indicated only one felony and one misdemeanor conviction on record.

FUTURE DIRECTION

To further discourage offenders, avert violations, enhance enforcement, and encourage cleanup of hazardous waste and waste disposal violations, the legislature in 1990 has passed a number of bills.

**1990 Legislation related to hazardous waste:**

- o **Chapter 122** of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in relation to publication of a notice of application for a regulatory permit. Effective May 7, 1990.
- o **Chapter 146** of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law by adding Article 54 which calls for stewardship projects to be undertaken, and allows for the raising of these monies. Effective May 14, 1990 with exceptions.
- o **Chapter 152** of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law and the Vehicle and Traffic Law in relation to lead acid battery recycling. Effective Jan. 1, 1990.
- o **Chapter 164** of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law Article 27-1313, paragraph g of subdivision 5, in relation to municipally operated inactive hazardous waste disposal sites. Effective May 21, 1990.
- o **Chapter 173** of the Laws of 1990 amends the transportation law in relation to truck size limits and previous DWI offenses with respect to haulers of hazardous material. Effective May 21, 1990 with exceptions.
- o **Chapter 219** of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in respect to a requirement for environmental impact statements for actions that will have a significant impact on special groundwater protection areas. Effective June 11, 1990
- o **Chapter 226** of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in respect to requiring waste transporter permits for transporters of waste tires. Effective Jan. 1, 1990.
- o **Chapter 261** of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in respect to the application of chemicals into water for the purpose of weed, insect, or fish control. Effective June 24, 1990.

- o Chapter 286 of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law in relation to a prohibition against hazardous packaging, by adding new title headings to Article 37. Effective and retroactive to when chapter 775 of the Laws of 1987 took effect.
- o Chapter 294 of the Laws of 1990 amends the Environmental Conservation Law and the General Business Law and the Traffic Law in relation to restricting the sale, venting, and disposal of chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs). Effective July 1, 1990.

#### SUMMARY

No single data source reveals the complete picture of 1989 hazardous waste and waste disposal violations in New York State. The primary reason for this is that each individual reporting agency focuses on particular aspects of the problem that are of concern to that agency be it the transport of hazardous materials, the court processing of offenders, arrest processing or the clean-up, prevention or investigation of violations.

Currently, the diverse information-gathering and reporting systems being implemented by these agencies along with the possibility of data overlap prohibit combining the reports to arrive at a single, accurate accounting of total violations in the State. For these reasons, a State summary has not been included. It is recommended that each data source be reviewed independently of any other.

The information in this report does provide a general overview of the number of hazardous waste and waste disposal violations that were monitored and addressed by specific State agencies in 1989.

INTRODUCTION

There were 3,817,866 new cases filed in the trial courts of the Unified Court System in 1989.<sup>1,2</sup> Excluding parking tickets, there were 2,830,562 filings as follows: 42% (1,176,809) were filed in criminal courts, 36% (1,015,868) in civil courts, 18% (516,295) in the Family Courts, and 4% (121,590) in the Surrogates' Courts.

Dispositions in the trial courts during 1989 totaled 3,827,165. Excluding parking tickets, there were 2,839,861 dispositions, as follows: criminal courts--40%, civil courts--36%, Family Courts--18% Surrogates' Courts--6%.

Table 2 shows a breakdown of filings and dispositions in the trial courts by type of court.

## 2.2 CRIMINAL CASES

Criminal cases are processed in the trial courts as follows: Felony indictments and superior court information are processed in the Criminal Term of the Supreme Courts in New York City and in the County Courts outside New York City. In several counties outside New York City, a portion of the felony caseload is processed in the Supreme Court as well. The District Courts of Nassau and Suffolk and the City, Town, and Village Courts outside New York City have original jurisdiction over felonies and complete jurisdiction over misdemeanors, violations, and infractions.

### 1. Criminal Term of Supreme and County Courts

Filings: Statewide, 79,025 felony cases were filed in the Supreme and County Courts during 1989.<sup>3</sup> Sixty-seven percent (53,194) of the 1989 filings occurred in New York City.

Table 3 shows 1989 filings by judicial district.

Table 4 focuses on individual counties, ranking the eighteen counties with 400 or more felony case filings in the Supreme and County Courts. These eighteen counties accounted for 91% of all felony filings in these courts.

<sup>3</sup>"Cases" are a count of "defendant-indictments," i.e., each defendant on each indictment counts as a case.

Dispositions: Statewide, 75,240 cases reached disposition (guilty plea, trial verdict, dismissal, or miscellaneous other) in 1989. Sixty-seven percent (50,157) of the 1989 dispositions occurred in New York City.

Table 3 shows 1989 dispositions by judicial district.

Table 4 shows that sixteen counties with over 400 dispositions accounted for 90% of all felony case dispositions. Twelve counties which commenced over 40 trials accounted for 89% of felony trials commenced statewide in 1989. Of the total of 5,062 felony trials commenced, 4,219 (83%) were jury trials.

Figure 3 shows felony case dispositions by type. There were 62,472 guilty pleas (83%), 7,341 dismissals (10%), 4,413 trial verdicts (6%) and 1,014 other dispositions (1%).



2. Criminal Courts of Limited JurisdictionCriminal Court of the City of New York:

There were 320,600 arrest cases filed in the Criminal Court of the City of New York in 1989. There were 316,681 dispositions.

Of the dispositions, 44% were by guilty plea, 32% by dismissal, 18% by referral to grand jury or transfer to Supreme Court for waiver of indictment, 0.3% by verdict, and 6% miscellaneous other.

There were 94,092 summons cases added to the calendar. [In addition, 97,469 summons cases were filed but not added to the calendar (defendant did not appear)]. There were 93,876 calendared dispositions.

City and District Courts Outside of New York City. Criminal case intake in the City Courts and the Nassau and Suffolk District Courts totalled 254,353 in 1989. The courts reported 232,526 dispositions. Of the dispositions, 55% were by guilty plea, 33% by dismissal, 7% by referral to grand jury or transfer to Superior Court for waiver of indictment, 1% by trial verdict, and 4% other.

There were 428,739 noncriminal (violations and infractions) Uniform Traffic Tickets disposed in these courts. These consisted primarily of fines paid (by personal appearance and mail). In jurisdictions without Parking Violations Bureaus, the City and District Courts process parking tickets. Dispositions totalled 987,304 in 1989.

Figure 4 shows criminal caseload activity in the criminal courts of limited jurisdiction.

STANDARDS AND GOALS

Since 1975, Standards and Goals of the Chief Administrator of the Courts have provided performance measures for the courts for elapsed time to disposition for felony cases in the Supreme and County Courts, civil

performance measures for the courts for elapsed time to disposition for felony cases in the Supreme and County Courts, civil 11cases in the Supreme Courts, and for proceedings in the Family Courts.<sup>6</sup>

Felony Cases: The applicable standard is disposition within six months from filing of indictment, excluding periods when a case is not within the active management control of the court (e.g., warrant outstanding).

During 1989, 86% of felony case dispositions statewide were achieved within the six-month standard.

Civil Cases: The standard is disposition within fifteen months from the filing of note of issue. During 1989, 91% of note of issue dispositions statewide were achieved within this standard.

Family Court: The standard is case disposition within 180 days of the commencement of the proceeding, excluding periods when a case is not within the active management control of the court (e.g., warrant outstanding). During 1989, 99% of dispositions statewide were reached within the standard.

PROBATION DEPARTMENTS

Intake Services

Cases opened for intake services increased 7% from 139,549 in 1988 to 148,976 in 1989 (Chart 1). The 31,540 cases opened in New York City represents 21% of the statewide total, compared to 20% in 1988.

Pre-disposition Services

There were 22,859 cases received for supervision prior to court disposition in 1989. This is a 21% increase over the 18,897 received in 1988 (Chart 2).

Investigations

Probation departments conducted 109,777 regular investigations (pre-sentence, pre-plea, JD, and PINS) and 74,384 other investigations in 1989. This 184,161 total is a 9% increase over the 169,688 investigations conducted in 1988 (Table 1).

Probation Supervision

The total number of family and criminal cases sentenced to probation increased from 52,235 in 1988 to 53,688 in 1989. The number of family and criminal cases on probation at the end of the year increased from 127,588 in 1988 to 135,881 in 1989 (Table 2).

The number of probation cases supervised at the end of the year in New York City increased from 55,045 in 1988 to 58,830 in 1989 (Chart 3). The number of criminal court cases supervised statewide at the end of the year increased from 120,807 in 1988 to 128,707 in 1989 (Chart 4).

The number of cases sentenced to probation in New York City increased by 5% from 18,465 to 19,429 between the years 1988 and 1989 (Chart 5). During 1989, there were 53,688 cases sentenced to probation statewide. This is a 3% increase over 1988 when 51,938 cases sentenced to probation (Charts 5 and 6).

Felony cases sentenced to probation increased much more dramatically than misdemeanors from 1985 to 1989. The increase was much more obvious in New York City than in Upstate counties (Charts 7, 8, and 9).

Misdemeanor cases supervised at the end of 1985 outnumbered felonies. In 1989, the number of felony cases was larger than the misdemeanors. The difference was attributable to the larger New York City felony caseloads. Outside of New York City, there continued to be a larger number of misdemeanor cases (Charts 10, 11, and 12).

Of the 38,502 cases closed in 1989, 14,071 (37%) were by early discharge and another 9,886 (26%) by maximum expiration. In New York City, these categories reflected 49% of all case closings. Outside of New York City, these categories reflected 69% of all case closings (Charts 13, 14, and 15).

On 12/31/89, there were 725.2 cases on probation for every 100,000 population. This figure ranged from 324.0 in Richmond County to 1,398.8 in Sullivan County (Table 3).

### ALTERNATIVE TO INCARCERATION (ATI) PROGRAMS

Alternative to incarceration programs seek to reduce reliance on incarceration either by providing more or better information upon which critical judicial decisions are made, or by offering new and different options to the court. Currently, programs operate within four broad program models:

#### Pretrial Release Programs

Pretrial release programs collect and verify information about criminal defendants and present the information to the courts so that more informed decisions regarding pretrial release conditions can be made. Some pretrial release programs provide community supervision of the defendant during the pretrial period. Some programs also provide bail expediting services, assisting the defendant to raise bail by contacting potential sureties. During 1989, 41 pretrial release programs interviewed 39,981 defendants (Tables 5 and 6).

#### Defender-Based Advocacy Programs

These programs receive referrals from defense counsel and prepare a variety of reports to facilitate pretrial release, plea bargaining and alternative sentencing. In addition, defender-based advocacy programs routinely refer defendants to social service agencies based upon their evaluations of defendants' personal needs. Alternative sentencing plans prepared by these programs often include enhanced provisions for community supervision and mandatory participation in treatment programs. During 1989, 10 defender-based advocacy programs provided services to 971 defendants (Table 7).


#### Community Service Sentencing

Community service sentencing offers the courts a new sentencing option. The typical community service program screens offenders to determine their appropriateness for participation and then places these individuals with carefully selected non-profit or governmental agencies where they must complete the number of service hours imposed by the courts. Over 3,200 offenders whose sentences including the performance of community service were monitored by 33 programs during 1989 (Table 8).

#### Specialized Alternative Programs


Specialized alternative programs provide a variety of services aimed at specific offender populations. During 1989, six Treatment Alternative to Street Crimes (TASC) programs provided assessment, referral and monitoring services to 3,353 offenders in need of drug, alcohol and mental health treatment). Seventeen other specialized alternative programs provided services to 3,188 offenders across the State and included home confinement programs, residential programs and programs aimed at special offender populations such as juveniles, offenders with alcohol and drug abuse problems or developmental disabilities, and offenders in need of job training (Tables 9 and 10).

1987-1989**




DURING THE YEAR 1987-1989**




1985-1989**



1985-1989**




1985-1989



1985-1989





PROBATION CASES SUPERVISED


# ADULT PROBATION CASES CLOSED 01/01/89 TO 12/31/89 STATEWIDE


# ADULT PROBATION CASES CLOSED 01/01/89 TO 12/31/89 NEW YORK CITY


The number of inmates in New York State prisons rose to an all-time high of 51,232 at the close of calendar year 1989. This represents a rise of 15% or 6,672 inmates from the previous year and 312% from a low 12,444 inmates on December 31, 1972. The number of inmates in state prisons declined to this low of 12,444 following a series of judicial and policy decisions that restricted the types of offenders that could be sentenced to state correctional facilities. This decline began in 1964 and continued over a nine-year period. Contributing to this decline was the Baxstrom decision which led to the release from Department custody of all criminally insane inmates held beyond their maximum expiration dates along with related decisions which ended the practice of holding dangerous mentally incapacitated persons under state prison custody for long periods of time. This and related decisions, coupled with other factors including a revised Penal Law which became effective in September 1967, changes in sentencing procedures, and by the development of major institutional programs for drug addicts by New York State's drug control agency, resulted in an annual net loss in the state prison population which continued through 1972. This situation reversed in 1973 when admissions exceeded releases for the first time since 1963. The rise has continued every year since with significant increases expected both in 1990 and 1991. Reasons for this increase include a major growth in both violent and drug crime over this period and a series of stringent laws mandating imprisonment for a growing number of offenses.

INMATES UNDER CUSTODY ON DECEMBER 31: 1972 - 1989




Admissions To Department Custody (Table 1 and Chart 2)

Admissions to Department custody have shown a general rise starting with 1971 and continuing through 1989. The three-year period 1978-1980 did see a lower volume of admissions than was recorded in 1977 but at the expense of a growing number of felony cases awaiting disposition for periods of over six months. The reduction of this particular felony disposition backlog was accompanied by a sharp rise in 1981 admissions. Admissions have continued to rise since that point reaching an all-time annual high of 28,497 in 1989. Court commitments account for three out of four admissions and trends in this category largely shape the flow of offenders into state prisons. Court commitments declined to a low of 4,250 in 1970. From this 1970 low, commitments have risen to a high of 21,536 in 1989 an increase of 17,286 or 407 percent. Beginning in 1971, felony commitments rose rapidly, offsetting declines in commitments for lesser offenses which had been diverted to other agencies. Contributing to this trend has been a rise in felony arrests, indictments, and court dispositions and an increasing tendency of the courts to commit convicted felons to state correctional facilities. Several more stringent laws enacted in 1973 and in subsequent years have added to this increase in commitments. These include the second felony offender law which imposes mandatory state prison sentences for such offenders; a drug law which imposes harsher penalties on drug offenders; and the imposition of mandatory terms of imprisonment for all Class B and for certain Class C and Class D felonies. The trend toward a higher level of court commitments has continued through 1989 reflecting also the impact of the violent felony legislation that became effective in 1978 as well as the growing pool of felony offenders who must be sent to prison in the event of a new felony conviction.

The number of admissions resulting from violation of parole has also increased over the past ten years reflecting the growing number of persons released to parole supervision during this period. Other admissions such as absconders from temporary release and returns from the Office of Mental Health have similarly increased as the number of persons in these programs continues to grow.

Reason For Commitment (Table 2)

Of 21,514 offenders committed during 1989 to custody of the Department of Correctional Services, 10,100 or 46.9% were sentenced as second felony offenders while 190 or 0.9% were sentenced as persistent felony offenders. A small portion of the commitments, 440 or 2.0% were sentenced as Youthful Offenders.

The largest group of the 1989 commitments had been convicted of drug felonies (9,762 or 45.4%). Drug commitments had averaged only 11% or 12% of annual commitments for several years. Starting in 1984, however, the proportion as well as the number of drug felons has grown rapidly. The proportion of second felony offenders among drug commitments has also grown substantially from only 7.7% in 1978 to 50.7% in 1989.

One out of three (7,113 or 33.1%) of the 1989 commitments had been convicted of crimes designated in the penal law as Violent Felony Offenses (VFO). Commitments for robbery led the VFO group followed by crimes involving burglary; homicide; dangerous weapons; violent sex crimes; and assault. Second felony offenders accounted for 36.7% of the VFO group, the lowest proportion among the various crime groupings.

There were 1,111 offenders committed for other felonies involving violence or coercion. Commitments for robbery led this group followed by crimes of homicide; other sex crimes; and assault. Over half, 51.2% of this group were sentenced as second felony offenders.

There were 3,088 or 14.4% committed for property and other felonies. Burglary was the largest crime in this group followed by stolen property; grand larceny; driving while intoxicated; and forgery. This group had the highest proportion of second felony offenders at 63.7%.

**Drug Felony Commitments (Tables 3 and 4 and Chart 3)**

The number of commitments for drug felonies has risen sharply over the past six years. Over the period 1970-1984 drug felons accounted for from ten to thirteen percent of total commitments to the Department. This proportion has risen since 1985 to an all time high of 45.3% in 1989. (See Table 3.)

Nearly three out of four (72.8%) drug commitments in 1989 had been convicted of a drug sale while the remainder had been convicted of drug possession felonies. Over one-half (50.7%) of the 1989 drug commitments had been sentenced as second felony offenders. Most of the Class D and E felons were committed as second felony offenders. The largest number of commitments were received for Class D felonies (2,937 or 30.1%) followed by Class B at 2,726 or 27.9%; Class C at 2,111 or 21.6%; Class E at 1,113 or 11.4% and Class A at 875 or 8.0%. 

Releases From Department Custody (Table 1 and Chart 2)

Releases from Department custody in 1989 totaled 21,825, an increase of 9.6% over 1988. Historically, releases had remained relatively stable during the five-year period 1971-1975, averaging 7,285 annually. In 1976 a sharp rise in releases is observed, up 10% over the previous year. This substantial rise reflected a growth in the pool of parole eligible inmates in the burgeoning inmate population who were subsequently released to parole supervision. The year 1978 saw a temporary drop in releases which reflected longer minimum periods of incarceration being set by the Board of Parole and a modest shift toward longer sentences on the part of the courts, both of which lessened the number of paroles. Releases for 1979 and 1980 resumed an upward trend, including high volumes of parole and conditional releases. A decline in 1981 releases reflected both sentencing changes under the violent felony offender law as well as a change in the manner in which the minimum period of incarceration was determined for a considerable portion of the inmate population. Releases resumed their upward trend in 1982 and reach an all-time annual high in 1989.

Time Served By First Releases (Table 5)


There were 14,005 inmates released to parole supervision for the first time on their current sentence during 1989. The median time served by these offenders in DOCS facilities was 19.0 months. Violent felony offenders had the highest median time served figure at 27.0 months, ranging from a high of 171.5 months for persons originally committed for murder to a low of 20.0 months for assault 2nd offenders. Other coercive offenders served a median time of 18.0 months followed by drug felons at 16.0 months and property and other crimes at 15.0 months. The addition of time served in local jails to state time increased the overall median time served by five months to 24.0.

COMMITMENT OFFENSE: DECEMBER 31, 1989**







NEW YORK STATE COMMISSION OF CORRECTION

The State Commission of Correction oversees all correctional facilities in New York State including state prisons, county jails, city, town and village lockups and precincts. Its goals are: to regulate and oversee the operation and management of state and local correctional facilities; to develop policies, plans and programs that will improve the administration of these facilities; and to promote a safe and secure correctional environment for both staff and inmates. In light of these goals, the Commission investigates incidents and correctional management issues; establishes and enforces minimum standards; provides training for county correction officers and managers; offers technical assistance on health services including AIDS related issues; and, approves plans and specifications for new jail construction or renovations. The Commission also serves as a central repository for information on the correctional system in New York State.

Three Commissioners head the agency: A Chairperson and two members who chair the Citizens' Policy and Complaint Review Council and the Medical Review Board, respectively. The Citizens' Council monitors grievances in county facilities and provides an avenue for citizen participation in development of Commission policies and programs. The Medical Review Board monitors medical and mental health services in correctional facilities and investigates circumstances surrounding inmate deaths.

The correctional system in New York State is comprised of three major correctional jurisdictions including the Department of Correctional Services, the New York City Department of Correction, and county jails/penitentiaries. The Department of Correctional Services (DOCS) operates all state correctional facilities. DOCS houses only those inmates who are sentenced to more than one year. The New York City Department of Correction (NYCDOC) operates all county correctional facilities within the City of New York; and thirdly, county jails and penitentiaries are operated by individual county sheriffs/correction departments. These county departments house pre-trial individuals as well as those who are sentenced to one year or less.

In addition, the Commission of Correction monitors and serves as a central repository of data for the New York City Police Department (operating New York City Precinct Lockups) and all other City, Town and Village Police Department Lockups outside the City of New York.

INMATE POPULATIONS

The Commission began collecting inmate population data by conducting semi-annual telephone surveys to county jails and penitentiaries in 1981. Currently, county facilities report daily inmate populations via the on-line Jails Daily Population Reporting System.

Inmate population counts for both the New York City Department of Correction and the State Department of Correctional Services are obtained from Daily Population Reports produced by both departments.

Table I and Figure 1 present the inmate populations across the three major correctional jurisdictions from 1981-1989.

# STATE AND COUNTY INMATE POPULATION 1981 - 1989



Table II illustrates the percent of occupancy of county inmates to jail capacity for upstate facilities as well as the City of New York. The average daily count for the month of December, 1989 includes the physical body count only. It is common for "upstate" jails to board their inmates out to other counties due to overcrowding. This decreases their body count in order to maintain facility compliance for maximum occupancy. Inversely, many counties board-in inmates from surrounding counties when they have bed space available. This increases their body count to include all inmates housed. The following table reports the actual body count for all jails across New York State for the last month of 1989. The design capacity represents the amount of permanent jail space within each facility. The total capacity includes all permanent and temporary jail space available within each facility. Examples of approved temporary capacity would include a day room that has been converted to house inmates until permanent jail space is obtained.

The average daily CENSUS for county correctional facilities for the last three years, 1987-1989, are displayed in Table III. The average census reflects the number of county inmates for whom the sheriff/commissioner are responsible. The census is computed by adding to the physical body count all those inmates who are boarded out to another county, housed out to a mental hygiene facility, etc. Inmates who are boarded in would not be included in the census. Rather these inmates are reflected in the county of origin or census county.

NEW YORK STATE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT  
DIVISION FOR YOUTH



During 1989, 2,648 individuals were admitted to residential facilities operated by the New York State Division for Youth. Of these, 2,252 were first admissions having had no prior contact with Division programs, 306 were readmissions from community care, and 90 had experienced previous placements with the Division (Table VI).

For those youth adjudicated Juvenile Delinquents, Restrictive Juvenile Delinquents, or Juvenile Offenders, the offenses of burglary, robbery, larceny and other thefts accounted for 54.5% of the admissions. Assaults and homicides were responsible for an additional 12.6% of the admissions for this group (Table I).

Among the 2,648 admissions, 6.8% were placed in secure facilities and an additional 30.7% in limited secure facilities. The largest category among remaining admissions was cooperative/voluntary which accounted for 25.5% of the admissions (Table II).

Juvenile Delinquent adjudications accounted for 82.8% of the admissions and Juvenile Offender convictions an additional 6.0%. Persons In Need of Supervision were responsible for 9.7% of the 1989 admissions (Table III).

Males made up 88.3% of the admissions and females the remaining 11.6% (Table IV). Table V, which lists admissions by ethnicity, shows Blacks accounting for 55.2% of the admissions, followed by Whites at 24.0%, and Hispanics at 18.4%.

## THE BOARD OF PAROLE

During the 1987-88 and 1988-89 fiscal years, the Parole Board conducted over 43,000 interviews and/or hearings in State correctional facilities to determine parole eligibility dates for certain inmates, the release readiness of eligible inmates to parole supervision and the re-release of parole violators, as well as other types of administrative hearings.

The number of release interviews conducted by the Parole Board increased from 21,448 in 1987-1988 to 22,074 in 1988-1989, 3% increase.

The Parole Board granted release to 28,883 inmates during the last two fiscal years with an increase of 1% in 1988-89. Release decisions were granted to 17,673 initial applicants during the two year period (inmates who became eligible for parole release after serving their minimum sentence from April 1, 1987 through March 31, 1989). Reappearance interviews resulted in 6,718 release decisions for inmates who were previously eligible for parole release, but were denied release and became eligible again. Re-release interviews for violators and other release interviews resulted in 4,492 inmates released to the community. The decisions rendered at the various release interviews are summarized in Table 1 below.

The community protection efforts of the Parole Board are reflected in a comparison of some of the characteristics of inmates granted and denied release at initial interviews. The comparison reveals that inmates who were denied release were more likely to have committed crimes involving the use of a weapon or the occurrence of an injury. Further, those who were denied release had more extensive prior records than inmates granted release. The effectiveness of the Parole Board's screening is demonstrated in greater detail in the table to follow:

## PAROLE OPERATIONS

### Institutional Parole

The Parole Officer assigned to an institution plays a critical role in the inmate's transition from institutional to community life. The IPO serves in a bridging capacity between the inmate and the community, the inmate and the field parole officer, and the inmate and the Parole Board.

The role of the Parole Officer with an institutional assignment includes an assessment of the needs of each inmate and encourages their participation in programming, during incarceration, which meets these needs. These Parole Officers conduct inmate group counseling sessions and Parole orientation classes for inmates. Additionally, they interview inmates, in advance of their Board release interviews, to gather information which is presented to the Board in summary reports together with recommendations as regards the granting or denial of parole release and the possible conditions of release.

After a parolee has been granted release, the Parole Officer continues to participate in Parole Board release planning through the Community Preparation Program. The Parole Officer provides the link between the institution and the community both through pre-release interviews conducted with inmates and through ongoing communication with the Field Area Office to which the parolee is to be released. These services are provided to both inmates who are released by decision of the Parole Board and to those conditionally released.

Finally, institutionally assigned Parole Officers continue to participate on correctional temporary release committees which grant temporary work release, furloughs and other leaves of absence for good cause to inmates. The Institutional staff is involved in committees within the state's correctional facilities that give support and advice to drug and alcohol programs.

### Community Supervision of Parolees

Community supervision is at the heart of the Division's community protection mission. The Parole Officer with a field assignment is located in the community supervising offenders released from state correctional facilities. Community protection requires that Parole Officers adhere to strict supervision standards. Additionally, it is essential to ensure that parolees comply with the terms and conditions of release. When the conditions of release are violated, the Parole Officer must take appropriate action.

Presence in the community allows the Parole Officer to become familiar with the services and resources which the neighborhood contains. Through their familiarity with the surrounding community, the officer can expedite the reintegration of the offender by linking offenders with particular needs to relevant services.

Beginning in FY 85-86, the Division implemented Differential Supervision which was a unique approach to community supervision caseload management. The concept targets resources on parolees with the highest levels of need for surveillance and social services in an attempt to meet the agency's goals of community protection and parolee reintegration. Allocation of these resources is based on a model of risk management under which newly released parolees are placed on Intensive caseloads which require extensive contact standards and reduced caseload size. After 15 months parolees are moved to larger, Regular caseloads when their potential threat to the community and level of service needs have been reduced.

There were 40,771 individuals under community parole supervision during fiscal year 1988-89, as reflected in Table 3. This represented an increase of 8% over the previous year's figure of 37,868. Parole Board releases from state correctional facilities increased from 13,633 during fiscal 1987-88 to 14,822 during fiscal 1988-89. Statistics reflecting median time-served of those released by the Parole Board have remained very consistent over the years.

### Outcome of Parole Supervision

The primary goals of the Division of Parole are to assist offenders released from correctional institutions to adjust to community life, and to provide community protection by preventing these individuals from re-engaging in criminal behaviors.

Parole Officers carry out these goals by supervising parolees in the community, coordinating the delivery of available social services, and helping to motivate and guide the parolees towards a more positive lifestyle. However, one must realize that not all persons will abide by their conditions of release. The Division must, therefore, fulfill the goal of community protection by returning a violator to prison.

A violation of parole occurs when an individual under supervision violates the conditions of parole in an important respect. These conditions are agreed to in writing by an inmate upon release from prison to community parole supervision. They stipulate, for example, that if the releasee absconds from supervision or re-engages in criminal activity, his/her parole is subject to revocation. The individual may consequently be returned to prison following a series of due process hearings.

In the 1988-89 period, 17% of all parolees under supervision during the year were returned to prison by the courts for committing new crimes or by the Parole Board for violating the rules of parole (e.g., absconding, or illegal use of drugs). Table 4 provides a more detailed analysis of the parole success rate.

In view of the data in Table 4, the parole success rate can be measured in several different ways.

In terms of total number of parolees not returned to prison, the success rate was 85% in 1987-88 and 83% in 1988-89. These results are an indication of the Division's overall performance in deterring parolee crime and reincarceration.

From the point of view of enforcing the rules of parole, parolees returned to prison for rule violations cannot really be considered "failures" in the same sense as those who were returned for new criminal convictions. For example, absconding from supervision is less serious than committing a violent offense. But, more importantly, a prison return based on a rule violation decreases the chances of a parolee being a threat to community safety. Given this, the success rate was actually 96% for fiscal year 1987-88 and 1988-89.

Using the most rigorous definition of success, those parolees in an active reporting status, the success for 1987-88 was 72%; in 1988-89 it was 69%. This measure excludes parolees in either an incarcerative or absconder status. It is important to note that not all of these incarcerated or absconder parolees will have their parole revoked or even enter the violation process.

**CRIME VICTIMS BOARD**

The Crime Victims Board (CVB) was established August 1, 1966 to provide monetary compensation to eligible crime victims. Since 1966 numerous legislative enactments have expanded eligibility and award criteria which have enabled the CVB to provide a wide array of assistance to crime victims and witnesses.

By statute the CVB is mandated as the "payer of last resort". Compensation able to be provided to crime victims, not necessarily physically injured, includes but is not limited to awards for: unlimited, unreimbursed medical expenses including the cost of necessary counseling expenses for victims and appropriate family members; unreimbursed loss of earnings/support up to a weekly maximum of \$400 until an aggregate of \$30,000 is reached; unreimbursed funeral expenses to a maximum of \$2,500; the cost to repair or replace items of essential personal property up to \$500; unlimited, unreimbursed occupational or vocational rehabilitative needs; the cost of residing at or utilizing the services of a domestic violence shelter; and lastly, the payment of reasonable attorney's fees up to \$1,000. As a result of a Governor's initiative that was enacted in 1989, the survivors of police officers slain in the line of duty as a direct result of a crime are able to receive reimbursement for reasonably incurred burial expenses without regard to financial difficulty.

In fiscal year 1986-87, the CVB witnessed a dramatic increase in claims filed by crime victims attributable to two main factors: 1) the enactment of Chapter 688, Laws of 1985 which made significant enhancements to eligibility and award criteria; and, 2) a New York City-wide police notification program which provided information on the existence of and benefits available from the CVB. In the following fiscal years, the increase in claims filed by crime victims has been at a rate consistent with other increases experienced before Chapter 688 became effective.
