

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this study is to determine the criminal history (prior arrests and convictions), as well as the drug history of adults incarcerated in the state prison system. Using SBI number as the key identifier, the Department of Corrections' Offender Based Correctional Information System (OBCIS) database was merged with the State Police Offender Based Transaction System/Computerized Criminal History (OBTS/CCH) database and resulted in a match for 85% or 14,235 of the department's adult residents. Major findings of this study are as follows:

PRIOR ARRESTS/CONVICTIONS:

- There was an average of 7.6 arrests per resident, with a median of 6.
- * Three out of four of the current state prison residents had prior convictions.
- * There was an average of 4.2 convictions per resident, with a median of 3.
- * Two out of three were convicted of a violent offense or had a previous violent conviction.
- * Only 9% of the state prison population had no reported history of violence and no prior convictions.

DRUG HISTORY:

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- * 60% of residents had at least one drug arrest.
- * Four out of 10 residents had at least one drug conviction.
 - One third of all residents had distribution as the most serious drug arrest charge.
 - Over 25% of all residents had possession as the most serious drug arrest charge.

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ACQUISITIONS

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One third of all residents had at least one distribution arrest, with almost 20% having a minimum of one distribution conviction.

Half of all residents had a minimum of one possession arrest, with over 30% having a minimum of one possession conviction.

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RESIDENTS INCARCERATED FOR VIOLENT OFFENSES:

- * Half are currently incarcerated for violent offenses.
- * Four out of ten had prior violent convictions.
- * 34% had prior non-violent convictions.
- * 27% had no prior convictions.
- * 41% of current residents with sexual offenses as the most serious offense, had no prior convictions.
- * Half of the residents incarcerated for robbery had a prior violent conviction.

RESIDENTS INCARCERATED FOR NON-VIOLENT OFFENSES:

- * 30% of the residents incarcerated for a nonviolent offense had a prior violent conviction.
- * 54% of all non-violent offenders had a prior violent arrest or conviction.
- * 24% of all non-violent offenders incarcerated for drug offenses had no reported prior convictions.
- * Half of residents currently incarcerated for a weapons offense had prior violent convictions.

I. Introduction

The purpose of this study is to determine the extent of prior arrests, convictions and drug history of adult residents in Department of Corrections facilities.

II. Methodology

On October 10, 1989, the Department of Corrections' Offender Based Correctional Information System (OBCIS) 16,835 residents in the department's adult recorded facilities. In order to secure data concerning previous arrests and convictions for the group, the Department solicited the assistance of the New Jersey Criminal Disposition Commission and the Department of Law and Public Safety's Division of Criminal Justice.

Using SBI number as an identifier, the OBCIS database was run against the State Police Offender Based Transaction System - Computerized Criminal History (OBTS/CCH) files. The run of one database against the other yielded a match for 85% or 14,235 of the department's adult residents. These 14,235 residents were matched to OBTS/CCH files for arrest and conviction, as well as SBI number. This resident population does not include the additional 3,000 adult offenders that are housed in county jails awaiting entrance to the state prison system.

It should be noted that conviction data do not include federal or out of state arrests or convictions. Conviction data may also be somewhat understated due to historical

reporting problems with OBTS/CCH data. Tables VI and VII represent a total of 13,338 residents, reflecting a 6% error due to incompatibility between OBCIS instant offense type (violent/non-violent) and CCH/OBTS offense type.

III. Findings

Table I indicates that 76% (or 3 out of 4) of the 14,235 residents matched had prior convictions. Approximately half of the residents are currently incarcerated for violent offenses and half for non-violent offenses. Violent offenses include homicide, kidnapping, robbery, assault and sexual offenses.

Of the resident population, 9,419 or 66% (2 out of 3) were convicted of a violent offense or had a history of a violent offense conviction (Table II). Only 9% of the population had no history of violence and no prior convictions.

Note: Assault offenses included simple and aggravated assault. Of all residents, 3% had prior simple assault convictions.

A total of 108,607 arrest incidents resulting in 60,199 convictions were recorded for the 14,235 resident offenders. The number of arrest incidents for individual offenders ranged from 1 to 59, with an average of 7.6 arrests per resident and a median of 6. Convictions ranged from 1 to 46, with an average of 4.2 and a median of 3 (Table III).

Average and median number of arrest incidents and convictions were lower for violent offenders than non-violent offenders. Drug offenders were included in the non-violent category, and were analyzed separately, as well.

Almost 60% of all residents had at least one drug arrest incident (Table IV) within their current and prior arrest history. Over 40% of all residents had at least one drug related conviction.

One third of all residents had distribution as their most serious drug arrest charge, while over 25% had possession as their most serious drug arrest charge.

As Table V indicates, one third of all residents had at least one distribution arrest, resulting in almost 20% of all residents having at least one distribution conviction. Almost 50% of all residents had at least one possession arrest with over 30% of all residents having at least one possession conviction.

For all residents incarcerated for violent offenses, 39% had prior violent convictions, 34% had prior non-violent convictions and 27% had no prior convictions recorded (Table VI).

Of all offenders with sexual offenses as the most serious current offense, 41% had no prior convictions. Almost 50% of the offenders incarcerated for robbery had a previous conviction for a violent offense.

Note: Tables VI and VII total only 13,338 residents rather than 14,235 as depicted in Tables I through III. This reflects a 6% reduction due to incompatibility between OBCIS offense type and CCH/OBTS offense type.

As indicated by Table VII, 30% of all residents incarcerated for a non-violent offense had a prior violent <u>conviction</u>. While not included in this table, 45% of the residents incarcerated for a non-violent offense with no prior violent convictions, had prior <u>arrest</u> incidents which included violent charges. In all, 54% of residents currently incarcerated for non-violent offenses have been previously <u>arrested</u> or <u>convicted</u> of a violent offense.

Twenty-four percent of all non-violent offenders incarcerated for drug offenses, had no prior convictions. Of all non-violent offenders currently incarcerated for a weapons offense, 50% had prior violent convictions (Table VII).
