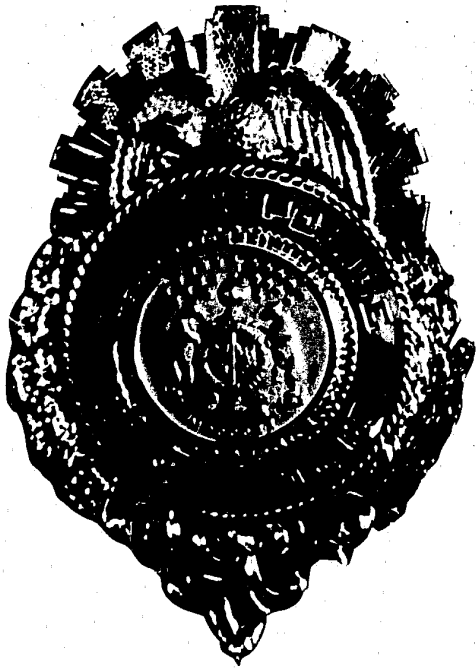

Commissioners:

I hereby respectfully submit the Annual Report for 1973.

Last year, total Part I crimes increased 1.7%. Negligent manslaughter, larceny under \$50, rape, assaults, and auto thefts declined compared to last year. Those categories experiencing increases were robbery, 11.5%, and burglary, 9.7%. Operation Robbery Control, launched in December, was a great success, and we expect to use the same techniques throughout 1974.

However, even the most skilled police agency can achieve only transitory reductions in the crime picture without the trust and unhesitating support of the citizens of the community. Therefore, it is our goal to strive for a more harmonious relationship with the public, civic groups, and criminal justice agencies. Through this police-community alliance we can mobilize and direct our efforts to make Kansas City a safer city in which to live.

Fortunately, during the year, traffic fatalities declined from 97 to 88. A statistical study suggested that fatalities decreased because of stepped up enforcement by fatal accident enforcement units, combined with extensive efforts to inform the general public of our traffic problems, through the news media. However, there was an increase of 5.2% in the number of injury accidents handled by the department. We pledge to continue our efforts to prevent all accidents.

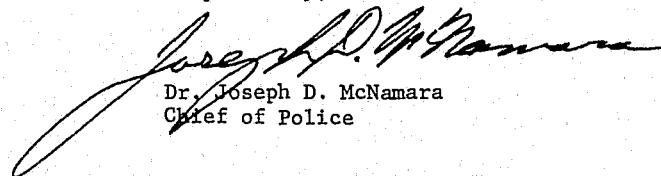
Throughout the year, we have proceeded with our Task Force programs with truly encouraging results. Other such programs, the patrol projects and the comprehensive personnel study, appear particularly promising for 1974.

The entire department shared in the pride of our community when the former Chief of Police, Clarence M. Kelley, was appointed Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. It was with a feeling of humility and great pride that I followed Mr. Kelley as the new Chief of Police on November 1, 1973.

Our deep gratitude goes out to the citizens of our community who, on December 18, 1973, voted overwhelming approval of the police capital improvement bond program which was so badly needed. The new facilities resulting from the passage of these bonds will enable us to further improve service to the citizens of our splendid city.

Please be assured that this department will continue to use every available resource to increase its effectiveness and professional competence in order to provide the best possible police service to our community.

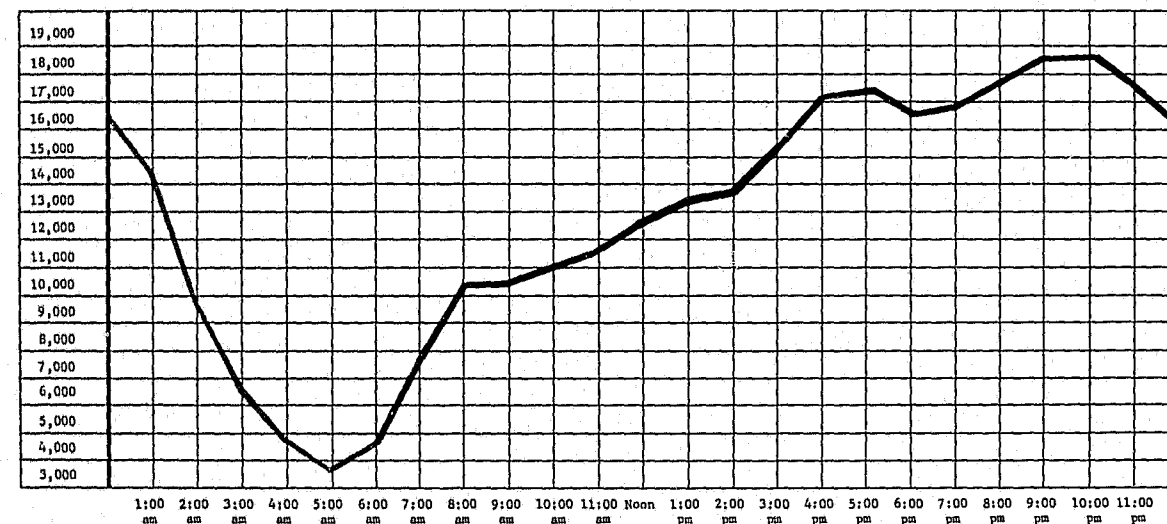

RADIO CALLS (INCIDENTS)

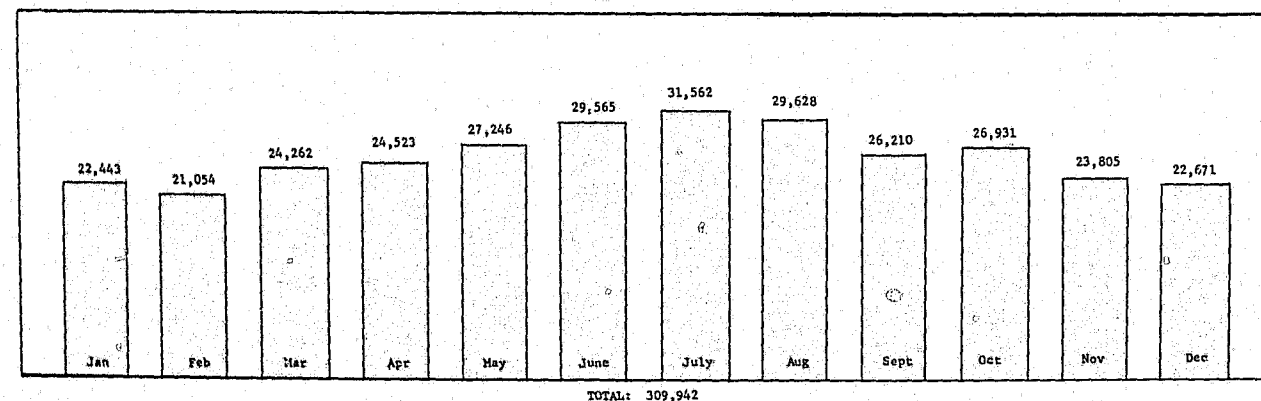

Since the factors which cause crime are many and vary from place to place, readers are cautioned against drawing conclusions from direct comparisons of crime figures between individual communities without first considering the factors involved. Some of the conditions which will affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from place to place are briefly outlined below:

Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part; composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race; economic status and mores of the population; relative stability of population, including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types; climate, including seasonal weather conditions; educational, recreational, and religious characteristics; effective strength of the police force; standards governing appointments to the police force; policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts; attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems; the administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency.

POLICE OFFICERS PER SQUARE MILE



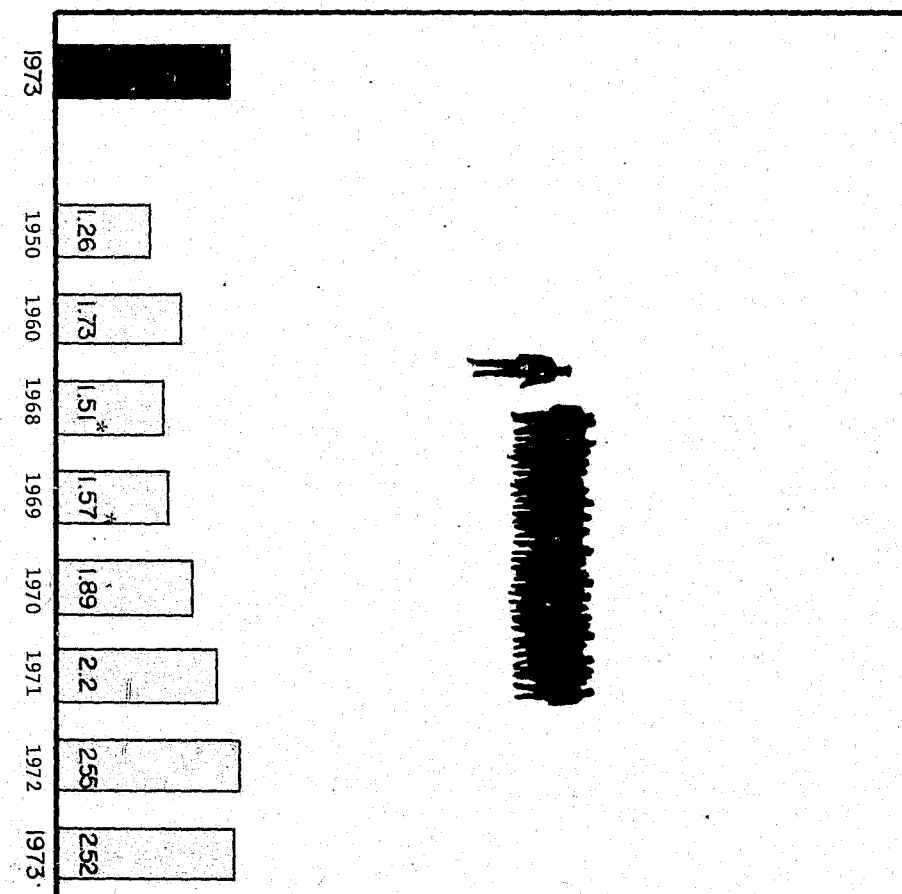
AVERAGE OF 40 CITIES FROM

KANSAS CITY'S POPULATION BY AGE - BASED ON 1970 CENSUS

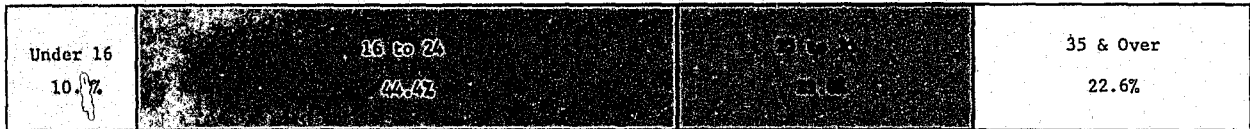

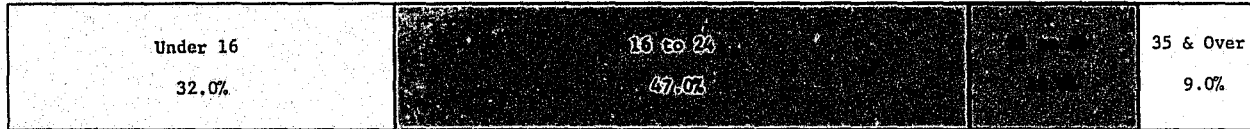

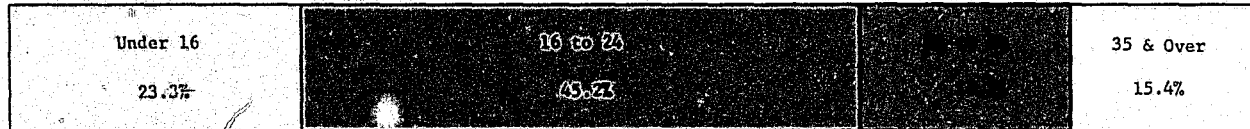

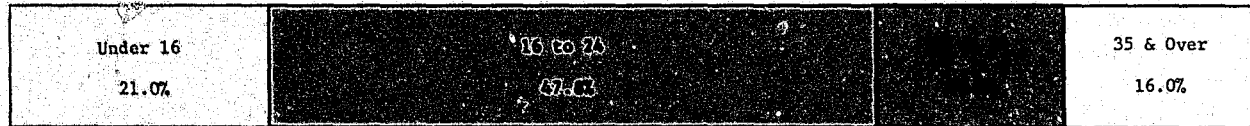

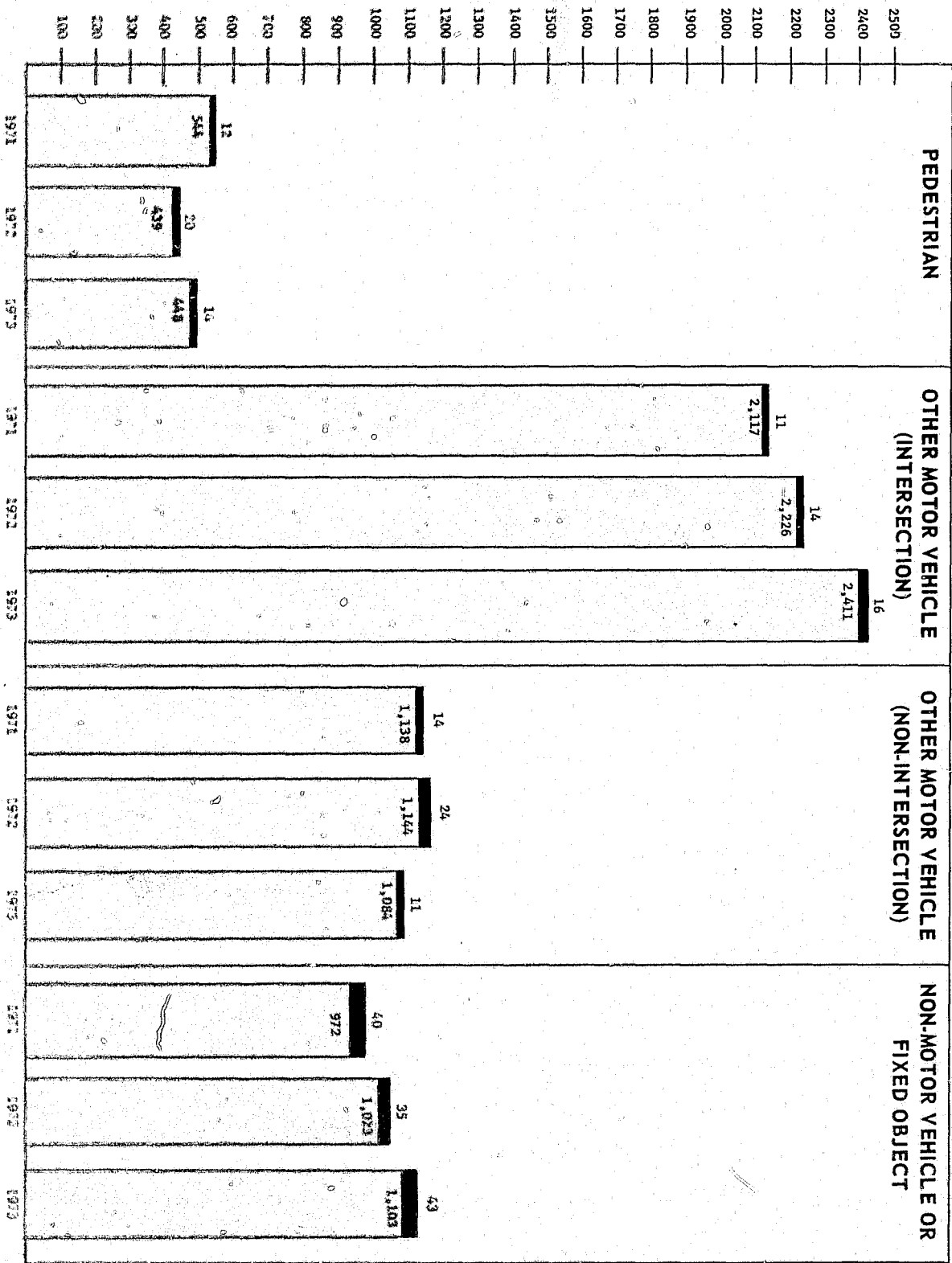

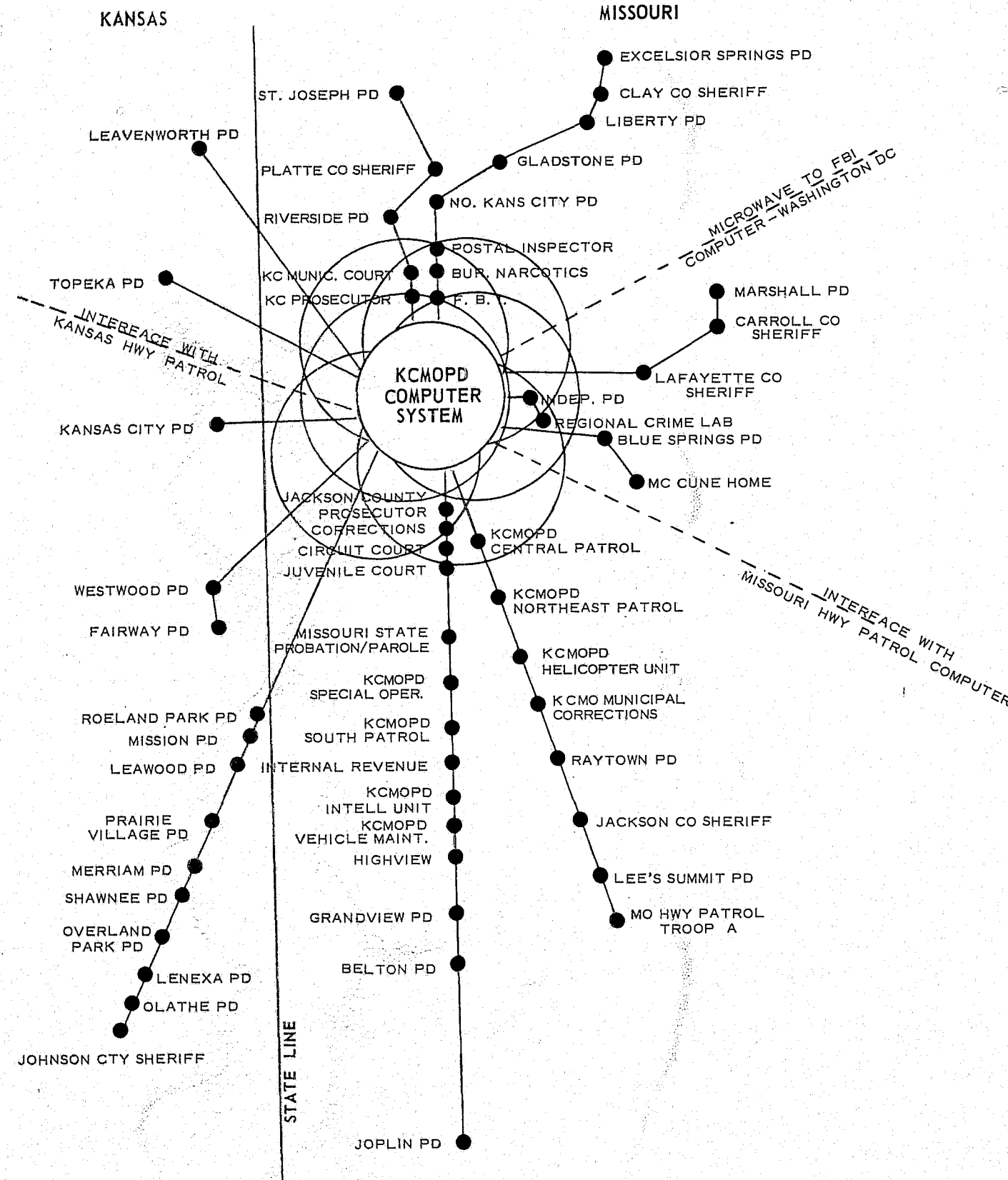

OPERATION ROBBERY CONTROL

For the three years prior to 1973, the number of robberies occurring during the month of December was substantially higher than the monthly average of each year. In December of 1970, robberies were 14% higher than the monthly average. In 1971, robberies increased 18%, and December of 1972, resulted in yet a greater margin of increase over the monthly average---22%.



During the first 11 months of 1973, robberies had risen to 15% over the same period of 1972, significantly more than any other category of crime. Recognizing that the last month of the year could again prove costly and tragic to many Kansas Citizens, Chief Joseph McNamara conceived and on December 4, launched "Operation Robbery Control" in an effort to bring about a reversal in this alarming trend.

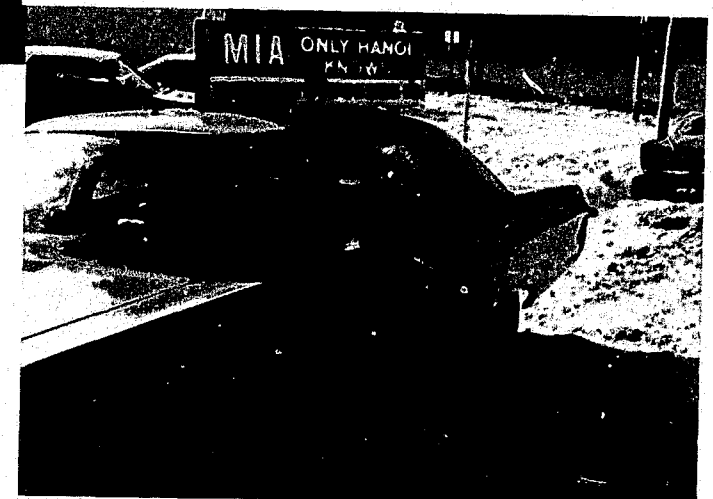


ROBBERY CONTROL

Police officers, both men and women, from the three patrol divisions, the Special Operations Division, the Investigations Bureau, as well as officers temporarily assigned to the project from administrative positions, were committed to this all-out effort to curb robberies. A robbery control center, staffed around the clock by command personnel, as well as crime analysts, was established at the 28th Street Police Station. Computer data depicting high-frequency time periods and geographic areas particularly vulnerable to armed and strong-armed robberies was utilized to deploy the available manpower. Computer analysis as well as spot maps indicating the location and type of robbery throughout the city were maintained and each robbery plotted as soon as it occurred. Based on this information, officers were deployed in a variety of strategies ranging from a saturation type of patrol with officers in contemporary dress operating rental vehicles. Decoy operations with officers in a wide range of disguises were used frequently. Police officers attired as cabbies operating borrowed taxicabs were used to combat cab robberies and to maintain surveillances. Young policewomen were transformed into older, typical purse snatch victims by a professional make-up artist and equipped with wireless microphones to maintain voice contact with their cover teams.

The dedication and commitment of the officers assigned to this special and unique project began to pay gratifying dividends. Instead of the customary increase, the rate of robbery by Christmas time had been reduced by almost 27%, compared to the same period of 1972.

The final statistics reflected an impressional decrease in robberies of over 20%, compared to December, 1972. Arrests for robbery increased from 63 in December of 1972, to 92 during the same period in 1973, an increase of 27%. Confiscated handguns, the means most commonly used to commit armed robberies, rose from 79 during December, 1972, to 151 in December of 1973, an increase of 91%.
