

#### **Foreword**

**Contents** 

A growing proportion of all persons in the United States are under some form of correctional supervision — on probation, in jail, in prison, or on parole.

In this compilation of statistical reporting series, which for many years were published in separate volumes, the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) provides a convenient source for data about persons in every part of the correctional population. We hope that its format and presentation will promote understanding of the population as a whole and its management.

This volume of statistics from 1991 features a section devoted to State prison inmates. In 1991 BJS sponsored a survey of State prison inmates, and the tables presented here reveal some of the results of that effort. Anyone interested in analyzing the data from the survey or from other reporting series may access the data through the National Archive of Criminal Justice Data at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

We extend our gratitude to the State, Federal, and local respondents who have enabled us to continue this joint venture, which dates back to 1850. I hope that this and future BJS reports will continue to help us all gain more insight into the important role of corrections agencies and employees throughout the Nation.

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#### **Important Note**

Correctional Populations in the United States presents numbers that describe persons under some form of correctional supervision. In this compilation the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) seeks to help users by ---

- making readily apparent the links between different correctional institutions or methods in each State
- suggesting the similarities and differences between States and regions as our system of criminal justice responds to both common and disparate needs
- permitting comparisons, however limited they must be, with previous years' statistics.

#### Helping readers find a single number

Through an index at the end of the volume, readers can find all topics treated in the tables. The index numbers refer to the tables.

Footnotes give extra information about how to interpret the numbers in the tables.

Category definitions are available in three places: the explanatory notes in the appendixes of sections, the questionnaires also in the appendixes, and the definitions of common terms in the introduction on page 3.

#### To make comparisons across years or between jurisdictions

BJS makes every effort to report numbers that are consistent in interpretation with those of the past and between separate jurisdictions in the present. Data collection rules and reporting protocols that fit historical statistics and that impose the least burden on respondents are used.

Some jurisdictions depart from the reporting conventions, and some categories for counting have shifted over the years. Users who try to draw conclusions from such numbers by comparing years or jurisdictions must take into account special circumstances and changes. Footnotes, table notes, explanatory notes, and other material highlighting the tables must be consulted for a full understanding of the data.

## Introduction

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#### History of U.S. corrections statistics

In 1850 the Federal Government, in cooperation with the States as a part of the Seventh Decennial Census, initiated a count of prisoners in 32 States and in the territories of Minnesota, New Mexico, Oregon, and Utah. Between 1850 and 1870, U.S. marshals administered the census of prisoners as part of a special schedule of social statistics. The 1880 report indicated there were 61 prisoners in State institutions per 100,000 residents. By 1890 Nevada had the highest per capita rate among the States, 203, and Wyoming had the lowest at 16. In that same year New York had 136 prisoners per 100,000 residents, and California had 169.

In 1910 the introduction of the indeterminate sentence was described in prisoner statistics; 21% of State prisoners on January 1 had received such sentences. The 1923 report said that more than a half of the prison admissions that year were under indeterminate sentences and observed that such sentences resulted in wide ranges between minimum and maximum sentences and disparities in setting release dates. In 1926 the Bureau of the Census began the annual collection of prisoner statistics, and the report for that year described the goal of the effort as the collection of data to "show the application of penal policies for various classes of offenders and in different parts of the country." That first annual report in 1926 provided information by jurisdiction on admissions, releases, sentences and time served, inmates under sentence of death, recidivism, and crowding — issues of major concern today.

During the past 64 years the partnership between the Federal Government and the States and localities in collecting corrections data has grown and prospered.

In 1950 the program was transferred from the Bureau of the Census to the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) in the Department of Justice and in 1971 to the predecessor agency of the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration

(LEAA). LEAA added the statistical series on local jails (1970), probation (1979), and parole (1976).

All of the major reporting series and projects of the corrections unit, Bureau of Justice Statistics, are outlined under "Data sources" below. The Bureau of the Census serves as the data collection agency for these series. When Congress created the Bureau of the Census in the late 19th century, it charged the agency with the responsibility to account for prisoners. That involvement has continued intermittently and in various forms until the present, as shown in the following chronology that sketches the evolution of the statistical reports grouped in this volume:

- **1904.** Prisoners and Juvenile Delinquents, 1904 reported movements rather than individuals. Prison officials served as enumerators.
- **1923.** *Prisoners, 1923* presented adults separate from juveniles.
- 1926. Prisoners in State and Federal Prisons and Reformatories began as an annual report that continued until 1946. The report included a special section on prisoners under sentence of death. From 1946 to 1970 the Bureau of Prisons published the annual figures. The Law Enforcement Assistance Administration followed for 9 years until BJS was created in 1980. (The Bureau of the Census has acted as collecting agent since 1972.)
- 1947. The Bureau of Prisons began the separate annual reports on prisoners under sentence of death. The LEAA and then BJS continued the reports until 1984. The Bureau of Justice Statistics will continue to publish annual bulletins about the death penalty and persons sentenced to death; the more detailed statistics will appear in the corrections volume.
- **1965.** The National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD), a nongovernmental organization, started the Uniform Parole Reports project under Federal contract.
- **1970.** LEAA conducted its first 1-day count of jails.

- 1974. LEAA, with the Bureau of the Census, surveyed a national random sample of offenders in State prisons. The survey, repeated in 1979 and 1986, collected information about personal background and criminal history and inquired about drug and alcohol usage.
- **1976.** The NCCD and LEAA annual reports covered parole data beginning in 1976.
- 1978. The Bureau of the Census counted prisoners in U.S. jails; the Bureau repeated the complete enumeration in 1983 and 1988.
- **1979.** The first annual report on parole and probation appeared, published by BJS.
- 1982. The Bureau of the Census completed the first annual jail sample survey for BJS. Bulletins containing data from the sample survey are supplemented by the corrections volume.

#### Definitions of common terms used in tables

Custody. To have custody of a prisoner, a State must hold that person in one of its facilities. Early statistical reports gave custody counts that largely have been replaced by jurisdiction counts of State prison populations. A State may have custody of a prisoner over whom another State maintains jurisdiction. The tables present both kinds of counting procedures, with jurisdiction counts being more complete; States that report only on custody are noted.

Detention status. This term distinguishes between prisoners, usually in jail, who were convicted or who were awaiting judgment.

Discretionary parole. A release from prison to supervision is discretionary when it is decided by a board or other authority.

Good time. When correctional authorities deduct time from a prison or iail sentence, often to reward or to encourage good behavior, they give good time. When the good time is tied to a specific action, such as working in a prison industry or performing a meritorious deed, it is called "earned."

Hispanic origin. A person of Hispanic origin may be of any race; however, a few States treat the ethnic category as a racial one. Reporting officials usually rely on self-definition, but some States classify according to surname.

Jurisdiction. Jurisdiction refers to a unit of government or to the legal authority to exercise governmental power. According to the latter meaning, the prisoners under a State's jurisdiction may be in the custody of local jails. (See "Custody.")

Mandatory parole. Mandatory parole results from statutory or correctional quidelines, and no judgment by a panel or board is required for release of a prisoner to supervision outside of prison.

Maximum sentence length. Some jurisdictions sentence offenders to a range of years; the larger number in that

range is the most that a prisoner may serve on a sentence. Often, good time is subtracted from the maximum sentence. When the tables report on prisoners with sentences longer or shorter than a year, the maximum sentence is used where applicable.

Movement. In corrections, a movement is an admission to or a release from a status -- prisoner, parolee, or probationer. Unless specifically noted, a transfer between facilities does not count as a movement.

One-day count. For a 1-day count a jurisdiction or facility is asked to report how many people were on its roll on a certain day. The average daily population is a year's total number of people on the roll each day, divided by the number of days. The methods of counting in aggregate do not yield estimates of either the number of persons in a status during a year or the average amount of time persons remain in a status.

Race. Classification by race often depends on the reporting program and the State. A few States reported two categories: white and nonwhite. A few others categorized Hispanic offenders as belonging to "Other race." Numbers of persons with certain racial backgrounds were sometimes estimated.

Reporting time. The prison and capital punishment figures are from December 31, 1991, unless otherwise noted. The Bureau of the Census surveyed jails on June 28, 1991; they previously took a complete census of jails on June 30, 1988.

Revisions. Many States revise the yearend number reported for the previous year. Those revisions are made in the total, not the detail. For example, the number of blacks, whites, and members of other races for 1989 were not changed by a State in 1990 to equal its revised 1989 total.

Youthful offender status. State legislatures create the youthful offender status through statutes that provide for

special sentencing, commitment, or record sealing procedures for young adult offenders adjudicated in a criminal court, as opposed to a juvenile court. The offenders may be above the statutory age limit for juveniles but below a specified upper age limit.

## Series that aggregate by reporting unit

- NPS-1. Annual yearend count of prisoners present by jurisdiction, sex, race, Hispanic origin, and admissions and releases during the year.
- **NPS-1A**. Count of prisoners present on June 30 by jurisdiction.
- NPS-1B. Advance yearend count of prisoners; emergency releases because of prison crowding; rated, operational, and design capacities of prison facilities.
- NPS-8A. Yearend count of persons in prison under sentence of death.
- NPS-8B,8C. Complete survey of States to determine any significant changes in statutes or case law relating to the death penalty.
- **CJ-8.** Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on probation by jurisdiction.
- **CJ-7.** Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on parole by jurisdiction.
- **CJ-5.** Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of more than 100 people.
- **CJ-5A.** Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of fewer than 100 people.
- **CJ-42.** Census every 5 years of all State and Federal operated, community based correctional facilities to record their characteristics.
- **CJ-43**. Census every 5 years of all State and Federal prison facilities to record their characteristics.
- CJ-3. Census every 5 years of all jail facilities to record their characteristics.

## Series based on reported individual offenders

- NPS-8. Characteristics of persons admitted to, under, or released from, a sentence of death during the year.
- NCRP-1A. Individual record data on each offender admitted to prison during the year, covering race, age, Hispanic origin, jail credits, prior prison credit, offenses and number of counts, and maximum and minimum sentence.
- NCRP-1B. Individual record data on each offender released from prison during the year, covering data contained in NCRP-1A, offenses and sentences since admittance, time spent in halfway houses, time served, and category of discharge.
- NCRP-1C. Individual record data on each offender discharged from parole supervision, covering data contained in NCRP-1A and -1B, parole discharge, and category of discharge.

## Series based on interviews of sampled prisoners

- SIJ-43. Survey every 5 years of a random sample of prisoners in jail to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.
- NPS-25. Survey every 5 years of a random sample of prison inmates to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.

#### Special studies of recidivism

BJS has conducted two major studies of the arrests and convictions of offenders after they are released from prison.


Recidivism I. This project analyzed arrests and convictions of a cohort of offenders paroled from prison in 20 States. It incorporated into the parole records FBI data on each parolee's contacts with criminal justice agencies. The selected offenders were 18 to 22 years of age when they were released from prison in 1978.

Recidivism II. This data collection program permits analysis of criminal justice contacts through 1986 for a sample of 16,000 prisoners released from prison in 11 States in 1983. The effort merged FBI, State, and local police records with correctional records.

#### Historical statistics

Historical statistics on prisoners in State and Federal institutions, yearend 1925-86 (NCJ-111098) reports custody counts by jurisdiction.


The U.S. local jail population increased from 209,582 in 1982 to 426,479 in 1991



The survey excludes five types of facilities from the count:

- · lockups that house persons for less than 48 hours

- the combined jail-prison systems of Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

Data were obtained through mailed questionnaires. Two followup mailings and phone calls elicited a response from 99% of all jails. For the four jails in certainty jurisdictions and the one jail outside a certainty jurisdiction not responding to the survey, data were adjusted by applying the average growth factor for facilities in the same stratum and region and with the same type of inmates (men, women, or both sexes).

## **Explanatory notes**

The 1991 Survey of Inmates in State Correctional Facilities was conducted for the Bureau of Justice Statistics by the U.S Bureau of the Census. Through personal interviews during June, July, and August 1991, data were collected on individual characteristics of prison inmates, current offenses and sentences, characteristics of victims, criminal histories, family background, gun possession and use, prior drug and alcohol use and treatment, educational programs and other services provided while in prison, and other personal characteristics. Similar surveys of State prison inmates were conducted in 1974, 1979, and 1986.

## Sample design

The sample for the 1991 survey was selected from a universe of 1,239 State prisons that were enumerated in the 1990 Census of State and Federal Adult Correctional Facilities or had been opened after completion of the census. The sample design was a stratified twostage selection.

In the first stage correctional facilities were separated into two sampling frames: one for prisons with male inmates and one for prisons with female inmates. Prisons holding both sexes were included on both lists. Within each frame, prisons were stratified into eight strata defined by census region (Northeast, Midwest, South, and West) and facility type (confinement and community-based).

All prisons with 1,950 or more men were selected from the male frame, and all prisons with 380 or more women were selected from the female frame. The remaining prisons in the male frame were grouped into strata of approximately 2,600 males and then stratified by security level (maximum, medium, minimum, and unclassified). The remaining prisons in the female frame were also grouped into strata of approximately 574 females. A systematic sample of prisons was then selected within strata on each frame with probabilities proportional to the size of each prison. Overall, a total of 277 prisons were selected.

In the second stage interviewers visited each selected facility and systematically selected a sample of male and female inmates using predetermined procedures. As a result, approximately 1 of every 52 male inmates and 1 of every 11 female inmates were selected. A total of 13,986 interviews were completed, yielding an overall response rate of 93.7%.

Based on the completed interviews, estimates for the entire population were developed using weighting factors derived from the original probability of selection in the sample. These factors were adjusted for variable rates of nonresponse across strata and inmate characteristics. Further adjustments were made to control the survey estimates to midyear 1991 custody counts projected from data obtained in the National Prisoner Statistics series (NPS-1).

# Colorado

Hispanic origin: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

## Delaware

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Some prisoners serve sentences in which the term in prison is partially suspended, to be completed under probation. They were categorized with inmates sentenced to 1 year or more only when the prison portion of their sentences exceeded 12 months. As a result, the population and movement counts of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year are understated, and the population

count of inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentences is overstated.

Parole violators and conditional release violators with new sentences: Include violators with or without new sentences,

Other admissions and releases: Include admissions from and releases to State hospitals, local hospitals and those inmates serving weekend sentences. Other admissions also include inmates who were changed from jail sentences of less than a year to prison sentences of more than 1 year.

# **District of Columbia**

Race: Numbers estimated.

# Florida

Jurisdiction population: Excludes inmates awaiting pickup from jails.

## Hawaii

Category estimates: Jurisdiction and custody totals are actual counts. Admissions, releases, race, and Hispanic origin are estimated from information from Hawaii's Correctional Information System (CIS).

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Some prisoners serve sentences in which the term in

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Include some parole violators without new sentences, and some returned violators with charges pending.

Other admissions and releases: Contain the difference between long-term admission and release movements not reported in other categories. Include transfers and release to/returns from medical furlough, writ appeal, or bond.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Unspecified causes of death: Cause of death not known at time of data collection.

Hispanic origin: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

## indiana

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Jurisdictional population: Excludes 711 male inmates awaiting pickup from local jails.

Conditional release violators with new sentences: Include parole violators with or without new sentences and other conditional release violators without new sentences.

Other unconditional releases: The Parole Board determines the termination of sentences.

Conditional releases, probations: Numbers estimated.

## lowa

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Include persons returned to prison to await a revocation hearing.

### Kansas

New court commitments: Include some prisoners returning from appeal or bond.

Other admissions: Include admissions not categorized at time of data collection.

Other conditional releases: Prisoners under supervision similar to that for parolees.

Unspecified causes of death: Cause of death not known at time of data collection.

Hispanic origin: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

## Kentucky

Other admissions: Prisoners returned to prison by court order. May include some prisoners returning from appeal or bond.

Race: Distinguished as white or black.

Hispanic origin: Not included in Louisiana's data system.

## Maine

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentence: Returns from probation.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Returns from intensive supervision program.

Other conditional releases: Releases to intensive supervision program.

Other releases: Includes releases on detainers and warrants.

# Maryland

Category estimates: The admissions, releases, and population totals are actual counts. Categories for admissions and releases are estimated by applying percentages from automated data to the totals that are made manually. The

automated data count only inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year, while the detailed categories in the manual data include inmates with maximum sentences of 1 year or less.

New court commitments: Include some prisoners returning from appeal or bond.

Unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: Include some releases to probation.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases and some releases to appeal or bond.

Jurisdiction population, inmates with sentences of more than 1 year:
Offenders who are sentenced to local correctional facilities for terms up to 2 1/2 years are excluded from counts of population, admissions, and releases; however, they may be included in reports about the jall population.

Unknown race: Includes Hispanics who are not categorized as any other race.

# Michigan

Population, admissions and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Transfers to and from other jurisdictions: Include transfers to and from mental hospitals, Federal prisons, and prisons in other States.

Returns to/from appeal or bond: Contain the net difference between movements to and from the courts.

#### Minnesota

Parole violators with new sentences: Include other conditional release violators from supervised mandatory releases and work releases with new sentences.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Include other conditional release violators from supervised mandatory releases and work releases without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Include prisoners discharged after the Office of Adult Releases modified their sentences or after a court or executive order. May include some commutations.

Other conditional releases: Work releases.

Hispanic origin: Includes 142 male inmates and 1 female inmate categorized as unknown race.

Custody population unsentenced inmates: Include 23 male inmates held for Minnesota counties and 30 male inmates held for the U.S. Marshal.

# Mississippi

New court commitments: Include some probation violators with and without new sentences.

Other admissions: Include inmates awaiting revocation hearings, some returns from appeal or bond, and data adjustments.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Work releases.

Other releases: Inmates who went back to prison pending a parole revocation hearing that subsequently returned them to community supervision. Also includes some releases to appeal or bond.

Hispanic origin: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

# Missouri

Parole violators with new sentences: Include other conditional release violators returned to prison.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Include some other conditional release violators with no new sentences.

Other admissions: Include returns from AWOL/escape, appeal/bond, and shock probation.

## Montana

New court commitments: Include some probation violators with and without new sentences.

# Nebraska

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Unknown race: Include inmates who did not identify their race.

#### Nevada

New court commitments: Include some returns from appeal or bond.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Hispanic origin: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

# **New Hampshire**

New court commitments: Include some prisoners returned from appeal or bond and may include other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Include parole violators who receive new sentences after readmission to prison.

Other unconditional releases: Include court-ordered releases not specified as conditional or unconditional.

## **New Jersey**

New court commitments: May include some transfers from other jurisdictions and returns from appeal or bond.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Prisoners returned (some with new sentences) from the Intensive Supervision Program, an experimental program operated by the Administrative Office of the Courts.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other conditional releases: Prisoners released to the Intensive Supervision Program.

Other admissions: Include inmates whose admission types were not known at time of data collection.

Other race: Includes Hispanic inmates who are not classified as white or black.

# **New Mexico**

Parole violators only, no new sentences: May include parole violators with additional sentences.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Include returns from community corrections program.

Other conditional releases: Include releases to community corrections program.

Causes of death: Can specify only executions.

## **New York**

New court commitments: Include parole violators and other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Transfers from and to other jurisdictions: Include transfers from and to the Department of Mental Hygiene for psychiatric treatment. Also include some inmates transferred to and from other agencies.

Other admissions: Include 77 men and 4 women returned from conditional parole deportation to custody of the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization Services, as well as 4 men and 18 women returned following erroneous discharge.

Unspecified causes of death: Cause of death not known at time of data collection.

Other releases: Includes 2 men and 23 women for whom type of release was not indicated.

Race and Hispanic origin: Categorized all Hispanic inmates, white and black, as white.

# North Carolina

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Some prisoners serve sentences in which the term in prison is partially suspended, to be completed under probation. They were categorized with inmates sentenced to 1 year or more only when the prison portion of their sentences exceeded 12 months. Although the maximum sentences of all such prisoners were

more than 1 year, nearly all of them were included with those prisoners having sentences of 1 year or less. ## Ohio

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 411 men and 23 women housed in jails solely to ease prison overcrowding.

Hispanic origin: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

## Oregon

Sentencing information: The counts of population, admissions, and releases of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year include some inmates with sentences of a year or less.

Other admissions: Include inmates whose admission types were not known at time of data collection.

Other unconditional releases: Include court-ordered releases.

Other releases: Include 4 men with vacated sentences and types of release were not known at time of data collection.

# Pennsylvania

Other admissions: Include persons returned by the Board of Probation and Parole on their original sentence pending revocation and those committed as technical or convicted parole violators.

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Some prisoners serve sentences in which the term in prison is partially suspended, to be completed under probation. They were categorized with inmates sentenced to 1 year or more only when the prison portion of their sentences exceeded 12 months. As a result, the population and movement counts of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year are understated, and the population count of inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentences is overstated.

Other conditional releases: Include an inmate who went back to prison after an erroneous release to bail and who was subsequently released.

Unspecified causes of death: Include a death by drug overdose.

Total inmate population: Custody and jurisdiction counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Rhode Island.

#### South Carolina

New court commitments: Include some transfers from other jurisdictions.

Other unconditional releases: Include court-ordered releases and offenders who paid fines.

Other conditional releases: Include inmates released to the jurisdiction of the Department of Parole and Community Corrections under the Emergency Powers Act.

#### Tennessee

Sentencing information: The counts of population, admissions, and releases of inmates with sentences of more than 1 year include some inmates with maximum sentences of 1 year or less. As a result, the population and movements of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year are overstated.

Parole violators with new sentences: May include some parole violators with no new sentences.

Other conditional release violators with new sentences: Include some probation and community correction programs violators returned without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Releases to parole: Include some mandatory releases to supervision.

Other conditional releases: Include releases to community correction programs.

Jurisdiction population total: Includes 1,929 men and 89 women housed in local facilities to ease prison crowding. Excludes 2,736 felons sentenced to serve their sentences in local facilities.

Unknown race: Includes all inmates who are not classified as white or black.

Hispanic origin: Tennessee's data system does not distinguish Hispanic origin.

#### Texas

Population, admissions, and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Parole violators with or without new sentences: Texas' data system does not distinguish parole violators with new sentences from those without new sentences.

Other admissions and other releases: Contain the difference between longterm admission and release movements not reported in other categories. Include prisoners returning from or leaving for long-term bench warrants and medical furloughs.

Unspecified causes of death: Include all causes of death other than by execution and those relating to HIV infection.

Other race: Includes inmates of Hispanic origin.

# Utah

Other unconditional release: Include inmates whose sentences were terminated by the Board of Pardons.

Unspecified causes of death: Cause of death not known at time of data collection.

# Vermont

Parole violators with or without new sentences: May include an undetermined number of other conditional release violators returned.

Total inmate population: Custody and jurisdiction counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Vermont. "Lockups" operated by some cities and counties are excluded.

Population and custody counts: Made December 5, 1990.

Race: Numbers estimated, with less than 0.5% of the men classified as non-white.

# Virginia

Other admissions: Include parole revocations pending (both discretionary and mandatory), transfers, and returns from appeal or bond.

Other unconditional releases: Include administrative releases.

Supervised mandatory releases and paroles: Include releases to detainer and transfers to other jurisdictions.

Unspecified causes of death: Cause of death not known at time of data collection.

Other releases: Include an undetermined number of persons who were returned to prison pending revocation of discretionary or mandatory parole, for whom no revocation occurred, who are being returned to parole or other supervised status.

Hispanic origin: Categorized as prisoners of unknown race.

# Washington

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions and releases: Include inmates whose admission and release types were unknown at time of data collection.

Other race: Includes inmates with mixed racial origins.

# West Virginia

Conditional releases, probation: Include some releases to court jurisdiction of inmates declared unfit to remain in a particular minimum security facility.

Other admissions: Include inmates whose admission type was unknown at time of data collection.

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 263 men and 24 women housed in jails solely to ease prison overcrowding.

## Wisconsin

Wisconsin revised the previously reported December 31, 1990, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Other admissions: Include 9 men and 2 women returned to prison following Special Action early releases and 1 man erroneously released.

Other conditional releases: Include Special Action early releases.

Other releases: Include court-ordered releases not specified as conditional or unconditional.

# Wyoming

Population, admissions, and releases counts: Based on custody data.

New court commitments and unconditional releases, expirations: May include a small number of administrative turnovers (starts and expirations of consecutive sentences).

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other releases, men: Include releases to detainer.

Other race: Includes Hispanic prisoners.

Please do not leave any item blank unless required to do so by specific instructions.

## 1. JURISDICTION POPULATION ON JANUARY 1

- a. New court commitments Include all inmates who were admitted with all new sentences, that is, these inmates were not readmitted for any sentences. This category includes probation violators entering prison for the first time on the probated offenses. Do not include parole violators with new sentences as new court commitments.
- b. Parole violators with new sentences Include all parolees returned with new sentences.
- c. Other conditional release violators with new sentences Include all conditional release violators (other than parole violators) returned with new sentences, for example, returns from shock probation, supervised mandatory release, etc.
- d. Parole violators only, no new sentences Include all parolees returned only for formal revocations of parole which were not accompanied by new sentences. If the parole was not formally revoked, that is, the parolee was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.
- e. Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences - Include all conditional release violators (other than parole violators) returned only for formal revocations of conditional release which were not accompanied by new sentences. If the conditional release was not formally revoked, that is, the conditional release violator was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.
- f. Transfers from other jurisdictions Include all inmates transferred from another jurisdiction to the jurisdiction of your State to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the admission if your State does not acquire jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your State.

- g. AWOL returns, with or without new sentences Include all returns from AWOL. AWOL is defined as failure to return from authorized temporary absences such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence.
- h. Escapee returns, with or without new sentences Include all returns from escape. Escape is defined as unlawful departure from a state correctional facility or from the custody of state correctional personnel.
- i. Returns from appeal/bond Include all inmates reinstated to correctional jurisdiction from long-term jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report returns from short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court (that is, where the state retained jurisdiction).
- j. Other admissions Include all other admissions not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these admissions in the "NOTES."

#### 3. YOTAL INMATES HANDLED

This entry should equal the jurisdiction on January 1 (Item 1) plus all 1991 admissions (Items 2a-2k).

## 4. RELEASES

Do not report short-term movements (less than 30 days) where the State has retained jurisdiction, such as to court, to work, study or mercy furloughs.

**Unconditional -** An unconditional release occurs only if the released inmate cannot be reimprisoned for any sentence for which he was in prison.

- a. Expirations of sentence Include all inmates whose maximum court sentences minus credits have been served.
- b. Commutations Include all inmates whose maximum sentences have been changed (lowered) to time served to allow immediate unconditional release.
- c. Other unconditional releases include all other unconditional releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "NOTES."

**Conditional** – A conditional release occurs if the released inmate, upon violating the conditions of his release can be imprisoned again for any of the sentences for which he was in prison.

- d. Probations Include all inmates who have been placed under probation supervision and conditionally released. Include all shock probation releases.
- e. Supervised mandatory releases include all inmates who must, by law, be conditionally released. This type of release may also be called mandatory conditional release.
- Paroles Include all inmates conditionally released to parole. Enter only releases officially entitled "parole."
- g. Other conditional releases include all other conditional releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "NOTES."

- m. Death caused by another person include all inmates whose death was caused accidentally or intentionally by another inmate or prison personnel.
- o. Other deaths Include all other deaths not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these deaths in the "NOTES."
- AWOLS Include all failures to return from an authorized temporary absence such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence
- p. Escapes from confinement include all unlawful departures from a state correctional facility or from the custody of state correctional personnel.
- q. Transfers to other jurisdictions Include all inmates who were transferred from your State's jurisdiction to another jurisdiction to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the release if your State does not relinquish jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your
- r. Releases to appeal/bond Include all inmates released from correctional jurisdiction to long-term jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court where the state correctional system retains jurisdiction.
- s. Other releases include all other releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "NOTES."

## 5. JURISDICTION POPULATION DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates under your State's jurisdiction on December 31, regardless of the location of the inmates. Do not include other jurisdictions' inmates (for example, other states' inmates, pre-trial detainees) merely housed in your prisons.

# 6. CUSTODY POPULATION DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates in your State's **custody**, that is, include inmates your State is housing for other states, or federal or local authorities as well as your own inmates who are physically located in your State facilities on December 31. Do **not** include your State inmates housed outside your State prison facilities.

## 7. PRISON CROWDING DECEMBER 31

- (4) Asian or Pacific Islander A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian Subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
- (5) Other Any other races not covered by the above categories. Please specify the other races in the "NOTES."
- (6) Not known Any inmate whose race is unknown should be included here.

#### 9. ETHNIC ORIGIN

- (1) Hispanic A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
- (2) Not Hispanic A person not covered by the above category.
- (3) Not known Any one whose ethnic origin is unknown should be included here.

## 10. HIV TESTING

- a. Mark "Yes" if any inmates in your custody during calendar year 1991 were tested for the antibody to the Human Immuno Deficiency Virus (HIV) that causes
- b. If "Yes" marked in item 10a, mark one, all or any combination of the categories in item 10b to specify the type(s) of inmates who were tested. For example, all incoming inmates and all inmates who requested it may have been tested in 1991. You would mark categories 1 and 4. If category 4, "certain inmates," is marked, complete item 10c.

Include all inmates who are immune suppressed and have life threatening infections, due to AIDS indicator diseases. indicator diseases
- d. Total HIV Infection/AIDS Cases This is the sum of 11a, 11b, and 11c.

The tables presented in this chapter in past volumes are omitted. The annual parole survey (CJ-7) was not conducted in 1991. Instead, the Bureau of Justice Statistics sponsored the 1991 Probation and Parole Agency Census to collect detailed information on these agencies and the offender population under their supervision. Results from the census will be reported separately.

#### **Explanatory notes**

The statistics reported for capital punishment may differ from data collected by other organizations. The differences occur for a variety of reasons:

- Inmates under sentence of death are originally added to the National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) counts when they enter correctional facilities rather than when judges pronounce sentence.
- Following the year when prisoners are first counted, their admissions or releases as a result of court order are attributed to the year for the sentence or court order. For example, a prisoner sentenced in November 1989 and entering prison custody in January 1990 would be counted as an admission in the 1990 report; the 1991 report would count him or her as being under sentence of death at yearend 1989. Similarly, a prisoner whose sentence is overturned in 1989 but who remains in the count until 1991 when the court's decision is reported would be subtracted from the 1989 and 1990 reports.
- NPS counts of persons under sentence of death are always for the last day of a calendar year and will differ from more recent counts.

Correctional Populations in the United States, 1990, failed to include 20 inmates who either were reported late to the NPS program or were not in the custody of State correctional authorities at yearend 1990: Florida (4), Georgia (2), Illinois (3), Kentucky (1), Louisiana (1), Maryland (1), Nevada (2), Ohio (1), Pennsylvania (1), Tennessee (1), and Texas (3). Thirty inmates had sentences to death removed in 1990 but were not reported: Arizona (4), Florida (12), Georgia (1), Illinois (3), Maryland (3), Mississippi (1), Missouri (1), Ohio (2), Oklahoma (1), and South Carolina (2).

In 1991, five male prisoners of the Armed Forces were under a military death sentence for murder.



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
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
