I. INTRODUCTION

The statistical information in this report has been compiled through a joint effort of the Alabama Department of Youth Services (DYS), the Alabama Juvenile Courts, and the Alabama Department of Human Resources (DHR). The data provides a summary and an analysis of juvenile delinquency and CHINS cases disposed of and reported to DYS by the juvenile courts during the calendar year 1991, as well as abuse, neglect, dependency and special proceedings cases reported to DHR.

Data concerning programs operated by, or licensed by DYS, is also presented. Programs operated by DYS include campuses, group homes, Development and Information center, HIT and CPS programs and the Interstate Compact on Juveniles. Long and short term facilities and programs licensed by DYS include attention homes, group homes, detention centers, and day treatment programs.

Every effort has been made to insure that the data presented in this report is accurate. It is only as accurate as the information provided to the Department of Youth Services by courts and licensed facilities. Continued emphasis is on the importance of accurate and timely reporting for compilation into a cumulative report.

II. METHODOLOGY

The primary method of data collection utilized by the Department of Youth Services to obtain data on cases disposed of by the juvenile courts in Alabama during 1991 was the Juvenile Court Statistical Card. It is the responsibility of each Juvenile Court Judge to maintain records on every case receiving a disposition by the court, whether formal or informal. The most significant data elements appearing on the Juvenile Court Statistical Card include basic demographic information (e.g., county, date of birth, sex, and race) and general case history data: previous law encounters, reason for referral to the court, manner of handling (with or without a court appearance), adjudication and case disposition.

With computers becoming more widely available in the juvenile justice field, some counties have opted to generate their statistical cards from their own computer systems. Seven automated counties, Chambers, Jefferson, Lauderdale, Lee, Mobile, Montgomery and Russell, are now using computer generated statistical cards for reporting their juvenile offenders. Data about the programs licensed by the Department of Youth Services were compiled from monthly population reports submitted by each program. Data on the DYS operated institutional programs and community placement facilities were collected from monthly population reports and child placement cards.

Detailed information is provided by the Diagnostic and Evaluation Center about juveniles who have been committed to the

Department of Youth Services. Data is also provide by the Interstate Compact on Juveniles correspondent about that program.

Information on abuse, neglect, dependent and special proceedings cases is provided for this report by the Alabama Department of Human Resources, Division of Data Analysis and Reporting.

III. JUVENILE COURT STATISTICS Five Year Comparison

Five Years ago in 1987, the Department of Youth Services processed a total of 26,886 delinquency and CHINS cases that were disposed of by the Alabama Juvenile Courts. In 1991 there was a total of 34,543 disposed cases reported. This represents an overall 28.5% increase in reported juvenile crimes in the last five years. (See Figures 1, 7 and 8.)

In addition to comparing actual offenses disposed of in the past five years, a comparison was also done on the rate per 100,000 population for reported offenses. This method of comparison is particularly useful because obtaining the rate of offenses eliminates the population variable. It compares offenses as if all counties had a population of 100,000 persons.

In 1991 the rate of delinquency and CHINS offenses disposed per 100,000 population was 854.9; in 1987 the rate was 640.8. This reflects a percentage increase of 33.4% in the past five years. (See Figure 2.)

DELINQUENCY AND CHINS OFFENSE

The percentage ratio of delinquency and CHINS offenses reported has not shifted significantly in the past five years. In 1987 approximately 75% of the total cases reported involved delinquency offenses, and 25% involved CHINS offenses. In 1991 the ratio was 71.2% of all cases were delinquency offenses and 28.8% of all cases were CHINS offenses.

The number of Violent offenses has increased by 50.0% from 1987 to 1991. Property crimes had a 19.1% increase and Part II

offenses had an increase of 15.4%. Technical offenses had an increase of 29.0%. These increases can be contributed to the overall increase in the total juvenile crime rate.

The number of delinquency offenses has increased 20.9%, from 20,335 cases in 1987 to 24,594 cases in 1991. The number of CHINS offenses has increased 51.9%, from 6,551 cases in 1987 to 9,949 cases in 1991. (See Figures 3 and 5.)

The rate per 100,000 population for delinquency offenses has also increased in the last five years. Again, however, the rate per 100,000 population for CHINS offenses has experienced an overall increase. The rate per 100,000 population for delinquency offenses increased 26.6%, and the rate per 100,000 population for CHINS offenses increased 57.7%. (See Figures 3 and 5.)

CARE PENDING DISPOSITION

Since 1987 there has been a slight decrease in the overall percentage of youth detained overnight compared to those who were not detained. The percentage of youth detained was 17.4% in 1987; in 1991, that percentage was 15.0%. The great majority of youth who were detained overnight were detained in a licensed detention facility. The percentage of all youth detained who were detained overnight in a detention facility has decreased slightly from 12.3% to 11.8% in the last five years.

MANNER OF HANDLING

In the past five years there has been a 34.1% increase in the number of reported cases that were disposed of with a court appearance (formally), and there has been a 19.3% increase in the

number of cases disposed of without a court appearance (informally).

DISPOSITION

As stated above, the number of dispositions that were handled with a court appearance has realized an increase during the past five years. In addition, there has been increases in the number of dispositions involving probation and consent decrees. Since 1987, there has been a 26.3% increase in probation and a 27.2% increase in the number of consent decrees.

Of the total cases reported in 1991, 22.5% were placed on probation. In 1987 this percentage was 22.8%.

Considering that the percentage of cases disposed of without a court appearance has increased between 1987 and 1991, there was a 45.5% increase in the number of cases disposed of by an informal adjustment in that same time period. The percentage of cases involving informal adjustments has increase from 10.1% in 1987 to 11.4% in 1991.

Five Year Comparison



Five Year Comparison



Five Year Comparison



Five Year Comparison



Five Year Comparison




Five Year Comparison




1991 JUVENILE COURT CASES
Summary of Findings

A total of 34,543 juvenile cases were processed by the Department of Youth Services on delinquency and CHINS cases disposed of by the Alabama Juvenile Courts in 1991, a 5.3% increase from the previous year. However, during the past five years the overall increase in reported juvenile court dispositions has been 28.5%.

Of the total dispositions reported to DYS, violent offenses accounted for 8.7%, property offenses 23.0%, part II offenses 34.2% and CHINS offenses 28.8%. The remaining 5.3% were referred for technical offenses such as violation of probation or violation of aftercare. Since some youth are referred to the courts more than once during the year, the 34,543 total cases reported involve a lesser number of youth.

Of the 3,003 violent offenses reported, the great majority (1,957) involved simple assault, while 505 offenses of aggravated assault were reported. In other violent offenses, there were 81 cases of murder, 8 cases of negligent manslaughter, 98 cases of forcible rape, and 354 cases of robbery (both weapon and strong arm).

Property offenses accounted for 7,928 of the offenses, a 13.8% increase over 1990. The most frequent property offense reported was larceny (non-shoplifting) 2,593. In addition, there were 2,287 burglaries, 2,361 larcenies (shoplifting), and 687 motor vehicle thefts.

There was a total of 11,826 cases involving Part II offenses

reported. There were 53 cases of arson, 248 cases of forgery, counterfeiting, fraud and embezzlement, 1,019 cases of buying, receiving or concealing stolen property, 1,570 cases of vandalism, 556 offenses involving weapons charges and 1,967 cases of disorderly conduct. There was a total of 938 drug offenses reported, an increase of 7.9% from last year. Sex offenses, including prostitution and commercial vice and excluding forcible rape, accounted for 180 offenses. Traffic violations for the state accounted for 495 cases and trespassing and game violations accounted for 1,144 cases. Liquor law violations accounted for 1,907 offenses. Liquor law violations include driving under the influence, violation of liquor laws and drunkenness.

CHINS offenses represented 9,949 of the total offenses reported. There were 3,988 cases of truancy reported, 2,291 cases of running away and 3,511 cases of ungovernable behavior/beyond control. The remaining 159 CHINS offenses involved offenses such as violation of curfew.

Technical Offenses accounted for 1,837 of the total cases for the 1991 calendar year. Violation of probation had a total of 1,781 cases reported and violation of aftercare had 56 cases reported for the state.

Of the total cases reported, 35.3% were disposed of without a court appearance, and 64.7% with a court appearance. Of the total cases without a court appearance, 20.1% were lectured and released and 11.4% involved an informal adjustment.

Approximately twenty-five percent (8,858) of the cases

disposed of with a court appearance were to be supervised by a probation officer, and 1.4% (467) were waived to adult court. 19.6 percent (6,764) were dismissed, 8.3% (2,869) involved a consent decree, and 1.4% were fined. 30.3% of the cases involving a court appearance were adjudicated delinquent (10,479) and 5.9% (2,050) were adjudicated CHINS.

Males composed 81.8% of the delinquent cases, but they accounted for 51.2% of the CHINS cases. White males accounted for 36.1% of the delinquency cases, black males 45.2%, white females 8.8% and black females 9.3%. CHINS cases were composed of 29.6% white males, 21.2% black males, 27.9% white females, and 20.7% black females. Approximately 48.5% of the total cases were white and 50.9% were black.

The most frequently occurring age was 16-17 years old, with 40.9% of all referrals (CHINS and delinquency). Other age frequencies for offenses reported in 1991 are as follows in descending order: 14-15 years old (34.6%); 12-13 years old (15.8%); 11 years old and below (6.9%); and 18 years and older (1.8%).

Approximately fifty-one percent of the youths reported had no prior offenses. 51.3% of the males had at least one prior offense, while 42.5 percent of the females had at least one prior offense to the juvenile court.

Approximately 52.8% of all referrals were made by law enforcement agencies, (18,230), 12.3% by the victim, (4,256). 13.4% by parents/relatives, (4,635), and 13.4% by school authorities, (4,622). The remaining 8.1% of the referrals were

made by juvenile probation officers, social agencies, or other courts or sources.

Eighty-five percent of all referrals were not detained over night, 11.8% were held in a detention facility and 3.2% of all referrals were detained in a jail, attention home/shelter care or in protective custody/shelter care.

Juvenile Court Dispositions



V. REFERRAL DATA BY POPULATION
A. COUNTIES WITH OVER 100,000 POPULATION

Counties with over 100,000 persons are considered "urbanized areas" by the Bureau of the Census. Alabama has seven such counties, and these were chosen for close analysis because of their large populations. The counties are Calhoun, Jefferson, Madison, Mobile, Montgomery, Morgan and Tuscaloosa (See Table 13).

The rate per 100,000 population provides a uniform basis for comparing one county to another. It is a standard unit of measurement used by the Federal Bureau of Investigation as a basis for comparing the number of crimes reported in a particular area to the number of persons residing in that area. For example, Montgomery County's present population is approximately 209,100, the number of juvenile court referrals disposed of (delinquent and CHINS offenses only) during 1991 was 2,044; therefore, Montgomery County's rate of referrals disposed of is 977.52 per 100,000 population.

Calhoun County, which comprises 2.87% of the state's total population, accounts for 3.50% of the total court dispositions but it is rated tenth out of the 67 counties with a rate of referrals disposed of at 1,043.10 per 100,000 population (an increase of 20.76% from 1990).

Approximately 16.12% of the state's population is located in Jefferson County, and it represents 15.91% of the total juvenile court referrals, with a rate of referrals disposed of per 100,000 of 843.44 which is an increase of 12.8% over the 1990 rate of

747.66

Madison County has 5.91% of the total population, represents 4.61% of the total juvenile court referrals, and has a rate per 100,000 of 667.22, a 1.1% decrease from 1990.

Of these seven counties, Mobile represents 9.37% of the state's population which is slightly more than half of Jefferson County's population, but note that Mobile County contributes 19.17% of the total juvenile court dispositions, which is higher than Jefferson County's percentage of referrals, and its rate per 100,000 (1,748.81) is more than double that of Jefferson County. In fact, Mobile County has the highest rate per 100,000 population of any county in the state.

Montgomery and Madison County are very close in population (each accounting for over 5.0% of the states's population). This year, their percentage of juvenile court referrals disposed was 5.92% and 4.61% respectively. Montgomery County experienced a decrease in its rate per 100,000 to 977.52 and Madison County's rate per 100,000 also decreased to 667.22.

Morgan County is the seventh largest county with 2.47% of the population. They were ranked 42nd in the state per 100,00 with a rate of 556.00. The county deals with 1.68% of the total juvenile court dispositions.

Tuscaloosa County was ranked nineteenth in the state for referral per 100,000 with 838.54 (a 5.69% increase from 1990), and it comprises 3.72% of the state's population.

In summary, Jefferson County is the most populous of the seven counties with over 100,000 population, and has the fourth

lowest rate per 100,000 of juvenile court referrals disposed. Mobile County (the second largest county of the seven) has the highest rate of referrals per 100,000, of the counties with over 100,000 population, with 1,748.81. It is also the highest ranked per 100,000 of all the counties in the state and it also has the largest number of juvenile cases reported.

Four of the most populous counties (Jefferson, Mobile, Tuscaloosa, and Calhoun) realized an increase in their percentage of the state's juvenile court referrals disposed of from 1990, while three counties (Montgomery, Madison, and Morgan) realized a decrease.

There were increases in the rates per 100,000 population for all Alabama counties with over 100,000 population except for two counties (Madison and Montgomery). Montgomery County's rate per 100,000 decreased 17.78% from 1990, Madison County's rate per 100,000 decreased 1.12%. Four of the other five counties with over 100,000 realized a significant increase in the rate per 100,000 population during 1991, while Morgan County realized a small increase in the rate per 100,000 population.

As stated above, the 1991 population report is taken from the latest census count. The previous year's population figures have been estimates taken from the center of Business and Economic Research at the University of Alabama.

REFERRALS PER 100,000 POPULATION FOR ALL COUNTIES*

The rate of referrals disposed of per 100,000 population ranges from 1,748.81 in Mobile County to 46.39 in Tallapoosa County (See Tables 14 through 21). The state as a whole has a rate of 854.90, the rates per 100,000 population for the state as well as for the individual counties are slightly higher in 1991 in comparison to the previous year primarily due to the fact that Alabama experienced an increase in the number of reported delinquency and CHINS offenses with dispositions. There are 16 counties with juvenile court disposition rates higher than the state as a whole, and 57 counties with lower rates.

There were four counties that changed among the ten counties with the highest referrals per 100,000 population in 1991. The counties of Baldwin, Calhoun, Monroe and Talladega replaced the counties of Blount, Butler, Chambers and Montgomery in the top ten, of the remaining 6 counties, Barbour, Dale, Greene and Mobile increased their standings, and Franklin and Houston decreased their standings from the previous year. The ten counties with the highest rate of referral per 100,000 are:



B. SCREENING AND PLACEMENT

In October, 1991, the Department of Youth Services began implementation of a decentralized system of intake. The Office of Screening and Placement serves as the receiving center for all referrals to the Department. Documents and reports provided by the local courts are utilized by the Screening and Placement Committee to make an initial classification of each youth committed to the agency. Information such as the child's risk/needs assessment, social evaluation, delinquency record, academic records, and other available information are utilized in the classification process. The Screening and Placement Committee, made up of the Executive Director, Administrator of Screening and Placement, and the School District Counseling Administrator meet weekly to make initial placement and classification decisions. Once determined, the committing courts are notified as to which DYS facility to refer the child to for orientation and evaluation.

There were 1,026 juveniles committed to the Department of Youth Services in the 1991 calendar year.

Males made up 88.6% of these commitments and females comprised 11.4% of the commitments. White males accounted for 25.2% of the assessments, black males 63.0%, white females for 4.8% and black females for 6.6%. The most frequent occurring ages were 16 and 17 years old, with 55.9% of the total commitments.

The seven most populated counties, Jefferson, Mobile,

Montgomery, Madison, Tuscaloosa, Calhoun and Morgan accounted for 466 (45.4%) of all youth sent to the DYS system in 1991.

The five most common offense committed by the youth that were placed in the DYS system, for 1991, were: Theft of Property with 222 offenses or 21.64%, Burglary with 130 offenses or 12.67%, Violation of Probation with 111 offenses or 10.82%, Assault with 97 offenses or 9.45%, and Drug Offenses with 66 offenses or 6.43%. These five offenses accounted for 61.0% of all commitment crimes.

Fourteen Year Comparison



VIII. INTERSTATE COMPACT ON JUVENILES

The Interstate Compact on Juveniles is the legal vehicle for cooperation between states on juvenile delinquency supervision and the return of runaway youths.

It is the legal mechanism for returning delinquent youths who have run away from other states and have been apprehended by authorities in Alabama and is also responsible for arranging for the return from other states of Alabama runaways.

In 1991, there were 240 runaways handled through the interstate Compact on Juveniles representing a 6.67% increase over the previous year. One hundred and nine (45.4%) were runaways from Alabama who went to other states (an 11.2% increase from 1990), and 131 (54.6%) were runaways from other states who were apprehended in Alabama (a 3.1% increase from 1990).

Alabama's border states (Tennessee, Georgia, Florida and Mississippi) received 46.8% of the runaways from Alabama. Texas received 11.9% of Alabama runaways. The four border states concurrently provided Alabama with 35.9% of its out-of-state runaways. 38.2% of the out-of-state runaways were detained in Alabama's six most populous counties (Calhoun, Jefferson, Madison, Mobile, Montgomery and Tuscaloosa).

Of the 240 runaways handled in 1991, 93 (38.8%) were female and 147 (61.2%) were male. The average age for Alabama runaways was 16.4 years old while the average age for out-of-state runaways was 16.2 years old.

The Interstate Compact on Juveniles is also responsible for arranging placement for supervision with other states of

delinquent juveniles, provided they are eligible for probation or parole. During 1991, a total of 298 placements were approved, an overall increase of 6.4%. There were 161 out-of-state youths placed in Alabama (a 7.3% increase) and 137 Alabama youths placed in other states (a 5.4% increase).

ALABAMA DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES
A. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

A total of 4,586 cases of abuse, neglect, dependency and special proceedings were disposed of by the 39 juvenile courts that reported during 1991.

The 4,586 cases disposed of represented 297 cases of abuse, 1,260 cases of neglect, 2,256 dependency cases, and 773 special proceedings cases*. Eighty-four percent of the cases were disposed of with a court appearance and almost sixteen percent without a court appearance.

In forty-two percent of the cases, the children were placed in the custody of a relative, and in twenty-three percent, custody of the children was awarded to the Department of Human Resources. Fourteen percent of the cases were dismissed.

Boys accounted for forty-eight percent while girls were fifty-two percent of the cases disposed of. White youths accounted for 47 percent of the cases and black youths accounted for 52 percent.

Children in 37 percent of the cases were brought to the attention of the court by parents, guardians, or relatives. Social agencies referred the children in 51 percent of the cases.

In twenty-eight percent of the cases the youth received protective custody, shelter, attention home, or other care pending disposition of their cases.
