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## SUMMARY

The main purpose of this study was to examine the length of criminal careers of criminal offenders. Through the use of a maximum-likelihood method, the investigators estimated the average rate at which certain groups of offenders terminate their criminal activities. The study also sought to find out the differences in termination rates across selected offender attributes.

The data analyzed in this study were derived from official Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) records of 21,004 offenders who were arrested in the Detroit SMSA during the period 1974 to 1977 for the criterion offenses of murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary or auto theft. The criminal history of each offender was constructed from arrest records from age 17 through the end of the study observation period in 1982. The history data includes information on arrest charges, disposition of the arrest, court action and sentences, and custody arrangements.

### Purpose of the Study

Information on the length of time that offenders are criminally active and the attributes of these offenders are important for the planning of crime related services, such as the demand for prison space. However, the lengths of criminal careers are particularly difficult to measure since the beginnings and endings of criminal activities are not directly observable. Arrests are usually the only evidence of an active career, and the termination of the career is inferred from a lack of arrests over some period of time. But then, a lack of arrest does not necessarily mean cessation of criminal involvement: there are offenders who are criminally active but who remain free of arrest. Neither does a rearrest completely rule out the possibility of the termination of an offender's criminal career: a group of recidivists may include individuals who have terminated their offending careers soon after the recidivist events. These considerations led the investigators to develop a measure of criminal career termination based on the assumption that the shorter are the observed intervals between arrests, the more likely is a long arrest-free period indicative of termination of an offender's criminal career. Corollary to this, observations of long intervals between arrests increase the likelihood that an offender is still criminally active despite the lack of arrests.

The purpose of the study was to measure the termination rates of the sample offenders and to relate these rates to a variety of attributes such as age, race, frequency of previous arrests, and crime type. The data address the following questions:

1. Are offenders who previously have been criminally active longer also more likely to sustain future criminal behavior than those with shorter prior careers?
2. What are the personal attributes of individual offenders who have a more enduring criminal career as differentiated from those who terminate offending quickly?
3. Does the nature of prior criminal record (e.g., offense type and number) distinguish offenders by their termination rates?

## Methods

### *Study Design*

This study made use of available FBI data on the officially recorded offending history (criminal careers) of adult individuals who were arrested in the Detroit SMSA for certain offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary or auto theft) during the period January 1974 to December 1977. The individual's arrest history before and after the target arrest (the offender's first arrest for one of these offenses in the Detroit SMSA during 1974 to 1977) consisted of data on the arrest event, a list of offenses charged at the arrest, the final disposition of the arrest (whether convicted or not), the terms of the corresponding sentence, and custody arrangements, if any. Each offender's history included arrests from the age 17 (the age of adult jurisdiction in Michigan) through the end of the observation period in June 1982.

The data on the criminal histories of the sample of offenders were analyzed to determine the lengths of criminal careers and how they varied across offender attributes. Maximum-likelihood methods were used to estimate career length. The basic data used in the estimation were observations of the intervals between arrests, together with variables measuring race, age, sex, and type of crime charged at each arrest.

### *Sources of Information*

Data were collected from the computerized criminal history file maintained by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The FBI file is a central, national depository of all arrest records in several states.

### *Sample*

The sample consists of official records of adult individuals, aged 17 years and over, who were arrested at least once for the criterion offense of murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary or auto theft during the period January 1, 1974 to December 31, 1977 in the Detroit SMSA. Records from the FBI file pertaining to these individuals' criminal histories (arrest charges, court actions and custody arrangements) were studied from their first arrests at the age of 17 and all their other subsequent arrests up until the end of the study observation period in June, 1982. The full dataset includes 123,535 arrest records for 21,004 individuals and consists of data on arrests, arrest charges, court action, and custody arrangements. The data file also includes demographic information about the sample: sex, race, place of birth, and date of birth.

### *Response Rates*

A report on the response rates is not applicable since the investigators used secondary sources of data, the computerized criminal history file maintained by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

### *Dates of Data Collection*

While the sample was defined in terms of arrests from 1974 through 1977, the arrest history data span times as early as 1926 (depending on the arrestee's age) and as late as 1982.

## Summary of Contents

### *Description of Variables*

There are two types of records in this hierarchical file. The first and higher level record pertains to the individual and contains seven variables describing the person. The second level record pertains to the arrest and contains 53 variables describing the arrest and subsequent court proceedings.

The first record type includes the following demographic attributes: (1) birth month; (2) birth year; (3) birth place; (4) sex; and (5) race.

The second record type contains variables that describe a complete cycle of events related to an arrest: dates, charges, court actions, sentences, and custody arrangements for every arrest incident for each individual offender. This record is repeated for as many arrest events as are recorded for an offender from age 17 to the year 1982. All individuals in the sample have been arrested at least once. Therefore there is at least one arrest record following each person record.

The arrest segment of the data record includes the following variables: (1) the month of the arrest; (2) the year of the arrest; (3) the county of arrest; (4) the arrest charges (up to three charges per arrest); and (5) the disposition of the arrest (up to three dispositions per arrest).

The variables contained in the court action segment of the record are: (1) the court disposition month; (2) the court disposition year; (3) offense type charged in court; (4) court disposition (e.g., convicted, dismissed, acquitted); (5) minimum suspended sentence; (6) maximum suspended sentence; (7) minimum confinement sentence; (8) maximum confinement sentence; (9) minimum probation sentence; (10) maximum probation sentence; (11) fine; and (12) other court sentences. These variables were repeated twice for two possible court actions. Sentence data are completed only for the applicable sentence types resulting from an arrest; all other sentence types are left blank.

The custody status segment of the record describes the individual's admission to and release from correctional custody associated with the arrest. The variables are: (1) the month custody took place; (2) the year the custody took place; and (3) the supervision status of the subject. These variables were repeated up to five times for five possible custody supervision events for each arrest.

Because not every arrest is followed by a complete cycle of court actions, much of the arrest record may be inapplicable to a specific arrest incident.

In sum, there is a record for each arrest. On each record are data for up to three arrest charges, up to two court actions and up to five custody arrangements.

A complete listing of the variables is shown in Appendix A of this guide.

### *Presence of Common Scales*

None.

### *Unit of Observation*

The data file is organized as a hierarchical file composed of two record types.

The unit of observation for Record Type 1 is the individual offender. The unit of observation for Record Type 2 is the arrest incident.

## Geographic Coverage

The collected data pertain to criterion arrests for murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, or auto theft made in the Detroit Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA) during the period January 1974 to December 1977 (the first arrest of this type is called the target arrest). Arrest events before and after the target arrest may have occurred anywhere in the United States.

## Evaluation

### *Data Quality*

As indicated in the Data Completeness and Consistency Report (pp 11 to 14), checks for internal consistency and out-of-range and missing values suggested that the data are relatively free of detectable coding errors for Record Type 1 of the data file.

For Record Type 2, checks for internal consistency revealed that the data are relatively free of detectable coding errors. Out-of-range values checks showed that there are cases (less than 1%) with out of range values in six out of the total 53 variables. Furthermore, checks of missing values showed that 45 variables had missing values on over 40 percent of the total number of cases. Many of these missing values may actually be data that are not applicable or are not reported in the original data source. It is important to note that an offender may or may not go through the complete judicial system process, and as such, no record of such events will appear in the offender's file. However, codes were not provided in the study that will distinguish between not recorded, not applicable, or missing data. For the purpose of this guide, all of these data types were reported as missing.

Consistency checks could not be done on the data because there are no skip-patterns or logical relations among the variables that permit such checks.

### *Data Limitations*

Since the Detroit SMSA was chosen as the focal point of the study, generalizations of the findings to other areas in the United States may not be warranted.

This study relied exclusively on the data supplied by the FBI criminal history file. Thus, the validity of the criminal career termination rates that were produced using these data rests upon the validity of the FBI criminal history file.

The data file does not contain the estimated career length measures developed by the investigators. Only the raw data on which these estimates were based are included.

#### RECORD TYPES

There are two types of records in this hierarchical file. The first and higher level record pertains to the individual and contains variables describing the person. The second level record pertains to the arrest and contains variables describing the arrest and subsequent court proceedings.

Record Type 2 may actually be designated by a 2 or a 3 on the data file. Records 2 and 3 are similar in content and structure except that Record 3 pertains to an individual's first arrest in the Detroit SMSA for murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, or auto theft during the period 1974 to 1977: this arrest was the basis for including the individual in the study data. Record 2 contains data for all other arrests.
