

Note from the Director

This report analyzes the number and type of cases sentenced under the federal guideline system in the U.S. and Texas between 1989 and 1993. Data were provided by the U.S. Sentencing Commission. The federal government has jurisdiction over offenses specified in the United States Code (USC), offenses committed on federal lands or on American Indian reservations. Offenders that commit federal offenses after November 1, 1987 are sentenced under a mandatory sentencing guideline system that became effective on that date. In 1993 approximately 90% of all cases in the federal judicial system nationwide and almost all cases in Texas were sentenced under the guideline system.

In 1993 there were 118,919 state convictions and 53,607 state cases sentenced to prison compared to 4,149 and 3,525 respectively for the federal judicial system in Texas. Federal cases represented 3.4% of all state and federal cases convicted in the state and 6.2% of all state and federal cases sentenced to prison in Texas. The average federal prison sentence was 65 months compared to 117 months for state offenders. A federal offender with an average prison sentence will serve eleven months longer in prison than a state offender with an average prison sentence.

The number of offenders sentenced to prison in Texas by the federal government has not been a significant factor in the reduction of the state's Index Crime rate (Index Crimes are reported crimes used in calculating the state's crime rate). The Index Crime rate in Texas has decreased every year since 1989, with an overall reduction of 19% from 1989 to 1993. The number of offenders sentenced to prison by the federal government in Texas represents too small of a proportion of the total number of offenders sentenced to prison in the state for federal sentences to have a significant impact on the crime rate. Moreover, more than half of the federal cases in Texas were convictions for drug and immigration offenses. These offenses are not counted as Index Crimes.

The Index Crimes are Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft and Motor Vehicle Theft. The Index Crimes are the offenses used by the Texas Department of Public Safety in calculating the state's crime rate. Therefore, due to the low number of federal convictions in relation to state convictions and due to the fact that most federal convictions in the state were not for Index Crimes, it is reasonable to say that activities by the federal judicial system in Texas cannot be a significant factor contributing to the reduction of the state's crime rate. The federal judicial system and other federally funded initiatives, however, are important elements assisting the state in the areas of prevention and drug law enforcement.

Overview of the Federal Sentencing System

Jurisdiction

- ♦ The federal government has jurisdiction over offenses specified in the United States Code (USC), offenses committed on federal lands or on American Indian reservations.
- ◆ Examples of federal offenses punishable under the USC are immigration offenses, bank robbery, postal crimes, embezzlement of federal funds, tax evasion and organized crime, among others.

Sentencing Guidelines

- ◆ The USSC was created under the sentencing reform provisions of the Comprehensive Crime Control Act of 1984 (Sentencing Reform Act) (Pub. L. No. 98-473), and was organized in October 1985 as an independent agency in the judicial branch of the federal government.
- ◆ The United States Sentencing Commission (USSC) is primarily responsible for the development and dissemination of policies and practices in the form of sentencing guidelines used by the federal courts in the sentencing of offenders convicted of federal crimes.
- ◆ The USSC submitted to the U.S. Congress its original sentencing suidelines in April, 1987.
- ♦ The guidelines became effective in November 1987.
- ◆ The guidelines are only applicable to offenses committed on or after November 1, 1987.
- Sentences are imposed based on where the offender falls on a "grid" of penalties that consider factors related to the severity of the offense and prior criminal history.
- The system abolished parole and required offenders sentenced to prison to serve a minimum of 50% of their sentence before release.
- ◆ The constitutionality of the federal sentencing guideline system was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court in Mistretta v. United States (January, 1989).

Definitions of Terms

Cases: each case received by the United States Sentencing Commission (USSC) involves a single sentencing event for a single defendant. Multiple counts and multiple indictments are considered a single sentencing event if sentenced at the same time by the same judge. A single defendant may appear more than once if involved in more than one sentencing event. Multiple defendants in a single sentencing event are each counted as a separate case. Note that the number of cases for gender, race and number of cases sentenced to prison or probation differ from the total number of cases received by the USSC due to the exclusion of cases with missing data on gender, race, age, or sentencing.

Probation: this category includes cases that are listed by the USSC as "other cases" - cases that received a suspended prison term, economic sanctions only, or supervised release only.


Other (under race category): this racial category includes Native American, Alaskan Native and Asian or Pacific Islander origin.

Property crimes: larceny, embezzlement, fraud and counterfeiting.


Drug crimes: drug trafficking, use of a communication facility and simple possession.

Other crimes: firearms violations, auto theft, bribery, tax offenses, money laundering, burglary/breaking and entry, murder, manslaughter, kidnapping / hostage, assault, arson, sexual abuse, extortion / racketeering, gambling/lottery, civil rights, pornography, prostitution, offenses in prisons, administration of justice (e.g., commission of an offense while on release), environmental / fish and wildlife, national defense, antitrust, food and drug (e.g., tampering with products), and other miscellaneous offenses.


Cases Sentenced under Federal Sentencing Guidelines, 1989-1993




- ◆ The number of cases sentenced in the U.S. under the federal sentencing guidelines increased 99% over the five year period.
- ♦ In 1993 well over 90% of all cases sentenced in the U.S. were sentenced under the guideline system.
- ◆ Texas, California, Florida, Illinois and New York accounted for 38.4% of all cases sentenced under federal guidelines in the U.S. in 1993, with Texas comprising 10% of all cases in the U.S.



Federal Cases Represent a Small Percentage of All Felony Convictions in Texas






The Federal Judiciary in Texas Implemented the Sentencing Guideline System Faster than Other States

- ♦ The federal judiciary in Texas implemented the guideline system more quickly than other states, where there were more operational challenges raised in the early years of implementation.
- ♦ The number of cases in California, Florida, Illinois and New York slowly increased through 1993.
- ◆ In Texas the number of cases increased significantly in 1990 and then stabilized and decreased slightly through 1993.
 - The decrease in cases sentenced under the guidelines was mostly due to policy changes related to the sentencing of drug offenders.
 - ✓ The federal District Attorney raised the threshold concerning the amount of drugs that have to be involved in a drug offense for the case to be prosecuted as a federal case, thus displacing a significant number of drug cases to the state courts.

Most Cases Sentenced under Federal Sentencing Guidelines in Texas were Sentenced to Prison




 More than half of all federal cases sentenced to prison in Texas are for drug and immigration offenses

Most Offenders Sentenced in Texas under Federal Sentencing Guidelines are Hispanic



- ♦ In the U.S., Whites represented the largest group of offenders sentenced from 1989 to 1993 (45%), followed by Blacks (28%) and then Hispanics (24%).
 - ✓ In Texas, Hispanics comprised the largest group sentenced (56%) during the five years, followed by Whites (29%) and Blacks (14%).
 - ✓ The higher percentages of Hispanics sentenced in Texas can be explained by the higher proportion of Hispanic offenders involved in drug and immigration cases.

The Federal Judiciary in Texas Sentenced Offenders to Prison at a Higher Rate than the National Average




 In 1993, Texas sentenced a higher proportion of cases to prison for all offense types, except for immigration cases.

The Average Federal Prison Sentence in Texas was Lower than the National Average



- ◆ Sentence length is affected by various factors, such as the guideline sentence for the particular offense and the offender's prior criminal history.
- ◆ The average sentence in 1993 for offenders admitted to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice - Institutional Division was 117 months.

 - √ 79% of the state's federal drug cases were in the Western and Southern districts in 1993.

- ◆ East Texas imposed the longest average sentence to prison, with 78 months, followed closely by North Texas with 77 months.
 - ✓ The average sentence length for Texas as a whole in 1993 was 65 months.
- ◆ Sentence length is affected by various factors, such as the guideline sentence for the particular offense and the offender's prior criminal history.
