# PRELIMINARY ANNUAL REPORT CRIME IN NORTH CAROLINA 1994

The number of Crime Index offenses reported by North Carolina law enforcement agencies during 1994 increased 1 percent over 1993. Crime in suburban areas of North Carolina increased 1 percent, while crime in the rural areas went up 1 percent.

Collectively the number of violent Index offenses (murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault) decreased 2 percent statewide. Individually, murder and robbery both dropped 4 percent, rape went down 2 percent and aggravated assault decreased 1 percent.

Property crime (burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft) as a group increased 2 percent across the state. While burglary decreased 1 percent, larceny went up 3 percent and motor vehicle theft rose 7 percent. Arson, a property crime not included with the other Index offenses, jumped 21 percent.

The number of juveniles under the age of 18 arrested for Crime Index offenses increased 7 percent over 1994, compared to a 4 percent decrease in adults 18 and over arrested. Youths arrested under 18 for violent crime increased 3 percent, with adult arrests dropping 6 percent. The number of property crime arrests for juveniles under the age of 18 jumped 7 percent, while adult arrests for all property crimes decreased 2 percent.

The number of North Carolina law enforcement officers assaulted increased 1 percent over 1993. Two law enforcement officers were feloniously killed in 1994, compared to four that were killed in 1993.







## Juveniles Arrested for Violent Crime<sup>2</sup>


**Cumulative Changes Since 1984** 


