THE DIRECTORY is presented for general information and guidance. Every effort has been made to assure accuracy but the Association cannot assume responsibility beyond the point of using the information supplied in response to the questionnaires submitted to departments and institutions. Therefore, wherever omissions are noted it is due to the fact that the information was not available or could not be obtained.

Occasionally local conditions differ to alter the meaning of certain terms used. For example, the questionnaire solicited information relative to the type of inmates confined, as follows: "Is your population made up of felons . . . misdemeanants . . . others (specify) . . ." The intent of the use of the word felons was purely legal to the extent that a felon is ordinarily one convicted of a major crime while a misdemeanor is ordinarily one convicted of a minor crime. This information appears as "Population: Felons, misdemeanants, etc."

The heading "Age limits" indicates the statutory minimum and maximum commitment age limits, as reported through the questionnaire.

Figures in parentheses in telephone numbers indicate the Area Code.

†This symbol indicates up-dated information was not received.

Again we have identified those institutions and agencies which have institutional memberships in the ACA and those facilities conducting work release programs.

Part time parole board members are identified by P.T.; full-time by F.T.

Included again is a listing of city and county short term institutions with a capacity of 100 or more. It may not be complete. Information includes minimum age and sentence limitations.

At the 102nd Congress of Correction, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, August 24, 1972, a new constitution was approved which includes representation of official bodies from all phases of corrections. For the first time, in this edition special effort has been made to increase the number of juvenile institutions listed.

Credit for the compilation, editing and proofing of this Directory is due to Mrs. Rhodella Nicholson, secretary in the ACA Office. She has exercised every effort to assure complete and accurate information.

We again heartily thank all of those who complied with our request for information to make available a directory that is in wide demand and highly valued by those actively engaged in the various branches of crime study and treatment.

IMPRISONMENT

Every person sent to prison is first received in the local prison serving the court from which he has been committed. Whether he subsequently serves all his sentence in the local prison or is sent to another institution depends largely upon his age, the length and nature of his sentence, and his personal history and character. At the local prison the convicted prisoners who are not transferred are kept apart from the prisoners who are awaiting trial or sentence. Civil prisoners are also kept separate. There and elsewhere the first offender is as far as practicable separated from the recidivist; young prisoners are segregated from adults.

As many convicted prisoners as possible, particularly those serving long sentences, are removed from local prisons to training prisons which provide different categories of security and control and a variety of treatment and training facilities. Each prison has some sick bay accommodation and some closed prisons have special facilities for surgical, medical and psychiatric treatment or observation. In most the regime is based on constructive practical work or vocational training supplemented by further education and recreational activities.

ENGLAND

Prisoners with the lowest security rating are accommodated in open prisons, which have no physical barrier to prevent absconding and have an atmosphere more conducive to the rehabilitation of the offender.

Prisons for men are administered in four regional groups, each containing a wide range of establishments. There are too few women in custody for their establishments to be administered on a fully regional basis and Holloway Prison, which is being redeveloped as a medically orientated establishment, serves as the main institution in the women's service.

A prisoner sentenced to a term of more than one month is eligible for release after serving two thirds of his sentence, subject to good conduct. If he is serving a determinate sentence of imprisonment he may be considered for early release on license after serving one-third of his sentence or one year, whichever is the later. This early release, or parole, may be granted only if it is recommended by the Parole Board, which is an independent body.

BORSTALS

Young offenders aged 15 and under 21 convicted of an offense punishable with imprisonment may, if the court so decides, be sentenced to borstal training. These offenders are sent to an allocation centre and after study by specialist staff are allocated to the training borstal best suited to their character and requirements.

The period of training, the emphasis in which is on remedial and educational treatment, is between six months and two years depending upon the offenders response. This is followed by a period of supervision by the probation and after-care service lasting for up to two years.

DETENTION

Young offenders between the ages of fourteen and twenty-one years may be sent to a detention centre. There are two types of centre—junior centres for offenders of fourteen and under seventeen years of age, and senior centres for those aged seventeen and under twenty-one. The regimes place emphasis on high standards of effort combined with individual guidance from members of the staff.

The normal period of detention is three months, but there is power to award up to six months in exceptional cases. Offenders sentenced to detention are now eligible, subject to good conduct, for remission of one-third of the period of the order.
