

INTRODUCTION

This report is a description and an objective display of pertinent jail and court data concerning administrative District 14; which consists of Harney and Malheur Counties in the State of Oregon. The base year for the study is 1972. The report shows the type of jail data collected.

Through mutual agreement with the Southeastern Oregon Law Enforcement Planning Agency (District 14), the State Feasibility Study supervised the collection of data from the police records and prepared this report from those raw data.

The study is designed to assist the local people in studying their present system and work with them through a planning process toward a comprehensive, regional system of services to local correctional clients, in keeping with the most current concepts in corrections.

The Corrections Task Force of the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice reported in 1967 that more than nine-tenths of the persons arraigned each year on criminal offenses are charged with misdemeanors. In spite of this fact, the Task Force pointed out that services for misdemeanor offenders are more fragmented, more scanty and even more poorly funded than services for felons. The Commission made recommendations for change in two areas -- misdemeanor programs and organization and administration of misdemeanor services.

Among the programs they endorsed are: (1) increased community treatment and pretrial release (work or education); (2) increased diversion of "status" offenders (drunks, vagrants) and nonserious offenders (minor traffic violators) from jails; (3) better and quicker classification and diagnosis, and referral of misdemeanants to community treatment resources; (4) wider use of transitional programs; (5) more rehabilitative programs in local jails; and (6) less reliance on fines without regard for ability to pay. Organizational and administrative changes recommended by the Commission included: (1) divorcing operation of the jail from law enforcement functions; (2) integration of misdemeanor corrections, parole and probation in a single administrative unit; (3) creation of state-wide jail and probation standards; (4) state subsidies for misdemeanor probation programs; (5) better pay and training for misdemeanor correctional officers; and (6) regionalization of misdemeanor institutions.

Following that line of thinking, the LEAA has laid down a series of guidelines for those who would use federal moneys for jail remodeling or new construction. Briefly, the guidelines require that all possibilities for utilizing alternatives to incarceration be exploited, as well as consideration for other guidelines.

It is anticipated that this report is only the first step in the process of planning and implementing important improvements in the correctional services on a local level.


Correctional Feasibility Study

The Correctional Feasibility Study, funded by an LEAA block grant, began in 1970 as a pilot project to develop urban and rural regional correctional system models for Oregon. Although its scope has since expanded to provide planning assistance to 34 of the State's 36 counties, the Study's philosophy and process remain centered on local involvement in the planning process and community correctional programs for the misdemeanor.

To encourage rational regional planning, the Governor of Oregon has divided the State into fourteen administrative districts, which comprise one to five counties. Many of the administrative districts contain Councils of Governments (COGS) which have responsibility for coordinating land use and service planning for the district.

At the invitation of the local law enforcement planning agencies, the Feasibility Study staff will enter a district and begin its three-phase process. Firstly, pertinent baseline data are collected. Sources of these data are jail booking ledgers and files. Data are collected on each jail booking for a sample period, usually one year.

The Study's second phase focuses on local participation in analysis of the baseline information, identification of problems in the criminal justice system and selection of ways to deal with those problems. The Study staff provides staff support and consultants to the local planning groups during this process, and prepares a report summarizing the



There are four jails in District 14. The Harney County Jail is at Burns; the Malheur County Jail at Vale; and Municipal jails at Ontario and Nyssa in Malheur County.

There are 114 miles between Burns and Vale. The distance from Ontario to Baker City is 72 miles and 70 miles from Burns to John Day.



DATA SOURCES

Data collected deal with people who moved through the criminal justice system from the point of booking in District 14 during 1972. Following are major data sources used for this report and an explanation of sources not used.

Jail Bookings Data

The primary sources of data for this study are the booking ledgers and files of the four jails in the District.

BACKGROUND DATA

Population

The two counties in District 14 showed a three percent increase in population from 1960 to 1970 for a total of 876 additional people. During that ten-year period, Malheur County grew by 405 to a 1970 total of 23,169 people and Harney County added 471 people for a total of 7,215 by 1970.

The 1972 report, prepared by the Center of Population Research and Census at Portland State University (estimates), showed Malheur County with 23,380, an increase of 211 since 1970, and Harney County with 6,900, a decrease of 315.

In Harney County, Burns City (3,290) and Hines City (1,415) have the largest populations, (1971 figures from Portland State University).

In Malheur County, cities with the largest populations are Ontario (6,950), Nyssa (2,650), Vale (1,650), Jordan Valley (200), and Juntura (55). Population amounts were taken from the 1971 U. S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census. Estimates of incorporated cities were prepared by the Center for Population Research and Census, Portland State University, July 1, 1971.¹

Geography

The City of Burns is the county seat of Harney County and Vale is the seat of Malheur County. The two counties are similar in square mileage with Harney County consisting of 10,132 square miles and Malheur County including 9,925 square miles. Malheur County forms the southeastern corner of Oregon. Harney County lies adjacent to the west side of Malheur County. Both counties' southern borders lie on the Nevada State boundary.

Industry

Both counties are known for their livestock raising and agricultural industries. Harney County is also a lumbering area. Malheur County is a food-processing area (row crops).

Court System

Thirteen courts exist in District 14 as follows:

Enforcement

Two Sheriffs' Departments and five municipal law enforcement agencies have responsibility for enforcement with staff strength as follows:

The Oregon State Corrections Division has one probation and parole officer in this area. His responsibility includes District 14 and Grant County in District 12.

The District has four jail facilities within its boundaries, including Harney County Jail, Malheur County Jail, Ontario City Jail and Nyssa City Jail. Their individual bed capacities are as follows:

Following is an objective look at each jail's physical layout and a description of services.

Harney County Jail

The single-story jail structure stands alone behind the Courthouse. It has been used since 1962. Prisoners are admitted through the secure front door which is electrically controlled at the booking-dispatch area. Inside the front door, the prisoner is processed at the booking window and then passes through a second electrically-controlled door to the jail area.

Directly across from the booking area is the drunk tank with barred front. This tank has no plumbing or bunks. Next to the drunk tank, and at the opposite end of the jail from the juvenile-female section, is the six-bunk male dormitory. It has a front door made of bars and crossed metal slats. Plumbing consists of a washbasin, commode, but no shower. Also across from the booking area is a solid metal door leading to a small storage area which may be used as an isolation cell.

Separated from the remainder of the jail area, and next to the centralized booking area, is a separate section for females or juveniles. This section consists of three two-bunk cells, each with commode, washbasin, and barred front door. There is a shower and a large dayroom space.

A similar section exists at the rear of the jail for adult males, except it has four cells. Behind the drunk tank is a deepfreeze and storage room. Adjacent to the jail entrance area is a small room divided by a window. Visitors are admitted through the front door of the jail, then

directly into the visiting room. Prisoners enter the visiting room directly from the jail sally port area.

Communication is by telephone during visiting periods. Next to the visiting area is a closet and beyond that is the jailer's apartment.

There is a sound monitoring system throughout this building. Three meals a day are prepared in the jailer's apartment and his wife is the matron.

For medical emergencies, the county medical doctor or any other doctor may be called; however, the county hospital is but three blocks distant.

Malheur County Jail

The two-story, brick Malheur County Courthouse was constructed during 1958 and the County Jail in 1964. On the first floor, leading from the public corridor through a metal, electrically-controlled door is the entrance section of the jail. This door has a small window for observation. Prisoners are brought in through this way, past the barred window of the office, past a clothing storage room, to the prisoner-intake room. This room has a solid metal door with a small window in it, and a shower. Next door is a plumbing corridor, then a medical room.

Across this entrance section, from the prisoner-intake room, is a visiting room, identification room, attorneys' room and the fingerprinting room.

There is a two-way mirror between the identification room and the attorneys' room, with the mirror side in the attorneys' room.

A barred door separates this whole receiving area from the actual jailing portion. Beyond this door is the prisoners' side of the visiting room; conversation is by telephone through the windows.

Toward the front of the jail area is the male-juvenile section which consists of five individual cells; four cells each have a commode, washbasin, and shower; the fifth is a segregation cell with just a commode and washbasin. Also in this section is a large day room with a commode, washbasin, and large table. The separated female-juvenile section of the jail is a large four-bunk room with one shower, commode, and washbasin.

The adult female section is also a large four-bunk room with one shower, commode, and washbasin. It also has a segregation cell, with a commode and washbasin, and a stripped cell (for drunks) that has no plumbing.

Adult males are housed either in the five-cell (two bunks each) felon tank or the sixteen-bunk misdemeanor dormitory. The walls of both tanks are barred construction. The felon area has commodes and washbasins in each cell, as well as a set in the dayroom area. One shower serves this tank. The misdemeanor dormitory has two toilets, two commodes, and one shower.

Separate from the other areas are individual cells: one isolation cell for mentals, one isolation cell for general purpose and a drunk tank. The general purpose isolation cell has a commode and washbasin.

A solid metal door leading to the trustee dormitory has a window in it. There are eight bunks, one commode, one washbasin and one shower.

The trustees, under the supervision of jail personnel, cook three meals daily and do the laundry.

Most medical problems must be taken to a hospital or doctor's office. The County Health Clinic is used whenever possible; the County Medical Examiner will come to the jail once a month. Prolonged mental problems of any prisoner would likely cause his transfer to the hospital in Pendleton, with that hospital providing the transportation.

There is no exercise area in the jail. State work releasees occasionally are housed and a few local weekenders.

Twenty-four hour supervision is provided by a man and wife who have an apartment behind the jail office. Relief supervision comes in three nights a week and weekends.

Nyssa City Jail

This three-story City Hall, constructed in 1938 of brick, houses a jail on the basement floor. Inside the City Hall front door and down the

immediate stairway, is a hallway which leads to a storage room, public restroom, furnace room and in the rear, an exit with a door constructed of wood with inside metal lining. Along the other side of this hallway is a one-bunk female cell with washbasin and commode, which has a wooden door over a barred door. Between that cell and the three male cells is the booking and dispatch room with a wooden door. A heavy security screen has been installed in the hallway between the female cell, booking room, and male cell area. The screen can be locked from either side, allowing officer to control any problem that might arise.

The male jailing area has a solid metal door leading from the hallway into three, two-bunk cells. Each cell has a window, barred on the inside and heavily screened on the outside. There are doors on the cells which lead to a walkway in front of all three cells which contain a commode and washbasin.

Supervision consists of 24-hour periodic checks. Smoke detection equipment is installed in male and female cells. There is a nearby medical clinic for medical emergencies. Three restaurant meals per day are served for working prisoners and two meals per day for nonworking prisoners.

Ontario City Jail

Behind the City Hall are two small concrete block buildings, each housing separate jail areas. They date back to the 1920's. Through the metal door of the larger building is a walkway extending along the front of a four-bunk cell. The doorway to the cell is barred and the cell itself has a commode, washbasin and shower. There is a barred window leading

to the outside. There is also a window leading from the entrance area to the outside front.

The other jailing structure has an outside, solid metal door leading to a barred entrance area. Inside the jail area is a two-cell, free-standing jail section. Each of these two cells has four bunks and a barred front. The dayroom area in front of the two cells contains a commode, washbasin and shower. There is one window leading from the free-standing area which is heavily screened on the inside and constructed of reinforced glass.

There are heat-sensitive devices which serve as fire alarms.

The dispatcher provides 24-hour supervision. There is a matron on duty, usually 24 hours a day, depending on shifts.

Two restaurant meals are served daily. The medical hospital is four blocks distant.

Visiting is conducted in the afternoon with the visitors conversing through the bars.

On April 2, 1973, the Ontario City Council unanimously approved the recommendation that the city no longer use its jail as a local correctional facility, but that it be used only as a lockup, for temporary detention. This action followed the recommendation of the Malheur County Court Grand Jury that the Ontario City Jail be used only for emergencies. Consequently, all

prisoners requiring detention or imprisonment of more than eight hours are transferred to the county jail in Vale. The Ontario City Police Department assumes responsibility for transporting prisoners with the cooperation of the Malheur County Sheriff's office and the Oregon State Police.

JAIL POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

Before these data are followed from initial booking through to final disposition, a frame of reference will be presented by describing the total jail population as to the: arresting agency by jail, court of immediate jurisdiction, age, sex, race, residence, and offense.

Table 1 displays the total bookings (1,564) by jail. Ontario City Jail processed most (41%) of the district's bookings, with 634 of 1,564.

Table 1 also lists jail bookings by arresting agency. The Ontario City Police are shown as making 36% (566) of the arrests resulting in District 14 bookings during 1972. The Oregon State Police was the arresting agency for 27% (420) of the total bookings.

Table 2 breaks down each jail's population according to age and sex. Juveniles represent 13% of the total population. Those eighteen to twenty years of age are 19% (303) of the total. Approximately 68%, or 1,065, of the total bookings are under thirty-six years of age with 12% (132) being female. The number of unknown ages should be considered when comparing any part of the total. The female portion of each total is indicated in parentheses. Normally, jail populations are considered in the total and the secondary question is, "How many of those are women?" That is the reason for condensing the Table's breakdown in the manner which it is presented throughout this Findings report.

Table 3 compares District 14 with the other Oregon Planning Districts. Page 8 presents the Oregon State Map with each of the districts outlined. Table 3 reveals that District 14 books a sum of people equal to 5% (52 per 1,000) of its total population. The relative number of juvenile bookings is near the mean of other districts. Drunk-related bookings show a lower percentage, due possibly to the new drunk-arrest law initiated July 1, 1972. However, District 14 reveals a higher percentage of alcohol-related bookings (37%) than the other districts but an average percentage for drunk and alcohol-related bookings.

Table 4 defines the District's population by race and sex. The Table shows that 29% (453) of the total bookings were of the Mexican descent, compared to 61% (957) Caucasian bookings.

Table 5 shows comparison of districts concerning race of persons booked.

Table 6 shows that the majority (58%) of District 14's bookings are people residing within the two-county area. The data reveal that 32% (498) of the total bookings (1,564) were non-Oregon residents, possibly accounting for the high percentage of arrests by the Oregon State Police. Malheur County and Ontario City accounted for 80% (398) of these out-of-state bookings, again the factor possibly being the highway traffic near and through the area of Ontario of out-of-state residents.

Table 7 shows that District 14 has the highest percentage of out-of-state residents (32% of bookings) and the lowest percentage (8% of bookings) of in-state (non-District) residents.

Table 8 lists the offense categories of those people booked into District 14 jails during the year 1972. Table 8 is concerned with the offenses by jail and by sex. It shows 77% (72) of the drug offenders were booked in the county jails and 71% (98) of the traffic lodgings were at Ontario City. The drunk drivers were booked by Ontario City (35%), Nyssa City (11%), Malheur County (31%) and Harney County (23%). Ontario City booked 70% of the MIP bookings.

Ontario City booked 48% (289) of the total 597 alcohol-related bookings, being 38% of total offenses or bookings (1,564). The total bookings for misdemeanor offenses was 1,054 (67%).

JAIL POPULATION

Daily Jail Population

Tables 9 through 12 contain complete daily population figures for each jail: daily population, total prisoners in per month, total prisoners out per month, highest count on any one day, lowest count on any one day and the average daily population for each month of 1972. Any person staying in jail, whether twenty-four minutes or twenty-four hours, is counted as having been in jail one day.

The data indicate that the month of June was the high population month for the jails in Malheur County with April being the month with the highest average daily population in Harney County. Low population month for Malheur County Jail and Ontario City Jail was January, while December was low population month for Nyssa City Jail. Harney County Jail had its lowest daily jail population in November.

The average daily adult population for Malheur County was 18.9.

Tables 13 through 16 examine each of the four individual jails in terms of their daily population with pretrial and sentenced length of stay. (Note: refer to Tables 9 through 12 for complete information on daily jail population.)

Malheur County Jail (Table 13)

The highest monthly population of pretrial inmates for this jail was May (477) showing a daily average of 15.4%. The month of July indicated the highest length of stay for sentenced inmates with 482, an average of 15.6%.

Table 13 shows a close comparison between the annual daily average jail population of pretrial (9.3%) and the annual daily average jail population of sentenced (9.4%). According to these findings, on most any day of the year, you could find this number doing time in pretrial or sentenced; that is this jail, on the average, was used 282.3 days in 1972 for pretrial inmates and 286.3 days for sentenced inmates. Of course, it should be understood that pretrial and sentenced length of stay do overlap, showing the jail could be consistently in use, either pretrial, sentenced or both. (This same deduction and evaluation should be followed in Tables 13 through 16.)

Harney County Jail (Table 14)

The high pretrial month for this jail was April with 203 (6.77%). April was also high for sentenced population with 115 (3.83%).

Ontario City Jail (Table 15)

In this jail, June was the highest month with 122 (4.1%). June showed 92 in sentenced population, (3.1%).

Nyssa City Jail (Table 16)

June was the high month for pretrial detention with 33 (1.1%). June was also the high month for sentenced people with 60 (2.0%).

PRETRIAL ACTIONS

Pretrial actions in this section are described by court of initial jurisdiction, by jail and by age. The amounts of bail for those initially released on bail and for those jailed in lieu of bail are also listed.

Table 17 indicates, through Pretrial Action by Court, that most (384 or 25%) are jailed in lieu of bail. Figures reveal that 297 (19%) were released on bail but 78 (5%) of the total pretrial cases were released on their own recognizance. Unknown Court Jurisdiction occurred because jail records do not normally record the court of jurisdiction for cases dropped at arraignment, for bail forfeited cases or ROR "skips".

Table 18 breaks down the pretrial dispositions by jail. Ontario City showed 634 (41%) pretrial actions with 190 of those cases being released to other jurisdictions and 139 being jailed in lieu of bail. Malheur County showed action in 30% (471) with the highest percentage of that number (27%) being released to the immigration authorities.

Table 19 breaks down pretrial actions by age groupings. Ages 18-20 showed the highest number of cases (303), 19% of 1,564. Again, jail in lieu of bail revealed the most often pretrial action in this age grouping, 102 of 303 (34%). Second was 86 of 303 (28%) released on bail.

Table 20 shows the amounts of bail for those initially released on bail court. The bail amount of \$106-\$350 is the most prevalent (37% or 105). The Justice Court shows high in this range of posted bail (72) with the Municipal Court high in the \$51-\$105 area, showing 88% (66) of the total 75.

Table 21 shows the amount of bail posted by the arresting agencies. Of the 35% who posted bail in the \$106-\$350 range, the Oregon State Police showed the higher percentage of bookings with 58% (61) of the total 105, with bookings being approximately equal for both counties. These data could possibly relate to drunk driving and traffic arrests. Of the 75 that posted bail in the \$51-\$105 range, Ontario City showed the highest number of cases, with 40 or 53%.

Table 22 breaks down the amount of bail by court and the number of bookings which were jailed in lieu of this bail. The unknown factor with 224 (58%) of the total 384 cases indicates information was not available for the data collectors in police records. The Municipal Court showed the high percentage of 60% jailed in lieu of bail with 232 of 384.

Table 24 lists the lengths of pretrial detention, in days, by the jail of detention. Looking at the District as a whole, 85% (1,334) of the pre-trial detainees stayed in jail three days or less. The Malheur County Jail is unlike the other jails in that about 33% served four days or more pre-trial time in jail, 10% of those spent ten to thirty-six days, with 5% (25) spending thirty-seven or more days in pretrial detention.

COURT DISPOSITIONS

Table 25 displays final court dispositions by court. Fines account for 28% of all dispositions; 14% were jailed. The Justice Courts handled 30% (463) of the 1,564 bookings. The Municipal Courts handled 27% (418) of the total bookings. (Note carefully the footnotes on Table 21.)

Table 26 lists the amounts of fines by court. The \$201+ fine was most often used (40% of the time) and primarily by the Justice Courts. The \$51-\$199 fine was also used often (38% of the time) and the Municipal Courts accounted for most of these, 122 of 254, or 48%. The Justice and Municipal Courts levied 88% of the fines (390 of 442).

Table 27 displays the length of jail sentences in days, by jail. Malheur County housed 43% of the District's jail-sentenced prisoners (106 of 248) and 96% (102) of those served six days or more. Serving six to twenty days were 40% (98) of the sentenced population.
