

ANNUAL REPORT

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council and the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners of the City of Rockford, Illinois.

Gentlemen:

I hereby submit to your Honorable Body my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1974, giving the number of arrests made, a list of various violations, crimes and offenses committed, social conditions of prisoners, dispositions of prisoners, accident investigation summary, report of stolen property, miscellaneous work, department expenditures for the year, and other summaries.

The total number of arrests made and citations issued for the year was 33,063 for the following crimes and offenses which represents a decrease of 3,628 arrests over 1973:



COMMUNICATIONS

The year 1974 held several accomplishments for the Communications Division. This division has had a continuing trend toward professionalism. Several communications officers are taking or have completed extension courses leading toward electronics certificates in the electronics field. This will strengthen the learning program for all radiomen on this department.

The radio repeater system has been installed and is in use greatly enhancing our effectiveness.

The HEAR system was put into effect in 1974 enabling our white cars and ambulances to talk directly to the three city hospitals with no interruption to the main base channel during their often lengthy conversations.

Chief Communications Officer Anthony DiGiovanni attended the National APCO Conference in California. He brought back some ideas which he hopes to utilize in the future police radio networks he will be working with. Tony was appointed as the Interim Project Director for communications in the Public Safety Building now under construction. He has been in charge of planning and administering use of federal grants for the joint Communications Center.

Senior Communications Officer Bob LaMay attended the annual LEADS conference in Springfield. He brought back numerous transitional ideas he will be using in the future. A lot of insight was gained from other agencies attending that conference as to what problems were shared with whom and how they might be best corrected. This was an extremely valuable conference that was shared with other radiomen upon his return to Rockford.

The year of 1975 is expected to bring us several more benefits. It is expected the new Centrex Phone system will be operational in mid-March and will help alleviate some of the delay in the phone system. A new CRT teletype terminal with a digital display and a 3000 word per minute capability is expected to be installed in April. This may have some funding attached with it for a small period of time.

## YOUTH AND COMMUNITY SERVICES DIVISION

In 1974 the Youth and Community Services Division was commanded by a Lieutenant and staffed by two Sergeants, fifteen officers, and one clerk-typist. The personnel of this division are dedicated to establishing and maintaining communication and cooperation between the police department and school administrators, teachers, parents, students, other youths, various social agencies, and the people of Rockford in general, toward a common goal of crime prevention.

In 1974 officers of this division investigated 2,644 assigned complaints and were able to resolve 2,106 of these complaints representing a clearance rate of 80% of the cases assigned. 299 juveniles were referred to the Juvenile Court, 537 juveniles were counseled and released into the custody of their parents, and 167 juveniles were referred to other agencies. 815 juveniles were charged as juvenile delinquents and 101 adults were arrested for juvenile related offenses.

Cases referred to this division reflected a property loss of \$13,725.00 due to loss, theft, or destruction. These officers were instrumental in the recovery of property valued at \$55,605.00 during their investigations.

The Community Relations Section of this division was very active in 1974. The functions of this section are to actively strive for the highest degree of cooperation possible between the residents of the city and the police department. These officers attempted to accomplish this obligation by promoting understanding of the police tasks among the citizens of the city, by seeking information on police related community problems, by explaining the police role in the community, and by reporting deficiencies or needs in the law enforcement services to the department administration.

Considerable effort was expended by the Community Relations Section in crime prevention activities. 10,000 place mats with a crime prevention theme were donated by local businesses and distributed to restaurants. Business survey forms were distributed to shopping strips and centers throughout the city. These were useful to educate the business owners and to assist the department in the development of crime prevention programs. Numerous appearances were made before business people, social agencies, and other law enforcement officers to teach crime prevention methods. During 1974, 1,500 persons became new members in the Check-mate program. Requests were processed to check 1,021 homes while their owners were on vacation and 286 persons participated in the ride-along program. 82 tours were conducted of the headquarters building for 1,432 students and 255 adults. 75 presentations were made before various citizen groups discussing home security, self defense, shoplifting, and other topics of community concern.

The Department is certain that the Community Relations Section has been successful in helping in establishing a better relationship with the community in 1974.

The Youth Safety Officers made 967 visits to classrooms appearing before 23,000 school children. During these meetings with children they discussed the duties of a police officer, pedestrian safety, bicycle safety, child molester prevention, railroad safety, safety in the home, and safety patrol instruction. During 1974 these officers also met with 72 special groups to discuss safety oriented topics and drug education. There were 2,590 adults and students in attendance. The youth safety officers also supervise the adult school crossing guards and spend considerable volunteer time working with the Police Explorer Post.

During the summer months when school was not in session the Youth Safety Officers conducted bicycle safety programs with approximately 600 children.

For the fourth consecutive year, the Youth and Community Services Division sponsored the Myte Mite Baseball tournament. The tournament is for boys 8 to 10 years old and was attended by 2,200 people. Sixteen teams participated. The Youth Division uses the proceeds from the baseball tournament to sponsor four basketball teams for age groups of 7 to 10 years, 11 to 12 years, 13 to 14 years, and 15 to 16 years.

## TRAINING AND PERSONNEL DIVISION

The authorized strength of the Rockford Police Department in 1974 was 271 sworn officers. We started the year with 269 officers and ended the year with 258. There were 4 retirements, 7 resignations, and 2 officers were dismissed. One officer was hired and one of the officers who resigned was re-hired. The other positions could not be filled because we did not have an eligibility list of qualified applicants.

In 1974 we recruited candidates and started the screening process for new officers. We contacted 708 candidates by mail and had some walk-in applications. 352 people actually picked up applications and 256 persons returned them. 221 persons appeared to take the written examination and 111 of these passed. 98 candidates appeared to take the physical agility test and 81 of these passed. Background investigations were conducted for these 81 candidates and the reports were forwarded to the Fire and Police Commission.

1974 was a year of accomplishment in the area of officer training and education. In addition to in-service training seminars, all officers received some type of training. Discounting roll call and weapons training, members of the department receive a total of 15,490 classroom hours of training for an average of 59 hours per officer. Much of this training for sworn officers was conducted by the Police Training Institute, University of Illinois. Their programs are designed to blend information about police skills and human behavior and thus provide the student with better tools to serve his community. Another major training facility utilized by the department is the Northwestern University Traffic Institute (NUTI). NUTI is a national organization serving public agencies in all levels of government. The institute works to help members with managerial, supervisory, and technical skills of personnel in agencies

operating and managing the highway transportation and criminal justice systems. Two other well known schools utilized for training were the Southern Police Institute, University of Louisville, Louisville, Kentucky, and the FBI National Academy, Quantico, Virginia. Both of these schools are highly respected and offer college accredited courses. One officer attended each. Both programs deal with the theoretical and practical aspect of law enforcement.

The Illinois Department of Transportation awarded the Rockford Police Department a grant of \$13,264.31 which allowed us to contract with NUTI to conduct two 80 hour field accident investigation courses at Rockford Police Headquarters. 34 Rockford officers attended these courses with several officers from other departments in the region.

All department personnel below the rank of Lieutenant are required to attend firearms practice monthly from March to November. This training was conducted and supervised by this division.

For the first time in 1974 the State of Illinois education incentive program went into effect. This program pays officers with 30 or more police related college credits a lump sum of \$200.00 annually. 32 of our personnel were able to take advantage of this in 1974. This program should be of considerable aid in encouraging officers to further their formal education.

The Auxiliary Police Unit is supervised and trained by this division. 104 classroom hours of training was conducted for members of this unit. The members of the Auxiliary Police Unit contributed 2,582 man hours of service to the City during 1974.

All members of the department receive the I.A.C.P. Training Key and all Personnel the rank of Sergeant or above receive the Illinois Law Enforcement Officers Law Bulletin. This division also produces a monthly Training Bulletin and News Letter that goes to all personnel.

Members of this division have also been involved in a training program for the Police Explorer Post and have assisted other police agencies with training. We have been advisors in police curriculum planning and in college level police science courses and police training films. We have also conducted programs for various service clubs and civic groups.

#### EXPENDITURES FOR 1974

In 1974 \$5,109,152.00 was appropriated for the Police Department budget. Of this amount \$5,059,155.67 was spent and \$31,077.16 encumbered leaving a balance of \$18,919.17.
