

#### INTRODUCTION

The data derived from the preparation of this special report were obtained from the Juvenile Court Statistical Report, DSS-R&S-60. In North Carolina the county director of social services served as chief juvenile probation officer for 66 counties by virtue of General Statute 110-21. In 27 counties where the district court district had a county with a population of 84,000 or more, the chief district judge and the Administrative .

Officer of the Courts appointed a chief counselor and assistants to provide investigative, supervisory and other related services (General Statute 7A-134). In 7 counties where family counselor services were not available the chief district court judge designated persons other than government employees to act as juvenile probation officers (General Statute 110-23-1).

Although there are 100 counties in North Carolina, only 76 counties reported delinquent, undisciplined behavior, neglect, and dependency cases during 1972. One county reported cases for two months, eight counties reported only those cases referred to the County Department of Social Services and five counties reported only delinquency and undisciplined cases.

The incomplete data was the result of a non-mandatory reporting system in North Carolina, a non-uniform system of reporting and an insufficient number of staff members to maintain the necessary information. Therefore, the data in this report cannot be indicative of the actual number of cases that appeared before juvenile courts during the calendar year 1972. The reader should note that the unit of count is case, not children, and that a child may have been referred more than once during 1972.

### SELECTED CONCEPTS DEFINED

#### Child

A child is defined as "any minor under 16 years of age, and any minor 16 years of age and upward as to whom the court is exercising jurisdiction acquired before his attainment of that age" (Administrative Office of Courts, 1970).

## Delinquent Behavior

Delinquent behavior is any behavior that constitutes a criminal offense under State law and under an ordinance of local government, including violation of the motor vehicle laws, or behavior that violates the condition of his probation (Administrative Office of the Courts, 1970).

#### Undisciplined Child

An undisciplined child "includes any child who: (1) is unlawfully absent from school, or (2) is regularly disobedient to his parents or guardian or custodian and beyond their control, or (3) is regularly found in places where it is unlawful for a child to be, or (4) has run away from home" (Administrative Office of the Courts, 1970).

Running away

Truancy

Violation of curfew

Ungovernable behavior

Possessing or drinking liquor

#### Neglected Child

A neglected child "is any child who: (1) does not receive proper care or supervision or discipline from his parent, guardian, custodian or other person acting as a parent, or (2) is not provided necessary medical care or other remedial care recognized under State law, or (3) lives in an environment injurious to his welfare, or (4) has been placed for care or adoption in violation of laws" (Administrative Office of the Courts, 1970).

#### Dependent Child

A dependent child is defined as a child "who is in need of placement, special care or treatment because such child has no parent, guardian or custodian to be responsible for his supervision or care, or whose parent, guardian or custodian is unable to provide for his supervision or care" (Administrative Office of the Courts, 1970).

#### Disposition

Disposition of a court case refers to what was actually done or to what was intended to be done, rather than to the formal wording of the court order. For example, if a child was to be committed to a public institution for delinquents, but during the course of the action it was decided to suspend the commitment with the intention that the child be supervised by a probation officer, the child would be counted as "probation officer to supervise."

#### Family Income

The approximate annual income of the juvenile's family, as estimated by the worker who completed the Juvenile Court Statistical card, is considered to be Family Income.

#### JUVENILE CASES REFERRED TO COURTS: 1972

A total of 9,317 cases were reported to the North Carolina Division of Social Services during 1972. This total represents a decrease of 316 cases from the year 1971. This decrease is reflected in the decline in the number of counties and district courts who reported juvenile court cases to the Reports and Program Analysis Branch of the North Carolina Division of Social Services and the non-mandatory reporting system in North Carolina.

#### Delinquency and Undisciplined Cases

Table I summarizes the number of times a juvenile offender appeared in court on a new referral during 1972. Of the total 7,122 delinquent and undisciplined behavior cases, 83.9% were heard in court once and 16.1% appeared two or more times. There were 2,330 juveniles referred to court during 1972 on a new referral of delinquency or undisciplined behavior who had appeared in court prior to 1972. This figure is significant in that it shows 32.7% of the total number of children (7,122) were repeated offenders. Of the 7,122 delinquent and undisciplined behavior cases, 1340 or 18.6% were involved in more than one offense. Truancy was the primary reason for referral accounting for 15.6% of all juveniles heard on two or more offenses in juvenile court. (Table C-2). Of the 7,122 juveniles who appeared in juvenile court on delinquency and undisciplined referrals, 2,886 or 40.5% were

of the black race. However, of the 200 children involved in a violation of conditional release there were 125 or 62.5% of the black race.

In 51.4% of the juvenile court cases heard, juveniles were living in a home with one or both parents present. It is significant to note that of the 456 youths who were living in a home with a step-parent present there were 386 or 84.7% more referrals when the child was living in a home with the mother and step-father as opposed to the 70 youths or 15.3% who lived with the father and step-mother.

# Delinquency Cases

During 1972, 5,084 delinquency cases were reported to the Reports and Program Analysis Branch. This is a decrease of 108 cases from the year 1971. No attempt will be made to interpret the decrease due to the incompleteness of reporting. However, a useful and meaningful comparison of the ratio of delinquency cases to undisciplined behavior cases during the two years can be made. In 1971 the ratio of reported delinquency cases to be reported undisciplined behavior cases was 2.11 to 1.00. During 1972 the ratio increased to 2.49 to 1.00. The increase may be indicative of the rise in juvenile delinquents as "repeaters", the increased use of drugs, and the upsurge of larcenous acts committed in North Carolina by juveniles, whereas the juveniles involved in an act of undisciplined behavior may have used means other than court procedures (such as social agencies and school officials) to dispose of the problems. Almost three-quarters (71.1%) of the total number of referrals (7,122) were

for juvenile delinquency which was an increase of 3.5% over 1971, (67.9%). It was observed that male delinquents outnumbered females 4.5 to 1.00, and whites were shown to have 7.7 more cases in this category than blacks.

### Disposition of Delinquency Cases

In almost 87% of the cases the complaints were substantiated. In 13.1% of the delinquent cases were either waived to criminal court or proved not to be involved. (See Table E)

Presented in Table 2 is a percentage distribution of the delinquency cases by type disposition.

In over 15% of the cases, the youths were committed to public institutions for delinquents and 41% of the cases a probation officer was designated to supervise.

## Undisciplined Behavior Cases

A total of 2,038 cases were reported during 1972 for undisciplined behavior. This is a decrease of 421 cases from the number reported during 1971. Females very nearly equaled the males in frequency of referrals and whites were observed to show 17.2% more cases than blacks.

Truancy accounted for almost 53% of the undisciplined behavior cases and was the most frequent reason for referral for both boys and girls. It was noted that there was a 4% increase in the percentage rate in truancy between 1971 and 1972.

# Disposition of Undisciplined Behavior Cases

In 96.5% of the reported cases of undisciplined behavior, the complaint was substantiated with 88.4% of these cases having no transfer of custody. Only 2.7% of the juveniles involved in undisciplined behavior problems were sent to a public institution for delinquents. Juveniles shown in this category were proven to have had a prior court record. Presented in Table 3 is a percentage distribution of the undisciplined behavior cases by type of disposition.

#### NEGLECT AND DEPENDENCY

During the year 1972 County Departments of Social Services and Juvenile Courts reported 1,411 neglect cases and 784 dependency cases.

In comparison to 1971 there was a decrease of 83 neglect referrals and an increase of 299 (61.6%) referrals in dependency cases. Available data as shown on the DSS-R&S-60, Juvenile Court Report suggested that many juveniles were reported to be dependent rather than neglected children. On further examination of these reports through the Protective Services Program Supervisor of the Division of Social Services and county social workers, this office was able to validate the following information. The removal of a child from the home on a dependency petition rather than a neglect petition was judicially less complicated. The separation of child from parent proves to be more socially and psychologically beneficial when removal comes about "without a finding of parental fault" (dependency) as opposed to "with parental fault" (neglect). Therefore, it is possible to assume that the dramatic increase in dependency referrals and decrease in neglect referrals may have been effected by an adjudication made in the childs' best interests.

#### JUVENILE COURT CASES: 1973

Effective September 1, 1973 the General Assembly (House Bill 1358) authorized the Administrative Office of the Courts to be responsible for all probation and after-care services for delinquent and undisciplined behavior cases heard in juvenile courts throughout the State. As a result of this legislature the Report and Program Analysis Branch of the Division of Social Services no longer has responsibility for the Statistical reporting of these cases. Therefore, the following tables reflect only the first eight months of 1973 and no attempt is being made to analyze the data.

In 1973 there were 72 counties reporting all juvenile court cases.

One county reported for one month. One county reported for two months,
four counties reporting, only cases referred to the County Department
of Social Services and five counties reporting neglected and dependent
children only.

For the first seven months of 1973 there were 5,449 cases reported to the Report and Program Analysis Branch. This compares with 5,649 reported cases for the first seven months of 1972.

The decline of 200 cases is reflected in the number of counties reporting in 1973 as opposed to 1972. The following table shows the breakdown by type of case and percentages' distribution on juvenile court cases reported to the North Carolina Division of Social Services during the first seven months of 1972 and 1973

The decrease of 130 (15.3%) neglect cases in comparison to the increase of 101 (22.9%) dependency cases can again be noted for the first seven months of 1972 and 1973. (See Neglect and Dependency Cases 1972).
