

## Introduction

This report by the Secretary of State for Scotland on the statistics relating to police apprehensions and criminal proceedings for the year 1974 is laid before Parliament in accordance with the requirements of section 47 of the Police (Scotland) Act 1967.

### Crimes and offences made known to the police

1. The total number of crimes and offences made known to the police in 1974 was 538,791, an increase of 33,092 or 6.5 per cent. compared with 1973. The number of crimes made known increased by 14.4 per cent. from 158,015 to 192,233 and the number of offences increased by 2.6 per cent. from 337,684 to 346,558.
2. Of all crimes made known to the police in 1974, 48.0 per cent. were committed in the four counties of cities, a decrease of .9 per cent. compared with 1973. The number of crimes per thousand of population was 56.8 in the four counties of cities (49.9 in 1973); and 27.8 in the rest of Scotland (covered by sixteen county or joint police areas) (24.1 in 1973).

#### Crimes against the person (Class I)

3. Crimes against the person made known decreased by 399 or 4.7 per cent. to 8,081; those with violence rose by 168 or 4.7 per cent. to 3,765, those without violence fell by 567 or 11.6 per cent. to 4,316.

#### Crimes against property (Class II, III and IV)

4. The total number of crimes against property made known increased by 24,925 from 153,729 to 178,654 (16.2 per cent.); the figure for housebreakings rose by 11,064 from 63,853 to 74,917 (17.3 per cent.); thefts rose by 11,049 from 71,983 to 83,032 (15.3 per cent.); and malicious injuries to property rose in number from 6,737 to 8,532 (26.6 per cent.).

#### Forgery and crimes against currency (Class V)

5. The number of cases of forgery and crimes against currency made known fell by 135 from 1,613 to 1,478 (8.4 per cent.).

#### Other crimes (Class VI)

6. Other crimes made known fell by 173 from 4,193 to 4,020 (4.1 per cent.).

*Chart A on page 7 illustrates the trend in the period 1960-1974 and shows the main types of crime separately and in relation to the total.*

### Miscellaneous offences (Class VII)

7. The number of offences made known to the police increased by 8,874 to 346,558 (2.6 per cent.). The number of contraventions of the Road Traffic Acts reported (other than cases involving drink or drugs) increased by 5,021 to 151,568 (3.4 per cent.) and those involving drink or drugs by 498 to 14,028 (3.7 per cent.).

The number of reported incidents of breach of the peace increased by 3,856 to 7,0056 (5.8 per cent.) while cases described as drunk and incapable rose in number by 1,542 to 18,896 (8.9 per cent.). Taking a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner increased by 3,309 to 18,193 (22.2 per cent.); cases of malicious mischief fell by 1,958 to 22,147 (8.1 per cent.).

Chart B on page 7 illustrates the trend in the period 1960-1974 and shows the proportions that the main types of offences bear to the total.

Chart C on page 9 shows the number of drink and driving cases made known to the police in the period 1960-1974.

### Crimes and offences cleared up

8. In 1974, 71.1 per cent. of all crimes and offences made known to the police were cleared up (72.0 in 1973). The percentage of crimes cleared up was 39.9 (40.0 in 1973) and of offences cleared up 88.4 (87.9 in 1973).

### Disposal of persons proceeded against

9. The Scottish criminal courts dealt with 241,146 persons in 1974, 6,345 or 2.7 per cent. more than in 1973; 237,989 were dealt with summarily (6,128 more than in 1973) and 3,157 after full committal (217 more than in 1973).

### Charges proved

10. The number of persons against whom a charge was proved with or without a finding of guilt in all courts was 224,902, 5,116 or 2.3 per cent. more than in 1973. The following table gives comparative figures for 1961, 1972, 1973 and 1974:

TO POLICE BY MAIN TYPES





CHART B

### Imprisonment, etc., and detention in a borstal, detention centre and young offenders institution

11. 7,596 sentences of imprisonment were imposed by all courts during the year as against 6,903 in 1973, 4,229 of these sentences were for crimes and 3,367 for offences, compared with 3,802 and 3,101 respectively in 1973.

12. The number of persons sentenced to borstal training during the year was 799, of whom 421 were convicted of housebreaking or theft, compared with 765 and 408 respectively in 1973.

13. The number of persons ordered to be detained in a detention centre was 1,037, of whom 460 were convicted of housebreaking or theft: the comparable figures for 1973 were 991 and 431.

14. 1,829 persons were sentenced to detention in a young offenders institution during the year, of whom 769 were convicted of housebreaking or theft: the comparable figures for 1973 were 1,789 and 711.

### Fines

15. The number of persons fined was 187,230 (19,428 for crimes and 167,802 for offences). 3,114 or 1.7 per cent. more than in 1973. Fines imposed amounted to £2,996,715 (£584,373 for crimes and £2,412,342 for offences) compared with £2,611,543 in 1973.

### Probation orders

16. Probation orders were made in respect of 2,165 males (87 less than in 1973) and 689 females (57 less than in 1973).

### Sex and age distribution of persons against whom charges were proved


17. Of the 224,902 persons against whom a crime or offence was proved in 1974, 90.3 per cent. were males (90.2 in 1973). The highest rate for crimes and offences among males was again in the 17 year old group. The highest rate among females was in the 16 year old group. Of those against whom a crime was proved, 85.3 per cent. were males (85.3 in 1973); the highest rate among males was in the 16 year old group. Among females the highest rate for crimes was also in the 16 year old group. 91.1 per cent. of those against whom an offence was proved were males (90.9 in 1973), and the age groups showing the highest rate were 17 among males and 30-39 among females.

*Chart E on page 13 shows the number of males per 1,000 of population of each age group (over 15) against whom a charge was proved in all courts for crimes from 1950 to 1974.*

### Juvenile delinquency

18. The 1971 volume explained why the new arrangements for dealing with children in Part III of the Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968 necessitated a new

basis for measuring juvenile delinquency and stated that in future the Statistics would record figures for those children under 16 in respect of whom, on the clear-up of an offence, the police took action which resulted in the child being dealt with in any of three ways:

- (i) being prosecuted;
- (ii) being referred to the reporter with a view to consideration of a need for possible measures of compulsory care;
- (iii) being the subject of a police warning (and/or supervision under a police juvenile liaison scheme).

19. Figures for 1974 are given on this basis in Tables 18, 19 and 20.

20. 1974 is the third full year of operation of the new arrangements for dealing with children; thus it is possible to compare the figures for these three years fairly directly with each other. The 1971 volume however discussed the difficulties of comparison of 1971 figures with those for previous years. Similar difficulties apply to comparisons of years following 1971 with 1971 due to the coming into effect of the new provisions part way through 1971 (15 April). A table which might form a basis for comparison over a series of years is:

(1) Where the result of reference to the reporter was that, at the reporter's request the child was dealt with by police warning or juvenile liaison, the case has been included in "Police warnings" and excluded from "Referred to the reporter".

21. Previous volumes have referred to the possibility of an increase in the willingness of the public to report child offenders to police with the introduction of new arrangements adapted specially to the needs of children. Thus not only must any comparison of figures across the transitional period be made with considerable caution figures for some years after the change could expect to reflect a progressive increase in willingness to report child offenders to the police. In the 1973 volume it was suggested that evidence for this trend existed in the disproportionately large increase in children dealt with for miscellaneous offences as compared with crimes. This has not continued into 1974 during which year the number of children dealt with for crimes was 22.3 per cent. more than the corresponding number for 1973 while the number dealt with for offences in 1974 shows an 8.1 per cent. decrease compared with 1973. Thus the pattern of change in the number of incidents for which children are dealt is quite different from their elders; for crime the number of persons aged 16 years and over against whom a charge was proved in 1974 was 10.4 per cent. above that in 1973 and for miscellaneous offences it was 1.3 per cent. above that for 1973. It is noticeable that the numbers of young persons dealt with for crime types are significantly more volatile than their elders; whereas the number of persons aged 16 years and over with a crime against the person

proved against them decreased by 1.7 per cent. the number of persons under 16 years of age dealt with for a crime against the person decreased by 24.5 per cent. The number of persons aged 16 years and over with a crime against property proved against them increased by 13.5 per cent. while the number of younger persons dealt with for a crime against property increased by 24.7 per cent.

22. It was suggested in the 1971 volume that the figure comparable to the number of children prosecuted or warned prior to 1971 fell between the total number of children dealt with in one or other of the three ways referred to in paragraph 18 above and that figure less the number of children referred by the police to the reporter and who were neither brought before a children's hearing nor referred for local authority action on a voluntary basis. There were 11,656 such children in 1974. While developments in the use of the new arrangements are likely to reduce the value of comparisons with the old arrangements (or indeed with 1971), it is suggested that the figure for 1974 comparable to the total for years previous to 1973, fell between 38,993 (the figure shown) and 27,337 (38,993 less 11,656); equivalent 1973 figures were 35,932 and 26,012 respectively.

23. Of all crimes for which juveniles were proceeded against in court, referred to a reporter, warned or placed on the police juvenile liaison scheme, 95.9 per cent. were against property, 35.7 per cent. being housebreaking, 51.7 per cent. theft and 5.4 per cent. malicious injuries to property.

24. 48.7 per cent. of offences for which juveniles were dealt with were breaches of the peace; 6.7 per cent. were obstructions and nuisances; 17.7 per cent. malicious mischief to property; and 5.8 per cent. offences against local Acts and Byelaws.

25. During 1974, 13.3 per cent. of the children who had been dealt with in respect of crimes were female; this may be compared with the 1973 figure of 14.1 per cent. The equivalent 1974 figure for offences was 12.2 per cent. compared to the 1973 figure of 11.9 per cent.

26. In 1974 the highest incidence of crimes for which boys under 16 were dealt with was among those aged fifteen and among those aged fourteen for girls. The age of highest incidence of offences was fifteen for both boys and girls.

## Murder

27. Thirty-eight cases of murder were made known to the police in Scotland in 1974. The 38 victims included 1 child under 10 years of age, an infant of 7 months and 2 men and 4 women aged 60 or over.

28. Thirty-two persons were prosecuted in respect of 23 of these cases of murder. Twenty-one were sentenced to life imprisonment and 3 (aged under 18) were ordered to be detained during Her Majesty's Pleasure. One person was found not guilty and the charges against 6 people were found not proven. One person was found to have been insane at the time of the offence. In two other cases the criminal authorities ordered no proceedings. At the end of the year proceedings were pending in 11 cases and 2 cases remained unsolved.

## Appeals to the High Court of Justiciary

29. In order to give a fuller explanation of the nature and outcome of appeals, details of appeals under the Criminal Appeal (Scotland) Act 1926 are now contained in Table 26 (indictment cases); Table 27 contains details of the court of origin and outcome of appeals by Stated Case or Bill of Suspension (summary cases).

30. The following table gives the number of appeals allowed and refused during the last five years.





CHART E

## Notes on Criminal Procedure in Scotland

### Applicability of Criminal Procedure to Children alleged to have committed Crimes and Offences

Part III of the Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968 (which came into effect on 15 April 1971) introduced new arrangements, not involving prosecution before criminal courts, for children alleged to have committed criminal offences. Under these arrangements an official with the title of "Reporter", when a child is referred to him as having committed a crime or offence, considers whether in his view that child is in need of compulsory measures of care and, if so, arranges for him to be brought with his parents before a "Children's Hearing", a sitting of a treatment authority established for each local authority area. The children's hearing has no power to adjudicate on the question whether or not the child committed the alleged offence; where the facts alleged are disputed, the hearing cannot proceed with the case unless it has been referred to the Sheriff and he finds the facts established.

The children's hearing then has power to impose (by means of a "supervision requirement") what compulsory measures of care it considers are required.

"Child" for the purposes of Part III of the Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968 means basically a person under 16 years of age; but it includes also a person aged 16 and over but under 18 if he has a supervision requirement in force in respect of him.

Although the great majority of alleged child offenders are dealt with under these arrangements, the Crown retains its right to prosecute children who are over the age of criminal responsibility. (The law conclusively presumes that no child under 8 years of age can be guilty of any crime or offence.) This right is, in practice, exercised only in the case of very serious crimes or where some consideration of criminal justice points to the need for it, e.g., the desirability of a child who is alleged to have committed a crime in conjunction with an adult being jointly tried with him.

These Notes, being concerned with criminal procedure, do not touch further upon the Social Work Act arrangements for dealing with children, but, insofar as they refer to children, are confined to procedures where children are prosecuted before courts of criminal jurisdiction.

### Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction

These fall into two categories, courts of solemn jurisdiction (that is, where proceedings are taken on indictment and the judge sits with a jury) and courts of summary jurisdiction (which sit without a jury). The courts of solemn jurisdiction, where the more serious cases are tried, are the High Court of Justiciary and the Sheriff Court. The courts of summary jurisdiction, where the majority

of cases are dealt with, are the Sheriff Court (which tries cases under solemn and also summary procedure) the Justice of the Peace Court and the Burgh (or Police) Court.

*The High Court of Justiciary* is the highest criminal court in Scotland and consists of the Lords Commissioners of Justiciary, who are the Lord Justice General, the Lord Justice Clerk, and seventeen other judges, and are also the judges of the Scottish Supreme Civil Court, the Court of Session. It sits in Edinburgh and, on circuit, at Glasgow, Dundee, Aberdeen and other circuit towns.

*The Sheriff Court.* Scotland is divided into Sheriffdoms, each consisting of a county or a combination of counties, and these Sheriffdoms are further divided into sheriff court districts. A Sheriffdom has a Sheriff Principal and a number of Sheriffs and these act as the judges of the court. The Sheriff Court exercises an extensive civil jurisdiction as well as criminal jurisdiction.

*The Justice of the Peace Court* is organised on a county (and county of city) basis, the judges being the justices of the peace for the county (or county of city).

*The Burgh (or Police Court).* The judges of these courts, which are established in burghs, are town councillors who are serving (or have served) in the office of magistrate of the burgh. In Glasgow stipendiary magistrates also act as judges in the burgh court.

### Jurisdiction of Courts

The High Court has universal jurisdiction and sole jurisdiction in certain of the most serious crimes such as murder and rape. The Sheriff Court, sitting under solemn procedure, may deal with any other crimes or offences tried on indictment, and the Sheriff Summary Court has jurisdiction over all offences which may be tried summarily. The stipendiary magistrates of Glasgow have a jurisdiction similar to that of the Sheriff Summary Court. Other courts of summary jurisdiction have a limited jurisdiction over offences which may be tried summarily, the more serious of such offences generally being reserved for the Sheriff Court.

A "child", in the definition of that word for the purposes of Part III of the Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968 (see above) may be tried only in the High Court or Sheriff Court (solemn or summary).

### Prosecution

Prosecutions in Scotland are undertaken almost invariably by public prosecutors acting in the public interest—by the Lord Advocate (the chief public prosecutor in Scotland) in the High Court, by his officers, the Procurators Fiscal, in the Sheriff Court, and by the justice of the peace fiscal and burgh prosecutor in the justice of the peace and burgh courts respectively. The main practical exception to this is that certain statutes confer the right to prosecute for breaches of the statute on private bodies (and private individuals) concerned; but, even in these instances, the concurrence of the public prosecutor of the court is required if the breach is punishable by imprisonment without the option of a fine, unless the statute otherwise provides.

## Proceedings before Trial

*Police investigation and reporting.* The police make a preliminary investigation of all cases of crime discovered by or made known to them. Particulars of the case are then reported to the justice of peace fiscal or burgh prosecutor if the offence is within the jurisdiction of those courts and suitable to be tried before them, or otherwise to the Procurator Fiscal. (The Lord Advocate may issue instructions to the police with regard to the reporting of cases.) It is for the public prosecutor concerned, and not for the police, to decide whether to prosecute—and, in the case of the Procurator Fiscal, to decide whether to proceed summarily or to charge the accused by Petition with a view to proceedings on indictment.

Where the results of the police investigation suggest that the crime or offence has been committed by a child, then the action taken by the police depends on the nature and circumstances of the offence. Under the Lord Advocate's instructions certain types of case are reported to the Procurator Fiscal in order that consideration may be given in the first instance to the Crown's right of prosecution. Otherwise, the police report is sent to the reporter (see above) so that he may consider action for compulsory measures of care under Part III of the Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968.

*Investigations by Procurator Fiscal.* In cases of serious crime, where there is a *prima facie* case for proceedings on indictment, Procurators Fiscal make a careful investigation of all circumstances and personally examine witnesses in private. A written precognition in each case is then forwarded to the Crown Agent for the instructions of Crown Counsel—the collective title of the Lord Advocate, the Solicitor General and five Advocates Depute. Crown Counsel examine the precognition and determine whether further proceedings should be taken, whether, in fact, they should be taken on indictment, and, if so, whether they should be taken in the High Court or the Sheriff Court.

*Citation and Apprehension.* When a person of usually law-abiding character, who has a known residence, is accused of a minor offence, or one which is not punishable by imprisonment without the option of a fine, he is normally cited to appear at a specified time and place before an appropriate court. In other cases, and where the accused has failed to appear on citation, he is apprehended by the police. The police have certain powers under common law and statute to arrest without warrant, or may act on the authority of a warrant granted by a competent court.

*Appearance in court.* Wherever practicable, a person apprehended must be brought before the court competent to deal with his case (either by way of trial or by way of remit to a higher court) not later than in the course of the first lawful day after he is taken into custody. In serious cases, where prosecution on indictment is contemplated, the accused is charged on Petition at the instance of the Procurator Fiscal and brought before the Sheriff in private. He may then emit a Declaration (*i.e.* give any explanation or make a statement in regard to the charge) if he chooses, but in practice, such a Declaration is seldom made.

### Period of custody awaiting trial

(a) *Procedure on Indictment.* After the accused has been charged on Petition,

the Sheriff has power to commit the accused for further inquiry. The next stage is "full committal" or committal "until liberated in due course of law", that is, normally, until trial. The period of custody for further inquiry before committal "until liberated in due course of law" does not exceed eight days. After the accused has been fully committed an indictment is served upon him and he is brought to trial as speedily as possible, but as a safeguard, the law provides that his trial must be brought to a conclusion before the period of his custody after being so committed exceeds 110 days. (An accelerated procedure is described below.)

(There is no equivalent in Scotland of the preliminary investigation before examining magistrates held in England and Wales before committal for trial.)

(b) *Summary procedure.* On apprehension the court has power, without calling on the accused to plead, to adjourn the case for further inquiry for a period not exceeding seven (or, exceptionally, twenty-one) days from the date of his apprehension and may commit him to prison during the adjournment.

*Bail.* Persons in custody, other than those charged with murder and treason, may be liberated on bail by the Sheriff or, if the offence is within their jurisdiction, by other courts of summary jurisdiction until the time fixed for their appearance in court. Under Section 37 of the Criminal Justice (Scotland) Act 1963, application may be made to the Court for review or refusal of bail or of the amount of bail fixed. There is a right of appeal to the High Court by the accused person against the refusal of bail, by the Prosecutor against the granting of bail, or by either party against the amount fixed. The police are empowered to release on bail a person who has been apprehended where the offence is within the jurisdiction of a summary court other than the Sheriff Court.

Failure to appear in court at the specified time results, as a rule, in forfeiture of the bail and subsequent apprehension.

### Trial on indictment

*First (pleading) diet.* The pleading diet takes place in the Sheriff Court, whether the accused is to be tried in that court or in the High Court. The accused is called upon to plead guilty or not guilty. If he pleads not guilty, the case is continued to the second (trial) diet in the appropriate court. If he pleads guilty, and it is a case which is to be dealt with in the Sheriff Court, the Sheriff may then dispose of the case. If it is a High Court case, it is continued to the second diet in the High Court for disposal only.

*Second (trial) diet.* This is held at least nine days after the pleading diet, before the Sheriff or High Court according to Crown Counsel's instructions. A jury of fifteen is empanelled. Evidence is led (without opening speeches) and there are closing speeches for the prosecution and then for the defence, followed by the judge's charge to the jury. The jury may acquit the accused by finding him "not guilty" or the charge against him "not proven" or they may convict him by finding him "guilty". The verdict may be by a majority. If the verdict is "guilty" the court proceeds to dispose of the case.

*Accelerated ('section 31') procedure.* A person accused may give written notice that he intends to plead guilty, and thus avoid the delay which would

be involved in the preparation of the prosecution's full case. He is then served with an indictment citing him to appear before the Sheriff at a diet not less than four days thereafter. If he pleads guilty, the court proceeds to dispose of the case.

*Remit to High Court for sentence.* A Sheriff may, either on a plea of guilty or after trial, remit an accused to the High Court for disposal if he holds, for instance because of the aggravated nature of the case, that the question of sentence should be disposed of by that court.

### Summary trial

At the first calling of the case the accused is asked to plead to the charge. If he pleads guilty, the court may dispose of the case. Where the plea is not guilty, the court may proceed to trial at once or it may appoint a trial diet for a later date. (If the accused is brought before the court on apprehension, he is entitled to an adjournment of 48 hours and the court may also adjourn the case for other reasons.) Evidence is then heard and the court decides the case. The court may acquit the accused by finding him "not guilty" or the charge against him "not proven" or it may convict him by finding him "guilty". In the latter case the court proceeds to dispose of the case. (Cases in which the accused is disposed of without the recording of a conviction are described below.)

### Adjournment for inquiry after conviction

All courts have the power to adjourn a case after conviction (or a finding that the accused committed the offence) and before sentence for the purpose of determining the most suitable method of disposal.

### Powers of Court and Methods of Disposal—Summary Courts

(1) *Powers of imprisonment, fine and caution.* In the case of common law offences courts of summary jurisdiction other than the Sheriff (and stipendiary magistrate, whose powers are those of the Sheriff) may impose a sentence of imprisonment not exceeding 60 days or a fine not exceeding £50, and have power to ordain the accused to find caution for good behaviour for a period not exceeding six months and to an amount not exceeding £50; the Sheriff's summary powers are imprisonment not exceeding three (or, in some cases, six) months, a fine not exceeding £150 and caution for a maximum period of one year and a maximum of £150. In the case of offences created by statute the powers of the court are laid down by the statute.

(2) *Absolute discharge.* The court may discharge the accused absolutely. In this case, though it must be satisfied that he committed the offence, it does not proceed to conviction.

(3) *Probation.* The court may require the offender to be placed for a period of not less than one or more than three years under the supervision of a probation officer. The probation order, with which the accused must have expressed willingness to comply and which is made without the court proceeding to a conviction, may include a requirement that the accused undergoes medical treat-

ment, or any other requirement that the court considers appropriate and the offender has agreed to observe.

(4) *Admonition.* The court may dismiss the accused with an admonition.

(5) *Deferred sentence.* The court may defer sentence on the accused for a period.

(6) *Detention of younger offenders.* Imprisonment may not be imposed on any person under 21 years of age. No sentence inferring detention may be imposed on any person under 21 years of age unless, after considering a report on his character and circumstances, the court decides that no other method is appropriate. (A summary court must record its reasons for this decision.) The following are the special forms of detention for persons aged 16 or over and under 21:

(a) *Borstal training.* The sheriff summary court and a stipendiary magistrate's court, may, where a person aged 16 or over and under 21 is convicted of an offence punishable with imprisonment and after considering a report on his suitability for the sentence, sentence him to borstal training, *i.e.*, to training in a Borstal Institution for a period not exceeding two years and subsequent supervision on licence.

(b) *Detention in a detention centre.* A summary court may, where a person aged 16 or over and under 21 is convicted of an offence punishable with imprisonment, sentence him to a fixed period of three months in a detention centre. (This sentence is at present only available to the sheriff summary court and a stipendiary magistrate's court.)

(c) *Detention in a young offenders institution.* A summary court may, where a person aged 16 or over and under 21 is convicted of an offence punishable with imprisonment, impose on him a sentence of detention in a young offenders institution for a period not exceeding the period of imprisonment which it could competently have imposed on an adult. The court must first satisfy itself that neither a sentence of borstal training nor a sentence of detention in a detention centre should be imposed.

(7) *Restrictions on imprisonment.* Provisions similar to those described in (6) above restricting the detention of younger offenders apply to the imprisonment of adults classified as "first offenders" under the First Offenders (Scotland) Act 1960.

### Powers of Court and Methods of Disposal—Courts of Solemn Jurisdiction

Subject only to the maximum penalties that may be laid down for any offence by statute, the High Court of Justiciary has unlimited powers of imprisonment, fine and caution. The Sheriff's power of imprisonment is restricted to a maximum of two years. The other methods of disposal available to the summary courts are available to the courts exercising solemn jurisdiction but in the case of absolute discharge and probation a conviction is recorded.

### Special provisions relating to the prosecution of children

Special arrangements apply where a "child", in the definition of that word for the purposes of Part III of the Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968, is prose-

cutted before the High Court or Sheriff Court. (As indicated above, burgh and justice of the peace courts do not have jurisdiction to try children.) The court is required to have special regard to the welfare of the child; in summary proceedings (except where the child is tried jointly with an adult) there are separate rules of court, appropriate to the age of the accused, governing procedure in court; there are also restrictions on the persons who may be present in court and on public reporting of the identity of the accused.

*Custody awaiting trial.* Instead of remand in custody to a penal institution, the child is committed for detention to the local authority, although if he has attained the age of 14 he may exceptionally be committed to such an institution.

*Finding of guilt.* No conviction may be recorded against a child; instead, the court makes a "finding of guilt".

*Disposal.* The sentences not involving detention may be imposed on a child as on older persons. A child convicted on indictment may be ordered to be detained for such period as the court may specify; and, if convicted summarily, for a period not exceeding two years. In each case, the place of detention is decided by Secretary of State and the child may be released on licence at any time during the period. In addition, the court may remit the child to a Children's Hearing, which then has the same powers to order compulsory measures of care as in a case referred to it by the reporter.

#### **Special provisions relating to mental disorder**

Courts have power, when remanding an accused awaiting trial or sentence to commit him to detention in hospital if, on medical evidence, he appears to be suffering from mental disorder.

It is the duty of the prosecution to bring before the court any evidence it has about the mental condition of the accused.

Summary courts other than the Sheriff Court are required to remit to the Sheriff any person charged before them who appears to be suffering from mental disorder.

Where a person is convicted of a crime or offence and the court is satisfied, on the evidence of two medical practitioners, that he is suffering from mental disorder (which includes mental illness and mental deficiency) of a nature and degree which warrants his compulsory detention in hospital or subjection to guardianship, the court may make a hospital order or guardianship order, as the case may be. (In summary proceedings, the order may be made without a conviction, if the court is satisfied that the accused did the act charged.) The person's subsequent treatment (discharge, etc.) then falls to be dealt with by the appropriate medical authorities in a similar way to a person compulsorily detained in hospital or subjected to guardianship on account of mental disorder under ordinary civil procedures.

Where, on medical evidence, the court considers that there is a special risk that the person, as a result of his mental disorder, would commit offences if set at large, it may add to a hospital order an order restricting discharge ("restriction order"), the effect of which is to transfer from the medical

authorities to the Secretary of State responsibility for decisions on discharge and other matters affecting the public safety.

Unfitness to plead on account of mental condition stands in bar of trial ("insanity in bar of trial"); the issue is normally decided by the judge of trial, not by a jury. In indictment proceedings there is a defence of "insanity at the time of the crime", that, because of his mental condition, the accused was not criminally responsible for his act and should therefore be acquitted by the jury. On an acquittal on account of insanity at the time of the crime or a finding of unfitness to plead in indictment proceedings the court is required to make an order of the same effect as a hospital order together with a restriction order; on a finding of unfitness to plead in summary proceedings the court is required to make a hospital order and has discretion to add a restriction order.

#### **Appeal**

A person convicted on indictment in the High Court or Sheriff Court may appeal to the High Court of Justiciary (a) against his conviction on any ground which involves a question of law alone, or, with the leave of the High Court or upon the certificate of the judge who presided at the trial that it is a fit case for appeal, on any ground: and (b) against his sentence, with the leave of the High Court, unless the sentence is one fixed by law as in the mandatory sentence of life imprisonment for murder.

A person convicted summarily may appeal to the High Court by Stated Case or Bill of Suspension, but only on questions of law, procedure, etc., and not on issues of fact.

Appeals by persons convicted on indictment or by summary procedure are heard and determined by three of the Lords Commissioners of Justiciary, but a larger number may sit if the court considers it appropriate.

## **Explanatory Notes and Definitions**

#### **Crimes and offences made known to the police**

The figures include all crimes and offences made known to the police during the year, whether committed by the same or different persons, and whether any apprehension took place during the year or not. Offences reported to the police, and subsequently discovered not to have occurred (such as the loss of personal property afterwards found to have been mislaid), are not included.

#### **Crimes and offences in which one or more persons were apprehended, cited, warned, etc., or traced**

The figures include the crimes and offences in which one or more persons were referred to a reporter, to a children's hearing, warned, cautioned or admonished, either orally or by letter, by the police or a prosecutor, in addition to those in which one or more persons were apprehended or cited or traced.

### **Persons proceeded against**

The figures show the number of persons proceeded against, not the number of crimes and offences. Where, therefore, any person is charged at the same time with several offences, one of these has to be selected for tabulation. The rule followed is to select that offence for which the proceedings were carried to the furthest stage. If there were several convictions or findings of guilt, the offence selected is that for which the heaviest punishment was awarded. If the final result of proceedings on two or more charges is the same, the most serious offence appears in the tables.

### **Murder**

The number of crimes shown in the tables represents the number of complete acts of murder, irrespective of the number of persons killed. Thus, an act by which two or more persons are killed at the same time, or a succession of immediately consecutive acts, comprising one complete incident in which more than one person is killed, is recorded as one case of murder.

### **Crimes—judicial determination**

If there is a committal or conviction or finding of guilt within the year, the tables show the nature of the crime as judicially determined. Failing this, the charge which is named in the petition or warrant on which the prisoner is arrested is taken as determining the crime. If there are no proceedings and no apprehension the character of the crime is judged by the facts so far as known to the police.

### **Calendar years**

All the tables are for the calendar year ending 31st December (unless otherwise indicated) and includes only persons finally disposed of within the year. Where a case is pending at the end of the year (*e.g.* tried but sentence postponed) it is reserved for inclusion in the following year's tables. Figures for cases made known to the police during the calendar year therefore cannot be compared with figures for persons disposed of in the same period.

### **Persons committed till liberated in due course of law**

Cases where the accused has been fully committed till liberated in due course of law although afterwards ordered by Crown Counsel to be disposed of summarily and cases reported for the instructions of Crown Counsel are excluded from the tables showing proceedings in Summary Courts, and included in the tables showing proceedings after full committal.

### **Counties and burghs**

In the tables relating to areas, the figures shown under counties, include burghs as well as the landward areas administered by County Councils, with the exception of the four counties of cities (Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen and Dundee) whose figures are shown separately.

### **“Charge proved: order made without conviction or finding of guilt”**

The figures include persons who were ordered to be absolutely discharged or placed on probation under the Criminal Justice (Scotland) Act 1949, together with persons ordered to be detained in hospital or placed under guardianship under the Mental Health (Scotland) Act 1960.

### **“Otherwise discharged”**

The figures include cases in which, although the prisoner may not have been tried, a simple liberation did not follow, *e.g.*, military prisoners remitted to their regiments for trial; juveniles arrested by the police after absconding from approved schools and sent back to school without further punishment.

### **“Imprisonment”**

The figures do not include terms of imprisonment in default of paying fines or of finding sureties. Where sentences of preventive detention and corrective training were imposed (none were imposed during the year), these are included.

### **Fines**

The figures include all cases in which a fine is imposed, whether it is paid or not.

### **“Time between full committal and disposal”**

The period is calculated in all cases from the date on which the accused is committed till liberated in due course of law. In the case of persons who plead guilty at a pleading diet, the period ends on that day; where a plea of guilty is not tendered at a pleading diet, the period ends on the day of trial. Portions of a week are ignored.

### **Remits from Sheriff Court**

Where a prisoner has pleaded guilty in a Sheriff Court and is remitted (under section 31 of the Criminal Procedure (Scotland) Act 1887) to the High Court of Justiciary for sentence, the case does not appear in the Sheriff Court figures but in the statistics of the High Court. This also applies in the case of a person remitted under section 2 of the Criminal Procedure (Scotland) Act 1921.
