#### NOTES TO ORGANIZATIONAL SCHEDULE OF DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES

### PERFORMING POLICE OR INVESTIGATIVE ACTIVITIES

Note 1. The Division of Investigation was established the latter part of FY 1973, but was not operational until FY 1974.

- Note 2. Funds and personnel for the Division of Enforcement and Security/ Office of the Secretary, were not reported by the Department of Interior. Its mission is to provide the administrative support for all security and enforcement activities within the Department of Interior. Responsibilities include development of security programs, review of management policies and procedures concerning security and law enforcement, and liaison with outside law enforcement agencies.
- Note 3. This organization began its law enforcement activities in FY 1974.
- Note 4. Funds and personnel for the Office of Law Enforcement/Office of the Secretary for Enforcement and Tariff Operations were not reported by the Department of the Treasury. Its mission is to provide administrative support for all tariff and enforcement activities within the Department of the Treasury. Responsibilities include development of security programs, review of management policies and procedures concerning security and law enforcement, and liaison with outside law enforcement agencies.

Note 5. Funds reported are for only the National Central Bureau of INTERPOL, The Central Bureau is staffed by personnel detailed from the Department of the Treasury and the Drug Enforcement Administration. Their salaries are borne by the lending agency and the people have been included in the number of personnel reported by those agencies. Detailed personnel are as follows: FY 1973 - 7; FY 1974 - 9; and FY 1975 - 9.

Note 5. No FY 1975 data was available for the Office of Public Safety. Most of these activities have been discontinued for FY 1975.

However, the Army did report an average salary of \$18,695 for officers, and \$8,768 for enlisted personnel performing these activities. The Army reported an estimated average grade of GS-11 (average salary of \$17,232) for its civilian "in-house" investigators. The Army expects funding to increase (by approximately \$1.3 million) for criminal investigations in FY 1976.

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

Although funding for civilian guards will increase slightly (approximately \$287,000, the Navy expects a general decline in Navy police activities due to efforts to reduce the number of Navy installations, and substitute civilian for military personnel in FY 1976.

The Naval Investigative Service (NIS) reported an estimated average grade of GS-11, Step 2 (average salary of \$19,555) for its criminal investigators. NIS expects funding to increase for FY 1976 (projected increase of 96 personnel and \$1,121,000 in funding) due to a sharp increase in crime requiring criminal investigations at Navy installations.

- This is a beginning program and the funding reported is an estimate of funds necessary to enforce the "Wild and Free Roaming Horses and Burros Act" Funds include salaries, travel, supplies and vehicles. Personnel reported include two actual personnel as of February 5, 1975, (administrative support) and five programed (4 field investigators and 1 administrative support).
- The Director of the Law Enforcement Section estimates it will take an additional sixty-five (65) personnel and \$1.4 million to enforce the Sikes Act. Implementation of the Act is pending ratification by the eleven states affected by the Act.

3. Additional people and funds will be needed to enforce the Land and Water Conservation Act. According to the Director of the Law Enforcement Section, further clarification of certain provisions of the Act will be necessary before a definite plan for enforcement can be formulated.

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- 4. Bureau activities related to trespass operations are not reported because the law enforcement aspect of these operations are carried out by other State and Federal agencies. Also not included are the Desert Rangers who perform a public relations activity.
- 5. The Bureau of Land Management reported an estimated average grade of GS-11 for its criminal investigators. The Bureau of Land Management is seeking approval to increase the size of their program by \$1.4 million and 65 personnel for enforcement of the "Sikes Act" during FY 1976.

FBI officials could not separately identify the funds and personnel associated with performing personnel security investigations. An official estimated, however, that \$12,763,000 was committed in FY 1975 for conducting background investigations for other governmental agencies.

Another official estimated that about 25 percent of FBI resources are directed toward security matters carried out primarily by the Intelligence Division. FBI officials stated that an exact identification of this Division's activities and related funds would require a policy decision at a high level within the FBI before this information could be released. We did not pursue these matters any further because of the detailed GAO review of the FBI currently being performed.

2. The FBI reported an average grade of GS-13, Step 2, for its police activities. The FBI's budget request for FY 1976 provides for an increase of 250 cmployees (157 agents and 93 clerks) to handle the FBI's counterespionage responsibilities; however, the Office of Management and Budget (QMB) has imposed cuts in personnel costs which will result in a net decrease in FBI's overwill personnel complement of 704 employees (increase of 60 agents, decrease of 764 clerks) by the end of FY 1976.

- b. <u>Physical Security and Related Administrative Activities</u> All fourteen staff members are concerned with the "physical part of internal security", such as control of classified procedures for allowing certain vessels through the canal, control of classified information, etc. The major portion of ISO work is Physical Security related.
- 3. The Canal Zone Government (CZG) operates under the NM (nonmanual) pay series which is equivalent to the General Schedule (GS) pay series in the United States. The CZG reported estimated average grades of NM-7.4 for Customs officers, NM-4.4 for Locks Division Security guards, NM-3.4 for all other Panama Canal Company Guards, and NM-8.9 for Internal Security officers. Positions within the Police Division are ungraded. CZG expects a small increase in the number of personnel performing police activities (2 clerks) and a corresponding increase in operating costs for FY 1976.
