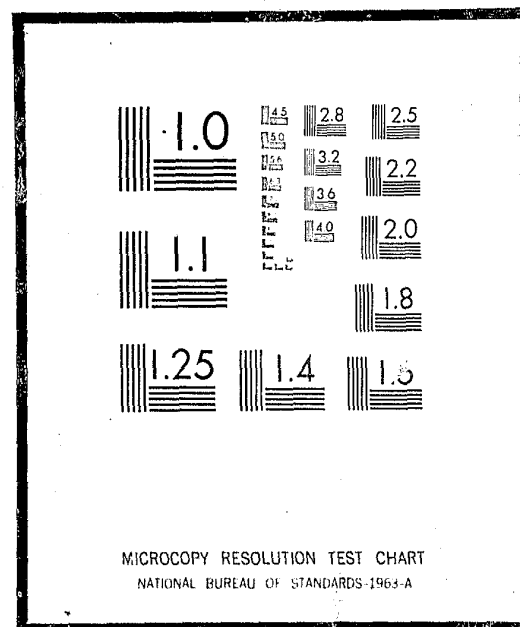

- /a Excludes residents placed on work or study release who are not reported in the institution count: WSR-11, Winnebago-2, Black River Camp-1.
- /b Excludes 57 status changes for residents held pending revocation hearings: 18 new sentence, probation violators, 12 no new sentence probation violators, 1 new sentence parole violator, 18 no new sentence parole violator, 8 no new sentence mandatory release violator.
- /c Excludes 370 status changes for residents out on temporary absence: 51 first release parole, 6 re-release parole, 4 first release M.R., 5 re-release M.R., 1 reinstatement to parole, 1 release to M.R. after return pending hearing, 27 first release DCO, 4 re-release DCO, 3 re-release end of sentence, 2 deaths, 212 transfers, 1 non-correctional institution, 51 authorized absence, and 2 unauthorized absence.
- /d Includes 1 reinstatement to probation.

Table 2. Juvenile Institutions:

- /b Excludes 354 status changes for juveniles out on temporary absence: 12 first release to aftercare, 2 re-release to aftercare, 2 release from temporary care-replacement, 3 release after return pending revocation hearing, 3 first release DCO, 69 first release direct discharge, 63 re-release direct discharge, 32 transfers, 11 authorized absence, 154 overstayed absence, 3 escape.

NOTE: Average daily population and rated bed capacity for Kettle Moraine Boys School is based on 365 days. It was open 123 days closing to juveniles November 1, 1974.

Table 3. Probation and Parole Services:

- /a Includes 2 adult probationers, 2 adult parolees, 2 juvenile probationers, and 7 juvenile parolees also included in institution counts who are held pending revocation hearings.

NOTE: Differences in totals for July 1, 1974 between the Monthly and Annual Report of Table 3, Probation and Parole Services are the result of the addition of 986 adult probationers, 298 adult parolees, and 1 juvenile aftercare who had been removed at the time of absconding. Absconders are not removed until they are apprehended and have a hearing. An additional difference of 8 is due to the accumulation of small month to month variances during the fiscal year.
