

INTRODUCTION

The Division of State and Provincial Police is an integral part of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. Formed, under Rule XIX of the IACP Constitution, the Division maintains a separate administrative identity and structure, to plan, direct and control the activities of the Division in light of the special needs and problems of State and Provincial police personnel.

The functions of the Division of State and Provincial Police include the following:

- 1. Provide advice and assistance to the State and Provincial Police on highway safety and criminal justice matters and other aspects of police management and operations, which are particularly applicable.
- 2. Plan, coordinate, and participate in various regional, national and international seminars, conferences, and workshops sponsored by the Division and which are in their interest.
- 3. Provide research and informational services for State and Provincial Police.
- 4. Provide limited staff studies under contract upon request of Division members.
- 5. Prepare or assist in the preparation of program proposals to various private organizations and public agencies.

- 6. Represent the Division before, and maintain liaison with, various private organizations and public agencies on matters affecting the Division members.
- 7. Serve as liaison for the Division with other Associations and groups, particularly those interested in having a responsibility for highway safety and criminal justice programs.
- 8. Provide guidance and assistance to other IACP Divisions in matters regarding State and Provincial Police and local-state-federal relations.

The objectives of the Division of State and Provincial Police are consistent with the objectives of the International Association of Chiefs of Police as set forth in Article I, Section 2(a) of the Constitution and Rules, and particularly as they relate to the special problems and needs of state and provincial forces.

1. To advance the science and art of police services.

- 2. To develop and disseminate improved administrative, technical, and operational practices and promote their use in police work.
- 3. To foster police administrators throughout the world.
- 4. To bring about recruitment and training in the police profession of qualified persons.
- 5. To encourage adherence of all officers to high professional standards of performance and conduct.

Membership of the Division of State and Provincial Police consists of the Chief Executives of the Nation's State Police, Public Safety and Highway Patrol Organizations and their Principal Staff Officers. On a national basis, the Division is divided into four geographical regions: (1) North Atlantic; (2) Southern; (3) North Central; and (4) Mountain Pacific.

In order to fulfill the Division's responsibility to conduct regional meetings of Division members for the purpose of more effectively dealing with the problems and advancing the interests of state and provincial police organizations within each region, a framework of responsibility was initiated. A regional chairman is appointed by the Division's general chairman from among the regions state police chief executives to serve as the region's spokesman and to sponsor an annual regional conference with a concurrent workshop for the principal staff officers from each agency represented. Staff services for the regional chairman, coordination of each regional training program, the providing of conference continuity, etc., are provided by the full-time IACP professional staff members.

The Regional conferences are designed to involve as participants the chief executives and principal staff officers of every state police, state public safety and highway patrol organization in the nation. Innovative ideas and experiences are exchanged among the law enforcement administrators, between them and outside experts, between them and representatives of other branches of the criminal justice system and between them and representatives of the public and private sectors. Training provided by the regional conferences is essential in order that the police administrators can better provide the professional police services needed in the complex society of today and the future.

Early in 1973 a Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) grant application was prepared for funding of the 1973 Regional Conferences of the Division of State and Provincial Police. For expediency, LEAA officials directed that this application be combined with two others which were pending and be submitted as a single grant application. An application for grant, dated March 5, 1973, was therefore directed to the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U. S. Department of Justice, for the purpose of obtaining the necessary funding for four regional planning meetings and four regional conferences of the Division of State and Provincial Police. This portion of the grant was in conjunction to funding

for the two other projects which had been included in the combined grant application.

Grant Award 73-TN-99-0001 was subsequently approved effective April 2, 1973, by LEAA assigning Martin R. Gardner as LEAA staff contact and designating a total project period of 18 months from date of award to completion of the project. (See Enclosure 1 through Enclosure 4 for details of the grant award pertaining to this specific project.)

Conduct of the Regional Conferences

In accordance with the provisions of the grant application proposal, four regional planning meetings were scheduled and held to develop the agenda and to determine the nature and scope of the regional conferences. Each state within each respective region was invited to participate in the two-day regional planning strategy meeting. The purpose of each of the meetings was to establish objectives and to identify topics of contemporary interest relative to the criminal justice system and the public need and interest which was of vital importance to the administrators on a regional as well as a national basis. Schedules of the regional planning meetings, which were developed, are listed as follows:

- Mountain Pacific Regional Conference Planning Meeting Denver, Colorado January 10-11, 1973.
- Southern Regional Conference Planning Meeting Oklahoma City, Oklahoma December 14-15, 1972.
- North Atlantic Regional Conference Planning Meeting (Developed and conducted by the Maine State Police.)
- North Central Regional Conference Planning Meeting St. Paul, Minnesota February 21-22, 1973.

Agendas and attendee rosters for each of the regional conference planning meetings may be found within the Appendix Sections of this report.

At each regional planning meeting, participants exchanged information and discussed subjects of both regional and national importance. The IACP Staff also suggested possible fields of study which they thought to be pertinent to the regional conferences.

As a result of the regional planning meetings, each region developed a four-day agenda of pertinent conference subjects, chose a regional conference site, and reserved dates for the regional conferences. The regional conferences of the Division of State and Provincial Police, which were held in 1973, are listed as follows:

To insure that key people at the National level became involved, a suggested guest list was prepared and distributed to each host executive for their use when preparing guest invitations to the regional conferences. See Enclosure 5 for suggested guest list.

SUMMARIZATION OF MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES

The regional conferences as proposed by the Division of State and Provincial Police of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) were designed to promote the following:

The instruction of state law enforcement leaders in improved methods of crime prevention and reduction and enforcement of the criminal law.

- The supplementation and improvement of police training at the state level.
- The advancement of the science and art of police administration by developing and disseminating improved administrative and technical practices.
- The cooperation and exchange of information and experience among police administrators and other interested individuals and organizations.
- The development of understanding and support among administrators at the state level, other elements of the criminal justice system, academicians and the public and private sectors.

The Regional Conferences included as participants chief executives and principal staff officers of state police, state public safety and highway patrol organizations.

Participants exchanged information and received training in subjects that were both of regional and national importance. Attendees were provided with current information relative to a broad range of timely topics of vital interest which related to contemporary issues within the criminal justice system. The opportunity was provided for a mutual interchange of ideas, techniques, and suggested solutions for successfully combatting those maraud and complex problems common to today's police agencies, including those matters that might be considered more provincial than national in scope. Input to the conferences came from three primary sources: (1) Speakers and participants representing other elements of the criminal justice system and other persons with expertise which was appropriate to the conference; (2) State police executives and their staffs; and (3) Staff consultants from the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

In addition to the presentations and the interchange of ideas among attendees, both the chief executives and their staff officers were provided experience in the conduct of high level managerial training conferences which should be useful to them in similar circumstances within their own respective states.

As noted in the conference agendas, workshops were also scheduled for the directors of the state-level police agencies' planning and research units at each one of the regional conferences. Program content for the workshops was developed by the chief executives during the prior regional planning meetings. As established, the workshops were interdisciplinary in nature and employed a variety of training and problemsolving techniques. All participants assigned to the workshops were experienced command level officers, well equipped to deal with the problems confronting state police organizations. The workshops served as a focal point for communication of ideas, problems, positions and needs and were designed to bring forth the experience and knowledge of the participants and apply them to the real problems they face within their organizations. Scientific problem-solving techniques were employed to develop solutions for contemporary problems. At the conclusion of each conference a presentation was provided to the administrators summarizing the results of the workshop and emphasizing specific recommendations resulting therefrom.

In total, approximately 65 law enforcement administrators attended the four regional planning meetings and approximately 186 attended the four regional conferences. A breakdown of attendees by region is listed as follows:

SUGGESTED CHANGES OR IMPROVEMENTS TO THE PROGRAM

In general, we believe that the present system of planning for and conducting the four regional conferences of the Division of State and Provincial Police of the International Association of Chiefs of Police is sound and should be continued in its present form. The use of planning meetings wherein input is received from police executives as well as from IACP staff members is a valid way to develop a pertinent agenda. Such a system brings to the forefront those problems currently concerning law enforcement executives on a national basis and through the use of the following regional conferences assists in the unification of policies and procedures of state/level agencies, and promotes better interaction between state/level police agencies and other members of the criminal justice system. The use of workshops as a part of each regional conference should also be continued as a means to resolve current problems and formulate recommendations or proposals to resolve them.

Both the two-day planning meetings and the four-day regional conferences should be continued in accordance with the present system. Group workshops, panels, and problem-solving exercises should be utilized to the greatest extent possible in each course presentation.

Continued efforts should be made to obtain the attendance of the chief executives of the state police, public safety and highway patrol organizations and their principal staff officers in these conferences.

Only the highest caliber of faculty members recruited from a national basis should be utilized. Attendees should be encouraged to accept innovations from other governmental or private agencies and apply them to their own organization wherever and whenever possible.

LEAA funding for annual regional conferences of the Division of State and Provincial Police should receive high priority consideration. The type of training received at these conferences by chief executives cannot be obtained from any other source on a national basis. When presented annually, it brings to the forefront those problems currently concerning law enforcement executives on a national basis and it assists in the unification of policies and procedures of state/level agencies, and promotes better interaction between state/level police agencies and other members of the criminal justice system. During the last few years these conferences have afforded great input to the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration in the resolution of national law enforcement problems.

In subsequent years, similar seminars will be held by IACP for the top managers of the patrol, investigative, traffic, training and community relations units in the police agencies already benefitted by this kind of training.



- 15. STANDARD GRANT CONDITIONS (Applicant understands and agrees that any grant received under P. L. 90-351, as amended as a result of this application shall be subject to and incorporate the following grant conditions.)
 - (1.) Reports. The grantee shall submit, at such times and in such form as may be prescribed, such reports as the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration may reasonably require, including quarterly financial reports and progress reports and final financial and narrative reports.
 - (2.) Copyrights and Rights in Data. Where activities supported by this grant produce original computer programs, writing, sound recordings, pictorial reproductions, drawing or other graphical representation and works of any similar nature (the term computer programs includes executiable computer programs and supporting data in any form), the government has the right to use, duplicate and disclose, in whole or in part in any manner for any purpose whatsoever and have others do so. If the material is copyrightable, the grantee may copyright such, but the government reserves a royalty-free non-exclusive and irreversible license to reproduce, publish, and use such materials, in whole or in part and to authorize others to do so. The grantee shall include provisions appropriate to effectuate the purposes of this condition in all contracts of employment, consultant's egreements, contracts or subgrants.
 - (3.) Patents. If any discovery or invention arises or is developed in the course of or as a result of work performed under this granting grantee shall refer the discovery or invention to LEAA. The grantee hereby agrees that determinations of rights to inventions made under this grant shall be made by the Administrator of Law Enforcement Assistance, or his duly authorized representative, who shall have the sole and exclusive powers to determine whether or not and where a patent application should be filed and to determine the disposition of all rights in such inventions, including title to and license rights under any patent application or patent which may issue thereon. The determination of the Administrator, or his duly authorized representative, shall be accepted as final. In addition, the grantee hereby agrees and otherwise recognizes that the Government shall acquire at least an irrevocable non-exclusive royalty-free license to practice and have practiced throughout the world for governmental purposes any invention made in the course of or under this grant. The grantee shall include provisions appropriate to effectuate the purposes of this condition in all contracts of employment, consultant's agreements, contracts, or subgrants.
 - Discrimination Prohibited. No person shall, on the grounds of race, creed, color or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be refused the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under grants awarded pursuant to P. L. 90-351, as amended or any project, program or ectivity or subgrant supported by this grant. The grantee must comply with the provisions and requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1954 and regulations issued by the Department of Justice and the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration thereunder as a condition of award of Federal funds and continued grant support. The grantee further must comply with the Department of Justice equal employment opportunity regulation in Federally assisted programs, to the end that discrimination in employment practices of State Planning Agencies, law enforcement agencies, and other agencies or offices administering, conducting or participating in any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance, on the grounds of rage, color, creek, sex or national or gin, be eliminated. This grant condition shall not be interpreted to require the imposition in State plans or planning agency subgrant programs of any percentage ratio, quota system, or other program to achieve ratio balance or eliminate racial imbalance in a law anforcement agency. The United States reserves the right to sek judicial enforcement of this condition.

15. STANDARD GRANT CONDITIONS - (Cont'd)

- (5.) Termination of Aid. This grant may be terminated or fund payments discontinued by LEAA where it finds a substantial failure to comply with the provisions of P. L. 90-351, as amended or regulations promulgated thereunder, including these grant conditions or application obligations, but only after notice and hearing and pursuant to all procedures set forth in Sections 510 and 511 of P. L. 90-351, as amended.
- (6.) Inspection and Audit. The Administration and the Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their duly authorized representatives, shall have access for purposes of audit and examinations to any books, documents, papers, and records of the greatee, and to relevant books and records of subgrantees and contractors, as provided in Section 521 of P. L. 90-351, as amended. A notice to this effect shall appear in all subgrants and other arrangements for implementation of this project.
- 7.) Maintenance of Records. All required records shall be maintained until an audit is completed and all questions arising therefrom are resolved, or three years after completion of a project, whichever is sooner.
- (8.) Utilization and Payment of Funds. Funds awarded are to be expended only for purposes and activities covered by grantee's approved project plan and budget. Project funds may be made available through a letter of credit system pursuant to rules and procedures as to establishment, withdrawals, etc., issued by the Administration and with which grantees must comply. Where grant awards are not sufficiently large to require this system, payments will be made on the basis of periodic requests and estimates of fund needs submitted by the grantee. Payments will be adjusted to correct previous overpayments or underpayments and disallowances resulting from audit.
- (9.) Allowable Costs. The allowability of costs incurred under any grant shall be determined in accordance with the general principles of allowability and standards for selected cost items set forth in OMB Circular No. A-87, "Principles for Determining Costs Applicable to Grents and Contracts with State and Local Governments", as further defined and delimited in conditions 10 and 11 below, and in the LEAA Financial Guide for Administration of Planning and Action Grents.
- Expanses Not Allowable. Grant funds may not be expanded for (a) items not part of the approved budget or separately approved by LEAA; (b) purchases or construction of land and buildings or improvements thereon, or payment of real estate mortgages or taxes, unless specifically provided for in the grant agreement; (c) dues to organizations or federations; (d) entertainment including luncheons, banquets, gratuities or decorations; (e) purchase of automobiles or other automotive vehicles unless provided for in the grant agreement; or (f) indirect (overhead) costs, where the grantee does not have an audited indirect expanse allocation system and rate acceptable to LEAA; (g) any bonus or commission to any individual for the purpose of obtaining approval of an application for LEAA assistance. Expenditure of funds in excess of the submitted total cost estimate for any major budget category will be permitted only with LEAA approval where this theoless an increase of more than 10 percent in the total category cost estimate. Such increases will be deemed, in
 - Written Approval of Changes. Grantees must obtain prior written approval from LEAA for major project changes. These include (a) changes of substance in project activities, designs, or research plans set forth in the approved application; (b) changes in the project director or key professional personnel identified in the approved application; and (c) changes in the approved project budget as specified in the preceding condition.
- Project Income. States and State agencies shall not be held accountable for interest earned on grant funds pending their disbursement for program purposes. All interest earned by units of local government with respect to grant funds must be returned to LEAA. However, in accordance with Department of Treasury Circular No. 1075 funds are not to be drawn until ready for immediate expenditure; therefore, only under unusual circumstances would interest from grant funds be earned. All other income earned with respect to grant funds Iroyalties, registration fees, service charges or fees, sales, atc.) shall be retained by the grantse; provided, however, that said income is either added to the funds already committed to the project or deducted from the total project for the purpose of determining the net costs on which the Federal share of the costs will be based.
- Title to Property. Title to property acquired in whole or in part with grant funds in accordance with approved budgets shall vest in the grantee, subject to divestment at the option of LEAA (to the extent of LEAA contribution toward the purchase thereof) exercisable only upon notice within 120 days after the end of the grant period or termination of the grant. Grantees shall exercise due care in the use, maintenance, protection and preservation of such property during the period of project use.
- Publications. The grantee may publish, at its own expense, the results of grant activity without prior raview by LEAA provided that any publication (written, visual, or sound) contains an acknowledgement of LEAA grant support. At least 10 copies of any such publication must be furnished to LEAA but only 5 copies of training materials (where used in grant project) need be supplied, except as otherwise requested or approved by LEAA. Publication of documents or reports with grant funds beyond quantities required to meet standard report requirements must be provided for in approved project plans or budgets or otherwise approved by LEAA and, for large quantity publication, manuscripts must be submitted in advance to LEAA.
- Third Party Participation. No contract or agreement may be entered into by the grantee for execution of project activities or provision of services to a grant project (other than purchase of supplies or standard commercial or maintenance services) which is not incorporated in the approved pro; tall or approved in advance by LEAR. Any such arrangements shall provide that the grantee will retain ultimate control and responsibility for the grant project and that the contractor or subgrantee, shall be bound by these grant conditions and any other requirements applicable to the grantee in the conduct of the project.
- (16.) Obligation of Grant Funds. Grant funds may not, without advence written approval by LEAA, be obligated prior to the effective date or subsequent to the termination date of the grant period. Obligations outstanding as of the termination date shall be liquidated within 90 days. Such obligations must be related to goods or services provided and utilized within the grant period.
 - Fixed Regulations. The fiscal administration of grants shall be subject to such further roles, regulations, and policies. concerning accounting and records, payments of funds, cost allowability, submission of financial reports, etc., as may be prescribed by LEAA, including those set forth in the LEAA Financial Guide, ULP Circulum A-21, A-87, and A-102, as well as §15 of FPR (41 CFR §15.003, etc. seq.), where applicable.

- Pelease of Information. Pursuant to Section 521 of the Act, as amended all records, papers and other documents kept by recipients of LEAA funds, including State Planning Agencies and their subgrantees and contractors, relating to the receipt and disposition of such funds, are required to be made available to the Administration. These records and other documents submitted to LEAA and State Planning Agencies pursuant to other provisions of the Act, including comprehensive State plans and applications for funds, are required to be made available by LEAA under the terms and conditions of the Federal Freedom of Information Act (5 U.S.C., 552). State Planning Agencies must follow applicable LEAA Guidelines on release of information and State Planning Agency procedures designed to facilitate local government participation.
- (19.) Negative Declaration. Applicant hereby declares that no significant environmental impact, as defined by the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 and LEAA Guidelines, may result from implementation of this program. Futher, the applicant hereby declares that implementation of this program will have no adverse effect on properties listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Where this Declaration cannot be made, the applicant must attach an Environmental Impact Analysis and proceed in accordance with OMB Circular A-95 clearance procedures and appropriate LEAA Guidelines.
- Assurance of Compliance with Civil Rights Laws. The applicant hereby agrees that it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and all requirements imposed by or pursuant to regulations of the Department of Justice (23 C.F.R. Part 42, subpart C) issued pursuant to that title, to the end that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, creed, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the applicant receives Federal financial assistance from the Department of Justice. The grantee further will comply with and insure compliance by its subgrantees and confrectors with the Department of Justice equal employment opportunity regulation in Federally assisted programs (28 C.F.R. Part 42, subpart D) to the end that employment discrimination in such programs on the grounds of race, color, creed, sex or national origin, shall be eliminated. The grantee recognizes the right of the United States to seek judicial enforcement of the foregoing covenants against discrimination and will include a similar covenant assuring the right of the United States to seek judicial enforcement in its subgrants or contracts.

- a. Why does the Federal Covernment not set a standard for patrolling the interstate highways? (National Safety Council says 1 highway patrolman is needed for every 2500 cars registered.)
- b. Trust fund should be made available for enforcement purposes, but such a proposal was defeated.


