The information delineated in this tenth annual report from the Michigan Law Enforcement Officers Training Council reflects activity during the <u>five</u> quarters of fiscal year 1975-76.

Council activity during that time was undertaken in response to the mandates set forth in Act No. 203, Public Acts of 1965, as amended. Accordingly, staff time was directed toward three efforts, these being basic recruit training, career development training, and the improving of the basic recruit curriculum.

The philosophical belief superintending all Council activity is that through mandated training the citizens of the great state of Michigan will have available to them the finest law enforcement officers the discipline has to offer. That belief is the vital life line that requires, and receives, the support of the Executive Office, the Legislature, and the discipline itself.

SECTION II

BASIC TRAINING

The State of Michigan continued its mandatory basic training concept during the 1975-76 fiscal year. That concept calls for mandated minimum employment standards, and, generates basic training through Council approved regional academies, provides for reimbursement of training costs through state appropriation, and certifies that each academy may certify each participant in its program as having successfully completed the prescribed basic training curriculum which results in

The aforementioned concept allowed for the training of 1,292 law enforcement officers at thirteen locations. The Council funded 41 of the 42 training sessions that were needed to train the basic recruits.

Further, through state appropriation, 302 law enforcement officers were housed on a subsistence basis to allow local police agencies that are not in close proximity to a certified training center an opportunity to comply with Act No. 203, P.A. 1965, as amended, without causing

Pre-Service Training

A secondary basic training concept that has been operating in the field during the past several years is the pre-service concept. Two four-year colleges (Ferris State College and Grand Valley State Colleges) and one community college (Lansing Community College) prepare officers for service who have not yet become sworn personnel.

The M.L.E.O.T.C. continued to promote the career development concept for the law enforcement discipline. Training endeavors that were maintained by the Council included Advanced, Police Alcohol Training, First Line Supervision, Middle Management, and Executive Development Seminars. These programs were supported in part by grants from the Office of Criminal Justice Programs and the Office of Highway Safety Planning.

In keeping with the development of media support for classroom use, the Council prepared and published a Media Guide that accurately reflects the support that the Council can and does give to the law enforcement discipline throughout the state. Approximately 215 of the guides have been sent to various federal, state, county, and local agencies affiliated with the law enforcement discipline.

Council media was used by two out of state agencies, 20 colleges and universities, and 46 agencies within the state.

(By authority conferred upon the department of state police by section 9 of Act No. 203 of the public Acts of 1965, as amended, being section 28.609 of the Compiled Laws of 1948.)

R 28.4101. General provisions.

ALC: NOTE:

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Rule 1. As used in these rules, "Act" means Act No. 203 of the Public Acts of 1965, as amended, being sections 28.601 to 28.616 of the Compiled Laws of 1948. The terms defined in the act have the same meaning when used in these rules.

R 28.4102. Employment qualifications.

Rule 2. A person employed as a police officer under the act shall: (a) Be a citizen of the United States.

(b) Have attained the minimum age as established by the hiring agency. which shall be not less than 18 years or as otherwise provided by law. (c) Have obtained a high school diploma or have attained a passing score on the general education development test indicating a high school graduation level.

(d) Have no prior felony convictions.

(e) Possess good moral character as determined by a favorable comprehensive background investigation covering school and employment records, home environment and personal traits and integrity. Consideration will be given to all law violations, including traffic and conservation law convictions, as indicating a lack of good character.

(f) Possess normal hearing, normal color vision and normal visual functions and acuity in each eye correctable to 20/20. Be free from any other impediment of the senses, physically sound, in possession of his extremities and well developed physically, with height and weight in relation to each other as indicated by accepted medical standards. Be free from any physical defects, chronic diseases, organic diseases, organic or functional conditions, or mental and emotional instabilities which may tend to impair the efficient performance of his duty or which may endanger the lives of others or himself. (g) Successfully complete the basic police training curriculum at a council

approved school.

R 28,4103. Examinations, fingerprints and certificates.

Rule 3. Before sending a person to a council approved school, the hiring agency shall:

(a) Cause the applicant to be examined by a licensed physician to determine that the applicant meets the standards set forth in subrule (f) of rule 2. A declaration of the applicant's medical history shall be made available to the examining physician and shall become a part of the background investigation.

GENERAL RULES

MINIMUM EMPLOYMENT STANDARDS-GENERAL RULES

(b) Cause the applicant to be fingerprinted and a search made of local, state, and national fingerprint files to disclose any criminal record.

(c) Conduct an oral interview to determine the applicant's acceptability for a police officer position and to assess appearance, background, and ability to communicate.

(d) Certify that the prospective trainee meets the minimum employments standards set forth in subrules (a) to (f) of rule 2.

R 28.4104. Forms.

Rule 4. Form TC-01, entitled "Application For Enrollment In A Certified Academy" shall be completed and forwarded to the appropriate school coordinator before a person will be allowed to attend a council approved school.

R 28.4105. Practices and standards.

Rule 5. Recruitment and employment practices and standards shall comply with the law applicable to police officer employment.





In order to be eligible for enrollment in a Regional Training Academy, all persons employed as law enforcement officers on or after January 1, 1971. must meet all of the following conditions:

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Appendix B

PREREQUISITES FOR ENROLLMENT IN A REGIONAL TRAINING ACADEMY

1. The trainee applicant must meet all of the Minimum Employment Standards as published by the Council.

2. The trainee must be employed with a law enforcement agency of a city, county, township, village, or of the State.

3. The trainee must be employed in a position as a law enforcement officer with the powers, upon completion of training, to enforce the general criminal laws of the state of Michigan.

4. A law enforcement trainee must be on the payroll and receiving compensation during his training period.

Any exceptions to the above listed enrollment prerequisites must be

1. In order to properly enroll a trainee at a Regional Training Academy, the trainee's agency head (or his desinate) must be the individual who enrolls the trainee. A trainee is not allowed to enroll himself in a Council approved school.

2. A TC-Ol form entitled, "Application for Enrollment in a Certified Academy: must be submitted to the regional academy coordinator prior to the beginning of the school. A trainee will not be admitted to a Regional Training Academy until this regulation is complied with. Any exceptions to this regulation must be

ACT NO. 203, P.A. 1965 as amended by Act No. 220, P.A. 1968, Act No. 187, P.A. 1970, Act No. 31, P.A. 1971, and Act No. 422, P.A. 1976

AN ACT to provide for the creation of a law enforcement officers training council: to provide for additional costs in criminal cases and the establishment of the law enforcement officers training fund and allocations therefrom to local agencies of government participating in a police training program.

Sec. 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Michigan law enforcement officers training council act of 1965". Sec. 2. As used in this act:

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"Council" me: as the law enforcement council. (a) (b)"Executive secretary" means the executive secretary of the council.

"Police officer" or "law enforcement officer" means a member of a police (c) force or other organization of a city, county, township, village or of the state, regularly Sec. 3. There is created the law enforcement council to carry out the intent of this

employed as such and who is responsible for the prevention and detection of crime and the enforcement of the general criminal laws of this state, but shall not include any persons serving as such solely by virtue of his occupying any other office or position. act and to consist of 11 members selected as follows:

(b)

(d) Three members appointed to the council by the governor from a list of 6 active law enforcement officials submitted by the Michigan sheriffs association.

(e) One member appointed to the council by the governor from a list of 3 names submitted by the fraternal order of the police. (f) One member appointed to the council by the governor from a list of 3 names submitted by the metropolitan club. (g) One member appointed to the council by the governor from a list of 3 names

submitted by the Detroit police officers associations. (h) All appointments made by the governor shall be subject to the advice and consent of the senate.

Sec. 4. All members of the council shall hold office for a term of 3 years, except that of the members first appointed from nominees submitted by the Michigan association of chiefs of police and the nominees submitted by the Michigan sheriffs association-1 shall be appointed for 3 years, 1 for 2 years, and 1 for 1 year. A vacancy caused by expiration of a term or termination of his official position in law enforcement shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment. A member appointed to fill a vacancy created other than by expiration of a term shall be appointed for the unexpired term of the member who he is to succeed in the same manner as the original appointment. Any member may be reappointed for additional terms.

Sec. 5. The council shall designate from among its members a chairman and a vice chariman who shall serve for 1-year terms and who may be re-elected. Membership on the council shall not constitute holding a public office, and members of the council shall not be required to take and file oaths of office before serving on the council. The council shall not have the right to exercise any portion of the sovereign power of the state. No member of the council shall be disgualified from holding any public office or employment by reason of his appointment or membership on the council, nor shall he forfeit any such office or employment, by reason of his appointment hereunder, notwithstanding the provisions of any general, special or local law, ordinance or city charter.

APPENDIX F

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

(a) The attorney general, or his designated representative.

The commissioner of state police, or his designated representative.

(c) Three members appointed to the council by the governor from a list of 6 active members submitted by the Michigan association of chiefs of police.

Sec. 6. The council shall meet at least 4 times in each year at Lansing, and shall hold special meetings when called by the chairman or, in the absence of the chairman, by the vice chairman or when called by the chairman upon the written request of 5 members of the council. The council shall establish its own procedures and requirements with respect to quorum, place and conduct of its meeting and other matters.

Sec. 7. The council shall make an annual report to the governor which will include pertinent data regarding the standards established and the degree or participation of municipalities in the training programs.

Sec. 8. The members of the council shall serve without compensation but shall be entitled to their actual expenses in attending meetings and in the performance of their duties hereunder.

Sec. 9. (1) The council shall prepare and publish minimum employment standards with due consideration to varying factors and special requirements of local police agencies relative to:

(a) Minimum standards of physical, educational, mental, and moral fitness which shall govern the recruitment, selection, and appointment of police officers.

(b) The approval of police training schools administered by a city, county, township, village, or corporation.

(c) Minimum courses of study, attendance requirements of at least 240 instructional hours, equipment, and facilities required at approved city, county, township, village, or corporation police training schools.

(d) The requirements in subdivision (c) shall be waived if any of the following occur:

The person has previously completed the mandatory training requirements (i) and less than 1 year of police service, has voluntarily or involuntarily discontinued his work as a law enforcement officer, and is again employed within 1 year after discontinuing work as a police officer.

(ii) The person has served more than 1 year and less than 5 years, has completed the mandatory training requirements, and takes employment with another police agency within 18 months of discontinued service.

(iii) The person has served 5 years or more and takes employment with another police agency within 2 years of discontinued service.

(iv) The person is a member of a sheriff's posse or police auxiliary temporarily engaged in the performance of his duties and while under the direction of the sheriff or police department.

(e) Minimum qualifications for instructors at approved police training schools. (f) Minimum basic training requirements which regularly employed police officers excluding sheriffs shall complete before being eligible for employment.

(g) Categories or classifications of advanced in-service training programs and minimum courses of study and attendance requirements for these categories or classifications.

(h) The establishment of subordinate regional training centers in strategic geographic locations in order to serve the greatest number of police agencies that are unable to support their own training programs.

(i) Acceptance of certified basic police training and experience received in states other than Michigan in fulfillment in whole or in part of the minimum employment standards prepared and published by the council.

(2) Notwithstanding any other provision of this statute, a regularly employed person employed on or after January 1, 1977, as a member of a police force having a full-time officer shall not be empowered to exercise all the authority of a peace officer in this state, nor employed in a position which is granted the authority of a peace officer by statute, unless the person has complied with the minimum employment standards prepared and published by the council pursuant to this section. Law enforcement officers employed before January 1, 1977, may continue their employment and

participate in training programs on a voluntary or assigned basis but failure to meet standards shall not be grounds for dismissal of or termination of employment. A law enforcement officer employed before January 1, 1977, who fails to meet the minimum employment standards established pursuant to this section and who voluntarily or involuntarily discontinues his work as a law enforcement officer may be employed with a law enforcement agency if that officer meets the requirements of subsection (1) (d) (iii).

The amounts annually appropriated by the legislature shall be paid by the state treasurer in accordance with the accounting laws of the state upon certification of the executive secretary of the council for the purpose of reimbursing an amount not to exceed the training costs incurred for each officer meeting the recruitment standards prescribed pursuant to this act during the period covered by the allocation, plus an amount not to exceed the necessary living expenses incurred by the officer which are necessitated by training requiring that he be away from his residence overnight. If the moneys in the law enforcement officers training fund to be appropriated by the legislature for the training and living expenses are insufficient to allocate the amount for training and living purposes, the amount shall be reduced proportionately. An allocation shall not be made to a training agency or to a city, county, township, or village or agency of the state which has not, throughout the period covered by the allocation, adhered to the standards established by the council as applicable to either training or personnel or both recruited or trained by the training agency, city, county, township, or village or agency of the state during this period.
