

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The Nebraska Uniform Crime Reporting Program

Introduction

The counterpart of the Nebraska Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program is the national UCR program, which is under the direction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). This national program is the result of a need for nation-wide and uniform compilation of law enforcement statistics. Uniform Crime Reports were first collected in 1930 after being developed by a committee of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). Today the IACP continues to serve in an advisory capacity to the FBI in its operation of the program. In 1966 the National Sheriffs' Association (NSA) established a Committee on Uniform Crime Records to serve in an advisory capacity to the national UCR program while actively encouraging sheriffs throughout the nation to participate in the program.

During the last several years, the direct collection of Uniform Crime Reports has been transferred to individual states. Currently 40 states have operational UCR programs. As in many states, Nebraska's UCR program will become a component of the criminal justice information system.

The Nebraska UCR Program

The Nebraska UCR program involves the compilation, classification and analysis of crime statistics reported by law enforcement agencies in the State in accordance with guides and regulations prescribed by law.

The statute creating the Nebraska UCR program is incorporated into the same statute which created the Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice, hereafter referred to as the Commission. The portion of this statute relating to UCR is reproduced below:

Nebraska Revised Statutes

Chapter 81-1425

"(6) collect, develop and maintain statistical information, records, and reports as the Commission may determine relevant to its functions."

Chapter 81-1426

"Public officers and agencies; information, records, reports; furnish to the Commission:

"(1) The Commission may obtain from all public officers or agencies whose functions include the control, apprehension, trial, or correction of criminal offenders in this state, such information, records, and reports as the Commission may determine relevant to its functions.

"(2) It shall be the duty of all public officers and agencies whose functions include the control, apprehension, trial, or correction of criminal offenders to provide such information, records, and reports as the Commission shall reasonably require."

Nebraska's UCR program became operational on January 1, 1971. Commencing on that date all crime statistics flow through one central agency, this Commission, before submission to the national UCR program. The State Patrol, all sheriffs' departments and all police departments of municipalities of 1,000 population and over are required to submit Uniform Crime Reports by the seventh day after the end of the month. All Uniform Crime Reports are verified and all mathematical computations are checked.

Any errors or questionable data are corrected by telephone contact with the agency in question. After verification and processing of data, a magnetic tape is built and submitted to the national UCR program.

This Commission publishes quarterly and annual reports based upon data submitted. The quality of these reports is hampered by agencies who have refused to participate in the UCR program and by those who have not reported for all months. In a state program such as this, data from all agencies is needed in order to portray crime in the state.

An area of concern in the UCR program is uniformity in reporting. The Nebraska UCR program utilizes the same offense classifications as the national program. The offense classifications are as follows:

Part I Offenses

- (1) Homicide-
 - (a) Murder—any unlawful killing of a human being in which the element of malice aforethought was present in the murder. Manslaughter—any unlawful killing of a human being without the element of malice aforethought,
 - (b) Death by Negligence—any death that occurs because of the negligence of some person other than the victim and that is not in the commission of an unlawful act.
- (2) Rape-
 - (a) Rape by Force—the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will, but excluding statutory rape and other sex offenses.
 - (b) Assault to Rape-all assaults and attempts to rape.
- (3) Robery—the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another against his will by violence or by putting him in fear. Robbery differs from larceny in that it is aggravated by the element of force.
 - (a) Armed Robbery-Any Weapon—when any object is so employed as to constitute force or the threat of

force, it will be considered a weapon. This would include firearms, knives, clubs, brass knuckles, black-jacks, broken bottles, acid, explosives, etc. Cases involving possible pretended weapons or cases involving weapons not seen by the victim but which the robber claims to have with him should be counted in this category.

- (b) Strong Arm-No Weapon—includes muggings and similar offenses when no weapon is used but strongarm tactics are employed to deprive the victim of his property. This is limited to hands, arms, fists, feet, etc. As in armed robbery, all attempts are included.
- (4) Assault—an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another. General Rule—all assaults will be classified in the following categories, exclusing assaults with intent to rob or rape.
 - (a) Gun-all assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of any type of firearm. This includes revolvers, automatic pistols, shotguns, zip guns, rifles, pellet guns, etc.
 - (b) Knife or Cutting Instrument—all assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of cutting or stabbing objects such as knives, razors, hatchets, axes, cleavers, scissors, glass, broken bottles, daggers, ice picks, etc.
 - (c) Other Dangerous Weapon—assaults or attempted assaults when any object other than a gun, knife or cutting instrument is used. This includes clubs, bricks, jack handles, bottles, explosives, acid, lye, poison, scalding water and cases of attempted drownings, burnings, etc.
 - (d) Hands, Fists, Feet, Etc. (Felony)—any assaults with hands, fists, feet, etc. which could result in a felony conviction. In order to be classified as a felony, the victim must suffer great bodily harm.
- (5) Burglary—any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, burglary with larceny is classified and scored only as burglary; the larceny is excluded. Breaking and entering of a motor vehicle is classified as larceny.
 - (a) Forcible Entry—all offenses where force of any kind is used to unlawfully enter a locked structure to commit a felony or with intent to steal something. This includes entry by use of a master key, celluloid or other device that leaves no outward mark but is used to open a lock. Concealment inside a building followed by breaking out of the structure should also be scored here.
 - (b) Unlawful Entry-No Force—no evidence of forcible entry.
 - (c) Attempted Forcible Entry—when determined that forcible entry has been attempted.
- (6) Larceny-Theft (Except Auto Theft)—the unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. This involves all larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket picking, purse snatching, shoplifting,

larceny from auto, larceny of auto parts and accessories, bicycle theft, larceny from buildings and larceny from any coin-operated machines. Any theft that is not a robbery or any theft that does not result from a breaking and entering will be scored here. Embezzlements, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are excluded.

(7) Motor Vehicle Theft—larceny or attempted larceny of automobiles. All thefts and attempted thefts of motor vehicles are included. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. Those incidents in which the alleged offender had lawful access to the vehicle as in a family situation or the unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle such as chauffeur, employee, etc. are excluded.

Part II Offenses

- (8) Other Assaults (Misdemeanor)—consists of all assaults and attempted assaults which are simple or minor in nature.
- (9) Arson-includes all arrests for violations of state laws and municipal ordinances relating to arson and attempted arson.
- (10) Forgery and Counterfeiting—all offenses dealing with the making, altering, uttering or possessing with intent to defraud anything false in the semblance of that which is true.
- (11) Fraud-fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretense. Includes bad checks, confidence games, etc.
- (12) Embezzlement—the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.
- (13) Stolen Property—all offenses of buying, receiving, possessing or concealing stolen property as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.
- (14) Vandalism-Destruction of Property— all willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control, by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth or any other such means as may be specified by law or ordinance.
- (15) Weapons—includes violations of weapon laws such as manufacture, sale or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons, and all attempts to commit any of the above offenses.
- (16) Prostitution and Commercialized Vice—include in this class the sex offenses of a commercialized nature such as prostitution; keeping bawdy house, disorderly house or house of ill repute; pandering, procuring, transporting or detaining women for immoral purposes, etc. and all attempts to commit any of the above.
- (17) Sex Offenses—includes all sex offenses other than forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. This encompasses offenses against chastity, common decency, morals and the like such as adultery and fornication, buggery,

incest, indecent exposure, sodomy, carnal abuse (no force) and all attempts to commit any of the above.

- (18) Drug Abuse Violations—statistics for these arrests are requested on the basis of the narcotics used. This includes all arrests for the violation of state and local ordinances, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing and making of narcotic drugs. Four divisions of narcotic drugs are recognized. These are
 - (a) opium and cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine),
 - (b) marijuana,
 - (c) synthetic narcotics which can cause true addiction (demerol, methadones) and
 - (d) other dangerous nonnarcotic drugs (barbituates, benzedrine).
- (19) Gambling— includes all charges relating to promoting, permitting or engaging in gambling. This classification is broken into three divisions:
 - (a) bookmaking (horse and sport book),
 - (b) numbers and lottery and
 - (c) all other gambling.
- (20) Offenses Against Family and Children—includes all charges of nonsupport, neglect or abuse of family and children such as desertion, abandonment or nonsupport, neglect or abuse of child, or nonpayment of alimony.
- (21) Driving Under the Influence— limited to driving or operating any vehicle while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotic drugs.
- (22) Liquor Laws— with the exception of drunkenness and driving under the influence, all state or local liquor law violations are placed in this class. Federal violations are not included. Include manufacturing, selling, transporting, furnishing as in maintaining unlawful drinking places, bootlegging, operating a still, furnishing liquor to a minor and using vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor.
- (23) Drunkenness-Intoxication— includes all offenses of drunkenness or intoxication with the exception of driving under the influence. This generally encompasses drunk and disorderly behavior and public intoxication.
- (24) Disorderly Conduct-Disturbing the Peace include all disorderly persons who can not be classified under offenses 1 through 23 or under offense 25.
- (25) Vagrancy include arrests for failure of an individual to give a good account of himself, begging, loitering, etc.
- (26) All Other Offenses include all violations of state and local laws not otherwise classified.
- (27) Suspicion limited to suspicion arrests when the persons arrested are released by the police.
- (28) Curfew and Loitering Law Violations (Juveniles) all arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.
- (29) Runaways (Juveniles) limited to juveniles taken into custody who have run away from the reporting jurisdiction.

Crime Factors

Statistics gathered under the Nebraska UCR Program are police statistics. The agencies report the offense and arrest data according to the standard offense classifications and not according to state statute or local ordinance. Offenses are related to municipality and county in which they occur, rather than to the agency which may investigate, arrest or otherwise dispose of the case. The clearance, in every case, is attributed to the municipality or county in which the offense occurred, even though the arresting agency may not be the department originally reporting the offense.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon many characteristics of the community, and therefore, when attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and the factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community. Below are some of the conditions which will by type and volume affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

Density and size of the community population and the

metropolitan area of which it is a part.

Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.

Economic status of the population.

Relative stability of population, including commuters, seasonal and other transient types.

Climate, including seasonal weather changes.

Educational, recreational and religious characteristics. Standards governing appointments to the police force. Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.

Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems.

The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

Caution should always be used when using the crime statistics presented herein, however, it should also be kept in mind that the data presented is the most accurate currently available. The law enforcement personnel who provide the data are to be commended for their efforts to provide accurate data. Without their sincere cooperation, this publication would not be possible. Crime is a social problem, and therefore, should be a concern of the entire community. We appreciate the law enforcement agencies participation in the UCR Program thereby permitting us to identify the extent of crime for the citizens of the State.

Nebraska Crime Trends, 1972-1976

Introduction

One of the purposes of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program is to measure the extent of crime in the State. The crime index offenses are used as the measuring tool. The crime index offenses are:

- 1. Murder, Manslaughter
- 2. Forcible Rape
- 3. Robbery
- 4. Felony Assault
- 5. Burglary
- 6. Larceny-Theft
- 7. Motor Vehicle Theft

There are various ways to present crime trends; in this publication we depict crime trends by population groups and by the offenses themselves. When an agency fails to report all twelve months of a year, an estimate is computed to arrive at a total for the year. If an agency failed to participate in the UCR Program any one year, they are excluded from any trend analysis.

The conditions affecting crime statistics which have been previously mentioned, should be kept in mind.

Crime and Population, 1972-1976

Crime reported during 1976 reflected a 38 percent increase over 1972. Nebraska's population has increased 1.8 percent over 1972. The crime rate per 1,000 population has increased 35 percent. For the first time since 1972, crime decreased when compared to the previous year. Crimes reported during 1976 decreased one percent over 1975.

An analysis of crime trends by population groups revealed that cities over 250,000 population (the City of Omaha) had a 16 percent increase over 1972, however, they reported a six percent decrease in 1976 over 1975. Cities of 100,000 to 250,000 population (the City of Lincoln) had a 45 percent increase over 1972. For the first time since 1972, they reported a decrease when crime decreased eight percent in 1976 over 1975.

Cities of 5,000 to 100,000 population had a 68 percent increase over 1972. Robbery had the greatest increase of 196 percent over 1972.

Cities under 5,000 population had a 45 percent increase over 1972. Felony assaults increased 203 percent over 1972.

Counties, which include the rural area and cities under 1,000 population, reflected a 61 percent increase over 1972. Felony assault increased 160 percent over 1972.

The State agencies which report offenses occurring on State property (the State Patrol and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln), had a 63 percent increase over 1972. Felony assault increased 475 percent over 1972.

Crime Index Offenses, 1972-1976

The crime index offenses reported during 1976 reflected a 38 percent increase over 1972. Larceny-theft has had the greatest increase, 51 percent, over 1972. Murder, manslaughter has increased 10 percent, forcible rape has increased 50 percent, robbery has increased 21 percent, felony assault has increased 21 percent, burglary has increased 25 percent and motor vehicle theft has decreased nine percent over 1972.

Several offenses have shown decreases in 1976 when compared to 1975. Murder, manslaughter decreased 28 percent, robbery decreased 30 percent and felony assault decreased 14 percent.

Percent of State's Total Crime by Population Groups, 1972-1976



Percent Change Over 1972



Murder, Manslaughter, 1972-1976




Figure 4 Forcible Rape, 1972-1976

Percent Change Over 1972




Figure 5 **Robbery, 1972-1976**

Percent Change Over 1972




Figure 6 Felony Assault, 1972-1976




Figure 7 **Burglary, 1972-1976**





Figure 8 Larceny-Theft, 1972-1976

Offense Data, 1976

This section contains a detailed analysis of the index offenses reported to the Commission by law enforcement agencies. Throughout this section, crime rates and clearances are given. The crime rate is the number of offenses per 1,000 population. To compute the crime rate, divide the population by 1,000 and divide the number of offenses by that answer. The 1976 estimated population for Nebraska is 1,553,000 as provided by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Clearances

For UCR purposes, an offense can be cleared by arrest or by exceptional means. An offense is cleared by arrest when the offender is identified, there is enough evidence to charge him and he is actually taken into custody. The arrest of one person can clear several offenses and several persons may clear one offense.

An offense may be exceptionally cleared when it falls into one of the following categories:

- 1. The offender commits suicide.
- 2. A double murder occurs (two persons kill each other).
- The offender dies after making a confession.
- 4. The offender is killed by a law enforcement officer.
- 5. The offender confesses to committing the crime while already in custody for another crime or serving a sentence.
- The offender is prosecuted in another city for a different crime by federal, state or local authorities, or for the same offense, and the other jurisdiction refuses to release the offender.
- 7. Another jurisdiction refuses to extradite the offender.
- 8. The victim of a crime refuses to cooperate in the prosecution.
- The offender is prosecuted for a less serious charge than the one for which he was arrested.
- The offender is a juvenile who is handled by a verbal or written notice to the parents in instances involving minor offenses such as petit larceny.

Volume

A total of 54,662 index offenses were reported or known to law enforcement agencies in 1976. The violent crimes of murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and felony assault accounted for six percent of the total offenses. The property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft accounted for 94 percent of the total offenses.

Felony assault accounted for 58.9 percent of the violent crimes and larceny-theft accounted for 72.6 percent of the crimes against property. Larceny-theft was the most frequently reported of all crimes, accounting for 68.3 percent of the total offenses.

Crime Rates

Based on an estimated population of 1,553,000, the crime rate was 35.2 in 1976. The crime rate for violent crimes was 2.09 per 1,000 population. The crime rate for crimes against property was 33.1 per 1,000 population. There were 24 larcenythefts per 1,000 population in 1976.

Clearances

A total of 13,094 index offenses were reported cleared during 1976, a clearance rate of 24.0 percent. Murder, manslaughter had the greatest percentage of offenses cleared, 95.7 percent. Violent crimes had a clearance rate of 64 percent. Crimes against property had a clearance rate of 21.4 percent.

When comparing the number of clearances with the number of offenses reported during the year, it was noted that a larger percentage of violent crimes are cleared than property crimes. This can be attributed to the fact that there are more property crimes to be solved and police investigations of violent crimes are usually more intense. The element of confrontation between the victim and the perpetrator, as well as witness identification of the perpetrator, contributes to the higher rate of clearance.



Murder, Manslaughter

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being in which the element of malice aforethought was present. Manslaughter is defined as any unlawful killing of a human being without the element of malice aforethought. Suicides, accidental deaths and justifiable or excusable homicides are excluded.

Volume and Rate

During the calendar year 1976, a total of 46 murders were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Murder, manslaughter accounted for 1.4 percent of all violent crimes (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and felony assault) and one-tenth of one percent of all Index Offenses. In 1976, there were .03 murders per 1,000 population.

Murder, Manslaughter Analysis

In all cases of murder, manslaughter reported under the UCR Program, a supplementary report is submitted by the reporting agency. The supplementary report provides the age, sex and race of the victim(s) and offender(s), weapon used to commit the offense, relationship of the victim to the offender, and circumstances or motive leading to the crime.

The frequency of murder during 1976 was highest in the month of February, when 9 murders occurred. Only one murder was reported in January.

In 1976, male murder victims accounted for 73.9 percent of the total murder victims, with 50 percent of those being in the age group of 18-29. Female murder victims accounted for 26 percent of the total murder victims, and 58.3 percent of those were in the age group of 30-39. Victim analysis by race disclosed that 58.7 percent were White and 30.4 percent were Negro, and 10.9 percent were Indian.

Of the 44 known perpetrators, males accounted for 84.1 percent and 50 percent of those were in the age group of 18-29. Female perpetrators accounted for 15.9 percent, and 42.9 percent of those were in the age group of 30-39. White perpetrators accounted for 50.0 percent of the perpetrators, Negroes accounted for 47.7 percent and Indians accounted for 2.3 percent.

Most murders, 78.3 percent, were committed by a relative or acquaintance of the victim. A further breakdown indicated that 50.0 percent were committed by an acquaintance; 28.3 percent were committed by a relative; 13.0 percent were committed by strangers and 9.0 percent no relationship could be established.

A total of 44 murder, mansluaghters was cleared in 1976. Handguns were used in 47.8 percent of the murders and a knife or other cutting instrument was used in 15.2 percent.





Forcible Rape

Forcible Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

Volume and Rate

During 1976, enforcement agencies in Nebraska reported a total of 317 forcible rapes. Forcible rape accounted for 9.7 percent of all violent crimes (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and felony assault) and 0.6 percent of all Index Offenses. In 1976, there were 0.2 rapes per 1,000 population. Since forcible rape is a crime against the female population, the crime rate is 0.4 per 1,000 female population.

Analysis of Forcible Rape

Rape by force accounted for 71.6 percent of all forcible rapes and 28.4 percent were attempts to rape.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for forcible rape, 17.2 percent, occurred within the 25-29 age group. Juvenile arrests accounted for 17.2 percent of all persons arrested for forcible rape.

Of all persons arrested for forcible rape, 63.2 percent were White, 32.2 percent were Negro, 2.9 percent were Indian and 1.7 percent were of other races. A total of 212 forcible rapes, 66.9 percent, were cleared during 1976.

Rape Circumstances

Law enforcement agencies are asked to submit a supplementary report on the circumstances surrounding any rape by force and attempt to rape. Supplementary reports were received on 123 cases; the Omaha P.D. did not submit any supplementary reports. Victims under the age of 25 accounted for 78.4 percent of the total victims. Of those victims under the age of 25, 49 percent were between 18 and 24, and 51 percent were under the age of 18. The greatest percentage of victims were attacked by an acquaintance in either a car, residence or in the country, 20.8 percent. Relatives were responsible for the attack in 12.8 percent of the incidents. In 14 incidents, there was more than one perpetrator involved.



Robbery

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. Robbery takes place in the presence of the victim. The victim, who usually is the owner or person having custody of the property is directly confronted by the perpetrator and is threatened with force or fear that force will be used. Robberies are reported in the following categories: firearm, knife or cutting instrument, other dangerous weapon and strongarm - no weapon.

Volume and Rate

During the calendar year 1976, a total of 973 robberies were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Robbery accounted for 30.0 percent of all violent crimes (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and felony assault) and 1.8 percent of all Index Offenses. In 1976, there were 0.63 robberies per 1,000 population.

Analysis of Robbery

A firearm was used in 42.9 percent of all robberies, a knife or other cutting instrument was used in 10.5 percent, other dangerous weapons were used in 6.7 percent and strong arm tactics were used in 40.0 percent of all robberies.

Of all robberies, 44.7 percent occurred on streets, highways, alleys, etc. Robbery of a commercial house accounted for 17.8 percent and the robbery of a person in his home accounted for 14.5 percent of all robberies.

The age group of 17 accounted for the highest percentage, 13.7 percent, of all persons arrested for robbery. The arrest of males accounted for 91.2 percent of all arrests for robbery.

Of all persons arrested for robbery, 42.9 percent were White, 52.5 percent were Negro, 3.6 percent were Indian and one percent were of other races.

A total of 360 robberies, 37.0 percent, were cleared by law enforcement agencies in 1976.





Felony Assault

B

Felony assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. Felony assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily injury.

Volume and Rate

During calendar year 1976, there were 1,917 felony assaults reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Felony assault accounted for 58.9 percent of all violent crimes (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and felony assault) and 3.5 percent of all Index Offenses. In 1976, there were 1.23 robberies per 1,000 population. A total of 1,465 robberies, 76.4 percent, was cleared in 1976.

Analysis of Felony Assault

A firearm was used in 30.1 percent of all felony assaults and hands, fists and feet were used in 25.5 percent. The use of a knife accounted for 22.7 percent and the use of other dangerous weapons accounted for 21.7 percent of all felony assaults.

The age group of 25-29 accounted for the highest percentage of persons arrested for felony assaults, 16.7 percent. Arrests of males for felony assaults accounted for 87 percent of all arrests for felony assault.

Of all arrests for felony assault, 65.8 percent were White, 25.2 percent were Negro, 8.5 percent were Indian and 0.5 percent were of other races.

During 1976, agencies provided victim/offender relationships on each assault reported, including misdemeanor assaults. The assault would be categorized as either relationship established or stranger-to-stranger. Victim/offender relationships were received on 2,192 assaults. The victim of an assault knew the perpetrator in 70.5 percent of the incidents, and did not know the perpetrator in 29.5 percent of the incidents.

by Month-1976




Burglary

Burglary is defined as any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Burglary is divided into three categories: forcible entry, unlawful entry - no force, and attempted forcible entry.

Volume and Rate

During calendar year 1976, a total of 10,472 burglaries were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Burglary accounted for 20.4 percent of all crimes against property (burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) and 19.2 percent of all Index Offenses. In 1976, there were 6.74 burglaries per 1,000 population. A total of 2,042 burglaries, 19.5 percent, was cleared.

Analysis of Burglary

Of all burglaries, 68.3 percent were the result of forcible entries and 27.3 percent were unlawful entries with no force used to enter the structure. Attempted burglaries accounted for 4.4 percent of the total reported burglaries.

Of all reported burglaries, 60.2 percent involved residences and 39.8 percent involved non-residences. Of the residential burglaries, 38.4 percent occurred during the night, 26.3 percent occurred during the day and the time was unknown in 35.4 percent. Non-residential burglaries occurred most frequently during the night, 68.6 percent, the time of entry was unknown in 25.7 percent and entries during the day accounted for 5.7 percent.

The age group of 13-14 accounted for the highest percentage of persons arrested for burglary, 16 percent. Male arrests accounted for 95 percent of all arrests for burglary and juveniles accounted for 54.6 percent.

Of all persons arrested for burglary, 77.8 percent were White, 18.3 percent were Negro, 3.6 percent were Indian and 0.4 percent were of other races.





Larceny-Theft

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. Larceny-theft as an Index Offense includes larcenies under \$50 in value.

Volume and Rate

During calendar year 1976, a total of 37,341 larceny-thefts were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Larceny-theft accounted for 72.6 percent of all crimes against property (burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) and 68.3 percent of all Index Offenses. In 1976, there were 24 larceny-thefts per 1,000 population. A total of 8,054 larceny-thefts, 21.6 percent, was cleared in 1976.

Analysis of Larceny-Theft

Of the total larcenies reported, 43 percent were under \$50 in value, 40 percent were \$50-\$200 in value and 17 percent were over \$200 in value. The theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories accounted for 23.6 percent of all thefts. Thefts from motor vehicles, other than parts and accessories accounted for 18 percent of all thefts.

The age group of 13-14 accounted for the highest percentage of persons arrested for larceny-theft, 13.5 percent. Male arrests accounted for 64.4 percent of all larceny-theft arrests and juveniles accounted for 49.5 percent.

Of all persons arrested for larceny-theft, 76.1 percent were White, 20.8 percent were Negro, 2.4 percent were Indian and 0.7 percent were of other races.



Motor Vehicle Theft

Motor vehicle theft is defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. Thefts of farm equipment, bulldozers, airplanes and construction equipment are not included in the definition of a motor vehicle. Motor vehicle theft is divided into the following categories: autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles.

Volume and Rate

During calendar year 1976, 3,596 motor vehicle thefts were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Motor vehicle theft accounted for seven percent of all crimes against property (burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) and 6.6 percent of all Index Offenses. In 1976, there were 2.32 motor vehicle thefts per 1,000 population. A total of 917 motor vehicle thefts was cleared during 1976.

Analysis of Motor Vehicle Theft

During 1976, law enforcement agencies provided additional information regarding types of motor vehicles stolen. The agencies reported that 2,514 autos, 455 trucks and buses and 627 other vehicles were stolen.

During 1976, 2,735 motor vehicles were recovered; 81.1 percent were recovered within the same jurisdiction where they were stolen, 18.9 percent were recovered in another jurisdiction.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 15.4 percent, occurred in the age group of 13-14. Male arrests accounted for 92 percent of all motor vehicle theft arrests and juveniles accounted for 55 percent.





Arrest Data, 1976

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requires the reporting agencies to report monthly the number of arrests made for offenses which occurred in their jurisdiction. The arresting agency does not report an arrest if it was made for a violation in another jurisdiction. The reporting agencies are required to report State Patrol arrests in their jurisdictions.

A person is scored only once each time arrested, which means if a person is arrested and is wanted for several crimes, he would be scored only once for the most serious offense. Several persons may be arrested in connection with one offense and each person is counted as an arrest.

Volume and Rate

Law enforcement agencies in Nebraska reported 57,142 arrests in 1976 for Part I and Part II offenses. This represents an 0.5 percent decrease over 1975 arrests. There were 36.8 arrests per 1,000 persons in Nebraska in 1976 as compared with 37.1 arrests per 1,000 persons in 1975.

Arrests for Part I offenses accounted for 20.9 percent of the total arrests. Of the arrests for Part I offenses, larceny-theft accounted for the greatest portion of the arrests, 63.7 percent. The highest percentage of arrests for Part II offenses were for drunkenness, intoxication.

During 1976, arrests for crimes of violence (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and felony assault) accounted for 11.8 percent of all arrests for Part I offenses and 2.5 percent of the total arrests.

Arrests for crimes against property (burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) accounted for 88.0 percent of all arrests for Part I offenses and 18.4 percent of the total arrests.

Arrests for Part I offenses increased 0.2 percent over arrests for Part I offenses in 1975. Death by Negligence arrests showed the greatest increase of 90.9 percent. Arrests for murder, manslaughter, robbery and burglary all decreased over 1975.

Arrests for Part II offenses decreased 0.7 percent over 1975 arrests for Part II offenses. Arrests for curfew and loitering laws increased 41.2 percent over 1975.

Arrests by Age

The number of persons under the age of 18 (juveniles) arrested during 1976 decreased six percent over 1975. Arrests of juveniles for Part I offenses also decreased eight percent over 1975. The arrests of persons age 18 and over (adults) increased two percent over 1975. Adult arrests for Part I offenses increased nine percent over 1975.

Of the arrests for the index offenses (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, felony assault, burglary, larceny-theft and

motor vehicle theft), 78.8 percent were under the age of 25, and of those, 47.6 percent were under the age of 18. The age group of 13-14 accounted for the greatest number of arrests in any age group for the index offenses.

The arrests of persons under the age of 25 accounted for the following percentages of the total arrests for each index offense: murder, manslaughter, 29.4; forcible rape, 57.5; robbery, 78.8; felony assault, 53.9; burglary, 89.3; larceny-theft, 78.5; and motor vehicle theft, 86.0 percent.

Of those arrests for index offenses involving persons under the age of 25, persons under the age of 18 accounted for 13.3 percent for murder, manslaughter; 30 percent for forcible rape; 51.8 percent for robbery; 31;8 percent for felony assault; 61.1 percent for burglary; 63.0 percent for larceny-theft and 64.0 percent for motor vehicle theft.

Arrests by Sex

In 1976, males accounted for 82.9 percent of all arrests. Males accounted for 74.6 percent of the arrests for Part I offenses and 85.1 percent of all arrests for Part II offenses. Total male arrests decreased one percent over 1975 and female arrests increased one percent. Male arrests for Part I offenses increased two percent over 1975 and female arrests decreased three percent. Male arrests for Part II offenses decreased one percent and female arrests increased three percent.

Females were arrested for larceny-theft more times than any other offense. The greatest number of male arrests were recorded for drunkenness-intoxication.

Arrests by Race

A distribution analysis of total arrests by race for the year 1976 indicates 80.4 percent of all arrests were White, 11.8 percent were Negro, 7.0 percent were Indian and 0.8 percent were of other races. The arrest involvement by race for the index offenses revealed that 74.5 percent were White, 21.6 percent were Negro, 3.3 percent were Indian and 0.6 percent were of other races.

An analysis of arrests by race for crimes of violence (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and felony assault) revealed that 58.4 percent were White, 34.6 percent were Negro, 6.2 percent were Indian and 0.8 percent were of other races.

An analysis of arrests by race for crimes against property (burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) revealed that 76.6 percent were White, 19.8 percent were Negro, 3.0 percent were Indian and 0.6 percent were of other races.

An analysis of arrests by race for Part II offenses revealed that 82.0 percent were White, 9,2 percent were Negro, 8.0 percent were Indian and 0.8 percent were of other races.

Percent of Adult-Juvenile Involvement in Total Index Offenses Based Upon Arrest Data



Dispositions of Persons Handled by Police

During 1976, law enforcement agencies charged 94.1 percent of all persons handled. "Adults charged" accounted for 97.8 percent of the total adult arrests and "juveniles charged" accounted for 82.8 percent of all juvenile arrests. Persons handled within the department accounted for 5.3 percent of the total arrests. Juveniles referred to a welfare agency accounted for 0.5 percent of the total juvenile arrests. Persons referred to another police agency accounted for 0.6 percent of the total arrests.

In 1976, law enforcement agencies voluntarily submitted dispositions on these persons charged by them. A total of 93 agencies provided disposition data on 24,641 persons charged.

A total of 2,458 juveniles (persons under 18) were referred to juvenile court and 2,136 juveniles were referred to criminal or adult court. Of those adults and juveniles processed through adult court, 62.6 percent were guilty of the offense charged, 4.4 percent were guilty of a lesser offense, 13.7 percent were acquitted or otherwise dismissed and 19.2 were pending prosecution at the end of 1976.

Law Enforcement Employee Data

The Nebraska UCR Program collects data pertaining to law enforcement personnel on an annual basis. Law enforcement agencies are surveyed each year as to the number of full-time personnel employed, the number of sworn personnel by sex, and the number of civilian employees by sex.

As of October 31, 1976, there were 2,672 persons employed full-time in 190 law enforcement agencies, excluding the 474 employed by the State Patrol and the 49 employed by the University of Nebraska — Lincoln. These 2,672 employees represented an average of 1.7 persons for every 1,000 persons in the State. Of the full-time employees, 2,007 were sworn personnel, which represented an average of 1.3 persons per 1,000 population. Civilian personnel accounted for 24.9 percent of the total full-time employees, and represented an average of 0.4 persons per 1,000 population.

Female personnel accounted for 2.5 percent of the total sworn personnel and 70 percent of the civilian personnel.

County Sheriff's Departments

As of October 31, 1976, a total of 767 persons were employed in 89 sheriff's departments, representing 1.5 persons per 1,000 population. Sworn personnel accounted for 67.8 percent of the total employees. Civilian personnel accounted for 32.1 percent of the total employees. Female personnel accounted for four percent of the total sworn personnel and 65.5 percent of the total civilian personnel.

Municipal Police Departments

As of October 31, 1976, a total of 1,903 persons were employed full-time by 101 municipal law enforcement agencies. Sworn personnel accounted for 78.1 percent of the total number employed. Females accounted for 2.2 percent of the sworn personnel. Civilians accounted for 21.9 percent of the total employed. Females accounted for 73.3 percent of the civilian personnel.

Nebraska State Patrol

As of October 31, 1976, a total of 474 persons were employed full-time by the Nebraska State Patrol. Sworn personnel accounted for 77.4 percent of the total employed. Females accounted for 35.5 percent of the civilian force.

The Campus Police of the University of Nebraska — Lincoln had a full-time force of 49 persons as of October 31, 1976. Sworn personnel accounted for 85.7 percent and civilians accounted for 14.3 percent. Females accounted for 20.4 percent of the total full-time personnel.

Assaults on Law Enforcement Officers

The Nebraska UCR Program also collects data on law enforcement officers assaulted. During 1976, there were a total of 286 assaults on law enforcement officers. There were 215 assaults on municipal officers, 51 assaults on officers of county sheriff's departments, 12 assaults on State patrolmen, and one assault on an officer of the Campus Police of the University of Nebraska — Lincoln.

Most of the assaults, 38.5 percent, occurred while responding to disturbance calls and 18.2 percent occurred while attempting to make an arrest. The officer was assaulted with hands, fists or feet in 78 percent of the assaults and 42.6 percent of those assaults resulted in injury to the officer. A total of 275 assaults on police officers, 96.5 percent, were cleared during 1976.


