Abstract: Liliha House was designed to serve as a crisis-intervention center for adult males. The primary target groups were adult ex-offenders including those released from Hawaii State Prison, the Honolulu City Jail, and those on probation. Other men in need of short term care were also served. The goal of the program was to provide residents of Liliha House a chance to find new and constructive means to re-adjust to the community. Food, shelter, job assistance, and counseling were provided in the hope that each resident would be able to adjust in the community after leaving the program. This report focuses on the program as it functioned under the contingency management approach beginning in July, 1972. An attempt is made to outline the theoretical framework and rationale for the program especially the contingency management model. The report also includes a discussion of the behaviors of the residents as they relate to achieving the program objectives, the relationships between variables, and finally, recommendations for program improvement.

Abstract: The purpose of this study was to identify variables which are predictive of parole outcome. The population consisted of 92 men who had been residents of the Adult Furlough Center, a short-term pre-parole program. Data were collected from prison, Adult Furlough Center, and parole records. Data analyses were done using factorial and multiple regression techniques, and chi square statistics. It was found that the ability to maintain employment on parole was the single variable most predictive of parole success. The second most important variable was performance in the Adult Furlough Center program, in which one of the main goals was to establish employment prior to going on parole. These findings were consistent with those of studies done elsewhere. Additionally, it appears that the population studied is similar to other prison and parole populations in being characterized by employment problems.

Abstract: The purpose of this project evaluation is to provide program administrators with data useful in making critical decisions concerning the M-2 Sponsor Program. The project evaluation started in April 1973 and was completed June 1976. The methodology used in this report included monitoring and describing the program and, in addition, included survey analysis for assessing ward and volunteer attitudes toward the M-2 Program, and a quasi-experimental design for evaluating impact of the M-2 Program on the clients. Emphasis is placed in this evaluation on exploring what types of M-2 wards succeed with what types of volunteers. The utility of the information produced for decision-makers lies not with the certainty of overall impact, but with the differential effects of success or failure on parole with certain types of juvenile offenders.

Abstract: Delinquency - habitual delinquency - is presently of major concern to virtually every American military activity. In 1964, almost 25,000 servicemen were discharged from the Armed Forces for reasons of unfitness. Many thousands more were involved in major offenses, court-martialled, and confined in military correctional institutions. The cost of these disciplinary proceedings is staggering - both in terms of dollars and loss of military operational effectiveness - and is increasing every year. With our present high emphasis on qualitative analysis, maximum utilization of resources and cost effectiveness within the Department of Defense, it would seem obvious that a whole-hearted effort should be made to reduce the high cost of military discipline. Abstract: Offender rehabilitation in Wisconsin's criminal justice system is explored. Recommendations are made with regard to: improvement of facilities; medical and psychological problems facing offenders; alternatives to incarceration and forms of confinement such as work release programs and probation and parole; and educational and vocational programs and social services available to enable the Wisconsin corrections program to provide meaningful rehabilitation. The Citizens Study Committee on Offender Rehabilitation was formed in 1971 and divided into 11 subcommittees which pertain to crime and their punishment. Abstract: The objectives of the project were to develop a classification system for assessing persons convicted of driving while intoxicated, identify short-term rehabilitation (STR) objectives for these people, review available treatment programs, and make recommendations of programs which can be used to help DWIs reach STR objectives. A classification system was designed which included assessment of the client's adaptability to inner conflict/stress, assessment of the forces affecting the client regarding drinking from his sociocultural environment, and the severity of the client's problem with alcohol. Using the classification system, a set of STR objectives are identified for a client. These objectives represent desirable changes in the client's behavior and the impact of his sociocultural environment. STR programs are recommended which should help a DWI to reach these objectives. These programs include some elements of treatment modalities which have been shown to be effective and appear relevant for use with DWIs. Abstract: This is a four part survey of the legal aspects of contract parole. PART I discusses the capacity of a prisoner to enter into a MAP contract. It suggests minimal due process requirements to insure that contract negotiations maximize equal bargaining power between the prisoner and the parole board, so a prisoner voluntarily enters into the contract. PART II deals with the eligibility standards established by a parole board for prisoners to qualify for MAP. It suggests standards which will satisfy the Equal Protection Clause and due process requirements for a prisoner if he is declared ineligible for MAP or if his proposed contract is not approved by the parole board. PART III is a discussion of the contract issued relative to a model MAP contract attached to the survey. The analysis considers the legality of the contract, undue influence and duress, the parties, the terms of the contract, standards of performance, third party dispute settlement, renegotiation, and notice and termination of the relationship. PART IV deals with the problems with contract performance under MAP including enforcement and termination of the contract. It discusses the levels of due process in the prison setting and suggests the procedures applicable to the contract parole setting. There is an attached Appendix which discusses an informal survey of states relative to receptivity to MAP.
