I hereby submit to your honorable body my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1977, giving the number of arrests made, a list of various violations, crimes and offenses committed, social conditions of prisoners, accident investigation summary, report of stolen property, miscellaneous work, department expenditures for the year, and other summaries.

The total number of arrests made and citations issued for the year was 36,739 for the following crimes and offenses which represents an increase of 4,753 arrests compared to 1976.



A "HANDSHAKE" PROJECT

In 1977 the Rockford Police Department initiated a "Fencing Operation" with the goal of recovering the stolen property of citizens and identifying the perpetrators. The approach was for undercover law enforcement agents to open a business establishment which would afford violators the opportunity to sell stolen property at well below the fair market value. Although the operation is not novel and has been implemented by other agencies, there was a unique feature that has added insight into the community of the Rockford area. Namely cooperation and a binding trust between the public and private sectors. A brief descriptive narrative will help clarify and bring the point into focus.

The need for such an operation was seen as a necessary law enforcement tool by police investigators, but due to budgetary constraints, the funding was not readily available. In addition, it was seen by administrators as a medium through which public and private energy could be harnessed in a joint effort. Knowing that the nation wide theme of 1977 for Kiwanis Clubs was "Crime Prevention", representatives of the Rockford Police Department met with the leaders of Rockford, Alpine and Rock Valley Clubs. At this meeting the outline of the project was explained and the minimum monetary cost established. The role of the Kiwanis Clubs would be to provide the support funds for the effort. However, in the attempts of leaders to solicit money from their respective clubs, they were requested not to divulge the details of the project except that it was "anti-burglary" in nature. A total of \$7,900. was collected by the Kiwanis on verbal trust. It thus lead to numerous arrests and tens of thousands of dollars worth of property recovered. Truly a "handshake" project based on trust and cooperation.

The following is a financial breakdown of the entire project:

\$7,900 was given by the three clubs

\$5,400 was given by Rockford Kiwanis Club equal 68% \$1,800 was given by Alpine Kiwanis Club equal 23% \$_700 was given by Rock Valley Kiwanis equal 9% \$7,900 100%

\$2,838.00 was realized from the sale unclaimed property recovered during the operation

166.67 was realized from Court Restitution \$3,004.67

At the end of the operation, \$753.67 remained in the account established to run the enterprise. The \$3,004.67 was added to this amount for a total of \$3,758.34 and under the auspicies of the city council was returned to the donating clubs on the following basis.

A total of \$2,555.68 was given to Rockford Kiwanis Club = 68% A total of 864.41 was given to Alpine Kiwanis Club = 23% A total of 338.25 was given to Rock Valley Kiwanis Club = 9% 100%

In 1977 the Communications Division of the Rockford Police Department came under the administrative control of the Governing Board of the Public Safety Building and operational control of the Winnebago County Sheriff. As a joint function it is now known as the Winnebago Public Safety Communications Center.

Their figures supplied to the Rockford Police Department, shows there were a total of 95,898 calls for service initiated by citizens or officer activity.

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#### YOUTH AND COMMUNITY SERVICES BUREAU

The Youth and Community Services Bureau of the Rockford Police Department is commanded by a Captain and is staffed with 3 Sergeants, 18 Detectives, 1 Patrol Officer, and 2 Clerk-Typist. The personnel of this Bureau are dedicated to establishing and maintaining communications and cooperation between the police department and the people of Rockford toward a common goal of prevention of criminal acts.

During 1977, officers of this bureau investigated 2703 assigned complaints and were able to successfully resolve 2076 which represents a clearance rate of 77% of cases assigned. This is in comparison with a rate of 90% clearance during 1975.

Ouring 1977 95 Juveniles were referred to the Juvenile Court, 346 Juveniles were counseled and released to the custody of their parents or guardians, and 67 Juveniles were referred to other agencies. Also 855 Juveniles were charged as delinquent children and 94 adults were arrested in juvenile connected cases.

Two officers ofthis bureau are assigned to work in the elementary schools of the city. They instruct the children in the duties of the police officer, pedestrian, safety, bicycle, safety, safety patrol activities, child molesting, and drug education.

During 1977 these officers made 320 visits to schools and appeared before classes attended by over 17,618 students. The officers also attended 256 special meetings with groups such as, the P.T.A. and Explorer Scouts. One of these officers supervised the 42 adult crossing guards in addition to his other duties.

One officer on a full time basis is assigned to Police Community Relations
The duties of this officer included meeting with and coordinating the efforts
of various people and groups in the city to promote a better understanding
of the functions of the police, and thus a better relationsship between the
public and the police.

The Crime Prevention Unit started into it's third year of operation on January 1, 1977. Through the combined efforts of all the Units' personnel, the department has gained the support of our citizens in promoting numerous anti-crime programs and projects.

#### YOUTH AND COMMUNITY SERVICES BUREAU continued

During the year the Crime Prevention Unit personnel made 58 presentations covering various subjects, and a total of 2,574 citizens attended these presentations. Also during 1977 a total of 118,568 pamphlets, cards, stickers, and flyers were distributed by the unit. There were also many radio, television, and billboard advertisements presented to the public by the unit, which covered various Crime Prevention themes.

Cases referred to this bureau reflected a property loss of \$12,954.77, and officers of this bureau were instrumental in the recovery of property valued at \$20,395.27 during their investigations.

The Victim/Witness Assistance Program of the Rockford Police Department, under the auspices of the Youth and Community Services Bureau, began operating October 20, 1977. Funded by C.E.T.A., this program is aimed primarily at serving senior citizens who have been victims or witnesses of crime. This unit will also provide assistance to individuals who have become involved with the Rockford Police Department as a result of non-criminal matters. These people may need a referral to another agency, transportation to court, information regarding the criminal justice system, emotional support, or a variety of other needs. When the officer becomes aware of a citizen with a need, he will make every effort to assure that the need is met through proper assessment, referral, and follow-up. This program should further integrate the Rockford Police Department with the community for the purpose of common goals.

#### TRAINING AND PERSONNEL DIVISION

The authorized strength of the Rockford Police Department was 268 at the start of 1977, and 267 at the end of the year. We started the year with 259 officers and ended the year with 255. During the year, we had 9 resignations and 4 retirements.

The basic goal of the Training and Personnel Division is to provide all police personnel through formal training, with the appropriate skills, knowledge and attitudes to effectively carry out the police mission of enforcing the law, maintaining order, preventing crime and providing for the safety and security of all our citizens.

During 1977 a total of 14,406 hours were spent in training by employees of the department, which is an average of 53.95 hours per employee. This does not include instructors time, time spent by recruits with a Field Training Officer, or training given to members of the Rockford Auxiliary Police, Police Explorer Post or other agencies.

The Auxiliary Police Unit, which is supervised by this division, volunteered 6,726½ man hours in both training and work type situations during 1977.

The department received \$10,923.98 in reimbursements for training from the State of Illinois during 1977.

The Training and Personnel Division also conducted training sessions and special programs for other police agencies, civic groups, etc.. The division has also been involved with the F.B.I. Training Committee, helped organize the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Directors Association, P.T.I. Curriculum Committee, Rock Valley College Advisory Board and worked with NILEC to coordinate training in this region.

This division has also been involved in testing and monitoring tests administered by the Fire and Police Commission and participated in the entrance and promotional examinations given by other agencies.

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
