Born: September 28, 1880

Entered the Cincinnati Police Division as a Sub-Patrolman on January 17, 1905.

Appointed as a full-time Patrolman on August 15, 1905.

Promoted to Corporal on August 1, 1912.

Elevated to Lieutenant on January 15, 1915.

Raised to Lieutenant of Detectives on May 15, 1915.

Promoted to Major, assigned as District Superintendent on February 16, 1928.

Assigned as Police Inspector on February 17, 1938.

Retired on February 16, 1946.

During his 41 years of service, Major Seebohm was assigned to various units, including a period as a horse mounted patrol officer.

During prohibition days, Major Seebohm commanded a twelve man "Flying Squad" with the responsibility of enforcing the Volstead Act. During this period, the unit set a record for arrests and convictions that was recognized nationally.

Following retirement, he retained an active interest in policing and the Cincinnati Police Division and marched in nearly all of the police memorial day parades.

Major Seebohm officially ended his career in 1946, however, he was a familiar sight around the Police Division until his death on November 2, 1977.

Sir:

The Annual Report of the Cincinnati Police Division for the year 1977 is herewith submitted. This report provides a summary of the Division's activities and accomplishments.

For the second consecutive year, efforts of the Division to reduce criminal offenses netted a decrease of 4.58% in major crime.

Major crime is categorized by the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (U.C.R.) system into Index and Non-Index Crime. The Index classification consists of Murder, Non-Negligent Manslaughter, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny and Auto Thefts.

Index Crimes totaled 29,907 in 1977 for a net decrease of 1,439 from the 1976 total of 31,346, or a decrease of 4.59%. Part I Non-Index Offenses (Negligent Manslaughter) increased from 17 to 20, 17.64% over the previous year.

The most significant increase occurred in Murders with 74, a 32.14% jump over 1976. Increases were also shown in Rape offenses with 10.27%, Robberies with 6.36%, and Auto Thefts with 3.94%. Decreases occurred in Aggravated Assaults with -10.58%, Burglary with -2.07%, and Larcenies with -7.46%.

Total criminal arrests for 1977 Part I and Part II offenses decreased 11.16% compared to 1976. Part I arrests dropped 13.42% and Part II decreased 10.43%.

There were 30,475 vehicular crashes in 1977 as compared to 28,911 in 1976, and increase of 1,564. 54 persons were killed as a result of 53 accidents, 19 of the fatalities were pedestrians. This was an increase of 2 fatalities from 1976. Persons injured in 1977 vehicular accidents totaled 6,577, an increase of 345 from the previous year.

On January 30, 1977, the Police Division expanded to city-wide team policing operation. Districts one, Three and Five were reduced to three sectors and Districts Two and Four were divided into sectors. All five districts now operate under the team policing concept with each having three sectors.

The goals of the team policing program are to develop in citizens a sense of trust and close identity with the police, improve citizen cooperation in crime prevention, develop a proprietary interest in the police for the safety and welfare of the people they serve, improve police understanding and sensitivity to the people they serve, reduce the current level of criminal victimization, and maintain departmental, citizen and media support.

Funds were appropriated for the remodeling and enlarging of the District Two facility. Construction is expected to begin in mid-1978.

The Operations Bureau is designed to deliver the primary police services, both uniform and investigative. The Bureau is commanded by an Assistant Police Chief and consists of five Police Captains who function as Officers of the Day, the five Police Districts, Criminal Investigation Section, and Traffic Section. Nearly 83% of all sworn police personnel are assigned to this Bureau.

The position of Officer of the Day was staffed 24 hours per day by one of five Captains who possess line authority over all operations units. These officers represented the Chief of Police and functioned accordingly. They handled exceptional incidents in a line capacity up to the limits of their resources.

The Criminal Investigation Section is responsible for the investigation of selected Index and Part II offenses. The section consists of a Homicide Squad, Robbery Squad, Document Squad and Youth Aid Squad.

During 1977, 74 homicides were recorded in the City of Cincinnati. This was an increase of 18 over 1976, or an increase of 32.14%. The overall clearance rate for homicide offenses was 86.49%.

The Crime Prevention Coordinator, a new position in the Operations Bureau in 1977, was responsible for the overall crime prevention activities of the Division.

On April 21, 1977, the Loftin-Lally House, 1330 Clay Street, a half-way house, was dedicated in honor of slain officers, William Loftin and Sergeant Robert Lally.

The Operations Bureau was responsible for the discharge of police services for numerous special events in 1977. Operations Bureau provided personnel for numerous parades in the downtown area, including St. Patrick's Day, Veterans' Day, and several other parades.

The Operations Bureau provided security details for one Vice Presidential and three other dignitary visits. The dedications of the I-471 Bridge and Government Square were attended by political dignitaries.

S.W.A.T. teams, Special Weapons and Tactics, were called out on three occasions during 1977. Successful results were achieved in every instance. Particular praise was accorded the SWAT teams and the Division for their efforts at a two day hostage situation on February 11, 1977, at Catherine Booth Hospital, 3595 Washington Avenue.

On September 18, 1977, the Division recalled 23 police officers from the laid-off list of December, 1976. The 23 officers were re-assigned to the Operations Bureau to replace officers lost through retirement and resignations.

The Operations Bureau personnel were involved in policing two major strikes by public employees. The Cincinnati teachers went on strike April 13, 1977, through May 6, 1977, and the Queen City Metro bus drivers also went on strike on December 8 until December 30, 1977. Both strikes required additional attention; however, neither experienced any major incidents.

In April of this year, the Central Vice Control Section, the Intelligence Section and the Regional Enforcement Narcotics Unit were placed under the newly formed Organized Crime Bureau. This reorganization is intended to provide coordination of Division efforts directed toward control of street and commercialized vice activity, illegal narcotics trafficking, racketeering and other organized criminal operations.

The Central Vice Control Section actively engaged in all areas of vice enforcement and attained a high degree of success in controlling street prostitution. This enforcement program was achieved

through active coordination and cooperation of Operations Bureau and Vice Control Section personnel. Police efforts were enhanced by a series of articles published by the "Cincinnati Enquirer" which focused community attention on the nature and extent of the prostitution problem and the obstacles which have affected enforcement efforts.

The Intelligence Section continued to monitor influences of organized crime and potential dangers of illegality to the community.

The Regional Enforcement Narcotics Unit, a federally funded strike force composed of City and County officers, continued as a major drug enforcement arm for the Greater Cincinnati Area. In 1977, R.E.N.U. investigations resulted in drug seizures amounting to two and a half million dollars and the arrest and prosecution of nearly 276 drug violations.

During 1977, the Program Management Bureau was composed of the Research and Planning, Fiscal and Budget, Property Management, and Transportation Sections. In addition to these Sections, the Cincinnati Institute of Justice, a contract agency of the Safety Department, was also assigned some of the activities of the Bureau.

The Research and Planning Section completed a feasibility study of Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) for the Division's communications system. In late 1977, this Section revised the Offense Report to include information about "battered women" at the request of City Council. The training program for "Model Rules for Law Enforcement" was also developed by this Section.

An additional responsibility of the Research and Planning Section was the preparation and support of grant programs for the Police Division. This function brought the Division approximately \$114,000 in new LEAA funds. This Section also acted in concert with the Fiscal and Budgetary Section as an "administrative pass through agency" for grants of non-city organizations. "Pass Through" grants amounted to \$540,000. Funds in excess of \$200,000 were obtained from the Ohio Department of Transportation to support the traffic oriented Selective Enforcement Program (SEP) and the purchase of new radar equipment.

The Operations Analysis Unit, formerly of the Operations Bureau, was absorbed by the Research and Planning Section.

For the second year, the Fiscal and Budget Section played a major role in the preparation of the Annual Program Budget of the Division. This Section coordinated the activities of the other units of the Division in preparing the Program Budget, and compiled the final document for the Division.

In the beginning of 1977, the Fiscal and Budget Section initiated a routine audit of district "Pursuit of Criminal" funds to insure uniformity in the accounting of funds used for this purpose.

During 1977, the Property Management Section implemented a refined inventory system designed to reflect consumable supplies on hand

and provide increased accountability for supply usage.

The move of the main Police Property Room from the 5th floor to new quarters on the lower level of the Alms and Doepke Building was undertaken during 1977. Additional space allowed the consolidation of property from City Hall and the Court Street Firehouse in this one location.

The responsibilities of the Transportation Section consisted of (1) coordination of assignment and repair of the Police Automotive Fleet and (2) the Impounding Lot operation, which processed all vehicles towed in the Police Division.

As an economy measure during 1977 the police vehicle fleet was reduced by fifty-four unmarked passenger vehicles. Reduced budget allotments also resulted in withdrawal of most vehicle take home privileges. Planning for new decals to identify marked vehicles in the police fleet was undertaken during 1977. The new decals will be used exclusively for the Police Division on all new cars received during 1978 and thereafter.

The fleet travelled 5,915,910 miles during 1977, a decrease of 1,267,779 miles, when compared to 7,183,689 during 1976. The accident ratio (accidents per 100,000 miles driven) increased from 4.98 to 6.72.

Phasing out city owned wreckers used to tow impounded vehicles began on May 15, 1977. Private sector wreckers took over the total task on September 3, 1977. One city wrecker will remain at the Impoundment Lot to move and position vehicles inside the lot, tow vehicles to court, etc. Planning for new fee schedules, revised city ordinances, and wrecker rules was initiated and planned for implementation in early 1978.

A total of 8,737 vehicles were impounded for various reasons during 1977. Monies realized for impoundment fees, sale of unclaimed vehicles and sale of junked vehicles amounted to \$305,354.30. Difficulty in obtaining legal papers necessary for vehicle disposal from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles resulted in limited towing on several occasions.

The Cincinnati Institute of Justice, whose staff included several police officers detailed to that agency, performed work in the areas of policy analyses, and program assessment and development of new projects.

Specifically, the police assigned the Institute served as liaison with the community's alcoholic detoxification center, assessed the Division's stationhouse release procedure and analyzed how emergency medical services are provided by police and fire personnel.

In addition, Institute staff in conjunction with Division management helped implement police performance measurement tests dealing with conflict resolution and administrative support. Assistance also was provided in the preparation of performance measures in the Division's program budget.

Institute staff also performed special analyses related to the development of a major offender program scheduled to begin in mid-1978. This program is being designed to better coordinate and focus police and prosecutorial resources on cases which involve the habitual offender or "career criminal."

The Technical Services Bureau consists of the Police Records Section, Central Warrant Processing Section, Criminalistics Section and the Police Communication Section.

The Police Records Section started the year with seventy-five (75) total personnel. During the year lay-offs and attrition resulted in a 14% reduction in personnel strength. However, by year's end the Section was beginning to increase strength through the acquisition of new Public Service Employees.

As a direct result of personnel shortages, the Police Records Section experienced a serious backlog in microfilming traffic crash reports, requests from insurance companies for copies of accident reports, generating traffic warrants for delinquent tags, updating the Electro-file and providing the Traffic Engineer with accident data. Most of the backlogs were reduced after new personnel were trained in their job responsibilities.

The Police Records Section continued involvement in fulfilling requirements of the law for first offender record expungements. Approximately seventy (70) records of individuals were deleted from local, state and F.B.I. files. These records were sealed in accordance with the new law.

The Police Records Section became involved in the planning stages to determine the feasibility of computerizing the processing of traffic citations, including the Ohio Uniform Traffic Ticket.

During the year 1977, the Miracode I rapid retrieval unit became obsolete and a new Miracode II unit was requested by the Criminalistics Section. At the end of the year there were 34,200 entries in the Miracode system. This represents an increase of 1,400 over the previous year. Criminalistics Section personnel searched 6,218,300 single fingerprints and 312,075 mug-shots in 128 hours, while assisting in 107 criminal investigations.

New I.D. cards were made by Criminalistics Section for the entire Police Division. For the first time, I.D. cards were issued for all civilian personnel.

A new system of color coding criminal history jackets was initiated by the Criminalistics Section. This has significantly reduced the problem of misfiled jackets.

The Central Warrant Processing Section, in an effort to save valuable police man-hours, completed its first full year of mailing letters on "owes the court" probation violation warrants.

The Division realized exceptional results from this effort with an overall service percentage of 44.8 for the year.

In order to meet standards prescribed by the Ohio Traffic Rules, on September 18, 1977, the Police Division began using a revised Ohio Uniform Traffic Tag. An arraignment date is now assigned on all moving violations and the tag serves as the summons, thus eliminating the need for a warrant. The Central Warrant Processing Section therefore experienced a large reduction in hand-generated warrants for moving violations offset, however, by an increase in capiases.

On October 1, 1977, the Hamilton County Welfare Department's contract with the City of Cincinnati for the service of probation violation and non-support welfare warrants expired. The new contract was awarded to Hamilton County. Therefore, on December 1, 1977, the Central Warrant Processing Section sorted through some 18,000 active affidavits and transferred approximately 532 welfare warrants to the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office.

In March, 1977, the Police Communication Section absorbed several responsibilities of the disbanded Police Community Relations Bureau. The Media Information function, along with the Community Radio Watch Program were two major operations which were assigned to Police Communication Section. Two police officers were assigned to the Police Communication Section to perform these functions.

After many months of study and consideration the Cincinnati Police Division joined many local and State police agencies throughout the nation who utilize citizen-band (CB) radios as an effective tool in improving the delivery of service and protection to their various communities. In the latter part of the year a base-station CB radio was installed and activated in the Police Communication Section. The CB radio enables the police dispatcher to communicate directly via radio with many area CB base-stations and numerous mobile radio units when emergencies and crime related activities occur in their presence. The Division acceptance of the CB radio has fostered and enhanced a cooperative public-safety effort between law enforcement and radio equipped citizens. This police-CB cooperative program benefits the entire community.

In the early 1970's the Police Division was forced to abandon the immediate chronological teletyping of police radio dispatches to the responding officer's assigned district station in favor of a

delayed computerized time-stamped system. With the demise of the teletype, district command and field supervision lost a valuable resource and an important tool which aided in the coordination, control and supervision of the on-going district activities. In the summer of 1977, steps were taken to restore chronological teletype to the police districts. In October, the Police Communication Section began the chronological teletyping of all radio dispatches in District Three to the District Three Station. Shortly thereafter, District Five joined District Three in receiving this service. The remaining police districts will receive chronological teletype by April of 1978.

In 1977, the Ohio State Law Enforcement Automated Data System (LEADS) computer terminal installed at the Police Communication Section was upgraded to a Univac cathode-ray tube display screen. The acquisition of the Univac computer terminal facilitated access to computerized criminal history (CCH) data. The Police Communication Section LEADS computer terminal is currently one of three in the State of Ohio, and the only terminal in Hamilton County which was authorized, effective 10/26/77, to access Ohio Offender Based Transaction Statistics/Computerized Criminal Histories. In 1978, the State of Ohio will interface with National CCH computerized files. When the interface is implemented, the Cincinnati Police Division will have instant access to the National Computerized Criminal History Data Base.

The purchase and assignment of eighty-five, five channel, four watt personal portable radios in 1977, continues the process begun in 1976 of replacing and upgrading existing Police Division four channel, one watt radios. In addition to increased power, the new radios permit car-to-car communication and improved coordination of effort between Investigative (Channel Five) and Uniformed Officers (Channel Four).

The Inspectional Services Bureau is comprised of three sections: Inspection Section, Internal Investigation Section, and Court Section. The primary functions of the Bureau are to provide information necessary to good administration and to assure quality control, which includes maintenance of a high level of integrity throughout the Police Division.

The Inspection Section monitors the activity of the Police Division through staff inspections as ordered by the Police Chief and unannounced inspections conducted on an unscheduled basis. It insures accountability on the part of those to whom authority has been delegated by implementing inspections to ascertain if policies and procedures of the Division are being adhered to. The inspectors, by obtaining facts, by observation, inquiry, and analysis, appraise the adequacy of the overall police operation.

Along with their primary duties, members of the Section also conduct semi-annual inspections of uniform parts and other Division issued equipment and prepare purchase orders when such equipment

requires replacement or repair. They also monitor sick time usage by members of the Division and instances of officers failing to appear in court.

During the year 1977, the Inspection Section conducted 23 formal inspections of Division activities. The Section continued to monitor absenteeism, work permits, overweight persons, court appearances, light duty assignments, and auto accidents and provided timely reports to unit commanders with regard to these to assist in identifying and correcting deficiencies. Day-by-day inspections of police officers and equipment were continued, as were the semi-annual uniform inspections.

Toward the end of the year, the Inspection Section became involved with the Cincinnati Institute of Justice in preparing to survey segments of the community in order to measure citizens' comments on the handling of complaints. This program is an expansion of the Citizens' Attitude Survey and will tie in directly with the American Justice Institute's Police Performance Measures Plan.

The Internal Investigation Section investigates citizen complaints of a serious nature, i.e. corruption, dishonesty, intoxication on duty, violation of law, and other matters which, in the judgement of the Inspector or the Police Chief, are serious. Members of the Section are available as a staff resource to assist unit supervisors in conducting and processing routine internal investigations.

The Section is also responsible for conducting disciplinary hearings at or beyond the Bureau level and is available to assist with hearings of less than Division level when requested.

The Internal Investigation Section investigated 247 complaints in 1977, a decrease of 112 complaints or 29.4% compared to the 349 complaints investigated during 1976. Of the 247 complaints, 157 were instituted by citizens and 90 were initiated by the Police Division. The Section assisted with 32 disciplinary and appeal hearings as compared to 15 the previous year. Section personnel participated in training in the disciplinary process which was provided for all Sergeants and Lieutenants.

The Court Section is an integral part of the inspection process. Members of the Section are charged with the responsibility of maintaining order in the court rooms and the verification of time spent in court by off-duty officers for which compensatory time is awarded.

The Commander of the Court Section maintains a close liaison with other members of the Criminal Justice System and is responsible for observing the decorum and appearance of officers appearing in court and reporting any deficiencies to the Commander of the Inspectional Services Bureau. He also assists in the scheduling and notification of officers appearing in court to assure that they are available when required to present testimony in the prosecution of criminal cases.

The Personnel Administration Bureau has two major areas of responsibility: (1) the keeping of personnel records and (2) the training of personnel. These were carried out through the two sections of the Bureau, the Personnel Section and the Regional Training and Education Section.

The Personnel Section has the basic job of maintaining the records: Records of injuries and accidents; medical, addresses, and marital status changes; transfers, promotions, separations, retirements, and performance to mention but a few. The mechanical processes of identifying, locating and handling the restoration to duty of twenty-three young officers from the layoff list to active duty fell on the Personnel Section. The purging of records, a continuous process, also rests with the section. Currently being processed is the development of a manual of job descriptions to complement the Manual of Rules and Regulations so that each individual has a better concept of the range of responsibilities built into any assignment he may be given.

The Personnel Section assumed the majority of the administrative and record keeping tasks previously performed by the former Community Relations Bureau.

In April of this year a deluge of performance reports inundated the Section as the first full usage of the new multipage rating process came into use.

Members of the Personnel Section participated with the City Manager's Task Force on Police and Fire Employment practices, in working on Affirmative Action plan and Equal Employment Opportunity problems.

The Regional Training and Education Section (Regional Training Center) completed its fourth year under a descending fund plan of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, (LEAA). The facilities of the Training Center are made available to the personnel of the entire county in the areas of in-service training. This training ranges from training of computer terminal operators as required by the state, through breathalyzer, investigations, model rules, auto theft, to the discussion of vicarious liability of city administrators and development of a "Quality of Life" theme for the city.

The weapons training of the police personnel covers use of a variety of weapons, close combat, safety thinking, and SWAT applications.

Much planning time was consumed in the development of a report with specific recommendations for redevelopment of the Evendale Target Range. With the need for increased safety features, Evendale became less than a safe training area and Indian Hill permitted the use of their range. (Indian Hill is a safe range, but inefficient for the total purposes needed.)

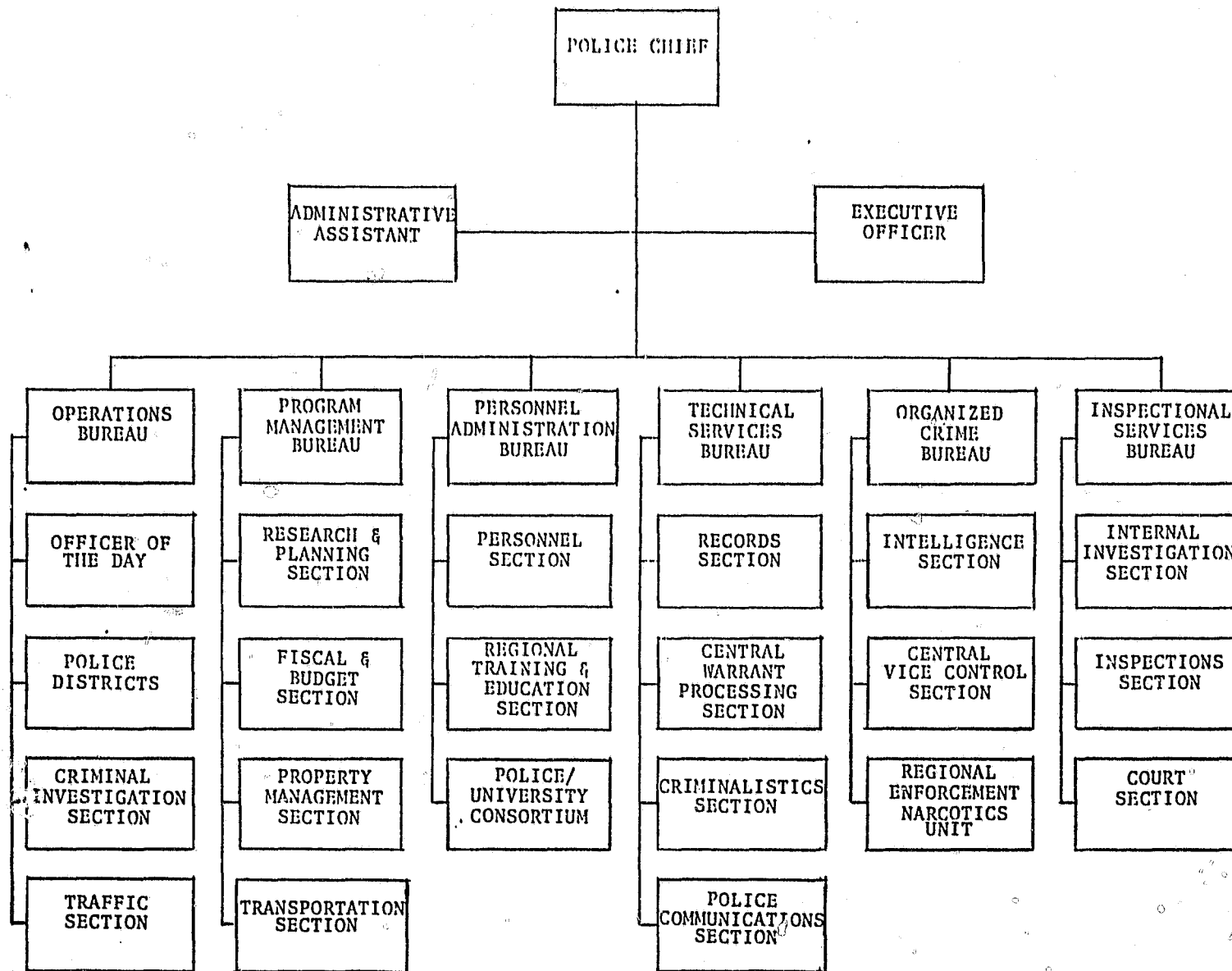
The 23 newly reinstated Police Officers received a solid one week of orientation and training to equip them to return to the ranks of the uniformed.

A recent innovation in training is the use of the Ringmaster, a slide tape, rear screen projection visual-audio training aid. This concept is designed to keep the field personnel in their units of assignment for quick short types of training instead of requiring their travel to a central location for a longer day away from their primary responsibilities.

The Division gratefully acknowledges the support and cooperation received from the City Administration and from other governmental agencies and officials. The personnel of the Division pledge to continue efforts to provide Cincinnati with the best possible service.

Table 76. MAP OF CINCINNATI SHOWING CENSUS TRACTS

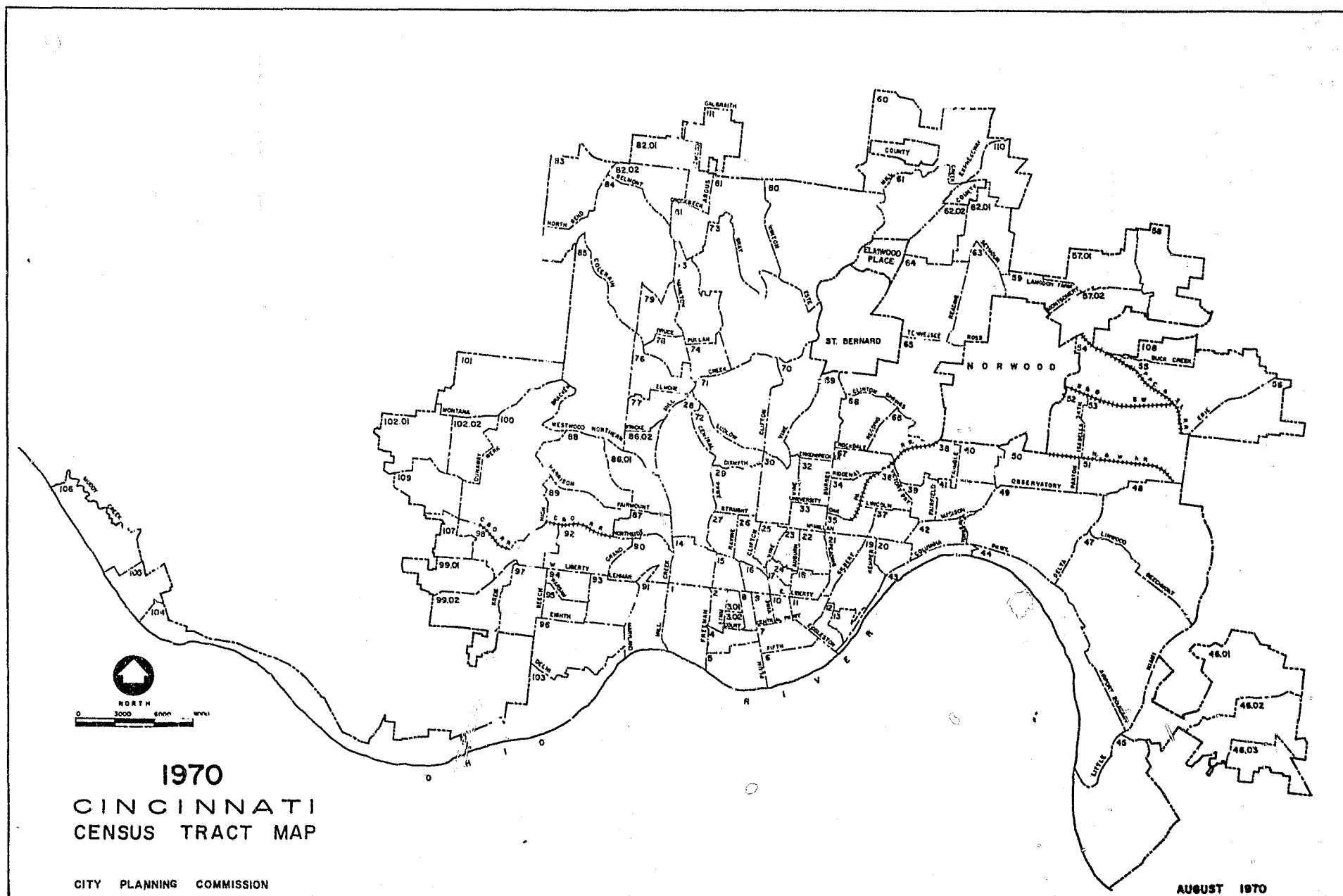

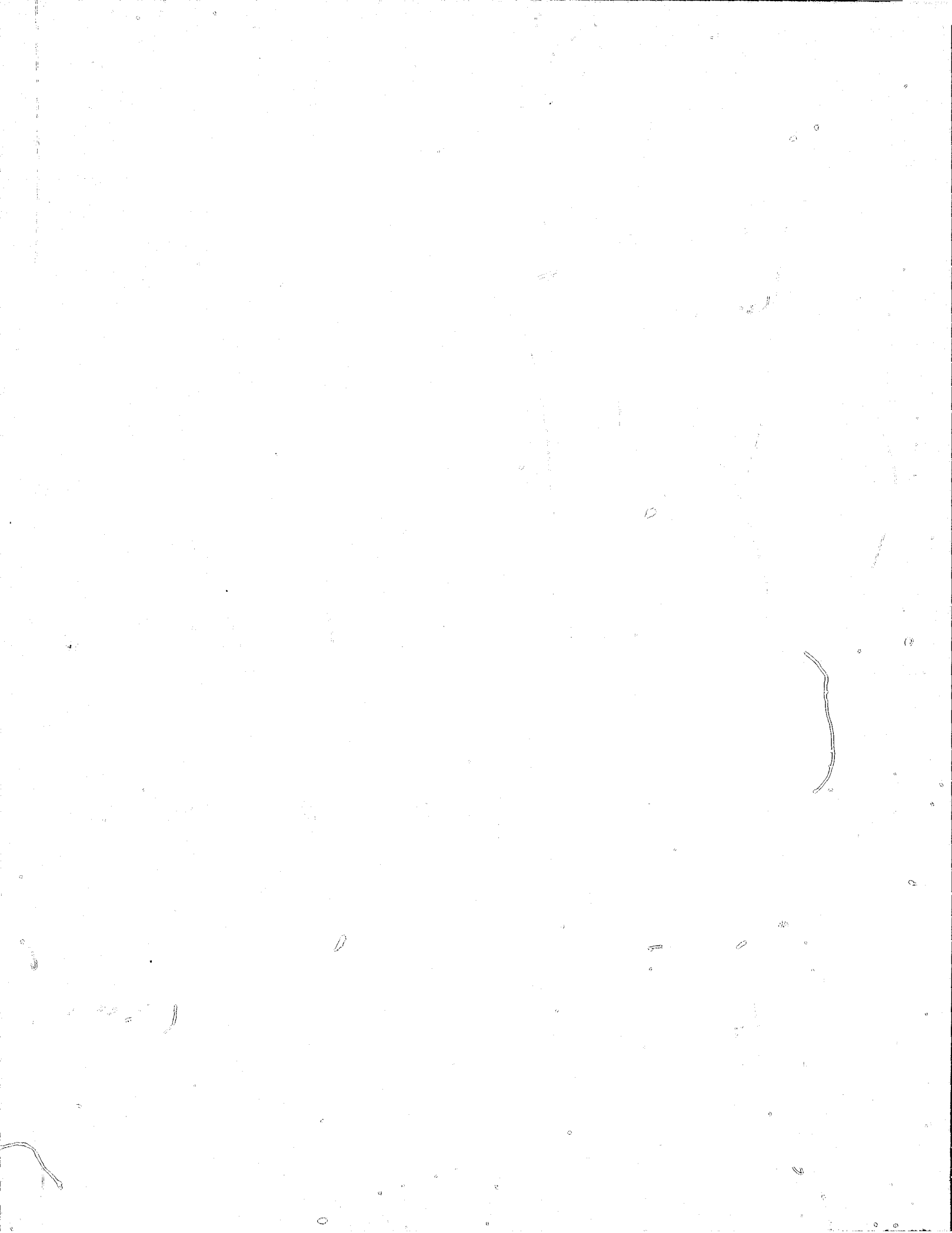

January through December, 1977

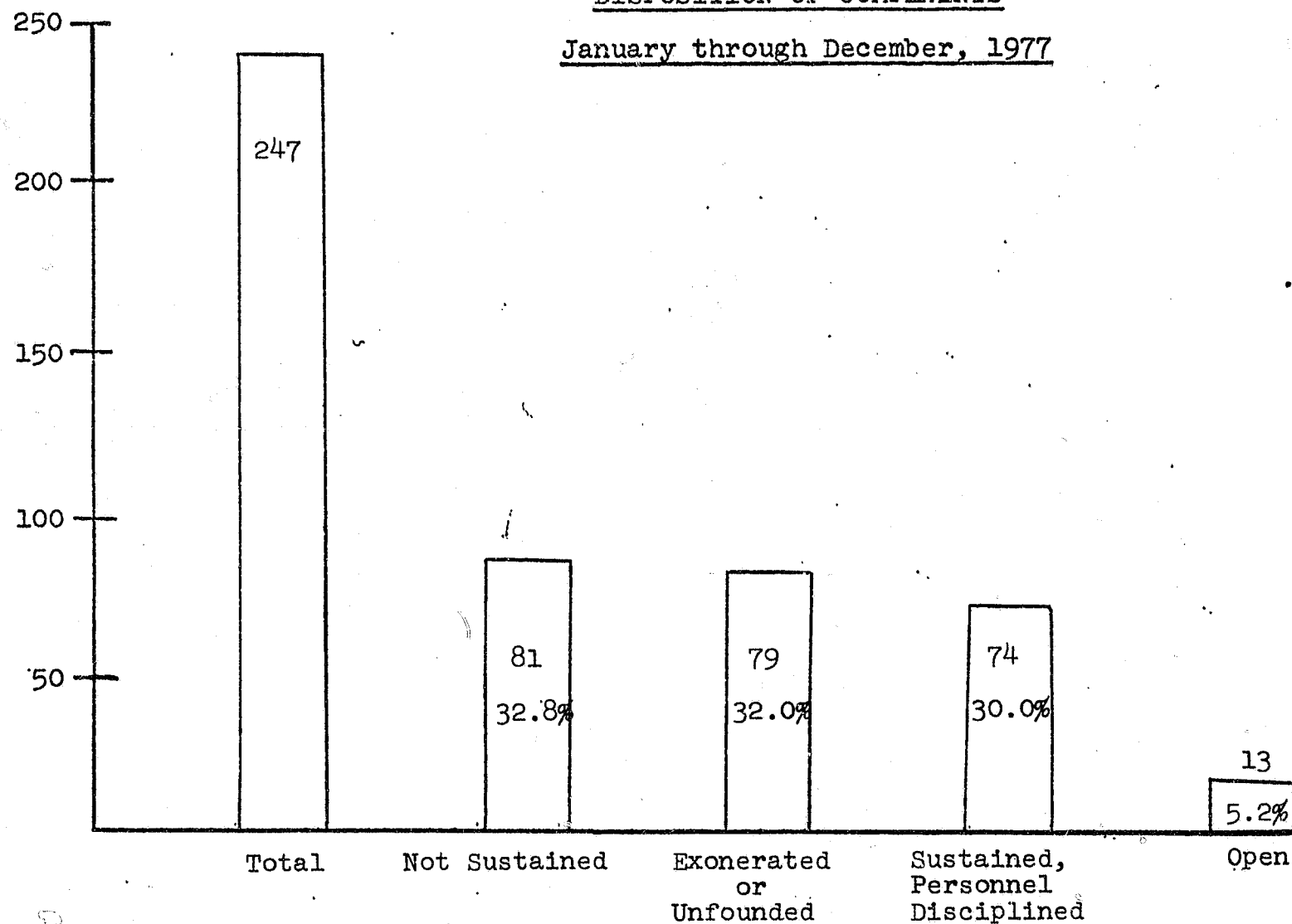

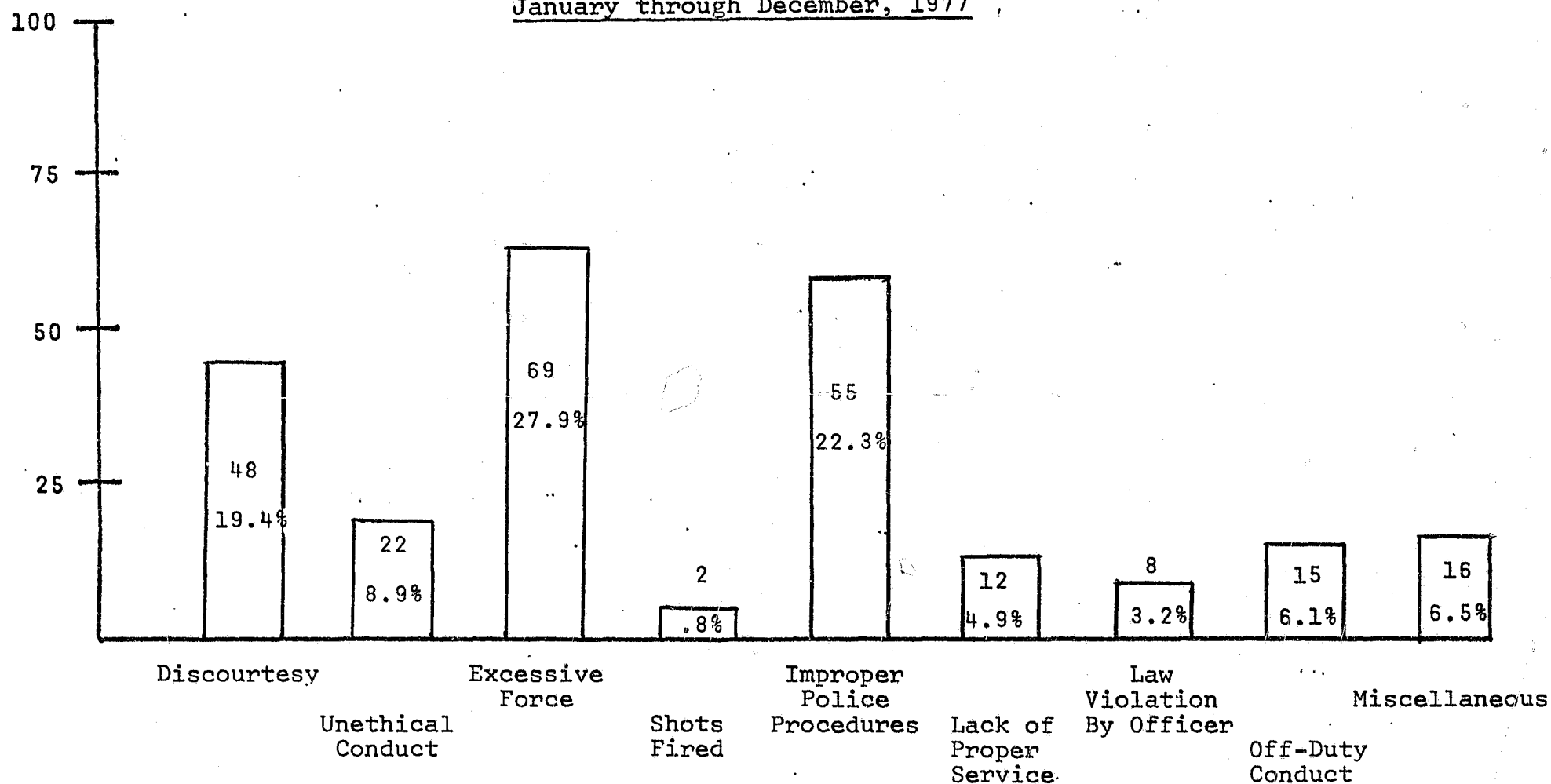

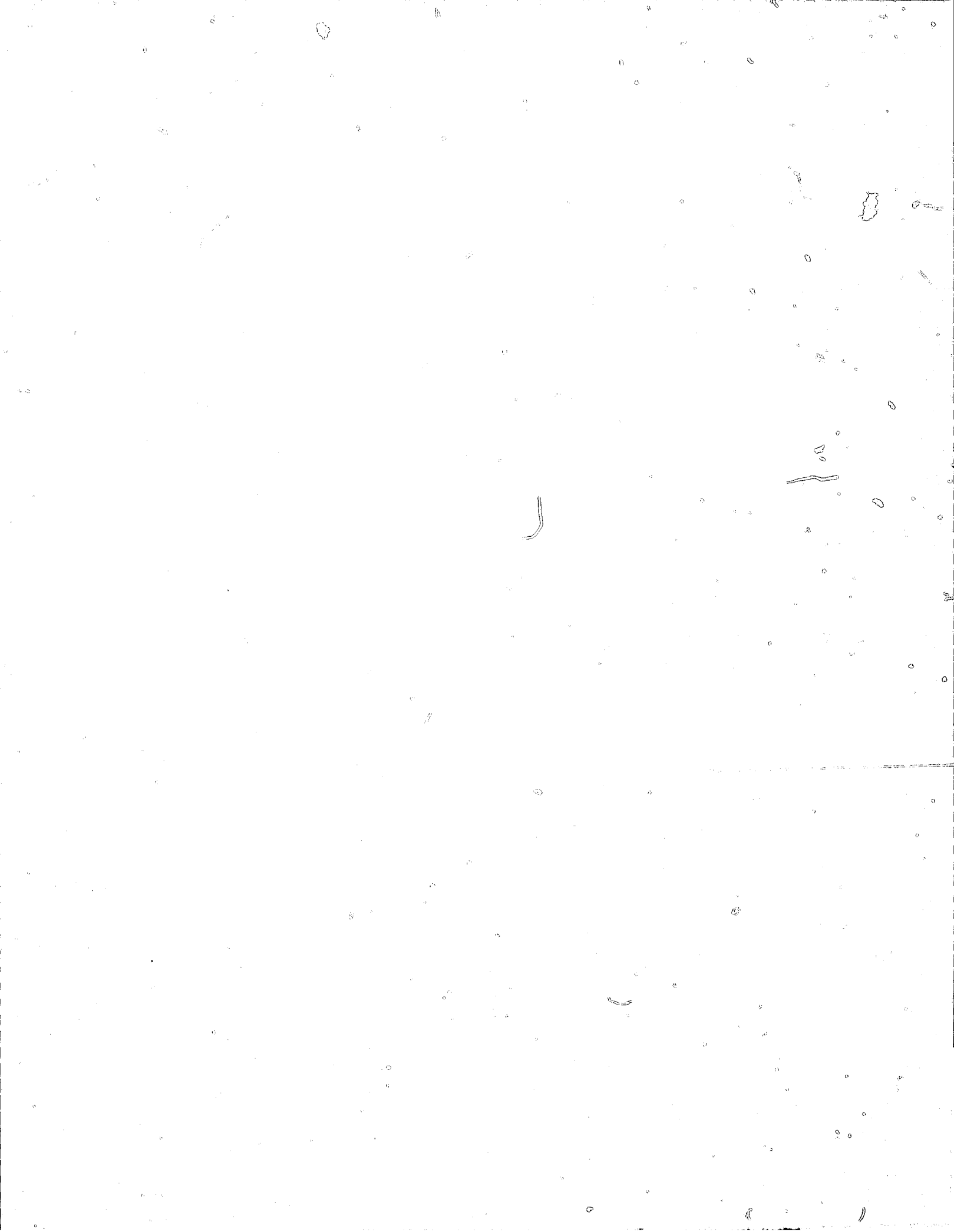

TABLE 142.--AN OUTLINE OF CINCINNATI POLICE HISTORY

Settled in 1788 and a frontier town for many years, originally known as Losantiville, Cincinnati was incorporated as a town in 1802, with a population of about 800 persons. The soldiers of Fort Washington provided what "protection" was necessary prior to that time. The early inhabitants had no need for anything like a police force as crime was negligible and there was no traffic. After incorporation, a marshal was elected every year, but earliest actual policing dates from 1803 when a disastrous fire caused the Council to provide for a night watch. All male citizens over the age of 21 were required to serve in rotation without pay as watchmen, 12 each night. They reported to the Watch House at 8:00 o'clock and chose an "officer of the night" who divided them into two "classes" of six men each for patrol duty. While "walking to and fro through the streets", each one carried a lantern and a watchman's rattle for summoning assistance and giving signals.

With Cincinnati's rapid growth to a city, certain citizens, irked by their enforced duty as watchman, initiated a movement in 1818 to establish a fund to pay for the services of professional night-watchmen. Accordingly, an ordinance was passed in that year providing for a captain and six watchmen, who were granted the power of arrest and also were required to trim the street lamps and "light them about dusk". The City was incorporated the following year, 1819, with a population of about 9,000. The corporation line on the south was the Ohio River, on the west the Millcreek and on the north a straight line drawn through Liberty Street from the Millcreek to the Ohio. By 1826, the Watch consisted of two captains and 18 men. In 1842, a day watch of two men was added to supplement the night force. They were paid \$1.25 per day each. The night men received \$1.00 a night. By 1855, there were a hundred men on the force and the city's population had grown to approximately 135,000. The first detectives were added to the force in that year, when three men were appointed for special investigation work. Finally, in 1894, City Council passed an ordinance levying a tax of one mill on the dollar upon all property owners to pay the salaries of the watchmen. Thus was created the first true "police force", under a direct responsibility to the taxpayers of the City.

From the earliest days, the watchmen were under the authority of the various town or city marshals, who were elected for one or two-year terms. In 1859, the position of City Marshal was abolished and the office of Chief of Police formally established under a five-man Board of Police Commissioners who served without pay. The Marshal's job had declined in importance since 1853, due to political maneuvering, and from it evolved the position of Chief of Police. This title was changed again, however, in 1873 to that of Superintendent of Police. All appointments and dismissals of watch and police personnel from the beginning were on a political basis with individuals serving at the pleasure of the Mayor in the

office. In 1873, as an attempt to correct this, an act was passed providing for the selection of a commission of four members who took over the power from the Mayor and Chief of Police. This commission was short-lived and in 1874 was abolished, the Mayor again taking charge. However, in 1886 the department was taken out of the realm of politics by a state law which established a non-partisan Board of Police Commissioners which had complete control and supervision of the police force.

This Board consisted of four commissioners appointed by the Governor of Ohio, who also had the power of removing them. Not more than two members of the Board could belong to the same political party. Appointments to the force and promotions were required to be made from eligible lists without reference to political opinions or affiliations and all had to be approved by the Board. Commissioners and policemen alike were prohibited from political activity. The Mayor was given the responsibility for the direction of the force, with the Superintendent of Police in direct command.

In 1903, the position of Chief of Police was re-established and a Board of Public Safety was formed by merging the Boards of Police and Fire Commissioners. However, six years later this Board was abolished and a Director of Public Safety was appointed assuming charge of the police, fire, welfare and other safety functions.

In 1910, the merit system of appointments and promotions was fortified by the passage of the present Civil Service Law, the formation of a Board of Civil Commissioners and the appointment of a Civil Service Examiner. The population of Cincinnati was then 363,591 and the 643 men on the police force patrolled 49 square miles, the approximate area of the city at that time.

All along, many improvements were being made in police methods. In 1856, the first uniform was adopted. Registration of persons arrested was begun in 1863, leading to the establishment of a rogue's gallery in 1873. The dial system of police telegraph was installed in 1866 and telephones were introduced in 1878, just two years after Alexander Graham Bell obtained his patent. In 1879, a telephone exchange serving the entire department was installed and the Cincinnati Police enjoyed the distinction of being the first Police Department to supplant the telegraph with the telephone.

In 1881, the patrol wagon service was organized, the second of its kind in the country. With the reorganization of the department in 1886, the Detective Bureau was formally established, mounted policemen on horseback began to replace the foot patrolmen on the outlying beats and in the next few years many innovations that today are to be found in most police departments were introduced. These included a police gymnasium with physical training for the men;

military drill under a drillmaster, which led to the annual parade and inspection of the force; the School of Instruction with formal training for all members of the department; a printed manual for each man, containing the rules and regulations governing the force and instructions in many of the details of police business; a Board of Examiners to conduct regular "mental and manual" examinations; a police library and the Roll of Honor, awarded for meritorious deeds.

The Bertillon department was established in 1892. Because of the increasing use of the fingerprint system of identification, which was adopted by the department shortly after its introduction into this country in 1904, this department became the Bureau of Identification in 1912.

The first automobile was purchased and utilized by the Division in 1909. In 1912, a regular traffic squad was formed with motorcycles being utilized by this unit the following year. Horsedrawn patrol wagons were discarded and replaced by motorized wagons in 1913. By 1924, horses were being replaced by roadster type automobiles which, in turn, were replaced by coupes in 1928.

By 1920 the city had grown to 401,247 in population and the police force to 696 men. On January 1, 1926, the City Charter form of City government was inaugurated, placing the police, together with other executive branches of the municipal service, directly under the control of the City Manager. In 1930, the position of Director of Safety was restored and the force established as the Division of Police of the Department of Safety.

In 1927, the number of police districts was reduced from ten to seven and the position of district Superintendent was created. A police major was assigned to the position in each district. The control of all traffic matters was removed from the districts and placed under the command of a Superintendent of Traffic. Also in that year, a teletype system of inter-communication was installed, and a more modern style of uniform with the .38 caliber revolver was adopted. During the following year, 1928, with traffic signal lights being introduced downtown, traffic patrolmen, who formerly had directed traffic with hand and whistle signals were given short walking beats in the congested area.

The centralized Bureau of Records was also established in 1928 and a new record system was installed as a result of recommendations proposed by staff members of the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. This system and the crime classification developed for it proved so successful that they were taken as the ground work for the published Manual which established the Uniform Reporting System, formally adopted in 1929 by the country's leading police departments. Thus Cincinnati, pioneering in the field of modern police records,

played a significant part in the development of this system. Since then statistics have been compiled uniformly and are comparable with those of other police departments cooperating in the project.

In 1930, the Federal Census found the city's population to be 451,160. There were 662 members of the police department. Communication was considerably improved in 1931 when Station X, the Department's radio station, WKDU, was completed after two years construction.

In 1931, the City Retirement System was established, replacing the Police Relief Fund for police employees. In 1933, a city-wide Safety Patrol was organized and in 1934, with injuries and deaths from vehicular accidents constantly increasing, the first unit of an accident investigation squad was added. The Traffic Accident Investigation Bureau was formally established in 1936, with especially selected and trained men in motor cars equipped with cameras, measuring tapes, red flares, first aid kits, etc.

Another noteworthy addition to the department was made in 1934, when the Police Crime Laboratory equipped with ballistic, X-ray, polygraphic, microscopic, moulage and other equipment was established. In 1935, the Police Credit Union was organized, one of the first to be formed in the country by police employees. The following year, effective January 1, 1936, Central Station was re-established at City Hall for the purpose of centralizing at one point instead of seven, the registration and detention of all persons arrested. In 1936, the personnel of the department numbered 633; in 1937, 714.

Early in 1937 the city saw the greatest flood in its history when the Ohio River rose to an unprecedented crest of 80 feet, 28 feet above flood stage. Twenty-four square miles of the city were inundated and the water front measured fifty-two miles. This was a major disaster, but with the help of the Ohio National Guard and Coast Guard, the police were able to meet every emergency without a declaration of martial law. Also, in that year an outdoor police pistol range was built at Bald Knob and the Annual Medal Shoot for members of the department was initiated.

In 1939, two important steps were taken to curb juvenile delinquency which was rapidly becoming a serious problem in the city. The Boy's Clubs movement was introduced to Cincinnati and the formation of Bicycle Safety Clubs in the schools was begun by specially trained officers. Delayed previously because of litigation, the city's testing station for compulsory inspection of motor vehicles was also opened that year. The Federal Census of the following year, 1940, showed the city's population at 455,610. The police department had 732 employees.

In 1941, a court decision restored the Police Relief Fund, removing police officers as members of the City Retirement System. Parking meters began to be installed in that year and preparation

for civilian defense was started to meet the impending war emergency which made itself fully felt in 1942. Two-way radio and radio-telegraph were added to the department's communication facilities when new radio equipment was put into operation in 1942. The policy of furnishing new recruits with revolvers and equipment, including the first complete summer and winter uniform, was also initiated in 1942.

The Juvenile Crime Prevention Bureau (renamed numerous times since) was organized in 1943. For that year Cincinnati was awarded first place in the National Traffic Safety Contest and was runner-up in the Ohio Traffic Safety Contest. In 1944, with the dissolving of the civilian defense organization, the Auxiliary Police Corps was established and augmented the police force during the time of man-power shortage caused by military leaves. Also, during that year the phase over to FM radio broadcasts from AM was initiated with it being completed in 1949. At the end of 1944 there were 159 stars on the police service flag for members in the armed service. In 1945 a Keeler polygraph was acquired for the Police Crime Laboratory.

Policewomen were added to the force early in 1946. In that year also the target range in Lockland was acquired. In 1947, a missing person unit, to work in conjunction with the police districts, was established as part of the Juvenile Bureau. Late in 1950, a new District Six Stationhouse, located on Erie Avenue, was opened. The Census Bureau announced the city's population as 503,998.

In 1951 the average work week of members of the force was reduced from 48 hours to 44. Also, during that year the Motor Transport Bureau was discontinued as a separate unit and its duties and personnel taken over by the Police Districts. Early in 1952 radar was successfully used to aid the police in the apprehension of speeders. The Police Training School was re-named Police Academy when it was moved to new quarters on the second floor of District 2 Stationhouse.

The Lincoln Park Drive Police Building, housing offices of the Police Chief and several members of his staff, in addition to quarters for the Juvenile Bureau, Traffic Bureau and District One, was placed in use early in 1955. At the same time a realignment of police district boundaries was inaugurated. Later in the same year the Crime Bureau, Records Section and Identification Section expanded into the quarters made vacant in the City Hall by removal of the several units to Lincoln Park Drive.

The first group of Police Cadets was employed in 1955. On April 1, 1956, the Division was placed on a 40 hour work week. In December 1957, a new Stationhouse for District 5, located on Ludlow Avenue, was opened. The Tactical Unit, composed of a sergeant and ten patrolmen, was formally organized as a separate

entity of the Patrol Bureau in April 1959. The city's population was 502,550 in 1960 according to the U.S. Bureau of the Census. The first steps in forming a Canine Corps were undertaken. The following year the Canine Corps, combined with the Tactical Unit, was placed in operation. In 1966, the rank of Police Specialist was created.

In 1967, the co-op system of training was inaugurated between the Police Division and the University of Cincinnati for the cadets. Late October 1967 brought the introduction of the school resource officer program to 96 public and 60 parochial schools in the city. For the first time since the Police Division utilized motor vehicles, the color was changed from dark to light blue.

Summer months of 1968 found the uniformed officers wearing white short sleeved shirts. In March 1969 the actual operation of the Regional Crime Information Center began. June 1969 brought about implementations of a recently released International Association of Chiefs of Police report through a re-grouping of various sections and bureaus. A new Crime Prevention Bureau was established. Community Relations programs were extended to all police districts.

August, 1969 construction started on second floor extension and third floor addition, to 310 Lincoln Park Drive. In December, 1969 all police functions remaining in City Hall, with the exception of the Detention Facilities, moved to the Alms and Doepke Building, 222 E. Central Parkway.

Early in 1970 District Two was absorbed by District One, reducing the district total to six. The core area of the city also received the first police motor scooter patrol. Late in this year the first policewoman retired and a police uniform for policewomen was created. The Cincinnati Police Division also suffered a severe loss when Chief Jacob Schott passed away.

In January the new Communications Section at Police Headquarters became a reality, replacing Station X. Individual two-way radios with lapel microphones and the Eisenhower type jacket were introduced as standard equipment.

In 1971, Carl V. Goodin was appointed as Police Chief. Through a \$478,100.00 planning grant from the Ford Foundation, a proto-type of a then innovative patrol technique known as Community Sector Team Policing (Com-Sec) was instituted on a limited scale in District One. Other grants provided programs involving community service assistants and a Community Relations mobile van.

The year of 1972 saw the Division initiate motor scooter patrol in all six districts and this new mode of patrol emerged as particularly effective in crime prevention and public relations. The Alcohol Safety Action program was formed under a Federal Grant on

January 17, 1972 to combat the problems created by the drinking driver. Miracode Rapid Information Retrieval System was inaugurated which allows searches for a single fingerprint or a "mug shot" in a minimum of time by utilizing a numerically coded system.

In 1973, due to its initial success and backed by additional Ford Foundation grants totalling almost \$3 million, the Police Division fully implemented Community Sector Team Policing in District One. Com-Sec's primary goal was to combine efforts of citizenry and police in establishing a safe community. Simultaneously a pilot program to evaluate the effectiveness of a new investigative model was being conducted in District Five. An investigative skill training program was initiated in 1973 and continued into 1974, furnishing each member of the Division with the latest in Criminal Investigations. A Legal Section was formally established in the Division with the cooperation of the City Solicitor. This section effectively coordinated the training program for the new Ohio Criminal Code which went into effect January, 1974.

Community Sector Team policing completed its first full year in 1974 and was deemed a success. Plans were formulated to expand the program to other districts.

During the Spring of 1974, a tornado of major proportion struck parts of Cincinnati and inflicted havoc and severe property damage, especially in the Saylor Park area. The Police Division along with other city, county, state and private agencies, combined all possible resources to provide assistance as needed.

Districts Four and Seven combined in the new District Four Station at 4150 Reading Road in early 1975. The facility is described as one of the most advanced police installations in the United States having been planned by a special committee of residents and police.

Districts Three and Five joined District One as Com-Sec Districts in 1975.

1976 was an unusual year for the city of Cincinnati and the Police Division. In addition to providing basic police services, the Police Division was responsible for security details and crowd control for many Bicentennial celebrations, the National League Playoffs and World Series, and numerous visitors and candidates connected with local, state, and national elections.

Although the nation's Bicentennial was a busy year, a concerted effort by the citizenry and police realized 6.85% decrease in the crime rate.

As was the case with other municipalities throughout the United States, Cincinnati was faced with declining economic conditions and was forced to resort to budget cutbacks. The Police Division was saddened by the lay-offs of approximately 200 of its personnel. The Police Cadet program, which started in 1955 came to an end with the lay-offs of all the cadets. In addition, 94 police officers and numerous civilian employees were released.

Myron J. Leistler was appointed Police Chief on November 12, 1976. Colonel Leistler became only the eighth newly appointed Chief of the century.

The year 1977 saw the police Division adopt a modified form of Team Policing in all of its five districts. The title "Com-Sec" was abandoned due to the enlargement of police sectors beyond community boundaries.

Twenty-three police officers, who were furloughed the previous year, were recalled to duty.

This brief history only highlights some of the major developments of the Cincinnati Police Division. The interest, enthusiasm and dedication to duty of present day personnel assures its continuing growth.
