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1977 GOALS AND OBJECTIVES - AN UPDATE

Last year the Bureau established fourteen (14) goals and eighty (80) sub-objectives which were to be accomplished within specified time frames during the next one to four years.

Of these eighty sub-objectives, eighteen were suspended, eight remain under review, and fifty-four were initiated and are either on-going or completed.

Following are a few examples of the fifty-four projects initiated during 1977:

1. GOAL: To develop a full range of personnel services in family, financial, and pre-retirement counseling.

STATUS: Preliminary development of an alcohol rehabilitation program has been completed. Several officers have successfully participated in the program and are once again working at an acceptable level. Expansion of the current mental health program is also underway. Bureau personnel taking part are insured of complete confidentiality and may see one of several counselors whose services are paid for by budgeted funds. A committee has been established to review all member assistance programs and to recommend effective additional programs.

The Training and Personnel Divisions have also refined spouse and family seminars into an ongoing program which will promote the stabilization of the police family. Lectures include discussions with command personnel and city officials.

2. GOAL: To develop a comprehensive fleet safety program which will substantially reduce the incidence of personnel and equipmental losses due to traffic collisions.

STATUS: In 1977 a sergeant previously assigned to other duties was appointed the fleet safety officer. Driver training has been expanded to three days for recruits and a remedial driver program has also been initiated.

A standardized method of compiling police vehicle accidents was put into effect in June, 1977. A peer-group Collision Review Board was established which reviews all collisions and makes recommendations, as necessary, to the Chief of Police.

The program has been very successful and the cost savings (FY 76/77 \$63,496) have more than paid the salary of the fleet safety officer.

3. GOAL: To develop a performance measurement system for all ranks and positions within the Police Bureau.

STATUS: It is difficult to design an employee evaluation program which will produce valid and useful information. There is such a diversity of tasks involved in the job of order-keeping and emergency services that it is hard to identify standards of comparison. To overcome this problem the Bureau is developing seven specialized evaluation forms for groups with similar job performances: Patrol/Traffic Officers, Investigators, Sergeants, Command/Management, Administrative/Supervisory, Staff/Technical and Secretarial/Clerical. Committees representing each of the groups will select their own performance measurement criteria. It is believed this work will pay off with constructive information:

To professionalize the Bureau by guidance for the individual's personal growth and development.

To establish common educational needs at the academy or inservice training levels.

To enable the fairest decisions in matters involving discipline.

To help supervisors and administrators in making either acceptable job assignments or in considering requests for transfer.

4. GOAL: To involve operational units in the investigation of less critical citizen's complaints against the Bureau for the purpose of increasing officer awareness of community

feelings.

STATUS: The above goal was met early in 1977 when the Internal Affairs Division began sending selected citizen complaints to the precincts and divisions for investigation. Out of 722 complaints lodged against the Bureau, 198 were investigated by the precincts and divisions. Forty-six were forwarded to the Bureau of Emergency Communications.

This procedure allowed the Internal Affairs Division more time for in-depth and complete investigations of the more serious allegations. Overall the Internal Affairs Division sustained 6.6% of the complaints made against the Bureau and its personnel. The precincts and divisions sustained 10.5% of the investigations assigned to them.

5. GOAL: To upgrade the officer/coach system through selection, training and evaluation.

STATUS: In 1977 one hundred Bureau members were surveyed regarding the status of the coaching system. The Planning & Research, Training and Personnel Divisions then drafted a position paper which summarized the problems. An analysis of the results of the survey indicated that, among other things, the coaching system required more direction. A member of the Training Division has been appointed Field Training Coordinator and is providing the necessary supervision and direction to the program. This resulted in specific attention being focused on the individual officer problems and training needs. The program has also resulted in a savings of from one to two months of coaching time for each probationary officer.

6. GOAL: To reduce substantially the use of sick time by Bureau personnel through evaluation, personnel incentive programs, and administrative control.

STATUS: Sick leave usage in the Police Bureau in 1977 was down by almost one-third over the previous year. This is compared to a one-sixth average reduction for other city agencies.

Among those factors which may have contributed to this decrease were: the provisions of the labor contract which reflect the responsible position of all negotiators in recognizing the sick leave problem; the compensatory time off (in lieu of paid overtime) provision for sworn personnel; the Bureau's demonstrated concern with and efforts toward sick leave reduction; and the dry, mild weather experienced during the fall and winter months.

7. GOAL: To expand our ability to identify and apprehend the career criminal by providing officers with necessary additional resources and training.

STATUS: In July of 1977, LEAA awarded an Integrated Criminal Apprehension Program Grant (ICAP) to the Portland Police Bureau. The goal of the Portland ICAP is to increase apprehensions, especially of career criminals, in the North and East Precincts.

The training of patrol officers, authorized under the grant, has been completed. In addition, resources in terms of covert vehicles and surveillance equipment are readily available to North and East precinct officers.

Career criminals are defined as those offenders arrested for any offense, who have two prior felony convictions or an offender who is currently on probation, parole, or institutional supervision as a result of a felony conviction and the current offense is one of violence against a person or the burglary of a dwelling.

8. GOAL: To establish a system of crime analysis information which will afford operational personnel with crime specific data for the purpose of planning present and future activities in deployment and tactics.

STATUS: The Crime Analysis Unit became 100% manually-operational November 1, 1977. Under the auspices of the ICAP grant, crime analysis moved away from the statistical presentation of information and concentrated on the development of operational information for patrol

officers. Crime specific analysis is achieved through the monitoring of patterned offenses. Tactical information is developed by plotting crime activity and known offenders via various mapping techniques and a suspect file.

It is forecast that operational crime analysis and its associated tactical planning will have a profound and long-lasting effect upon future selective crime enforcement activities directed at burglary, rape, robbery and auto theft.

9. **GOAL:** To explore the selection, equipping, training and utilization of auxiliary police to upgrade them into an effective force for providing ancillary police services.

STATUS: The Bureau's Auxiliary Police became the Police Reserve in 1977, with a correspondent upgrading of standards for appointment, training, attendance, performance, appearance and accountability.

Thirty new reserve officers were recruited and appointed during the year. Fifty-five active reserve officers were enrolled in one of three reserve academies, ensuring a minimum of 120 and a maximum of 300 relevant training hours. In 1977 they performed 8,773 volunteer hours.

OTHER 1977 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In addition to those in conjunction with the Bureau's goals and objectives, there were other accomplishments in 1977.

DETECTIVE DIVISION: In 1977 the Detective Division was reorganized to improve the utilization of its resources. One result was an improved clearance rate from 16% to 19% for all Class I crimes. The Division also developed and implemented a weekly radio program designed to increase information from the public on major crimes and crime trends. Detectives also became further involved in the Bureau's hostage negotiating team with the commitment of a lieutenant and five detectives.

The Fence Detail of the Division is a federally funded police project aimed at interdicting the flow of stolen property. This was the second year of the projected four year grant. During 1977 the detail arrested 153 persons on 213 felony and 16 misdemeanor charges. Fifty-six search warrants were prepared and served and there were 152 searches by consent. Property valued at \$335,768 was recovered and \$308,367 or 94.7% was identified and returned to the rightful owner.

JUVENILE DIVISION: The 1977 Oregon Legislative Assembly passed Senate Bill 835 amending O.R.S. 418.735 which is the child abuse statute. Effective October 4th, 1977 the Children's Services Division and law enforcement agencies were required to immediately notify one another upon notice of a case of child abuse. The number of reported child abuse cases in the period from October 4th through December 31st, 1977 was 128. In the same time period in 1976 there were 63 reported cases. This meant a 103% increase in Juvenile Division investigations during this time frame.

In 1977 work was started on a project to help eliminate truancy and reduce crime. Franklin High School was the school selected for the pilot project. The program will deal with employment, education, and rehabilitation.

PRECINCTS: East Precinct was successful last year in continuing a number of programs started in previous years as well as beginning new projects in an effort to better serve the community. Initiated in 1977, in conjunction with the Tactical Support Division and ICAP, was an ambitious program designed to increase criminal apprehensions and increase capabilities to identify and apprehend career criminals. Staffing was also completed for the East Precinct Crime Prevention and Crime Analysis units.

North Precinct created and staffed a position of Crime Analyst (also in conjunction with ICAP) and increased the Crime Prevention detail from one to two officers. Precinct personnel also actively participated with two police citizen advisory committees which emphasized the willingness of the

police to involve citizens in the total law enforcement effort within North Precinct. Also in 1977, federal grant money was obtained to remodel and restore the North Precinct building into a combination police facility and community center.

Central Precinct, in 1977, saw the completion of the Portland Transit Mall and a continued revitalization of the downtown area. The precinct was also selected to participate in a test program for the Mobile Digital Terminals (MDT) which were to be installed early in 1978. These terminals will allow instant communications with the Bureau of Emergency Communications, including access into crime information computers.

LEGAL ADVISOR: The Police Bureau's Legal Advisor continued to act as the in-house counsel, advising the Chief and Bureau members about duty-related legal questions and proposed administrative and policy changes.

The Legal Advisor also chaired the Bureau's Legislative Committee during the 1977 legislative session. The committee, with the help of the Mayor's Office and Commissioner Jordan, was instrumental in obtaining legislation on child abuse detection, fingerprinting of juvenile felons and auto theft prevention and detection. These efforts also helped prevent passage of a bill which would have damaged the juvenile court system.

CRIME PREVENTION: In July, 1977, the Crime Prevention Bureau became the Crime Prevention Unit under the Portland Police Bureau. This provided the City the opportunity to coordinate and expand crime prevention programs so that a broad umbrella of services could be offered to the citizens of Portland.

Though the scope of activities has expanded since the program's inception, the Crime Prevention Unit has focused its efforts increasingly on the neighborhoods. Utilizing the community's resources, along with assistance from other city agencies, such as the Office of Neighborhood Associations, crime prevention programs are being tailored to the needs and concerns of each neighborhood.

In the Buckman Neighborhood in southeast Portland, a molestor caused anger and frustration in citizens and police alike. Working with neighborhood people, city agencies, and other units in the Police Bureau, the Crime Prevention Unit turned a negative situation into a constructive, positive program. Block meetings were held in Buckman to acquaint people with techniques they could employ to reduce their chances of becoming a victim of crime. Over 70 homes in Buckman volunteered to be Block Homes where children could go when they are in trouble. In addition, the Buckman Neighborhood Association formed a Crime Prevention Committee to help develop plans to make their community a safer place in which to live. The molestor was eventually apprehended.

Out of the crime problems of Buckman arose the idea for the Trail Blazer Trading Cards. Fourteen cards with pictures of individual team members contain basketball and crime prevention tips for young people. The cards are built around three themes: Children as Victims; Children as Offenders; and Children as Crime Fighters. The cards will be ready for distribution in the spring of 1978. The Kiwanis Clubs in the metropolitan area financed the printing of the cards.

In addition to these programs, and the traditional crime prevention programs, the Crime Prevention Unit is developing Braille literature for the blind, television spots for the deaf, and has translated crime prevention information into four foreign languages. Also, the unit has a six person carpenter crew which installs locks, and other needed security controls, on the homes of elderly, low-income, and handicapped citizens at no cost to them.

These programs rely on the support of citizens and police to be successful. The benefits are obvious: a safer community, a reduction in people's fear of crime, increased reporting of crimes, and enhancing the image of one of the nation's finest police organizations.

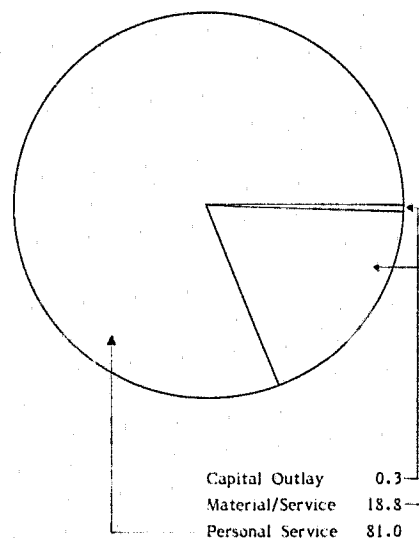

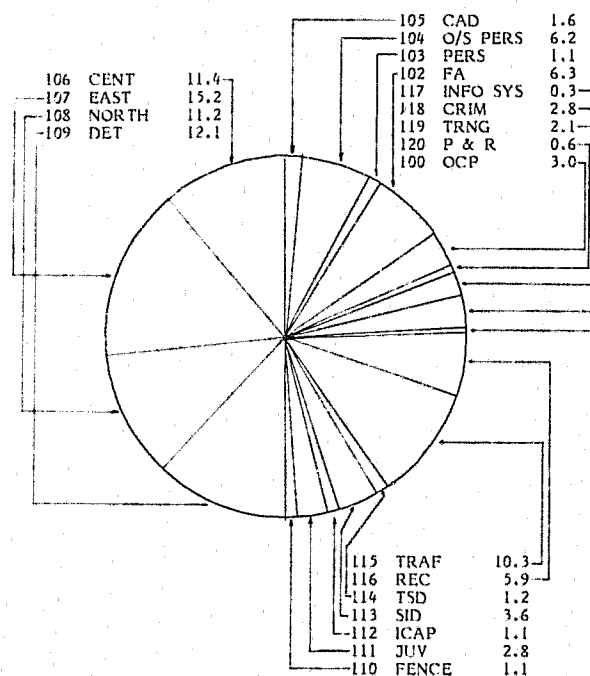

PATROL DEPLOYMENT FORMULA

The formula for Patrol Deployment is established by manhour research relating only to those patrolmen assigned to uniform patrol and traffic functions. Thus, only the 338 patrolmen rank officers assigned to the three precincts or Traffic Division were considered.

The average annual manhours not available for patrol assignments was determined by researching personnel records and union contract provisions. Where complete records were not available, hand tallied statistical samplings were taken from personnel time sheets. The following information was established:

- 77% of the officer's time is available for patrol-related functions.
- 23% of the officer's time is consumed by other than patrol-related functions.
- 1.8 officers are required to fill one eight hour position, seven days per week.
- 5.5 officers are required to fill one position 24 hours a day, seven days per week.

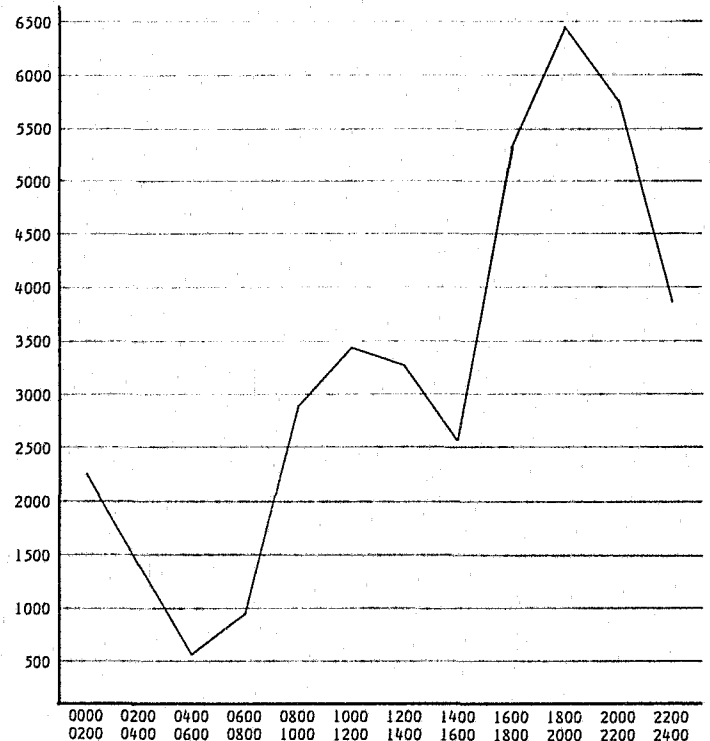

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING DEFINITIONS

All definitions and classifications of offenses are based on Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) standards and do not necessarily conform to State of Oregon statutes (ORS).

PART I OFFENSES: (Class I Crimes)

Seven UCR offenses chosen as indicators of crime in the United States because of their seriousness and frequency of occurrence.

MURDER AND NONNEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER: The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE: Certain willful killings are classified as justifiable or excusable. In UCR, justifiable homicide is defined and limited to: 1) the killing of a felon by a peace officer in the line of duty, or 2) the killing of a felon by a private citizen. A killing is not classified as justifiable or excusable on the basis of self-defense, action of a coroner, prosecutor, grand jury or court.

NEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER: The killing of another person through gross negligence.

FORCIBLE RAPE: The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.

ROBBERY: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

BURGLARY: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.

LARCENY - THEFT: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another, without threat or force.

POCKET PICKING: The theft of articles from a person by stealth where the victim usually does not become immediately aware of the theft.

PURSE SNATCHING: The grabbing or snatching of a purse or handbag from the custody of an individual.

THEFT FROM PERSON: The grabbing or snatching of an article other than a purse or handbag from the custody of an individual.

SHOPLIFTING: The theft by a person other than an employee of goods or merchandise exposed for sale.

THEFTS FROM MOTOR VEHICLES (except theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories): The theft of articles from a motor vehicle, whether locked or unlocked.

THEFT OF MOTOR VEHICLE PARTS AND ACCESSORIES: The theft of any part or accessory attached to the interior or exterior of a motor vehicle in a manner which would make the part an attachment to the vehicle or necessary for the operation of the vehicle.

THEFT OF BICYCLES: The unlawful taking of any bicycle, tandem bicycle, unicycle, etc. (except from a Burglary, Robbery, Rape or Murder).

THEFT FROM BUILDINGS: The theft from within a building which is open to the general public and where the offender has legal access.

THEFT FROM COIN-OPERATED DEVICE OR MACHINE: A theft from a device or machine which is operated or activated by the use of a coin. (Includes theft from parking meters.)

LARCENY MISCELLANEOUS: All thefts which do not fit the definitions of the specific categories of Larceny listed above.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. Examples are automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters, snowmobiles, etc.

INDEX OFFENSES: All Part I Offenses except Manslaughter by Negligence and Simple (Non-Aggravated) Assault.

PART II OFFENSES: (Class II Crimes)

All other crimes used in UCR crime classifications which are not those defined as Part I Offenses.

NON-AGGRAVATED ASSAULT: Any assault, or threat to assault, which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

ARSON: Any willful or malicious burning or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, church, college, public building or any building, ship or other vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft; contents of buildings, personal property of another, etc.

FORGERY/COUNTERFEITING: The making, altering, uttering or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true.

FRAUD: Fraudulent conversion and obtaining of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

EMBEZZLEMENT: Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

STOLEN PROPERTY: BUYING, RECEIVING, POSSESSING: All offenses of buying, receiving and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

VANDALISM: The willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control, by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other means as may be specified by local law.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, ETC.: This class deals with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: Manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; Carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; Using, manufacturing, etc., silencers; Furnishing deadly weapons to minors; Aliens possessing deadly weapons; All attempts to commit any of the above.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE: This class includes sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as: Prostitution; Keeping bawdy house, disorderly house or house of ill fame; Pandering, procuring, transporting or detaining women for immoral purposes, etc.; All attempts to commit any of the above.

SEX OFFENSES: (Except Forcible Rape, Prostitution and Commercialized Vice.) This class includes offenses against chastity, common decency, morals and the like, such as: Adultery; Incest; Indecent exposure; Indecent liberties; Intercourse with an insane, epileptic or venereally diseased person; Seduction; Sodomy or crime against nature; Statutory rape (no force); All attempts to commit any of the above.

NARCOTIC DRUG LAWS: This class includes arrests for violations of State and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing and making of narcotic drugs.

GAMBLING: All charges which relate to promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling are included in this category.

OFFENSES AGAINST THE FAMILY AND CHILDREN: This category includes all charges of nonsupport and neglect or abuse of family and children.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE: This class is limited to the driving or operating of any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

LIQUOR LAWS: With the exception of "Drunkenness" and "Driving Under the Influence", liquor law violations, State or local, are placed in this class.

DRUNKENNESS: Included in this class are all offenses of drunkenness or intoxication, with the exception of "Driving Under the Influence".

DISORDERLY CONDUCT: In this class are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace.

VAGRANCY: Persons prosecuted on the charge of being a "suspicious character or person, etc." are included in this class.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES: This class includes all other State or local offenses not included in the above list (Offenses 1 through 25).

SUSPICION - INVESTIGATED AND RELEASED: While "Suspicion" is not an offense, it is the ground for many arrests in those jurisdictions where the law permits. After examination by the police, the prisoner is either formally charged or released. Those formally charged are entered in one of the Part I or Part II offense classes. This class is limited to "Suspicion" arrests where persons arrested are released by the police.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAWS (JUVENILES): Included here are all arrests for violation of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such law exists.

RUNAWAY (JUVENILES): This category includes apprehensions for protective custody as defined by local statute. Arrests made by other jurisdictions or runaways from our jurisdiction are included. Not included here are protective custody with respect to runaways taken for other jurisdictions.

PART III OFFENSES:

A classification of indicators used by individual agencies for their own information system, but not part of the UCR program. Part III as defined in Oregon includes Police Activity, Non-Criminal Complaints and requests for service.

PRIMARY CHARGE: When an individual is detained or cited for more than one offense, the primary charge is the most serious offense for which the person was detained or cited.

ADDITIONAL CHARGES (ALL): All additional offenses for which a person was detained or cited.

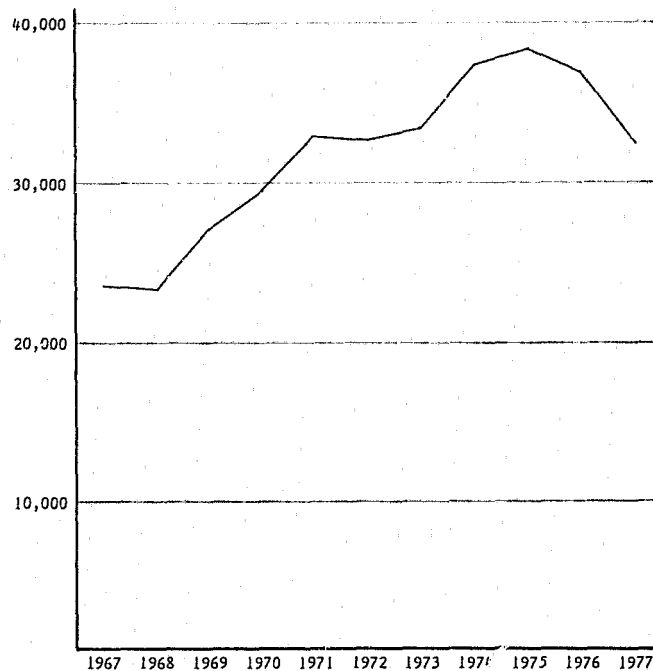

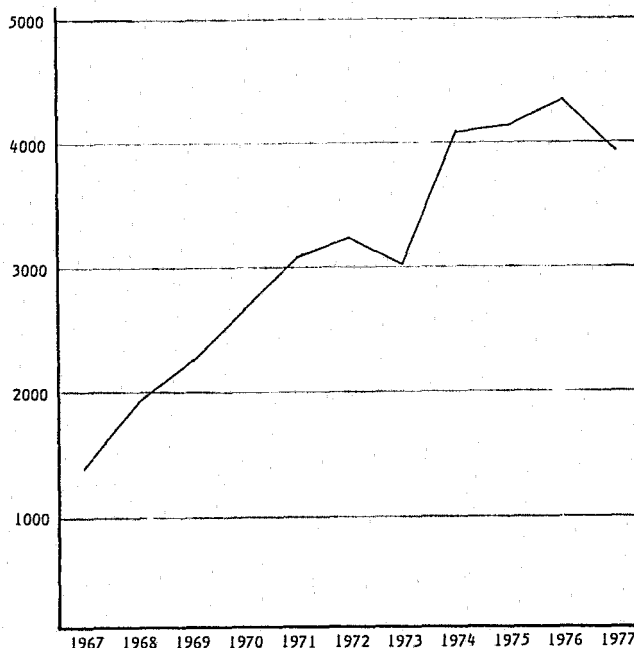

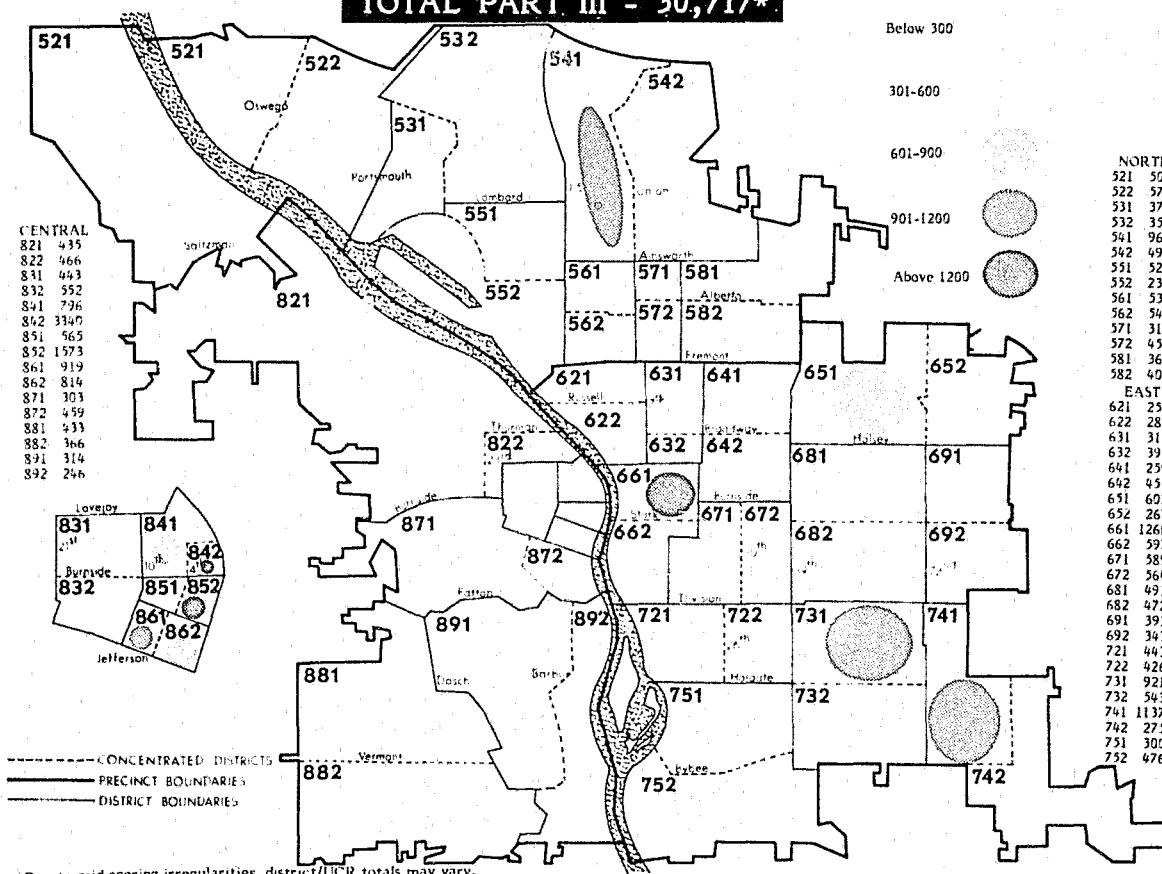
