

# SUMMARY

Departmental population continues to rise (+533 since last year) but at a declining rate of increase. All institutional populations, except that of the Minimum Security Facility are rising or stable (total increase +713 since last year). Community Services population continues to decline (-180). As a result the proportion of the DCDC population which is incarcerated has increased to 61.5% (compared with 54.8% one year ago). Projections necessarily show continued increases in adult facilities, sentenced incarcerated and Detention Services, and continued decreases in parole. There is reason to believe, however, that a turning point has been reached for the incarcerated population which is expected to stabilize. The inmate characteristics section describes a more seriously "criminal", slightly older population which shows a declining involvement in marriage, employment and religion.

## Population Distribution and Trends

Total Department population (Table I) has risen to 6284, an increase of 22 since last quarter. The decrease in Community Services population, from 2464 to 2419 (-45), was more than offset by the increase, from 3798 to 3865 (+67) in the incarcerated population. The increase in the incarcerated population was about equally contributed to by increases in Detention (+31) and Correctional Services (+36) populations.

Comparing the present quarter (October-December, 1976) with the same quarter of 1975 the incarcerated population has increased at an average quarterly rate of 178 compared with the most recent quarterly gain of only 67. The community based population was decreasing at an average quarterly rate of 45 and continues at this rate. The Detention populations rate of increase has also slackened, from an average +103 to the present quarter's 31. A possible conclusion is that the Department's incarcerated population has reached a peak and will not be subject, in the near future, to the unusual increases experienced in the last year or 18 months.

In fact, during the month of December, Detention Services actually decreased in population (-169) from November as did Correctional Services (-15) while Community Services increased by 17.

Table II shows that, at least on a quarterly basis, the incarcerated population continues to increase as a proportion

of the total D.C.D.C. population while Community Services decreases.



## Population Projections

Each of these projections represent the average of three projections done during the quarter, on a monthly basis.

Each of the three uses the previous six months data as a base. A regression equation is derived which describes the straight line which best fits the population data from the prior six months. It is, at best, an imperfect method. OP&PA has recently acquired a programmable calculator. With it various non-linear approaches have been tried (quadratic equations, power curves) but none were consistently more accurate than the simple straight line method presently employed.

Detention: As noted, the unusually high rate of increase in this population has apparently slackened. This is a welcome respite after a 10-month increase of 49%. The projected population for October-December 1977 (1698) is rated as unacceptable because Detention Services is so susceptible to external policy and social changes. The actual population is expected to be lower. The court imposed order controlling the overcrowding of detention facilities would alone preclude such a projection.

Total Sentenced Incarcerated: The projected population of 2839 would require an average monthly increase of 27 persons in this category. Since the average monthly increase during 1976 was 24 persons, and the rate of population increase is

Since the Department is presently at its assumed capacity (approximately 2500) for the sentenced incarcerated, recently heightened sensitivity in other criminal justice agencies to the moral and practical problems of prison overcrowding, may result in ameliorative influences.

Adult Facilities at Lorton: The projected increase of almost 350 is again viewed as unlikely. Some smaller increase is more probable. In the last report the projected average monthly rate of increase was over 40. This quarter the projected average monthly increase has dropped to 29. The direction of change is evident and expected to continue.

Youth Centers: The projection for this category continues to be for a stable population of 550-565. This is, of course, the result of the maintenance of a court imposed maximum allowable population. The average population can never be as high as the allowable maximum (575). The Youth Centers maintain an average count that is less than 3% below their capacity.

Parole: Last quarter the parole population was decreasing at a projected rate of 28 per month. This has dropped to a rate of 21 per month this quarter. The expectation of this office is that this rate of decrease will be slower next quarter.



### Inmate Characteristics

This section is titled "inmate characteristics" but relates only adult characteristics. A request for a similar treatment of youth was forwarded to the Office of Automated Data Processing in June 1976. Several inquiries as to the current status of the project have resulted in assurances that work is progressing. Perhaps it will be completed for the next quarterly report.

The criminal/legal and social characteristics of the adult immate population which are related in this section are not subject to very rapid change. In an attempt to find any longer range changes this report compares present characteristics with those of adult sentenced immates incarcerated in December of 1975 and December 1973. The biggest changes are in the total number of immates (and charges convicted) and the quality of reporting of certain characteristics (narcotic and alcohol histories).

Criminal Information: The mix of "types" of offenders (personal, property, etc.) has not changed much in the last 3 years. There may be a slight shift from statutory to property offenders. The average number of convictions per inmate rose from 1.7 in 1973 to 2.2 in 1975 and 2.4 in 1976. The proportion of repeat offenders (measured in terms of number of times committed) is up as well. These figures show an increasingly

"criminal" service population in D.C.D.C. The Departmental work-load is, then, increasing, not only in size but in difficulty of handling. The proportion of inmates with detainers has also increased substantially. The only characteristic that might indicate some relief is that an increasing proportion of inmates has one year or less to serve (up to 22% in 1976 compared to 14% in 1975).

The younger offenders (18-22) are more often convicted of crimes against persons (44% vs 40% for 23-30 age group and 35% for 31+) but are less likely than older offenders to be serving more than 3 years (60% vs 71% for those over 22).

Social Characteristics: The age composition of adult inmates has shifted upward slightly since 1973 with a decrease of 3% in those under 23 and a corresponding increase in those older. The proportion reporting to be single, separated or divorced has increased from 61% to 69%, while the married percentage dropped from 35% to 27%. There is also a slight disaffiliation with so-called organized religions. Employment has dropped and unemployment rose by 9%. Note that at least 28% of those employed reported earning less than \$2.00 per hour on their last job.

A stable precentage of the population (about 7%) report some mental or physical disability. However, a decreasing proportion report having received any treatment for

disabilities, 46% in 1976 compared with 82% in 1973.

Virtually all of this drop is in the area of mental care.

In the area of narcotic and alcohol histories the most important change is the improvement in reporting. The "unknown" categories dropped 30% for narcotics and 26% for alcohol. However, because of the poor quality of earlier reporting no conclusions as to trends can be derived.
