Preface

As this report so closely follows the format of earlier publications, and the background to these two studeis is fairly well understood, only a brief commentary on the statistics is given.

The first of the two sections of the report deals with referrals made under the Juvenile Liaison arrangement with the Devon & Cornwall Constabulary and the second section concerns the work of the Juvenile Courts in Devon.

Whilst these two areas of work are very closely related, direct comparison between them is not always feasible because of the time delay between a decision to prosecute and actually bringing the case to Court.

Appendices A and B present statistics for both Police Liaison and Courtwork on a localised basis and corrected for population.

As much of the interest in earlier reports has centred on the analysis of Police Liaison at school level, this has been extended considerably, giving details of age, offence and month referred for each school. This information is included in a separate Appendix (Appendix C). As it is of a confidential nature the Appendix is excluded from many of the copies of the report being circulated.

Part 1 Police Liaison

During the year ended 31 March 1978, the Devon County Council Social Services Department's Divisional Offices received 5,556 notifications from the Police under the Juvenile Liaison arrangement. This total included 924 notifications of non-delinquent acts by or against children and a further 288 notifications of delinquency involving children uncer the age of criminal responsibility. The remaining 4,344 notifications indicate the number of offenders reported in the County.

In 1974/75, it is estimated that 4,365 children were referred; this fell to 4,091 in 1975/76 and 4,087 in 1976/77. 1977/78's total is back to the level of four years ago, although the extent of change over the past four years is not that great.

Table 1.1. opposite gives a detailed comparison of the four years' statistics at Social Services Divisional level where the situation can be very different from that at the County level. The clearest point is that whilst reported delinquency in Plymouth has fallen steadily over the four years, there has been a corresponding increase in the other main urban centres of the County - Exeter and Torbay. In the remaining rural Divisions there has been no clear pattern at all.

Main Complaint and Division

The breakdown of the type of complaint leading to the notification given in Table 1.2. reveals some minor points such as the general fall in the number of burglaries and a steady increase in traffic offences, but there has not really been any change over the past four years.

In Plymouth traffic offences are not being notified in the same way as for other parts of the County and this influences the other tables in this report.

Age, Sex and Division

Table 1.3. leaves out non-delinquent offences, but includes the children under 10 years of age reported for delinquent offences. The under-10s are excluded from the main analysis of this report, but a separate examination was undertaken. The main points of interest were: a high level of complaints due to damage to property, proportionately twice as high as for older children, and that six cases did go on to appear in Court, presumably as care proceedings.

Otherwise, the age distribution has been fairly stable over time. There has been a proportionate increase in the number of girls being referred. The average age of boys has fallen marginally and the average age of girls has gone up very slightly. The fall for boys is mainly due to a reduction in the number of 16-year-olds notified.

Age, Sex and Main Offence

The relationship between age, sex and the main offence committed follows the established pattern, with a proportionate fall in theft with increasing age, although for older boys this year this is slightly different than before. Last year there were 308 15-year-old boys referred, compared with 371 this year, and the numbers of 16-year-old boys has fallen from 354 to 229. This drop in theft for 16-year-old boys accounts for all of the change mentioned on page 8.

The distribution of offences committed jointly or alone is consistent with earlier years, apart from 'receiving' falling from 83.7% to 62.4%.

Previous Knowledge

This is one aspect where a clear trend has emerged. As was reported last year, the significance of previous knowledge seems to be increasing. Table 1.5. shows that the overall percentage previously known has fallen slightly this year, but there are some age groups where the upward trend has increased, particularly 11 and 12-year-old girls.

The figures below give an estimate of the numbers previously and not previously known over the full year.

The difference between boys and girls, particularly if previously known, is clear. Last year it was stated that the fall in juvenile delinquency was due to a substantial reduction in the number of first-time offenders. Although this no longer appears to be a definite trend, at least the number of first-time offenders is still below the 1974/75 level.

Recommendation and Division

Three factors - the age of the child, previous knowledge and the recommendation made are closely inter-related. Older children are more likely to have been referred before, and children referred before are more likely to be prosecuted but of these factors it is recommendation that seems to vary the most at Divisional level.

Table 1.6. gives full details. The three Divisions with the highest rates of delinquency, Exeter, Paignton/Brixham and Torquay, have the most 'No More Action' recommendations. Traffic offences are far more likely to result in prosecution (57.5% compared with 28.9% overall), therefore, Divisions not recording traffic offences understate the extent of prosecution.

The recording of voluntary supervision still presents problems. In Paignton/Brixham Division where the recording seems to be quite good the level of prosecution is still at the County average and it seems that the voluntary supervision has the effect of reducing cautions.

On average it takes two weeks for Divisions to reply to the Police with their recommendations, an extra three days are taken if the child is interviewed. Some Divisions are far quicker to reply than others.

The outcome of the case agreed with the recommendation in 98.1% of notifications. 24 recommended cautions resulted in prosecution but 30 recommended prosecutions resulted in caution being given.

Part 2 Courtwork

Division and Cause or Main Complaint

This year has seen a slight reversal of previous years' trends. The number of children before the Court has fallen slightly again, but this is because of a sharp fall in other care proceedings. The number of appearances for theft rose sharply by 158 (39%) but most other criminal proceedings (except public disorder and other traffic offences) remained the same or reduced somewhat. This resulted in a total increase in offenders before the Court of 77.

Reasons for the fall in care proceedings are not fully clear. The numbers of these are now lower than they were in 1974/75 (when there were 141 such proceedings) before public attention was more sharply focussed on the problems of child ill-treatment and neglect, the majority of the reasons for children appearing under other care proceedings. A longer period is probably needed to see whether this is a short-term fluctuation.

The rise in theft is not completely a reflection of more children being referred under liaison arrangements but a higher rate of prosecution. Prosecutions for burglary have fallen steadily since 1974 from 247 to the present 157 but the number of offenders referred under liaison arrangements rose.

Most Divisions have had a very stable flow of children before the Courts since 1974. In some smaller Divisions the numbers have varied more; Bideford showed a steady increase. In Exeter this year there has been quite a drop but this is explained by a fall of 39 in children appearing under other care proceedings.

Age, Sex and Cause or Main Complaint.

In previous years the trend had been to more younger children under 12 and more aged 16 before the Courts. Numbers of 13/15 year olds had been showing a decrease. This has changed somewhat this year in keeping with the changes in reasons for Court appearances. Younger children and girls appear, as is to be expected for the under 10s, on grounds of Care Proceedings. It has been noted that Care Proceedings fell substantially last year. 16 year olds appear more often for burglary and other traffic offences, both of which fell this year.

The rise in prosecutions for theft seem to be the sole reason for more 13/15 year olds before the Court. With these exceptions the pattern of children before the Court seems to remain very static over time. Girls continue to appear in small numbers and only constitute 9.3% of all appearances by offenders (compared with 9.7% in 1976/77 and 11.3% in 1975/76). This also compares with a slight but steady rise in the proportion of girls referred under liaison arrangements which stand at 17.6% in 1975/76 and 19.1% in 1977/78.

Girls have again been involved in a narrower range of offences than boys being mainly for theft, assault and drinks/drugs although considerably more appeared for burglary this year.

Court Result and Cause or Main Complaint.

As with other aspects of Court work discussed so far there has been a slight change in emphasis in the trends of the previous 3 years. Many fewer Care Orders after Care Proceedings but more after criminal proceedings: more Supervision Orders to the Probation Service and fewer to the Social Services Department: a steady increase in Borstal Orders but a fluctuating pattern of Detention Centre Orders.

The number of offences resulting in fines have fallen somewhat this year. This applies to most types of offence. In particular offences of assault, although fewer in number, have resulted in more custodial forms of sentence in Detention Centre or Borstal.

Age, Sex and Court Result.

The fall in the making of Care Orders has affected all age and sex groups this year (not just the younger children it affected last year). Not only have fewer young children been made subject to Care Orders for child abuse, but fewer, adolescent girls beyond control of their parents or in moral danger have been removed under a Care Order.

The Probation Service have taken more of the Supervision Orders for all those aged 14 and over. This is particularly so for 14 year old boys where last year Social Services had twice the number the Probation Service received — now the position is almost reversed.

The large numbers of 16 year olds being fined is mainly a result of their involvement in traffic offences on a fairly large scale compared with younger age groups. These offences more frequently result in a fine.

Division and Court Result.

The availability of local facilities affect the pattern of Court results. Thus the use of the Attendance Centre is available in West Devon but not elsewhere. This seems to affect the numbers in West Devon whose principal outcome is a fine. West Devon also seems to have more revocation of orders than elsewhere - a continuing aspect of their practice.

Reference has already been made to the higher number of Supervision Orders made to the Probation Service this year. This seems to have applied particularly in South Devon where last year few such Orders were made while this year they have predominated in Paignton and Torquay. Elsewhere the balance between the two services has been much the same as before except that in total, many fewer Supervision Orders have been made in East Devon.

The rise in recommendations for Borstal training seem mainly confined to West Devon although Detention Centre is recommended more widely across the County. Care Orders are still a higher proportion of Court results in Exeter than elsewhere although they have halved in absolute numbers compared with last year.

SUMMARY

The outline of this report has been retained now in a similar shape for three years. The total number of children being referred to the Social Services Department by the Police and appearing before the Court have also kept a consistent pattern over this time, although points of detailed change have been apparent.

In liaison arrangements with Police, Plymouth has shown a small but steady decline in total numbers in recent years. This fall has been compensated for by increases in Exeter, Torquay and some rural Divisions, so that in total there has been a 6.5% increase in referrals. This is matched by a 6.3% increase in children before the Courts for delinquent offences. Some of the variations may be accounted for by differing local practices (e.g. few traffic offenders referred in Plymouth), but these patterns have been mainly consistent over time and do not seem to have changed this year.

Some trends have continued from past years. Slightly more children are being referred - fewer children have come to notice for the first time. More girls are also being referred by the Police, but in spite of this, there are even fewer girls before the Court. A slight reversal of one trend from previous years is fewer 16-year-old boys being referred under liaison arrangements after a steady build up in earlier years.

There remains a fairly consistent number of 10 and 11-year-olds before the Juvenile Court for criminal proceedings (37 in 1977/78 and 41 in 1976/77). Most of these have been for theft and have been spread fairly evenly over the Juvenile Courts of the County. The fact of their attendance must reflect our interdepartmental policies and practices.


A cause for concern is the increased number of Gare Orders arising from criminal proceedings — is this due to Courts being faced with the more recalcitrant offender whose need for control is particularly great? Or is it, perhaps, due to the dearth of community—based treatment resources? The sharp drop in care proceedings and Care Orders resulting from them is perhaps even more difficult to explain and probably needs a longer period to assess the long-term trend.

The move to the Probation Service in the making of Supervision Orders is another shift identified this year. Whether it is a reflection of the Courts preference, or follows inter-departmental policies on the division of work between services it is not possible to say - again it possibly needs to be seen in the context of longer-term trends.

Finally, in view of the importance and interest attached to schools, more detailed information about the ages, offences and time of year of notifications has been included as an appendix to this report.
