A Report on the Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facility Census of 1975

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

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Preface

This report, covering the Nation as a whole, presents findings of the 1975 Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facility Census, as well as selected data from previous enumerations. The primary purpose of the report is to provide 1975 information on the basic characteristics of non-Federal public facilities and of privately operated facilities, although references are made to certain nationwide trends observed during the 1971-75 period. The discussion is drawn mainly from selected tables in Appendix I, which display national-level data, and from earlier reports in the series. Information on individual States was limited to a short discussion on the geographic distribution of facilities. Detailed State tables can be found in Appendix II.

For the purposes of this report, juvenile facilities were distinguished along functional lines and, in the case of those within the public sector, according to State or local administration. Much of the information, including the facility counts and the numbers of individuals residing within or staffing the facilities, pertains to mid-1975 (June 30). Other data elements, namely admissions and departures, apply to the full calendar year, whereas the information on expenditures reflects activities during the course of the most recent 12-month fiscal period (which for some facilities coincided with the calendar year).

Conducted early in 1976 by the Bureau of the Census, the 1975 census was the fourth in a series of enumerations sponsored by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA). The first two, covering 1971 and 1973, were directed solely at public facilities, but the coverage was expanded into the private sector beginning with the 1974 census. This program of periodic censuses replaced an annual survey, sponsored by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare (HEW), that yielded data concerning adjudicated juveniles in the custody of public facilities. The results of those surveys were published in reports entitled Statistics on Public Institutions for Delinquent Children. The HEW surveys covered reception or diagnostic centers; training schools; and ranches, forestry camps, or farms. Under LEAA sponsorship, the coverage was expanded to include detention centers and shelters, i.e., facilities intended principally as temporary residences for juveniles awaiting court action, as well as halfway houses and group homes. The basic reports derived from the censuses—typically an advance report and a final report—are published under the title *Children in Custody*. The report on the 1971 census presented a broad overview of the juvenile justice system that has not been duplicated in subsequent issues.

Facsimilies of the questionnaires used in the 1975 census (Form CJ-17 for public facilities and CJ-29 for private ones) appear in Appendix III. The criteria used to identify the facilities canvassed, the techniques of data collection, and the data limitations are described in the methodology (Appendix IV), which is followed by a glossary.

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Introduction

The 1975 census revealed that 2,151 juvenile detention and correctional facilities were in operation throughout the Nation as of June 30 of that year, housing a total of 76,576 individuals. Each of the figures represented modest reductions-amounting to 15 fewer facilities and a 3-percent decrease in residents—over the corresponding totals a year earlier. Both reductions centered on privately operated entities, as there was a 5-percent increase in the number of facilities administered by agencies of State or local government and a 4-percent rise in the residents they housed. The 1975 increase in the number of public-sector residents was widespread, reversing a downward trend that was evident between 1971 and 1974: It involved the population of adjudicated delinquents held in large-capacity secure institutions (mainly training schools), as well as juveniles held in less secure facilities (chiefly group homes), although the rate of increase for the latter was slower than that prevailing during 1971-74.

About 64 percent of the residents of juvenile detention and correctional facilities throughout the United States as of mid-1975 were accommodated in 874 public institutions, and the remainder were housed in 1,277 private facilities. Despite being outnumbered by about 3 to 2, public facilities experienced some 9 in every 10 of the 698,000 admissions to and 684,000 departures from juvenile institutions during 1975. The high proportions of these movements attributed to public facilities stems from the heavy concentration of short-term establishments in the public realm.

Although technically operating outside the public sector, the private facilities served almost exclusively as adjuncts of public ranches or group homes, providing long-term residency for committed youths. The vast majority of private establishments, holding well over four-fifths of all private-sector residents, were of either type. Because of differences in the systemwide functional roles of the two sectors, therefore, it is useful to confine intersectoral comparisons to ranches and group homes. Such a comparison indicates that, despite having a far lower residential capacity per facility, private ranches and group homes accounted for 57 percent of all admissions to and departures from such facilities in 1975.

The number of group home facilities rose rapidly during the early 1970's, reaching a systemwide total of 1,046 in 1975 and making them nearly 3 times more numerous than any other single type of juvenile institution. The rapid growth of group homes in the public sector between 1971 and 1973 (a 91-percent increase) had subsided by 1974; in the private sector, however, group homes increased by 6 percent between 1974 and 1975. Although group homes were key elements of the juvenile facility system because of their rapid growth and large number, training schools remained important because of their relatively high design capacity—averaging 139 residents per facility in the public sector—and the high proportion of juveniles housed in this type of institution. In 1975, training schools accounted for only 12 percent of all public and private facilities but held about two-fifths of the system's residents, including a majority of all adjudicated delinquents. After declining 3 percent from 1971 to 1974, the number of public training schools increased by 2 percent in 1975. Privately operated training schools grew even more significantly (7 percent) between 1974 and 1975.

As of mid-1975, the Nation's 2,151 non-Federal juvenile detention and correctional facilities were staffed by 80,185 employees, a 7-percent increase over the level in 1974. Approximately two-thirds worked in the public sector, and one-third in the private. Part-time employees constituted a growing proportion of the work force, making up between 20 and 30 percent of the total in each sector. When accounting for all employees, full-time as well as parttime, the ratio of juveniles to staff throughout the system was roughly 1 to 1. But among ranches and group homes, where the sectors were functionally most comparable, the private facility ratios were somewhat more favorable than those of the public sector. Similarly, private sector spending at ranches in 1975, \$10,101 on a per capita basis, was substantially greater than that for public facilities (\$9,142). Among group homes, however, it was the public sector that had a higher expenditure per resident-\$8,588 vs. \$8,058.

General Findings

Facilities

The 1975 Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facility Census revealed the midyear operation of 874 non-Federal public facilities and 1,277 private facilities. The great majority of those in the public sector consisted of training schools (21 percent), group homes (22 percent), or detention centers (40 percent), whereas nearly all private-sector facilities were ranches (23 percent) or group homes (67 percent), as shown in Chart 1. The number of public institutions rose from 829 to 874 between midyear 1974 and 1975, the third consecutive enumeration marked by a net increase of approximately 5 percent. Private facilities, on the other hand, decreased 4 percent from 1,337 to 1,277.

Group homes dominate increase

The number of public group homes rose 150 percent during the period 1971-75, including 17 percent between 1974 and 1975. This rapid growth resulted in a shift in the distribution of facilities by type; in 1971 about 1 in every 10 was classified as a group home; whereas in 1975 it was 1 in every 5 (Chart 2). The number of public training schools increased 2 percent from 1974 to 1975, reversing a gradual downward trend that had occurred during the years from 1971 to 1974. Public detention centers also gained in number between 1971 and 1975, at a yearly rate of about 5 percent.

The 4-percent decline in private facilities between 1974 and 1975 was largely the result of a decrease by one-fourth (from 395 to 295) in the number of ranches. Additionally, there was a 13-percent reduction in private short-term institutions—from 76 down to 66. These decreases more than offset a 6-percent growth in training schools and group homes.

Public training schools found nationwide

Detention centers and training schools had the widest geographic distribution among public facilities




Chart 1. Percent distribution of juvenile facilities, by sector and type, midyear 1975

as of mid 1975. The former were represented in all but 6 of the 51 jurisdictions and the latter in all of them, including Massachusetts, which had closed its training schools between 1971 and 1973.2 Public shelte's operated in nine jurisdictions, but numbered only one or two in each, except for the District of Colun bia, which had six; Michigan, five; and lahoma, four. Public reception or diagnostic inters were reported in 14 States, but no jurisdiction had more than one, except California with four. Public ranches were established in half the States, but they were highly concentrated in California—43 out of the nationwide total of 103. In 1971, about onethird of all jurisdictions reported having one or more public group homes. During the next 4 years the proportion nearly doubled, rising to 63 percent in 1974, before declining slightly to 57 percent in 1975. As of June 30 of the latter year, public group homes were found in 29 jurisdictions.

Data pertaining to the geographic distribution of facilities in the private sector were available only for long-term institutions. Among these, group homes were, by far, the most widespread, operating in every jurisdiction except Delaware, and numbering 20 or more homes in each of 15 States. Private ranches were reported in all but eight jurisdictions; however, two States—California and New York—together accounted for nearly a fourth of the total. Training schools were the least common type of private long-term facility. Slightly fewer than half the jurisdictions each had 1, 2, or 3 such institutions within their boundaries, but California reported a total of 13, Pennsylvania 12, and Texas 4.

Drop in average facility size

A decrease in the overall median design capacity of public juvenile facilities from 48 to 33 residents over the 1971-75 period resulted largely from a drop in the median capacity of training schools (from 184 to 139) and from continued growth in the number of smaller sized group homes. For public long-term facilities as a whole, the median capacity dropped by nearly one-half, despite a general stability in the size of ranches and, to a lesser extent, in that of group homes (Chart 3).


The median size of facilities in the private sector showed a slight decline, from 14 in 1974 to 12 in 1975. The difference in the overall average capacity of public and private facilities—33 in the former vs. 12 in the latter as of mid-1975—reflected the disproportionately large number of small group homes in the

private sector; about 3 in every 4 of these facilities had been designed for occupancy by fewer than 15 residents.

Low occupancy rates common

Approximately 36 percent of all public facilities were operating at less than 70 percent of design capacity as of mid-1975, and, for purposes of this study, could be considered insufficiently utilized. About 8 percent were occupied at 110 percent or more, and thus could be considered overutilized. Even though a large share of the public facilities were underutilized in 1975, there has been a significant decrease since 1973 in the proportion of these institutions reporting occupancy rates of less than 70

Number of facilities



percent. On the other hand, overutilization, i.e., occupancy at 110 percent of capacity or more, appeared to have stabilized at 8 percent of all facilities during 1974 and 1975, after fluctuating in earlier years.

Private facilities generally maintained higher occupancy rates than public institutions. This was, at least partly, because the great majority of private facilities were ranches or group homes, where rapid population turnover is uncommon. Nevertheless, very high and very low levels of occupancy were less frequent among private than public facilities (Chart 4). As of midyear 1975, only 2 percent of all private institutions were functioning at 110 percent of design capacity or more, and thus could be considered overcrowded. At the same time, about 21 percent were operating at less than 70 percent of capacity.

Most short-term public facilities admit both sexes

From 1971 to 1974 the proportion of public facilities admitting both boys and girls increased only slightly, from 50 to 53 percent; in 1975 it stood at 52 percent. During 1975, as in the preceding 3 years, nearly all short-term public facilities accepted residents of both sexes, whereas most long-term establishments did not. Relative to public facilities,


private facilities, overall, were much less likely to admit both sexes; this was a consequence of an almost complete lack of short-term institutions in the private sector. When the comparison was limited to long-term facilities, however, the proportion of institutions accepting both sexes was slightly higher among private than public institutions—24 vs. 18 percent.

Admissions and departures

Approximately 1,274,000 admissions and departures were reported by public facilities in 1975, down slightly from the 1974 level of 1,288,000, but more than in either 1973 or 1971. The private sector, lacking the detention center complex responsible for 4 in every 5 movements undertaken by public facilities, accounted for fewer than a tenth of all admissions and departures—108,000 in 1975, up from 101,000 during the previous year.

High turnover rate of residents

Because of the comparatively short stay of most individuals entering the juvenile facility system, both the volume of admissions and that of departures was many times greater than the average daily population residing in juvenile facilities. In the public sector, for example, the 1975 combined total of 1,274,000 admissions and departures was equivalent

to nearly 3,500 per day. Considered in relation to the average public-facility population of about 48,800, this yould indicate that about 7 out of every 100 persons either were entering or leaving the institutions each day (Table A).

The level of admissions to and departures from public facilities varied appreciably by type of institution. Detention centers, principal entry points into the juvenile facility system, recorded the highest turnover (25 per 100 residents), whereas training schools and group homes had the lowest, 1 per 100 residents for each type. The volume of public-sector admissions and departures did not differ greatly for each type of facility between 1974 and 1975.

Court commitments account for most public admissions

Detailed movement data gathered from public training schools and ranches from 1971 through 1975 showed that court commitments made up a majority of the admissions. In the latter year, court commitments accounted for 62 percent of all admissions to training schools and for 71 percent of those to ranches. None of the other categories of admission, including returns from aftercare or parole programs and transfers in from other facilities, accounted for more than a fourth of all admissions.

Most departures from public training schools and ranches during the 5-year period took the form of placement in aftercare or parole programs, although the relative use of these movements tended to drop, while transfers and discharges without supervision were on the increase. In 1975, about half of all departures were effected through placements in aftercare or parole programs. Among the remaining departures, transfers outnumbered unconditional discharges by roughly 2 to 1.

Residents

As of June 30, 1975, a total of 76,576 individuals, 3 percent of whom were nonjuveniles, lived within the juvenile detention and correctional facilities enumerated by the census. Sixty-four percent were in State or local facilities and the remainder in private establishments; within the public sector, persons residing in State institutions outnumbered those in local facilities by about 2 to 1. With respect to the 74,270 juveniles in custody, the vast majority were males, and there was little difference between the average age of residents of each sex. Most of the youngsters were being held as adjudicated delinquents, more than likely as a result of committing a felony rather than a lesser offense.

Trend toward declining population

Juvenile detention and correctional facilities operated by units of government at other than the Federal level held a total of 49,126 persons as of mid-1975. The figure represented an increase of 4 percent over the 47,268 counted a year earlier, reversing an 18-percent drop in population recorded between 1971 and 1974. This change, however, was attended by a 14-percent decrease (from 31,749 to 27,450) between 1974 and 1975 in the population housed within privately operated facilities. In relation to the total of a year earlier, the net result of these diverging counts was a reduction by 2,441 persons, or 3 percent, in the number of residents held nationwide as of mid-1975.

During the 1971-75 period considered as a whole, all types of public facilities except group homes shared in the loss of the juvenile population (Table B). Despite a more than doubling in the number of juveniles within group homes between 1971 and 1975, the total housed in public long-term facilities was 15 percent lower in the latter year, mainly because of a sharp drop in the training school population. Compared with the juvenile population counts for

1973 and 1974, however, the figures for 1975 evidenced that the upturn in residents had affected both short- and long-term facilities and that group homes had experienced a sustained rate of growth throughout the first half of the decade.



The population decline that occurred among public training schools between 1971 and 1975 reduced from 62 to 57 percent the portion of the juvenile population held in that type of facility. Within the private sector, the loss in residents between 1974 and 1975 also involved long-term facilities, notably ranches, whose population declined 23 percent during the 12-month intercensal period. Nevertheless, the vast majority (97 percent) of juveniles within private-sector institutions was being held on a long-term basis. The corresponding proportion for public facilities was 73 percent, reflecting the basic functional differences that exist between the two sectors (Chart 5).

Juveniles average about 15 years of age

The average (mean) age of juveniles in detention and correctional facilities as of mid-1975 was slightly more than 15 years. Among the residents of public institutions, the figure was about 4 months higher for boys than for girls, whose average age was 15 years. Within private facilities there was only about a month's difference in the average age: Approximately 15.3 years for boys and 15.4 for girls. In each

sector the average age of boys and girls varied according to the type of facility. The largest age difference—amounting to 20 months—occurred between boys assigned to private reception or diagnostic centers (14.2 years) and boys held at public ranches (15.9 years).

Boys outnumber girls 3 to 1

More than three-fourths of all individuals housed in the Nation's juvenile facilities as of mid-1975 were boys. Differences were evident, however, in the distribution of the sexes according to sector and facility type (Chart 6). Girls generally made up a higher proportion of the population in private facilities than in public ones, and their numbers were relatively greater in detention centers or shelters than in other kinds of institutions. The reverse—a relatively higher concentration of boys-was true at ranches, whether public or private. Similarly, boys were housed in private training schools in numbers disproportionately higher than their share of the total private-facility population. Private shelters were the only facility group, in either sector, in which girls outnumbered boys-52 vs. 48 percent.

Detention status differs by sector

As in the preceding years, detention status was a key characteristic for differentiating detention and correctional facility populations in the public sector from those in the private sphere. At mid-1975, adjudicated delinquents represented 72 percent of all juveniles in public facilities, but only 36 percent of those in private facilities (Table C). Juveniles admitted voluntarily, together with those classified as dependent or neglected, constituted only 2 percent of the public-facility total; in sharp contrast, these groups made up nearly two-fifths of the private-sector population.

Juveniles adjudicated as delinquents were the only detention status group in the public sector that grew between 1974 and 1975. Most of this growth occurred within State-administered facilities, where the adjudicated delinquent population rose 11 percent By contrast, among private facilities, the number of adjudicated delinquents dropped 1 percent between 1974 and 1975, as did persons in need of supervision (or PINS, who declined by 13 percent), voluntary admissions (-23 percent), and dependent or neglected children (-32 percent).

The majority of both male and female juveniles in public facilities were adjudicated delinquents, but the proportion among boys was greater than that among girls (77 vs. 54 percent). On the other hand, 22 percent of the girls were persons in need of supervision, as compared with only 6 percent of the boys. In private facilities, adjudicated delinquents were the single largest detention status group among both the male and female populations. But unlike the proportions in the public sector, they made up less than a majority, 40 percent of the boys and 27 percent of the girls, with voluntary admissions and dependent or neglected persons accounting for relatively substantial shares of the population for each of the sexes.

Felony-type offenses predominate

Among the adjudicated delinquents and PINS for whom offense data were reported in the public sector in 1975,³ half were being held for felonies, 26 percent for status offenses, 19 percent for misdemeanors, and 5 percent for drug offenses. There were, however,

depending on whether the juveniles were adjudicated delinquents or PINS and on whether they were male or female. Within the adjudicated delinquent population, boys were more likely than girls to be detained for felonies and less apt to be held for status offenses. Approximately 64 percent of all boys, but only 25 percent of all girls, adjudicated as delinquents were confined for felonies. Conversely, 43 percent of the girls, but only 10 percent of the boys were detained for status offenses. Among PINS, roughly 9 in every 10 males or females had been committed for status offenses, and about 3 percent of each sex were in custody for felonies.

considerable differences in these proportions

Regardless of whether they had been placed in custody because of a felony, status offense, misdemeanor, or drug violation, adjudicated delinquents and PINS in public facilities were more likely to be confined in training schools than in any other single type of facility. Nearly two-thirds of all delinquents and PINS were held in training schools (Table D). Ranches, which held 16 percent of those individuals, ranked second. Detention centers, the third class of secure facility, held a high proportion (19 percent) of those detained for status offenses.

Longer detention time in private facilities

On the average, juveniles in private facilities spent substantially more time in custody than their counterparts in public facilities. This was true for

¹ Consists of emotionally disturbed or mentally retarded juveniles awaiting transfer for specialized treatment.

Identification of the type of offense leading to placement as an adjudicated delinquent or as a PINS was provided for approximately 64 percent of the relevant individuals held in public facilities on June 30, 1975. The unavailability of offense data for some jurisdictions reflects legal or recordkeeping practices. Because of the substantial underreporting, the information on offenses may or may not be representative of all adjudicated delinquents and PINS. Nevertheless, similar findings from the 1973 and 1974 censuses suggest that the data are reasonably accurate and that the proportion of adjudicated delinquents and PINS in each of the offense categories has remained relatively unchanged.

long-term and short-term facilities alike, as well as for specific types of institutions, including ranches and group homes, where the great majority of private-sector residents were housed. The average stay for juveniles in private facilities amounted to 10 months and 7 days, compared with an average confinement of only 3 months and 27 days for those in public institutions.

Among public facilities in 1975, training schools confined juveniles for the longest period of time—an average of about 7.6 months. Individuals held at ranches spent the second-longest period (about 6.5 months), followed by those assigned to group homes (5.8 months). By comparison, in private facilities the longest average stay was at ranches (slightly more than 13 months), followed by training schools (nearly 11 months), and group homes (just over 10 months).

During the 1971-75 period, the average length of stay by juveniles confined in public training schools or group homes tended to decline, while remaining fairly stable or fluctuating for the other types of public facilities. There were sharp drops between 1974 and 1975 in the average length of residency within each of the three types of private long-term institutions.

Staff

The number of personnel serving in public juvenile facilities remained at roughly the same level from 1971 to 1974—approximately 45,500—then rose 15 percent to about 52,500 in 1975. Staff members in the private sector totalled about 27,700 in 1975, a decline

of 3 percent from the figure recorded in 1974. Thus, with about 46 percent more institutions but a much smaller number of residents, private-sector facilities were staffed by nearly half as many personnel as found in the public sector.

Increase in nonpayroll and part-time staff

As in past years, the 1975 staff of public facilities was composed predominantly of full-time workers paid directly by the employing facility. However, the number of nonpayroll personnel in public facilities rose 145 percent from 1973 to 1975, greatly exceeding the increase in payroll workers (6 percent). By 1975, nonpayroll personnel accounted for about 17 percent of the total staff. A more than doubling in the size of the part-time staff between 1973 and 1975 also was relatively much greater than the growth of full-time personnel, who increased only 5 percent. It is possible, however, that a more accurate tally of community volunteers, enumerated separately from other personnel for the first time in 1975, accounted to some extent for the appreciably higher total of parttime workers in public institutions.

Data were unavailable for 1975 concerning the distribution of full- and part-time personnel in privately operated facilities. A year earlier, however, approximately 3 of every 10 workers were employed on a part-time basis. The level of nonpayroll, public-sector employees rose 38 percent between 1974 and 1975, whereas that of payroll workers declined 11 percent.

Personal custody workers are largest group

Approximately two-fifths of all public-sector staff members in 1975 performed personal custody activities. Treatment and educational workers were the second largest group (36 percent), followed by operational and maintenance workers (15 percent); administrative personnel made up a tenth of the total. Reflecting an overall pattern of stability throughout the public system, there were no significant shifts in the overall functional distribution of the workforce between 1971 and 1975.

Trend toward fewer residents per staff

The maintenance of a relatively stable public-sector staff, in the face of a declining residential population, resulted in the lowering of the number of juvenile residents per full-time staff member (payroll and nonpayroll combined) from 1.4 in 1971 to 1.1 in 1974 and 1975. Strictly comparable figures were not available for private facilities, although data on the number of juvenile residents per full-time payroll worker—1.6 in both 1974 and 1975—suggest that the corresponding ratio was less favorable than in the public sphere.

The trend toward a lower ratio of juveniles to public full-time personnel was apparent during 1971-75 for each type of facility and each category of personnel. Among the 6 types of facilities, detention centers showed the greatest reduction in this ratio, from 1.3 residents per each full-time staff member in 1971 to 0.9 in 1975. Resident-to-staff ratios as of 1975 varied widely according to the type of personnel, from a low of 2.8 to 1 among personal custody workers, to a high of 9.6 to 1 for administrative employees. The latter group, together with treatment and educational personnel, registered the greatest improvement during 1971-75 in the ratio of residents to staff (Table E).

Expenditures

Expenditures by non-Federal juvenile detention and correctional facilities in the United States amounted to nearly \$868 million in 1975. Approximately two-thirds of this amount was expended by public institutions and one-third by private facilities. In both the public and private sectors, about 9 of every 10 dollars were committed for operating expenses (gross salaries and wages, employee benefits, food, supplies, and contractual services) and the remainder for capital outlays.

Increased per capita spending in each sector

Total expenditures in the public sector during fiscal 1975 amounted to \$594.1 million, a 17-percent

increase over the 1974 total and 30 percent more than in 1971.5 The latest increase, which exceeded the economy's inflation rate, probably was associated with the growth in staff size. In contrast to the increase in public sector expenditures, private-facility outlays were down 7 percent, from \$294.0 million in 1974 to \$273.6 million in 1975. The decline principally was a result of lower expenditures of all types for ranches and less capital spending for training schools and group homes.

The public sector's higher level of spending was also reflected in its operating costs, which rose 64 percent on a per capita basis, from \$7,002 in 1971 to \$11,469 in 1975. Among the four most numerous types of public institutions—detention centers, group homes, training schools, and ranches—the largest gain in per capita costs during 1971-75 took place in detention centers (72 percent) and the smallest at ranches (38 percent). In the private sector, the general decline in spending between 1974 and 1975 was more than offset by a 14-percent reduction in residents, so that the overall per capita operating expenditure of \$9,516 in 1975 was, in fact, 11 percent higher than a year earlier. In both the public and private sectors, however, a substantial proportion of the cost increases was attributable to inflation.

Public facilities, whether specializing in long- or short-term custody, generally cost more to operate on a per capita basis during fiscal year 1975 than did private facilities. And, within each of the sectors, short-term institutions required greater per capita funding than did long-term facilities (Table F). There were exceptions, however, to both observations. Thus, although the overall per capita expense figure was 21 percent higher for public facilities than for

those privately operated, private ranches cost about 8 percent more to operate than their public counterparts, and the difference with respect to training schools was relatively small (about 4 percent more in public than private facilities). Moreover, the operation of private training schools (i.e., a type of long-term facility) was somewhat more expensive than that of private short-term facilities as a whole. For the Nation at large (including both the private and public sectors), the 1975 average per capita operating cost was \$10,778, encompassing \$12,853 for short-term facilities and \$10,302 for long-term institutions.

Sharp rise in public capital outlays

Capital spending for new buildings, major repairs or improvements, and equipment declined by nearly half (48 percent) in the public sector between 1971 and 1974, then rose markedly—41 percent—in 1975. This reversal stemmed chiefly from large capital investments affecting ranches (126 percent) and group homes (149 percent). The 26-percent reduction in capital expenditures reported for private facilities between 1974 and 1975 resulted mainly from decreased outlays for the same two types of facilities: 29 percent less was allocated for ranches and 21 percent less for group homes.



Appendix IV

Methodology

The 1975 Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facility Census, fourth in a series of enumerations sponsored by LEAA, was designed to gather data on the nationwide complex of residential facilities holding juveniles in custody. The first two censuses, in 1971 and 1973, were restricted to public facilities, but the 1974 and 1975 enumerations were expanded to include private facilities, partially in response to the passage of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974. Data for all censuses were collected for LEAA by the Bureau of the Census. The 1975 census was conducted in February 1976.

Facility selection criteria

The facilities covered in the 1975 census were residential juvenile establishments operated by State or local governments, or by private entities, as:

- detention centers;
- shelters:
- · reception or diagnostic centers;
- e training schools;
- ranches, forestry camps, or farms; and
- halfway houses or group homes.

For purposes of tabulation and analysis, the first three of these types of facilities were considered short-term institutions, whereas the last three were categorized as long-term facilities.

In response to an increased interest in the extent to which juvenile facilities emphasized rehabilitation-oriented programs, the 1975 questionnaire included an additional facility type—residential treatment centers (defined as facilities serving juveniles whose behavior does not necessitate the strict confinement of a training school, often allowing them greater contact with the community). It was anticipated that all respondents would be able equally to determine whether this classification was applicable to their facility. However, uneven responses necessitated the elimination of this category and the reclassification of facilities according to the six types listed above.

To have been included in the 1975 census, juvenile detention and correctional facilities in the public sector were required to have been in operation at the time the census was conducted (February 1976), to have been in operation at least a month before the census reference date (June 30, 1975), and to have had a resident population in which juveniles made up

at least 50 percent of the total. The last-mentioned criteria, however, did not apply to California State-administered facilities that held youthful offenders in addition to juveniles; these facilities were included in the census even in cases where the youthful offender population outnumbered the juvenile component.

In addition to meeting the criteria for public establishments, private facilities were eligible for enumeration if a minimum of 10 percent of their residents were:

- adjudicated delinquents,
- persons in need of supervision,
- voluntary admissions,
- persons awaiting transfer to another jurisdiction, or
- persons held pending disposition by the courts.

Excluded were facilities in which more than 90 percent of the residents were dependent or neglected individuals or other nonoffenders.

Specifically excluded from the 1975 census were juvenile detention centers operated as a part of local jails but lacking a separate staff or budget; Federal juvenile facilities; nonresidential facilities; foster homes; and facilities exclusively for drug abusers, alcoholics, dependent or neglected persons, unwed mothers, the emotionally distrubed, or the mentally retarded.

Census procedures and response rate

Names and addresses of public and private facilities for the 1975 census were based on the mailing list used in 1974, appropriately updated from the 1974-75 edition of the Directory of Correctional Institutions and Agencies, published by the American Correctional Association, and the 1975 edition of State Comprehensive Lev Enforcement Plans, prepared by each State for LEAA. This updated list was then sent to juvenile correctional authorities in each State for review and correction.

All four censuses were conducted by mail. For the 1975 enumeration, there was an initial mailout of the 1975 Public Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facilities Census questionnaire (Form CJ-17) to 971 public facilities; of these, 350 were mailed to 41 central reporting units. The remaining 621 questionnaires were mailed directly to individual facilities, as was the 1975 Private Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facilities Census questionnaire (Form CJ-29), sent to 1,723 private facilities. Not all of these facilities met the stipulated criteria and, accordingly, were excluded. Institutions that failed to respond initially were mailed second and third

requests, as appropriate. A subsequent followup to those still failing to report was made by telegram or telephone.

An overall response rate of 100 percent was achieved for public facilities that met the selection criteria; the rate for private facilities was 95 percent. For the few private facilities that ultimately did not respond to the census, data were supplied from the questionnaires returned in the 1974 Census.

Respondents were requested to provide estimates for data that could not be obtained from available records. They also were asked to submit expenditure information on a fiscal year basis, i.e., for the period from July 1, 1974, to June 30, 1975. Many provided information on such a basis; however, other reference periods, such as a calendar year, were acceptable.

Limitations of the data

All data collected for the 1975 census and previous enumerations reflect State-by-State variation among juvenile justice systems, and thus require caution when making comparative interpretations. The comparison of data is also limited by changes in the questionnaires of each enumeration. In the 1975 census, as in the previous counts, facilities were selfclassified. For the 1971 enumeration, respondents were asked to mark the type of facility most applicable. For those of 1973, 1974, and 1975, they were requested to indicate which type of facility applied primarily; if they had multiple functions, they were instructed to check as many types as were applicable, with the primary classification being determined in followup efforts. Where administration by more than one level of government was indicated, facilities were classified by the level of government providing the most funding.

Various methodological changes were made in the 1973 and subsequent enumerations on the basis of information and experience gained from the administration of the 1971 census. Most of these were definitional changes, indicating differing interpretations for part-time employment, gross sataries and wages, and capital expenditures. Details of these and other definitional changes are documented in the glossary. Additional changes involved different approaches in tabulation, i.e., whether to use the total resident ropulation as the universe (as was done in 1971), or 's restrict the universe to the juvenile population (which was the general pattern in 1973), or to use both methods, i.e., the total resident population as the universe for some tabulations and the juvenile population only for other tabulations (as was the procedure in 1974 and 1975).

In the 1971, 1973, and 1975 enumerations, the nonjuvenile component of the population included youthful offenders as well as "other" adults, whereas in the 1974 census it consisted only of youthful offenders. The midyear distributions of nonjuvenile residents for each of the censuses is as follows:

The 1975 youthful offender figure included 2,072 males and 58 females, all of them in California public facilities. Of the 176 adult residents counted in the 1975 census, 16 males (all in public facilities) were in Montana, whereas private-sector institutions held 152 males and 8 female distributed among Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Hampshire, North Dakota, and Oregon.

Glossary

Adjudicated delinquent—Detention status of a juvenile who, as the result of a formal and completed judicial proceeding, is adjudged a delinquent, usually for a nonstatus offense—one for which an adult could be prosecuted in a criminal court. Includes some status offenders, especially in States without special status offender statutes. Even in States with such statutes, juveniles with previous offenses can be adjudicated delinquent for status offenses. Conversely, a judge can declare a juvenile to be a person in need of supervision (defined below) for a felony or misdemeanor.

Administrative staff—Includes employees in such positions as superintendent, administrator, assistant administrator, director, business manager, purchasing agent, stenographer, bookkeeper, accountant, switchboard operator, clerk, and typist.

Age—Pertains to the age of the youngest and oldest resident, including nonjuveniles. For the 1971 census the information was based on the completion date of the questionnaire, whereas for the 1973, 1974, and 1975 censuses it was as of June 30th. Average age data for the 1973 and 1974 censuses pertain to all residents, but for the 1975 enumeration include only juveniles.

Awaiting transfer to another jurisdiction—Detention status of a juvenile who allegedly has committed a crime in, or run away from, another jurisdiction and is being held pending return to that jurisdiction. Includes runaways from other correctional facilities. Excludes adjudicated delinquents awaiting placement in a correctional facility.

Capital expenditures—For the 1974 and 1975 censuses, includes costs for new buildings, major repairs or improvements, and new equipment, including single expenditures of any amount. For the 1973 census, includes spending for new buildings, major repairs or improvements, and new equipment costing \$1,000 or more, but excludes single expenditures of less than \$1,000. For the 1971 census, includes spending for new buildings, major repairs or improvements, and new equipment costing \$100 or more.

Child in need of supervision (CHINS)—See "Person in need of supervision," below.

Dependent and/or neglected—A juvenile over whom a juvenile court assumes jurisdiction because of its finding that the care exercised by parent, guardian, or custodian falls short of a legal standard for proper care. Excludes juveniles held on delinquency charges, adjudicated delinquents, and those declared in need of supervision, even if they also could be considered dependent and/or neglected. On the data tables, the category appears as "Dependent and neglected."

Design capacity—The number of persons a facility is designed to hold, exclusive of arrangements, if any, to alleviate overcrowding, such as the use of double-deck bunks in a unit designed for single bunks, or the conversion to sleeping quarters of space that was designed for other purposes.

Detention center—A short-term facility that provides temporary care in a physically restricting environment for juveniles in custody pending court disposition and, often, for juveniles who are adjudicated delinquent and are awaiting placement or transfer to another jurisdiction.

Detention status—One of the following statuses under which juveniles are held: adjudicated delinquent, person in need of supervision, held pending court disposition, awaiting transfer to another jurisdiction, voluntary admission, and dependent and neglected.

Discharged without further supervision—An unconditional departure or release from a detention or correctional facility.

Drug offense—A drug-related offense that if committed by adults would normally have been classified as a felony or misdemeanor.

Felony—An offense that if committed by an adult would be considered a felony. Excludes felony-type drug offenses.

Gross salaries and wages—A component of operating expenditures. For the 1973, 1974, and 1975 censuses, excludes employer contributions to employee benefits. For the 1971 census, includes the value of compensation for meals, lodging, and uniforms for facility personnel.

Group home—See "Halfway house and group home," below.

Halfway house and group home—A long-term facility in which residents are allowed extensive contact with the community, such as attending school or holding a job.

Held pending court disposition—Detention status of a juvenile who has not had a hearing or who has had only a preliminary, screening, detention, or similar hearing and is awaiting further court action.

Juvenile—In most States, a person under age 18. With respect to juveniles in custody, a person subject to juvenile court proceedings because a statutorily defined event (usually, but not necessarily, an

offense) is alleged or demonstrated to have occurred while his/her age was below the statutory limit of original jurisdiction of a juvenile court.

Juvenile in need of supervision (JINS)—See "Person in need of supervision," below.

Juvenile offense-See "Status offense," below.

Long-term facility—A correctional, as opposed to a detention, facility. Includes training schools; ranches, forestry camps, and farms; and halfway houses and group homes.

Minor in need of supervision (MINS)—See "Person in need of supervision," below.

Nonjuvenile—With respect to persons in custody, one within the original jurisdiction of a criminal rather than a juvenile court because his/her age at the time of an alleged crime was above the statutory limit.

Nonpayroll staff—Full-time or part-time personnel not on the payroll of the reporting facility. Includes individuals paid by a parent agency or service who are assigned to the juvenile facility, personnel paid under contractual agreements or Federal grants, and college interns. Excludes community volunteers in 1971, when they were not counted, and in 1975, when they were counted as a separate group.

Operational expenditures—Gross salaries and wages, plus other operating expenses.

Operational, maintenance, and other staff—In addition to housekeeping personnel, includes all other employees not classified within the administrative staff, personal custody staff, or treatment and educational staff.

Other operating expenditures—A component of operating expenditures. For the 1973, 1974, and 1975 censuses, covers expenditures for food, supplies, and contractual services. For the 1971 census, also includes the fair market value of free commmodities or services provided by any public or charitable organization.

Payroll staff—Full-time and part-time personnel on the payroll of the reporting facility.

Personal custody staff—Employees in charge of the daily supervision and guidance of the residents. Includes such personnel as house parents, group supervisors, group workers, cottage parents, and matrons.

Person in need of supervision (PINS)—Detention status of a juvenile declared by a juvenile court to be in need of supervision. Encompasses those known variously as child in need of supervision (CHINS), juvenile in need of supervision (JINS), and minor in need of supervision (MINS), as well as those designated as unruly, unmanageable, or incorrigible

under special statutes for status offenders. All PINS are not status offenders, and all status offenders are not PINS. Even in States with status offender statutes, juveniles with previous offenses can be adjudicated delinquent for status offenses. Conversely, a judge can declare a juvenile to be a person in need of supervision for a felony or misdemeanor.

Placed in aftercare or parole program—A conditional departure or release from a juvenile detention or correctional facility.

Private facility—For this report, a juvenile detention or correctional facility subject to governmental licensing, but under the direct administrative and operational control of private enterprise; typically receives substantial governmental funding, in addition to support by private sources.

Public facility—For this report, a juvenile detention or correctional facility under the direct administrative and operational control of a State or local government and staffed by public employees.

Ranch, forestry camp, and farm—A long-term residential facility for persons whose behavior does not necessitate the strict confinement of a training school, often allowing them greater contact with the community.

Recommitment—A type of admission involving persons who commit a new offense and are recommitted by court order, even if these persons are in an aftercare or parole status.

Reception or diagnostic center—A short-term facility that screens persons committed by courts and assigns them to appropriate correctional facilities.

Resident—A person, juvenile or nonjuvenile, held in a juvenile detention or correctional facility.

Return from aftercare or parole—A type of admission involving persons returned to confinement for violations of the conditions of aftercare or parole. Excludes those returned for new offenses.

Shelter—A short-term facility that provides temporary care similar to that of a detention center, but in a physically unrestricting environment.

Short-term facility—A detention, as opposed to a correctional, facility. Includes detention centers, shelters, and reception or diagnostic centers.

Status offense—An act or conduct that is declared by statute to be an offense, but only when committed or engaged in by a juvenile, and that can be adjudicated only by a juvenile court. Typical status offenses are violation of curfew, running away from home, truancy, possession of alcoholic beverages, and leading an immoral life. Both adjudicated

delinquents and juveniles declared to be persons in need of supervision can be status offenders.

Training school—A long-term specialized type of facility that provides strict confinement for its residents.

Teatment and educational staff—Employees who provide professional services to the residents. Includes such personnel as psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers, case workers, counselors, classification officers, chaplains, librarians, aftercare or parole workers, recreation workers, physicians, dentists, registered nurses, practical nurses, medical aides, principals, and teachers.

Voluntary admission—A type of admission in which a juvenile voluntarily commits himself/herself to a facility without being adjudged by a court to be delinquent or in need of supervision. The juvenile may be referred to the facility for treatment by parents, court, school, or social agency.

Youthful offender—A person, adjudicated in criminal court, who may be above the statutory age limit for juveniles but below a specified upper age limit, for whom special correctional commitments and special record-sealing procedures are made available by statute. The special correctional commitment may be to a juvenile facility, to a special section of an adult facility, or to a separate facility for the confinement of persons between the age limits specified in the particular statute. Such provisions exist in Federal law and in the laws of several states.
