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INTRODUCTION

Crime and Delinquency in California is an annual report published by the Bureau of Criminal Statistics (BCS). It presents data on the nature and extent of crime and delinquency and the manner in which criminal justice is administered in the state. Since 1945, the Bureau has been the state's central agency for the collection of statistical data on the number and types of offenses known to authorities; the personal and social characteristics of criminals and delinquents; and the administrative actions taken by criminal justice agencies.

"Crime and Delinquency in California, 1978" is the 27th annual report compiled by the Bureau. In order to make information available at the earliest possible time, the report is presented in two parts. Part I displays statewide data on crimes, arrests, the number of law enforcement personnel, and the amount of law enforcement expenditures. Crime and arrest data for each county and for the 36 largest law enforcement agencies in the state are provided in Appendix A. Part II will be available in June 1979. It will include data on adult and juvenile offenders processed through the court and correctional systems, as well as personnel and expenditure information for those systems.

Information contained in Parts I and II is compiled from reports submitted to the Bureau on a regular basis by state and local criminal justice agencies. Also, many agencies are surveyed for possible reasons for fluctuations from year to year. Some of the interpretive analyses are based on the results of these surveys.

In addition to the Bureau's Crime and Delinquency report, a supplemental report series, Criminal Justice Profiles, is published annually. Individual reports are prepared for the state and each of the 58 counties. The reports contain ten-year trend data for the state and individual counties as well as annual county and jurisdictional data for the report year. Criminal justice data not provided in either the Crime and Delinquency report or the Profile series may be available from the Bureau on a special request basis.

CRIMES

Crime is a term generally used to describe human behavior and activities that have been declared illegal. They range from those treated as insignificant to those that excite concern and are a distinct hazard to either persons or property. Offenses that can result in a state prison sentence or punishment by death are called felonies. Less serious offenses that can result in either a fine or a sentence of not more than one year in a county jail are termed misdemeanors.

The exact number of crimes committed is unknown. Not all felony crimes, and fewer misdemeanors, are reported to the police. This may happen if victims consider offenses against them to be insignificant, believe nothing can be done about them, or fear retaliation from offenders. In some instances, victims may have participated willingly in gambling or drug usage and therefore benefit from remaining silent. The more serious the offense the more likely it is to become known to the police.

California law enforcement agencies report information on the more serious crimes through the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. The Bureau of Criminal Statistics (BCS) administers the UCR Program in the state and forwards the data to the FBI for use in its annual publication.

The seven major crimes most likely to be reported to law enforcement agencies are referred to as the Crime Index by the FBI; BCS labels them the Seven Major Offenses. For classification purposes, the Seven Major Offenses are divided into two groups: crimes against persons and crimes against property. Crimes against persons includes willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Crimes against property includes burglary, theft (\$200 and over), and motor vehicle theft.

The FBI and BCS differ in the method of presentation of crime data. The FBI includes all thefts, regardless of dollar value, in its total theft category. BCS includes only those thefts valued at \$200 or more. Table 1 of this report includes both the FBI Crime Index and the California Seven Major Offenses totals to allow comparisons between the two indices.

There are differences between the UCR Program and the California Penal Code in the definitions of some crimes. For example, thefts from locked vehicles and telephone booths are considered as thefts for UCR purposes, but are defined as burglaries in the California Penal Code. Also, shoplifting (where intent to enter a premise to commit theft can be established) is classified as burglary in California but counted as theft by UCR. In cases where differences exist, this publication utilizes the UCR Program definition.

CRIMES - SEVEN MAJOR OFFENSES


Table 1 presents data on total crimes reported annually in California for the years 1973 through 1978. Because smaller numbers are involved, there is frequently more variability in percent changes for low volume crimes, such as willful homicide, than in high volume crimes, such as burglary.

In 1978, the Seven Major Offenses increased 6.6 percent over the prior year in California (from 917,358 to 977,985), representing the largest annual increase since 1975. Theft (\$200 and over) and robbery showed the largest increases, up 10.5 percent and 9.2 percent respectively. From 1973 to 1978, the Seven Major Offenses rose 32.1 percent (from 740,157 to 977,985). Theft increased 105.0 percent and aggravated assault posted a 46.2 percent increase.

Changes in numbers of crimes are often more meaningful when discussed in relation to changes in population during the same periods. Crime rates are based on the number of crimes per 100,000 population in the state during the year shown. Population estimates for each year are compiled by the California Department of Finance.

Also shown in Table 1 are annual percent changes in the Seven Major Offenses crime rates from 1973 through 1978. In 1978, the crime rate rose 4.7 percent over 1977. From 1973 to 1978, there was a 22.9 percent increase. There were increases each year, except from 1976 to 1977 when a 0.7 percent decrease occurred.


CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS

Crimes against persons, as shown in Chart B, represented only a small proportion of the Seven Major Offenses (16.8 percent). These crimes generally cause the most concern and receive the most attention. At the same time, they are often impossible for the police to anticipate or prevent. They involve a violent or potentially violent face-to-face confrontation between the victim and offender. Two crimes, robbery and aggravated assault, accounted for 91.6 percent of all crimes against persons but only 15.4 percent of the total Seven Major Offenses.

Table 1 shows that from 1977 to 1978 the number of crimes against persons increased 7.8 percent (from 152,827 to 164,751). Robbery showed the greatest increase in number, 9.2 percent. From 1973 to 1978, total crimes against persons rose 41.4 percent in number. The crime showing the greatest percent increase for this period was aggravated assault, up 46.2 percent.

From 1977 to 1978, the rate per 100,000 population for crimes against persons rose 5.9 percent. Within that category, robbery registered the greatest gain, up 7.2 percent. The rate for crimes against persons increased 31.5 percent from 1973 to 1978. Aggravated assault showed the largest increase, 36.0 percent.

Willful Homicide - The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. (Includes murder and nonnegligent manslaughter.)

In 1978, these crimes represented only 0.3 percent of total crimes and 1.6 percent of crimes against persons. Table 2 shows that 2,601 willful homicides were reported in the state in 1978. This total represented a 4.8 percent increase over 1977 and a 39.7 percent increase over the 1973 total. Some law enforcement officials attributed part of the rise to increased gang activity (prison gangs and youth gangs).


Percent changes from one given year to a subsequent year are not calculated when the given base year number is less than 50.

Table 2 and Chart C contain information on the type of weapon used in the commission of willful homicides. Firearms were used in over 55 percent of the homicides in 1973, 1977, and 1978. The second most frequently used weapon was a knife or cutting instrument. Though small in numbers, the use of a club more than doubled, from 76 in 1973 to 158 in 1978.

Data on homicides involving peace officers are summarized in Table 3. From 1973 through 1977, the number of justifiable homicides committed by peace officers increased each year, from a low of

64 in 1973 to a high of 97 in 1977. However, in 1978 this trend was reversed, with the homicides dropping to 87.

In contrast, the number of peace officers killed in the line of duty fluctuated, with a high of 16 in 1973 and a low of 6 in 1976. In 1978, 12 peace officers were killed, 10 of whom were killed during incidents such as ambushes, traffic stops, and kidnappings.

Forcible Rape - The carnal knowledge of a female forsibly and against her will. (Includes attempts to commit forcible rape.)

Forcible rape offenses rose 5.0 percent from 1977 to 1978 (from 10,715 to 11,249). From 1973 to 1978, there was an overall increase of 34.7 percent. Table 4 shows data for the two forcible rape categories (rape by force and attempts to commit forcible rape) for 1973, 1977, and 1978. Rape by force comprised about two-thirds of the total for each year.

A number of factors may have contributed to the rise in the number of reported forcible rapes. There has been an increased willingness on the part of victims to report these crimes. This is largely the result of legislation, which became effective in 1976, modifying interviewing and processing procedures to better protect the rights and privacy of rape victims. Some communities have established rape crisis clinics which further encourage victims to report the crimes to the police. In addition, some of the increase may be attributed to offenders in several areas of the state who committed multiple rapes.

Robbery - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

As shown in Table 5, the number of robberies reported in 1978 increased 9.2 percent over 1977 (from 62,207 to 67,920). Robberies which occurred on highways (including streets, parks, parking lots, etc.) had the greatest numeric increase, from 25,707 in 1977 to 29,489 in 1978. The largest percent increase was in bank robberies (27.0 percent). The only decrease (12.3 percent) was in the miscellaneous category, which includes all other locations. From 1973 to 1978, there was a 37.1 percent increase in total robberies and a 221.3 percent increase in bank robberies.



From 1977 to 1978, armed robberies increased 8.5 percent; while strong-arm robberies, which involve the use of physical force (hands, fists, feet, etc.), rose 10.5 percent. From 1973 to 1978, armed robberies registered a 43.7 percent increase and strong-arm robberies increased 26.8 percent.

By Location




Some law enforcement officials attribute the overall increase in robberies to an unstable economy and the effect of inflation. Also, it is purported that the increased prices of narcotics and dangerous drugs have forced users to commit more robberies. The proliferation of small all-night markets, which represent convenient crime targets, has also been cited as a contributing factor to the increase in robberies.

The large increase in bank robberies may be attributed to the growth in the number of banks and savings and loan institutions throughout the state. Also, many banks have located in more suburban areas and have extended their banking hours, thus providing greater opportunity and accessibility to potential offenders.

As shown in Table 5 and Chart F, 64.0 percent of the total robberies in 1978 were armed robberies. Firearms (including simulating a firearm) continued to be the weapon most often used in armed robberies (67.8 percent). However, the largest increase from 1977 to 1978 was in the use of knives or cutting instruments, 9.9 percent.

Aggravated Assault - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

As indicated in Table 6, the number of aggravated assaults increased 7.2 percent in 1978 over the previous year (from 77,424 to 82,981). From 1973 to 1978, aggravated assaults increased 46.2 percent. "Dangerous weapons" other than firearms and knives or cutting instruments were most commonly used in aggravated assault crimes during 1978. "Hands, fists, feet, etc." were used in 27.1 percent of the assaults, knives and cutting instruments were used in 19.0 percent, and firearms in 21.7 percent of the aggravated assaults reported in 1978.



Only aggravated assaults are included in the Crime Index and Seven Major Offenses figures; however, BCS also collects data on nonaggravated assaults. There was a total of 94,661 nonaggravated assault crimes reported to law enforcement agencies in 1978. This represents a 6.2 percent increase over 1977 (from 89,151 to 94,661). From 1973 to 1978, there was a 36.4 percent growth in nonaggravated assault crimes.

CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY

Crimes against property are passive and lack the personal interaction and injury found in crimes against persons. As shown in Chart B, they accounted for 83.2 percent of the total Seven Major Offenses reported in 1978.

Table 1 shows that in 1978 there was a 6.4 percent increase in crimes against property over 1977 (from 764,531 to 813,234). Theft (\$200 and over) had the largest increase in number, up 10.5 percent. During the period from 1973 to 1978, crimes against property rose 30.4 percent in number with the category of theft (\$200 and over) recording the most significant increase, 105.0 percent.

From 1977 to 1978, the rate per 100,000 population for crimes against property grew 4.5 percent. Theft registered the largest percent change in rate, up 8.5 percent. From 1973 to 1978, the crimes against property rate increased 21.3 percent.

Burglary - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. (Includes attempted forcible entry.)

In 1978, burglaries represented 49.7 percent of the total Seven Major Offenses, and 59.7 percent of the crimes against property. As shown in Table 1, 1978 was the first year since 1975 that burglaries increased in number, up 5.0 percent over the previous year (from 462,736 to 485,742).

From 1977 to 1978, increases were recorded for both residential (4.9 percent) and nonresidential (5.2 percent) burglaries. Daytime burglaries rose 10.3 percent while nighttime burglaries increased 1.9 percent.



During the period from 1973 to 1978, total burglaries rose 19.2 percent. There were increases in both residential (23.1 percent) and nonresidential (11.6 percent) burglaries.

Table 7 displays data on the type of entry, location, and time of day for burglaries reported in 1973, 1977, and 1978. In 1978, approximately 71 percent of the burglaries were force and attempt force entry and 29 percent were no force entry. Residential burglaries made up 68.4 percent of the total burglaries. As to time of day, 38.7 percent of the burglaries occurred during the day, while 34.7 were perpetrated at night. In 26.5 percent of the burglaries, the time of commission was unknown.

Theft (\$200 and over) - The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property with a value of \$200 or more from the possession or constructive possession of another. (Except embezzlement, fraud, forgery, and worthless checks.)

Table 8 indicates that theft (\$200 and over) increased from 157,781 in 1977 to 174,386 in 1978, or 10.5 percent. From 1973 to 1978, theft crimes registered a 105.0 percent increase. An influence on the increase in thefts has been the effect of inflation, which caused more items to be included in the \$200 and over category.



Although data are displayed for all thefts, the Seven Major Offenses include only those thefts \$200 and over.

As noted earlier, only those thefts \$200 and over are included in the Seven Major Offenses. However, BCS also collects data on thefts under \$200. Total thefts reported in 1978 increased a slight


CHART I

1.9 percent from 1977. While thefts \$200 and over increased 10.5 percent, thefts \$50 to \$199 dropped 2.0 percent, and thefts under \$50 increased less than 1 percent (0.7 percent). Chart I shows data, by value, for total thefts in 1978.

The most noticeable increase in type of theft from 1977 to 1978 was for purse-snatching, up 10.9 percent. The largest decrease was in bicycle thefts, down 12.8 percent. Thefts "from auto and auto accessories" was the largest category, comprising 37.4 percent of the total.

Motor Vehicle Theft - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

In 1978, the number of motor vehicle thefts rose 6.3 percent (from 144,014 to 153,106). As shown in Table 9, the largest increase was in thefts of trucks and buses, 18.3 percent. From 1973 to 1978, motor vehicle thefts have shown an increase of 16.7 percent, the smallest increase of all the Seven Major Offenses.



A breakdown by type of vehicle stolen is not available for 1973. However, the proportions for type of vehicle stolen were similar in 1977 and 1978. In 1978, autos comprised 74.5 percent of the total motor vehicles stolen. (See Chart K.)

Some law enforcement agencies have attributed the increase in motor vehicle thefrs to car theft rings specializing in stealing and transporting motor vehicles out-of-state or dismantling them for the resale of parts. Also, the addition of mopeds to the "other vehicles" category may have contributed to the increase in the number of motor vehicle thefts.

STOLEN AND RECOVERED PROPERTY

Law enforcement agencies also report figures to the Bureau of Criminal Statistics on the estimated dollar value of stolen and recovered property. Since the data are not uniformly or consistently reported and agencies vary in their value estimating techniques, the figures must be considered as only "estimates." Also, it should be noted that these figures were affected in varying degrees by inflation.

As shown in Table 10, the dollar value of property stolen during 1978 was almost \$835 million. This was an increase of 34.9 percent over 1977 figures. Losses for currency, notes, etc. showed the greatest increase, 51.5 percent.

Stolen property recovered in 1978 was valued at over \$234 million, a 28.4 percent increase over 1977. The dollar value of recovered jewelry and precious metals increased 84.2 percent, while the dollar value of recovered livestock dropped 42.3 percent. Smaller changes were noted for other property types.

ARRESTS

An arrest is defined as an action which results in a person being taken into custody because the individual is believed to have violated the law. Not all arrests result in the person being placed in jail. Many arrestees are allowed to post bail or are released on their own recognizance to appear in court later to answer the charges against them. Also, some individuals are issued citations, much like traffic tickets, which direct them to appear in court later to answer the charges. However, in either case the arrest or citation is reported to the Bureau of Criminal Statistics (BCS).

In 1978, all California law enforcement agencies reported arrest and citation information to BCS on the "Monthly Arrest and Citation Register," generally referred to as the Arrest Register. This is a listing of each arrestee, and includes information such as age, sex, and race of the arrestee; the "most serious" arrest offense; and the law enforcement disposition (released or held for prosecution).

Both arrest and citation information are included in BCS arrest statistics. Arrest statistics are divided into two major groups: adult arrests (18 years and older) and juvenile arrests. Adult arrests are categorized as felony level and misdemeanor level. Juveniles may be arrested for either felony or misdemeanor level offenses as well as delinquent tendencies. The felony level category includes those offenses which could result in a death or state prison sentence if the offender is convicted as an adult. Misdemeanor level offenses are those which could result in a fine or a sentence of up to one year in the county jail. The delinquent tendencies category includes those acts which are offenses only when committed by a juvenile, such as incorrigibility, runaway, and truancy.

Revisions to certain California laws during the past few years have had a dramatic impact on the processing of adult and juvenile offenders by law enforcement agencies in the state. These changes and their impact on the reporting of arrest statistics to BCS are discussed later in this chapter.

Total Arrests

Table 11 presents data on the numbers of arrests and the arrest rates per 100,000 population for 1973 through 1978. Because smaller numbers are involved, there is frequently more variability in percent changes for low volume arrests, such as those for homicide, than in high volume arrests, such as those for burglary. (Arrest data for specific offenses are shown in Tables 12-16.)

The total number of arrests for both adults and juveniles decreased 1.5 percent from 1977 to 1978 (from 1,454,300 to 1,432,852). While there was a slight increase of 0.5 percent in adult arrests from 1977 to 1978, it was offset by an 8.7 percent drop in juvenile arrests.

From 1973 to 1978, the total number of arrests increased 3.6 percent (from 1,383,234 to 1,432,852). During this period, adult arrests increased 12.2 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 20.7 percent.

Changes in numbers of arrests are often more meaningful when discussed in relation to changes in the representative population. This type of comparison is termed "arrest rate" and is based on the number of arrests per 100,000 population. Total arrest rates are based on the total population of California; adult arrest rates are based on the adult population (persons 18 years of age and older); and juvenile arrest rates are based on the youth population, those most likely to be arrested for law violations (10-17 years). Population estimates for each year were furnished by the California Department of Finance.

Table 11 also shows the annual percent changes in arrest rates from 1973 through 1978. The total arrest rate dropped 3.2 percent from 1977 to 1978 (from 6641.9 to 6426.2). The total arrest rate has declined consistently each year since 1974, when it was 7108.9. Overall, the rate dropped 3.6 percent from 1973 to 1978. This decline can be largely attributed to the decrease in arrests of juveniles for delinquent tendencies, which dropped 66.9 percent in rate (from 3281.0 to 1087.4).

Rate per 100,000 Population





Chart M shows that of the total arrests reported in 1978, approximately 80 percent were adults and 20 percent were juveniles. Misdemeanor arrests comprised 74.3 percent of the total arrests reported, while felonies comprised 23.3 percent and delinquent tendencies made up the remaining 2.3 percent.

By Type and Level of Offense





The proportions of adult and juvenile arrests in 1978 for felony and misdemeanor level offenses are displayed in Chart N. Burglary was the only offense where the majority of the arrestees were juveniles. Adults represented 55.0 percent of those arrested for motor vehicle theft and 55.2 percent of those arrested for petty theft. Almost all individuals arrested for the misdemeanor offenses of drunk (94.9 percent), drunk driving (98.1 percent), and checks and credit cards (97.5 percent) were adults.

By Level and Offense




Adult Arrests

As shown in Table 11, the number of adult arrests reported increased from 1,139,425 in 1977 to 1,145,323 in 1978, or 0.5 percent. There was a 4.0 percent growth in felony arrests and a 0.3 percent decline in misdemeanor arrests.

From 1973 to 1978, the number of adult arrests increased 12.2 percent (from 1,020,617 to 1,145,323). During this period, there was a 2.3 percent decrease in felony arrests and a 16.7 percent increase in misdemeanor arrests.

Chart O shows adult arrest rates for each year from 1973 through 1978. Overall, the adult arrest rate remained fairly constant (7169.1 in 1973 and 7198.3 in 1978). However, a noticeable change in the level of arrest occurred in 1976. On January 1, 1976, a law went into effect which made the possession of not more than one ounce of unconcentrated marijuana a misdemeanor offense rather than a felony as in prior years. This resulted in a substantial decrease in felony marijuana arrests and an increase in misdemeanor drug law violations arrests from 1975 to 1976. As shown in Table 11, the adult felony arrest rate dropped from 1799.2 in 1975 to 1490.9 in 1976, or 17.1 percent. Conversely, the adult misdemeanor arrest rate increased from 5435.7 to 5773.5, or 6.2 percent during the same period.

Adult Felony Arrests

Adult felony arrests are grouped into five major categories: crimes against persons; crimes against property; drug law violations; sex law violations; and "all other."

As shown in Chart P, 24.8 percent of the total adult felony arrests during 1978 were for crimes against persons, 41.3 percent were for crimes against property, and 21.0 percent were for drug law violations. The remaining 13.0 percent were for sex law violations and "all other" offenses.

By Type of Offense



As noted earlier, adult felony arrests increased 4.0 percent from 1977 to 1978. Table 12 shows that adult arrests for crimes against persons rose 4.3 percent (from 55,538 to 57,906) during this period. Though small in number, the largest increase in this category was for kidnapping, up 29.2 percent from 1977 figures. Arrests for crimes against property increased 2.8 percent. The largest increase was in arrests for motor vehicle theft, up 9.0 percent from 1977. Arrests for drug law violations rose 4.6 percent, with those for marijuana offenses increasing only 0.2 percent and those for "all other" drug offenses increasing 6.3 percent. The "all other" drug offenses category includes possession

and/or sale of heroin, cocaine, dangerous drugs, and other nonmarijuana drug offenses. Coincidentally, the number of arrests for sex law violations was the same in 1977 and 1978. The "all other" offense category, which includes offenses such as weapons violations, drunk driving, bookmaking, and arson, increased 7.0 percent from 1977 to 1978.

From 1973 to 1978, adult felony arrests dropped 2.3 percent (from 239,395 to 233,957). This decline is attributed to the 49.3 percent decrease in arrests for drug law violations, especially those for marijuana offenses which registered a 77.9 percent drop.

Adult arrests for crimes against persons rose 27.2 percent from 1973 to 1978. The greatest percent increase was for the low volume offense of kidnapping, up 88.1 percent. Law enforcement officials could not identify any single cause for this increase. Felony arrests for crimes against property increased 26.5 percent. The largest growth in this category was in theft, up 56.6 percent. Part of this growth may be attributed to the fact that some thefts formerly classified as misdemeanor offenses are now in the felony category as a result of the inflated value of stolen items.

Adult Misdemeanor Arrests -

As shown in Table 13, adult misdemeanor arrests decreased 0.3 percent from 1977 to 1978 (from 914,464 to 911,366). The greatest increase was in arrests for disorderly conduct, up 10.1 percent, while the greatest drop was for obscene matter, down 40.0 percent.

More than half of the adult misdemeanor arrests in 1978 were for drunk and drunk driving offenses. Arrests for drunk offenses decreased 6.1 percent and arrests for drunk driving increased slightly, 0.6 percent, from 1977. When the numbers of drunk-related arrests are removed from the total misdemeanor arrests in both 1977 and 1978, the remaining misdemeanor arrests increased 2.3 percent during this period.

From 1973 to 1978, there was a 16.7 percent increase in adult misdemeanor arrests (from 781,222 to 911,366). Contributing largely to this overall increase were arrests for drug law violations (153.9 percent), assault and battery (53.1 percent), petty theft (34.6 percent), and traffic custody cases (34.7 percent).


Juvenile Arrests

As displayed in Table 11, juvenile arrests decreased 8.7 percent from 1977 to 1978 (from 314,875 to 287,529). There was a 1.4 percent decrease in felony level arrests, a 9.1 percent decrease in misdemeanor level arrests, and a 24.2 percent decrease in arrests for delinquent tendencies.

From 1973 to 1978, juvenile arrests dropped 20.7 percent. This overall decrease represents a 14.9 percent decline in felony level arrests, an 8.8 percent increase in the misdemeanor level arrests, and a 67.9 percent drop in arrests for delinquent tendencies.

The total juvenile arrest rate (100,000 youth population) decreased 7.3 percent from 1977 to 1978. The largest rate decrease was in the delinquent tendencies category (23.1 percent). In 1978, the juvenile arrest rate (9437.7) was 18.3 percent below that for 1973 (11,544.6). The rate increased 12.5 percent from 1973 to 1974, but decreased each year from 1975 through 1978. California's youth population (10-17 years of age) has declined 3.0 percent since 1973.

The marked decline in the overall juvenile arrest rate since 1975 is primarily the result of a trend to divert juveniles arrested for delinquent tendencies from the formal juvenile justice system. This will be discussed further in the section entitled "Delinquent Tendencies."

Juvenile Felony Arrests

Table 14 shows juvenile felony level arrests decreased only 1.4 percent from 1977 to 1978. Of the three major categories of juvenile felony level arrests, arrests for crimes against persons declined 3.8 percent, arrests for crimes against property decreased 1.8 percent, while arrests for drug law violations increased 3.3 percent.

Interestingly, the increase in arrests for "all other" drug law violations, which includes heroin, cocaine, dangerous drugs, and other nonmarijuana drug offenses, was greater than that for marijuana violations (4.5 percent versus 2.4 percent). As shown in Table 12, there was a similar pattern for adult felony drug law violations arrests, with arrests for "all other" drug law violations increasing 6.3 percent, but those pertaining to marijuana violations rising only 0.2 percent.

During the period from 1973 to 1978, juvenile felony level arrests dropped 14.9 percent (from 118,629 to 101,008). The category showing the largest decrease was drug law violations, down 76.1 percent. Despite the overall decrease, increases were noted in crimes against persons, up 1.8 percent, and crimes against property, which showed a gain of 14.1 percent.

Chart R shows that crimes against property accounted for 68.9 percent of the juvenile felony level arrests in 1978. In contrast, they represented only 41.3 percent of the adult felony arrests, as displayed in Chart P. Crimes against persons comprised 15.4 percent and drug law violations 8.3 percent of the juvenile felony level arrests during the year. The remaining 7.4 percent were for arson and "all other" felony offenses.

JUVENILE FELONY-LEVEL ARRESTS, 1978



Juvenile Misdemeanor Arrests

Juvenile arrests for misdemeanor level offenses dropped 9.1 percent from 1977 to 1978 (from 168,689 to 153,393). Decreases of 10 percent or more were recorded for malicious mischief, checks and credit cards (non-sufficient fund checks and credit card thefts), glue sniffing, disturbing the peace, assault and battery, and weapons offenses.

From 1973 to 1978, juvenile misdemeanor level arrests increased 8.8 percent (from 140,931 to 153,393). Noticeable increases were in the drunk driving offense category (173.9 percent) and drug law violations (142.2 percent). Misdemeanor level arrest categories of checks and credit cards, weapons, and disturbing the peace each showed a decrease of 40 percent or more. If arrests for alcohol- and drug-related offenses are excluded from the totals for 1973 and 1978, the remaining juvenile misdemeanor level arrests would reveal a 6.2 percent decrease instead of an 8.8 percent increase during this period.

Delinquent Tendencies

Arrests for delinquent tendencies, often referred to as "status" offenses, dropped 24.2 percent from 1977 to 1978 (from 43,713 to 33,128). There was a dramatic decline of 67.9 percent from 1973 to 1978. As expected, the largest decrease was from 1976 to 1977, 45.9 percent.

The trends of decreasing arrests of juvenile offenders reflect a change in philosophy in the treatment of youthful offenders within the juvenile justice system. Youthful offenders charged with acts which would not be deemed criminal if committed by an adult were being diverted from the juvenile justice system. In the early 1970s, federal monies were made available to establish diversion programs for handling the status offenders. The impact of these various programs to divert this type of youthful offender is quite evident in the arrest statistics for the past five years. This philosophy of diverting status offenders was codified into law in 1977. It prohibits the detention of these juveniles in secure facilities such as jails or juvenile halls and camps. Fewer juvenile status offenders have come to the attention of the criminal justice system, even though there have been slight revisions to that law since 1977 allowing temporary detention in secure facilities under certain conditions.

Personal Characteristics of Arrestees

Table 15 shows data for both adult and juvenile felony level arrests in 1978. Specifically, data are included on the age, sex, and race of individuals arrested for crimes against persons and crimes against property. Table 16 presents similar data for misdemeanor level arrests in 1978.

Felony Arrests

In 1978, California law enforcement agencies reported 334,965 felony level arrests (Table 15). Of these 101,008, or 30.2 percent, were of juveniles (persons under 18 years of age) and 69.8 percent were of adults. The median age of those arrested was 21.7 years.

Juveniles constituted a majority (50.5 percent) only among those arrested for burglary. The median age of those arrested for this offense was 17.8 years. Those arrested for motor vehicle theft and robbery tended to be somewhat older but still were below the "average," 19.0 and 21.5 years respectively.

The oldest felony arrestees, in terms of median age, were those arrested for crimes against persons, other than robbery (24.0 years). The median age of those arrested for forgery, checks, and credit card offenses was 25.3 years and 23.3 years for those arrested for felony drug law violations.

Males constituted 86.9 percent and females 13.1 percent of felony arrests. The male median age was 21.6 years and the female was 22.5 years. Forgery, checks, and credit cards was the offense category with the largest proportion of females among those arrested, 35.8 percent, followed by drug law violations with 18.1 percent.

Nearly half (48.0 percent) of those arrested for felony offenses were white, 28.0 percent were Negroes, 21.9 percent were Mexican-Americans, and 2.1 percent were of other racial groups. According to the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, on July 1, 1976, 71.5 percent of the state's population was white; 15.8 percent "Spanish;" 7.7 percent Negro; and 4.9 percent "other."

Whites tended to be arrested less frequently for crimes against persons (36.9 percent of those arrested for these crimes were white), and more frequently for crimes against property (49.9 percent) and drug law violations (54.2 percent). Negroes and Mexican-Americans, on the other hand, tended to be arrested relatively more frequently for crimes against persons; Negroes particularly for robbery, where they constituted 44.6 percent of the total.

The median age of Negro felony arrestees (22.6 years) was slightly higher than that of either white arrestees (21.3 years) or Mexican-American arrestees (21.3 years). Whites made up the largest proportion of felony arrestees in the under 18 age group, where they were 52.1 percent of the total. The white proportion fluctuated between 45 and 48 percent among the older age groups. Generally, the proportion of Mexican-Americans tended to decline with age while that of the Negroes tended to increase with age.

A striking relationship between race and age involved Negroes and whites arrested for felony drug law violations. Whites constituted 63.4 percent of those under 18 who were arrested for these offenses. Their proportion declined steadily with age until only 36.6 percent of the arrestees 40 and older were white. The Negro proportion, on the other hand, grew from only 16.8 percent of those under 18 to 40.8 percent of those 40 and over. Arrests for crimes against persons evidenced nearly the opposite pattern, though involving Mexican-Americans rather than Negroes: the proportion of whites increased with age from 31.4 percent of those under 18 to 45.8 percent of those 40 and over while that of Mexican-Americans declined from 31.5 percent to 18.1 percent.

Misdemeanor Arrests

California law enforcement agencies reported 1,064,759 misdemeanor level arrests in 1978 (Table 16). Of these arrests 153,393, or 14.4 percent, were juveniles and 85.6 percent were adults. The median age of persons arrested for misdemeanor offenses was 25.6 years, 3.9 years older than that of felony arrestees.

This age difference stems primarily from drunk-related arrests. Arrests for drunkenness and drunk driving together made up 47.3 percent of all misdemeanor arrests. Persons arrested for these offenses tended to be older than those arrested for other misdemeanor offenses. The median age of drunk driving arrestees was 31.8 years and those arrested for drunkenness, 33.4 years. The median age of persons arrested for all other misdemeanor offenses was 22.4 years.

Females represented 14.4 percent of the misdemeanor arrests. They tended to be younger than males, and their median age, 23.8 years, was 2.3 years younger. Nearly a quarter (23.2 percent) of the females arrested were juveniles, compared to only 12.9 percent of the males. This was primarily the result of a disproportionately large number of female arrests for petty theft, which tends to be a crime more frequently committed by the young (the median age of persons arrested for petty theft was 19.4 years). Of the female misdemeanor arrests, 29.4 percent were for petty theft while only 7.1 percent of the male arrests were for petty theft.

Whites constituted 56.7 percent of those arrested for misdemeanor offenses, Mexican-Americans 24.8 percent, Negroes 15.8 percent, and other racial groups 2.8 percent. Only in the traffic custody category did the Negro arrestees outnumber the Mexican-American agreeses. While the median age of Negroes was 27.5 years, the median ages of both whites and Mexican-Americans were 25.0 years.

LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL

California's primary law enforcement agencies employed almost 65,000 full-time employees, according to a one-day count taken on October 31, 1978. Of these, the vast majority (57,373) were employed by the state's 540 police and sheriffs' departments. Of the total personnel, 74.2 percent (48,181) were sworn and 25.8 percent (16,710) were civilians.

As shown in Table 17, the number of full-time personnel dropped by 1,080 (1.6 percent) from 1977 to 1978. Sworn personnel decreased by 0.7 percent. This decline was partially due to some duties of personnel, such as correctional officers, dispatchers, and warrant clerks being reclassified from sworn to civilian status. Civilian personnel decreased by 4.2 percent.

Both the numbers of sworn and civilian personnel in 1978 were slightly above 1976 levels. The growth in sworn personnel from 1973 to 1978 was 5.6 percent, while that of civilian personnel was 18.7 percent.

LAW ENFORCEMENT EXPENDITURES

California law enforcement agencies spent approximately \$1.6 billion in Fiscal Year 1977-78. This was an 11.5 percent increase over Fiscal Year 1976-77 and a 76.0 percent growth in monies spent during Fiscal Year 1972-73. The financial data were obtained from the Governor's Budget and the State Controller's Office and do not include monies spent for building construction or derived from federal or state grants. Also, the effect of inflation should be considered when reviewing the information presented.

As shown in Table 18, the greatest increase in dollars spent was at the local law enforcement level. Police departments spent over \$956 million in Fiscal Year 1977-78, a 12.2 percent increase from the previous fiscal year (1976-77). Sheriffs' departments spent over \$415 million, up 11.2 percent from Fiscal Year 1976-77. During the period 1972-73 to 1977-78, police and sheriffs' departments expenditures experienced almost identical increases, 79.0 and 79.8 percent respectively.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE GLOSSARY 1

- ADULT: a person 18 years of age or older at the time of committing a crime.
- ARREST: "...taking a person into custody, in a ase and in the manner authorized by law. An arrest may be made by a peace officer or by a private person." (P.C. 834)
- ARREST RATE: the number of arrests per 100,000 general population.
- **COMPLAINT:** a verified written accusation, filed with a local criminal court, which charges one or more persons with the commission of one or more offenses.
- CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE: a drug, substance, or immediate precursor which is included in Schedules I through V inclusive, as set forth in Health and Safety Code Sections 11054 through 11057. These would include heroin, marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates, and psychedelics.
- CRIME: "...an act committed or omitted in violation of law forbidding or commanding it..."
 (P.C. 15)
- CRIME RATE: the number of crimes per 100,000 general population.
- **DELINQUENT ACTS:** those acts described under Welfare and Institutions Code Section 602 which involved violations by a juvenile of any law or ordinance defining crime, or the violations of a court order of the juvenile court.
- **DELINQUENT TENDENCIES:** unreasonable or incorrigible behavior as described under Welfare and Institutions Code Section 601.
- DISPOSITION POLICE: an action taken as the result of an arrest. The police disposition includes the action taken by a prosecutor and accounts for a defendant's entry into lower or superior court or the juvenile justice system. Examples of a police disposition are: adults released by law enforcement, referred to another jurisdiction, or misdemeanor or felony complaint filed; juveniles handled within department, referred to another jurisdiction, or referred to the probation department or juvenile court. (Uniform Crime Reports)

DRUGS: see Controlled Substance.

FELONY: "...a crime punishable with death or by imprisonment in the state prison..." (P.C. 17)

CRIMINAL JUSTICE GLOSSARY - Continued

- FILING: a document filed with the municipal court clerk or county clerk by a prosecuting attorney alleging or accusing a person of committing or attempting to commit a crime.
- JUVENILE: a person under the age of 18 at the time of committing a crime.
- MISDEMEANOR: a crime punishable by imprisonment in the county jail, by a fine, or by both.

 Under certain conditions defined by Section 17 of the Penal Code, a felony crime can be treated as a misdemeanor.
- MONTHLY ARREST AND CITATION REGISTER: a reporting system used to collect information on adult and juvenile arrests. The Arrest Register reports detailed data which identify age, sex, and race characteristics of offenders and creates a link to subsequent court activity.
- OFFENSE: charged offense is the offense for which the defendant was arrested or filed on by the district attorney. Convicted offense is the offense for which the defendant was convicted of or pled guilty to in court. Sustained offense is the offense for which the juvenile court sustains a petition.
- STATUS OFFENDER: a juvenile who has been adjudicated by a judicial officer of a juvenile court, as having committed a status offense, which is an act or conduct which is an offense only when committed or engaged in by a juvenile.
- STATUS OFFENSE: an act or conduct which is declared by statute to be an offense, but only when committed or engaged in by a juvenile, and which can be adjudicated only by a juvenile court.
- UNIFORM CRIME REPORTS (UCR): a program which provides a nationwide view of crime based on the submission of police statistics by law enforcement agencies to a central state agency. The Bureau of Criminal Statistics administers and forwards these data to the national UCR Program for California.

¹The following glossary terms are intended for this specific publication.

OFFENSE DEFINITIONS CRIMES REPORTED LEVEL

- FBI CRIME INDEX: seven offenses which were selected because of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and likelihood of being reported to the police. These offenses are murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. (This definition was taken from "Crime in the United States, 1977.")
- NONAGGRAVATED ASSAULT: an assault which did not involve the use of a firearm, knife, or cutting instrument, or other dangerous weapon, and there was no serious injury or aggravated injury to the victim.
- SEVEN MAJOR OFFENSES: offenses most likely to be reported to the police by the public. These offenses are willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft (\$200 and over), and motor vehicle theft, and are reported according to definitions taken from the F.B.I. Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook.

Crimes Against Persons

Willful Homicide – the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. (Includes murder and nonnegligent manslaughter.)

Forcible Rape — the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. (Includes attempts to commit forcible rape.)

Robbery — the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault — an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

Crimes Against Property

Burglary — the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. (Includes attempted forcible entry.)

OFFENSE DEFINITIONS - Continued

Theft (\$200 and Over) — the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another with a value of \$200 or more. (Except embezzlement, fraud, forgery, worthless checks.)

Motor Vehicle Theft – the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.
