Circuit Clerk's Manual

Preliminary drafting of a Circuit Clerk's Manual was accomplished during 1976 by the staff of the Administrative Office of the Courts. The manual when completed will cover duties in connection with litigation filed in the circuit and district court served by the clerk. Additionally, the manual will cover accounting procedures, personnel matters, records retention, purchasing, statistics collection, electronic recordmaking in district court, and other pertinent subjects.

Court Facilities

On October 1, 1976, a facilities planner was employed by the Administrative Office of the Courts, and preliminary contacts were made with resource organizations to determine facilities needs for the Court of Justice. Studies of existing court facilities surveys were analyzed in anticipation of space needs prior to the impending activation of the district courts. A first draft of the Supreme Court building program was prepared and submitted for consideration.

Electronic Recording

Upon recommendation of the Advisory Committee to the Administrative Office of the Courts, electronic recording devices will be used exclusively in the district courts. In order to provide a method of appraising recording equipment presently on the market, studies conducted in other states were thoroughly reviewed. A telephone survey of 20 states was conducted to gather information on selection and procurement processes, types of equipment used, and methods of transcription

Those companies with equipment presently on the market meeting specifications established by the National Center for State Courts were contacted and invited to participate in an evaluation study to be conducted in March and April, 1977.

Uniform Records and Forms

During 1976 statutes were enacted to give the Court of Justice authority to develop a comprehensive records management program. A planning grant was awarded by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration and staff was employed to begin developing plans for the implementation of uniform record-keeping systems. Major work in forms design and uniform procedures has been started with completion scheduled during 1977.

Uniform Accounting Procedures

In order to more effectively control and manage the financial activities of the Court of Justice, it was determined that there was a need for the design and establishment of a uniform accounting system. In late 1976, a federal grant was awarded and work was begun on drafting requests for proposals for competitive bidding from professional organizations to develop a uniform accounting system to meet the requirements of the unified court system.

THE APPELLATE COURTS

On January 1, 1976, the former Court of Appeals became Kentucky's court of last resort, the Supreme Court.

With the approaching organization of the intermediate appellate court, the Supreme Court promulgated new Rules of Appellate Procedure which were adopted effective July 1, 1976. Although the Court of Appeals was not appointed until August 17, 1976, appeals were docketed to that court beginning July 1.

Under the provisions of the judicial article, the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court includes those appeals from a judgment of the circuit court imposing a sentence of death or life imprisonment, or imprisonment for twenty years or more. Additionally, the Supreme Court decides appeals docketed in that court through a motion for discretionary review or motion for transfer. All other appeals are considered by the Court of Appeals.

All appeals were docketed in the Supreme Court from January 1, 1976, until July 1, 1976. From that date the appeals were docketed in both courts according to their jurisdiction as prescribed by the Constitution and by the Rules of Appellate Procedure.
