SECTION I

Uniform Parole Reports (UPR) is a federally funded national project collecting data on paroled offenders sentenced to a year or more in prison. It is funded by the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service (NCJISS) of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA), and is operated by the National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD) Research Center in San Francisco.

The individual-case data summarized in this report are voluntarily provided to UPR by parole agencies across the nation, including the fifty states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico. The data cover characteristics of parolees such as the amount of time served in prison on current charge, type of commitment offense, and number of known prior prison commitments. The data also cover the status of parolees while on parole (continued or absconded) or at the time of their removal from parole (discharged, returned, or recommitted to prison, or died). The tables provided here comprise the 1977 report on three groups of parolees: 1974 entries after three years of parole supervision; 1975 entries after two years of parole supervision; and 1976 entries after one year of parole supervision.

Specific questions that are answered by the tables include:

- What are the characteristics of individuals who entered parole in 1976 according to sex, age, racial background, amount of time served in prison, prior prison commitments, and previous parole violations?
- What are the characteristics of individuals who entered parole in 1976 according to region (e.g., Northeast), sub-region (e.g., New England), and state (e.g., Maine)?
- What is the distribution of individuals entering parole in 1976 according to both number of known prior prison commitments and amount of time served in prison on current charge?
- What is the distribution of individuals entering parole in 1974, 1975, and 1976, respectively, according to both conviction for a new offense while on parole and original commitment offense?
- In 1977, what was the parole status of individuals who entered parole in 1974, 1975, and 1976 respectively?
- After one year of follow-up, what was the parole status of individuals who entered parole in 1973, 1974, 1975, and 1976, respectively?

SECTION II METHODOLOGY

Sources of Data

During the three year period covered by this reports, forty-two states, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia submitted data on individual parolees for at least one year (see Appendix A). Not covered were Connecticut, Indiana, Maryland, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Colorado, Montana, and Washington. However, because of differences in data reporting, the number of jurisdictions whose data were included in the tabulations varied from table to table, ranging from a total of thirty-five in Table 1 to a total of thirty-nine in Table 3. See Appendix B for detailed data tables.

Estimation Procedures

In the instances (see Appendix A) where the data provided were incomplete, e.g., only a percentage of a particular parole population was covered, or data were reported for part of the three-year follow-up period, estimation procedures were used to reduce bias in the overall data base.

First, in states which reported on a sample of their parole populations, each reported case was weighted by the inverse of the sampling percentage. For example, if a state reported on fifteen cases as a 25% random sample of its parole population, each case was multiplied by 1/.25 (which is equal to 4). The estimated total population would be $15 \times 4 = 60$.

Second, where states reported data for less than twelve months in 1977, each reported case was weighted by the inverse of the percentage of the year covered. For example, if a state reported data for only nine months of the year (75% or 3/4), each reported case was multiplied by 1/.75 (which is equal to 1-1/3 (one and one-third)) or 4/3. So if the data for the nine months covered fifteen case, the estimated total population would be $15 \times 4/3 = 20$.

The first procedure assumes that the random sample is statistically equivalent to the total population. Statistical validity of the assumption can be computed. The second procedure assumes that the partial year sample is also statistically equivalent. The extent to which this assumption applies, that is the extent to which parole status and the composition of the parole population vary by month of parole entry, is an empirical issue. At the present time, UPR does not have the detailed data necessary to test this assumption or to create a more precise estimation model.

Definitions

Terms used in the report which have unique meaning within the UPR system are defined below:

- Commitment Offense--This refers to the offense for which the parolee was serving the prison term when s/he was placed on parole.
- Jurisdiction--This denotes the official realm of authority of a parole board/commission. In this publication parole jurisdiction is to be distinguished from parole supervision. The data were collected and are presented on the basis of official jurisdiction rather than where a parolee was living or being supervised.
- Known Prior Commitments--These are previous offenses for which the parolee was sentenced to prison for one year or more and was incarcerated on that sentence(s). The variable includes only those incarcerations that were known by parole authorities.
- New Conviction--This refers to any (new) offense(s) committed for which the parolee was convicted while s/he was under parole supervision for up to three years.
- Parole Entries--This refers to individuals "entering" or placed on parole during a particular year. It also includes return to parole supervision as a result of a new parole order or reinstatement on a previous parole order. This publication covers individuals entering parole in 1973, 1974, 1975, and 1976.
- Parole Population--This refers to only adult males and females who were sentenced to one year or more in the prison system, and who were released to parole supervision by either board action or by formal jurisdiction being transferred to a parole authority.
- Parole Status--This denotes the status (e.g., discharged, continued, absconded, returned or recommitted to prison, died) of parolees after one-year intervals (e.g., 1974 parole status of 1973 parole entries) for up to three years. Within this three-year range, parolees are followed only until they exit the system via discharge, return or recommitment to prison, or death.
- Time Served--This signifies the amount of time served in prison by the parolees on his/her current charge before being released on parole.

Data Presentation

The data in the tables have been presented in percentages except in two instances: 1) in Table 1 median age is represented

by an actual number of years, e.g., 30 years for ALL JURISDICTIONS; and 2) in Table 3, again, median time served is represented by an actual number of months, e.g., 24 months for ALL JURISDICTIONS.

SECTION III

NATIONAL PROFILE OF PAROLEES

Overview

The tables in this report cover four major areas:

- 1. Characteristics of the population entering parole (Table 1)
- 2. Time served in prison (Table 2)
- 3. Convictions for new major offenses committed while on parole (Table 3)
- 4. Parole status (Tables 4 and 5)

<u>Table 1</u> <u>Characteristics of Persons Entering</u> Parole Supervision in 1976

This table summarizes basic descriptive data on parolees who came under parole supervision in 1976, and covers the following characteristics: sex; age; race; amount of time served in prison on current charge; percentage with prior prison commitments; percentage of previous parole violators; and the ratio of the number of persons released on parole to the number of persons released from prison.

There are four levels of totals: 1) national or ALL JURIS-DICTIONS; 2) regional (i.e., Northeast, North Central, South, and West); 3) subregional (i.e., New England, Middle Atlantic, East North Central, West North Central, South Atlantic, East South Central, West South Central, Mountain, and Pacific); and 4) individual agencies.

Sex

Overall, at all four levels of summary, the proportion of males far exceeds the proportion of females. At the national level (ALL JURISDICTIONS), males comprise 94.1% of the population, females 5.3%. Amont the four regions, the Northeast had the highest proportion of male parolees (96.5%), and the South the highest proportion or female parolees (6.6%). Among the agencies, Wyoming shows the highest proportion of female parolees (11.1%), followed by North Carolina (8.8%), and Delaware (8.2%).

Nationally, the median age for 1976 parole entries was 25.6 years. Regionally, the highest median age was in the Northeast (26.6 years), and the lowest in the West (21.1 years). Because of its size, California tends to determine the shape of Western regional statistics and those for the Pacific sub-region, which in this case shows a median age of 20.6. The median ages are low because the 1976 entry file includes data supplied by the California Youth Authority (CYA) (court commitments only) while it does not include data on the older population of the California Department of Corrections (CDC). Among the agencies, Puerto Rico (30.3 years), the District of Columbia (29.7 years), and Utah (28.8 years) had the highest median age, while California (CYA) had the lowest (20.6 years).

Race

Nationally, the population was closely divided according to the two broad racial groups listed in the table: majority race, 48.3%; all other races 51.7%. Regionally, this was also the pattern except for the Northeast region where 36.8% of the parolees were from the majority race, and 63.2% from all other races. Among the agencies, Puerto Rico shows the highest percentage of all other races (99.4%), followed by Washington, D. C. (96.6%), New York (75.3%), New Jersey (70.6%), New Mexico (67.7%), California (CYA) and Alaska (60.9%). Highest percentages for the majority race are shown by Maine (98.1%) and New Hampshire (96.5%).

Time Served (In Prison on Current Charge)

Nationally, median time served in prison on current charge was 15.9 months. Regionally, the North Central region shows the highest in median time served (16.6 months), followed by the Northeastern region (16.3 months), and the South (16.0 months). The West is lowest with 12.8 months.

Known Prior Prison Commitments

Nationally, 26.1% of the individuals released on parole in 1976 had known prior prison commitments. Regionally, the Northeast region shows the highest percentage (32.8%), while the West shows the lowest percentage (9.3%, largely determined by the presence of California Youth Authority (CYA) figures in the regional data). Among the agencies, North Dakota shows the highest percentage (60.0%), followed by Delaware (51.8%), Idaho (44.3%), Pennsylvania (38.7%), Maine (37.7%), and New Jersey (37.2%). California (CYA) shows the lowest percentage (0.6%), followed by Georgia (12.9%), and Illinois (17.0%).

Previous Parole Violators

Nationally, 8.9% of the individuals released on parole in 1976 were previous parole violators. Regionally, the West shows the highest percentage of previous violators (20.3%), followed by the Northeast (14.4%). The North Central region with 9.4% more closely approximates the national figure (8.9%), while the South shows the lowest percentage (3.8%). Among the agencies, New Jersey had the highest percentage of previous parole violators (29.8%), followed by California (CYA) (26.3%), and Kansas (20.8%). On the other hand, North Carolina had the lowest percentage (0.1%), followed by New Mexico (0.8%), Missouri, South Carolina, and South Dakota (all with 1.3%), and Puerto Rico (1.5%).

Parole Entries as Percentage of Prison Releases

Nationally, individuals released on parole in 1976 comprise 68.9% of those released from prison. Regionally, the West shows the highest percentage (83.3%), followed by the Northeast (77.4%), and North Central (77.2%). The South shows the lowest percentage (57.8%). Among the agencies, Washington shows the highest percentage (99.0%), followed by New Hampshire (94.7%), New Jersey (93.3%), Vermont (92.5%), California (CYA) (92.1%), Illinois (90.6%), and Arkansas (89.1%). Georgia (36.1%), Wyoming (37.5%), Arizona (37.9%), Louisiana (41.0%), and Alabama (42.3%) show the lowest percentages.

Table 2 Time Served in Prison by Number of Known Prior Prison Commitments Controlling For Commitment Offense

The figures in this table were drawn from a "controlled" cross-tabulation in which time served in prison on current charge was cross-tabulated by number of known prior prison commitments while commitment offense was controlled. The three variables were ordered from low to high: time served according to severity; prior commitments; and commitment offense according to seriousness.

Time served is divided into six categories: less than 1 year; 1 year up to 2 years; 2 years up to 3 years; 3 years up to 4 years; 4 years up to 5 years; and 5 years and over. Prior commitments is also divided into six categories: none; one; two; three; four; and five or more. Commitment offense is divided into three categories: less serious (equivalent to Uniform Crime Reports (UCR) Part II); more serious (equivalent to Uniform Crime Reports (UCR) Part I crimes against property); and most serious (crimes against persons). All figures in the table are percentages, and represent the distribution of time served by prior commitments or each of the three offense groups separately. Looking at the offense groups separ-

ately minimizes the influence commitment offense would have upon the prior commitments-time served distribution.

With the effects of commitment offense removed or minimized, a statistical relationship between time served and prior commitments is expected: the amount of time served would increase with an increase in the number of prior commitments. As Table 2 indicates, this general pattern does emerge.

For example, when the least serious offenses (UCR Part II) are controlled, Table 2 shows that of parolees with no prior commitments, more (47.9%) served less than one year in prison, but as the number of prior commitments increases the percentage of parolees serving the longer term of one to two years increases. This pattern is similar for the more serious offenses (UCR Part I Property). Here, again, more parolees (51.8%) with no prior commitments served less than one year in prison, but as the number of prior commitments increases the percentage of parolees serving the longer terms of one to two years and two to three years increases. Finally, when the most serious offenses (crimes against persons) are controlled, the table shows that of parolees with no prior commitments, more (34.9%) served one to two years in prison. And here, too, as the number of prior commitments increases, the percentage of parolees serving the longer terms of two to three years, three to four years, and four to five years, and five years and over increases. Also, a distinct trend appears in the 5 YEARS AND OVER row of the most serious offenses: as the number of prior commitments increases the percentages of parolees serving five years and over increase steadily.

New Convictions for Persons Returned to Prison During Three Years of Parole Supervision By Commitment Offense

This table shows the distribution of new convictions for parolees who were released on parole between 1974-1976, and who were returned to prison during parole supervision for up to three years after release on parole. New convictions are distributed according to commitment offense.

The format of this table reflects a few changes from that of the corresponding table in the UPR Newsletters prior to 1978. (For example, see the table "New Major Allegations with Prison Return and New Major Convictions in First Year for Persons Paroled in 1974" in the February, 1977 UPR Newsletter.)

1. Four subheadings have been introduced to categorize offenses: No New Conviction replaces None from the old format Crime Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, and All Other Crimes have been added.

- 2. There is a slight change in the names and order of some of the individual crimes. For example, in Crimes Against Persons, Negligent Manslaughter is now Involuntary Manslaughter, Aggravated Assault is now simply Assault, and all other sex offenses have been divided and placed under All Other Crimes as Commercial and Non-commercial Sex Offenses. In the order of crimes in Crimes Against Persons category, there are two small changes: Theft or Larceny is now Larceny-Theft, and Vehicle Theft is now Motor Vehicle Theft. And finally, in the All Other Crimes category, the changes are: Forgery, Fraud or Larceny by Check to Forgery or Fraud; Commercial and Non-commercial Sex Offenses have been added; and Violation of Narcotic Drug Laws, and Violations of Alcohol Laws are now Narcotic Law Violations and Alcohol Law Violations.
- 3. Cross-tabulation data are provided not only by individual crimes, but also by the consolidated categories: Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, and All Other Crimes.
 - 4. Both males and females are included.
 - 5. Data are presented only in percentages.

The most significant pattern in the data in this table is the overwhelmingly high percentage of parolees (88.4%) who were not convicted of a new offense. Among those who were convicted of a new offense, the largest group committed crimes against property (4.5%), followed by all other crimes (3.6%), and crimes against persons (3.5%).

The distribution according to commitment offense is therefore dominated by considerably large percentages of parolees with no new conviction. For example, 89.0% of those whose commitment offenses were crimes against persons, and 86.7% of those whose commitment offenses were crimes against property were not convicted of a new offense. The highest percentages overall for no new conviction are: 95.7% of the parolees whose commitment offense was willful homicide; 94.0% of those whose commitment offense was involuntary manslaughter; and 92.6% of those whose commitment offenses were crimes against property, the highest percentage with no new conviction is for larceny-theft (87.4%), which is lower than the rates for parolees in the separate categories of crimes against persons, e.g., willful homicide, involuntary manslaughter, and assault. Among parolees whose commitment offenses were in the all other crimes category, the highest percentages not convicted of a new offense are for alcohol law violations (98.4%); noncommercial sex offenses (93.8%); narcotic law violations (93.7%); and commercial sex offenses (91.2%).

On the other hand, among parolees who had new convictions, the largest percentage <u>repeating</u> commitment offenses is in the crimes against property category (7.6%), followed by those in the crimes against persons category (5.8%). These percentages are quite small, but the pattern indicates that parolees repeated

crimes against property more frequently than either crimes against persons or all other crimes. Further, as the data on the second page of this table show, parolees whose commitment offenses were armed robbery and unarmed robbery were more likely to receive new convictions for crimes against persons (8.3% and 7.3%, respectively) than for either crimes against property or all other crimes. In addition, parolees whose commitment offenses were motor vehicle theft, burglary, and larceny-theft were more likely to receive new convictions for crimes against property (8.8%, 7.9%, and 6.6%, respectively) than for either crimes against persons of all other crimes. Finally, parolees whose commitment offense was a commercial sex offense were more likely to receive new convictions for all other crimes (5.9%) than for either crimes against persons or crimes against property.

Table 4 1977 Parole Status Report

The data in this table correspond generally with that in the September, 1977 "UPR UPDATE: Trends in the Data, Extended Followups: the 1973, 1974, and 1975 Cohorts." The distribution, here, however, summarizes the parole status in 1977 of parolees who entered parole in 1974, 1975, and 1976, and who were followed from their entry dates on parole through 1977. This means that the parole status of 1974 parole entries is based on three years of follow-up during parole supervision, hence the label "1974--Three-Year Follow-Up" in the table. Similarly, the parole status of 1975 and 1976 parole entries is based on two years and one year of follow-up, respectively. One change has been introduced in the illustration of the data (see Table 4): the breakdown of parole status is more detailed. In addition to percentages reported as absconded, returned to prison with new minor conviction or technical violation, and recommitted to prison for a new major offense, Table 4 includes percentages discharged, continued on parole with and without difficulty, returned to prison with and without a new minor or major conviction or without a violation, and the percentage reported dead.

some of the variation in the distribution in Table 4 is generally characteristic of parole. For example, the table shows that the percentage of parolees discharged from parole increases with length of the period of follow-up: 55.8% of the 1974 parole entries were discharged (three-year follow-up), compared with 46.9% of the 1975 parole entries (two-year follow-up), and 17.1% of the 1976 parole entries (one-year follow-up). This pattern is consistent in the distribution of parolees continued on parole (no difficulty): the highest percentage (65.0%) is for 1976 parole entries, followed by 26.8% of the 1975 parole entries, and 16.3% of the 1974 parole entries. Overall, this category of continued on parole (no difficulty) either had no reported difficulty while under parole supervision, or had convictions for minor offenses resulting in sentences of less than sixty days. Those who were

continued on parole with difficulty comprise very small percentages: 2.3% of the 1976 parole entries; 0.6% of the 1975 parole entries; and 0.2% of the 1974 parole entries.

The rate at which parolees absconded is also quite low. According to the data, in 1977, the 1976 parole entries had the highest percentage of parolees who were reported as having absconded (4.3%), followed by the 1975 parole entries (2.6%), and the 1974 parole entries (2.0%).

On the other hand, the 1974 parole entries had the highest percentage of paroless returned to prison (13.3%), followed by the 1975 parole entries (11.8%), and the 1976 parole entries (7.3%). This category includes all returns to prison other than recommitment to prison on a new major offense. But here, again, it appears that length of the follow-up period is an important variable because the longer the follow-up period, the greater the possibility of the parolee's return to prison in this population. It is clear from the data, however, that most of the parolees in this group were returned to prison for technical violations only (no new conviction(s) and not in lieu of prosecution). Among the 1974 and 1975 parole entries, the rates, 8.5% and 8.8%, respectively, were almost double that of the 1976 parole entries (4.7%).

The proportions of parolees returned to prison for both new minor or lesser conviction(s) or in lieu of prosecution, and in lieu of prosecution for new major offense(s) are similar, with higher percentages for the 1974 and 1975 parole entries and lower percentages for the 1976 parole entries. The proportion of parolees returned to prison but not for new violations (some are returned for medical treatment) is extremely low, ranging from 0.1% of the 1974 and 1975 parole entries to 0.4% of the 1976 parole entries.

With 11.0% recommitted to prison for a new major conviction, the 1974 parole entries show the highest recommitment rate, followed by the 1975 parole entries (10.8%). Only 5.7% of the 1976 parole entries were recommitted for a new major conviction. One inference that can be drawn from this pattern is that parolees tend to be more successful in not committing a new major criminal offense within the first year after release on parole than over the second and third years.

Finally, the numbers of parolees from the 1974-1976 parole entry population reported to have died in 1977 were very small. They ranged from 1.7% of the 1974 parole entries to 0.6% of the 1976 parole entries.

One-Year Parole Status of People Entering Parole in 1973, 1974, 1975 and 1976

UPR has previously published first-year status data for 1973, 1974, and 1975 parolees in somewhat similar form to that shown in Table 5 (see UPR Newsletters February, 1977 and November, 1976; and "UPR UPDATE: Trends in the Data," September, 1977). The reported results differ slightly for four reasons. First, as previously described, the categories of parole status have been increased to identify separately discharges and deaths. Second, 1974 and 1975 data have been weighted to correct for missing months and sampling percentages as described in the Methodology section. Third, based on the 1977 data (that is, the 1974 third-year status and the 1974 second-year status), it was possible to correct certain errors or omissions in the previously published data. changes tended to increase the rate of return or recommitment to prison. Fourth, the population shown in Table 5 includes only those states that provided complete data for each follow-up group (that is, third-year results for 1973 and 1974 parolees, secondyear results for 1974 parolees, as well as first-year results for 1976 parolees). This last factor means that the year-to-year parolee status has shown a high degree of stability once a certain minimum number of states are represented. This minimum is met in all data shown. On the other hand, the first-year results are directly comparable to the multi-year results shown in Table 4 (that is, 1974 first-year and third-year status are results at different time periods for the same population, as is also true for 1975 first-year and second-year status), a comparison in which considerable variation is expected.

The distribution in Table 5 shows the one-year parole status of parolees who were released on parole in 1973, 1974, 1975, and 1976, respectively; the plot lines in the table illustrate trends in the one-year parole status for each of these groups.

The percentage rates for parolees who were discharged from parole after one year show a gradual decline over the 1973-1976 period, dropping from 22.2% in 1973 to 21.1% in 1974, to 20.5% in 1975, and finally to 17.1% in 1976.


Rates for those continued on parole declined slightly in 1974 and 1975 (from 59.6% in 1973 to 57.9% in 1974, and to 58.8% in 1975), but rose sharply in 1976 (65.0%).

On the other hand, rates for parolees returned to prison (in the next three categories) fluctuated between 1973 and 1974, then declined in 1976. For example, the rates for parolees returned for technical violations or new minor convictions rose slightly from 8.7% in 1973 to 9.7% in 1974, then dropped slightly to 9.0% in 1975, and dropped even more (to 6.9%) in 1976. The rates for parolees recommitted to prison for new major convictions rose from 4.2% in 1973 to 7.5% in 1974, rose again in 1975 to 8.0%, then dropped to 5.7% in 1976. Among parolees who were reported to have absconded, the rates dropped from 4.2% in 1973 to 2.7% in 1974, rose slightly

to 3.0% in 1975, and rose again to 4.3% in 1976. Finally, the percentages of parolees reported dead are extremely small, ranging from 0.6% in 1976 to 1.1% in 1974.
