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#### INTRODUCTION

Section 2001, Chapter 1103, Division 2.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, states: "The Office of Criminal Justice Planning shall conduct a survey to determine which state agencies administer federal grant funds for the purposes set forth in Section 2002."

This report is a response to that legislative demand. Its purpose is to offer anyone interested in Federal resources for Human Services an easy reference to those resources. It does not attempt to detail the specifics of each piece of legislation nor substitute for the knowledge of professionals managing or working with programs implemented under a given piece of legislation. Again, this document is a greatly simplified overview of most (but not all) Federal funds available for Human Services.

The first draft of this survey was completed in March of 1978 using the <u>U.S. Code Service</u> as the resource document. It contained an overall analysis of various Federal Acts, similar to the Legislative Summaries in this report.

During the initial survey it became apparent that more detailed program information must be included in our final version if the summary was to be functional. The program information contained in this final report was taken from the <u>Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance</u>, <u>1977 edition</u>. In addition, it was reviewed and supplemented, substantiated, clarified or eliminated (due to recent changes in legislation) by specialists working at both the State and Federal levels of government. Flow charts were added to increase the reader's understanding of the flow of Federal funds from the national to local level.

The inevitable passing of new legislation and changes in law necessitate periodic revision of this survey. The Office of Criminal Justice Planning will provide updated or expanded program coverage on July 1 of each year. These updates can be obtained by writing the Executive Director of the Office of Criminal Justice Planning. Programs authorized under legislation for Agriculture, Transportation, Community Mental Health, and Action will be added in the July 1979 update.

The Survey contains (17) seventeen sections, ordered according to the <u>Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance</u> number. There are three parts to each section: 1) Legislative Summary; 2) Program Summary; and 3) Flow Chart.

The Legislation Summary: The Legislation Summary is an over-view of the basic legislation and is analyzed in terms of purposes, types of funding, and possible applicability to Youth and Family Programs. Each legislative summary contains the Act's stated purposes followed by a reference page number(s). Each number refers the reader to the appropriate page for a Program Summary that is consistent with the identified purpose. The page numbers in the Funding Categories column also refer the reader to corresponding Program Summaries. Some legislative programs were excluded from the Summaries when they were found inappropriate as a source of funding for Youth and Family projects.

The <u>Program Summary</u>: The Program Summary is a break down, per the <u>Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance</u>, of categorical programs included in the <u>legislation</u>. Each program summary represents a single funding category (or portion of such) within the enabling <u>legislation</u>. It also is cross-referenced by page numbers to the <u>Legislative Summary and appropriate Flow Chart(s)</u>.

Flow Chart: The Flow Chart is presented for each piece of legislation and/or program(s). The flow chart offers the reader a visual portrayal of fund flow from application to award or rejection.

In our desire to be brief and concise, some inaccuracies may have occured. For that reason we invite knowledgeable persons to offer their comments, corrections and/or suggestions for improving this document, thereby making future versions more useful to the reader.
