

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Introduction

This volume is a product of the National Evaluation of LEAA's Standards and Goals (S&G) Program. The S&G program was active during the period 1974-77. The evaluation was conducted by the American Institutes for Research in 1977-78.

It was the intent of the S&G program that each state develop its own set of standards for the operation of its criminal justice institutions--law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, public defense services, courts, and the correctional system. The standards were to include topics that cut across LE/CJ institutions such as juveniles, system planning, information systems, and crime prevention. By March 1978, 45 of the states had developed standards for at least some aspect of the LE/CJ system. Most states published their standards as a separate volume explicitly designated as the product of the S&G Program. Some states simply included the standards in their comprehensive state plans. Four additional states with S&G programs had not published any standards by that date, and two states chose not to participate in the program.

The standards do not have the force of law or even of administrative regulation. They were typically produced by a commission of leading figures in the state's law enforcement and criminal justice system. Often, prominent lay persons were also included. The commission was typically supported by a research and administrative staff, functioning in much the same role as a congressional committee staff. The standards they produced can be read as an official statement of where a state wants its law enforcement and criminal justice system to be heading, and the minimum acceptable practices that the system should permit. The standards were not always adopted by the State Planning Agencies (SPAs), nor were the LE/CJ agencies in some states aware of their existence (see Table 1).

The concordance of standards and goals that follows embraces 41 states that had completed standards development by March 1978, and for which the S&G document was publicly available. It focuses on 136 selected topics--"key elements" as we labeled them--that specified policy and practice in concrete detail. The topics were chosen from the five volumes produced by the National Advisory Commission in 1973: those dealing with police, courts, corrections, the criminal justice system, and community crime prevention. Several criteria governed the selection of standards. They were to be specific enough to entail an identifiable behavior or activity by an agency affected by the standard. Thus, broad and undefined standards such as "Every police agency should insure its operational effectiveness in dealing with other elements in the criminal justice system" were eliminated from consideration. Standards were also eliminated if they appeared to address self-evident or incontrovertible truths, or if they merely endorsed policies or practices that were settled by some other authority such as a legal statute or a court decision. Another obvious criterion was the intrinsic importance and salience of the issues the standards addressed to the criminal justice system.

Data reported on the following pages were obtained by combing the standards volumes of the 41 states and determining the stance of each state on each of the 136 key elements. In the final step, the variations on each key element were grouped into a manageable number of categories, with footnotes indicating significant deviations.

When interpreting the tables, it should be remembered that states varied in their approaches to standards development. Some states, such as South Carolina, developed standards only on a few topics of highest priority in that state; hence, South Carolina did not have standards for most of the topics in this comparison. Other states virtually copied the National Advisory Commission (NAC) standards. Still others went beyond the scope of NAC, and developed standards on topics not covered in this analysis. At each of these extremes, the impressions left by the tables could occasionally be misleading. Most states, however, used NAC as a guide, applying their own thinking to the topics we covered.

Many coding decisions were necessarily subjective. In particular, we sometimes wavered on the question of whether to code "no standard," when a remotely relevant item had been found. The rule was that the state standard must address the specific topic indicated by the key element. But there were borderline cases.

It should also be noted that states were often ambiguous about what constituted a "standard," as distinct from an "implementation strategy," or just "commentary." We took a broad interpretation of "standard," using most of the material in the volumes, regardless of its official label. Information retrieved from commentary is generally italicized in the following tables.

The results of this exercise were used as a basis for much of the analysis in the evaluation reports.* But it is our hope that the complete state-by-state breakdown will be of reference value to SPAs and other criminal justice planning agencies. Hence this concordance.
