

\* \* \* HIGHLIGHTS \* \* \*

These highlights are presented as an interpretive aid to the readers of this publication. The data base itself is a compilation of self reporting by the courts and is the best available objective data of its type. However, recognizing some imperfections in the current state of the art, caution is recommended in absolute use.

\*THE 23,406 JUVENILE COURT REFERRALS REPORTED IN 1978 REFLECTED A 3.7% INCREASE OVER 1977. HOWEVER, THIS INCREASE COULD BE SLIGHTLY LARGER AS DATA WAS NOT RECEIVED FROM GRAY COUNTY AND POTTAWATOMIE AND WABAUNSEE COUNTIES DID NOT PARTICIPATE. (page 3)

\* THE SIX LARGE COUNTIES HAVE CONSISTENTLY REPORTED APPROXIMATELY TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL REFERRALS DURING THE PAST THREE YEARS. (page 4)

\*THERE WERE 11,362 REFERRALS FOR DELINQUENT AND MISCREANT ACTS DURING 1978 OF WHICH 4,912, OR 43.2%, WERE FOR LARCENY AND BURGLARY. (page 6)

## PREFACE

Since the 1977 juvenile report was issued, the Kansas Legislature passed, and the Governor signed into law, HB 2059, the Kansas Juvenile Justice Information System (KJJIS). The text of this bill is found in Appendix E. The law is now part of the Kansas Juvenile Code (KSA 38-805). The collective efforts of the Office of the Judicial Administrator, the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services and the Statistical Analysis Center of the Governor's Committee on Criminal Administration are currently moving toward active implementation of the unified reporting system.

The proposed model for the KJJIS emulates a National Model developed by Mr. Lawrence A. Boxerman of the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges. This National Model, called the Juvenile Information System Requirements Analysis Project (JISRA) supplants the older HEW Juvenile Court Statistical Card series and expands the data base significantly. While not necessarily proposing to transfer the total JISRA model to Kansas, although nothing would mitigate against this, the developed Kansas system should retain the basic design so as to be a functioning contributor to a national statistical data base maintained by the National Center for Juvenile Justice (NCJJ) in Philadelphia. Kansas currently contributes to this data base and should continue as a participant into the future.

Numerous localities have begun to restructure their juvenile systems and every effort has been made to keep abreast of these developments, as well as advise these localities of the direction that the state system may be progressing. The hope exists that localities will use the state model so as to minimize the possible interface problems in meeting the reporting requirements. Similarly, the state system has attempted to recognize specific problems of localities and structure the system accordingly.

It had been proposed that the new reporting system be finalized and in place by January 1, 1980. However, this date proved unachievable. Currently, a July 1, 1980 date is the target. Current scheduling would seem to indicate only a 50-50 chance for the new date. Regardless, the old statistical card (Appendix F) will continue in use until replaced.

It is firmly believed that the data collected under the new system will greatly enhance the ability of program planners and policy makers to adequately plan for juvenile facilities and progress in the future. Similarly, the data base will be a comprehensive one, in that it will be the base of information from which all agencies will draw their basic information, hence, alleviating the current problem existing in conflicting data presentations. The future of Kansas in the area of juvenile justice statistics appears, at this time, quite bright indeed.

## INTRODUCTION

The data contained in this publication represents court submissions of the Juvenile Court Statistical Card (Appendix F) for calendar year 1978. Unlike 1977, total reporting for all 105 counties was not received for 1978. Cards from Gray county were never received while Pottawatomie and Wabaunsee counties refused to participate. Due to the passage of HB 2059, the Kansas Juvenile Justice Information System (KJJIS) bill, statutory authority now exists for the collection of data in the future. This report should return to one of comprehensive scope in all future years.

The knowledge concerning the activities of juveniles in the State of Kansas allows state and local officials, program planners and criminal justice personnel to gauge the needs of youth in the state. Such knowledge allows for informed decisionmaking in the allocation of limited resources to address identified problem areas. This system report for 1978 attempts to provide decisionmakers with knowledge necessary to make informed decisions on the juvenile activity in Kansas. Data reported in this publication comes from the Statistical Card exhibited in Appendix F. This form will remain as the basic input document for the KJJIS until the revised system is finalized.

The data collection effort for this system report is a coordinated effort between the Office of the Judicial Administrator, Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services and the Statistical Analysis Center of the Governor's Committee on Criminal Administration. This coordination should continue in the future and yield positive benefits for the entire state.

While the Kansas Juvenile Code is constantly under examination, and efforts at recodification are currently under way, the current Code is found in the Kansas Statutes Annotated 38-801 et seq. The juvenile system has developed a specialized vocabulary to adequately describe the proceedings. Portions of this vocabulary are contained in Appendix C to assist the reader in understanding the materials found in this publication.

This year's report has been expanded significantly. The "large county" designation has been expanded to include Douglas and Reno counties. As before, however, any county may request data of a specific nature.

One concern continues to exist from the past. A rather large amount of "Missing Data" is reported. This "missing" label is attached to any variable which was not completed when the card was submitted. In many cases, attempts were made to get responses; however, this was not always possible. Further efforts should significantly reduce the amount of missing data reported.


JUVENILE COURT ACTIVITY IN 1978

TRENDS IN JUVENILE COURT REFERRALS

Statistical information on activity through the juvenile court in Kansas for 1978 was processed on 23,406 referrals. Chart I pictures the trend in referrals since record keeping began in 1960. The 1978 referral rate represented a 5.5% decrease from the peak of 24,777 referrals in 1975, and a 3.7% increase over the 1977 referral rate of 22,562.

The average number of referrals per court has increased from 214 per court in 1977 to 228 in 1978. This measure is probably slightly conservative, since data was available for only 102 courts in the 1978 tabulation, as compared to 105 courts in 1977.

While it is hoped all courts will complete data cards on all referrals handled by any court personnel, whether formally or informally, inconsistency of reporting is a major failing of this information system. When making any cross-county comparisons, one must remember that possible inconsistencies exist in the data. While attempts are continuing to achieve a level of uniformity across jurisdictions, such has yet to be achieved. Factors that affect reporting consistency and allow variations in the data include:

- (1) Differences in interpretation of reporting standards;
- (2) Differences in administrative practices while some courts report only formal cases, other courts may designate only the most serious cases as formal. Unification should assist in the constancy of administrative practices;
- (3) Varying community and/or parental attitudes;
- (4) Other community agencies may serve children without such activity coming to the attention of the court;
- (5) Handling policies of the law enforcement agencies;
- (6) Population size or density of the area;
- (7) A rural versus urban differentiation.

An example of the effect of one of these factors on trends, as suggested by the available data, is found in Table 1.

(Note: For 1978 county numbers were missing on 64 cases. Thus, while there were 23,342 total cases received only 23,406 proved usable).

Table 1 presents the referral rate over a three-year period by locality. Sedgwick county showed a 109.7% increase in total referrals between 1976 and 1978. However, further examination of the procedural aspects of the actual reporting revealed that only formal cases were submitted for 1976; proper reporting procedures were followed for 1977 and 1978 figures. When the referral rates for Sedgwick county for the years 1977 and 1978 were compared, a 9.4% decrease in referrals was found. The effect of inconsistencies in reporting procedures becomes apparent when trends and cross-county comparisons are attempted.

#### REASONS FOR REFERRAL

Referrals in 1978 were made for the specific offenses listed in Table 2. The table has been divided into six sections, based on categories outlined in the Kansas Juvenile Code. The first section (Murder to Trespassing) pertains to Delinquent and Miscreant acts -- equivalent to the adult classifications of felony and misdemeanor, respectively. Of this category, Larceny-Shoplifting was the most frequent juvenile offense reported (1,872), followed by referrals assigned to the "other" delinquent/miscreant category (1,858). The second division (Running Away to Other) contains the status offenses -- those offenses applicable only to juveniles, of which Running Away was the most frequent referral type. Traffic offenses (Drunk Driving to All Other Traffic) comprise the third grouping of referrals. The fourth division contains those referrals designated as Deprived. Special Proceedings, the fifth section, refers to petitions to marry, adoption proceedings, custody proceedings, requests to enlist and requests for emancipation. Finally, referrals which did not specify an offense are assigned to the "Missing" section. Throughout this publication any referrals lacking one or more of the data elements under consideration will be assigned the "Missing" classification.

These legal categories of offense are summarized in Table 3. Delinquent-Miscreant acts accounted for nearly one-half of the court-activity, while status offenses comprised more than one-quarter of the workload. Together, the two categories represented 75.1% of the total referrals; for Johnson county, these two categories combined accounted for 92.5% of the county's total referrals. In a cross-county comparison, considerable variation was found in the Status Offender category, with Johnson county showing the highest referral rate of 39.8% and Sedgwick county showing the lowest referral rate for this category with 14.0%. Wyandotte county reported a large proportion of Deprived cases (21.1%). The remainder of percentages approximated the distribution of state totals.

For ease of presentation, most references throughout this book will be relative to these legal categorizations.

Offenses listed in the Kansas Criminal Code (K.S.A. 21-101 et. seq.) are classified into topical categories (i.e., Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, Crimes Against Public Safety, Sex Offenses, etc.).

Table 4 provides the distribution of referral offenses into the larger topical categories. Non-criminal type referrals (status, traffic, deprived, special) comprised the largest proportion of the total (48.9%), with shoplifting and burglary being the primary crimes against property. Non-aggravated assault was the leading referral in the Crimes Against Persons category. Analysis of the data for Uniform Controlled Substances referrals showed that non-narcotic drug offenses comprised 77.8% of the total for that category.

## MANNER OF HANDLING

One of the principal elements in the handling of a juvenile case is the decision whether to file a petition. Essentially, when a petition is filed the juvenile is formally placed into the mainstream of the court's activity. Table 5 indicates that 50.8% of the 1978 referrals were handled with formal petition. The data also showed that 47.5% of total referrals for 1978 were handled informally, or without petition. Such informal cases include referrals to other community resources or resolution at intake.

With the exception of Sedgwick county, the data suggested a preference for informal handling of juvenile cases in the large counties; this tendency was most marked for Johnson county, which showed that 78.6% of all juvenile cases were handled without petition. Data for Sedgwick county was skewed toward formal handling of juvenile cases, with 80.7% of that county's juvenile cases being handled with petition. Figures for "all other" counties also indicated a tendency toward formal handling, as 66.5% of total referrals for this category were handled with petition.

## SEASONALITY OF REFERRALS

As the data in Table 6 and Chart 2 suggest, peak rates for juvenile referrals appeared in the months of March and October, while low referral activity was indicated in the months of February, July, and December. Further seasonality data can be found in Appendix D.

## DEMOGRAPHIC CHARACTERISTICS OF REFERRALS

The three primary demographic variables in the current data base are age, sex, and race. From a program planning perspective, knowledge of demographic variables allows for effective allocation of limited resources across the state. Table 7 shows the distribution of referrals based on age. The data indicated that youths from 15 to 17 years old comprised the largest group of youths referred to the courts (59.7%).

Problems with the current data base become evident in an age by category of offense analysis (Appendix D). A child prior to the first birthday would be correctly entered as "0". However, according to the data submitted, 61 referrals in the "0" age bracket were for delinquent-miscreant acts or status offenses. Such findings must raise a question of the validity of the data for these referral cases. Hopefully, implementation of the unified reporting system will alleviate such problems in the data base for future publications.

Table 8 presents the distribution of referrals by sex. Overall, referrals of males constituted 68.7% of total referrals, with referrals of females comprising 30.2% of the total. This percentage distribution was approximated across all localities.

The distribution of referrals by race is presented in Table 9. The figures indicated that 78.8% of all referrals were identified as white. Again, weaknesses in the current data base should be considered in an evaluation of the data. The large percentage of "Missing" entries (7.7%) suggest that reporting of race may be problematic for some agencies. In addition, expansion of the category of Race to include other designations (Oriental, Mexican-American, etc.) may reduce entries in the "Other category, thereby improving the accuracy of comparisons.

#### SOURCE OF REFERRAL

Analysis of the data supplied on source of referral found that law enforcement agencies were responsible for almost three-quarters (72.4%) of the total referrals of juveniles to the court in 1978 (Table 10). Percentage distribution for referral from a law enforcement agency varied across localities, from 89.9% of all referrals in Johnson county to 60.5% of total referrals in Wyandotte County. Wyandotte county showed a high rate of referral from a social agency (22.9%) as compared to the overall rate of 8.6% for referral by social agencies.

## RECIDIVISM THROUGH THE COURTS

The data elements of Prior Referrals During Calendar Year and Referrals In Previous Years are intended to provide information concerning recidivistic activity through the courts. However, several problems exist with these variables, which limit the applicability of findings based on these statistics as they are currently reported. For instance, it is impossible to ascertain the relationship between individual activity in previous years and individual activity during the current year, which limits the usefulness of the data for historical analysis. Also, some confusion exists as to whether figures reported individual activity or referral activity. For these reasons, analysis of these data elements will not be attempted; the tables will, however, be included in Appendix D for reference.

### CARE PENDING DISPOSITION

Another problematic data element in the current information system is the Care Pending Disposition entry. In its present form, a court is asked to combine the numbers for the provided entries should more than one type of case occur. Future revisions will attempt to clarify the recording procedures. Table 11 is provided for reference only; of the total referrals, 75.9% indicated no detention overnight, while 13.1% had some form of confinement prior to disposition.

## CASE DISPOSITION

The manner in which a particular referral is settled by the court is presented in Table 12. Of the total referrals, 102 were waived to the adult court; Sedgwick and Wyandotte counties accounted for 62.7% of these cases (64). Cases that were dismissed (10,069) comprised 43% of the total. Considerable variation was found in the percentage of cases dismissed -- data supplied for Johnson county indicated that 73.6 of all referrals made for that county were dismissed, while data submitted for Douglas county showed that only 4.5% of all referrals in that County were dismissed. Probation was the disposition in 15.7% of the total number of cases. The transfer of legal custody, generally to SRS, occurred in 2,429 referrals (10.4%).

## TIME FROM REFERRAL TO DISPOSITION

The length of time between the date of referral and the final disposition of the referral was computed from two data elements, the date of referral and the date of disposition. If either of these data elements is missing for a particular referral, then the length variable is impossible to compute and must be assigned the "Missing" classification. Table 13 shows that 11.5% of the referrals (2,680) had missing data.

Examination of the data submitted revealed that 51.3% of total referrals (12,013) were disposed of in 30 days or less. If missing cases are excluded from the total, the percentage of cases disposed of in 30 days or less increases to 58% of the adjusted total. Notable differences in results are found when percentages are based on totals that include Missing cases, as compared with totals that exclude Missing elements. For instance, Douglas county disposed of 45% of all referrals in 30 days or less when Missing entries were included in the computations; however, when Missing referrals were excluded from the total figure, Douglas county disposed of 67.9% of its referrals in 30 days or less. Similarly, Shawnee county figures indicated that 37.7% of referrals were disposed of in 30 days or less when Missing elements were excluded from the computations. In view of the possible discrepancy, one should consider the magnitude of Missing cases with respect to the total when assessing the results of the data.

SUMMARY

The purpose of this section has been to present each variable from the current input document of the Kansas Juvenile Justice Information System (KJJIS) and to provide some descriptive highlighting of the data submitted. Indications of general activity through the juvenile courts of Kansas have been based on the data as it was reported by the agencies represented. Caution was advised in interpreting the data in areas where problems in the data base exist. It is anticipated that the new unified reporting system will enhance the quality of information provided for those persons responsible for program planning, evaluation, and expenditures.

The following section will present crosstabulation of selected data elements in an attempt to examine interrelationships of the variables. Remaining tables generated from the data collected are provided in Appendix D as a resource for the reader.

## SECTION II

### COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS OF SELECTED VARIABLES

The purpose of this section is to examine the interrelationships of selected variables. Tables presented in this section show specific trends in the data, or serious deficiencies in the data base. Tables with crosstabulations of variables not found in this section are included in Appendix D for reference.

Table 14 presents the crosstabulation of Race by Sex for 1978 referrals. The available data indicated that white males comprised 60.4% of the total number of referrals, black males accounted for 8.1% of the total, and Indian males represented .3% of the total figure. In addition, the data showed that white females constituted 25% of all referrals, black females represented 3.9%, and Indian females accounted for .2% of the total number of referrals. If only male referrals are considered (15,180), white males accounted for 85.9%, black males 11.5%, and Indian males .4% of the total. Of the female referrals (6,404), white females represented 84.3%, black females 13.3%, and Indian females .6% of the total.

Again, since there is a significant number of missing cases (7.8%), conclusions about the interrelationship of these variables should be made with caution. In addition, a more discrete breakdown of race categories to include other designations (Oriental, Mexican-American, etc.) should reduce the number of "Other" entries, thereby producing more precise data.

The category of Offense by Sex is presented in Table 15. Of the male referrals, 58.3% were for delinquent-miscreant offenses, and 20.8% were for status offenses. By contrast, analysis of female referrals showed that 30.4% were for delinquent-miscreant offenses, and 42.7% were for status offenses. Of the referrals made for delinquent-miscreant acts, male referrals accounted for 81.7% of the total. Referrals for status offenses were almost equally divided between males and females (53.1% and 46.9%, respectively).

Table 16 provides data for Category of Offense by Race. For white referrals, 48.8% were made for delinquent-miscreant offenses, and 29.6% were made for status offenses. Similarly, 48.6% of Indian referrals were for delinquent-miscreant offenses and 19.3% were for status offenses. Data for black referrals showed that delinquent-miscreant offenses accounted for 63.3% of the referrals, and status offenses constituted 17.4% of the total for black referrals. It should be noted that, again, there was a sizeable number of Missing cases which limits the usefulness of the data.

Examination of the data submitted for the manner in which a referral is handled in relation to the category of offense (Table 17) indicated that 59.6% of the delinquent-miscreant referrals were handled with petition. In contrast, 63.2% of referrals for status offenses were handled informally, or without petition.

A comparison of the data element Category of Offense with Source of Referral (Table 18) revealed that those agencies charged with certain activities are indeed involved in those activities. Law enforcement agencies were the source of 93.3% of the delinquent-miscreant type referrals for the year. These cases comprised 62.3% of the total referral activity from law enforcement agencies for the year. Law enforcement agencies were also responsible for 61.4% of all referrals made for status offenses, which represented 22.6% of total law enforcement referrals. The data showed that school departments generally made referrals for status offenses (88.4% of all school referrals), with truancy being the most frequent offense reported (Appendix D-5). Social agencies were most likely to make referrals for deprived cases (86.3% of all social agency referrals).

Crosstabulation of the data reported for Manner of Handling by Sex (Table 19) showed that slightly more than half of female referrals were processed without petition (54.9%), whereas male referrals were handled with petition at approximately the same rate (54.6%).

Table 20 provides figures on the interrelationship of Manner of Handling and Race. For white referrals, manner of handling was almost equally divided between informal and formal handling (49.3% and 50.7%, respectively). According to the data available, almost two-thirds of Black and Indian referrals were handled with petition (63.2% and 63.3%, respectively). As noted, these tendencies are based on the data available for analysis; one should keep in mind that close to 10% of the referrals in this crosstabulation were classified as Missing.

An interesting system activity is apparent in Table 21, Manner of Handling by Source of Referral. While formal handling of referrals represented 52% of the total, referral by probation officer had an 84% chance of being handled formally. The data would suggest that once on probation, further violations were not viewed favorably by the probation staff.

Table 22 outlines the data available for disposition by the category of offense. Only .7% of the referrals made for delinquent-miscreant acts were waived to criminal court, 46.3% of such referrals were dismissed, and probation was the disposition in 23.1% of those cases. The majority of referrals made for status offenses were dismissed (56.5%), and 13.1% of such cases were settled by probation. The 1,196 Traffic offenses assigned the "Other" disposition (53.5%) most probably represented some sort of fine being paid. Deprived cases were most often referred elsewhere (35.6%), followed by dismissed cases 25.8%), and finally, in 23.2% of Deprived cases, custody was given to a public agency. Since 43.9% of referrals made for Special Proceedings were classified "Inapplicable", it is difficult to make assumptions about these entries.

An indication of possible inaccurate data input is found in Table 23, Disposition by Manner of Handling. Of the 102 cases listed as being waived to criminal court, 10 were reported as being handled without petition. It is doubtful such was the case. Similarly, 147 of the entries pertaining to the transfer of legal custody were reported to have been handled without petition, which is most probably incorrect. As is evident from the cited examples, care should be taken in interpreting the data available on the interrelationship of these two variables.

Tables 24 and 25 present data available for the time elapsed between referral and disposition by category of offense and manner of handling, respectively. As pointed out previously, both data elements must be available for this analysis; if one data element is missing, the case is assigned the "Missing" classification. Assumptions based on the data provided for these tables should be made with caution since more than 10% of the cases in each table were assigned as "Missing" (13.4% and 12.8%, respectively).

Nevertheless, Table 24 indicates that slightly more than one-half of the delinquent-miscreant referrals were completed in 30 days or less. Similarly, 56.9% of the deprived cases were completed in this amount of time. Nearly 70% of the referrals for status and traffic offenses were completed in 30 days or less (66.5% and 68.7%, respectively). In many cases, both the delinquent-miscreant referrals and the deprived referrals necessitate alternative placements, hence requiring greater lengths of time to locate proper placement situations for the individuals.

APPENDIX C  
Glossary of Terms

## GLOSSARY

- Adjudication - the process of deciding whether or not a youth fits into one of the categories of delinquent, miscreant, deprived, wayward or truant.
- Criminal-type offender - a child who has been charged with, or adjudicated as, being a delinquent or miscreant child.
- Delinquent child - a child less than 18 years of age who does an act which, if done by a person 18 years of age or over, would make such a person liable to be arrested and prosecuted for the commission of a felony.
- Deprived - a child less than 18 years of age:  
(1) who is without proper parental care or control, subsistence, education... or control necessary for such child's physical mental or emotional health, and the deprivation is not due solely to the lack of financial means of such child's parents, guardian or other custodian;  
(2) who has been placed for care or adoption in violation of law;  
(3) who has been abandoned or physically, mentally, emotionally abused or neglected or sexually abused by his or her parent, guardian or other custodian;  
(4) who is without a parent, guardian or legal custodian.
- Juvenile Offender - a child, subject to the jurisdiction of the Kansas juvenile code, that is an accused or adjudicated delinquent, miscreant, wayward or deprived child or a traffic offender or truant.
- Miscreant child - a child less than 18 years of age who does an act which, if done by a person 18 years of age or over, would make such person liable to be arrested and prosecuted for the commission of a misdemeanor; or the violation of any city ordinance or county resolution; or who escapes from or runs away from any lawful court ordered placement.
- Petition - a formal statement of the allegation(s) alleging a child to be delinquent, miscreant, deprived, wayward or truant.
- Status offender - a child alleged or adjudicated to be a wayward or deprived child or a truant.

Traffic offender

- a child under 14 years of age who does an act which, if done by a person 14 years of age or over, would make such person liable to be arrested and prosecuted for the violation of specific traffic offenses. Whenever a child of 14 years of age or older is charged with a traffic offense, the prosecution of such offense shall not be heard pursuant to the juvenile code but shall be commenced in a court of competent jurisdiction in the same manner as prosecutions involving adults.

Truant

- a child who, being by law required to attend school, absents himself or herself therefrom to the extent of being a truant.

Wayward child

- a child less than 18 years of age:
  - (1) whose behavior is injurious to his or her welfare;
  - (2) who has deserted his or her home without good or sufficient cause;
  - (3) who is habitually disobedient to the reasonable and lawful commands of his or her parent, guardian or other lawful custodian;
  - (4) who does an act the commission of which by persons under the age of 18 years is specifically prohibited and made unlawful by state law, city ordinance or county resolution.

(c) In order to properly advise the three branches of government on the operation of the juvenile justice system, each district court shall furnish the judicial administrator such information regarding juveniles coming to the attention of the court pursuant to the Kansas juvenile code as is determined necessary by the secretary of social and rehabilitation services and the director of the governor's committee on criminal administration, on forms approved by the judicial administrator.
